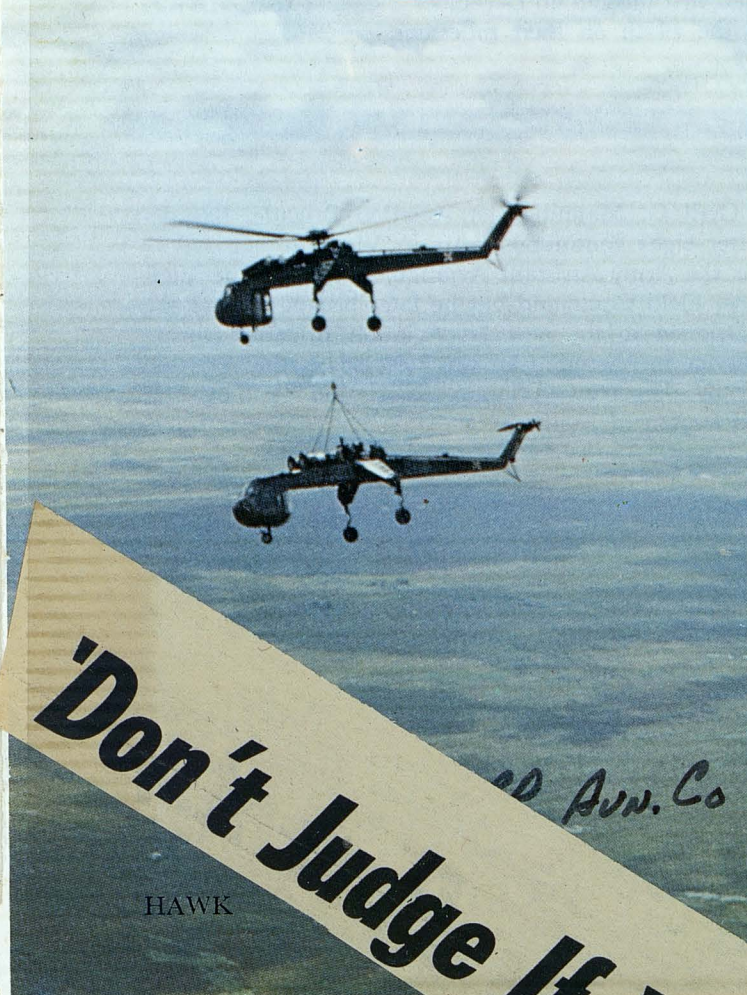

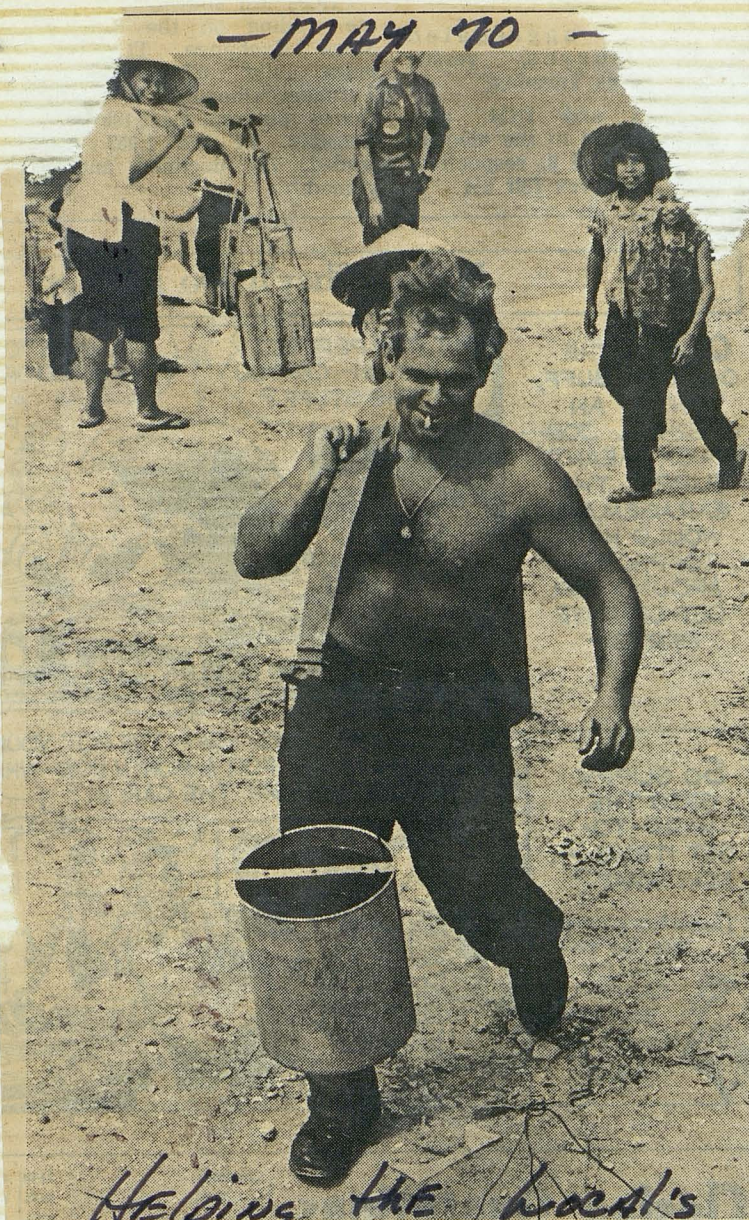

Explaining the difference between MEDCAPS in the Republic of Vietnam and Cambodia, Fleming said, "Over there (in RVN) we simply set up a medical aid station at the main gate and the people come to see us. 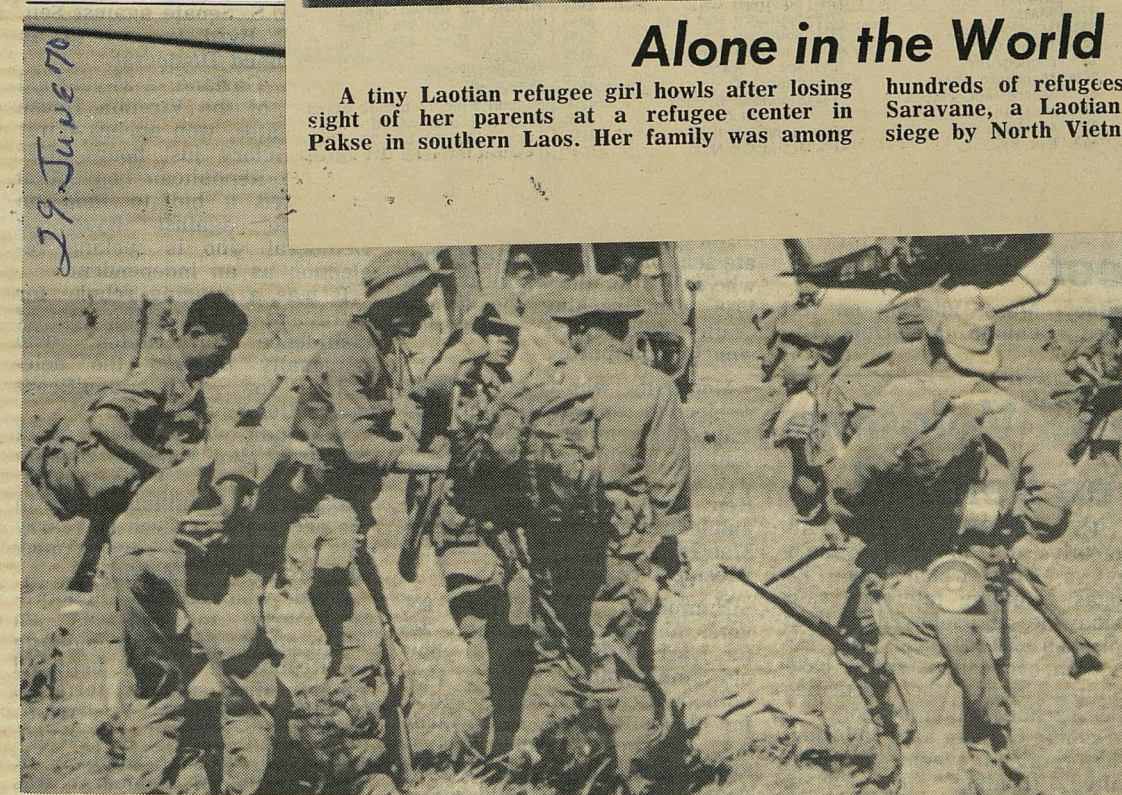

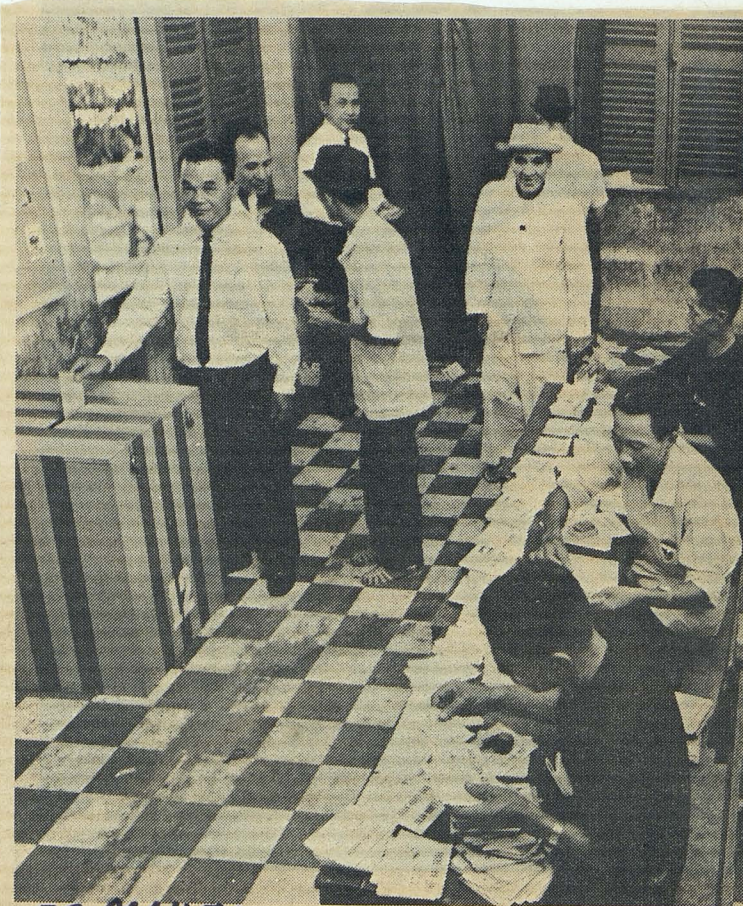

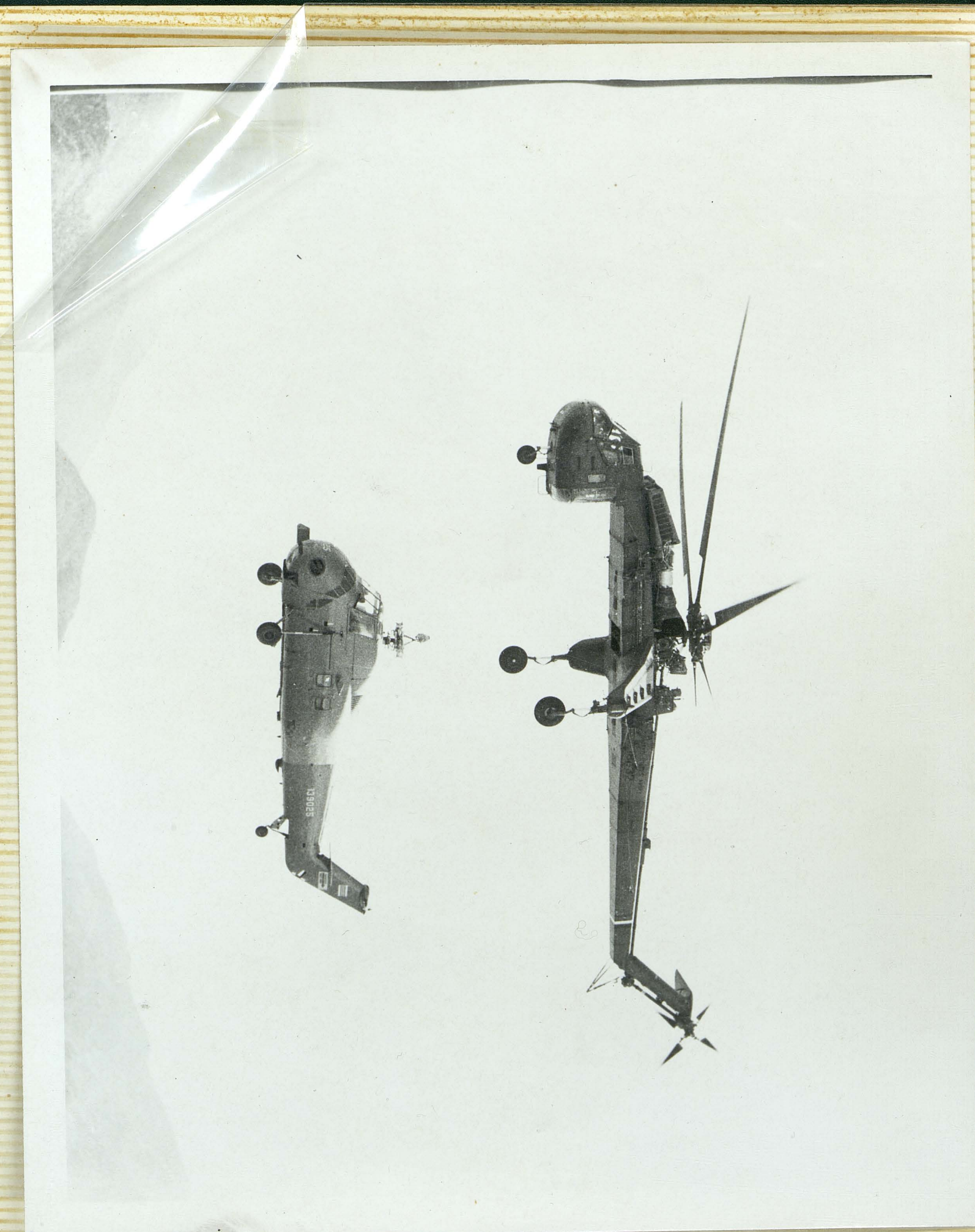

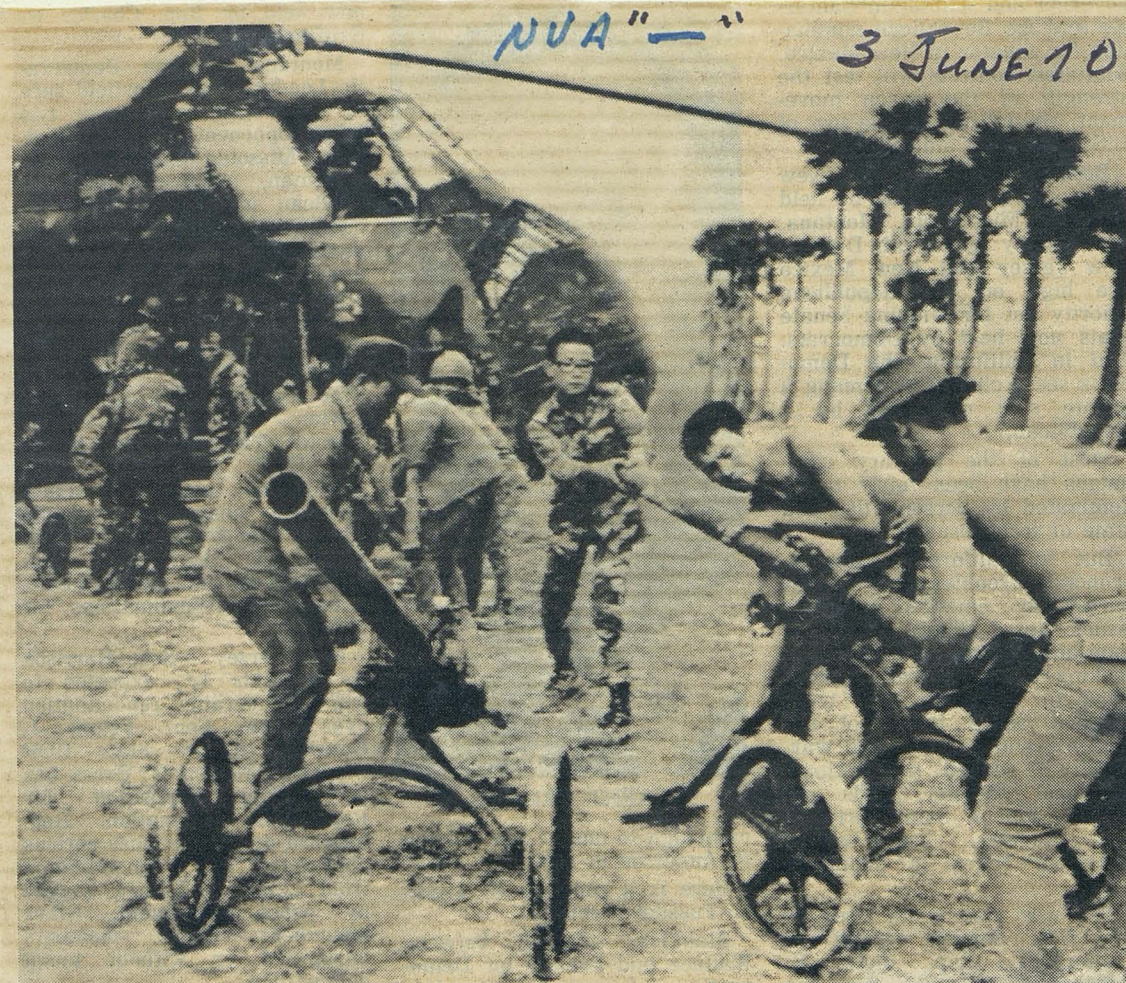

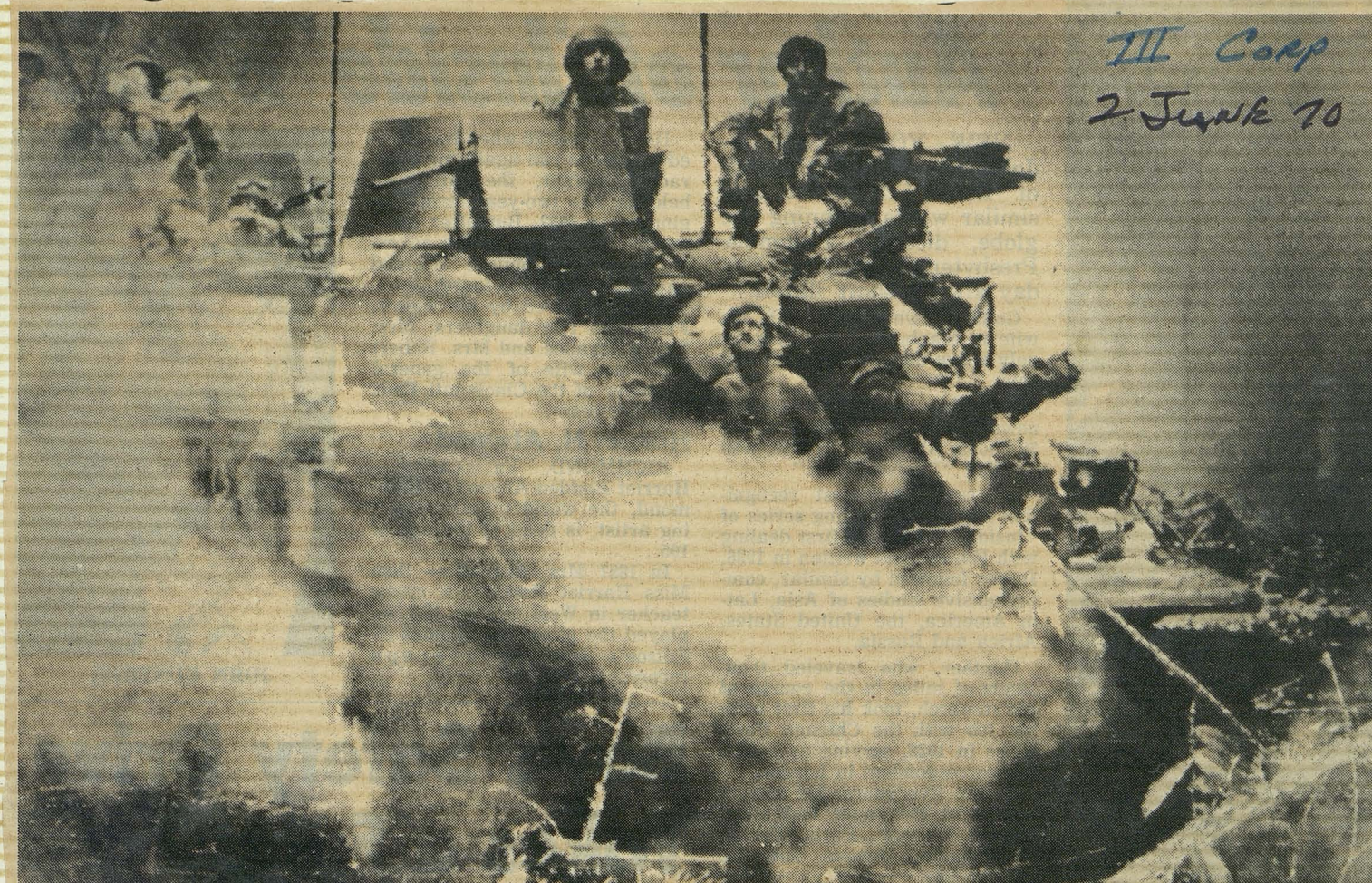




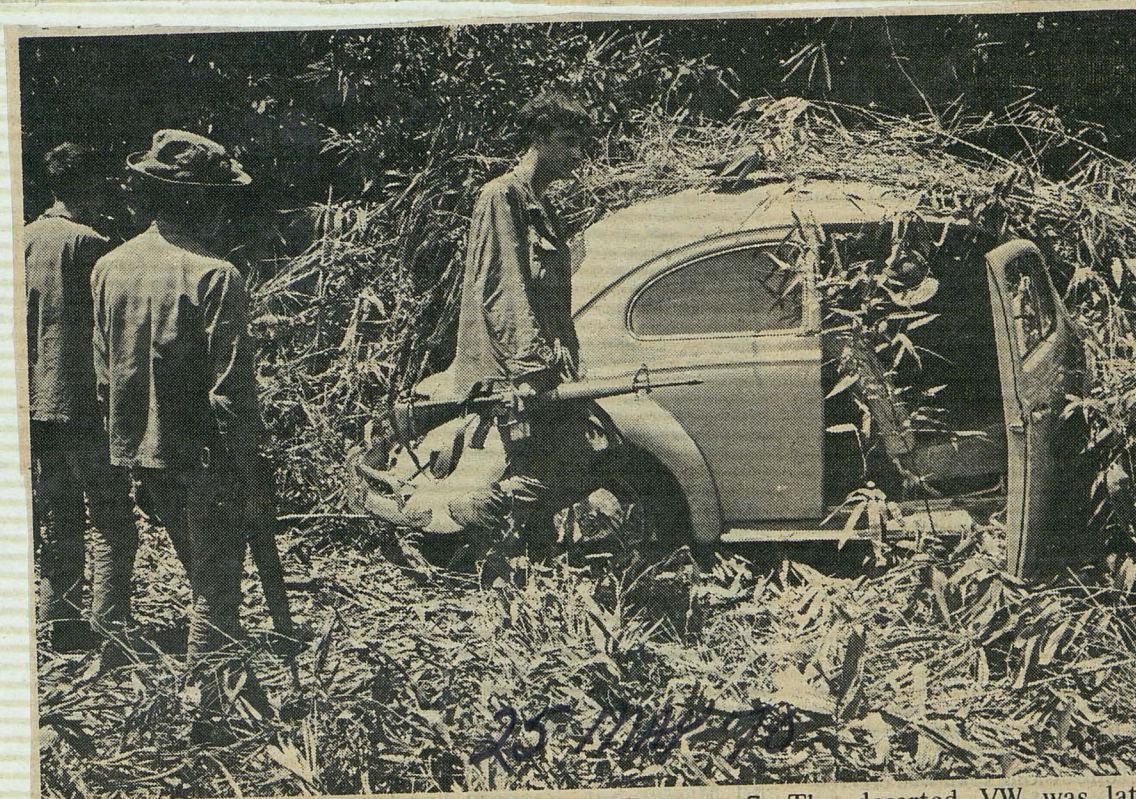

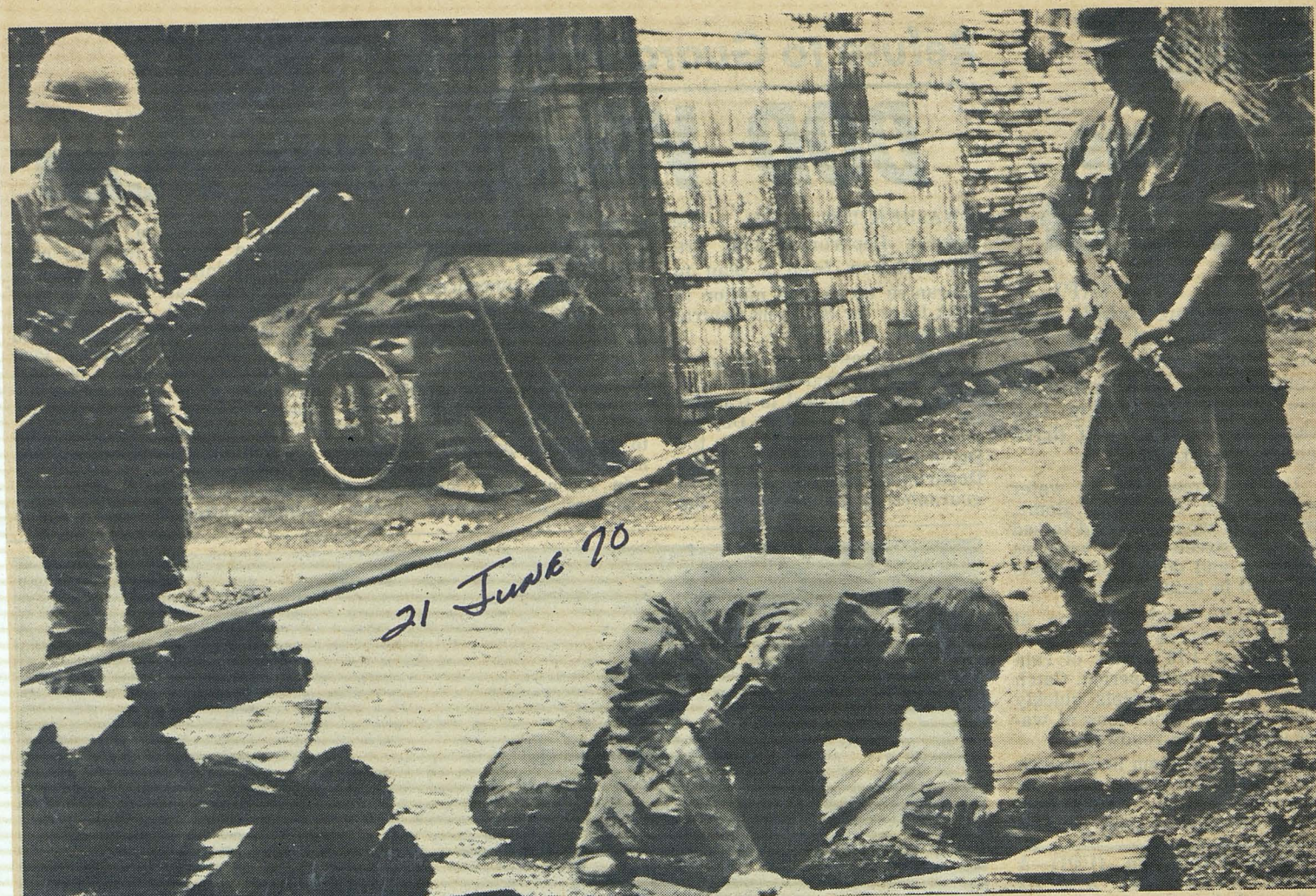

Sandbox-Cambodian Style

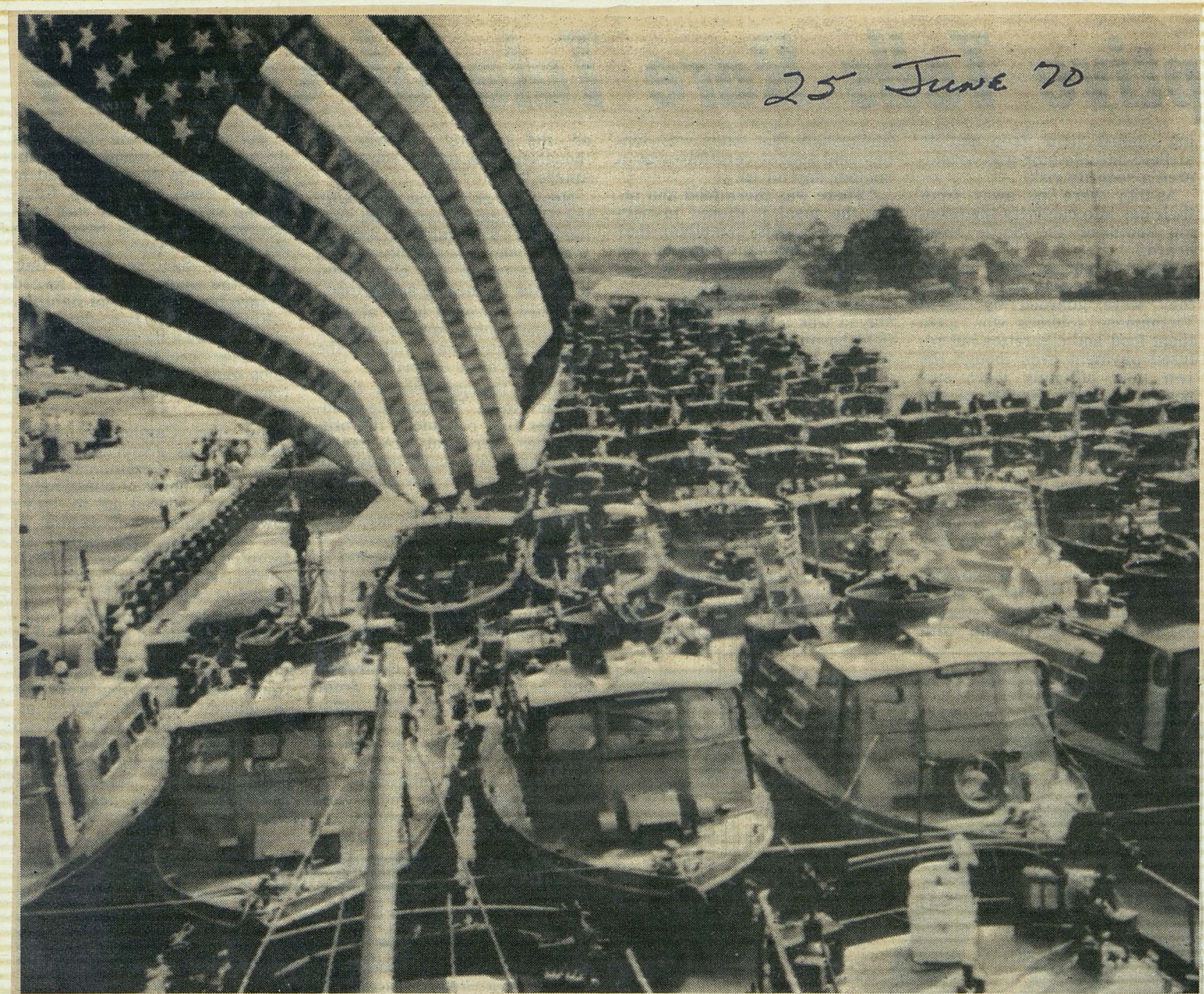

273 River Boats Formally Given to Viets
