OK, let's compromise. Why don't you bring up to date, in the present context, the Fort Bragg speech you delivered in 1961. Leeds is a step in the right direction, but not for daily newspaper consumption. If you could put Vietnam now in the context of what you said then -- about the nature of the struggle in the developing world and the necessity for dealing with an adversary on his ground and according to his rules --- I think I could get it into daily newspapers with a total circulation of five to ten million readers, and that would be a start.

Thanks for your fine words about my role; they are nice thoughts but I wonder.....
