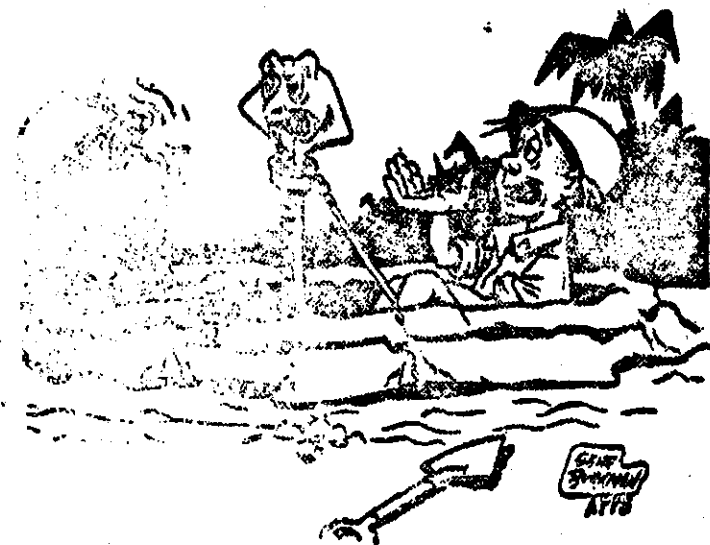
Production Control remains busy reballing parts and keeping up with the paper work brought about by the 984th minesweep teams.

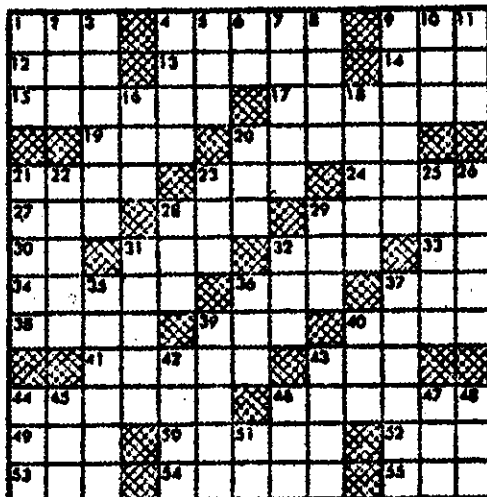

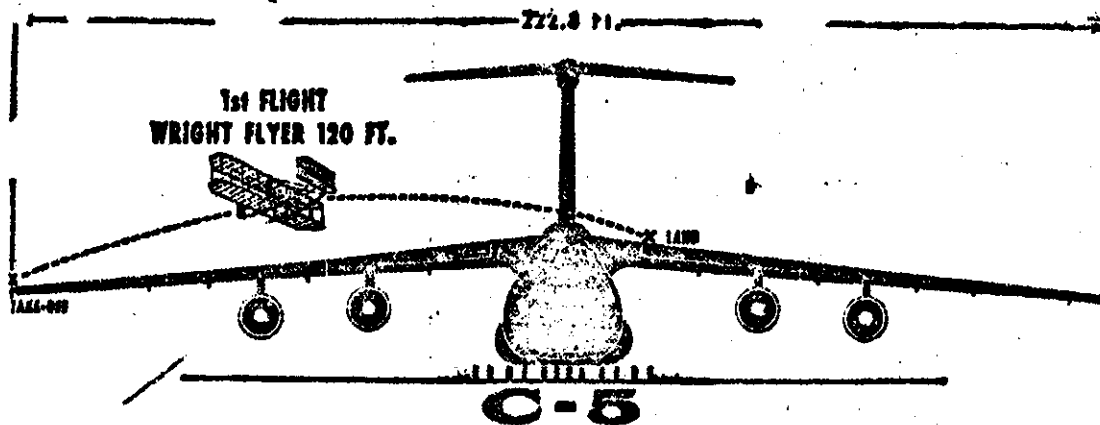
ARVN Rome Runners

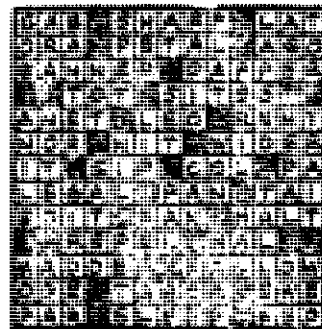
