## New Base Supply Operates Here With 21,000 Items

On Nov. 27, a new base supply was officially activated here. Prior to this time organizations here had to rely on either Tan Son Nhut AB or Clark AB for logistic support.

When formed, the base supply account totaled approximately 3,000 different line items. Now, in less than one month's time, the account is in excess of 21,000 items. The section recently switched to a punch card accounting machine system (PCAM)

510<sup>th</sup> TFS Has Busy Week Against Viet Cong

The 510th Tactical Fighter Squadron had a busy week this week as they logged their 1,000th combat flying hour since arriving here last month. The 510th was the first squadron to bomb enemy targets after the 30 hour Christmas truce.

The 1,000 hour mark was reached on a flight led by Capt. Bob W. Guin that struck a Viet Cong concentration and storage area approximately 90 miles southwest of Saigon. Seven structures were destroyed and 12 damaged.

Other pilots on the flight were Lt. Col.

Allen S. Nelson, commander of the 510th TFS, and Capt. Gary W. Fredricks. Captain Fredricks was credited with the 1,000th hour.

Two F-100s of the 510th TFS were standing alert early Sunday morning when they were scrambled to provide close air support for ARVN outposts that were under Viet Cong

# Air Policemen Build Rifle Range

A 100-meter rifle range has been carved out of the side of a hill three miles northwest of this tactical fighter base. The work was done by seven noncommissioned officers of the 3rd Air Police Squadron who voluntarily tackled the job.

TSgt. Ben Hayes, NCOIC, AP training, headed the project. The 35-point (firing positions) range will be used for U.S. Air Police and augmentees (base personnel used in emergencies) training.

"We could have utilized the range at Tan Son Nhut," Sergeant Hayes explained, "but their range is only 50 yards long with a capacity for training only 20 men at a time. Besides, we realize a savings in manpower and vehicles by not having to travel that far."

A resourceful sergeant, Sergeant Hayes borrowed a bulldozer from the Vietnamese Air Force on the evening of Dec. 15 and for the next three days drove it through heavy brush 130 by 180 yards. The firing area itself is 80 by 100 yards.

"I was startled a few times when I hit some trip flares which shot up through the tracks of the dozer," said Sergeant Hayes with a smile of relief, "but nothing more potent." We also dug up a series of tunnels 10 feet deep and 6 feet wide the Army sealed with grenades. We never did find out what their purpose was."

Working alongside Sergeant Hayes on the project were Technical Sergeants Johnnis L. Andrews, James E. Derrick and Donald E. Metz; and Staff Sergeants Kenneth R. Chon, Charles R. Floyd and William W. Smith.

## Protestant Chaplain Assumes Duties Here

The Chaplain's staff was increased this week with the arrival here of Captain Richard S. McPhee. Chaplain McPhee, a Protestant chaplain, had been at Ellsworth AFB, S. D., before coming to Bien Hoa.

Chaplain McPhee, a native of Fredonia, N.Y., served as an Air Force enlisted man during the Korean conflict.

His educational achievements include a Bachelor of Science degree from Fredonia State Teacher's College (N.Y.) in 1951, a Bachelor of Divinity in Theology from the Eastern Baptist Seminary (Philadelphia, Pa.) in 1956 and a Master of Science degree in education from Syracuse University (N.Y.) in 1960.

Chaplain McPhee received his commission in the Air Force Reserves in 1956 and later volunteered for recall to active duty. He has served as Pastor of churches in Oxford, N.Y., and New Britain, Connecticut. Since being recalled has served at several Air Force bases in the United States.

The chaplain's wife and three children are residing in Fredonia, N.Y., while he is serving in Vietnam.

Such requests in the future will be approved only under the most "unusual, fully documented" circumstances, the Air Force said.

# TET Jan. 21

## Vietnamese New Year's Celebration Explained

How would you feel if a visitor to the U.S. did not understand the meaning of our holidays, such as New Year's or Independence Day?

Would you be insulted if this visitor did not know what was expected of him in keeping with our long traditions of these holidays?

You might be — and so might the Vietnamese if you as an American visitor, do not understand the meaning of TET, the Vietnamese New Year observance which begins Jan. 21.

TET is a complex holiday with its origins buried in antiquity and legend. It is a combination of All Souls Day, a family celebration, a spring festival, a national holiday and an over-all manifestation of a way of life.

TET symbolizes the coming of the new year and the ending of the old, and in this respect compares with our New Year's Day. TET, however, lasts seven days, instead of one. It starts on the first day of the lunar calendar.

TET begins on the day of the new moon which falls sometime between the winter solstice and the spring equinox.

Instead of centuries of 100 years each, the Vietnamese calendar is divided into 60-year periods. Each year in a period is designated by one of five major elements — wood, fire, earth, metal or water — and

one of 12 animals — rat, buffalo, tiger, cat, dragon, snake, horse, goat, monkey, chicken, dog or pig.

This year—1965—was the Year of the Snake, and 1966 will be the Year of the Horse. This is the way the year is referred to—using just the name of the animal.

To the Vietnamese, TET is the most important, solemn and festive holiday of the year. It is a mixture of religion and paganism, with variations practiced from village to village throughout Vietnam.

This week the Bugle Spotlight falls on ALC Clyde W. Lyon, a Duplicating Devices Specialist assigned to the 3rd Headquarters Squadron. Airman Lyon works in the Chief, Administrative Services office (CAS) as a multilith machine operator. One of his biggest jobs here is the weekly printing of 1500 copies of the BIEN HOA BUGLE.

Do not give gifts which are taboo for this period. Some of these are medicines, vitamins, anything sharp, or used items. An appropriate gift for TET would be a bouquet of red flowers for the wife in the family.

It was the first combat mission flown in the Republic of Vietnam following the Christmas truce. Pilots on the flight that left here at 6:55 a.m. were Capt. Gary W. Findlay, flight leader, and Capt. Warren Terry.

On Tuesday, another flight of three F-100s from the squadron hit a VC storage area along a canal 35 miles southeast of Can Tho. Using 500 pound general purpose bombs and 20 mm cannons they destroyed 20 structures, damaged 25 and caused 2 secondary explosions. Pilots on the mission

were Capt. Lorin B. Krueger II, flight leader, Capt. James A. Cullen and Lt. Col. Allen S. Nelson.

Colonel Nelson was credited with both secondary explosions, thought to be from stored, VC ammunition.

What should an American do during TET?

Most important is to be on your best behavior. Avoid insulting anyone or indulging in arguments.

If a Vietnamese invites you to his home, accept all food and gifts offered. To refuse food or drinks is inordinately rude.

Drive Carefully, the life you save may be mine.
