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


FORWARD

The history of the 188th Assault Helicopter Company, from the date it was activated in November 1966, through 31 March 1968, covers its training period at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, and its combat operations against insurgent forces in the Republic of Vietnam. During this time the "Black Widows" have grown from a young inexperienced unit to a highly developed, combat ready, organization.

Organized for the sole purpose of combating insurgent forces engaged in guerrilla warfare in Vietnam, the 188th met their preparation schedules and departed for Vietnam in April 1967. Fully operational by the 15th of June, the "Black Widows" set out to prove its ability to the older and more experienced companies in Vietnam. Supporting elements of the 25th Infantry Division, The Special Forces, and combined forces of the Republic of Korea and Vietnam, 188th helicopter's have fought at Phu Hiep, Tay Ninh, Song Be, Loc Ninh, Hoc Mon, the Iron Triangle, and Ho Be Woods, to mention only a few. They have fought in all areas of Vietnam-- I Corps, II Corps, III Corps, IV Corps-- from the Cambodian Border, south to the Mekong Delta, and north, through the Central Highlands to the DMZ. A total of more than 22,968 hours have been flown to date, in combat and in support of ground forces.

The 188th Assault Helicopter Company has met numerous setbacks; a mortar attack on the 24th of June which virtually eliminated all "Black Widow" aircraft, and a succession of rocket, mortar, and sniper attacks beginning 9 November 1967 through the TET Holidays in February of 1968. Despite these setbacks, which only hindered the "Black Widows" momentarily, the 188th never failed to meet the requirements of its missions. Courage, Loyalty, and bravery in action has followed the "Black Widows" and the name is known in all of Vietnam as a company to be depended upon, to look up to, and to treat with respect.

The material contained in this unit history is only a beginning to the story of the 188th Assault Helicopter Company. The future of the company is dependent upon its foundation, a foundation that has been baptized in blood, bolstered by courage, and constructed by the determination of the men of the company. The future will find that the "Black Widows" of the 188th will be fully prepared to meet all commitments, all missions, and all requirements demanded for the success of army aviation and its role in service of the United States of America.

CHAPTER I

UNIT BACKGROUND

The 188th Aviation Company was activated at Fort Campbell, Kentucky, on 1 November 1966, with personnel on station by 15 December 1966. Fort Campbell was an excellent place for activation of an aviation company due to its size and the training potential existing on the reservation.

Unit training started on the 15th of December 1966, after arrival of all personnel and the arrival of twenty-three UH-1H, and eight UH-1C, model helicopters. While at Fort Campbell, the 188th performed many missions in support of the 101st Airborne Division and participated in two field training exercises. The FTX's and missions that were conducted by the unit were oriented toward flying that is being done in Vietnam at the present time, and it was hopeful that the four months of training, which gave an average of 100 hours per aviator, would be of value during the units stay in Vietnam.

The advance party of the unit arrived in-country on 25 April 1967 with Major James L. Rungee as our representative. The company was assigned as part of the 269th Combat Aviation Battalion and was to locate at Dau Tieng, Republic of Vietnam. The advance party started to formulate the plans for the living area and operational area of the unit and its detachments at that location.

The unit Commanding Officer, Major Bobby E. Wofford, arrived on 30 April 1967 with the remainder of the unit, and was met at Ben Hoa Airfield by the 12th Group Executive Officer, LTC Sheppard. The company was then airlifted to Dau Tieng. Immediately after the arrival of the main body, work was begun to meet the operational date of the unit which was tentatively set for 15 June 1967.

Pilots and crew members were sent to other units for in-country training for a period of two weeks and then returned to Dau Tieng. The unit received further training by sending five helicopters daily on missions with the 116th Assault Helicopter Company and the 187th Assault Helicopter Company, which were also organic to the Battalion.

The 15th of June marked the day that the 188th Assault Helicopter Company became operational which lightened the load of missions that was daily fulfilled by the other companies in the Battalion.

Rapidly the unit progressed and soon it was able to carry its full load of responsibility. In the months that followed, this unit has become one of the top assault helicopter companies in the Republic of Vietnam.

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At the time of the 188th Assault Helicopter Company's arrival in Vietnam, Dau Tieng was only recently considered secure from manned enemy attacks and the first month proved to be dangerous as well as exciting. In attempting to improve the new company location long hours of hard work were called for. Tents had to be erected, bunkers had to be constructed, and facilities pertaining to the operation of the unit had to be prepared. By June 15th the unit was considered to be operational and immediately began to carry out its general support and combat missions successfully. The combat spirit which is now a 188th Tradition was initiated during this period and teamwork and confidence in battle was established and remains as pride in being a "Black Widow".

Setbacks were incurred. On the night of the 24th of June an incident occurred which will remain in the memories of the older "Black Widows". The disastrous setback came in the manner of a well planned mortar attack by the Viet Cong. Enemy rounds fell all along the company airfield inflicting casualties on personnel in the area as well as destroying or putting out of commission over 90% of our aircraft. The after effects of the mortar attack resulted in a maintenance standdown of the "Black Widows". Still, the company flew a few general support and counter mortar missions through the remaining six days of the month of June.

On the following month, the 188th received special orders to depart Dau Tieng and move to Phu Hiep, RVN, and work under the operational control of the 10th Combat Aviation Battalion. The "Black Widows" made the move on 7 July 1967 and quickly organized operations and maintenance so the unit was fully operational within a week. Support by the 188th A.H.C. was extended to ROK (Republic of Korea) forces in the II Corps area. The terrain features were far different from the relatively flat III Corps area, thus new flying techniques were required to master this predominantly mountainous region. The ROK forces greatly appreciated the support rendered by the "Black Widows". There was only one event that blackened an otherwise successful endeavor. To the great remorse of all "Black Widows" a mid-air collision between two counter mortar gunships caused the death of two crews on the night of 31 July 1967.

The first two and a half weeks of August saw the 188th continuing support of the ROK forces, but on the 23rd, the company began preparing for the return to the III Corps area. Prior to departing Phu Hiep the 188th was made an official honorary member of the 10th Combat Aviation Battalion as a tribute for outstanding services rendered. The company arrived back at Dau Tieng at 1650 hours on 24 August 1967, and was given two days to become operational again.

On the 31st of August the "Black Widow" airlifted elements of the 25th Infantry Division into what proved to be a very "hot" LZ. The Combat Assault required them to make four insertions into the Landing Zone while receiving intense automatic weapons fire. A total of seven aircraft were hit, resulting in three W.I.A.'s. Later on in the day a "Black Widow" emergency med-evac ship came under heavy enemy fire resulting in the death of its doorgunner and wounding of its crew chief. Despite the ordeal the med-evac was completed.

There were numerous combat assaults and scattered general support missions during the month of September. On the 22nd, the Black Widows" lost a dear friend and fellow aviator when Warrant Officer James T. Donahue was killed in action while participation in an "Eagle" flight in support of the 25th Infantry Division. Despite the tragic death of Warrant Officer Donahue, the 188th collected itself and pushed on into the month of October. The "Black Widows" managed to fly over their quota of hours again, displaying their ability to adjust in the face of tragedy. Another blow struck the 188th when Major Boyd E Morrow and SP4 Jimmie W. Green died during a test flight just outside Dau Tieng in the early pre-dawn hours of 13 October 1967.

Suffering from the loss of three companions the 188th still continued to progress and to expand their range of missions. In keeping with their primary mission as a combat assault helicopter company the "Black Widows" covered every corner of the III Corps area during the month of November. Letters of appreciation were received from various ground commanders commending the 188th on the exemplary services rendered. But again tragedy marred this month's activities when on 22 November 1967 a "Black Widow" gunship crashed off Sandy Point, Nha Be, RVN. Three crew members escaped serious injuries but to everyone's sadness, the pilot, Warrant Officer Robert W. Watts, could not be rescued and died in the murky waters of the Saigon River.

The month of December was a very busy one for the "Black Widow". The company participated in two major operations; "Operation Yellowstone" for the 25th Infantry Division and "Operation Rapid Fire" for the 5th Special Forces. The company received a commendation for the units performance while participating in "Operation Yellowstone", the largest airmobile operation of its type in aviation history. The "Black Widows" again proved themselves invincible in support of the 5th Special Forces, while flying in the face of heavy enemy fire and jungle-thick terrain. While sustaining numerous injuries to personnel and damage to aircraft the 188th "Black Widows" displayed exemplary discipline and professionalism, and in doing so, won the wide respect for their actions.

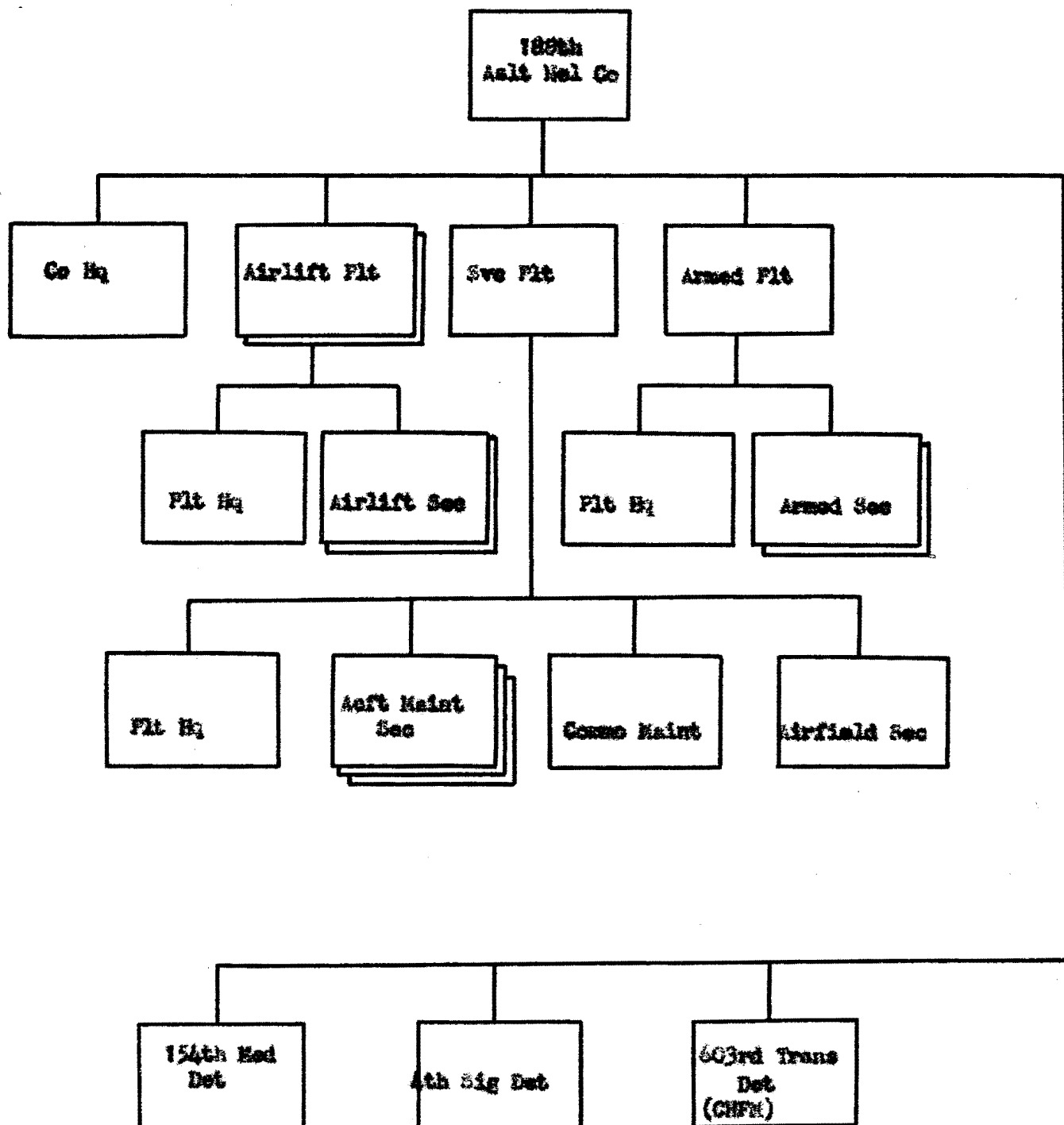
