## VC Base Report Pure Lies: Sihanouk

PHNOM PENH, Cambodia (AP)—The discovery of a Viet Cong campsite four miles inside Cambodia has reportedly angered neutralist Prince Norodom Sihanouk and raised doubts about his past denials that Vietnamese Communist forces were given sanctuary here.

The prince reportedly regards the discovery by American newsmen as a fabrication and part of a campaign against him by the U.S. press.

## Thailand To Get U.S. Missiles

BANGKOK (AP)—The United States has agreed to supply Thailand with ground-to-air missiles, Thai Prime Minister Field Marshal Thanom Kittikachorn said Monday.

Thanom, speaking at his weekly press conference, refused to give further details, saying the matter was a "military secret."

A U.S. Embassy spokesman also refused to comment.

Government sources said the missiles were part of a new military aid agreement reached between the two governments.

The Thais had asked for a reported million-dollar increase in military aid in return for sending a fresh division of troops to South Vietnam to join the 2,500 Thai soldiers already in action.

The agreement is believed to initially specify the equipping of a Thai army company with Hawk missiles.

The company would later be expanded to a battalion.

Thailand in 1967 received about \$100 million in aid from the United States plus possibly four or five times as much in military construction, most of which went on six big air bases.

Other details of the new agreement were not available. But embassy sources said it would include full equipment such as weapons and vehicles for the Thai division earmarked for Vietnam.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The State Department said Monday it is undecided as to whether it will protest to Cambodia about recent reports that the Viet Cong have used the country as a haven.

Cong, reportedly told intimates the press stories were part of a campaign inspired by the U.S. Command in Saigon to justify military operations against Cambodia.

The prince's prime minister, Son Sann, was informed of the campsite by newsmen before the stories were published. His initial reaction was cautious. He even said he would make an official investigation.

The prince, however, reportedly accused the press of hypocrisy, said the evidence was doubtful and questioned whether the campsite existed.

The prince had personally invited newsmen to visit the border to investigate charges of Viet Cong infiltration. There are no Western newsmen regularly stationed in Phnompenh, and the prince rarely grants visas.
