

# Da Nang

DA NANG, Vietnam (PAO)—"Probably more patients come into this hospital in shock than any other hospital in the world," commented Navy Lt. Charles Cloutier of Boston.

Dr. Cloutier, two other doctors and seven corpsmen at the Naval Support Activity Hospital in Da Nang have been studying the effects of shock on battle casualties.

"The shock study," said Lt. Cmdr. Larry Carey, the study's director, "grew out of the first blood program in 1965, when frozen blood was initiated for the first time in a combat zone. Being that most of the patients requiring this type of blood were in shock, it became apparent that studies were needed to gain knowledge for better treatment."

Three hospital corpsmen follow patients through the hospital from the time they arrive in receiving until they are transferred out. Four other corpsmen back them up with lab analysis.

To date, 26 patients have been studied. "The results which are being compiled now," said Dr. Cloutier, "involve the exact kind of physical disturbances that occur in a shock patient, the areas of his disturbances and what such disturbances can lead to."

He said no Stateside hospital has the patients available for such a study.

## Tunnel Rat Discovers Hidden VC Graves


CU CHI, Vietnam (IO) — A curious tunnel rat pulled the cork recently on an underground Viet Cong crypt beneath a 25th Inf. Div. battalion base camp in the Iron Triangle 25 miles northwest of Saigon.

Pfc. Jerry Hawkins had come to what appeared to be the end of a VC tunnel near the 1st Bn., 27th Inf. forward base camp.

"I was curious about the sudden dead ending," Hawkins said later, "so I probed around and discovered a big, cork-shaped plug camouflaged with mud."

He pulled the tight-fitting stopper from the tunnel wall, scratched out a hole large enough to squeeze through, and continued to explore the tunnel system.

## Wire Leads To VC Base

Sweeping through the jungles 70 miles north of Saigon, lead elements of the company came in contact with the enemy. After a brief exchange of fire the Viet Cong fled.

S.Sgt. James Wilson, Sarasota, Fla., found the wire and with the aid of Spec. 4 Rodney Coleman of Henry, Va., traced it to where the enemy Claymore was rigged for command detonation. A search of the area around the mine revealed fresh digging and several fortified bunkers that were described as new. The base was destroyed.
