

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Black Widow at PCAM

No, not one of those creepy-crawly things with the red hourglass on its tummy and a severe bite that then devours its mate. This Black Widow is a noisy flapping flying thing that flits about and hovers, some of which spit out defensive fire with a .50 calibre machine gun. Yes, we now have one of those resting on our own PCAM aircraft display grounds. It is our renovated **Bell UH-1H Huey helicopter**.

Recently our former Huey Medevac (for medical evacuation) helicopter had its markings restored to its service colors while in the 188th Assault Helicopter Company of the United States Army when it served honorably in Vietnam. With door art of "Lucy in the Sky with Diamonds" as derived from music of the time ("Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club" in 1967) and nose art featuring a deadly spider, the transformation is remarkable.

And who was responsible for this effort involving the PCAM chopper that is referred to as "Slick," but PCAM members who served in the following capacities during that past conflict. They are Phil Williams (crew chief), Dick Detra (door gunner), Bob Moon (door gunner), John Charlebois (crew chief), and John Hayes (AF medic). Not to be neglected as part of the Huey crew is Dick's wife Karma Detra.

For our **October 20th meeting**, **Phil Williams**, who had two tours in "Nam" will present the history of this unit, our own Huey, and will describe their efforts in renovating the chopper for our museum display in time for our 2004 air show.



PCAM has had the benefit of historical presentations from World War II and the Korean era but only a few from the Vietnam War. Now, once again it is time for their story to be heard.

Test Pilot Joe Rogers Honored

U. S. Air Force Colonel (retired) Joseph W. Rogers of Healdsburg was inducted into the Society of Experimental Test Pilots (SETP) **Aerospace Walk of Honor** at Lancaster, California on Saturday September 11th, and a plaque recognizing his accomplishments was placed on a granite block in "Boeing Plaza" along Lancaster Boulevard. The ceremony was part of the city's annual Aviation Faire, timed to coincide with the third anniversary of the terrorist attacks of 9/11. Joe, along with four other pilots who spent part of their test careers at nearby Edwards Air Force Base, were enshrined along the mile-long walk this year, joining 70 others previously so honored. Photo emailed by Wayne Anderson shows Joe's plaque.

A condensed resume of Col. Rogers legendary career was presented in the July edition of *Straight Scoop*. The engraving on the plaque, in addition to noting many of his aviation accomplishments, lists his military awards.

On a windy afternoon in June of this year, after the World War Two Group's luncheon, several of us accompanied PCAM member Col. Rogers to the museum to view progress on the restoration of the newly acquired Convair F-106 Delta Dart - Joe's favorite airplane. It was fully assembled and on its wheels, but still needing a paint job. A few photos were taken with Joe in front of the 106. My snapshot shows PCAM President Jim Cook and Executive Director Duane Coppock along side of the retired Air Force Colonel.

The 106 represents the pinnacle of the Century Series aircraft and is regarded by many pilots as their favorite (even among SR-71 pilots).

Colonel Joseph W. Rogers, USAF

Colonel Joseph W. Rogers, USAF set a new official world absolute speed record at Edwards AFB in 1959 when he piloted a Convair F-106A Delta Dart to a speed of 1,525 mph. After 45 years, this was still the record for single engine airplanes.

Flying over Korea and Viet Nam, Rogers flew 300 combat missions in P-51 Mustangs, F-80 Shooting Stars and F-4 Phantoms. He attended the USAF Experimental Test Pilot School in 1956 and the Air War College in 1964.

He flew early development test flights of the F-86D Sabre and performed early testing on the F-102, F-106 weapons systems before joining the SR-71/YF-12 Test Force, where he flew the first Blackbird mission of the USAF/NASA YF-12/SR-71 USAF research program. He eventually became Test Director of the world's highest and fastest airplane, the SR-71 at Edwards Air Force Base. In 1971, Rogers was already evaluating advanced fighter design concepts that wouldn't appear until the 1990s.

Colonel Rogers was awarded the Silver Star, the Distinguished Flying Cross, the Legion of Merit and the Air Medal with 16 Oak Leaf Clusters. A fellow in the Society of Experimental Test Pilots, Rogers received the Thompson Trophy and the Federation Aeronautique Internationale De La Vaulx medal. During his career as a test pilot, Rogers logged 13,000 hours in more than 50 aircraft, including the F-86D, F-102, F-104, F-106, YF-12, SR-71 and F-4.

Established in 1990 by the Lancaster City Council, the Aerospace Walk of Honor celebrates test pilots who were associated with Edwards AFB. Recognition is awarded for distinguished aviation careers marked by significant and obvious achievements beyond one specific accomplishment.

F-106 Delta Dart Dedication Ceremony

The board of directors and members of the Pacific Coast Air Museum request the honor of your presence at the dedication of the newest airplane in its collection of historic aircraft. This dedication is being made by the museum in honor and in remembrance of General Jimmy Jumper and the Convair Delta Dart will be sporting the scheme of his squadron, the 48th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, based at Langley Air Force Base in Virginia.

His son, General John Jumper, the current Chief of Staff of the Air Force and member of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, and the Jumper family, including Mrs. Jimmy Jumper, will be in attendance at the dedication.

at the Charles M. Schulz - Sonoma County Airport,
and will begin promptly at 10 am.

Immediately after the dedication ceremony

PCAM will host a luncheon and reception in the hangar for General Jumper and his family.

The F-106 played an important roll in the defense of our country, and now General Jumper himself is on the front line of the day to day decisions which will help determine our country's future course. We are honored to have him attend the dedication of this very special aircraft. Our dedication of the F-106 will be made in honor of General Jimmy Jumper at the request of Col. Joe Rogers, a friend of the Jumper family, member of PCAM, and still holder of the world speed record set by the F-106.

General Jumper was born in San Antonio, Texas. He began his military career in 1941 as an enlisted man and received his commission as a second lieutenant in December 1944 after graduating from the aviation cadet program at Moore Field, Texas.

He has served in a number of key positions at many locations in the United States and in the Far East. Some of his assignments included the Air Defense Command as liaison officer at Sacramento Air Materiel Area, McClellan Air Force Base. In 1956 he was on the F-102 suitability test at Edwards Air Force Base, and Eglin Air Force Base, Florida.

In July 1956 General Jumper entered the Air Command and Staff College, Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama, and was assigned as commander, 5040th Consolidated Aircraft Maintenance Group, Elmendorf Air Force Base, Alaska. He attended the Air War College, Maxwell Air Force Base, Ala., 1960-61, and then assumed duties as commander, 48th Fighter Interceptor Squadron, which was equipped with F-106 Delta Darts, at Langley Air Force Base, Virginia.

Assigned as commander, 27th Tactical Fighter Wing, Cannon Air Force Base, New Mexico, in April 1968.

General Jumper was transferred to Vietnam in July 1971 and assigned to the U.S. Military Assistance Command, Vietnam, as the assistant chief of staff, plans. He assumed duties as deputy chief of staff, intelligence, Headquarters Seventh Air Force, Tan Son Nhut Air Base, in December 1971, and as chief, Air Force Advisory Group, Military Assistance Command, Vietnam, where he also served as the adviser to the commander, Vietnamese Air Force.

Senior Air Force member, Weapons Systems Evaluation Group, Office of the Deputy Director, Research and Engineering, Defense, 1973. Special assistant to commander, Thirteenth Air Force, Clark Air Base, Republic of the Philippines, 1973. Chief of the Air Force Advisory Group, Military Assistance Command, Vietnam, at Tan Son Nhut Air Base, 1974.

His military decorations and awards include the Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit, Joint Services Commendation Medal, Air Force Commendation Medal with three oak leaf clusters, and Army Commendation Medal. A pilot with more than 5,200 flying hours.

Congratulations SpaceShipOne Team; X-Prize Winners

Two other Rutan designed aircraft flew as chase planes: a Beech Starship and Burt's Alpha Jet. Along with the launch platform, the White Knight, the creative genius of this man is as inspirational as the X-Prize achievement.

Microsoft co-founder, Paul Allen, bankrolled the effort, and Richard Branson's Virgin Galactic has contracted Scaled Composite to provide somewhat larger versions to go into commercial service in 2007.

On October 4th, 2004 (the 47th anniversary of Sputnik), the latest creation of Burt Rutan and his team at Scaled Composites completed the second flight into space in less than a week, to win the \$10 million Ansari X-Prize. The craft reached an altitude of 368,000 ft., surpassing the 358K' set by the X-15 in the 60s.

Brian Binnie, a 20 year Navy test pilot, was the astronaut for the craft's last trip to space. Mike Melvill had the honors for the first trip as well as SpaceShipOne's maiden voyage to space back in June of this year.

The prize will be awarded in St. Louis on November 6th.
