1. (C) SIZE AND COMPOSITION OF OPERATION:

a. Detachment B-36 (Command and Control)

Comd (Maj), S-2 (Cpt), S3 (Cpt); Ops Sgt, Intel Sgt, S4 Sgt, Commo Section (Includes Commo Supervisor, two (2) RTT Operators, and two (2) Radio Operators).

b. Det A-361/MSF 957 consisting of:

(1) 14 man Special Forces "A" Detachment.

(2) 6 LRRP NCO's (II FFV assets)

(3) (104 VNN) Cambodian Company (Recon Flt and three (3) main force platoons).

(3) (132 VNN) Cambodian Company (Recon Flt and three (3) main force platoons).

d. Special Augmentation - Attached

(a) Arty FS Coord and two (2) Radio Oprs (6/67 Arty)

(b) Two (2) USAF FACS w/one (1) FAC acft.

(c) Two (2) Radio Relay Acft Pilots w/two acft (11th Avn Bn).

(d) Six (6) UH1D Slick Acft (One (1) Acft C&C), Four (4) UH1C (UH) Gunships, (188th Assault Helicopter Company).

2. (C) MISSION:

Special Task Force Rapid Fire conducts special operations commencing D Day, 08 December 1968, in designated AO's to develop combat intelligence and to satisfy EEI.

3. (C) SPECIAL TASKS (EEI) AO's BEAR, MONGOOSE AND CUB:

a. Summary of Enemy Situation:

Current order of battle does not indicate the presence of any major VC/NVA units in the AO's, however, the Hqts 7th NVA Div with supporting elements and the 271st VC Regiment are all located in the vicinity of XT5993 and it is probable that elements of these units may be in or near the AO's.

(g) Miss [REDACTED] was an amphibious mission in [REDACTED] at XT 157846 where they discovered a B-W trail which was approximately 4' wide and had been recently traveled by ox-carts. Patrol was to have infiltrated a different LZ however they received small arms fire on their attempted landing and infiltrated the above LZ. The patrol did not observe any enemy and were extracted without incident. For complete details of this patrol see Annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(h) Mission Nr 7 was an ambush mission infiltrated at XT 153880 where they established an ambush and observed six NVA personnel travelling on a N-S trail. The team was unable to engage the enemy due to the distance from the friendly position to the enemy. The enemy was armed with AK-47 and SKS weapons. For complete details of this mission see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(i) Mission Nr 8 was an armed aerial recon which made a reconnaissance of AG Mongoose without landing. For complete details of this mission see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(j). Mission Nr 9 was an armed aerial recon which infiltrated at XT 095767 after observing numerous persons on a road which had been declared an unauthorized area for civilian personnel. The team apprehended 14 persons who were later released as innocent civilians after being warned against traveling in the area. For complete details of this mission see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(k) Mission Nr 10 was an ambush mission infiltrated at XT 185965 in which vicinity they established an ambush on a N-S trail and encountered two VC with unknown results. The patrol was then infiltrated at XT 203964 and established an ambush on a N-S trail. Throughout their stay in this ambush position the patrol heard numerous warning or signal shots being fired both to the N and S of their position. Team observed an estimated 5 VC traveling on the trail, the enemy was engaged, resulting in 1 VC KIA, 1 VC KIA (probable), 1 VC captured, and 1 VC WIA (probable). Captured VC revealed he was a liaison agent for the 111st NVA Regiment and was escorting newly arrived personnel to their new camp. Also captured in the engagement was one AK 47 and numerous items of equipment. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(1) Mission Nr 11 was an ambush mission which was infiltrated at XT096923 and the patrol established an ambush at XT 094922 where they observed 3 VC moving S on a N-S trail. The patrol engaged the VC resulting in 1 VC KIA and 1 VC KIA (probable) and the capturing of 1 SKS and numerous items of equipment and personal possessions. For complete details of this mission see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(m) Mission Nr 12 was an armed aerial recon which was infiltrated at WT 983656 where they engaged an estimated 17 VC who were attempting to evade the patrol and the armed helicopters. In the engagement there were 5 VC KIA and 1 VC KIA (probable) and 2 VC WIA by ground troops and 5 VC KIA by gunships and TAC air. One type 53 Chicom carbine and 1 SKS were captured in the engagement. For complete details of this mission see annex B, debriefing Reports.

(n) Mission Nr 13 was an armed aerial recon which was infiltrated at WT 970722 from where the patrol moved NW to river line and then N along river where by discovered a weapons manufacturing area and housing area for approximately 15 personnel. Numerous spider holes and enemy fortifications were discovered along the river bank as well as a sampan docking area with one sampan. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(o) Mission Nr 14 was an ambush mission which was infiltrated at WT 967758 and did not observe any enemy activity. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(p) Mission Nr 15 was an ambush mission which was infiltrated at XT 054858, in the general vicinity the team observed numerous trails but did not observe any enemy though they heard signal shots throughout their patrol. For complete details of this patrol see Annex B, Debriefing Reports.

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(q) Mission Nr 16 was an armed recon which was infiltrated at WT 940870 where they established an ambush on a E-W trail and encountered 2 VC on bicycles, wounding both VC who then escaped. The patrol captured numerous documents and small items of equipment. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(r) Mission Nr 17 was an armed aerial recon which was infiltrated at XT 036730 where they apprehended 3 VC suspects who were later released as innocent civilians. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(s) Mission Nr 18 was a special mission to destroy a bridge at XT 084730 which was approximately 10 meters long and 3 meters wide, constructed of heavy logs. The bridge was approximately 75% destroyed. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(t) Mission Nr 19 was an ambush mission which was infiltrated at WT 944784 where they heard talking and other activities which indicated the presence of a force larger than one enemy company traveling on a N-S trail near the LZ. Because of the size of the enemy force the patrol did not engage. Tactical air and gunship runs were placed on general area with unknown results. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(u) Mission Nr 19A was a reinsertion of mission number 19 which was infiltrated at WT 950080 and did not observe any enemy activity. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.



(v) Mission Nr 20 was an armed serial recon which was infiltrated at WT 265652 and moved N along the rivers edge. The patrol encountered enemy huts and fortifications approximately every 8 to 10 meters and observed numerous loaded sampans along the western edge of the river. The team was extracted when the gunships observed an estimated 25 to 30 enemy going toward the friendly location from the S. Three sorties of TAC air and numerous rounds of artillery were fired into the area. Only small items of personal equipment were captured. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(w) Mission Nr 21 was an armed aerial recon which was infiltrated at XT 100930 where they detained 7 VC suspects which were later released as innocent civilians. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(x) Mission Nr 21A was infiltrated at XT 084745 with the special mission of destroying a bridge in that vicinity. The bridge was approximately 80% destroyed by the patrol who also captured 3 bicycles of unknown origin. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(y) Mission Nr 22 was a special mission to destroy a bridge vicinity XT 083729 which was 85% destroyed. In the vicinity of the bridge the patrol captured 4 VC suspects who were later released as innocent civilians. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(z) Mission Nr 23 was an ambush mission which was infiltrated at XT 086833 and while establishing an ambush on a N-S trail in that vicinity the patrol was attacked by an estimated VC platoon (20-30 enemy), resulting in 8 VC KIA, 2 VC KIA (probable), 2 VC KBA, 1 VC WIA (probably) and 1 AK 47 captured. Friendly losses were 2 US KIA, 1 indigenous KIA, 2 US WIA, and 5 indigenous WIA. While searching area prior to establishing the ambush the team leader and one indigenous found WDL communications wire which nearly paralleled the N-S trail. The N-S trail bisected an E-W trail N of the ambush position. It is felt that this area is the site of a major enemy base camp. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, debriefing Reports.

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(1) W...₆ is enemy strength, disposition, composition, and unit identification within the AO's.

(2) What are the locations of base camps, command and control facilities and logistical support activities within the AO's?

(3) Will the enemy fight to preserve base camps or will they withdraw? If they will fight, determine with what forces, when and with what supporting arms. If they will withdraw, determine to where and by what routes using what means of transportation.

(4) Will the enemy reinforce his forces within the AO? If so, when and where, and with what forces?

(5) Determine the use of trails, roads, and waterways with respect to type of traffic, volume and frequency of use.

(6) What activities are being carried out within the AO's by VC/NVA units, where, in what strengths, and with what effectiveness.

c. Additional mission assignments as required by the 25th Infantry Division.

(1) Target against units capable of attacking Thien Ngon (XTO881) with fires and or ground forces.

(2) Locate enemy base areas and report details of size, fortifications, tunnels and trails.

(3) Destroy VC/NVA forces located within capability.
Report all contact immediately.

(4) Determine the presence of COSVN, with emphasis in northern half of AO BEAR (traditional COSVN base area).

(5) Develop combat intelligence and satisfy EEI.

d. Additional EEI as required by the 25th Infantry Division:

(1) What VC/NVA units operate within AO BEAR and MONGOOSE, particularly in the vicinity of LOGO (WT9757), XA MAT (XT0879) and junction THIEN NGON (XT0881)?

(2) Do enemy forces attacking THIEN NGON (XT0881) infiltrate from Cambodia, and return upon completion of attack? If so, what are their routes?

(3) How recently have located major enemy base areas
been used?

(4) How are VC/NVA forces supplied in the area and from where? How well are main force units equipped, uniformed, armed? How is their morale?

4. (c) TIME OF COMMENCEMENT/TERMINATION: Operation Rapid Fire V was conducted from a Forward Operations Base (FOB) located at Tay Ninh east airfield. The Tactical Operations Center (TOC) was activated at 061400 December 1967 and deactivated at 241130 January 1968. Troop moves from Long Hai to Tay Ninh and from Tay Ninh to Long Hai were made by C130 aircraft, CH 47, and organic wheeled vehicles. A CH 47 was used to move the detachment RTT van.

5. (c) CONDUCT OF OPERATIONS:

a. Operation Rapid Fire V began with the issuance of a written OPORD, prepared by CO Detachment B-36, submitted to Co A, 5th SFCA, 1st SF, Bien Hoa, and approved by the CG, II. FFV 4 December 1967. Detachment B-36 S2 and S3 visited Co A and obtained the current intelligence on the assigned area of operations (AO). The RTT van was airlifted by CH 47 on 5 December from Long Hail to Tay Ninh East (FOB site). The first C130 lift departed Vung Tau airfield at 051300 with troops and equipment and the last lift closed Tay Ninh West at 051930 December 1967.

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The camp site was established and liaison visits were made with Detachment B32 and advisory elements of US Army installations in Tay Ninh and the TOC was officially opened for operations on 6 December 1967. The fire support coordinator and radio relay pilots made visits and were briefed on 6 December 1967. At 091600 December 1967 the CO, B-36 conducted a briefing of all elements and detachments who would be working on Operation Rapid Fire V and warning orders were issued to the first two team commanders. Det B-36 deployed the following type sub-units in area of operations throughout the duration of operations:

(1) Recon Missions: Normally consisting of six (6) men (not more than four (4) US and two (2) indigenous soldiers).

(2) Recon/Ambush Missions: Normally consisting of twelve (12) men (not more than six (6) US and six (6) indigenous soldiers).

(3) Ambush Missions: Normally consisting of twenty (20) men (not more than six (6) US and fourteen (14) indigenous soldiers).

(4) Armed Aerial Recon Missions: Normally consisting of thirty five (35) men (not more than ten (10) US and twenty five (25) indigenous soldiers).

(5) Mobile Strike Force Company: Consisting of one (1) thirty five (35) man indigenous recon platoon and three (3) fifty (50) man indigenous main force platoons. The company is commander and led by a Special Forces twelve (12) man A Detachment supplemented by ten (10) IRRP's from II FFV assets.

(6) SUMMARY OF MISSIONS:

(a) Mission Nr 1 was an armed aerial recon mission and was infiltrated at XT181978 in which vicinity the team found a recently constructed bunker and two wells. Trails in the area had been recently used by foot traffic and ran N to S. A small garden was also located in the general area. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(b) Mission Nr 2 was an armed aerial recon and was infiltrated at XT 129712 and apprehended four woodcutters who were questioned and released. The patrol also discovered a N to S trail on which a truck had recently passed. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(c) Mission Nr 3 was an ambush mission and was infiltrated at XT 125949 and moved SW for 400 meters to a SW to NE trail and were establishing an ambush when the patrol sighted four VC and engaged them. Results of the encounter were 1 VC KIA (probable). For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(d) Mission Nr 3A was an ambush patrol infiltrated at XT 096923 from which location the patrol moved E for 50 meters to a N-S trail and established an ambush position from which they observed 3 VC traveling from N to S on bicycles and engaged them killing one and capturing 1 US M-16 rifle and numerous small items of equipment and documents. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(e) Mission Nr 4 was an ambush mission which was infiltrated at XT 185968 and did not engage the enemy or observe any unusual activities. For complete details of this mission see Annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(f) Mission Nr 5 was an armed aerial recon and infiltrated at XT 087881 where it was challenged by 7 to 10 VC just after arriving on the LZ. The VC were engaged with organic weapons and gunship fire, there were no friendly casualties in the engagement and enemy casualties are unknown. For complete details of this patrol see Annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(C) Group 80C

(C) Item #1: Speech, delivered in Dec 67 by Ho Chi Minh, President of the DRV at the 23d anniversary of the NVA and the "National Resistance Day" reproduced by Doan [Group] 80C, praises successes of the NVA and the exploits of a number of guerrillas in SVN. Ho Chi Minh states that he was so impressed by the success of the [VC] Liberation Army against 120,000 [sic, prob 1,200,000] US Troops and their lackeys that he felt he was 20 years younger. The speech affirms that the US "aggressors" will certainly be defeated. The fact that US Secretary of Defense MacNamara was recently compelled to resign proves that they are being defeated. Ho Chi Minh further appealed to 31 million people in North and in SVN to strive to gain a final success.

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(aa) Mission Nr 23a was a reinforcement mission for mission number 23 and helped secure the LZ for extraction. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(bb) Mission Nr 24 was an ambush mission which was infiltrated at XT112963 and moving N toward an ambush position the patrol saw numerous bunkers and enemy installations in the vicinity of XT 113964. The patrol saw an old enemy base camp with an E-W trail winding through it. It was at this location that the team established their ambush. While watching the trail the patrol observed 3 VC traveling E to W and engaged the enemy, capturing one and wounding the other two. When the patrol had moved to the exfiltration LZ and while the first helicopter was landing, the patrol was taken under heavy automatic and semi-automatic weapons fire resulting in 1 US KIA, 1 indigenous KIA, 2 US WIA, 2 indigenous WIA, 2 air crew WIA and 2 VC KIA (probable) and 1 VC WIA (probable). During the engagement the VC who was captured was struck by enemy fire and later died. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(cc) Mission Nr 24A was a reinforcement mission for mission no. 24 to secure the LZ for extraction. For complete details see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(dd) Mission Nr 25 was an armed aerial recon which was infiltrated at XT102755 and apprehended 6 VC suspects who were later released as innocent civilians. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(ee) Mission Nr 26 was an armed aerial recon which did not engage any enemy from ground positions, however 3 VC were sighted from the air and taken under fire with unknown results. For complete details see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(ff) Mission Nr 27 was an ambush mission to capture POW's and documents which infiltrated at XT 142864. Results were one (1) VC wounded and captured and one (1) VC WIA (Possible). For complete details see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(gg) Mission Nr 28 was a special mission to engage enemy personnel by sniper fire who might be traveling on the road vicinity XT103758. During the conduct of the patrol the team engaged a total of 6 enemy, killing one and wounding one. For complete details of this mission see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(hh) Mission Nr 29 was an ambush mission which was aborted because of ground haze and the pilots of the helicopters could not establish the proper LZs. For complete details of this mission see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(ii) Mission Nr 29A was a special mission to investigate a reported VC rice cache in the vicinity of WT990640. The patrol moved N along the river line and became heavily engaged with an estimated enemy company who were occupying a fortified base camp in the vicinity WT991643. After numerous TAC air strikes and reinforcements the patrol was extracted. Results of this engagement were 15 VC KIA, 10 VC KIA (probable), 3 VC WIA (probable), 2 indigenous KIA, 7 US WIA, 13 indigenous WIA. It was established from captured enemy documents that this was the location of the headquarters of the 80th Training Regiment and some of the documents were classified by the enemy as being Top Secret. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(jj) Missions Nr 29B and 29C were reinforcement missions for mission nr 29. Enemy casualties and friendly casualties have been included in the above statistics. For complete details of these missions see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(kk) Mission Nr 30 was an armed aerial recon which infiltrated at WT 972659 and moved N along the river engaging one VC swimming from Viet Nam to Cambodia possibly killing him. The patrol also discovered numerous trails, enemy fortifications, and sampan docking areas. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

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(ll) Mission Nr 31 was a Special Mission team infiltrated at XT 245952 to assess the damage done to a suspected VC base area by a B-52 air strike. The patrol observed approximately 40 enemy bunkers, numerous spider holes and one hut in the area. 2 VC were sighted leaving the area but were not observed by friendly forces on the ground. Complete details of this patrol annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(mm) Mission Nr 32 was an ambush mission which was infiltrated at XT 011770 and established an ambush in this area. The patrol observed 6 to 10 VC traveling on the trail N to S who were engaged, killing one and capturing miscellaneous small items of equipment. In the engagement no friendly casualties were sustained. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(nn) Mission Nr 33 was an armed aerial recon which did not land. For complete details of this mission see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(oo) Mission Nr 34 was an ambush mission which was infiltrated at XT 125954 and established an ambush on an E-W trail in this vicinity. Shortly after establishing the ambush the patrol observed an estimated 25 to 30 VC running slowly down the trail from E to W. The enemy was engaged, killing 6 and wounding 2 and capturing 1 SKS. In the engagement 1 US and 1 indigenous were slightly wounded. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(pp) Mission Nr 35 was an ambush mission which was infiltrated at XT 046837 and established an ambush at WT 946838. The patrol observed enemy movement in the area and were able to engage 2 VC killing one and capturing one AK47 and numerous items of small equipment. For complete details of this patrol see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(qq) Mission Nr 36 was a sniper mission which was aborted due to the higher priority of impending missions. For additional details see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(rr) Mission Nr 37 was a recon mission which was infiltrated at XT 043616 and was extracted at XT 057658 without making contact with or observing the enemy. For complete details of this mission see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(ss) Mission Nr 38 was a recon mission which was infiltrated at XT 043616 and observed one VC vicinity of XT 013619 carrying an AK 47 and wearing NVA web gear. This patrol was then extracted at XT 013619 after hearing approximately 10 VC parallelling their line of advance. For complete details of this mission see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(tt) Mission Nr 39 was a recon team which was infiltrated at XT 023699 and extracted at XT 027695 after negative enemy sightings or contact. For complete details see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(uu) Mission Nr 40 was cancelled.

(vv) Mission Nr 41 was an ambush mission which was infiltrated at WT 944850 and established an ambush on a N-S road in that vicinity. The patrol observed 2 VC travelling on the road from S to N and engaged them. Immediately the patrol came under heavy fire and TAC air was called on the enemy, estimated to be a reinforced platoon. As a result of the encounter the enemy suffered 4 KIA, 1 KIA (possible) and friendly losses were 2 US WIA, 1 indigenous WIA. For complete details of this mission see Annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(ww) Mission Nr 42 was an armed aerial recon with the additional mission of assessing a TAC air strike in the vicinity of WT 974624. During the conduct of the sweep of the area the patrol observed numerous huts, enemy fortifications, tunnels, and other evidence of enemy activity. During the extraction of the patrol one helicopter door gunner

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observed 1 VC and engaged him with machine gun fire. Possible KIA. For complete details of this mission see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(xx) Mission Nr 43 was a recon mission which was infiltrated at XT 042607 and swept to XT 013593 without observing any enemy although the team feels that 2 enemy were WIA on hearing a booby trap left by friendly elements detonate. For complete details of this mission see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(yy) Mission Nr 44 was an armed aerial recon which was infiltrated at XT 033720 and observed unused enemy huts which they destroyed, no contact with the enemy was made. For complete details of this mission see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

(zz) Mission Nr 45 was a search and destroy mission which was infiltrated in the vicinity of WT 972659 in three separate lifts. The patrol moved from S to N and from N to S along the river line being proceeded in both directions by TAC air and artillery. Numerous enemy installations and garden areas were destroyed though only one enemy was observed swimming from Viet Nam to Cambodia and was engaged by the gun ships killing him. For complete details of this mission see annex B, Debriefing Reports.

11. Was Mission Accomplished: Yes. Special Task Force Rapid Fire was given the mission of establishing enemy disposition, composition, and unit identification and to determine the level of VC/NVA activity within the AOs. The Special Task Force accomplished all of its missions and satisfied all of the EEI with the exception of the requirement from the 25th Infantry Division to determine the presence of COSVAN in the AO. The Special Task Force continually interdicted main VC/NVA supply routes and infiltration routes and

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forced the enemy to expend his forces in defending his base camp locations. The Special Task Force did irreplaceable damage to the security of the 80th Training Regiment with the capture of enemy documents and the destruction of the safe haven for that organization. Enemy prisoners captured were interrogated and revealed valuable information of their units and their activities. Throughout the conduct of Operation Rapid Fire V TAC air strikes and artillery strikes were placed on the enemy both day and night severely interdicting his ability to reinforce his positions or to effectively react to friendly operations.

12. (C) LESSONS LEARNED:

a. General: Due to the type of AO and the enemy activity found therein, many situations developed which allowed new innovations to be tried. They are listed below.

b. In destroying enemy huts which are usually constructed of bamboo and thatched roofs, the use of white phosphorous grenades is an excellent means. However, it should be pointed out that due to the volatility of white phosphorous extreme care should be exercised in its handling. This detachment suffered two indigenous killed when a white phosphorous grenade detonated on the belt of one of the personnel. These grenades do not have the safety pins spread as do fragmentation grenades and this lends them to the possibility of accidental detonation.

c. In destroying enemy fortifications and structures such as bridges an 8" artillery projectile will do maximum damage with a minimum of weight and inconvenience. As in the destruction of large quantities of rice (After Action Report Rapid Fire IV) the fuse well of the 8" projectile should be filled with C4 and detonated with electrical or time fuse detonation.

d. In the use of rope ladders, rappelling ropes, and McGuier rigs it is essential that the helicopter descends from a height greater than the length of the rope and that it descends straight down. If the helicopter is not at a height sufficient to allow the ropes to completely straighten out when they are thrown from the aircraft, they will tangle and valuable time is lost in attempting to straighten them out.


e. Claymore mines when used as a device to capture prisoners should be aimed low so that the person against whom the mine is used will be wounded and not killed. This procedure is effective only if the ambush force is sufficiently greater in size than the enemy force to insure the safety of the friendly elements.

f. Extreme care should be exercised in the use of fire producing products such as white phosphorus when a unit is attempting to break contact or be exfiltrated. In one incident during the conduct of this operation a patrol was forced to move from their primary position because a rocket from a gun ship started a grass fire which moved toward the patrol. Because of this fire the patrols position was revealed to the enemy who delivered effective fire on the team.

g. The use of tactical air strikes and artillery as a blocking force is most effective on a search and destroy mission. Tactical air and artillery can also be plotted to proceed the friendly search operation which will open up the jungle canopy making travel easier and revealing enemy installations to a greater degree than only a ground search.

h. Great care must be taken to insure that reaction forces from other units, (i.e. divisional units, ready reaction unit), are fully apprised of their responsibility to this detachment in that the size of the force which is internally available to the Special Task Force is not of sufficient size to engage in a major enemy contact. Considerable difficulty was encountered in obtaining additional helicopter support when this unit was engaged in a major contact and needed to reinforce its ground troops in

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order to evacuate wounded and dead personnel.

i. It is possible to rig a claymore mine with a wire and tape device which allows the claymore to be thrown toward enemy fortifications or personnel. When the detonating wire is pulled toward the person who threw the mine it is pulled to a position which faces the instrument towards the enemy. This device is excellent in breaking contact and destroying enemy fortifications without exposing the friendly personnel to enemy fire.

j. White phosphorus is an excellent means of marking enemy positions for artillery and air strikes in that the smoke rises much more quickly than that from a normal smoke grenade. This technique should only be used when a severe time factor is involved and immediate reaction is needed.

k. Flares carried on the shackles of radio relay & FAC aircraft can be used to start fires in enemy gardens and rice fields. When used the altitude must be such that the flare ignites but hits the target before deployment of the parachute.

l. When using an aerial observer to mark targets for ground troops, white phosphorus grenades are more practical than smoke or WP rockets. If dropped from an altitude of 400 feet or less the grenade will explode on the ground. This conserves the marking rockets for use with the TAC aircraft.

m. Often it is practical for a commander to control ground units from a FAC aircraft. This leaves the C&C helicopter free for the Arty FS coordinator, aircraft commander, and ground unit S3. In the C&C ship one of the two FM radios is tuned to the command net, the other to the artillery frequency. The aircraft commander controls his assets by use of UHF/VHF. The commander controls the ground elements from the FAC aircraft by FM on command frequency. This allows the commander to insure TAC air is placed exactly where he wants it. It allows him to stay on target during the strike --- normally the C&C must clear the Target Area for high performance aircraft. The S3 monitors the command net and can easily relay information to the FOB without disturbing the command net by changing his FM set from low band to high band (vice-versa). The FOB monitors and high/low band frequencies.

n. In selecting alternate frequencies it is convenient and easy to remember if the alternate frequency is obtained by changing the band selector switch, i.e. high to low/low to high.

o. When directing close air support using either UTT's or TAC always include the following:

- (1) Azimuth from your position to the target.
- (2) Distance from your position to the target.
- (3) Direction you desire firing passes to be made (your position must be known by supporting aircraft).

If the direction of fire passes is not given all too often the aircraft will come in on the azimuth given from your position to the enemy. This results in the aircraft firing over or into the friendly positions and could cause friendly casualties.

p. When ascending a rope ladder, it is best to climb it from the side, inserting the heels in each rung - toes out. This reduces the inward swing and need for ground personnel to hold the bottom rungs steady. This technique also allows the leg muscles to do the work and takes the strain off the arms. When practical have a snap link attached to a secure piece of webbing or belt. In the event the climber becomes fatigued the snap link can be snaped on to a rung and secure the climber.

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q. When extracting using the McGuire Rig (more than one person). It is an added safety precaution to use the safety wrist strap on a buddies rig - this way if the McGuire rope fails the rider is still secure to the other soldier's rig.

r. When assaulting enemy bunkers and trench lines it is necessary to over run enemy positions as quickly as possible in order to capture WIA's and documents. If stubborn resistance is met, napalm has been found best in quickly neutralizing the enemy. It can be delivered within 20 meters of the friendly forces without causing harm. It is necessary to mark the front and rear of the friendly line so that the napalm can be delivered by TAC air without endangering friendly positions.

13. (C) Conclusions and Recommendations.

a. Conclusions: The missions accomplished in the assigned AOs proved to be well suited to the capabilities of Project Rapid Fire. The variety of enemy situation and the strength of enemy activity again provided ample opportunity for the Special Task Force to exercise to the fullest its ability to strengthen its ground positions by rapid reaction to the changing situation. The Special Task Force was limited in its night operations because radio relay aircraft were only available for 7 hours of flying time per day and it is not advisable to have teams on the ground at night if there is any possibility that continuous radio communications cannot be maintained.

b. Recommendations:

(1) That future Rapid Fire Operations be given a more definite support agreement with reaction elements.

(2) That the same supporting elements be kept together if at all possible to allow for the quickest response and maximum efficiency of the Special Task Force. Each change in supporting elements necessitated a training period which delays the employment of the Special Task Forces.


15. (C) Close Air Support Rapid Fire V:

a. II FFV provided two USAF FACs and two L-19 FAC aircraft in support of Rapid Fire V. Both aircraft were located at Tay Ninh West airfield and the FACs lived at the FOB where they were available for planning purposes. Normal utilization of the FAC's were to have them provide coverage during all infiltrations and exfiltrations. The experience of both pilots proved invaluable to the Special Task Force in that they quickly adjusted to our operations as one FAC had supported us in the past. During enemy contact the FAC pilots employed the gunships as they would TAC air, guiding them onto the targets and marking targets with rockets and smoke. TAC air was used to the fullest extent and was always quickly responsive to our needs. Because of past participation by the FACs in similar operations, it was possible for them to judge the severity of an engagement and to request TAC air support without being directed to do so by the commanding officer.

b. Radio relay aircraft were only permitted to provide 7 hours coverage of the operation per day and to some extent limited the night operations that were conducted as a patrol in the field must have continuous contact with the FOB. During the operation some difficulty was encountered in coordinating the activities and flying times of the radio relay aircraft.

c. The 188th Assault Helicopter was to provide 5 slicks, (4 for troop lift and 1 C&C), and 2 gunships, for continuous coverage of insertions and extractions. Because of heavy enemy ground fire it was

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normally impossible for the gunships to remain at their desired strength and the usual procedure was to employ 3 gunships with 2 on station and the other to serve as a filler while the ships on station refueled or rearmed. 2 gunships are inadequate for our operations.



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ANNEX A TO AFTER ACTION REPORT RAPID FIRE V

25 January 1968

SUBJECT: AREA ASSESSMENT AND INTELLIGENCE

REFERENCES: AO BEAR, MONGOOSE, CUB, MAP VIETNAM 1:50,000 Sheet numbers 6131I, 6132II, 6231IV, 6232III, 6232IV, Series L7016.

AGENCIES AND SOURCES: Agencies included: Company A, 5th SFGA, 1st SF, II Field Force Vietnam, 188th Assault Helicopter Company, USAF Forward Air Controller, 6/27th Artillery, Detachment B-32, 5th SFGA.

1. MISSION: Special Task Force Rapid Fire conducts special operations commencing D Day, 08 December 1967, in designated AO's to develop Combat Intelligence and Satisfy EEI.

2. AREA OF INTEREST BOUNDED BY THE VIETNAMESE-CAMBODIAN BORDER ON THE WEST AND NORTH AND GRID LINE 54 TO THE SOUTH AND 23 TO THE EAST.

a. Weather: During the period of Rapid Fire V 08 Dec through January, the temperature was generally from 75 degrees in the early morning to a high of 90 degrees in the early afternoon.

(1) Cloudiness: Infrequent early morning haze usually dissipating by 1000 hours, some heavy clouds in the early to late afternoon but with a general ceiling of unlimited.

(2) Visibility: For the most part visibility is unlimited throughout the day, no operations were severely affected by lack of visibility though occasional ground fog in the early morning made infiltrations difficult.

(3) Precipitation: No precipitation occurred during the period of Rapid Fire V.

(4) Advantage to Enemy: Occasional ground haze made it possible for the enemy to move under cover while our helicopters were on approach.

(5) Disadvantages to Enemy: The generally excellent weather made infiltrations and reinforcements comparatively easy during the entire period. The generally good weather made aerial reconnaissance an effective tool and tended to restrict the movement of the enemy in open areas.

b. TERRAIN:

(1) Relief: AO's Bear, Mongoose, and Cub were flat to rolling with Nui Ba Den serving as an excellent reference point for most areas of the AO's.

(2) Drainage: The AO's generally drained into small streams which flow to the Song Vam Co Dong which serves as the border between Vietnam and Cambodia on the western and northern sides of the AO's, the Vam Co Dong flows west and south. Streams in the area which were encountered by the operational elements were dry.

(3) Vegetation: Undergrowth in the AO's varied from open rice paddies to dense undergrowth. Most of the area is primarily jungle with single and double canopy. Much elephant grass is evident throughout the open areas in the AO's. Bamboo is sparsely located throughout the AO's with the preponderance being located on the river area in the western portion of AO MONGOOSE. Because of intense GVN-US artillery and bombing much of the area is heavily pock marked and the jungle has grown back over the damage making many areas difficult to travel.

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c. TRAFFICABILITY: Movement in most areas is difficult but not restrictive with the exception of the river banks where the movement is restricted because of the heavy underbrush. All of the area is adaptable for the use of wheeled and tracked vehicles. Throughout the area there are numerous landing zones. Streams in the area at this time do not pose a problem in that they are generally dry and easily forded. Cross country movement by foot is practical within the area.

d. Lines of Communications: Within the area there are two main north-south roads, Highway 13 and 22 with a well defined trail running basically East to West in the most northern part of AO Bear. Trails are numerous throughout the area and most are trafficable by ox carts.

e. Cover and Concealment: Cover is limited in some areas due to the lack of relief and is limited to ant hills and similar protection. Concealment in the area is generally good to excellent and in the areas along the river concealment is superior.

f. Observation and Fields of Fire: Because of the lack of relief, fields of fire are generally excellent with the only limiting factor being the dense undergrowth in some areas. Observation is excellent if high ground is available. Indirect fire weapons can be utilized but it is recommended that artillery be adjusted by air in the areas of primary jungle.

g. Obstacles: The area is generally considered passable by infantry troops and tracked vehicles with no obstructions.

h. VC Booby Traps: During the entire period of Operation Rapid Fire V no mines or booby traps were encountered by friendly elements.

i. Critical Terrain: Generally speaking the most critical terrain feature in the area would be the Vam Co Dong which affords a rapids means of transport to NVA/VC units and may be a major infiltration means from Cambodia to Viet Nam. Other critical terrain features are roads and trails which if controlled by enemy forces provide a means of rapid reinforcement and could result in friendly forces being encircled and destroyed.

j. Enemy: VC/NVA units in the AO's are well equipped, well trained, well fed and excellent fighters. They will fight to preserve their base camps and do not hesitate to engage friendly forces and will use trails and roads to rapidly reinforce their positions and to search for friendly elements. The area along the Song Vam Co Dong is literally a fortress from the southern most portion of the area to Logo located at WT 9775, it was impossible for this detachment to insert a team into this area without engaging in a major contact. The area of the Vam Co Dong is used as a garden area and resupply storage as well as a training area for newly arriving troops from North Viet Nam and Cambodia.

k. Answers to EBI and OIR:

(1) Main force units reported in AO Mongoose is the 80th Training Regiment. VC/NVA captured indicate elements of the 141st NVA Regiment and C-25 Engineer Company are located in the AO.

(2) The 80th Training Regiment base camp was located in the vicinity of WT 991648 on 7 January 1968. Garden areas were located vicinity WT 980750 to WT 970620 along the Song Vam Co Dong. Captured documents and POW's indicate base camps in the following vicinities: WT 9678, WT 9944, XT 0164, XT 0069, XT 1097, XT 1785 and XT 0888.

(3) The 80th Training Regiment base camp was defended by three reinforced platoons using small arms and automatic weapons. Base camp vicinity XT 088881 was defended by a platoon, using small arms and grenades. Indications are enemy will defend his base camps in this area. If enemy withdraws it is generally towards Cambodia and by foot.

(4) Enemy forces attacking Thien Ngon are locally based units receiving logistical support from Cambodia.

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(5) The units located in the AO's are supplied by using the trails in the area and by sampans navigating the Song Vam Co Dong. Logistical support comes from Cambodia and from the gardens along the Song Vam Co Dong. The main force units are well equipped weapons and uniforms wise. Individuals have been observed wearing black pajamas, grey shirts and black pants, khaki uniforms and several mixtures of clothing. Enemy has been armed with AKL7's, SKS's, Chicom Carbines, AK50's, RPG's and pistols. The enemy is aggressive and willing to fight, he is well fed and clothed, all general indications of high morale.

(6) The enemy has the capability to reinforce his units in the AO at will.

(7) The main infiltration routes into War Zone "C" are located here and along the Song Vam Co Dong, i.e. Operational Area Mongoose. For detailed study of trails, roads and waterways see paragraph "1". For additional information see Operations and Intelligence Overlay, Annex G.

1. SUMMARY OF INTELLIGENCE INFORMATION ON ROAD AND TRAIL ACTIVITY, MAP REFERENCES SEE FORMAT THIS ANNEX:

(1) Trail shown on map as a road starting XT0991 and leading NE is a foot size path from that location to XT1597 and is used only by foot traffic it's entire length.

(2) Trail shown on map at XT1393 leading E, SE, and NE is in existence and well used by foot traffic.

(3) Trail shown on map at XT 0388 and leading S, SE, and NE is well used and in the vicinity of XT 0387 night movement of vehicles has been observed. Approximately 17 vehicles parked on one occasion vicinity XT0488.

(4) Trail shown starting at WT9890 and leading SW exists and continues SW and W to the Cambodian border vicinity WT9186 and is well used by ox cart traffic.

(5) A trail starts vicinity WT9186 just N of shown clearing and proceeds E to vicinity WT9286 and then SE to intersect above mentioned trail vicinity WT9386.

(6) A trail starts vicinity WT9787 and proceeds SW to vicinity WT9586 where it branches with one trail going due W and intersecting trail mentioned in line 5 vicinity WT9486. Other branch proceeds SW to vicinity WT9485 where it turns nearly due S and terminates at the Cambodian border vicinity WT9478, this trail is heavily used by foot and ox cart traffic.

(7) Trail shown on map starting vicinity WT9489 and leading S-SW to vicinity WT9485 is old and not used.

(8) A trail starts vicinity WT9485 and leads due W.

(9) A trail branches off the trail mentioned in line 6 vicinity WT9484 and leads SE to vicinity WT9382 where it splits with one branch leading S around the shown clearing to WT9281 and the other branch leading W-SW to vicinity WT9082.

(10) Highway 24 starting at WT8882 and leading N-NE is heavily used by vehicles traveling at night with their lights on.

(11) Highway 20 starting vicinity WT9775 and leading NE is lightly used by foot traffic only.

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(12) Highway 24 in the vicinity WT9368 is well used and has several branch roads (trails) leading N off of it. Also in the vicinity of WT9668 and leading N along the wood line is a vehicle parking area.

(13) Highway 13 from WT9960 to XT0059 is heavily traveled but trail from XT0059 to XT0159 is not used to any extent.

m. SUMMARY OF ENEMY INSTALLATIONS AND FACILITIES, MAP REFERENCES SEE FORMAT THIS ANNEX.

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and team discovered a lean to which team immediately secured. Inside of lean to were weapons manufacturing parts and VC field manuals. (All documents and weapons manufacturing items were evaluated to Co A, 5th SFGA as soon as possible) Team then continued on for another 20 meters in a northerly direction and came across a VC house which was approx 15 meters wide and 20 meters long. The building was a 2 story building which contained more field manuals and weapons manufacturing parts. The upstairs of the house was fitted out to be a sleeping area for approx 15 personnel. Immediately after searching the house team completely destroyed the house (by setting fire to it). Team moved on in a northerly direction and came across a sampan docking area which had one sampan chained to the dock. Team destroyed the sampan and docking area by using grenades and M-79's. Team moved on north for about 15 meters and sighted a sampan in the middle of the river, team took the sampan under fire and sank it with a direct hit from a M-79. After sinking the sampan team searched area and discovered 4 bunkers which they destroyed. (Note: throughout the entire operation the team was under fire from snipers and automatic weapons). All the areas in which the team had searched and destroyed had been occupied in the last 5 minutes. Throughout the entire operation the VC had been evacuating the areas where the teams direction of march was. When the team was ordered back to the exfil LZ they searched and destroyed approx 7 bunkers and expended all ammo on sniper holes and enemy fortifications. Upon reaching LZ team was evacuated under fire.

(2) Terrain: Thick underbrush, double canopy jungle, soil is capable of wheel and track vehicles. Throughout the area of operation the team was hindered by thorn bushes and thick underbrush. The team did not cross any streams or rivers. Visibility in the area was from 10 to 15 meters.

(3) Obstacles: Team was constantly hindered by bushes.

(4) Mines or Booby traps encountered: Team destroyed 2 CBU which were placed on the trail.





Note: After operation, air strikes were called in with following ordinance dropped on AO: 6 MK.32 Hi drags, 2 Napalm bombs, 20 mm strafe, 100% ordinance in target area. Results of air strike, 4 bunkers destroyed and 6 uncovered.

Team on the ground destroyed 2 large hootches (1 of the hootches was a two story house). Team also destroyed 2 sampans and a docking area. Team also destroyed 4 bunkers and caved in 11 spider holes. Reason team did not destroy remaining of fortified positions was due to their running out of ammo.

In the course of events that occurred during the operation 4 helicopters were taken under fire by the VC and 4 of the craft were hit. Results of the hits were as follows: 2 Gunships hit and were pulled out of the operation, 2 slicks were hit, causing one slick to return to the FOB and the other ship crashed in the jungle at coordinates XT 0462. The craft was immediately secured and pulled out by a CH-47.

During the course of action by the ground troops the team was forced to destroy in place the following items: 2 partially made shovels, 2 55 gal drums of gasoline, 1 large vice, 21 lbs of C-4. Note: some of the items were thrown into the river due to the intensity of the ground fire.

Team feels that they either destroyed or damaged 1 sampan on the far side of the river. Team also destroyed 40 to 60 chickens and ducks.

The following information concerns the VC which were sighted by gunships south of ~~patrol~~ location approx 1200 meters. They were sighted approx 3 minutes after ~~patrol~~ infiltrated into the area north of the VC.

When patrol touched down at coordinates mentioned above the CAC ship and gunships noticed 20 to 35 VC approx 1200 meters to their south at coordinates WT 967687. The VC were running north towards ~~patrol~~ location, at this time the gunships engaged the VC with rockets and machine gun fire. The VC were dressed in light colored uniforms and all were armed with individual weapons. The gunships when taking the VC under fire came under intense enemy fire from all directions including emplacements from the Cambodian side of the border. After the gunships expended all of their ammo the arty was called into the VC's location. During the firing of arty the gunships returned to Tay Ninh to refuel and reload. Upon arriving at Tay Ninh the gunships noticed many hits in the aircraft. Upon contacting the FOB at Tay Ninh East, the gunships reported that only 2 of their ships could return to the scene of the action. FOB immediately requested a heavy fire team from Dau Tieng and within 15 minutes a light fire team and a heavy fire team returned to the scene of the action. During this time Smokey III had called in TAC Air. TAC air was then called off due to the gunships returning to the point of contact. The gunships worked the area over for a second time and then noticed a large sampan in the middle of the river at coordinates WT 965723. The sampan had one person in it who escaped to the shore line, the sampan was sunk after the gunships made their run. In the course of this action the gunships came under intense automatic weapons fire from the Cambodian side of the border. (The pilots feel that this sampan was a decoy so that the gunships would fall into a cross fire) During the course of the action the FAC pilot and the gunships noticed many bunkers and spider holes through the area. From sightings in previous days the people involved in Rapid Fire V believe the area is occupied by a large enemy unit (Probably a Regiment).

It was cut into the bank and was designed for two boats. Had not been used since last rainy season. Team traveled north to XT 060646, where a man made stairway was found going down into the river. This also had not been used since last rainy season. Team continued north to XT 058654. At this point there was a well used trail about 1 foot wide, also inactive since last monsoon. At XT 058658, there was a trail which led directly to the teams exfiltration point, but it also had not been used recently. Patrol walked appx 7 kilometers in the 2 1/2 days.

(2) Terrain: Thick underbrush, flat terrain, sparse trees. The Suci Ben Da which flowed to our general right flank moved at a speed of appx 1 to 2 knots. The banks anywhere from 0 to 8 feet high, and 180' slope to 0'. Average width 8-10 ft or more. River in this area of operations is more than adequate to handle the largest of sampans, and overhanging vines and bamboo stands afford good cover for these crafts. Has been used by boats of fairly large size in the past, but not recently. Due to the large number of open areas, suitable for LZ's in the area, it was difficult to move with concealment. Only bisecting stream of any importance was crossed at XT 063638, flowing from north west to south east. Very old trails in area indicate that a base camp might have been located in the area in the past. Old tree markers were found.




d. Conduct of Patrol:

(1) Patrol Route: Patrol infiltrated at 200700 and proceeded west for about 50 meters into the woodline. Voices were heard from the North East and patrol moved north. Paths, recently made, were noticed in the grass, and an old house elevated off the ground about three feet. It was well built, about 8' by 10' with no roof, general state of disrepair. About 3 meters off the north end of the LZ a bunker was found facing in the opposite direction of the LZ. It was dug out of an ant hill, about four feet deep, apparently a shelter from artillery and air raids. At 0807 the rear security indicated a VC was sighted to the west at a distance of about 40 meters. Could not identify weapons or equipment as he disappeared into the underbrush. Team continued moving north and then changed direction due east. After moving about 40 meters another house about 20' by 20' was found, also in a state of disrepair, apparently hit by artillery. At this time the rear security spotted 2 more VC moving past the friendly location in an easterly direction, and the rear security also heard a element moving up from the rear. Team set 2 M-14's in a clearing to their front and then moved south east from 1100 to 1130, covering about 100 meters, where they halted and set up security. Immediately movement was heard in all directions and between 3 to 5 VC were seen in various areas about 20 meters away. Request for extraction was relayed by radio to FOB. At 1300 gunships arrived. Team leader ignited a WP grenade to mark position and gunships made two initial runs to cover withdrawal to the LZ. In moving to the LZ the rear security spotted a VC behind an ant hill. VC was killed with M-16 rifle fire, at a distance of about 15 meters. He was clothed in a brown uniform, weapons and equipment not identified. Along the route smoke was popped so that the gunships could keep track of direction and progress. Team was extracted at 1330. Gunships placed supressing fire on the LZ during exfiltration.

(1) Patrol Route: From LZ patrol moved to river and discovered 8.200 lbs bags of rice which were opened and destroyed. Team then split and one element moved north and one south. Southern element discovered a hut 8x8 with thatched roof and two sides which had a small sleeping platform. Team continued south for 50 meters and discovered 2 10"x24" concrete blocks sunk into the ground each of which had 2 5/8" steel anchors embedded in each block. A third concrete block of the same size had a pulley like device anchored to it consisting of a piece of machinery with 1 18" diameter wheel on either side of the piece. Machinery was not operable. In same area team discovered fresh animal waste and a new ox cart which was destroyed. Also in the area were numerous small trenches with overhead cover to be used as protection against air attacks. One tunnel was dug under an ant hill and had a fox hole at the entrance to be used as a fighting position. Team continued 40 meters south and found a latrine and heard voices, team fired M79 into the area and swept the area with no active results. Team returned north to the LZ and were extracted. Northern element moved north from the LZ and discovered a small docking area with one 8' x 20' hut and 2 8' x 10' huts, all with thatched roofs and no sides, and all were destroyed. Team continued north and discovered another hut and a 3'x2'x12' bunker with one entrance facing the river and 1 facing down river. Team also discovered an ox cart tongue in the river which was tied to a tree, and when the rope was cut it sank into the river. Team continued north 50 meters and discovered a garden area 1/4 acre in size, in the area also were 2 8x8' huts with thatched roofs. One hut had a table, various eating tools and fish nets. All huts and equipment were destroyed. Team continued north 20 meters and discovered a sampan which was destroyed. Team continued north to WT974620 where another sampan was discovered and destroyed. Also discovered and destroyed were approx 500 lbs salt, 100 lbs rice, and 4 huts. Huts in this area were more sturdy constructed than those previously mentioned. Team received automatic weapons fire from the Cambodian side of the river which was returned and ECM Air was called in with unknown results. Team was then extracted.



d. Conduct of Patrol:

(1) Patrol Route: The first element landed at time indicated above and immediately discovered four houses about 10 meters from their infil point which they destroyed. Moving into the main woodline they found a small complex cornering a space of appx 40 meters composed of bunkers and 6 houses. Houses were destroyed, bunkers numbered 6, and were 6x4'. Continuing to move along the river to the north the team found numerous air raid type shelters along the river, and large garden plots. Garden plot was destroyed by uprooting plants and throwing them into the river. Nearby another complex of houses and bunkers were found. This was an obvious VC farm as it contained pens for animals and a large cooking area for farm workers. At 0930 the C&C ship informed team to circle wagons as a TAC bomb run was coming in to the south at 500 meters. At this time team received small arms fire from the Cambodian side of the river. The fire was ineffective and not returned. Team remained in general area until link up with 2d element at 1030. During the interim other houses and bunkers were discovered about 15 meters away. The bunkers and houses were the same size and configuration as others previously found. The houses were destroyed. At 1035 another TAC bomb run was made about 500 meters south of the 2 elements. During movement of element 2 from the LZ to link up with the 1st element the following actions took place. It had become apparent that the entire area running north to south along the river and the woodline was a huge VC farm. Team moved into the woodline off the LZ to the northwest destroying dozens of houses as they left. Team was in the process of destroying houses when 1 VC popped out of a spider hole and was killed by M16 fire. The enemy fell in the river and a grenade was thrown to confirm his death. He did not have a weapon. There were 6 small 2 man bunkers along the river at this point, with entrances pointing west and south. Patrol moved 25 meters farther north and found a 15' sampan against the bank of the river containing a compartment of fresh fish. Sampan was sunk with rifle fire. An empty PFD ~~man~~ was found in the boat also. More houses were found and destroyed enroute to linkup with first element. At about 1045 the bomb run mentioned above was terminated and both elements moved out, 1st element in the lead and 2nd in the rear with the mission of destroying such facilities as the first element might find. About 100 meters farther north an indig soldier accidentally discharged a P grenade which was attached to his pistol belt resulting in the death of 2 indig, 2 indig WIA, and 1 USA SF WIA. Medevac arrived at 1130 followed by the 3rd element at 1135. Medevac was fired on from the north east as it lifted off the LZ. The small arms fire was answered by an air strike of 20mm cannon and CBU's and a rocket run by gunships. At 1145 the 1st and 2nd element moved out in the lead in line with the third element in the rear as security and destruction party. Direction of movement was northwest. Immediately an ox cart was found on the right flank. It was decided not to carry heavy loads such as logs or weapons and ammunition. It was destroyed with a LM. The team moved on a distance of 350 meters where a nearby VC cow was destroyed with M16 fire. During the movement of the patrol over the previously 350 meters, over 30 houses were discovered and burnt to the ground. At least 60 protective type bunkers were also in the same area. Old three strand barbed wire fences were prominent, believed to be constructed to delay movement from nearby LZ's to the farm area. At 1300 all 3 elements again linked up and, circling wagons, ate lunch. During this period it was noted that gunships making runs on the Vietnamese side of the river were receiving fire from the Cambodian side of the river. At 1320 the team moved out following the river north, about 150 meters. Another area was found and 15 houses destroyed. Numerous wells were also found which had been hit by artillery sweeps laid in ahead of the team. At WT 962676 2 M-16 mines were placed in a large garden which a peared ready for harvest. This garden was 250 meters long and 150 meters wide surrounded by fences with 10 houses which contained farm harvesting equipment. The houses were destroyed with the 500 lbs of rice that they contained. It should be noted here that these gardens were in two stages of cultivation, one ready for harvest and partially gathered and the other in the growing stage. At 1445 the patrol moved out north along the river in a column formation to

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maintain cover during the movement due to the lack of vegetation adjacent to the river. At about 1500 the team reached a junction where it found that a finger along the river was to the rear of its left flank. The patrol leader broke his command into 2 elements, one which fanned to the northeast and provided security for the main element. The main element conducted a wheeling sweep to the northwest and southwest to search the area at WT 960670. At this location the rear element joined the main element. The 1st and 3rd elements moved south into the finger and the 2nd element went north along the river. Both elements found a mixture of defensive positions composed of trenches and bunkers. One third of these positions had been in recent use, and they all faced east across the open rice paddies. At 1600 the commander in the air made the decision to effect extraction of the patrol. At this time the 3d element stayed in position along the river, the 2d element continued sweeping north, and the 1st element continued sweeping south. It was during this time that the 1st element uncovered one of the most important finds of the day. In the southern part of the finger area, a large headquarters complex was located. It was composed of houses, kitchens, machine shops, briefing rooms, poultry and livestock compounds, and a sophisticated docking point. At the same time the 2d element to the north found a complex almost identical to the southern one within a distance of 500 meters of each other. The complex to the south was in the general vic of WT 961667. The complex to the north was in the vic of WT 961675. The 3d element was extracted at 1615. The decision was made at this time to continue the sweep north by the 2d element while awaiting extraction. At WT 966678 a canal running east to west was discovered, about 3 meters wide and 150 meters long. 2 bunkers covered the entrance to the canal. It lead to a rice paddy which was ready for harvest. A well used trail from the canal to the rice paddy was laid with M-14 mine. It was not possible at this time to continue destruction activities due to limited time and material. It was possible however to remove the bulk of machinery items and throw them in the river. Both elements then moved to exfiltration LZ's and were returned to the FOB.

Generally the area is open and farmed, but circumvented and paralleled on the east and west by heavy jungle and the river. With the exception of some marshy areas track vehicles could move easily in a north south axis with ample support and maneuver space.


(4) Misc: This search and destroy mission has confirmed the fact that the area patrolled is a maze of farms emplaced to feed VC elements training in the area.

h. Was Mission Accomplished: Yes. Size of the patrol limited the amount of materials available to complete comprehensive and long lasting destruction.

i. Recommendations and Conclusions: If the VC and VA operating here cannot feed their trainees and infiltrating elements the value of maintaining their complexes in this area will be greatly reduced. It is sometimes difficult to destroy base camps and troop concentrations, this is not the case with gardens and farms which have existed unmolested in War Zone "C" for the last two years, if not longer. The machinery, buildings, and docking points, plus varied and sundry other points in the AO are directed towards the production of food crops throughout the year, with transportation means available both by water and overland at harvest time. Situation reports and debriefings prepared and forwarded by Det E-36 during Operation Rapid Fire V has pinpointed not only these VC farm areas but the training complexes and troop concentrations that they support to the north and south along the river from below the Logo road to WT 974977. An all encompassing list of recommendations and conclusions will be included in the AAR for this operation, however it is sincerely felt that a massive air and land operation should be launched as soon as possible to destroy and deny this area to use by the enemy once and for all.

III. EXPLOITED INFORMATION:

Source stated that he was drafted on 21 March 1965. He was trained in HAI DUONG province for 4 months. Training included: Firing (AK 47, AK 50), digging foxholes, tunnels and bunkers.

Source stated that in July 1965 he finished training and was assigned to the H-19th Engineer company, 611th battalion, 219th regiment. The mission of his company was to dig tunnels and foxholes to be used for protection against air raids. On 05 August 1965, H-19 Engineer Company infiltrated into SVN. After 3½ months his company reached 4th Bac Ke post (this post is in SVN). His infiltration group was called 611th group and included 300 men. While the group was infiltrating there were approx 20 men who contacted malaria. Source had malaria in 4th Bac Ke post and stayed in a hospital which is located in the 4th Bac Ke post, 5 days walking distance from 6th Military Region. When source was released from the hospital he was again assigned to H-19th Engineer company. At that time, the location of H-19th Company was in 6th military region. Strength of H-19th company was approx 80 men. The units mission in 6th military region was to build roads and trails for the VC. His unit was located in 6th military region for 11 months. The H-19th Engineer Company was disbanded and source was assigned to 1st Squad, 2nd Platoon, C-25th Engineer Company, located in TAY NINH province. C-25 LBN 86200YK/B5 of 5th regiment is subordinate to COSVN.



Source did not know of any rice or weapons caches. He has not seen any American or SVN POW's in the area.

IV. INTERROGATOR: SP/6 BENITEZ

INTERROGATOR'S COMMENT: Source in many instances contradicted himself and denied having any knowledge as f.r as places and directions. I believe he is holding information. Recommend further interrogation in regard to COSVN infrastructure and locations.



- (b) Furnish up to date info on enemy, weather and terrain
- (c) Coordinate Photo coverage.
- (d) Provide required map coverage.
- (e) Provide a POW collection point of handling POW's and documents
- (f) Coordinate and provide other Intel as required.

(2) S-3

- (a) Provide Liasion with II FFV as required.
- (b) Provide necessary frequencies and commo support.
- (3) S-4 Provide logistical support as required.
- (4) ALO: Provide required coord with USAF.

c. Det B-36

(1) Provide 6 USASF for Command and Control Plus 5 radio operators.

(2) Establish FOB and Commo Center.

d. Det A-361. Provide one Recon and one main force Platoon. Strength of this force will be 8 USASF, 2 IRRP's and 50 VN Nationals.

e. Det A-362. Provide one Recon and one main force platoon. Strength of this force will be 8 USASF, 5 IRRP's and 60 UN Nationals.

f. Det A-302. Provide one Mike Force Company as ready reserve. This unit will be operational in AO Mongoose.

g. Det B-32: Coord and Liasion.


h. US Army Avn Supt (II FFV Asset)

(1) Provide continuously, five helicopters capable of carrying at least six combat equipped soldiers. The ships must also be able to hover at an altitude of 100 feet during infiltrations and extractions with this number of personnel on board.

(2) Provide a ten slick scramble on two hour alert.

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(3) Provide three UTT's capable of performing close air support.

(4) Provide continual Radio Relay on a 24 hour Basis.

i. 23rd Arty Gp: GS

j. TAC Air Support.

(1) Immediate: on call thru FAC to III DASC, Dien Hoa

(2) Preplanned : On call thru III DASC.

k. SAC support: ARC LITE and Quick Run Strikes on call thru the II FFV, Long Binh.

l. Coordinating Instructions:

(1) MSF 361 and 362 provide additional USASF, LRRP and VNN, Cambodian, personnel as required.

(2) All mines and booby traps will be self destructive.

(3) All personnel contacted within the AO are considered hostile.

(4) Decisive engagement will be avoided unless defeat of the enemy in detail is calculated.

(5) Assets of Co A, 5th SFGA, designated to support Opn Rapid Fire V will be attached off 060800 Dec 67 unless by VOCG.

(6) This plan is effective for planning upon receipt.

(7) Commo to higher Hqs will be direct to B-32 and by RTT to Co A, 5th SFGA.

4. (C) Administration and Logistics:

a. Administration:

(1) A roster of all Rapid Fire V personnel will be provided to Co A and Long Hai. A third copy will be maintained at the FOB (TOC), Tay Ninh.



(3) ID Tag's will be the only ID carried by personnel operating in or over the AO.

(4) Casualties will be reported as soon as possible using SOP direct to Co A, 5th SFGA.

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- (5) US dead will be taken to Co A, 5th SFGA, Bien Hoa ASAP.
- (6) US and VN Nationals wounded will be evacuated to 45th MUST Hospital Tay Ninh West.
- (7) VN Nationals slightly wounded will be treated at the FOB.
- (8) All POW's and documents will be process thru the FOB to Co A, 5th SFGA, Bien Hoa.
- (9) Medevac: All wounded will be medevaced using Det B-36 attached Avn Resources.

b. LOGISTICS:

- (1) An emergency resupply of ammo and medical supplies will be on hand at the FOB, Tay Ninh East, for delivery by helicopter.
- (2) Additional supplies of all classes will be procured from Co A, 5th SFGA as required.
- (3) Class I:
 - (a) Personnel committed to the AO will be issued one Indig and one C-Ration per day.
 - (b) Personnel not committed will eat class A rations prepared at the FOB Mess Tent.
- (4) Class II SOP
- (5) Class III SOP
- (6) Class IV SOP
- (7) Class V SOP

5. (C) COMMAND AND SIGNAL

a. SIGNAL: Current SOI in Effect.



ANNEX A (INTELLIGENCE) TO OPLAN RAPID FIRE V

REFERENCE: a. Maps, AMS JCG (G) Series L7016, Scale 1:50,000, sheets 6232 III, 6232 IV.

b. Tactical Terrain Study Base Areas: Tay Ninh and Vicinity.
Hqs MACV J2 dated 15 October 1967.

1. (C) SUMMARY OF ENEMY SITUATION:

a. Current order of battle does not indicate the presence of any major VC/NVA units in the AO, however, the Hqs 7th NVA Div with support elements and the 271st VC Regiment are all located vicinity XT5993 and it is probable that elements of these units may be in or near AO.

b. Reference b indicates the presence of numerous well used trails leading into RVN from Cambodia and it is probable that the enemy is using the area as a major infiltration route.

2. (C) ESSENTIAL ELEMENTS OF INFORMATION TO BE COLLECTED WITHIN THE AO.

a. What is enemy strength, disposition, composition and unit identification?

b. What are the locations of base camp, command and control facilities and logistical support activities within AO?

c. Will the enemy fight to preserve base camps or will they withdraw? If they will fight, determine with what forces, when and with what supporting arms. If they will withdraw, determine to where and by what routes using what means of transportation.

d. Will the enemy reinforce his forces within the AO? If so when, from where, and with what forces?

e. Determine the use of trails, roads, and waterways with respect to type of traffic, volume and frequency of use.

f. What activities are being carried out within the AO by VC/NVA units, where, in what strengths, and with what effectiveness.

3. Request for information and assistance: Company A, 5th SFGA is requested to furnish:


a. Maps of the AO

b. Photo coverage of the AO

c. Prisoner detaining facilities for POWs captured within the AO.

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4. (C) COUNTERINTELLIGENCE:

a. Military Security: Commanders will take all active and passive measures to preserve the security of this operation, to include:

(1) Limitation of the number of personnel with knowledge of the mission and AO to those with a need to know.

(2) Strict Adherence to established procedures concerning the handling of classified documents and material.

(3) Insuring that indigenous personnel having access to areas connected with the operation do not gain knowledge of the operation.

b. Communications Security.

(1) Only those CRYPTOGRAPHIC systems and codes authorized by US National Authority will be used for electrical communications required protection.

5. (C) MISCELLANEOUS:

a. Instructions for exfiltration of VIP POW's will be requested subsequent to capture.

b. All captured documents and equipment will be reported to Co A, 5th SFCA.

c. POW's will be interrogated at FOB for immediately useable information and then evacuated to Co A, 5th SFCA.


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ANNEX H, SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION:

1. The following information and comments are included in the body and annexes of this After Action Report. However, it is felt that due to the fact these statistics and other media may elude the reader they are re-emphasized in this attachment.

a. During the conduct of Operation Rapid Fire V a total of seventeen (17) helicopters were struck by enemy fire. Ten (10) of these were destroyed, three were lost, but three were seriously damaged. Seven of these were shot down at various times but returned to station under their own power.

b. The statistics below are a resume of B-52 strikes and assessments:

d. The "Woodcutter" area indicated on Operations and Intelligence Overlay attached as Annex G is of special interest. Within this area Vietnamese loggers are allowed to travel freely with the permission of the Province Chief. It is known through interrogation reports and information received freely from these woodcutters that the following Viet Cong activities take place in this zone.

(1) Loggers communicate with the VC and cooperate with their desires in order to cut wood in the area.

(2) Truck owners are taxed at pre-arranged times in order to enter and leave the area.

(3) VC limit the movement of the woodcutters and dictate the areas that can be used in order not to interfere with the movement, cover, and concealment of Viet Cong units, either local or main force.

(4) Logger trucks are used for the transport of VC locals, who are in some cases working as woodcutters.

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
