Dick,

After I arrived in August, 1967 there was a time when the Top (First Sergeant DePalm) was the only administrative support besides the CO and XO for the 188th. The TOE may or may not have called for an Administration Officer, but at some point Lt Flack, who I believe was infantry, became the AO, or acting AO. On November 9th, 1967, those of us who were still not initiated learned the difference between "incoming" and "outgoing". I myself had been asking the same question. I had taken off early, shortly after dusk, and was just getting out of my boots when I felt "incoming" (Major Graham and ?? Snodgrass really felt it; there was a group of officers standing in front of the Orderly Room when "incoming" announced itself. Those two, I believe, were slightly wounded). I never flinched and found myself in a bunker just down the row from my "hootch" ("incoming" was a knowledge that separates me from the boys ever since: you know what I mean). After the initial mortar barrage we were ordered to report from the bunker to the berm line. When I arrived and had jumped over the last ditch "ditch" I realized that we were under fire (my first encounter with that feeling also). From behind a rubber tree I gingerly "popped" my little .38 (I still to this day declare that it was a Smith & Wesson, Blued, Air Force Special .38 revolver; but everyone tells me that no such weapon ever existed. They had never cleaned mine and I was fully aware of what was engraved on the barrel) in the direction of the "front". After awhile Lt Flack appeared on the berm line in shorts, a helmet and a flak jacket and commenced to direct fire, walking up and down the line shouting orders of some kind to urge us on I suppose. At some point the order to cease fire came down the line. Lt. Flack ignored the order (I didn't know where the order came from but I heard it being conveyed to Lt Flack by someone who had run down the line). Later, upon Major Johnson's questioning, I re-iterated the evenings events and Lt. Flack got on Major Johnson's shit list. It seems that the infantry had sent out troops for a pincer movement across the line and as they closed across our position they realized that they were receiving fire from our line. After requesting a cease fire they had advanced but our continued fire apparently hit some of their (our) folks (oops, friendly fire). Of course we were reprimanded and, of course, Major Johnson wasn't happy. Later, and I think this was after we moved to LZ Sally, it came time for Flack to go home. He did, but in the process had lifted a revolver from Ordinance and had taken it with him as a souvenir. When Major Johnson found out about it he had me call battalion and chase Flack down with orders to arrest him. The MP's got to Flack just as he was boarding the plane - he came back a miserable wreck and faced the wrath of an irate Major Johnson. I believe he was busted to something less than a civilian. I understand that he had pulled some other "childish" stunts and this had apparently been the last of the last straws. Well, Dick. That's what I remember on that subject. More Later. Mike

On 9 November 1967, First Lieutenant Ronald C. Flack, United States Army, distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous actions while serving as an advisor to the 188th Assault Helicopter Company's perimeter of defense during a Viet Cong mortar attack. Just prior to 2100 hours, Camp Ranier, Dan Tiang came under a mortar and ground attack. Not being in contact with the company command element, First Lieutenant Flack quickly analyzed the situation. Although enemy mortars were landing in a close proximity to his position, he burst out of his shelter without regard to personal safety and began assisting with the arduous task of molding the company's line of defense into a succinct fighting force. First Lieutenant Flack repeatedly exposed himself to hostile fire, but relentlessly continued the mission at hand. He directed personnel into secure positions, controlled weapons fire, and adjusted ammunition to assure a balanced distribution, prolonging the defense until ammunition could be resupplied. The small number of casualties inflicted during the fight, by the insurgents upon this unit is vivid evidence of the astute thinking and able leadership displayed. First Lieutenant Flack's spontaneous actions, exemplary courage and outstanding leadership in the time of confusion contributed immeasurably to the success of the defense. First Lieutenant Flack's bravery and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.

He quickly analyzed the situation and took steps to organize the defense of the unit. He worked his way to the perimeter of the compound and proceeded to direct and control his units fire at enemy positions. The small number of casualties this unit received during the attack is evidence of the astute thinking and able leadership displayed by this man. His actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit and the United States Army.
