

LEAVE & LIBERTY ON RETURN CONUS

The Command is most concerned about enabling personnel to be reunited with families ASAP on arrival CONUS.

Consenant then with the target date of 17 March 1969 for release, leave and liberty will be as follows:

Everyone to G'port

All personnel will return to Gulfport from RVM. Leave, liberty and transfers will be effected there.

96-hour Passes

Upon arrival at Gulfport, after a minimum check-in, personnel desiring such will be granted a 72- or 96- hour pass. (A 96 must include a Saturday and Sunday.)

Leave Discouraged

Reserve personnel being released have been discouraged in taking leave because of the short time for processing for release by the target date. Leave to be Granted

Personnel continuing on active duty with other units will be granted leave, if desired, shortly after arrival.
