It's a journal of military special operations that was started several years ago by some Vietnam era 75th Infantry rangers and has become very successful and internationally known. I recently wrote an article about one of our CP missions in January of 1969 just before Tet, on which we wasted two companies of NVA to include a Russian advisor. As soon as it's published I'll send you a copy.

In researching our KIA's for an ongoing project by the 75th Infantry Association I was given a personal account by Mark Miller who was with Lt. Green when he was killed. In it

he says there was also one of our men from the 3rd platoon who was part of a reaction force who was killed by friendly fire in that action. I have not been able to find any verification of that, or come up with a name. If you remember anything about this would you please let me know.

Also, are you in touch with Frank Moore, or do you have an address for him?

Mike, after looking at a map (LRP's only do that when absolutely necessary, right!) I see that Waynesville is only about 20 miles or so from Asheville. My wife's parents live in Asheville and we come up to visit when we can. We will be making a trip up there in the next month or so and I wondered if it would be possible to stop by for a short visit on the way back. I'd love to have the opportunity to sit down and talk to you.

Good luck in your rehab program. I know it's not as easy as it used to be for any of us. You know what they say about old Rangers; they never give up, they just give out! But go ahead and make me proud, I know you can do it!
