

OBITUARY

Mr. Douglas Marion Ray, oldest son of Cleveland and Odelia (Nee McClinton) Ray, Sr., was born June 25, 1950.

He was baptized at St. Peter Claver and attended St. Peter Parochial School until the 5th grade. He was very proud to be an altar boy, often being called upon to help at High Masses.

After moving to Maplewood in 1960, he attended Presentation of BVM and went on to Hill High School. Taking academic courses that included Latin, he excelled in track, specifically discuss throwing, and earned his letters in wrestling, winning the "W.L. Lewis" Award for "fastest pins" in the 1968 state championship.

Doug was a Vietnam Veteran of Company C (Charlie) Rangers 75th Infantry [REDACTED] Airborne. He served two years in Vietnam. Upon returning stateside, he attended school at St. Paul TVI taking plumbing courses. A year later he decided to become a pipefitter. Doug was the third Black pipefitter in the State of Minnesota. For the past 26 years, he has been a brother in Local #455 Pipefitters and Steamfitters, working on various buildings throughout the Twin Cities.
