4. Additional information:

- (a) Army ammunition evacuated (672 L/T) was due to two artillery units leaving and taking their ammunition with them.
- (b) Total Army Supplies on hand 1 February (12,078 L/T) represents plus 1249 correction. This is due to organizational equipment turned in to Ordnance (245 L/T), Quartermaster (883 L/T), and Petroleum (121 L/T).
- (c) USOM Supplies on hand 15 February totaled 50 L/T which is minus 150 L/T correction. This was due to over estimate.
- (d) Best estimate of organizational T O and E equipment remaining in Haiphong 15 February was 4 to 5 thousand tons.
