- In accordance with reference (a), the following quarterly combat readiness report of ground units is submitted for the period 1 July 1960 through 30 September 1960. Enclosures (1) through (8) are the quarterly readiness reports of subordinate units.
- This command is capable of providing two Marine Divisions, two Marine Aircraft Wings, a Marine Brigade consisting of air and ground elements, plus supporting elements of Force Troops for the conduct of combat operations.
- Significant events occurring during the past quarter which had a direct influence on readiness are as follows:
- Implementation of the transplacement program during the quarter saw the 2d Battalion, 7th Marines (enroute to 3d Marine Division at the time of last report); 3d Battalion, 7th Marines; and 1st Battalion, 9th Marines rotated to 3d Marine Division. The cadred 3d Battalion, 9th Marines in 3d Marine Division was redesignated Sub Unit One, Headquarters and Service Company, 3d Battalion, 7th Marines and cadred 3d Battalion, 9th Marines picked up in 1st Marine Division. The 2d Battalion, 1st Marines was returned to 1st Marine Division and 1st Battalion, 5th Marines was enroute to 1st Marine Division at close of the reporting period. The above rotation brings the 3d Marine Division to six full infantry battalions.

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b. The 4th Data Processing Platoon (Mobile), Fleet Marine Force previously reported as attached to 1st Marine Division is still attached to Marine Corps Base due to a conflict in previous instructions. This has already been the subject of separate correspondence to the Commandant of the Marine Corps.

4. PERSONNEL.

- a. The major ground commands of Fleet Marine Force, Pacific are above authorized strength for officers except for the 3d Marine Division; all major commands are below authorized strength for enlisted personnel. The major personnel deficiency is shortages in rank and MOS to fill authorized billets. Specific shortages are shown in subordinate unit reports.
 - b. Significant personnel factors by commands are:
- (1) lst MARINE DIVISION (REÍN) This division has shortages of officers in MOS 2715 and in lieutenants for assignment to supporting units. It has an overage of enlisted personnel E-5 and above in OF O3. Shortages of at least 50% of currently authorized strength exist in 12 OF's in ranks from E-1 through E-6. Reclassification, retraining and increased ITR input for non-transplacement units should help correct the overages/shortages.
- (2) Force Troops, FMFPac. The personnel shortages by rank and MOS reported by Commanding General, Force Troops, FMFPac will be corrected by on-the-job training and retraining assignments. Headquarters and Service Battery, 2d Light Antiaircraft Missile Battalion has been activated and it is anticipated that the three cadre batteries of the 1st Field Artillery Group and the third platoon of the two 8" Batteries will be activated during the second quarter FY 1961.
- (3) 1st Force Service Regiment. The manning level assigned this regiment for the 1st half FY 61 provides personnel not required for currently assigned missions and reduces the number of personnel in fields where a critical need exists if the unit is to perform its mission in support of a Marine Expeditionary Force. These manning level discrepancies apparently resulted from promulgation of 1st half FY 61 manning levels without benefit of recommendations from the field. Recommendations are being prepared to correct the situation for 2d half FY 61.

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5. TRAINING.

- a. During the quarter, all Fleet Marine Force, Pacific units concentrated on individual and small unit training to include battalion field and PHIBLEX type exercises which a majority of the Battalions held. This was in preparation for the RLT size exercises scheduled for the 2d Quarter and the Division/Wing exercise scheduled during the 4th Quarter. These exercises included the tactical use of helicopters in both day and night operations as well as the inclusion of combat support and service support type units.
- h. Artillery units supported the infantry training outlined above and all units held live firing exercises during the quarter. The 1st Light Antiaircraft Missile Battalion, and "B" Battery, 1st Medium Antiaircraft Missile Battalion conducted live missile firing. CPX's were held at various levels from Battalion to Division. Special type training such as a Mountain Field exercise, Submarine training, Communication training and specialized training peculiar to service support and combat support units enhanced the overall posture of our training readiness.
- c. Units of the command provided amphibious assault demonstrations for the annual PACNARMIDLEX and JCOC #31, again giving us experience in exercising our combined arms team. 1st Air and Naval Gunfire Liaison Company provided a total of 24 teams (TACP, FAC, NGF) for other services as well as conducting organic training. 1st Composite Radio Company has also participated in joint exercises.
- d. Due to recent budgetary limitations, renewed emphasis has been placed on organic schools within our units. A reported 131 officers and 1951 enlisted men completed schools during the quarter. This does not reflect the total number of school graduates since TAD schools are not included, nor do all units maintain formal schools. Weapons qualification continues at better than 90%.
- e. Specific breakdown of training exercises, schools and degree of training readiness is contained in enclosures (1) through (8). It is considered that the overall training of the command is in a high category of readiness. Those units in categories B or C reflect a result of personnel turnover. Deployed units reflect the higher degree of training readiness, thus in effect giving us a category A capability to respond to Contingencies. Other units could be brought to category A within 6 weeks with the stabilization of personnel.

6. MATERIEL.

- a. All ground units of Fleet Marine Force, Pacific with the exception of the 1st Antiaircraft Group have on hand sufficient materiel to mount out and engage in amphibious operations or undertake assigned missions.
- b. The special report on the status of mounting out stocks of the 3d Marine Division (-) (Rein), requested by reference (b), is attached to the report of that unit.
- c. Specific materiel improvements, or limitations on individual units to perform assigned missions are enumerated below:

(1) 1st Antiaircraft Group.

(a) All units of this group continue in Materiel Category "C". Equipment shortages are known to supply echelons. Completion estimates for equipping the missile battalions is unknown.

(2) 3d Marine Division (-) (Rein).

- (a) The capability of the 3d Service Battalion remains limited since one Supply and Maintenance Platoon is only partially equipped. Requisitions have been placed and are reported in the related Materiel Readiness Reports forwarded through supply channels.
- (b) 3d Battalion, 7th Marines does not have its M40Al recoilless rifles. Marine Corps Supply Center, Barstow has reported that 7 recoilless rifles are enroute to Okinawa by air.
- (c) It is to be noted that the report of the 3d Marine Division (-) (Rein) established a Materiel Category "C" for the 2d Battalion, 7th Marines. Investigation indicates that the 2d Battalion, 7th Marines should be assigned a Materiel Category "B" and it is anticipated that Category "A" will be attained by 1 December 1960.
 - (3) <u>lst Composite Radio Company</u>.

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(a) Lack of major items of equipment continues to be a serious deficiency, however, the anticipated arrival during the 2d Quarter FY 61 of interim equipment repackaged in S-144 shelters should improve the capability of this unit.

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QUARTERLY REPORT OF COMBAT READINESS

STATEMENT OF THE COMMANDER

(Form 2)

1. During this past quarter, two infantry battalions (Third Battalion, Seventh Marines and First Battalion, Ninth Marines) were deployed to the 3rd Marine Division. Organization of infantry battalions for transplacement continues in accordance with current directives. One infantry battalion (Second Battalion, First Marines) joined this command from the 3rd Marine Division. The Second Battalion, First Marines, commenced its half-cycle in the United States on 1 September 1960. The Second Battalion, Ninth Marines will deploy to the 3rd Marine Division on or about 19 November 1960. The personnel figures in this report include those assigned to the First Force Service Regiment (-). New Manning Levels for the Reinforced Division became effective 1 October 1960.

a. Personnel:

(1) Officers

- (a) During the first quarter of this fiscal year officer strength was relatively constant.
- (b) The following table presents the current officer personnel strength:

(c) Information available indicates this command will lose approximately 71 (including 44 assigned to Second Battalion, Ninth Marines) and join 89 during the second quarter, Fiscal Year 1961.

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(d) There is a serious shortage of officers in the following field:

(b) Enlisted

(3) Considering known and estimated attrition and estimated gains during the second quarter, FY 61, the projected enlisted personnel percentages as of 31 December 1960 will be approximately 80.5% of the current T/O as compared with 75.4% at the beginning of the quarter. Included in the anticipated attrition is the loss of one T/O transplacement battalion and one communication company (Total 1304).

b. Training

(1) During the 1st quarter Fiscal Year 1961, the Division continued emphasizing individual and small unit as well as battalion and regimental level training. Two (2) battalion landing team amphibious landing exercises including tactical use of helicopters, two (2) battalion landing team amphibious exercises (PACNARMIDLEX 60 and JCOC #31), an artillery field firing exercise, and a reconnaissance battalion mountain field exercise highlighted the training activities during the quarter. Form 4 to this report enumerates the exercise schedule.

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- (2) The Division continued its training of transplacement battalions. During the quarter two (2) of these battalions (1/9/1 and 3/7) were rotated to the 3d Marine Division for their overseas phase. Two of the battalions (1/1/7 and 2/1/7) were re-formed and commenced their CONUS cycle.
- (3) Marksmanship training in all weapons was stressed with particular emphasis being placed on combat application.
- (a) Maximum utilization was made by Division units of the combat firing ranges including squad, platoon and company live firing exercises.
- (b) A recapitulation of requalification firing over the quarter is as follows:

- (4) A total of 868 students attended Division Schools during the quarter which included 45 officers who received an additional MOS of 5702 upon graduating from the Division ABCD Course.
- (5) Although the training status of this Division is considered to be in category "B", some units are in category "A" and some are in category "C" which reflects the effect of the transplacement program on the infantry battalions and regiments concerned. Form 3 furnishes the organic units individual status.

c. Materiel

(1) General. The materiel readiness of this Division will permit it to mount-out for combat. Certain shortages in repair parts and special equipment, particularly electronic equipment, do exist, but corrective action is dependent primarily upon procurement by higher authority. Generally the materiel readiness of this division would be classified in Category "B".

Enclosure (2)
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(2) Communication-Electronics. No appreciable improvement in electronic spare parts support for the division has been experienced during the past quarter. Requisition lead times are for the most part excessively long. A sampling of major electronics items deadlined this quarter for periods in excess of 40 days, indicates that out of 50 items, 43 different parts were required to effect repairs. These items do not include components such as handsets, headsets, etc. Approximately 300 such items are deadlined awaiting parts.

Currently the Division has its full allowance of Radio Sets, AN/TRC-27. However, in its present configuration this equipment is too fragile for field use. Excessive care must be exercised in handling, trans-porting, and installing this equipment. The consistent failures of the AN/TRC-27 and its associated equipment have caused serious deficiencies in the Division Communication System. To improve the usefulness of this equipment certain recommendations have been submitted.

- (3) Ordnance. The status of major combat ordnance materiel is satisfactory and the level of ordnance mount-out stocks is adequate.
- (4) Engineer. Engineer material readiness for the reinforced division is satisfactory with the exception of the tractors of 1st Pioneer Battalion. Currently there is a 50% deadline of said tractors due to a shortage of 3d echelon spare parts.
- (5) Motor Transport. Improvement in the motor transport posture during the past quarter has resulted in bringing the division to a satisfactory state of combat readiness.

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Personnel.

Note 1:

The major personnel problems in this command are:

- a. Shortage of officers in MOS 2715.
- b. Shortage of lieutenants for assignment to supporting units will continue to be a problem.
- c. An overage of culisted personnel in the rank of E-5 and above in OF 03. Reclassification and retraining should improve the situation during the next quarter.
- d. A shortage of at least 50% of currently authorized strength in the various ranks as follows:

e. This situation will improve with an increased ITR input for non-transplacement units.

Note 2:

Strength of the Division is slightly below manning level. This and the discrepancies in actual rank and MOS reflect adversely on the readiness position.

Training

Note 1:

Training deficiencies within the Division continue to be related directly to the personnel shortages. The transplacement system and cadres have reduced the effectiveness of training at the regimental and division level however training at battalion level and lower is considered excellent. The Division continues to maintain the capability to mount out within ten days for a combat mission.

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Note 2:

The transplacement system will continue to have effect on the training and combat readiness of the Division. At almost all times one infantry regiment will be in Category"C" since one or more battalions will be reforming. Those units not effected by transplacement continue efforts to maintain a high degree of combat readiness.

Materiel

Note 1:

The major deficiencies are set forth in the commander's statement.

Note 2:

The attainment of a higher degree of readiness by units not in Category "A" will be accomplished when the delay in receipt of spare parts has been reduced, when current shortages become available and when presently deadlined equipment comes off deadline status.

a. 1st Marines

In order to facilitate transplacement of lstBn 9th Marines to Okinawa during this quarter, certain organic equipment was transferred from 3dBn lstMarines. Shortages consist primarily of LMG barrel assemblies and bayonets.

b. 7th Marines

Allowance of 106 BAR's was transplaced to the 3rd Marine Division. A replacement allowance is anticipated with 1stBn 5th Marines returning from Okinawa in October.

c. 11th Marines

One 105 mm howitzer was lost during PHIBLEX 39-60 and replacement is anticipated in October.

1. Personnel

- Olvision is satisfactory, although the on board personnel strength during the quarter has been under the authorized manning level. During the period 1 July 30 August the manning level was 35 officers and 13.591 enlisted personnel. On 31 August 1960 the Division (Reinforced) began to operate under a new manning level of 369 efficers and 15,939 enlisted personnel. The on beard strength at the end of the quarter was 563 officers and 13.773 enlisted personnel; giving an overall shortage of 60 officers and 2,166 enlisted personnel. The most significant electage of enlisted personnel is primarily in the 08 field, with a manning level of 1,026 and an on board strength of 890.
- red during this period. The Second Battalion, Seventh Marines errived in July, replacing the Second Battalion, Pirst Marines which was transferred to the First Marine Division. On 23 August the cadre part Third Battalion, Ninth Marines was redesignated Sub Unit Mumber One, Readquarters and Service Company Third Battalion, Seventh Marines. Upon the arrival of Third Battalion, Seventh Marines and First Battalion, Ninth Marines during September the Third Marine Division organization was returned to six infantry battalions. Second Battalion, Fifth Marines was established as the First Afloat Battalion in the Far East and reported for operational control to Seventh Fleet and sailed for the South China Sea area on 4 August 1960.
- (c) In accordance with Fleet Marine Force, Pacific letter 30P/RCH, 031360 dated 4 August 1960 the following units were reactivated:
- (1) 3d Plateon, Company "C", 3d Anti-Tank Battalion consisting of one officer and 17 enlisted.
- (2) Echo Battery, Second Battalion, Twelfth Marines consisting of nine officers and 148 enlisted.
- (3) 3d Platoon, Company "C", 3d Pioneer Battalion consisting of one officer and 44 enlisted personnel. Personnel for units activated were provided from personnel within the 3d Marine Division as directed by Commandant of the Marine Corps massage 0612362 July 1960.

- (d) Third Force Service Regiment currently has fitteen companies activated, staffed and now in operation. Only the Longshoreman Company of Headquarters and Service Battalion, Table of Organization L-3403, remains to be staffed.
- (e) The necessary requirement to furnish a large number of Division personnel for performance of base type functions beyond the capabilities of Camp Butler, in the nime division camps continues to draw on the troop strength available for training. In addition, this command at the present time provides approximately 125 additional direct to Camp Butler under the Fleet Marine Force assistance program. Approximately 400 other marines are assistance camp functions which normally would be provided by Base, Civilian, or camp personnel in a Continental United States location.

(g) The personnel shartages, existing earlier in the personnel in 3d Anti-Tank Battalian, let amphibies Transer

Battalian, and 3d Medical Battalian were resulted materially upon the arrival of the September draft on I determined the arrival of the replacement draft from Continental United States after the departure of the relation draft.

2. Training

- a. The state of training of Division personnel is considered similar to last quarter's report and is given an overall rating of satisfactory. The personnel turnever and shortages continue to adversely affect training.
- b. There were as Division, Brigade, or Regimental Emeracises involving inflantly and supporting units during the resported quarter.
- c. Five major exercises including infantry battalian and artillery regiment firing exercises were conducted at the Fuji-McNair Training areas on Chinava for firing artillery, tank, and anti-tank weapons and the lack of adequate memouver room for infantry units in excess of two battalians places a premium on the continued availability of the Fuji-McNair Training area. Even with its relative preximity, shipping schedules require a flexibility in the usage requirements of the Fuji-McNair area that makes continued control of training area scheduling mandatory.
- d. The beach at Numazu, Japan is not adequate for tectical amphibious landing exercises and Kin Beach on Okinawa presents similiar limitations of non-existent maneuver room imland from the beach.
- e. Other off-island training included Naval Gunfire Exercises at Tabones and a RECONEL at Sangley Point in the Phillippines.
- f. Training facilities on Okinawa are being improved and expanded. Considerable progress has been made toward providing areas geometric training to facilitate all types of individual and unit comput training. Utilisation of the extremely rugged Northern Training Area has increased appreciably, with guerilla and survival type training being predominant.

- g. The affort BLT has enhanced the Division's capability to respond to the requirements of contingency plane. The Task Groups' prepositioning in the vicinity of areas of tension provides a spearhead force for any degree of 3d Marine Division employment. All plans now incorporate this battalion as a part of the necessary force to be committed.
- h. Operational Readiness Test Exercises (ORTEXs) continued to be conducted during the past quarter. The reaction time of units has improved and the number of discrepancies noted had decreased, demonstrating an improved readiness.
- i. Seventy-nine officers and seven hundred twenty-four enlisted men were graduated from Division Schools during the quarter in courses ranging from ABC Defense to NCO Leadership. Six infantry companies additionally completed a Division School unit intelligence course.
- j. From the standpoint of training, the Division is adequately prepared for combat operations.

3. Material.

- a. The 3d Marine Division is ready for immediate embarkation and for sustained operations. Sufficient organic equipment and materials are on hand for initial commitment. While the shortage of certain spare parts previously reported has improved, some peculiar item parts remain in short supply. This, combined with a shortage of trained maintenance personnel in lower enlisted ranks, impedes all echelons of maintenance.
 - b. Recommended changes in the M. Series T/Es continue to be submitted. Also, some atems have been authorized on a temportary basis for camp functioning in order to improve combat readiness as well as improve living conditions of the troops.
 - c. The employment of tactical vehicles for garrison support in addition to normal training exercises necessitates a high maintenance and repair rate.
- c. The 3d Service Battalion still lacks certain T/E items which curtail that organization's maintenance capability. (See consolidated report). Since the last report 3d Service Battalion has assumed supply responsibility for Class II items including all federal stock groups with the exception of Stock Group 75, uniform clothing, stationary, and blank forms.
- e. Items listed in Marine Corps Bulletin 4400 of 1 August 1960 (information on new and problem type items) are not listed in the Consolidated Report (Form3) as major deficiencies.

B. 3d Battalion, 7th Marines reports a Class "C" Category primarily due to lack of W40Al Recoilless Rifles.

STATEMENT OF THE COMMANDER

(FORM 2)

1. Personnel

- a. At the end of the quarter the Brigade had an excess of 13 Officers over Manning Level and a shortage of 391 enlisted personnel. The officer excesses were scattered over all ranks and MOS's up to and including Captains. Shortages of enlisted personnel were contend mostly around ground MOS's in the pay grades E-1/E-2.
- b. Naval personnel situation at the end of the quarter showed a shortage of two Dentists and six Dental Techicians. There was an excess of 2 Hospital Corpsmen.
- c. Overall picture of the personnel situation indicated that the Brigade was operating at 103% of the authorized officer strength and 92.8% of the authorized enlisted strength.
- d. Neither the Brigade Headquarters Company nor the Service Battalion Headquarters has sufficient personnel to establish and maintain a combat command post. This is due primarily to the lack of communication and motor transport personnel in the T/Os for these two units.

2. Training

- a. Training Readiness remains in the category " Δ " state. This quarter's training included company level exercises and a Battalion FEX for each Infantry Battalion.
- b. All units fired all organic weapons during the training in the Pohakuloa Training Area.
- c. Night Helicopter Training has been stressed and will be continued until all units are proficient in operating with helicopters at night.

d. The Brigade is prepared to embark immediately for combat operations. (not consider with remarks passe 1.6, alone)

3. Material

- a. Material readiness continues to be maintained at a high level with only minor exceptions.
- b. An overall "B" category for material readiness is assigned the Brigade as a whole however, for the following reasons:
- (1) The previously reported lack of approved Tables of Equipment for Service Company and Headquarters Company of Service Battalion continues to adversely affect the combat efficiency of these units.
- (2) As previously reported, and on a continuing basis, certain critical items of motor transport, ordnance and communications-electronics equipment are lacking or require replacement.

1. Major Deficiencies

- a. Personnel. See Form 2, paragraph 1.
- b. Training.
- (1) The lack of battalion and larger size training areas remains a training problem.
- (2) The non-availability of LCUs and LCM8s precludes the proper training of the Landing Support Company in the Hawaiian area.

c. Material

- (1) 4th Marines
- (a) Motor Transport. Pending receipt of the authorized Light Infantry Carrier M274, substitute jeeps (M38A1) and trailers continue being utilized.
- (b) Communication-Electronics. Air-ground communications equipment continues to be a problem area. The lack of testing equipment with the Service Battalion for the performance of 3d Echelon maintenance of air-ground equipment adversely effects the combat capability of this requment. Six of the authorized ten MAY Radios were evacuated for repair and modernization by commercial sources during 3d and 4th Quarter FY 1960 and have not been returned to date.
- (c) Ordnance. Six hundred and twenty six (626) bayonet knives and scabbards as previously reported being deficient have not been received to date.
- (2) 3d Battalion, 12th Marines. Major equipment shortages include:
 - 1 Test Set, engine (4910-555-4776) 1 Test Set, battery and starter (4910-590-7417)

(3) Service Battalion

(a) The combat capabilities and effeciency of both Service Company and Headquarters Company continue to be adversely affected by the lack of approved Tables of Equipment for these units.

(b) Companies comprising the Service Battalian are not in proximity to their parent unit and consequently are without the back-up support nomally avialable. In particular, this hinders the Battalian's capability to support the Brigade in ABC Defense.

2. Action taken to correct deficiencies.

- a. <u>Personnel</u>. Not applicable.
- b. Training.
- (1) Coordination with U. S. Army Hawaii is making some of the Army owned training areas on Oahu available to the Brigade more frequently.
- (2) Field problems using available LVT2 and trucks to simulate small landing craft are planned for Service Battalion elements to improve their amphibious landing capabilities. Some experence is being gained in beaching, loading and unloading LSTs during administrative moves to outer-island training areas. During scheduled training in SOCAL during 4th Quarter FY 1961 this area of training will be stressed heavily while shipping is available. Unfortunately this will be subsequent to the scheduled Brigade Landing Exercise.
- c. <u>Material</u>. (Supply Status Report, 1st Marine Brigade 21/rmk over 5213/3 of 7 October 1960 refers) Requisitons have been submitted by appropriate units for all-existing shortages.

3. Factors influencing estimated future readiness.

a. <u>Material</u>. Receipt of requisitioned items expected during 2d Quarter, Fiscal Year 1961 will rectify current material deficiencies.

1. Personnel.

a. Officers: The authorized manning level for officers is 100% of the Tables of Organization of units assigned, or 272 officers. The actual strength is 287, an overage of 15 officers. Of the total on board strength, there is an overage of 67 lieutenants, approximately 50 of which are basic 9901 undergoing on-the-job training in selected occupational fields. Shortages by rank include 2 lieutenant colonels, 8 majors, 7 captains and 34 warrant officers. The significant shortage is in major, OF 08, where a billet assignment deficiency of 6 exists.

b. Enlisted: The enlisted manning level of this command is 4194 while the actual strength is 3115, a shortage of 1097 enlisted. Rank shortages are concentrated in the E-5 and below pay grades. Major deficiencies by MOS are in occupational fields 07, 08, 13, 25, 27, 30, 33 and 35. Since submission of the last quarterly report of combat readiness this command has received the first half fiscal year manning level which is reflected in the above figures. This manning level includes the 2nd Light Antiaircraft Missile Battalion and reflects the reactivation of the three (3) cadre units in the 1st Field Artillery Group; also the additional platoon for the two 8" Howitzer Batteries. To-date only the H&S Battery of the 2d Light Antiaircraft Missile Battalion has been activated to serve as a clearing house for personnel of that battalion being ordered to school. The letter batteries will be activated during the third quarter FY 1961. The three cadre batteries and the third platoon of the two 8" Batteries are expected to be activated during the second quarter FY 1961.

c. From the personnel standpoint, all subordinate units of this command are capable of embarking immediately for combat operations, with the following exceptions:

2nd Light Antiaircraft Missile Battalion 4th 155mm Howitzer Battery (Cadre) 3rd 155mm Gun Battery (SP) (Cadre) 4th 155mm Gun Battery (SP) (Cadre)


2. Training:

- a. Individual Training: Normal individual training has been conducted within the units during the quarter. Utilization of First Marine Division and Marine Corps Base, Camp Pendleton, schools in addition to quotas for formal courses of instruction assigned by higher headquarters has aided in improving the status of individual training within the command. Participation in formal schools for the forthcoming quarter, particularly those funded by this command, will be sharply curtailed due to recently imposed budget limitations on expenditures of TAD funds. Locally a four week Basic Artillery Survey School attended by 24 Marines and a four week Basic Artillery Gunnery School for 22 Marines were conducted. Courses of instruction which resulted in the licensing of 90 drivers and 130 explosives drivers were conducted during the quarter.
- b. Basic Unit Training: Unit package training, which included live missile firing was completed at Fort Bliss, Texas, during this quarter for the 1st Light Antiaircraft Missile Battalion. Package Training for the 2nd Light Antiaircraft Missile Battalion will commence in November 1960. "B" Battery, 1st Medium Antiaircraft Missile Battalion conducted live missile firing at Marine Corps Base, Twentynine Palms, during September 1960. RSOPs and command post exercises will constitute most of the basic unit training for Antiaircraft Group Headquarters and the 1st Light Antiaircraft Missile Battalion for the forthcoming quarter. Field artillery units with the exception of cadre batteries have participated in numerous field firing exercises which have continued to improve their state of basic unit training. Unit training for "D" Company, 7th Engineer Battalion is conducted by the assignment and completion of various productive engineer tasks. Work on the landing field at Twentynine Palms by "D" Company will continue for at least the next two quarters. Projects assigned to this unit are carefully screened to insure compatibility with the unit's training requirements. Unit training for Detachment, 1st Force Service Regiment, does not apply to the Detachment 1st Force Service Regiment as a complete unit. Task organizations are formed as required.
- c. Advanced Unit Training: The 1st Field Artillery Group conducted two field firing exercises and two command post exercises during the quarter. All units from the group participated except the cadre batteries and the 4th 8" Howitzer Battery. One command post exercise and two field firing exercises are scheduled to be conducted by the 1st Field Artillery Group during the forthcoming quarter. In addition field artillery units will be participating in PHIBLEX 42-60 as indicated in paragraph 2d below.

d. Amphibious Training: Force Troops units participated in two amphibious exercises during the quarter. Project "TOPHAT" was conducted at San Nicolas Island during August 1960 and involved "C" Battery and elements of "H&S" and "E" Batteries of the 1st Medium Antiaircraft Battalion. The 1st Medium Antiaircraft Battalion (-), "D" Company 7th Engineer Battalion and elements from the Detachment, 1st Force Service Regiment participated in PHIBLEX 40-60 "LONG HAUL" on San Clemente Island. Detachment Hq Battery, 1st 8" Howitzer Battery, 1st Heavy Artillery Rocket Battery, 1st 155mm Howitzer Battery and 5th AOP (-) will participate in PHIBLEX 42-60 "PACK MULE" during the forthcoming quarter.

3. MATERIAL:

a. Material readiness remains stable. There has been some fluctuation in subordinate units material readiness but this is due in large part to extensive field operations resulting in deadlining of vehicles for repair. Shortages of major items reported by individual units are known to higher headquarters and supply echelons. There has been a slow down in delivery of certain items of HAWK equipment but these too, have been the subject of dispatches and correspondence. It is considered that the new material priority system will speed the delivery of essential items needed to remove vehicles from deadline.

- 1. Personnel: Personnel Category "B" has been specified for this command. Personnel shortages by rank and MOS do exist, however it is considered that total numbers of personnel assigned are sufficient who, through on-the-job and in retraining assignments, provide a firm personnel base, with the exception of the increased strength necessary to provide for activation of the Field Artillery Group Cadre Units and the 2d Light Antiaircraft Missile Battalion, as directed.
- a. Action Taken: Headquarters, Marine Corps, has been apprised of total personnel shortages.
- b. Estimate in column 5 is based upon known personnel input into Force Troops through 31 December 1960. Advanced orders have been received for approximately 700 graduate recruits and 400 enlisted personnel from other posts and stations so that by the end of the 2d Quarter FY 1961, sufficient total personnel will be on hand to activate all designated units at 90% Manning Level.
- 2. Training: Amphibious training during the past quarter has substantially increased the training readiness of the Antiaircraft Group Headquarters, First Medium Antiaircraft Missile Battalion and "D" Company, 7th Engineer Battalion. However, amphibious training for the remainder of Force Troops units is required before a category higher than "B" can be assessed. A majority of the key personnel have completed training to enable them to plan and conduct combat operations. The recent activation of the First and Second Light Antiaircraft Missile Battalions is the primary factor in placing them in the "C" category for training.
- a. Action Taken: All Force Troops units except the 5th Dental Company have been scheduled for amphibious operations during the next twelve (12) months. This will considerably improve the training readiness of Force Troops. Package training for the Second Light Antiaircraft Missile Battalion at Fort Bliss, Texas will commence in November 1960.

- b. Estimate in column 6 is based on the prediction of an "A" personnel readiness category by 31 December 1960, which will permit an effective unit training program culminating in the Division/Wing exercise "SHAGGY DOG".
- 3. Materiel: Materiel readiness is assigned category "B" due to shortages of equipment; equipment deadlined for lack of parts and shortages of communications equipment.
 - a. Action Taken: Requisitions for shortages have been submitted.
- b. Estimate of "unknown" for all category "B" and "C" subordinate units is based on lack of positive information on parts support and each item availability. The reduction in the FY 1961 R&E program, particularly in the communication equipment category, will probably delay even further the readiness of units.

1. Statement of the Commander

a. Personnel

(1) The imposed manning level for the first half of Fiscal Year 1961 seriously restricts the ability of this Regiment to accomplish its mission in support of a Marine Expeditionary Force as specified in the L-Series Tables of Organization. Readiness categories in this report are based upon assignment of a mission consistent with the manning level and reduced Tables of Equipment.

- (3) 21 officers were dropped during the quarter while 19 were joined. 208 enlisted personnel were dropped while 237 were joined. This Regiment is 9 officers and 315 enlisted personnel short under the new manning level. 198 enlisted personnel hold basic MOS's compared with 169 at the end of last quarter. This Regiment continues to transfer trained personnel and join basic Marines. While all basic Marines are given concentrated training in their fields and assigned primary MOS's above the basic level immediately upon becoming qualified, it appears virtually impossible to reduce by any appreciable amount, the number of basic Marines on board on any given date. In view of the 315 understrength figure and the 198 basic Marines on the rolls, this Regiment has an effective strength of trained personnel of 1135, or about 70% of the new manning level.
- (4) Many highly trained Staff NCO's are still being assigned to the Drill Instructor program. The Regiment lost 7 during this last quarter, 5 of which were highly trained Air Delivery Men (7141). 31 have been lost to this program since 1 January, 1960.
- (5) While the Staff NCO strength of this Regiment is approximately that authorized under the new manning level, we are 325 understrength in paygrades E-4-E-1.

ENCLOSURE (2)

- (6) This Regiment recommended a new manning level, 1 April 1960, of 115 officers and 1630 enlisted personnel. This strength was arrived at after long and careful deliberation and reflected the absolute minimum number of personnel felt necessary to perform the large variety of FMF and garrison tasks assigned. The manning level received 16 September 1960, making assignment for the first half of FY 61, does not coincide with MOS strength recommended. The new manning level of 96 officers includes 2 Marine Corps Exchange Officers (4130) and 1 Data Processing Officer (4002) none of which were requested or which are required under known currently assigned missions while in garrison. This resulted in a net loss of 17 officers from the old manning level and 22 officers less than was recommended. This command is presently attempting to put this new manning level in effect through distribution to battalions, but wide variations from recommendations cause considerable readjustment of thought and analysis. A variety of enlisted MOS's vary substantially, both in number and specialty, from those recommended. Those enlisted MOS's most seriously at variance with those recommended are listed below:
 - Oldl (Administrative Man) Old manning level authorized 58. Proposed was 70 including increase in rank to include E8 and E-7. Highest rank authorized by new manning level is E-6(2) to operate a Regimental Headquarters, 3 Battalion Headquarters and 12 Company Headquarters. The new manning level would authorize approximately 3 administrators for each Headquarters.
 - 0398 (1st Sgt Infantry) New manning level authorizes 10 compared with 5 previously. This seems inappropriate for a logistics organization. The new manning level also effects a reduction of 2 MOS 3098 (1st Sgt Supply Administration and Operations)
 - 1391 (Bulk Fuel Man) New manning level authorizes 160, an increase of 15 which was not recommended. This Regiment has never been able to obtain or train near the old number authorized.
 - 2645 (Central Officer, Installer-Repairman) Increased from 2 to 6. This Regiment has no central office equipment and does not repair such equipment:
 - (Reclamation and Salvage Man) New manning level decreases from 45 to 22. This MOS includes shoe and textile repair men. Under the old manning level, 20 of these personnel were furnished to the Base Materiel Battalion under the FMF Augmentation Program while 25 were a part of the General Supply and Maintenance Company, Materiel Supply and Maintenance Battalion which, as a part of its mission, provides all shoe and textile repair facilities for the 1st

Marine Division. The new manning level dictates that either the shoe and textile repair capabilities of this Regiment or the reclamation and salvage capabilities be terminated. Both cannot be operated.

- 3421 (Disbursing Man) Increased from 2 to 14. There is no known need for this MOS within this Regiment unless at full strength ready to mount out.
- 35?1 (Driver, Operator) Decreased from 109 to 99. The recommended increase was from 109 to 142, which was the minimum number of operators felt necessary to maintain to a minimum acceptable degree the large number of vehicles on hand in this Regiment. The number authorized is not adequate to perform the bare acceptable minimum of preventive maintenance.
- 4111 (Bookkeeper) Increased from 0 to 3. This MOS is not needed to perform any known mission while in garrison.
- 4131 (Exchange Man) Increased from 0 to 38. No known need exists for this MOS in this Regiment except upon mounting out.
- 9999 (Sergeant Major) Decreased from 4 to 3. Inasmuch as this billet exists in 3 Battalions and Regimental Headquarters, the reduction appears inappropriate.
- (7) The following MOS's authorized under the old manning level have been dropped from the new manning level.
 - 0311 Rifleman 5 E-4, 6 E-3 0369 Infantry Unit Leader 2 - E-5

Deletion of these infantrymen removes this Regiment's capability to provide a permanent staff of Sergeants and Corporals to the Regimental Guard. While privates of the guard can be provided on a daily basis, daily rotation of guard NCO's to provide security for a complex industrial area such as the one occupied by this Regiment is not believed to be in the best interests of the government.

- (2) The materiel capability to mount out continues to be seriously influenced by the personnel situation as existing at the present time. And, the materiel situation will further deteriorate as the effect of the new manning level T/O is felt by each subordinate battalion. This situation is caused by the fact that all items of the reduced strength tables of equipment are required to be on hand, while the manning level provides only a portion of the trained personnel required to operate and maintain the equipment, especially motor transport and engineers items. Some adjustment to the situation has been made by this command by administratively deadlining 40% of all motor transport equipment. In the event of mount out, a heavy burden of maintenance would accrue to this command in rectifying the cumulative number of minor defects which occur in vehicular equipment during a limited use status.
- (3) This Regiment is capable of embarking for combat operations in accordance with current contingency plans, providing sufficient non-organic transportation and cargo handling equipment is available for support and there is no delay in receipt of material now on earmarking requisition held at Marine Corps Supply Center, Barstow.

a. Table of organization number (provisional) 4853 revision number one authorizes 271 enlisted and 37 officers (includes 6 USN) for this unit. The current authorized manning level is 211 enlisted, 21 officers USMC and 6 officers USN. Assigned at the end of the reporting period were 184 enlisted and 29 officers (includes 6 USN). Enlisted personnel readiness based on current tables of organization strength is 68 percent. Generally, two FAC teams and two NGF spot teams are necessary for effective Air and Naval gunfire support of the battle group size unit in the assault. Capability for effective support of a division size unit is limited by lack of a second Naval Gunfire Spot Team and a second Forward Air Control Team for each Battle Group.

2. Training.

a. A high state of training readiness is maintained among all personnel on board through frequent unit field training, command post exercises with Army units and deployment for training exercises in the Far East. All personnel are sufficiently trained for immediate combat operations.

3. Material.

a. A high state of material combat readiness exists. There are no serious deficiencies effecting overall material readiness. Outstanding material requisitions are listed on enclosure (2).

1. Major deficiencies.

a. Personnel.

- (1) Authorization to form the second Naval Gunfire Spot Team and the second Forward Air Control Team in each of the Shore Fire Control Parties and Tactical Air Control Parties, and the additional personnel required to form these teams will be necessary to bring 1st ANGLICO, FMF up to it's full combat readiness.
- (2) A serious personnel shortage is anticipated during the next quarter. Thirty-five (35) enlisted personnel are due for rotation and a shortage of twenty-two (22) exists due to an increase in the manning level, with only three (3) enlisted personnel ordered to report. This indicates that the Company may be operating at a strength as low as 75% of it's manning level, until such time as replacements are received.

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QUARTERLY REPORT OF COMBAT READINESS STATEMENT OF THE COMMANDER (FORM - 2)

l. a. Personnel.

- (1) The First Composite Radio Company is authorized a manning level of one hundred per cent of T/O (10 officers, 150 enlisted USMC, and 2 enlisted USN). The present strength of the company is 10 officers and 157 enlisted USMC. One (1) enlisted USN is assigned for temporary additional duty in excess of 30 days.
- (2) Although an overage in T/O strength exists as of this report, these personnel will be lost within the next 4 months due to orders for school; termination of overseas tour; or end of enlistment. The assignment of the HML on a TAD basis to the company is not considered satisfactory. He should be assigned on a regular tour basis as are other personnel in order to preclude a change of Corpsman every 4 to 6 months. The problem of security clearance is a factor in this particular case.
- (3) Special personnel support to the 1st Marine Air Wing and 3rd Marine Division is continuing and the cost of this support is carried by this command. Approximately \$5,000.00 is spent annually for travel and TAD in maintaining two members of this command at each of the headquarters mentioned above.
- b. Training. During the quarter reported on, the company concentrated on General Military Subjects, Rifle and Pistol qualification, Advanced Operator Training (AOT) and Special Operational Training (SOT). AOT is designed to bring personnel to a peak operating level and to fulfill MOS requirements for present and next higher ranks in the career cryptologic field. SOT is designed to familiarize operational elements with specific assigned target areas in conjunction with Fleet Marine Force Pacific contingency plans. Detachment "C" (less ECM and CommSec personnel) is undergoing SOT at the National Security. Agency. Fort George G. Meade, Maryland.
- c. <u>Material</u>. The lack of authorized major equipment items continues to be the most serious deficiency in the command's combat readiness stature. As an interim measure, specific items of equipment are being repackaged in S-144 shelters and are expected to arrive during the 2nd quarter (CMC Conf msg 171432Z Aug refers).
- d. Summary. Immediate tectical support for Div/Wing echelon or lower is considered adequate. Force level support can meet minimum requirements.

1. Major Deficiencies.

a. <u>Personnel</u>. The lack of linquists (MOS 8631) is the only personnel deficiency reported during this period. Of the six authorized linquists, only three (two Russian and one Chinese) are on board. In addition to those mentioned, this command must possess a linquistic capability in areas covered by contingency plans if balanced detachments in readiness are to be maintained. A minimum of one in each language is required to conduct the extensive radio telephone intercept operator training required. At least three linquists, skilled in the particular target areas involved, are required if rapid exploitation of information is to be achieved. The lack of linquists has been offset to some degree by an extensive language training program utilizing language tapes and related training aids. The request for linquists is the subject of separate correspondence.

b. Training. The training deficiencies listed are due primarily to the lack of specialized equipment. This equipment and the operator techniques required for operation should be realized during the next two reporting quarters. Basic helicopter planning and employment completed by only one platoon of the company to date.

c. Material.

(1) The following items constitute the major material deficiency affecting combat readiness of this command.

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- 2. Statement of action taken by the Commander to rectify major deficiencies listed in paragraph 1 above.
- a. The lack of linquists (MOS 8631) has been partially alleviated by utilizing other sources on a temporary augmentation basis. Whenever possible personnel are requested on a TAD basis to augment this command in PHIBLEX'S and forward area training. Additionally, a tape library of over 500 tapes for language and related training is utilized extensively to train personnel within the company in order to meet the minimum requirements of linquistic capability.
- b. Receipt of the AN/MRD-15 equipments will correct the D/F training deficiency. Emphasis on helicopter operations will be increased to insure participation of all company units by the conclusion of 3rd quarter.
- c. The major material deficiency will be eliminated upon receipt of major equipment repackaged in Craig Helo-Lift Huts. ETA of these huts is 30 June 1961. As an interim measure to enable this command to meet its contingency requirements. CMC has authorized an allowance of a special communication system repackaged in S-144 shelters (CMC Conf mag 171432Z Aug refers). These S-144 shelters mount on 3/4 ton trucks and are expected on board next quarter. Tracer and follow-up action through normal channels on the remainder of the material shortages will continue.
- 3. Factors influencing estimated future combat readiness:
- a. Presently programmed training and the receipt of special equipment as noted above will permit this command to continue its present rate of improvement and meet contingency commitments satisfactorily.
