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



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PART IINARRATIVE SUMMARY1. INTRODUCTION

a. GENERAL. During December 1969, III Marine Amphibious Force Headquarters was located in East Danang, Quang Nam Province, Republic of Vietnam. The average personnel strength was 117,175, a decrease of 5,234 under the previous month.

b. ACTIVITIES. III Marine Amphibious Force continued to be guided by COMUSMACV Directive 10-11 dated 1 November 1968 in pursuit of its objectives for December 1969.

2. OVERALL EVALUATION

a. GENERAL. Communist activity decreased during the month, remaining light and scattered throughout I Corps Tactical Zone. Enemy KIA decreased to 2,969. US Forces continued six major named operations during December 1969. All elements of the Third Marine Division left the Republic of Vietnam and Phase Two redeployment was complete by 15 December 1969. Operation FULTON SQUARE, 1st Brigade, Fifth Mechanized Division, continued with 372 enemy KIA at the end of the year. 101st Airborne Division (AM), operation REPUBLIC SQUARE terminated on 6 December 1969 with a total of 192 enemy KIA and operation RANDOLPH GLEN commenced on 7 December 1969 with 114 enemy KIA during the month.

b. To the south, in Quang Nam Province, 1st Marine Division continued rice denial and security operations. A large number of friendly casualties were attributed to surprise firing devices. On 7 December, the 2d ROK Marine Corps Battalion, in a series of light to moderate contacts nine KMS southwest of Hoi An killed 39 enemy and captured 14 weapons. Americal Division continued four major operations with year end results as follows: FREDERICK HILL, 3,953 enemy KIA; GENEVA PARK, 1,001 enemy KIA; NANTUCKET BEACH, 194 enemy KIA; and IRON MOUNTAIN, 2,221 enemy KIA. There were two truce periods, Christmas and New Year, with 28 enemy violations recorded for Christmas and 29 violations for New Year.

c. Marine Corps small unit operations had 23 friendly KIA and 370 WIA with 978 enemy KIA. On major operations the U. S. Army received 47 KIA and 351 WIA while inflicting 592 enemy kills. The U. S. Army did not conduct any small unit operations during the month of December.

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b. EVENTS. During the month of December 1969 the following significant contacts were reported in chronological order:

At 010900H L Company, 3d Battalion, 7th Marines observed 43 enemy with packs and weapons in NVA uniforms 11 kms west of Que Son. An artillery mission was fired. Results: 15 NVA KIA.

At 011345H Reconnaissance Team ASPARAGUS observed 15 NVA collecting food two kms east of Liberty Bridge. The enemy were carrying packs and rifles. An artillery mission was called. Results: seven NVA KIA.

At 041700H Reconnaissance Team NAIL BRUSH observed nine enemy wearing black pajamas seven kms northwest of An Hoa. An artillery mission was fired resulting in six enemy KIA.

At 051355H Reconnaissance Team NAIL BRUSH observed seven enemy wearing black pajamas and carrying packs and rifles six kms north of An Hoa. An artillery mission was fired killing five enemy. Then at 1730H the team observed 40

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VC, moving southwest, also wearing black pajamas and carrying packs and rifles five kms northwest of the first sighting. Another artillery mission was fired killing 20 enemy.

At 091100H a squad patrol from H Company, 2d Battalion, 5th Marines observed five enemy hidden in two well camouflaged spider holes located in thick bamboo along a stream eight kms northeast of An Hoa. Several enemy wore blue uniforms and the rest wore black pajamas. The patrol apprehended the enemy without firing a shot, with all gear which included five AK-47's, assorted documents, medical supplies, and 3,200 piasters.

At 111237H a scout sniper from G Company, 2d Battalion, 7th Marines observed an unknown size enemy force moving west to east seven kms west-northwest of Thang Binh. The enemy lead element was carrying an unknown type weapon; the middle element carried no weapons or gear; and the 3d element had two men armed. The enemy units were well dispersed and all wore black pajamas. 1st platoon, G Company engaged the enemy with organic weapons, artillery, and air strikes. A sweep of the area revealed 35 NVA KIA (21 killed by air, seven killed by artillery, and seven killed by small arms fire) with no friendly casualties. During the 1st platoons contact, at 1252H, the 2d and 3d platoons observed 20 NVA moving west to east carrying weapons and wearing black pajamas four kms northwest of the 1st platoon. The units engaged the enemy with small arms and air strikes. Results: six NVA KIA (three killed by small arms fire and three killed by air). Both contacts broke at 1700H.

At 121430H 1st platoon from H Company, 2d Battalion, 5th Marines was taking one PW to the battalion rear and at the same time observed four enemy, wearing blue uniforms, running north 2½ kms west of Liberty Bridge. While firing small arms at the fleeing enemy, the PW made an attempt to escape and was shot. The unit swept the area and found four VC KIA. Total results: five VC KIA with no friendly casualties.

At 121837H Reconnaissance Team SIA TE CREEK observed 28 enemy wearing green utilities and carrying packs and rifles moving east on a trail 1¼ kms east of An Hoa. The team called an artillery mission resulting in 12 NVA KIA.

At 131810H an artillery forward observer with 1st Battalion, 7th Marines observed 20 to 30 NVA with individual weapons moving south on a trail, nine kms west of Que Son. The forward observer called artillery and 106RR fire. Results: six NVA KIA.

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At 131820H the SLATE CREEK Reconnaissance Team observed approximately 60 NVA wearing green uniforms 13 kms east of An Hoa, moving east on a trail. An artillery mission was fired resulting in 16 NVA KIA.

At 160945H F Company, 2d Battalion, 5th Marines, while on a company sweep, eight kms northwest of Liberty Bridge, observed one enemy running southwest. The company followed the enemy and made contact with an unknown size enemy force. Results: eight NVA KIA, 25 detainees, one individual weapon captured and miscellaneous documents/equipment captured. Then at 161030H, in the same area, F Company, 2d Battalion, 5th Marines observed five enemy on a small island approximately 50 meters away. The company moved onto the island and exchanged fire with the enemy resulting in 12 NVA KIA, three detainees, two individual weapons captured and miscellaneous documents captured with six friendly WIA. Total casualties for both contacts: 20 enemy KIA, 28 detainees and three individual weapons captured with six friendly WIA.

At 161420H H&S Company, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, while in a defensive position, observed nine enemy carrying weapons and packs 3½ kms west-southwest of Liberty Bridge. An artillery mission was fired resulting in seven VC KIA.

At 171430H H&S Company, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines observed 10 enemy running south along the Song Vu Gia River bank five kms northwest of Liberty Bridge. An artillery mission was fired resulting in five NVA KIA.

At 191440H H Company, 2d Battalion, 5th Marines, on a clear and search operation, seven kms west-northwest of Liberty Bridge, observed nine NVA in green uniforms coming out of a village. The company engaged the enemy with small arms and M-79 fire killing four NVA and capturing four. A further search of the village revealed three NVA hiding in a bunker. They refused to surrender and several M-26 grenades were thrown into the bunker, resulting in three NVA KIA and one individual weapon captured. Cumulative results: seven enemy KIA, four PW and one individual weapon captured.

At 192020H I Company, 3d Battalion, 1st Marines observed six VC moving north three kms west of hill 55. The company engaged the enemy with small arms and M-79 fire. Sweep of the area revealed five VC KIA and two packs containing miscellaneous clothing and documents.

At 201930H Reconnaissance Team PRIME CUT observed 12 black pajama-clad enemy, carrying packs and rifles, moving east seven kms south-southeast of Liberty Bridge. The team initiated an artillery mission, resulting in five enemy KIA.

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At 221910H Reconnaissance Team PRIME CUT observed 51 enemy with packs and rifles moving east on a trail seven kms south-east of Liberty Bridge. An artillery mission was fired resulting in 20 enemy KIA.

At 231410H D Company, 1st Battalion, 7th Marines observed 13, heavily armed, NVA moving east 13 kms north of Heip Duc. An artillery mission was fired resulting in 10 NVA KIA.

At 231500H an forward observer with H&S Company, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines observed 10 to 15 enemy with green uniforms, packs and rifles six kms northwest of Liberty Bridge. An artillery mission was fired resulting in nine enemy KIA.

At 231855H Reconnaissance Team PRIME CUT observed 22 enemy with weapons moving east on a trail eight kms southeast of Liberty Bridge. An artillery mission was fired resulting in 13 enemy KIA. Then at 2140H, the team observed 13 enemy moving east nine kms north of Liberty Bridge. Another artillery mission was fired resulting in seven enemy KIA.

At 232025H I Company, 3d Battalion, 1st Marines, while in an ambush position, observed 40 NVA with weapons moving west on a trail five kms west of hill 55. I Company, supported by artillery and SHADOW, exchanged fire with the enemy. Results: seven enemy KIA and one individual weapon captured with one USMC WIA.

At 242045H a squad from I Company, 3d Battalion, 1st Marines, while in a night ambush position, observed 60 VC, some with weapons, moving east nine kms north of Liberty Bridge. The enemy initiated contact with small arms fire and the squad returned small arms and M-79 fire. L Company, 3d Battalion, 1st Marines, adjacent to the squad, supported by fire. Artillery and air strikes were used on possible escape routes. The contact was broken at approximately 2110H and a sweep was made. Results: 31 VC KIA and three detainees with one USMC WIA. A continuation of the sweep by I Company, 3d Battalion, 1st Marines revealed an additional 10 VC KIA and seven individual weapons captured. Cumulative totals for the contact are 41 VC KIA, three detainees, and seven individual weapons captured with one USMC WIA.

At 252240H a reinforced squad from I Company, 3d Battalion, 5th Marines, while in a night ambush position five kms north-northeast of An Hoa, observed three sampans moving east across the Song Tho River carrying 15 black pajama-clad VC. The squad fired four 106mm RR beehive rounds killing eight VC. Five were killed by two direct hits and three while swimming. One sampan escaped to the east.

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At 261130H a platoon from I Company, 3d Battalion, 5th Marines, while in an ambush position, observed five sampans crossing the Tinh Yen River 2.5 kms north of An Hoa. Each sampan carried two enemy. Two 106mm RR beehive rounds and 60mm mortar were fired, resulting in six NVA KIA. Two sampans escaped down river.

At 300630H a squad from B Company, 1st Battalion, 7th Marines exchanged small arms fire with an unknown size enemy force three kms southwest of Que Son. A sweep of the area revealed five NVA KIA, four NVA packs and miscellaneous supplies with no friendly casualties.

At 301745H a forward observer from I Battery, 3d Battalion, 11th Marines observed 10 enemy on a trail 10 kms west-northwest of Que Son. An artillery mission was fired resulting in eight enemy KIA.

At 301810H Reconnaissance Team DURHAM 119 observed 50 enemy crossing the Chiem Son River, moving north seven kms east-southeast of Liberty Bridge. The enemy had packs, rifles and were wearing gray and green uniforms. An artillery mission was fired resulting in 22 NVA KIA and one secondary explosion.

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SECRET5. Intelligence

a. General Enemy Situation. Enemy initiated activity continued to be low in intensity demonstrating a general decrease in the indicators from last months figures. Enemy initiated ground incidents showed a decrease from November's 855 to 737 while the number of enemy killed in action was 3,271, a drop of 307 from last months total. The downward trend continued with Hoi Chanhs down 289 to a new total of 524 while the number of incoming rounds decreased, dropping from 1,798 to 1,112.

VC/VCI counterintelligence related activities reflected an intensification of propoganda and proselyting tactics in preparation for the "people's general offensive and uprising phase" of the Winter-Spring campaign, while long range plans for a protracted struggle continues. Terrorist activities continued at a low level and consisted primarily of civilian death and injuries resulting from indiscriminate enemy placement of mines and booby traps.

Enemy activity in QUANG TRI Province during the month was concentrated mainly near the DMZ where NVA units continued to make their presence known in numerous small actions. A significant action occurred on the 5th north-east of GIO LINH, when elements of the 3/1st ARVN contacted an estimated NVA company. In the action that continued most of the day, the ARVN's accounted for 35 enemy killed. The tempo increased as the month came to a end. On the 28th an element of the 1/77 Cavalry received 11x140mm rockets six kilometers south southeast of CON THIEN (YD 135645) resulting in light friendly casualties, then on the 31st, a platoon from A/1-61st was the target of a sapper attack three kilometers southwest of CUA VIET (YD 307682). Three PBR's, gunships and a reaction platoon were committed resulting in 16 enemy killed, probably from the 126th Naval Sapper Regiment.

Overt enemy action was again almost non-existent in THUA THIEN Province, a trend that has lasted through much of the fall. To the west, along the Laotian Border, surveillance efforts have continued to record infiltration into MRTTH from Base Area 611 and friendly aircraft in the vicinity have reported receiving air bursts, further confirmation of extensive enemy preparations to defend what is probably planned as a major infiltration route into the Republic of VIETNAM.

Enemy activity in QUANG NAM Province for the month began at a slow pace but gradually increased as large groups of the enemy were sighted moving generally from west to east. As the movements increased the number of contacts rose. A sharp action occurred on the 24th when a squad of 1/3/1 Marines received fire from an enemy force, nine kilometers north of LIBERTY BRIDGE (AT 938622). In the ensuing fire fight, with an adjacent company of the 3/1 supporting by fire, and artillery and airstrikes blocking possible escape routes, 41 of the enemy were killed with minor friendly casualties.

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Activity in QUANG TIN and QUANG NGAI Provinces was very light consisting of small unit contacts and harassing mortar and small arms fire on CAP, RF and PF positions.

c. Enemy Order of Battle. Confirmed forces operating in ICTZ as of 31 December 1969.

(1) QUANG TRI (P). Confirmed units in QUANG TRI Province include only those considered to operate south of the DMZ. Major units were regimental size 7th Front, the 246th NVA Regiment and the 2d Battalion, 84th Artillery Regiment. Additionally, a battalion of the 27th NVA Regiment and elements of the 31st NVA Regiment operated in the province. The total enemy strength in QUANG TRI Province was 3,455.

(2) THUA THIEN (P). Confirmed units in THUA THIEN Province included the 4th and 5th NVA Regiments, along with elements of the 6th NVA Regiment, The K32, K34 and K35 Artillery Battalions subordinate to the TRI-THIEN-HUE Military Region, also operated with the infantry regiments within the province. Additionally, four local force companies and one independent local force battalion operated in THUA THIEN Province. The total enemy strength in the province was 3,350.

(3) QUANG NAM (P). Enemy forces in QUANG NAM Province consisted of front line battalions and support units, the 31st, 36th, 90th and 141st NVA Regiments, and thirteen independent battalions. The independent battalions are the 1st Recon Battalion, 573d, 575th and 577th NVA Rocket Battalions, the 12th, 13th, 14th and 15th NVA Infantry Battalions, the 3d, T87, T89, HAI VAN Sapper/Sapper, and the 420th NVA Sapper Battalions, the 42d Recon Battalion and four local force companies. The total enemy strength for the province was 3,200.

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(4) QUANG TIN (P). The 2d NVA Division Headquarters and support units, the 1st VC and 3d NVA (AKA 31st) Regiments of the 2d NVA Division, six independent battalions which include the 70th and 72d LF Infantry Battalions, the 74th LF Heavy Weapons Battalion, the 78th LF Artillery Battalion, the 409th and 76th Sapper Battalions, and six local force companies were located in the province. The total enemy strength in QUANG TIN Province was 5,665.

(5) QUANG NGAI (P). The 21st NVA Regiment of the 2d NVA Division, 22d NVA Regiment of the 3d NVA Division, six independent battalions which include the 38th LF, 48th LF and 120th MF Infantry Battalions, the 9th and 406th Sapper Battalions, and the 107th Artillery Battalion, and 20 local force companies were located in the province. The total enemy strength in QUANG NGAI Province was 4,295.

d. Counterintelligence

(1) Counterintelligence Monthly Overview. VC/VCI counterintelligence related activities during December focused primarily on efforts to solicit/coerce physical, material and political support from the populace in preparation for what the enemy was calling the "people's general offensive and uprising phase" to be conducted in conjunction with a planned large scale military offensive during the Winter-Spring Campaign.

An increase in both civilian and military proselyting and associated propaganda activities was evident, particularly during the latter part of the period.

Expected high points of brief intensified enemy military activity, as indicated by various agent, PW and rallier reports, in conjunction with numerous anniversaries/dates of enemy significance in December, failed to materialize.

Despite VC/VCI emphasis on preparation for a people's offensive and uprising in conjunction with a planned large scale military offensive, long range plans and activities for a protracted struggle continued. Of significance was an enemy document captured in southern I Corps on 12 December 1969, pertaining to the study of an addendum to COSVN's Resolutions (see paragraph 2). The document reflected on attempts to obviate the significant threat posed by further "Vietnamization" of the war through a large scale offensive and indicated that a cease fire would be accepted only when the (NVA/SVN/VC) are sure to win in our political competition. The document stated that, among the preconditions noted were, when the Americans withdraw their troops from RVA, a coalition government is formed and the (NVA/SVN/VC) are stronger than the enemy (GVR) in various aspects and the (NVA/SVN/VC) reference to the degree of political strength felt necessary.

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to fulfill communist goals in RVN). In the event a planned large scale offensive failed to propagate those preconditions, the enemy then planned to pursue a protracted struggle.

(2) Propaganda and Subversion. VC/VCI propaganda and subversive efforts were focused primarily on counterpacification, "gaining the people", and combatting further "Vietnamization" of the war through the concerted use of civil and military proselyting tactics.

Propaganda efforts to exploit popular frustration generated by the war and gain the control and/or support of greater numbers of the population, continued to fabricate and/or distort the facts concerning US troop withdrawals, anti-war activities in the US, US racial bias and conflicts, US goals in Vietnam, GVN economic and pacification measures, defoliation, and various war related grievances and damages.

Selected enemy cadre, soldiers and children, continued to be sent to North VIETNAM for training and eventual return to key posts and various communist positions of leadership in South VIETNAM.

(3) Terrorism. Terrorist activity during the period continued at a relatively low level and consisted primarily of civilian deaths and injuries resulting from indiscriminate enemy placement of mines and booby traps and disregard for the presence or close proximity of civilians during attacks by fire. A moderate increase in terrorism was evidenced late in the period. Selective assassination and attempted terrorist intimidation of village and hamlet level GVN officials, security and pacification personnel, and active GVN supporters continued. Numerous captured documents and intelligence reports indicated that at least one of the main objectives of the planned Winter-Spring Offensive would be widespread assassinations, abduction and thought reform training of "tyrants" (GVN officials) and reactionaries (GVN supporters and sympathizers). Thus an intensification of terrorist activities, particularly selected assassination and kidnapping was expected from January through Tet 1970.

(4) Sabotage. Enemy sabotage and/or sabotage related activities diminished from the relatively low level of the previous month to an extremely low level during December consisting of the damage/destruction of two road culverts in QUANG TRI Province, and electric utility pole in THUA THIEN Province, and a bunker vicinity of the CAM LE BRIDGE (BT 014718), QUANG NAM Province in which one Marine was killed and three wounded. Three Vietnamese boys, ages approximately 13-14 were chased away from the bunker approximately 15 minutes prior to an explosion.

(5) Espionage. No reports of confirmed enemy espionage activities were received during December and is considered a failure to detect such activity rather than the absence thereof.

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SECRET6. LOGISTICS

a. General. Operations continued through December in ICTZ with no major changes in logistic posture. There were no named operations in December. Logistic support was provided to operating forces by helicopters, truck convoys and tracked vehicles. Intermittent inclement weather hampered small boat coastal and harbor off-load operations throughout the month. As a result resupply of units in NICTZ was slowed somewhat and ammo off-load was suspended for several days due to harbor swells. Enemy action had little effect on overall logistic support in ICTZ, with the exception of 26 December when enemy ground fire took its toll of one C7A aircraft at Tien Phuoc.

b. G-4

(1) Highlights of G-4 action during December were:

(a) From 3 to 5 December, Major H.J. MCCANN, Assistant G-4 Plans Officer, attended the FMFPac Rebuild Conference at Okinawa.

(b) From 2 to 5 December, Colonel W.F. SIMLIK, Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4, attended the FMFPac Logistic Conference and the executive portion of the FMFPac Rebuild Conference. Both conferences were held on Okinawa.

(c) On 17 December, P.W. MANTYLA, USA, Assistant G-4 Operations Officer, attended the Contractor Property Allocation Conference at MACV. This conference was held with regard to future real estate planning.

(d) On 17 December, the monsoon requirements for 1970-71 were established. Items of monsoon equipment are plastic sheeting, lightweight rainsuits, sleeping shirts, waterproof pistol covers, fighting hole covers and rainsuit repair kits.

(e) On 21 December, Lieutenant Colonel K.L. ROBINSON, G-4 Plans Officer, attended a Planning Conference at USAFV. This conference was held to prepare the Facilities Annex of MACV 186 Plan.

(f) On 30 December, a study of ICTZ airfields was completed. This evaluation was aimed at reducing the number of airfields for which the U.S. is responsible; establishing priorities for allocating resources; and defining specific requirements and responsibilities of airfield operations.

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(g) In December, a program was instituted to supervise disposal procedures at sanitary fills. This is aimed at keeping unauthorized materials from being dumped.

(1) Transportation Summary

(a) Air Operation Summary. Airlifts proceeded in a routine manner during December. Common Service Passenger totals decreased by 8099, from 70063 in November to 61964 in December. Cargo decreased 76.2 S/T's, from 9487.5 S/T in November to 9411.3 S/T in December. C7A passengers also decreased by 721, from 3290 in November to 2569 in December. Cargo increased by 111.7 S/T, from 993.8 S/T in November to 11055 S/T in December. Marine fixed wing cargo decreased 162.6 S/T, from 700.0 S/T in November to 537.4 in December. Passengers also decreased with a drop of 1228, from 7349 in November to 6121 in December. Marine helicopter passenger lifts (OH-23) increased by 5401, from 31612 in November to 37013 in December. Cargo decreased by 83.7

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S/T, from 3489.0 S/T in November to 3405.3 S/T in December. There was one practice emergency resupply (airdrop) flown on common service airlift (CSAS), and two emergency resupply (airdrop) flown by First Marine Aircraft Wing (1st MAW). There were two combat essential airlifts flown by CSAS.

(b) Surface Operation Summary. Enemy activity had little effect on the movement of cargo by surface means in ICTZ. During the month of December the seasonal monsoon flow was accompanied by the usual conditions in ICTZ restricting surface cargo operations for 12 days of the month. Over 8850 S/T's of cargo was retrograded by surface means from ICTZ port facilities to Danang. 16972 S/T's of retrograde was shipped out of country. Input into NICTZ totaled 30265 S/T, an increase of 9885 S/T over November. Input into Chu Lai was 33789 S/T while Sa Huynh received 1074 S/T. Danang received a total of 142295 S/T at all pier and ramp facilities which represents an increase of 6071 S/T over November. Total cargo input into ICTZ by surface means was 2074423 S/T, an overall increase from November. Over 700 S/T of grade III CL V was seadumped, leaving about 850 S/T remaining to be seadumped.

(c) Land Operations Summary. During the month of December, there were 83 resupply convoys carrying a total of 15,564 S/T and 18 retrograde convoys carrying a total of 2,189 S/T's.

(3) Road and Bridge Resume

- (a) Serious enemy LOC interdictions were non-existent during December. Only a few culverts sustained damage.

(4) Vietnamese National Railroad

There were no enemy interdictions on the railroad between Danang and Hue. The My Chanh Bridge is being restored by the VNRS and is now 25% complete. Hue to Dong Ha rail restoration has been hampered by lack of equipment, rain and by the badly deteriorated condition of the rail bed. 13.5 kilometers of track have now been restored.

h. Ordnance

(1) During December a representative from MACV, J42, reevaluated the ammunition storage capacity of ASP #1, Danang.

(2) A meeting was held at the Force Ordnance Office on 28 December 1969 to coordinate and discuss agenda items for the Semi-Annual FMFPac Ordnance Conference scheduled during February 1970. Representatives from the First Marine Division, Force Logistics Command, First Marine Aircraft Wing, and III Marine Amphibious Force Ordnance Office were present.

i. Supply

(1) The 16th periodic FMFPAC Logistic Conference was



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held on Okinawa during the period 1-5 Dec 1969. All major Marine commands in the Western Pacific were represented by principal supply/logistics staff officers and by commanders of major service support organizations. Headquarters, III MAF was represented by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4 and the Assistant Force Supply Officer. The purpose of this conference was to discuss logistics matters pertaining to WESTPAC forces. Recommended actions were developed and published.

(2) On 26 Dec 69 the Assistant Force Supply Officer attended a conference held at COMUSMACV, Saigon. The topic of discussion was a request by the Defense Supply Agency (DSA) for assistance in adjusting forecasts for in-country requirements for DSA managed items in order to preclude uniform across the board reductions in procurement by the DSA. The DSA requested factors representing the expected relationship of future demand to past demand in broad categories of supplies or commodities as well as individual forecasts of demands to be placed upon the DSA for selected high dollar value items. It was requested that the item forecasts be for an 18 month period, by quarter, commencing 1 April 70.

(3) A liaison visit was made to various units in the northern ICTZ to assure availability of U.S. Army logistical support to Marine units pending finalization of an Inter-service Support Agreement. Marine units were queried as to the adequacy of supply support in all classes of supply. Elements of the U.S. Army 26th General Support Group were then visited to verify sources of support and identify key individuals. Overall support provided by the Army was found to be very good. Future liaison visits are planned on a monthly basis to include supply and maintenance representatives from the Force Logistic Command.

J. Medical

(1) The total average patient load for 1st Medical Battalion and 1st Hospital Company was 200 with a total of 854 admitted and 268 patients evacuated out of country. 290 pints of whole blood were expended to use.

c. Civic Action Projects. The following are highlights of significant civic action projects conducted during the month of December 1969.

(1) Quang Tri Province, 1st Infantry Brigade, 5th Infantry Division (Mech) reports:

The repair of a bus station in Gio Son Village was completed this month. The building is located beside QL 1, the life line through Quang Tri Province terminating in Gio Linh district. The station has become a focal point for the area, a source of news, commerce point and a place for informal meetings. Capitalizing on this the district chief has allocated space to the Vietnamese Information Service and placed cadre there to provide information and news to the people.

1,110 ducklings were purchased with funds provided by the Brigade and the Chieu Hoi advisor. The ducklings were presented to the families of ralliers in an attempt to restore their agrarian livelihood. Three months ago a similar distribution was made of 1,010 ducklings. Over 70% of these are still alive

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and maturing well.

Construction projects underway include two new schools and a library for Hai Lang High School.

(2) Thua Thien Province, 101st Airborne Division reports:

The Division completed construction of two classrooms. Five school repair projects are underway.

(3) Quang Nam Province

The Phieu Hiep village nurse has been receiving on the job training in the 7th Marines Regimental Aid Station. The result is improved quality of medical care in the village.

Force Logistics Command reports that the completion of the Village Self Defense Headquarters compound in Nam O is a particularly significant event. It provides for the first time a relatively secure headquarters area for the administration of these type forces. It also provides a central billeting area for the reaction forces for the village. This project was a success because of the mutual involvement. The people provided the money to purchase the land and furnished the labor to construct the building and three bunkers. The civic action team furnished the materials. The people realized the importance of this project when Province officials came to the opening ceremonies.

e. Narrative Summary(1) General

(a) PsyOp activities in ICTZ were hampered during December by inclement weather, especially during the first half of the month.

(b) The III MAF monthly PsyOp Conference was held at Flight "A", 9th SOS on 8 December 1969. Each subordinate command presented a summary of recent PsyOp activity. The summaries were reviewed to determine problems encountered, the effectiveness of the various campaigns, themes, media and technique, and lessons learned.

(c) The Force PsyOp Officer attended the MACV POLWAR/PsyOp Conference at MACV Headquarters on 17 December.

(d) The III MAF Monthly PsyOp Orientation course for newly assigned PsyOp/S-5 Officers was conducted at 7th PsyOp Bn on 30 December 1969. Twelve officers attended.

(e) The three Officer committee, appointed in November to study operational PsyOp procedures in ICTZ, submitted its study to the Force PsyOp Officer on 30 December 1969.

(f) The 101st Airborne Division (airmobile) reported that its second aerial loudspeaker system became operational during the last week of December. The 1st Infantry Brigade, 5th Infantry Division (Mech) reported delivery of PsyOp messages from a 500 watt speaker system in a UH-1. Missions are flown nightly in conjunction with an aerial surveillance system. The First Coastal Zone Advisor, Naval Advisory Group made its initial use of night aerial broadcasting during the third week of December.

(g) The 101st Airborne Division (airmobile) cordons used Cultural Drama, Armed Propaganda, Audio Visual and Loudspeaker teams in processing 5000 villagers during 11-17 December. 72 persons were detained:

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11 VC; 40 VCS; 20 "Draft Dodgers; and 1 deserter. Organic Helicopters delivered leaflets on 73 targets on 13 Dec. Seven Quick Response Leaflets were developed during the week of 11-17 December.

(2) Program Evaluation and Results

(a) Chieu Hoi

1. The 785 Hoi Chanh who rallied during December was second only to the November record of 813.

2 Five VC rallied with their families to the Americal Division in Hau Duc District on 1 December. Reading PsyOp Leaflets and hearing Aerial Broadcasts were cited as inducing these Hoi Chanh to rally.

3 The 101st Airborne Division (airmobile) exploited three Hoi Chanh who rallied during the 4-10 December period by using taped broadcasts and quick response leaflets containing their pictures and handwritten statements. Tape broadcasts were played and leaflets directed into locations of their former units. A Hoi Chanh who rallied to the 101st during the period 25-31 December gave two reasons: (1) lack of food and (2) a tape rally-appeal made by a former comrade. The Hoi Chanh made a live aerial broadcast to his former comrades approximately four hours after he had rallied.

(b) Pro - GVN

1 All commands emphasized Pro GVN messages by APT, CDT, HB and HE teams, leaflet drops and aerial broadcasts (including Earlyword) to support operations during December.

2 During December the 1st Marine Division experimented with new techniques to diversify their PsyOp program and reach larger audiences. The first new procedure involved operations in which the division PsyOp resources were reinforced by teams from two companies of the 10th (ARVN) PolWar Bn to conduct loudspeaker broadcast and audio-visual presentations. Additionally, the division increased the proportion of the PsyOp effort devoted to face-to-face communications by conduct of loudspeaker broadcast in populated areas in connection with support for GVN, and by emphasis on movie presentations in HES rated "C" and "D" villages during evening hours when day workers and young people can attend. The main objective of these innovations is to increase Vietnamese participation in PsyOp, increase awareness and discussion of GVN progress and reach some important new audiences. The indications are that each of the techniques have merit and will be continued.

(c) Anti - NVA/VC

1 XXIV Corps units concluded the 90 day "High Price of Rice" campaign on 31 December. The momentum of the Anti-NVA/VC rice denial campaign will be revived for the spring harvest.

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2 The 101st Airborne Division reported efforts to exploit dissension between VC and NVA units in the Division TAOR. The 1st Marine Division developed propaganda to exploit the specific units involved in their TAOR.

3 The Americal Division used organic aircraft to deliver 150,000 leaflets on the dangers to NVA infiltrators on 8 December. The 101st Airborne Division conducted an Anti-NVA CH-47 leaflet drop over suspected NVA locations on 20 December. The leaflets emphasized harsh living conditions, lack of food and medicine, and promised good treatment for PW.

4 The Joint Propaganda Development Center developed Pro-GVN material to "mimic" the communist fondness for citing political and military teaching points in groups of three.

(d) Voluntary Informant Program

1 The 1st Marine Division reported 7,320 \$VN paid for six incidents resulting in 1X105mm rd, 4X60mm rds, 21XM-79 Rds, 6XM-26 Grenades, 1 Compass, 4 Booby traps and assorted miscellaneous ammunition. The 5th Special Forces Group reported 2,000 \$VN paid for information on a medical cache.

2 The 1st Marine Division is planning an intensive campaign to encourage children to report mines and booby traps in the Division TAOR. The theme is "Mines have no Friends." The coordinated combined campaign (Operation Save-A-Leg) will begin in early January 1970.

(3) PsyOp Intelligence

During the month of December the prominent enemy propaganda themes were:

(a) Demand a coalition government be formed with the PRG and the demise of the THIEU - KY puppet government; prepare for a long political struggle.

(b) Americans massacre civilians, kill innocent people, cause prices to become excessively high, and destroy crops and forests by defoliation.

(c) Rise up against the GVN tax increase and seek reconciliation for peace.

(d) "Afro-Americans", refuse to participate in the war; youths of Vietnam, do something to welcome and support the anti-war demonstrations to the American youths.

(e) As a result of successive defeats the U.S. is withdrawing its troops; all American soldiers will soon leave SVN and a coalition government will be formed with the NLF/PRG.

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(f) Vietnamization of the war is a result of worldwide anti-war movements; the U.S. will slowly withdraw from SVN while implementing their plan for de-Americanization of the war.

(g) Vietnamization of the war is President Nixon's way of prolonging the war.

ISO sections in III MAF commands produced 1,329 home town radio interviews on individual Marines and forwarded those tapes directly to the Fleet Home Town News Center for processing and distribution. e. OPERATIONS/ESCORT. The Operations/Escort unit continued to provide service to newsmen throughout the reporting period. Escorts were provided or arrangements were made to cover major I Corps operations---Frederickhill, Geneva Park

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and Iron Mountain, as well as many small unit operations and Pacification/CAP activities located within I Corps Tactical Zone. In addition, personnel of the Operations/ Escort unit accompanied major network and wireservice personnel to the 3d Marine Division Headquarters to cover redeployment of the division. Newsmen were also provided transportation and escort to Cua Viet to cover the release of ten Vorth Vietnamese fishermen who were picked up at sea in August. Transportation for newsmen to My Lai in Quang Ngai Province for coverage of the alleged incident there was provided this last month.
