

1. GENERAL ENEMY SITUATION. There was a wide variance in the fluctuation of indicators of enemy activity during the week. Enemy initiated incidents increased slightly, up 14 for a total of 221. There was a sharp increase in incoming enemy ordnance, 511 rounds were recorded, 306 more than last week. The number of enemy KIA's declined with 782 reported. This is a decrease of 231. The number of PW's also decreased, 39 were captured (seven NVA/32 VC). This is 59 fewer than the number taken last week. An increase in the number of Hoi Chanh's was reported, there were 28 more who rallied for a total of 110.

There was no significant counterintelligence related VC/VCI activity recorded during the reporting period.

a. QUANG TRI (P). Attacks by fire increased in QUANG TRI Province during the reporting period with the heaviest attacks occurring in the northern sector of the province just below the DMZ. There were also several scattered friendly initiated contacts recorded during the week.

On 22 February, 3/1st ARVN, guided by a prisoner, raided an enemy position 17 and one-half kilometers south of QUANG TRI (YD 355355). The raid resulted in 22 enemy killed, 17 FWC, three CSWC, 135 rounds of B-40, 50 assorted grenades, 12 claymores, 10,000 rounds of AK ammo, 220 pounds of rice and assorted foodstuffs and documents. There were no friendly casualties. The documents identified the position as the "Light" CP of the 7th Front.

On the 22d, a recon team from the 75th Infantry Rangers made contact with possible elements of the 246th NVA Regiment nine and one-half kilometers west of the ROCKPILE (XD 883557); there were six enemy killed.

There were several rocket firings on 24 February. At A-2, located one and one-half kilometers north of GIO LINH (YD 214742), the CP of 3/3 ARVN, received one 140mm rocket, several hours later five 140mm rockets impacted in the same location. There were no casualties or damage from

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either incident. Also on the 24th, A-4, 10 kilometers north of CAM LO, received six 122mm rockets, all landing inside the perimeter. There were negative casualties and moderate damage to two vehicles. A single round, thought to have been a 122mm rocket impacted at C-2, five kilometers north of CAM LO (YD 135645) causing no casualties or damage.

The harassing attacks by fire continued on the 25th, as FSB ANHE 14 kilometers west southwest of QUANG TRI (YD 290402) was hit by six 122mm rockets. Forty 82mm mortar rounds impacted on 3/2 ARVN, eight kilometers north northwest of the ROCKPILE (XD 950636), and eight 122mm rockets were fired at 3/1st ARVN seven kilometers southeast of BA LONG (YD 224384). None of these attacks caused any casualties or damage.

On 26 February, 3/2 ARVN engaged an unknown sized enemy force five and one-half kilometers north northwest of the ROCKPILE (XD 960615). During the contact, the ARVN also received an unknown number of 82mm mortar rounds resulting in light friendly casualties. There were two attacks by fire on the 27th. Third Company, 5/2 ARVN on a reconnaissance mission northwest of GIO LINH received 100x60mm mortar rounds, possibly from elements of the 270th NVA Regiment, resulting in negative casualties or damage. Then, 2d Company, 3/2d ARVN contacted an unknown sized enemy force, possibly elements of the 246th NVA Regiment, six and one-half kilometers north northwest of the ROCKPILE (XD 944610). In addition to SAF and AWF, the unit was hit by 110x82mm mortar rounds causing light friendly casualties. There was an additional incident on the 28th, as 3/3d ARVN on a search operation five kilometers northeast of GIO LINH (YD 240770) was hit by 20x82mm mortar rounds resulting in one ARVN wounded. The 3/2 ARVN in a night defensive position six kilometers north northwest of the ROCKPILE (XD 953613), was attacked by an unknown sized enemy force, probably elements of the 246th NVA Regiment. There were five enemy killed, and light friendly casualties.

b. THUA THIEN (P). There was very little activity of any sort to report in THUA THIEN Province during the reporting period. One enemy was killed in a brief contact on the 23d, when 4/3d ARVN conducting a search and clear mission 12 kilometers south of HUE (YD 665146) engaged an unknown size enemy force. On the 26th, a platoon from C Company 1st/501st Infantry 32 kilometers south of HUE (YC 740913) contacted an unknown sized enemy force. There were light U.S. casualties while enemy losses were unknown. On the 27th B-2/501st, 21 kilometers south of HUE (YD 533075) received 10x60mm mortar rounds, with negligible friendly casualties recorded. Also on the 27th, PF Platoon #87 11 kilometers east southeast of HUE captured three VC with weapons discovered hiding in a tunnel.

c. QUANG NAM (P). Enemy initiated activity in QUANG NAM Province decreased slightly during the reporting period. Action was characterized by meeting engagements and reconnaissance team sightings which resulted in fire missions called in on groups of the enemy observed moving throughout the lowlands.

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Early on 22 February, a team from the 1st Recon Battalion observed 40 enemy moving east on a trail eight and one-half kilometers southeast of LIBERTY BRIDGE (AT 992480). The team called a fire mission resulting in eight enemy killed. Another team observed 10 enemy later in the day moving west, three kilometers east southeast of LIBERTY BRIDGE (AT 966-522), the resulting fire mission killed seven enemy. A recon team on HILL 425 observed 150 enemy moving east seven and one-half kilometers southeast of LIBERTY BRIDGE (AT 985464) on the evening of the 22d. Artillery and airstrikes accounted for 10 KIA, possibly from the 36th NVA Regiment.

On the 23d, four enemy were killed when RF Company 791 ambushed an unknown sized enemy force three kilometers southwest of HILL 55 (AT 950-600), there were no friendly casualties. Then 3/51st ARVN, while conducting a search, made contact with an unknown sized enemy force four kilometers west southwest of LIBERTY BRIDGE. The ARVN, with Marine artillery support, killed 16 of the enemy.

A team from the 1st Recon Battalion discovered an enemy base camp 11 and one-half kilometers southwest of AN HOA (TC 209358). The camp, possibly belonging to the 90th NVA Regiment, consisted of 12 huts and several animal pens. A search of the huts disclosed a total of 1,500 pounds of rice, 1,100 pounds of wheat and 1,000 pounds of corn, the huts and the food were destroyed.

On 24 February, 3/51st ARVN contacted an enemy force, possibly local guerrillas, four and one-half kilometers north of AN HOA (AT 846496), resulting in seven enemy killed and no friendly casualties. A forward observer in a 3/5 Marines defensive position, called a fire mission on a group of seven enemy vicinity (AT 858554) seven kilometers west northwest of LIBERTY BRIDGE, killing five. Also on the 24th, 3/51st ARVN on a search, found 2,200 pounds of rice four kilometers west of LIBERTY BRIDGE vicinity (AT 884524). I/3/7 on a combat patrol eight kilometers northwest of THANG BINH (BT 101458) also discovered a cache containing 1,000 pounds of rice, two individual weapons and a small amount of other material.

During the night of the 24th, elements of the 37th Ranger Battalion received 14x60mm mortar rounds 12 kilometers south southeast of HOI AN (BT 189451). All rounds landed outside the night defensive position resulting in negative casualties or damage.

On the 25th, a squad patrol from B/1/5 Marines engaged seven enemy four and one-half kilometers northwest of LIBERTY BRIDGE. Six of the enemy were killed and one was captured, they were possibly from the Q83 Armed Unit. Then, 3/51st ARVN contacted elements possibly from the 90th NVA Regiment, five kilometers north of AN HOA (AT 852501) killing five and capturing five individual weapons and one chicom radio. A recon

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team engaged two enemy 20 kilometers west northwest of NAM O Bridge (ZC 160797) with small arms killing one and wounding the other. While tracking the wounded enemy, the team found 100x82mm mortar rounds, three cases of fuzes and one case AK-47 ammunition. The team also engaged an additional eight enemy, killing one, and then called in an air strike which caused numerous secondary explosions. Later in the day, an FC with B/1/26 called a fire mission on 23 enemy moving east on a trail 13 kilometers northwest of HILL 55 (AT 874706) killing five. Another 10 were killed by artillery 11 kilometers northwest of CUE SON (AT 928369). At 2200, a squad from C/1/26 in an ambush observed 30-40 enemy moving southeast vicinity (AT 933717) four and one-half kilometers west southwest of HILL 327. The enemy were engaged with small arms resulting in 11 enemy killed and no friendly casualties.

On the 26th, 3/51st ARVN ambushed an unknown sized enemy force five and one-half kilometers north of AN HOA killing five and capturing several individual weapons.

At 1635 on 27 February, B Company 1/26 OP on HILL 270 observed 45-50 enemy in green uniforms with packs and weapons 13 kilometers southeast of the DANANG Airfield (AT 876707). A fire mission was called resulting in 21 enemy killed. Later a recon team on HILL 250 observed 62 enemy in uniform with packs and weapons 12 kilometers west of LIBERTY BRIDGE (AT-815532). The resulting fire mission killed 17.

d. QUANG TIN (P). There was sporadic enemy action in QUANG TIN Province during the week, characterized by meeting engagements, and the discovery and subsequent destruction of two enemy hospital facilities.

On 22 February, BF Company 928 contacted an estimated platoon, possibly from the 1st VC Regiment, seven and one-half kilometers west southwest of TAM KY (BT 240200), resulting in five enemy killed and no friendly casualties. The 3/5th ARVN contacted elements, possibly of the GK 38 Medical Battalion, 2d NVA Division, 16 kilometers southwest of TIEN PHUOC CIDG Camp (AT 955076). Five enemy were killed, and a 200 bed aid station five huts and miscellaneous medical supplies were destroyed.

D-1/46th at Fire Support Base MARYANNE, 21 kilometers southwest of TIEN PHUOC (AS 962994) received an attack by fire on the 22d, consisting of 15-25 rounds of 60 and 82mm mortar fire, and undetermined number of 57mm recoilless rifle rounds and small arms fire from possible elements of the GK 33 Mortar Battalion, 2d NVA Division. There were light friendly casualties.

Also on the 22d, elements of B-3/21st Infantry and B-1/1st Cavalry contacted possible elements of the 3d NVA Regiment seven kilometers southeast of CUE SON, (BT 096313). The day long contact resulted in 23 enemy killed and light friendly casualties.

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On the 23d, 4/5 ARVN contacted an unknown sized enemy force 18 kilometers south southwest of the TIEN PHUOC CIDG Camp. Eight enemy were killed, six huts destroyed and 300 liters of cooking oil were captured. Then 3/5 ARVN in two contacts 16 kilometers southwest of TIEN PHUOC CIDG Camp (AT 970073), with possible elements of the 2d NVA Division, killed nine of the enemy and destroyed a cache of 300 RPG rounds.

Another hospital complex was found on the 24th by 3/5 ARVN 15 and one-half kilometers southwest of TIEN PHUOC (AT 975055). The complex was destroyed and 440 pounds of dried blood plasma in cans was evacuated to Fire Support Base MILDRED.

On 25 February "A" Troop 1/1st Cavalry contacted an enemy force while conducting an operation five kilometers east of QUE SON (BT 093340). There were 11 enemy killed and seven captured, two of the PW's were nurses, while the remaining were local guerrillas. At about the same time D-1/46th Infantry received 15x82mm mortar rounds while in night defensive positions at LZ MARYANNE 21 kilometers southwest of TIEN PHUOC (AS 562999). There were light friendly casualties.

e. QUANG NGAI (P). Contacts in QUANG NGAI Province were substantially down from the previous week. Activities included several meeting engagements and an attack by fire, as well as a successful mission flown by a Night Hawk helicopter and the destruction of the last of a series of three hospital facilities eliminated in southern I Corps during the reporting period.

On 22 February, 4/4th ARVN contacted an estimated enemy squad, possibly from the C 65 Local Force Company or the 38th Local Force Battalion, six kilometers northwest of MO DUC (BS 664576), nine enemy were killed.

On the 23d, a MH-1H Night Hawk from F/8th Cavalry contacted possible elements of the 406th Local Force Sapper Battalion, when it received SA 22 kilometers west northwest of QUANG NGAI City (BS 431761). The aircraft returned fire killing nine and destroying one hut. After refueling and reloading, the Night Hawk returned to the area and engaged eight enemy attempting to recover the dead, killing them all.

On the 24th, RF Company 183 contacted an unknown sized enemy force seven kilometers southeast of MO DUC (BS 769521) resulting in seven enemy killed and five PW's, possibly from the C 19 Local Force Company. Then the 6th Regimental Recon Company, 2d ARVN Division, found huts and a tunnel complex 10 kilometers north northwest of HA THANH CIDG Camp (BS 337-789), probably the B 23d Hospital. There were 19 huts, three of which were operating rooms, five recuperation huts and 11 sleeping huts; each hut had an underground bunker. A large quantity of food and medicines were destroyed along with the complex, while additional foodstuffs were evacuated or consumed by the ARVN.

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On the 27th, 2d Company, 4/6th ARVN and the 6th Regimental Recon Company were on a search operation when they received 60x82mm mortar rounds 10 kilometers south of TRA BONG CUNG Camp (BS 322782), causing negligible casualties. Counter battery was fired from TRA BONG on suspected enemy locations with unknown results.

Also on the 27th, a team from D/1-1st Cavalry, 17 and one-half kilometers west northwest of QUANG NGAI City (BS 478773) engaged seven NVA with organic weapons, killing all seven; later, an additional two enemy were killed; they were possible elements of the 406th Local Force Sapper Battalion.

f. ANALYSIS OF THE ENEMY SITUATION. It is our estimate that the coming week will see a continuation of attacks by fire, as well as an increase in the number of enemy initiated ground incidents. The increased troop movements noted during the past week, generally toward the east, indicate that the enemy may be positioning his troops for an increase in offensive activity.

The attacks by fire will be directed at military installations in northern I Corps Tactical Zone, primarily ARVN. In the south, the attacks will also be targeted against pacification security forces and may include follow up ground attacks and sapper attacks.

Any increase in enemy offensive action will be intense, but of brief duration. The probability of sapper attacks will increase later in the week as we move into a period of low lunar illumination.

2. ENEMY OPERATIONS DURING THE PERIOD. Enemy initiated ground incidents increased from 207 to 221 for the week of 22-28 February 1970. These incidents consisted of one ground attack, (none of which were company size or larger and one of which was platoon size or smaller), no ambushes, seven assault by fire, 119 harassing fire incidents, 84 mining and booby trap incidents, two hamlet harassment incidents, no assassination incidents, no espionage incidents, three kidnapping incidents, three propaganda incidents, and two sabotage incidents.

i. Weather

(1) Recap of Weather for Reporting Period. The weather was good relative to the seasonal average, the only exception being extensive fog and stratus during the morning hours. No significant precipitation was reported.

(2) Weather Outlook for the Period 01-07 March 1970

(a) General. No significant change in weather is expected over the first six days of the outlook period. Wind flow should be weak and from the southeast, resulting in good weather except for morning fog and stratus. On or about 7 March a weak monsoonal surge should bring northeasterly flow to I Corps. A corresponding increase in cloudiness and precipitation will accompany the surge.

(b) ICTZ Forecast. During the first six days partly cloudy except occasionally cloudy during the morning. No significant rain. Fog during the morning until about 1000H. Winds light and variable except for a 10 knot easterly sea breeze along the coast during the afternoon. On 7 March becoming cloudy. Occasional light rain and drizzle. Wind northwesterly through northeasterly at five to 15 knots.

4. COUNTERINTELLIGENCE. Annex C.

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5. CAPABILITIES AND VULNERABILITIES. Based upon a continuing evaluation of the enemy situation and the present disposition of enemy forces within the ICTZ, the enemy courses of action in probable order of adoption are considered to be:

a. Continue to maintain pressure on ARVN/FMAF by attacks by fire, limited ground attacks and light to moderate sapper attacks directed against targets within the I Corps Tactical Zone, with emphasis on the pacification effort.

b. In conjunction with capability a., above, conduct terrorism against selected GVN and ARVN personnel and continue extensive political, propaganda and proselyting activity to discredit and weaken the GVN and to increase the influence and prestige of the NLF's Revolutionary Committees and Provisional Revolutionary Government.

c. Expand present operations within the ICTZ by adopting the following courses of action in one or more of the following geographical locations/areas:

(1) Attack installations in northern QUANG TRI Province with up to five infantry regiments supported by two sapper battalions and three artillery regiments.

(2) Attack QUANG TRI City with up to five infantry battalions, supported by two sapper battalions and one mortar/rocket battalion.

(3) Conduct limited attacks in the HUE/PHU RAI area with elements of five infantry regiments, supported by two mortar/rocket battalions.

(4) Attack installations within the DANANG TAOR with the equivalent of up to five infantry regiments supported by five sapper battalions and three rocket battalions.

(5) Attack the TAM KY/CHU LAI Combat Base Complex with two infantry regiments (+) supported by three sapper battalions and two artillery battalions.

(6) Attack QUANG NGAI City with the equivalent of two infantry regiments, supported by two sapper battalions and one artillery battalion.

(7) Attack QUANG NGAI City, MO DUC and DUC FHO simultaneously with an infantry regiment equivalent at each location.

d. Defend on present positions just north of the central and eastern portions of the DMZ with up to five infantry regiments supported by two sapper battalions and three artillery regiments.

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e. Defend elsewhere in ICTZ (south of Route 9), including VC/NVA base areas with forces locally available.

f. Withdraw into the mountain and forested areas of western I Corps and/or LAOS or North VIETNAM.

g. Reinforce the forces presently in ICTZ with two to three divisions from North VIETNAM either across the DMZ or via the Laotian Panhandle.

h. Employ SSM's from NVN and/or border areas; employ limited air and/or Naval forces from NVN or surrounding areas; employ possible armor units from the area immediately north of the DMZ and/or border areas.

i. Vulnerabilities

(1) Due to the lack of support of the populace, the enemy is forced to expose himself in his efforts to obtain food and supplies, thereby making him vulnerable to allied observation devices and techniques, and subsequently allied fire power.

(2) The enemy is vulnerable to psychological operations, as a result of high casualties, lack of food and medicine, disease, failure to achieve intended goals, and loss of the wide spread support of the populace.

(3) The enemy's major logistic efforts are vulnerable to seasonal monsoons.

(4) The enemy's dependence on his environment is vulnerable as a result of successful pacification efforts.

(5) The enemy is vulnerable to aggressive, sustained, allied offensive operations.

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ANNEX B (SIGNIFICANT INFORMATION DERIVED FROM INTERROGATION REPORTS, AGENT REPORTS, AND CAPTURED DOCUMENTS) TO III MAF PERINTREP 09-70.

1. QUANG TRI (P). No significant reports.
2. THUA THIEN (P). No significant reports.
3. QUANG NAM (P). PW Le Tan NAM, 1st Company, Q.80th Battalion who was captured on 19 Feb 1970 at (BT 165495), nine kilometers south of HOI AN (Ref: SA QUANG NAM Sector, HOI AN RVN msg 230355Z Feb 1970), stated the location of his unit was (BT 215465), four kilometers northeast of THANG BINH City on 19 Feb 1970. The mission of his unit was to attack HOI AN City on an unknown date, (hearsay). The PW revealed that the morale was low for the following reasons: fear of air strikes, artillery, lack of food, and the troops were tired of running. The LEV of the unit was 180 Anh Dung and it had an AKA of the HOI AN City Group. Command cadre of the battalion were: CO-BUA, XO and PO-MINH; 1st Co CO-TAN, XO and PO-HOA; 2d Co CO-TROUC, XO and PO-QUANG. Source stated that the Q.80th Battalion lost almost it's entire 3d Company in March 1969 and the 4th Company was forced to disband also because of casualties from allied air and arty. The remnants of these two company's merged into the remaining two. The source stated that they had not received any replacements.

(OOB COMMENT: The PW's statements concerning losses and reorganization of the battalion and personalities of the battalion Commanding Officer, Executive Officer, and the Political Officer are consistent with information held by III MAF OOB, (F-1). All other personalities are reported for the first time, (F-6). No mention is made of the water sapper capability which had been previously reported for the Q.80th Battalion. All information is rated (F-2) unless otherwise indicated.)

4. QUANG TIN (P). PW Ngo Ngoc LUU (AKA LIEN) 6th Company, 1109th Battalion, 3d Regiment, 1st Nong Truong Division who was captured 1 Feb 1970, 10 kilometers northeast of HAN DUC (Ref: Init ITT rpt Amer 48-70 dtd 8 Feb 1970) stated that his unit, with a strength of 600 men was located three days walk north of the place of capture, (approximately BT 0219). The mission of the battalion was to attack somewhere in QUANG TIN Province in early March 1970. The morale of the unit was low because the men were tired of fighting and they had little food. The source stated that he had infiltrated from NVN on 20 Oct 1969 with 600 men. They arrived in KONTUM Province on 19 Dec 1969 with 500 men. He said that the 100 men were lost because of malaria and the lack of food. LUU related that the entire infiltration group, number unknown, was assigned to the 1109th Battalion. He also mentioned that he had used a modified AK-47 which had a grenade launcher and a device with which to cut wire. Reported personalities: CO-Hoang Van NANG, XO-Nguyen Van HANH, PO-Nguyen Van LEN. The composition of the battalion was six company's, each having a strength of 120 men. The weaponry of each company consisted of 12 B-40's, 12 B-41's, three machine guns, three 82mm mortars

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and that each man of the company had an AK-47. The subject stated that while infiltrating he had seen children between the ages of nine and 13 on their way to NVN, further while in LAOS he observed 37mm AA guns, however he could not recall where they were.

(COB COMMENT: The 1109th Battalion, 3d Regiment, 1st Nong Truong Division is unidentified, however it is believed that this is an infiltration group number. Recent PW's have given several other infiltration groups in the 1100 series and they are 1102, 1103 and 1105. Six companies per battalion is unusually high as well as the strength of each company. All personalities mentioned are unidentified. The modified AK-47 has been previously mentioned and was said to be used by sappers. Children being sent to NVN for training has also been mentioned in documents. All information rated (F-6).)

5. QUANG NGAI (P). PW Vo HIEP, Transportation Platoon of Military and Political School, MR-5 who was captured on 15 Feb 1970, 10 kilometers east northeast of HA THANH Village (BS 478778) (Ref: CG Americal Division Interr rpt Amer 61-70 dtd 17 Feb 1979) stated that the Transportation Platoon has a strength of 30 men and was located at TA MA CP in SON HA District, 20 kilometers west southwest of MINH LONG, (BS 351489) and that the Military and Political School was located somewhere in SON HA District (NFI). He further stated that the mission of the Transportation Platoon is to provide food for the Military and Political School of MR-5. The school has a mission to train NVA Company and Battalion Commanders. The platoon operates in TU NGHIA District and SON TINH District as well as SON HA District. The weapons and ammunition carried by his platoon were supplied by an NVA pickup platoon (NFI). Subject stated that morale is high due to the availability of food. The code number of the school is 577. In the six months he was with the unit, two men were killed and the unit had received no replacements. Reported personalities: PltLdr-CAT, AsstPltLdr-MINH. HIEP stated that his unit had never been in combat because they have standing orders to evade all contact with allied troops.

(COB COMMENT: This is the second report of the Military and Political Training School, MR-5 and the code number of 577 has been mentioned as the unit's code number, (F-1). The training school is thought to be located in the vicinity of (BS 286526, BS 289540, BS 292535 and BS 284534) (F-2). The information concerning the location of the school was obtained from a returnee who rallied to SON HA sub-sector on 19 Dec 1969. All personalities are unidentified (F-6). All information is rated (F-3) unless otherwise indicated.)

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ANNEX C (COUNTERINTELLIGENCE) TO III MAF PERINTREP 9-70

1. GENERAL. VC/VCI counterintelligence related activities continued at a low level during the reporting period. No change was noted in the basic enemy concept of operations. He continued to direct the bulk of his efforts at propaganda, coercion, proselyting and terrorism, in an attempt to gain popular support and enhance his campaign to disrupt the GVN pacification program and US "Vietnamization" of the war.

Once again the Hus-Danang Railroad became the target of saboteurs on 23 February, when an unknown type explosive device destroyed approximately ten meters of railroad track vicinity (YD 920110).

There were no reported incidents of espionage received this week and only two incidents of propaganda.

Reported enemy terrorist activity continued at the same relatively low level as the previous week. Thus far only ten incidents have been recorded in comparison to nine last week and fifteen the week before last.

The majority of the civilian deaths and injuries resulted from enemy explosive devices and grenades.

2. ESPIONAGE. No reports of enemy espionage and/or related activities in ICTZ were received this week.

3. SABOTAGE. Reports of enemy sabotage and/or related activities in ICTZ during the past week consisted of two incidents, as follows:

a. Thua Thien

(1) On 23 February 1970 at approximately 2310H, an unknown number of VC blew up a culvert with an unknown type charge vicinity (AT 840965). Twenty-five percent of the culvert was destroyed. (Ref: CO USAAG ICTZ msg 260905Z Feb70)

(2) On 23 February 1970 at approximately 2310H, an unknown size enemy force detonated an explosive device (nfi) on the railroad track vicinity (YD 920110), 18 km northwest of Phu Loc resulting in the destruction of approximately ten meters of track. There were no casualties.

(Ref: COMUSMACV msg 241000Z Feb70)

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4. POLITICAL AND PROPAGANDA. VC/VCI political and propaganda activities of the past week consisted of two incidents and reflected essentially no change from policy and tactics of the previous week.

Details of enemy political and propaganda activities reported during the past week, are as follows:

a. Quang Ngai

(1) On 24 February 1970 at approximately 2400H, a VC squad infiltrated into Phu An (H) vicinity (BS 558717), Tu Thuan (V), Tu Nghia (D), held a broadcasting course (nfi) and distributed leaflets (nfi) before withdrawing.
(Ref: PSA/PSD CORDS Quang Ngai R-21/02261150)

(2) On 24 February 1970 at approximately 2400H, the VC entered Xuan Pho (H) vicinity (BS 591733), Tu Thuan (V), Tu Nghia (D) and gathered the people together and propagandized about the people who have children carrying arms for the GVN. The people were urged to have their children return to the People's Liberation Front.
(Ref: PSA/PSD CORDS Quang Ngai R-21/02261150)

5. TERROR. Terrorist activity remained at a relatively low level for the third consecutive week with ten incidents reported. Two late reports from the previous week brings the total for that period to nine with four civilians being killed, one wounded and three abductions. One of the victims killed was the hamlet chief of Phuoc Hai (H), Quang Ngai (P).

Details of reported enemy terrorism and terrorist related incidents are contained in Appendix 1.

6. MISCELLANEOUS. Numerous captured documents, PW and Hoi Chanh reports reveal that the VC are finding it more and more difficult to procure rice and other foodstuffs from the populace.

There have also been agent reports over the past few weeks of VC provincial and district level cadre holding meetings in an apparent attempt to find solutions to the lack of food and support of the civilian population.

The enemy realizes that the GVN pacification program constitutes a most serious threat to the VC infrastructure and to date, he has been unable to come up with an effective countermeasures program. Without support of the people the enemy's objectives will be increasingly difficult to achieve and may cause serious damage to his already badly depleted infrastructure.

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Details of miscellaneous reports received during the past week, are as follows:

a. Thua Thien. On 21 February 1970 at approximately 0010H, about one VC squad entered Vinh My (H), vicinity (YD 938078), Loc Son (V), Phu Loc (D) and got 124 cans of rice from the people and then paid VN\$1500.

b. Quang Nam. On 16 February 1970, elements of the 1st Marine Division operating vicinity (AT 813464) captured an enemy document containing the following information:

A circular, dated 31 December 1969, signed by Nguyen TAM, Assistant Secretary, C70 (possibly Current Affairs Committee, Dai Loc District, Quang Da Special Zone, Region 5), forwarded to subordinate A's and B's, reveals that part of the population in the liberated (VC) areas took advantage of the truce (declared by the NFLSVN) for Christmas 1969 to flee to the enemy (GVN) controlled areas. They did so because they were demoralized by the enemy's (FWMAF/RVNAF) intensive attacks, and because they were misled by deceptive enemy (RVN) propaganda.

The cited failure was also due to the poor revolutionary spirit and the passive attitude of the friendly (VC) cadre. They did nothing to restrain the refugees, because they had relatives among them. In the days ahead, the population in the liberated areas will continue to move to the enemy controlled areas if no efforts are made by the friendly cadre to make the population realize the sinister scheme of the enemy (GVN). The revolutionary movement will be affected if drastic measures are not taken to remedy the situation. It was noted that the people who left the liberated areas for the enemy controlled areas returned to the liberated areas to induce other people to flee with them. Some of them brought back (RVN) Chieu Hoi appeals to the local (VC) cadre and deliberately told the latter of the motives which had impelled them to move to the enemy controlled areas. The friendly cadre did nothing to convince them to remain in the liberated areas and thus tacitly helped the enemy (GVN) to seize control of the population (under VC control). What they should have done in such cases, was to detain the reactionary individuals for three to five days for education, or thought reform.

Consequently efforts were to be made by Party Committees at all echelons to retain control of the local population at any cost. (CDEC Doc Log No. 02-2192-70) (Eval: B-3)

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c. Quang Ngai.

(1) A US MI source reported that on 15 February 1970 a meeting of VC Political Cadre was held at Tan Phuoc (V) vicinity (BS 562906), Binh Son (D). The purpose of the meeting was to dispatch high level cadre on a mission to operate in GVN controlled areas for the purpose of spotting and recruiting penetration agents among ARVN troops. The cadre were to operate as traders, barbers and knife sharpeners. They were to specialize in currency manipulation and black market operations. GVN passes and identification papers were provided these cadre (nfi).

(2) US MI source reported that from 0730H-1015H, on 15 February 1970 the Binh Son (D) Finance and Economic Committee held a meeting in the vicinity of Tinh Trung (V) (BS 425961), Binh Son (D). The purpose of the meeting was to plan an effective program of food and tax collection in support of military units. A spokesman said the soldiers were lacking supplies due to successful FWMAF operations that resulted in the capture of many caches. A plan was suggested that would increase the taxes on the people in VC controlled areas and steal food and money from the people in GVN controlled areas. Cadre would also contact traders in secure areas (VC controlled) and make arrangements to purchase supplies from them. Of the fifteen people who attended the meeting, the following were identified as district level Finance and Economic Cadre Members:

(3) A meeting of the Quang Ngai VC Provincial Committee was reportedly held in the vicinity of Ba Dien (H) (BS 492451), Minh Nghia (V), Minh Long (D), Quang Ngai Province, on 16 February 1970. The purpose of the meeting was to analyze the current situation and discuss new food tasks. There were 25 participants, most of whom were provincial party and committee members. Two representatives of Military Region 5 while in Hanoi, visited with several important leaders of North Vietnam to include: Pham Van Dong, Premier of North Vietnam and Truong Chinh. They were briefed on the political and economic situation and policies.

The current economic and food situation: Beginning in the summer

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of 1969, the VC planned to use between 4,000 tons and 7,000 tons of husked rice. The VC had established 52 principal and 80 alternate rice storage buildings holding 2,200 tons of rice. However, 20 principal and 24 alternate buildings with 1,000 tons of rice had been destroyed by US/ARVN troops. The remaining rice was distributed as follows:

200 tons to the Sao Vang Division
 150 tons to the 2nd NVA Division
 100 tons to the Transportation Organization
 200 tons to the Provincial Units
 700 tons to MR-5.

The food reserve for the Fall-Winter and the Winter-Spring Campaigns was depleted in October of 1969. However, 150 million RVN piasters were issued to the Provincial Front Forward Council by MR-5, and the VC attempted to purchase large amounts of rice from the October 69 crop. However, of the 900 tons purchased, 600 tons were destroyed by ARVN troops.

The economic and food problems were caused by several factors to include:

1. The US defoliation operations.
2. A lack of manpower.
3. A loss of stored goods.

After TET 68, the VC collected only 10% of the projected 40% in rice taxes that was their goal.

New tasks to be accomplished included:

1. Motivate the Party members to perform their assigned tasks.
2. Purchase food with the 500 million RVN piasters which the Provincial Committee was to receive.

Moreover, the Forward Front Transportation branches would be equipped with new vehicles (nfi).

The meeting was concluded with a discussion of domestic and foreign problems.

(4) On 18 February 1970 at approximately 2400H, the VC entered Phu An (H) vicinity (BS 584715), Tu Nghia (D) and took an unknown amount of rice from the people.

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ANNEX D (RECONNAISSANCE AND SENSOR ACTIVITY) TO III MAF PERINTREP 9-70

1. RECONNAISSANCE ACTIVITY. There were 36 reconnaissance patrols deployed throughout ICTZ during the week of 28 February 1970. The patrols reported sightings totaling approximately 709 enemy. Recon team contacts, air strikes and artillery called in response to the sightings resulted in 44 enemy KIA, two U.S. WIA, and three enemy PWs.

a. In the 1st Infantry Brigade, 5th Infantry Division (Mech) TAOR, ranger teams operating in the DMZ observed three NVA. Team contact resulted in one enemy KIA and one U.S. WIA.

b. The 101st Airborne Division's (AM) ranger teams operating north of Khe Sanh observed two enemy. Team contact resulted in one enemy KIA and one PW.

c. The 3rd Force Reconnaissance Company had no teams deployed during the reporting period.

d. The 1st Force Reconnaissance Company teams operating west of Thuong Duc sighted 119 enemy during the reporting period. Airborne radio relay, provided by 1st Marine Air Wing utilizing the C-117, supported the recon teams for a period of three days with excellent results.

e. In the Americal Division's TAOR, ranger team observed approximately 62 enemy. Team contact resulted in two enemy KIA and one U.S. WIA.

f. The 1st Reconnaissance Battalion's teams operating in the 1st Marine Division's AO observed approximately 523 enemy. Team contacts, air strikes and artillery called in response to the sightings resulted in 40 enemy KIA and two PWs.

2. SENSOR ACTIVITY.

a. Four sensor strings consisting of 16 sensors located in the DMZ in the 1st Brigade, 5th Infantry Division's (Mech) area detected two targets during the reporting period. Eighteen rounds of 155mm were fired in response with negative BDA.

b. Thirty sensor strings consisting of 98 sensors located out of the DMZ in the 1st Brigade, 5th Infantry Division's (Mech) area detected 61 targets during the reporting period. Two hundred and forty-one rounds of 155mm, 42 rounds of 175mm and 32 rounds of eight inch artillery were fired in response with negative BDA.

c. Sixty-three sensor strings consisting of 247 sensors located out of the DMZ in the 101st Airborne Division's (AM) area detected 16 targets during the reporting period. Thirty-six rounds of 175mm, 19 rounds of 155mm, 68 rounds of 105mm and 117 rounds of 81mm were fired in response with negative results.

d. Twenty-one sensor strings consisting of 91 sensors and 203 line sensors in the 1st Marine Division's area detected 52 targets during the reporting period. Seventy-seven rounds of 60mm, 172 rounds of 81mm, 15 rounds of 90mm, 270 rounds of 105mm, and 13 rounds of eight inch artillery were fired in response with negative BDA. Overall enemy activity across the 1st Marine Division sensor fields has increased considerably during the reporting period.

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e. Seventy-eight sensor strings consisting of 318 sensors and 39 line sensors located in the Americal Division's AO detected 69 targets during the reporting period. Four hundred and eighty-six rounds of artillery were fired in response with negative BDA.

f. Forty-one sensor strings consisting of 159 sensors in the 1st ARVN area detected seven targets during the reporting period. Six fire missions were fired in response with negative BDA.

g. Thirty-one sensor strings consisting of 92 sensors in the 2nd ARVN area detected 24 targets during the reporting period. Twenty-four fire missions were fired in response. Agents in the area reported six enemy KIA and six enemy WIA, resulting from artillery fire.

h. Nine sensor strings consisting of 44 sensors in the Quang Da Special Zone detected three targets during the reporting period. Three fire missions were fired in response with negative BDA.

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ANNEX E (MARCH WEATHER BRIEF) TO III MAF PERINTEP NO 09-70

1. General Weather. On the average the weather over ICTZ during the first part of March is cloudy with light precipitation, commonly referred to as "Crachin" weather. Periods of drizzle and rain associated with low stratus clouds frequently occur over the coastal area. After the middle of the month, the weather normally improves and low stratus clouds are replaced by convective clouds.

2. Precipitation.

a. Although March is a dry season month, rainfall increases over the average for February throughout ICTZ. Most local rainfall occurs as afternoon showers or thunderstorms, but during surges of the north-east monsoon, "Crachin" contributes significantly to the monthly rainfall.

b. The mean number of days with measurable precipitation varies from two days along the coast from the southern Corps boundary to HUE to about 10 days north of HUE. From HUE northward to the DMZ, precipitation, usually in the form of morning drizzle, can be expected on one of every three days. As many as 18 days with measurable rainfall have been reported at HUE during March.

c. Mean monthly precipitation amounts are less than one inch over most of ICTZ.

d. Monthly maximum values range from near five inches in the southern portion of ICTZ to 10 inches just north of HUE.

e. Minimum monthly precipitation amounts are zero over the entire ICTZ.

f. Maximum 24 hour precipitation values vary from three inches in the southern and northern portion to six inches in the area around HUE. A one day rainfall of seven to eight inches has occurred in the HUE region.

3. Thunderstorms. In the region from the southern boundary of ICTZ to the HUE area, thunderstorms are normally observed on one of every three days. In the area from HUE north to the DMZ, thunderstorms are observed on three of every six days.

4. Cloudiness.

a. Along the coast, cloudiness decreases both in amount and persistency, but because of "Crachin", overcasts generally below 1,500 feet can be expected one to eight mornings during the month. Convective clouds form over most regions during the late morning hours, and afternoon ceilings with bases 2,000 to 4,000 feet become more common toward the end of the month.

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b. Mean cloudiness over most of the area is between 60 and 80 percent with the maximum cloudy areas located north of HUE.

c. The mean number of days with total cloud cover equal to or less than 3/10 (widely scattered clouds) varies from less than five days over the northern portion to 14 days over the region south of HUE.

5. Visibility. Morning visibilities of less than three miles are frequent with "Crachin" conditions along the coast throughout ICTZ. These restrictions occasionally persist throughout the day.

6. Temperatures.

a. Mean daily maximum temperatures range from about 80 degrees in the northern ICTZ to about 83 degrees in the southern portion. The lowest mean maximum is 78 degrees at TIEN SWA, on Cape TOURANE northeast of DANANG.

b. The mean daily minimum temperature over most of the ICTZ is 65 degrees.

7. Relative Humidity. The relative humidity along the coast of the ICTZ continues to decrease slightly toward a mid-summer minimum. The mean relative humidity is between 80 and 90 percent.

8. Astronomical Data. BCT occurs 23 minutes prior to sunrise, and ECT occurs 23 minutes after sunset. Computed at (16°04'N, 108°13'E).

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



1. GENERAL ENEMY SITUATION. Most indicators of enemy activity declined last week. Enemy initiated incidents totalled 228, an increase of seven. The action however, was less intense than during the preceeding week. The total number of incoming enemy ordnance declined over 50 percent, dropping from 511 rounds for the week ending 28 February to 245 rounds for the current reporting period. The decline in intensity becomes apparent when this reduction is compared to the total number of harassing attacks by fire which were conducted. There were 135 incidents reported, 16 more than during the preceeding week. Another indication of the reduction in intensity of the week's action is the number of KIA's; 603 were reported, 179 less than last week. The number of PW's remained stable with 38 captured (three NVA/35 VC), one less than last week. The number of Hoi Chanh's increased with 125 rallying. This is 15 more than the previous week's total.

VC/VCI counterintelligence related activities continued at the relative low level that has been reported during the past few weeks. No change has been noted in the basic enemy concept of operations. The bulk of his efforts continue to be directed towards developing logistic support and a base of popular support in GVN controlled areas.

Enemy sabotage efforts against the HUE-DANANG Railroad appear to be increasing. On 3 March 1970 an FOD team from the 12th ARVN Security Group discovered 33.5 pounds of Chicom TNT that had been placed as derailment charges on the track vicinity (ZD 074010). On 3 and 5 March 1970, the DANANG-HUE Patrol Train detonated unknown type mines between DANANG and HUE. This is the fifth act of sabotage against the railroad in three weeks. Another sabotage operation was directed against the THANH QUIT Bridge (BT 042620) on 2 March. Seventy percent of the bridge was destroyed by explosive charges that were either floated down river or emplaced by swimmers.

Terrorist activity remained at a relatively low level for the fourth consecutive week. Thus far, total casualties resulting from enemy terrorist activity for this reporting period are eighteen killed and eighty-five wounded. Forty-seven of the wounded are the result of a VC mortar attack on PHU LOC #6 Refugee Camp (AT 925526). Five GVN officials were reported to have been assassinated during the week.

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a. QUANG TRI (E). There was a sharp decline in action in QUANG TRI Province during the week, especially noted in the number of incoming rounds of enemy ordnance. There were 191 rounds recorded last week in QUANG TRI Province as opposed to 170 during the preceding week.

On 2 March, 2d Company, 3/3 ARVN on a search operation north northeast of GIO HIEH found a cache containing 26x60mm mortar rounds, two 82mm mortar rounds and 15x8-40 rounds. All ordnance was destroyed in place.

On the 3d, a recon team from 2d ARVN Regiment being inserted six kilometers west of the ROCKPILE (YD 912563) received heavy small arms and machine gun fire from an NCF. The team killed five of the enemy, possibly elements of the 246th Regiment, and was extracted under fire. Friendly losses were light. On 4 March, 4th Company, 2/2 ARVN made contact with an NCF five kilometers north of Camp CARROLL (YD 061526) while moving to night defensive positions. Two ARVN were killed and six wounded, while enemy losses were unknown.

There was no significant ground activity recorded on the 5th. On 6 March, however, the 3d Company, 5/2d ARVN received 30x82mm mortar rounds one kilometer northwest of A-3 (YD 162722). The same unit received an additional 25 rounds of 82mm mortar fire two hours later, one and one-half kilometers west of A-3 (YD 157723). Neither attack caused any casualties or damage, and were launched by possible elements of the 31st Regiment. A/2 (YD 214742) also received five 140mm rockets resulting in negative casualties or material damage.

b. THUA THIEN (E). THUA THIEN Province maintained the quiescent level of activity which has been exhibited throughout recent months. Several harassing attacks by fire were the only significant events recorded during the week.

On 4 March there was an incident of light harassing fire, or a platoon of B Company, 1-501st Infantry received 10-15x60mm mortar rounds 10 kilometers north of A SHAN (YD 518042). There were light friendly casualties and negative damage. Also on the 4th, 3d Company, 2/3 ARVN received 15x60mm mortar rounds while searching 15 kilometers southwest of HUE (YD 620165). There were very light friendly casualties and no material damage. There was no significant ground action recorded in THUA THIEN on the 5th. Then, on 6 March, an element of 1/3 ARVN received 10x60mm mortar rounds while searching 15 kilometers northeast of A LOVI (YD 510085) causing light friendly casualties.

c. QUANG NAM (E). QUANG NAM Province experienced light and scattered enemy activity. There were no major engagements or movements of enemy troops reported.

On 1 March, a squad patrol from K/3/5 Marines found an enemy base camp 10 kilometers northwest of LIBERTY BRIDGE vicinity (AT 832579) consisting of six caves. Several rockets were found and destroyed. Four

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and one-half kilometers west of LIBERTY BRIDGE (AT 881523) the 3/51st ARVN while conducting a search found the bodies of 16 VC, possible elements of the Q83 LF Armed Unit, who had been killed by air strikes approximately two weeks earlier. A platoon combat patrol from 1/3/7 Marines received approximately 200 rounds of SAF and two unknown type explosions from three enemy, 13 kilometers south of HOI AN (BT 099446) resulting in light friendly casualties. Later, in the same vicinity, M/3/7 found a cache of 700 pounds of rice and miscellaneous medical equipment.

Also on the 1st, the NOAN MY Hamlet five kilometers north of LIBERTY BRIDGE (AT 924583) received three 82mm mortar rounds resulting in a number of civilian casualties. The enemy were possibly from the Q83 LF Armed Unit. A platoon from 3/51st ARVN ambushed an estimated VC squad seven kilometers northeast of AN HOA (AT 872520) killing five and capturing 100 kilo's of rice. The enemy were again possible elements of the Q83 LF Armed Unit.

Early on the 2d, the THANH QUAT Bridge, seven kilometers east of Hill 55 (BT 042620) was 70 percent destroyed by an explosion. The charges are suspected to have been floated down the river or planted by swimmers. The enemy was possibly from the R.20 MF Battalion or the Q82 LF Armed Unit.

In an harrassing attack by fire, on 5 March, PHU LOC #6 Hamlet one kilometer southwest of LIBERTY Bridge (AT 925526) received six 82mm mortar rounds resulting in one VN civilian killed, 47 wounded and two houses destroyed. The attack was by possible elements of the D.3 Battalion.

On the 6th of March, a squad from A/1/7 in a night defensive position 10 kilometers northeast of QUÉ SON (BT 105410) received 15x60mm mortar rounds resulting in negative casualties or damage.

Several troop movements were noted on the 7th. A platoon from A/1/1 in defensive positions six kilometers southwest of FSR STATION observed 30-40 enemy moving west in a column (AT 868678). They were armed and several carried large bags believed to be rice. An artillery fire mission killed 14, possibly elements of the 31st NVA Regiment.

Also on the 7th, H&S Company of 3/5 Marines in a defensive position nine kilometers north of AN HOA (AT 878576), observed eight enemy with packs and rifles in a tree line. A fire mission killed five, possibly elements of the Q83 Armed Unit. Then, 7F Company 759 contacted an USFF 12 kilometers southwest of HOI AN (BT 050400). A sweep of the area revealed 10 VC KIA, they were possibly from the 36th Regiment or the Q81 Armed Unit.

The 1/51st ARVN, conducting a search and clear operation two kilometers northwest of AN HOA (AT 830480) engaged an USFF resulting in seven enemy killed, possibly elements of the 90th NVA Regiment, with no friendly casualties.

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d. QUANG TIN (P). QUANG TIN Province recorded light but steady activity during the week, including several meeting engagements. On the 2d of March, while on a search and clear operation 12 kilometers southeast of HOI AN (BT 196454), RF Group 1/18 discovered a tunnel containing approximately 2.5 tons of locally grown unpolished rice. Half of it was given to local civilians and the remainder was destroyed. The 1/18th RF Group on a search and clear operation 12 and one-half kilometers south-southeast of HOI AN (BT 196458) contacted an USFP, possibly elements of the V.25 MF Battalion or the 70th IF Battalion. There were five enemy killed with very light friendly casualties.

On 4 March, the TIENTHUC CJDG (DET A-102) nine kilometers east of TIENTHUC (BT 201144) engaged a company size enemy force, possibly the V-18 IF Company or an element of the 1st VC Regiment, killing 12.

On 5 March, a UH-1H Helicopter from F/8th Cavalry on patrol five kilometers east southeast of QUÉ SON (BT 085335) observed and attacked six enemy with AWE, killing all six. Then, five kilometers east southeast of QUÉ SON (BT 0834), a Blue Team from F/8th Cavalry killed seven enemy and captured one, possibly elements of the 3d NVA Division, (a Blue Team consists of a rifle platoon in UH-1H Helicopters accompanied by two gunships and a scout section of one LOF).

Also on the 5th, D Company, 4/31st Infantry (AT 926268) three kilometers northeast of HIEP DUC engaged 11 VC killing nine and capturing two.

On 6 March, elements of D/3-21st Infantry, five kilometers east southeast of QUÉ SON (BT 085333) received heavy small arms fire from an USFP, possibly an element of the 3d NVA Regiment or the 105th IF Armed Unit. D Company returned organic fire and a sweep of the area revealed seven NVA killed. On the evening of 6 March, the TIENTHUC CJDG seven kilometers east of their camp (BT 176145) in a company sized ambush, attacked an estimated two NVA companies, possibly from the 1st MF Battalion killing five. As the enemy fled, the CJDG called in an artillery fire mission killing eight more. There were negligible friendly casualties.

As the week ended, there were three simultaneous attacks against the Pacification effort early on 7 March.

BINH TINH Camp (BT 267425) 10 kilometers east of THANG BINH received an unknown number of mortar rounds followed by a ground attack from an USFP, possibly an element of the V.16 Sapper Battalion or the 72d IF Battalion. There were five VC killed and light friendly casualties. At the same time (0215H) TU TRA Hamlet (BT 199350) seven kilometers south southeast of THANG BINH was infiltrated by an estimated VC platoon possibly an element of the V.15 IF Company. PSDF's guarding the hamlet engaged the enemy killing 12 while suffering only one friendly casualty. Then, TU NGHIA Hamlet (BT 239371) eight kilometers southeast of THANG BINH was infiltrated by an estimated platoon, again possibly from the V.15 IF Company. PSDF's guarding the hamlet suffered three KIA and five MIA while enemy losses are unknown.

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e. QUANG NGAI (P). Meeting engagements and artillery fire missions characterized action in QUANG NGAI Province during the reporting period.

On 1 March, a forward observer in an OP of C/3-1 observed six-eight enemy in a clearing 19 kilometers west southwest of QUANG NGAI (BS 460-708). A fire mission was called, killing five of the enemy possibly from the C.16 LF Sapper Company or the 107th Artillery Battalion.

Also on the 1st, a refugee led a platoon from the MINH LONG CIDG Camp to a cache approximately 10 kilometers to the south southeast (BS 504429), where the platoon received heavy small arms fire from the cache area suffering light casualties. A gunship (C-119) was called and fired on the enemy location causing several secondary explosions. Early on the 2d, the CIDG returned to the cache, killed five VC and discovered 400 rounds of assorted small arms ammunitions, two tons of locally grown unpolished rice, 300 pounds of salt and assorted military clothing.

Also on the 2d, 4/6th ABVN on a search operation eight kilometers south of the TRA BONG CIDG Camp (BS 350206) contacted an unknown size NVA force, possibly an element of the 406th LF Company. The ABVN killed nine of the enemy with no friendly casualties. Then, on the 3d, 3/6 ABVN engaged an NVA platoon 10 and one-half kilometers southwest of BINH SON (BS 517872) killing six while suffering light friendly casualties. The enemy were possibly from the 95 A LF Sapper Company.

Seventeen and one-half kilometers west northwest of QUANG NGAI, on 4 March, an FO from D Battery, 1/14th Arty observed 46 enemy in a clearing (BS 476758). A fire mission killed 22, possibly elements of the 406th LF Sapper Battalion.

In action on 5 March, 2/4 ABVN on a search operation killed seven enemy and captured six VC suspects in a contact, five kilometers north-east of MO DUC (BS 768565). A short time later in the same area (BS 774-544) 1/4 ABVN killed an additional eight enemy. Elements of the C 19 LF Company were possibly involved in these contacts. On the night of the 5th, C/4-3 13 and one-half kilometers southwest of MO DUC (BS 602476) in night defensive positions received heavy small arms fire and grenades, followed by seven 82mm mortar rounds and later by two rounds of 107mm. The enemy broke contact after gunships and flareships arrived on station. Friendly casualties were light, enemy losses were unknown.

f. ANALYSIS OF THE ENEMY SITUATION. Enemy activity was light and scattered during the week, with a slight increase noticed toward the end of the reporting period.

There was a decline in the number and intensity of attacks by fire in northern I Corps, and sightings of enemy troop movements in the southern corps area declined as well. Although the possibility of a large scale increase in enemy offensive activity remains, the enemy most probably will continue to keep his major troop formations out of contact as much as possible.

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It is believed that the coming week will see a repetition of the preceding week's activities, consisting of attacks by fire, meeting engagements and the possibility of sapper attacks. There will be continued emphasis on harassment of isolated outposts and pacification security elements.

2. ENEMY OPERATIONS DURING THE PERIOD. Enemy initiated ground incidents increased from 221 to 228 for the week of 1-7 March 1970. These incidents consisted of two ground attacks, (none of which were company size or larger and two of which were platoon size or smaller), three ambushes, two assaults by fire, 135 harassing fire incidents, 74 mining and booby trap incidents, three hamlet harassment incidents, three assassination incidents, no espionage incidents, no kidnapping incidents, two protagarda incidents, and four sabotage incidents.

(2) Weather Outlook for the Period 08-14 March 1970

(a) General. Weak northerly flow is expected during the early part of the outlook period, which will bring cloudy weather to ICTZ with brief breaks in the overcast during the afternoon hours. Drizzle and fog will be widespread during the morning. A gradual improvement is expected after 11 March.

(b) ICTZ Forecast. From 08-11 March skies will be cloudy except for brief partly cloudy periods during the afternoons. Visibilities will be restricted to as low as one-half mile during the mornings in light drizzle and fog. Winds will be northwesterly through northeasterly at five to 10 knots. From 12-14 March skies are expected to be partly cloudy. Visibilities will be unrestricted except for patchy early morning ground fog. Winds will be light and variable.

5. CAPABILITIES AND VULNERABILITIES. Based upon a continuing evaluation of the enemy situation and the present disposition of enemy forces within the ICTZ, the enemy courses of action in probable order of adoption are considered to be:

a. Continue to maintain pressure on ARVN/FMRF by attacks by fire, limited ground attacks and light to moderate sapper attacks directed against targets within the I Corps Tactical Zone, with emphasis on the pacification effort.

b. In conjunction with capability a., above, conduct terrorism against selected GVN and ARVN personnel and continue extensive political, propaganda and proselyting activity to discredit and weaken the GVN and to increase the influence and prestige of the NLF's Revolutionary Committees and Provisional Revolutionary Government.

c. Expand present operations within the ICTZ by adopting the following courses of action in one or more of the following geographical locations/areas:

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(1) Attack installations in northern QUANG TRI Province with up to five infantry regiments supported by two sapper battalions and three artillery regiments.

(2) Attack QUANG TRI City with up to five infantry battalions, supported by two sapper battalions and one mortar/rocket battalion.

(3) Conduct limited attacks in the HUE/QUANG BAI area with elements of five infantry regiments, supported by two mortar/rocket battalions.

(4) Attack installations within the DANANG TAOR with the equivalent of up to five infantry regiments supported by five sapper battalions and three rocket battalions.

(5) Attack the HAN KY/QUANG BAI Combat Base Complex with two infantry regiments (+) supported by three sapper battalions and two artillery battalions.

(6) Attack QUANG NGAI City with the equivalent of two infantry regiments, supported by two sapper battalions and one artillery battalion.

(7) Attack QUANG NGAI City, QUANG BUC and QUANG BHO simultaneously with an infantry regiment equivalent at each location.

d. Defend on present positions just north of the central and eastern portions of the DMZ with up to five infantry regiments supported by two sapper battalions and three artillery regiments.

e. Defend elsewhere in ICTZ (south of Route 9), including VC/NVA base areas with forces locally available.

f. Withdraw into the mountain and forested areas of western I Corps and/or LACC or North VIETNAM.

g. Reinforce the forces presently in ICTZ with two to three divisions from North VIETNAM either across the DMZ or via the Laotian Parahandle.

h. Employ SSM's from NVN and/or border areas; employ limited air and/or Naval forces from NVN or surrounding areas; employ possible armor units from the area immediately north of the DMZ and/or border areas.

i. Vulnerabilities

(1) Due to the lack of support of the populace, the enemy is forced to expose himself in his efforts to obtain food supplies, thereby making him vulnerable to allied observation devices and techniques, and subsequently allied fire power.

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(2) The enemy is vulnerable to psychological operations, as a result of high casualties, lack of food and medicine, disease, failure to achieve intended goals, and loss of the wide spread support of the populace.

(3) The enemy's major logistic efforts are vulnerable to seasonal monsoons.

(4) The enemy's dependence on his environment is vulnerable as a result of successful pacification efforts.

(5) The enemy is vulnerable to aggressive, sustained, allied offensive operations.

PW, MSGT Pham Vam TA, K-12 Company, 3d Battalion, 246th NVA Regiment, captured on 25 February 1970 approximately 7 kilometers West North West of the Rockpile vic (XD949633) stated the strength of the K-12 Company was 80 men. The PW also stated that the Headquarters 246th Regiment, Headquarters 3d Battalion and 80 men from a support artillery unit were located vic (XD 942622). The source further stated that the mission of the 3d Battalion was to make contact with any Allied units encountered. The source revealed that there were 12x12.7 mm AA guns in the regiment and elements of the 84th Artillery Regiment were operating with his unit. Reported personalities: 246th Regimental CO - LTCOL HOANG CHU; XO - MAJ GIANG; FO - LTCOL HOANG VIET LONG; AFO - MAJ TUY; 3d Battalion CO - SRCAPT HAN; XO 1STLT QUOC; FO - SRCAPT VIET; AFO - 1STLT THAT.

(OOB COMMENT: III MAF OOB holds the 2d Battalion, 84th Rocket Artillery Regiment as probably located vic. (XD8854) which is in the AO of the 246th Regiment. Reported information correlates with III MAF OOB holdings. All information rated (F-3).

2. THUA THIEN (P). Hoi Chanh, Cpl Van THIET, C.114 LF Company, Quang Dien (D) rallied on 28 February 1970, 2 kilometers south of Camp Evans vic (YD550308) (Ref: 101st Abn Div 041009Z Mar 70). He stated that he joined the C.114 LF Company in October 1969, and that at the time his rally the unit consisted of a Headquarters element of 15 personnel and one platoon of 15 personnel. He further stated that 25 of the personnel were NVA. The source also stated the C.114 LF Company base camp was in the jungles of Quang Dien (D) (possibly vic. YD4724). The source further stated the C.114 has never carried out operations against US/ARVN forces. The C.114 has a mission to defend Quang Dien (D). The source also revealed that ammunition resupply was easy to get, but that food was scarce. His unit's supplies were obtained from the 6th NVA Regiment.

(OOB COMMENT: Reported information correlates with III MAF OOB holdings. All information rated (F-3).

3. QUANG NAM (P).

a. FW Huynh Ngoc CHAU, XO of C-2 Company, Q 86 Local Force Armed Unit, Hoa Vang District, Front 44, who was captured 19 February 1970 in the vic of (BTO75680) (Ref: SA Quang Da Special Zone 060601Z Mar 70 Init Interr Rpt) stated, he and several others were hiding in a tunnel in an attempt to evade capture. When the ARVN came close the source left the tunnel and borrowed some women's clothing. The source stated that the VC often dressed in female clothes when travelling because U.S. personnel

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rarely detained females and therefore the VC often avoided being detained and questioned. The source stated the C-2 Company is no longer active and that the original strength of the company was 27 men. However, in subsequent actions all but four were either killed or captured. The four remaining men were sent to the CK 3 Sapper Company. (NFI)

(OOB COMMENT: This is the second report of VC dressing like women to avoid being detained. The CK 3 Sapper Company is organic to the Q 92d City Armed Sapper Unit, Precinct #3, Danang. The CK 3 Sapper Company has been redesignated the Nguyen Huu Thong Company (Sapper). All information is rated (F-3)).

b. FW, Nguyen Van LUONG, Aspirant, XO, 12th Company, Q 82 Local Force Armed Unit, captured 13 February 1970 vic (AT955553) (Ref: CG, 1stMarDiv msg 041715Z Feb 70, Sup Interr rpt (1st Interp Tm 47-02-70)) has revealed more information concerning the disbanding of the 3d Battalion, 36th NVA Regiment. The FW corroborated other reports that the healthy troops of the 13th Infantry Company had been used to reinforce the 11th and 12th Infantry Companies, which were sent to reinforce Dien Ban District Forces (Q 82), and that the Battalion Commander and Political Officer had been assigned jobs at VC Dien Ban District Headquarters. The FW stated the 14th Heavy Weapons Company had remained in the Hon Tau Mountains, and that the sick, as well as the remainder of the Battalion cadre had also remained in the Hon Tau Mountains. The FW further stated that the elements sent to reinforce Dien Ban District local forces would not rejoin the 3d Battalion. However, the FW believes that the 14th Company and the remainder of the Battalion will form the nucleus of a new 3d Battalion, 36th NVA Regiment upon arrival of new troops from North Vietnam.

(OOB COMMENT: It should be noted that this FW's statements conflict with the statements made by the former Commanding Officer of the 3d Battalion, 36th NVA Regiment, who was captured on 16 January 1970. The 14th Company was stated to have been sent to the 3d NVA Sapper Battalion, and that the Battalion cadre and sick were to be reassigned within the 36th Regiment. Additional intelligence will be required to determine if the 3d Battalion, 36th NVA Regiment still forms a potential threat against Allied forces operating in Quang Nam Province. All information rated (F-3)).

4. QUANG TIN (I). No significant reports.

5. QUANG NGAI (I). Foi Chanh, Pham Thi HUE, a female medic from the 48th Local Force Battalion, rallied on 4 March 1970 vic (BS690768) (Ref: 2d ARVN Div msg 060525Z Mar 70) stated that the 48th Local Force Battalion has a strength of 400. The 48th Local Force Battalion received 100 NVA replacements in December 1969, and that additional replacements were to arrive in March. She located the Battalion Command Post at (BS712884); the 1st Company at (BS694846); the 2d Company at (BS694868); the 3d Company at (BS710868) and the 4th Company at (BS725880). The source further stated

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that future missions of the Battalion are to attack the resettlement camps at SON MY (BS736794) and BINH DUC (BS784845). The source, however was not knowledgeable of the dates of these attacks.

(OOB COMMENT: The strength stated by this Hoi Chanh of 400 is greater than currently held by III MAF OOB holdings. This strength however, was confirmed by another Hoi Chanh, and a subsequent strength change will be made by OOB. This Hoi Chanh provides further evidence concerning the bolstering of VC units with NVA personnel, and the continual emphasis the enemy places on attacking and disrupting the GVN pacification effort, All information rated (F-3)).

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ANNEX C (COUNTERINTELLIGENCE) TO III MAF PERINTREP 10-70

1. GENERAL. VC/VCI counterintelligence related activities continue at the relative low level that has been reported during the past few weeks. Enemy efforts continue to be directed towards developing logistic support and a base of popular support in GVN controlled areas. His goal remains the same, the disruption of the GVN pacification program and the US "Vietnamization" of the war.

Enemy sabotage efforts against the Hue-Danang railroad appear to be increasing. Since 3 March three separate acts of sabotage have been reported. The Hue-Danang train detonated explosive charges on two occasions, one on 3 March and on 5 March. One other sabotage attempt was discovered by an EOD team on 3 March 1970. Thus far five acts of sabotage have been directed against the railroad since 15 February 1970.

Only one report of enemy propaganda activity was received this week.

Terrorist activity remained at a relatively low level for the fourth consecutive week. Total casualties resulting from enemy terrorist activity for this reporting period are eighteen killed and eighty-five wounded. Forty-seven of the wounded are the result of a VC mortar attack on Phu Loc #6 Refugee Camp (AT 925526). Five GVN officials were reported to have been assassinated during the week.

Significant miscellaneous reports are as follows:

A Duc Pho District Party Committee directive requiring that the An Quang Buddhist Sect prospective overthrow of the GVN government be supported by the VC.

An activity plan issued by the Quang Ngai Province Committee directing that political struggles be conducted along Highway 1 in Quang Ngai Province.

2. ESPIONAGE. No reports of enemy espionage and/or related activities in ICTZ were received this week.

3. SABOTAGE. Reports of enemy sabotage and/or related activities in ICTZ during the past week consisted of four incidents, as follows:

a. Thua Thien

(1) On 3 March 1970 at approximately 1115H, an EOD Team from the 12th ARVN Railroad Security Group, discovered train derailment charges vicinity (ZD 074010). The charges were placed under the track

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and ties, rigged with pressure firing devices; the charges totaled 33.5 pounds. Explosives used were Chicom TNT.
(Ref: III MAF Spot Rep from 24th Corps TOC DTG 031915H Journal #102)

(2) On 5 March 1970 at approximately 0745H, the Danang-Hue patrol train detonated an unknown type mine with a pressure type firing device vicinity (AT 837975). One box car was heavily damaged, ten meters of track were destroyed and four civilians were wounded.
(Ref: Significant Events Log 050500H-051700H Mar70)

(3) At approximately 1115H, a Danang bound train detonated a VC mine. 50 meters of track were destroyed. There were no personnel casualties.
(Ref: PSA/PSD/CORDS Thua Thien Rpt R-29/03041610)

b. Quang Nam. On 2 March 1970 at approximately 0420H, the Thanh Quit Bridge (BT 042620) was 70% destroyed by an explosion underneath it. The explosive charges are suspected to have been either floated down the river or planted by swimmers. The bridge was guarded by RF Company 796; however, there were no personnel casualties reported.
(Ref: III MAF Spot Rpt from ITOC DTG 020542H, Journal #38)

4. POLITICAL AND PROPAGANDA. Enemy propoganda efforts continue to be directed towards undermining the GVN accelerated pacification program and attempts to lure the people back to VC-controlled areas. No major changes are anticipated in enemy propoganda themes. Only one propoganda incident was reported during the week, as follows:

a. Thua Thien. Approximately one VC company entered Uu Thuong (H), Phong Nguyen (V), Phong Dien (D), and assembled the people for a propoganda lecture. Following the lecture the VC destroyed 85% of the hamlet's fences. The VC also left leaflets calling for ARVN soldiers to fight against the GVN.
(Ref: PSA/PSD/CORDS Thua Thien Rpt R-33/03021530)

5. TERROR. Terrorist activity remained at a relatively low level for the fourth consecutive week. Five late reports from the previous week increase the number of killed to forty-one and the number of wounded to fifty-four. Total casualties for this reporting period are eighteen killed and eighty-five wounded. Forty-seven of the wounded are the result of a VC mortar attack on Phu Loc #6 Refugee Camp. Five GVN officials were reported to have been assassinated during the week.

Details of terrorist incidents are contained in Appendix 1.

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6. MISCELLANEOUS. Enemy efforts continue to be directed towards developing logistic support and a base of popular support in GVN controlled areas. VC proselyting campaigns directed at ARVN units are emphasizing service to the VC rather than the GVN. Enemy proselyting cadre have been redirected to assess the current situation and apply new techniques (nfi) in their efforts to motivate the populace to support the VC.

Significant miscellaneous reports are as follows:

a. Quang Tri. On 24 February 1970, a US MI source reported that the VC operating in the front line region have launched a campaign to call upon the ARVN draftees serving in the front lines to follow them and that they will be returned to their homes. The concentration point will be Nam Dong vicinity (YD 143692). Once they arrive there they will be led to Laos by VC cadre and from there trucked south to their home towns. This campaign has been going on for some time. A number of draftees have followed the VC, but none have been returned to their homes. They were all forced to join the VC/NVA forces. In the past these GVN deserters were used to reinforce NVA units fighting in Laos. After a period of time, if they are still alive, they then will be returned to their homes to work in the guerrilla forces or as informants among the people.

(Ref: Det A 1stMIBn 525th MIGp Rpt #1/B/EX/0042/70 dtd 4Mar70)
(Eval: F-4)

b. Thua Thien. The VC may make an attempt to increase their presence in Phu Thu (D). An unevaluated agent report indicates that the Thua Thien Province Committee has ordered the Phu Thu (D)/Phu Vang (D) Special Service Units to reorganize and actively recruit new members. Allegedly 30 guerrillas have already been recruited for this unit from various villages in Phu Thu (D). The Huong Tra (D) Special Service squad has been ordered to supply the Phu Thu/Phu Vang Special Service Unit with 30 AK-47's, 2 RPG-20's, one 60mm mortar and an unknown quantity of ammunition. The troops and weapons are reportedly to be transported in two boats from Ba Lang (H) (YD 913229) to Luang Vien (H) (YD 925217), sometime between 2-10 March. The weapons will be wrapped in nylon and suspended below the waterline by ropes hanging over the sides. If the boats are searched the ropes will be cut. The boats reportedly will be made to appear as if they are carrying the usual cargo of algae or sugar cane.

(Ref: COMNAVFORV msg 050944Z Mar70)

c. Quang Nam. A PW from C2 Company, Q86 Battalion, Hoa Vang District Force (District 3) Front 44, captured on 19 February 1970 vicinity (BT 075680) has stated that he no longer had a mission as he was relieved of the command since it was completely defunct.

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Source was last with his unit when the remainder of his men were assigned to the CK3 Sapper Company (nfi). He was in the process of walking to the Cai Lanh Refugee Camp when he was spotted by a Marine helicopter at Tra Khe (V), near the point of capture. Source was disguised as a woman in an attempt to evade capture. He stated that the VC often dress as women when in danger of being captured because American troops operating in an area do not generally detain females.
(Ref: SA Quang Da Special Zone msg 030835Z Mar70)

d. Quang Ngai

(1) A US MI source reported that on 12 February 1970, information concerning a VC message which was sent from the Provincial Special Political Section to its region and district subordinates, was discovered in the vicinity of Mang But (BS 429241), Ba Chat (V), Ba To (D). The message was duplicated on a 2 page sheet of magazine paper. The subject of the message was to order lower level cadre to list any hamlet, village and district cadre or troops who have recently been wounded or have been resting at family homes or a rest camp, in order to send him to North Vietnam. The three part message is outlined below:

Part 1: Explain why they were to send their cadre and troops to North Vietnam. In addition the message also said that currently there were some cadre members who could not handle their mission and refused to support the VC government and some intended to defect.

Part 2: Village and district cadre members were divided into three groups:

- a. A faith group consisting of anyone who had high party morale.
- b. A dissatisfied group consisting of anyone who did not believe in the revolution.
- c. A secret traitor group consisting of anyone who had relatives in the GVN.

Part 3: The mission should be carried out before the end of March 1970, so that the Provincial Special Section could forward it to the Central NPLSVN. In May 1970 they would send anyone who was on that list to North Vietnam.

(Ref: Det D 1stMIBn 525th MIGp Rpt #1/B/DX/0205/70 dtd 12Feb70)
(Eval: F-6)

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(2) A US MI source reported that on 22 February 1970, DIEU, a Provincial Security cadre briefed the Son Tinh (D) Security cadre as follows:

Requirements: To determine the situation of the population in Quang Ngai City.

To determine the situation of the Party, ARVN and GVN.

To determine how well the city is defended by the ARVN.

All village level cadre are to list the names of their wounded and submit them to higher headquarters. This list is to be in three parts:

- a. Hard core: Party members of long standing who are devout communists.
- b. Undecided: Anyone who is not a party member but is faithful to the VC.
- c. Traitor: Anyone whose relatives are connected with the ARVN or GVN.

After receiving this list, the province level cadre would decide which of these people would be sent to North Vietnam and which would be sent to a thought reform camp. This is to be completed by April. (Ref: Det D 1stMIBn 525th MIGp Rpt #1/B/DX/0209/70 dtd 25Feb70) (Eval: F-6)

(3) A US MI source reported that on 25 February 1970, a VC meeting was held vicinity (BS 301673) with Province and Son Ha (D) level cadre members present. The purpose of the meeting was to review their previous tasks. The participants recognized that they failed to motivate and lead the inhabitants in conducting anti-GVN demonstrations during the TET holidays. They also failed to motivate inhabitants to point out those relatives who are ARVN members or GVN officials. Before ending the meeting the participants discussed new tasks (nfi). (Ref: Det D 1stMIBn 525th MIGp Rpt #1/3/DX/0224/70 dtd 28Feb70) (Eval: B-2)

(4) An enemy document recovered by elements of the Americal Division operating vicinity (BS 772358) contained the following information:

A directive, classified (VC) Top Secret, number 51/VPTV, dated 6 Dec 1969, signed by Tien CAN for H50 (possibly Current Affairs Committee, Duc Pho District Party Committee, Quang Ngai Province,

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Party Committee Region 5), addressed to various V's and B's (possibly subordinate village Party Committees and district agencies), states that according to information from a higher echelon, the An Quang Buddhist Sect is preparing for a coup d'etat to overthrow the Thieu-Ky-Khiem Government. Two possibilities are anticipated:

- a. Their coup d'etat will succeed quickly.
- b. They may fail but will continue their fight in provinces or districts.

Addressees were instructed to assist the Revolution's struggle in either case. Whether the coup fails or succeeds, addressees should intensify their military actions, political struggles and troop proselyting activities. They should take advantage of every opportunity to destroy US and RVNAF key units and their rear service facilities and disrupt their logistics. Addressees are also instructed to provide food, medicine and weapons to the (An Quang Sect) rebels. (Ref: CDEC Doc Log No. 03-1217-70) (Eval: B-3)

(5) An enemy document recovered by elements of the Americal Division operating in the vicinity of (BS 772358) revealed the following:

An activity plan, dated 24 Sep 1969, signed by Thanh CAM for T865 (possibly Political Struggle Section, Quang Ngai Province Party Committee, Military Region 5), addressed to all subordinate districts concerns political struggles to be staged throughout Quang Ngai Province during the winter of 1969.

The purposes of these struggles were to:

- a. Effectively counter the enemy's (FVMAF/RVNAF) pacification plan.
- b. Bolster such "legal" movements (movements that were conducted in RVN controlled areas under RVN legal status) such as the workers', students', Buddhist followers' and (RVNAF) soldiers' movements.
- c. Consolidate a political struggle movement along Route 1.

It was further noted that the cited political struggle movement should be regarded as of vital importance, since the areas bordering Route 1 (in Quang Ngai Province) were populated by as many as 250,000 people.

The plan also prescribes that each subordinate district should be able to motivate 2,000 to 5,000 persons each month to take part in political struggles. In addition, the population in various districts

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were to be regimented into political struggle forces on the following bases:

10,000 persons for each of the three districts of Duc Pho, Mo Duc and Binh Son.

5,000 persons for each of the two districts of Son Tinh and Tu Nghia.

5,000 persons for Nghia Hanh District and 10,000 persons for the city (Quang Ngai Province Capital).
