PART IINARRATIVE SUMMARY1. INTRODUCTION

a. GENERAL. General Leonard F. CHAPMAN, Jr., Commandant of the Marine Corps, visited III MAF units here between 16 and 19 July 1970. The General was greeted by Lieutenant General Keith B. McCUTCHEON and briefed on the current tactical situation in I Military Region. III MAF Headquarters was also visited by Lieutenant General William K. JONES, Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, on 14 and 15 July 1970. During July 1970, III Marine Amphibious Force Headquarters was located in northwest Danang, Quang Nam Province, Republic of Vietnam. The average Marine/Navy personnel strength in IMR was 39,999, a decrease of 1,247 under the previous month.

b. ACTIVITIES. III Marine Amphibious Force continued to be guided by COMUSMACV Directive 10-11 dated 5 April 1970 in pursuit of its objectives for July 1970.

2. OVERALL EVALUATION

a. Enemy contact and initiated activity throughout the Marine's Tactical Zone during the month of July decreased, and was characterized by widely scattered harrassing fire and limited ground engagements. Enemy KIA decreased to 456 as compared to 629 reported the previous month. Enemy terrorism incidents declined over the month as well with no reported incidents of propaganda activity.

b. One major named operation was initiated during the month of July. At 0730 hours on the morning of 16 July Operation "PICKENS FOREST" was commenced. Elements of the 7th Marines and one company from the 5th Marines were inserted at FSB Defiant to conduct CATEGORY III type operations in the vicinity and along the Son Thu Bon River. The operation has accounted for 65 enemy KIA and 46 weapons captured for the month.

c. Mines and booby-traps continue to be the major cause of casualties among Marine units. During the month there were 101 mine incidents involving Marines that accounted for 11 Marines killed, 177 wounded, 154 of which required evacuation. These figures represent 60% of the total casualties suffered by Marine units during the month as a result of mines and booby-traps.

b. EVENTS. During the month of July 1970, the following significant contacts were reported in chronological order:

At 010130H, CAP 4-2-3 ambush, 12 Kms southeast Quang Tri City, initiated organic weapons fire on estimated 40 enemy. The enemy returned fire with small arms and RPG's and fled to the west. A sweep of the area disclosed 5 VC killed, 5 IW's, 3 60MM HE mortar rounds, 1 pair of Chinese field glasses, and 2 satchel charges captured. During the contact 1 PF was killed and 2 USMC wounded requiring evacuation.

At 011815H, Recon Team PAL JOEY KILO, 5 Kms east of An Hoa, observed 5 enemy sitting in a harbor site. The enemy wore dark utilities and carried packs and weapons. An artillery fire mission was called resulting in all 5 NVA killed.

At 030825H, 400 meters south of Golden Gate Bridge, a 3/4 ton personnel carrier from "D" Company, 7th Engineer Battalion while traveling south on Route 1-D detonated a 40 pound rock mine. The truck was completely destroyed. Total casualties were 9 USMC and 1 USN wounded, all of whom required evacuation.

At 030945H, 800 meters south Golden Gate Bridge, a Navy 1,000 gallon water truck while traveling south on Route 1-D detonated a 40 pound rock mine. At 1010H, in the same location, an M-151 jeep from "M" Company, 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines, enroute to the scene detonated a similar type mine. The water tanker received moderate damage while the jeep was assessed a combat loss. Total casualties were 2 USMC, 1 USN killed and 2 USN wounded requiring evacuation.

At 091200H, 4 Kms east of An Hoa, the lead truck in a 11th Motor Transport Battalion convoy detonated a 40 to 60 pound box mine. Total casualties were 1 USMC wounded and evacuated. The truck was assessed a combat loss.

At 091935H, CAP 2-7-5 patrol base, 2½ Kms southwest of Marble Mountain, received M-79 fire, RPG's, Chicom grenades and small arms fire from an unknown size enemy force. Organic weapons fire was returned causing the enemy to break contact and flee south. A reaction force was requested from "H" Company, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines who moved to block suspected enemy escape routes, assist in the evacuation of the wounded and conduct a sweep of the area which produced 6 VC killed. During the contact 3 PF were killed, 6 USMC and 3 PF wounded, all of which required evacuation.

At 092015H, a squad from "L" Company, 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines, 2 Kms northwest of Namu Bridge, while in an ambush site received small arms fire and 4 RPG's from an unknown size enemy force. The squad returned organic weapons fire and called artillery fire missions on suspected enemy locations. During the contact 1 USMC was killed and 5 USMC wounded, three of which required evacuation. A sweep of the area was conducted with negative results.

At 110725H, a force consisting of 4 CAP's, 2-3-1, 2-1-3, 2-3-3 and 2-3-6, and a non CAP PF Platoon, 1 Km north of Dien Ban, conducted a clear and search operation that resulted in 5 VC killed, 3 local force VC guerillas and 1 individual weapon captured. There were no friendly casualties.

At 111120H, a fire team from "C" Company, 1st Battalion, 7th Marines, 4 Kms west of FSB Baldy, while set in an OP position received 2 M-26 grenades and automatic weapons fire from an unknown size enemy force. A platoon reaction force was dispatched and swept the area with negative results. During the contact 3 USMC were killed and 1 USMC wounded requiring evacuation. Also lost to the enemy was 1 ANPRC-25 radio and 1 M-16 rifle.

At 112045H, Recon Team PAL JOEY MIKE, 3½ Kms northeast Outpost Reno, observed 22 enemy moving on a trail. An artillery fire mission was called resulting in 5 NVA killed.

At 131000H, a squad from "L" Company, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines, 4 Kms southeast of FSB Ryder, found a cache consisting of 4 tons of unpolished rice 10 tin cans containing small amounts of explosives.

At 131130H, a platoon from "H" Company, 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines, 5 Kms west of FSB Baldy, observed 1 enemy with a weapon approximately 30 meters away. Small arms fire was initiated wounding the enemy who fled in an easterly direction. The platoon followed his blood trail to the entrance of a cave where they found him dead. The platoon threw M-26 hand grenades into the cave prior to conducting a search. While searching the cave, the platoon received 2 M-26 hand grenades that resulted in 4 USMC's being wounded requiring evacuation. The platoon returned fire and completed a search of the cave that resulted in 8 VC killed, 20 VC, 4 individual weapons, 1 PRC-25 radio, 2 other radios, 1 pair of field glasses, assorted medical supplies, documents and food captured.

At 150330H, "H" Company, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines, 2 Kms east of Tu Cau Bridge, while in a night defensive position received 3 hand grenades from an unknown size enemy force. Organic weapons fire was returned by the company causing the enemy to break contact. A sweep of the area at first light revealed 1 VC killed. During the contact 1 USMC was killed and 2 other USMC wounded and evacuated.

At 171400H, a platoon from "E" Company, 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines, 8 Kms east of FSB Dart, while on a patrol discovered an enemy arms cache hidden in caves and bunkers. The cache contained 20 cases 7.62mm ammunition, 12 mortar rounds, 4 Russia anti-tank mines, 2 cases of TNT, 8 light machine-guns, 17 SKS', 67,680 AK-47 rounds, 378 60mm mortar rounds, 350 82mm mortar rounds, 180 60mm fuzes, 30 pounds of TNT, 22 nonmetallic anti-tank mines, 8 Chicom grenades and 82 recoilless rifle rounds.

At 180845H, a platoon from "B" Company, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines, 5 Kms northwest of FSB Rawhide, while in defensive position observed 9 enemy carrying packs and weapons moving east. An artillery fire mission was called resulting in 7 VC killed.

At 181800H, CAP 1-3-5 patrol, 9 Kms east of Bin Son, observed 12 VC sitting in a harbor site. The patrol initiated organic weapons fire causing the enemy to flee east. A sweep of the area disclosed 5 VC killed, 2 Chicom grenades, 4 hammocks, assorted clothing and medical supplies captured. There were no friendly casualties.

At 191530H, a UH-1E from HML-167, in Quang Nam Recon Zone, while flying a visual reconnaissance mission received ground fire, was hit, broke in half in the air and crashed. The aircraft was completely destroyed and 4 USMC crew members killed.

At 221435H, Recon Team OFFSPRING, 5 Kms northwest of Dong Den Mountain, while airborne and approaching a LZ received heavy small arms and automatic weapons fire from 10-15 enemy. Gunships employed on board ordnance killing 8 NVA. There were no friendly casualties.

At 231025H, a M-51 truck from "B" Company, 7th Engineers, 3 Kms south of Hill 55, while traveling Route 4 detonated a 20-30 pound rock mine. The truck was assessed a combat loss and 1 USMC was wounded and evacuated.

At 231622H, Recon Team MOON DASH, 6 Kms southwest of Dong Den Mountain, observed 6 to 10 enemy dressed in green utilities carrying rifles and 782 gear. The enemy were engaged with small arms fire and returned fire with small arms and grenades. During the contact 5 NVA were killed and 2 USMC wounded. The team moved to a LZ and was extracted.

At 260508H, an AO flying with a Nighthawk Air Patrol from HML-167, 4 Kms north of An Hoa, observed 12 enemy dressed in green uniforms standing in the open around huts. The AO employed on board ordnance resulting in 9 NVA killed. Then at 0605H, 1 Km to the west of An Hoa, the aircraft

received small arms fire from 4 enemy who then fled into a treeline. The aircraft fired on board ordnance resulting in 5 VC killed. The aircraft was not hit and there were no friendly casualties.

At 291155H, a squad patrol from "E" Company, 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines, 8½ Kms east of FSB Dart, guided by a Hoi Chanh found an enemy ammunition cache containing 10 82mm and 30 60mm mortar rounds, 6 RPG rounds, 3,720 7.62mm rounds, 6 empty 122mm rocket boxes and 2 sets of NVA uniforms.

At 311100H, a platoon from "K" Company, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines, 3 Kms west of FSB Ross, while on patrol suffered heavy casualties from the explosion of a command detonated booby trap. The booby trap consisted of 1 82mm mortar round and 1 M-26 grenade rigged to a hellbox from a claymore mine. Total casualties were 2 USMC killed and 12 USMC wounded requiring evacuation.

(2) Stars & Stripes

(a) During the month 256,900 free issues of Stars & Stripes newspaper were distributed to III MAF personnel.

(3) R&R Activities (Out-of-Country)

(a) The U.S. Army assumed the responsibility for the operation of the Danang R&R Center on 1 July 1970. JSNAWF property consisting of 5 busses, photo copy equipment and public address system valued at \$42,065.25 was transferred to the Army without reimbursement.

(b) The total number of R&R seats allotted to III MAF for the month of July was 2174. The total number of R&R (Confirmed and Standby) and leave personnel for the month was 2511 resulting in a 111% utilization of seats.

(4) Lieutenant Colonel K. J. CLIFFORD was assigned as Special Services/R&R Officer effective 20 July 1970, vice Lieutenant Colonel J. M. VOSMIK who returned to CONUS.

5. Intelligence

a. General Enemy Situation. Enemy initiated activity for the reporting period remained at last month's relatively low level. Major enemy tactical units remained out of contact with Allied combat forces despite intelligence which suggested an attempted high point during the period 7-11 July.

On 7 July elements of the 5th Marines captured a PW from the R20th Battalion, one and one half kilometers southwest of Dai Loc District Headquarters (AT 905565). The PW stated that the mission of his unit was to coordinate with the Q82 District Armed Unit in attacking Allied forces in Dien Ban District.

On the 8th, the 194th RF Company engaged an unknown size enemy force while searching two tunnels three kilometers southwest of Hoi An (BT 134534). Ten enemy were killed and one captured. The PW was identified as a member of the reconnaissance squad of the V-25th Battalion.

In Da Nang City on the 9th, some areas experienced a temporary disruption of electrical power when a plastic explosive was detonated at one of the city's power plants.

In the 7th Marines AO on 13 July a patrol found 28 bunkers as well as four tons of rice, assorted tools, and ten surprise firing devices while conducting an operation eight kilometers southwest of Que Son District Headquarters (AT 969309). On the same day, another patrol from the 7th Marines engaged an enemy force in a cave complex five kilometers west of Fire Support Base Baldy (BT 083444). The patrol killed seven enemy and captured miscellaneous weapons and equipment, including two PRC-25 radios, several documents and medical supplies.

A probable sabotage incident was pre-empted on 18 July when three 16 pound bags of C-4, 40 feet of detonation cord, and six blasting caps were discovered in a shack at the Tien Sha ramp (BT 025835).

On the 19th, Reconnaissance team "Offspring" was extracted after making contact with a 13 man enemy force 10 kilometers northwest of Fire Support Base Ross (AT 955418). The team killed 10 enemy before being extracted. The same day in the Elephant Valley area, Reconnaissance team "Aunt Mable" made contact with an unknown size enemy force 16 kilometers west of Nam O bridge (ZC 187837).

On the 26th, team "Fluid Pipe" made contact with an enemy force in the same area. The enemy was wearing camouflage paint on their faces. Also on the 26th in an area 10 kilometers northwest of Hiep Duc (AT 805276) elements of the 7th Marines engaged an unknown size enemy force during the night. A sweep of the area at daylight revealed 24 packs containing miscellaneous equipment, supplies, and documents, including 275 blasting caps and 10 underwater mines.

c. Enemy Order of Battle. Confirmed forces operating in Quang Nam Province as of 31 July 1970.

Enemy forces in Quang Nam Province consisted of Front 4 Headquarters and support units, the 31st, 38th, and 141st Regiments and 12 independent Battalions. The independent Battalions were the D.26 Communication Battalion, 573rd, 575th, 577th NVA Rocket Battalions, the 3rd, T.87th, T.89th, and the 490th NVA Sapper Battalion, V-25th Infantry Battalion, the 42nd Reconnaissance Battalion, the R.20th, and the D-3 Infantry Battalions. Additionally there are approximately 3,790 administrative personnel and 3,911 guerrillas. The total enemy strength for the Province was estimated at 15,206.

d. Counterintelligence

(1) Counterintelligence Monthly Overview. Considering ^{that} the month of July allowed for six National and International holidays normally observed by Communist and pro-communist countries, and four Viet Cong historical dates/holidays, VC/VCI counterintelligence related activity declined substantially in comparison to previous months. Of significant interest was the noticeable reduction of KIA's, WIA's and property damage resulting from VC terrorist activity. However, the one sabotage and three terrorist incidents within the city of Danang are indicative of the enemy's continued capability to strike at targets of opportunity.

(2) Terrorism and Propaganda. There was an approximate 25% decrease in terrorist incidents from the previous month (25 vice 32) with a significant reduction in the number of KIA's and WIA's. The number of victims and houses damaged/destroyed is as follows:

There was only one incident in which a GVN Hamlet/Village official was the victim of a VC terrorist incident.

There were no reported incidents of VC Propaganda/Proselyting activity during the month.

(3) Subversion. No incident of subversion is known to have occurred during the month.

(4) Sabotage. Within the III MAF AO, there was only one reported sabotage incident which occurred at 2025 on 9 July 1970. The VC placed and detonated a one-pound plastic explosive charge in the Electric Plant located in the city of Danang (BT 036779), resulting in damage to the Electric Plant and two VN civilians wounded in the action.

(5) Espionage. There were no reported incidents of espionage known to have occurred during the month. However, it can be reasonably assumed that the VC/VCI maintain a continuing collection effort within the III MAF AO for the purpose of identifying prospective targets.

(2) Ordnance

(a) ASP #2 and FLC ASP's at Chu Lai and LZ Baldy were inspected during July. All sites were found to be satisfactory in all respects.

(b) A violation of safety precautions by ARVN personnel in their portion of ASP #1 resulted in an explosion of detonators which wounded one ARVN officer and four female workers. There was no materiel damage within the U. S. Marine portion of the ASP. Coincidental with this incident, a strong letter calling attention to safety regulations and violations thereof was dispatched from the CG, FLC to the CG, I Corps.

(c) Based on present stockage and anticipated deliveries, the decision was made to retain the available supply rate for 175mm HE ammunition at 80 percent. The CG, FMFPAC was informed accordingly.

(5) Common Service Support. During July problem areas were experienced in connection with common service support being provided by the Army. A meeting hosted by Army Support Command, Da Nang, was held on 13 July, at which time the adequacy of support as well as real and potential problems were discussed. Close liaison continues in order to effect smooth support in all areas of common service.

(6) Conferences. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4 returned to this Headquarters on 4 July after attending a Movements Planning Conference, which began on 29 June in Hawaii. The Force Embarkation Officer, who had accompanied the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4, remained at the conference until 12 July.

c. Embarkation Summary. During July a total of six amphibious ships were used to transport troops and equipment to CONUS and Japan in connection with Keystone Robin (Alpha) redeployment.

d. Engineer Summary

(1) Land clearing operations within the 2d ROKMC Bde area of operation continued during July. A cumulative total of 1570 acres had been cleared by month's end.

(2) Upgrading LTL 4 to an all weather road, including a six inch rock cap between route ML 1D and route 540, was completed on 24 July. This project commenced in late April with intermediate completions in land clearing and upgrading during the intervening months. The enemy heavily mined the road to prevent progress. Although twenty-five mines were detected and cleared during this project, there were 17 mine incidents. This resulted in two KIA's, 29 WIA's and destruction of eight major items of engineer equipment. The entire project involved hauling approximately 17,300 cubic yards of laterite, 10,150 cubic yards of rock and 223,000 gallons of water for upgrading 5.5 kilometers of road.

(3) Work begun on Go Noi Island during June was temporarily suspended during July.

e. Supply Summary

(1) Force Supply Officer, Col. J. C. BOULWARE, USMC, was relieved on 17 July by Col. C. H. SCHMID, USMC.

(2) The Assistant Force Supply Officer attended a CONEX Container Control Conference held in Saigon on 20 July. The conference was sponsored and hosted by COMUSMACV. Procedures for record keeping, reporting, maintenance, inspection, salvage, transfer, and loss were reviewed. Following the conference, related guidance was published by III MAF

(3) III MAF message 280336Z Jul 70 established a program for allocation of monsoon clothing and supplies within III MAF.

f. Dental Summary. Dental Civic Action (Medcap 11) conducted by III MAF Dental Units during July resulted in 1948 dental procedures and treatment of 1134 patients.

g. Medical Summary

(1) The Force Surgeon attended a Component Surgeons' Conference in Saigon on 2 July. Sponsored and hosted by COMUSMACV, the conference concerned the forthcoming July repair availability (RAV) period for the USS Sanctuary and was followed on 10 July by a conference aboard the USS Sanctuary to discuss this same matter. The latter conference was chaired by the USARV Surgeon, and it was recommended that the USS Sanctuary proceed as scheduled on 25 July to Subic Bay for RAV.

(2) Medical aid stations were inspected during July at 11th Motor Transport Battalion, 1st Battalion, 11th Marines and 1st 8" Howitzer Battery. Critiques followed the inspections.

(3) Patient load for 1st Medical Battalion during July averaged 127, with a total of 819 admitted and 210 patients evacuated out-of-country. A total of 697 units of whole blood was expended during the month.

(4) There was a total of 116 malaria cases during July.

(5) Information concerning III MAF in-patient facilities during July follows:

c. Civic Action Projects. The following are highlights of significant civic action projects conducted during the month of July 1970:

(1) 1st Marine Division reports the following:

(a) Go Noi Island Resettlement Project

1 USMC assistance to the Go Noi Island Resettlement Project has been terminated because of redeployment considerations and other priority projects.

2 The project is aimed at returning as many as 17,000 refugees, former inhabitants of the island, to their lands prior to the onset of the fall monsoon.

3 The original concept for the project was proposed by the Commanding General, 1st Marine Division, in July 1969, during Operation Pipestone Canyon (May-November 1969). The operation cleared the enemy from Go Noi Island and denied him staging areas and infiltration routes. The concept was studied and further developed by CORDS Agencies at regional and national levels.

4 In the spring of 1970, the Quang Nam Province Chief began a modest resettlement project and requested U.S. Marine assistance in preparing a site for a small village (100 houses) on the eastern tip of the island. Four Marine bulldozers were made available and operated for three weeks in April 1970, preparing the village site. This work included the preparation of a defensive berm for the new village Phu Loc.

5 At the outset of the project a pattern of cooperation and coordination was established that was to characterize the entire project. GVN province officials exercised overall direction of the effort that included installation and operation of a ferry by ARVN Engineers while ROK Marine and U.S. Marine bulldozers went to work. The GVN provided political support and security was coordinated between ROK Marines, ARVN, and RF Forces.

6 The project was progressing satisfactorily, if slowly, until by the end of May 1970, 65 houses had been constructed at Phu Loc. However, the majority of the 400 people involved did not spend their nights on the island.

7 In late May 1970, the project was accelerated and expanded when the GVN determined to resettle 17,000 people in Three new villages in the summer months before the arrival of the monsoon season. Additional U.S. assistance was requested.

8 The expanded project represented a challenge of considerable magnitude. The Commanding General, XXIV Corps responded by authorizing the diversion of an already fully committed engineer effort and offered such other assistance as was necessary. The Commanding General, III MAF authorized the commitment of U.S. Marine Engineer assets and appropriate construction materials. The Commanding General, 1st Marine Division was tasked with planning, coordination, and supervision of the U.S. efforts in support of the Vietnamese plan. U.S. Naval support was also elicited for bridge construction.

9 U.S. Marine Engineer and U.S. Navy Construction units were immediately tasked. A detailed plan was developed, and a Marine onsite project coordinator was designated.

10 Detailed plans called for the installation of a temporary floating bridge, a permanent bridge, and all-weather access road. Two additional villages sites, on-island roads, the clearing and plowing of approximately 2,000 hectares of overgrown land, and the furnishing of limited fortification and construction materials.

11 Work began even as the plans were being completed. U.S. Army "Flying Crane" helicopters lifted Marine Corps diskharrows onto the island where they were towed by Korean Marine tractors in clearing and plowing approximately 100 acres of land adjacent to the first village so that crops could be planted immediately. Locations of road, bridge, and village sites were determined and approved by the GVN as were procedures for locating, marking, and, in some cases, relocating gravesites.

12 Security arrangement typified the close coordination and cooperation of the participating units. The Commanding General, 1st Marine Division was charged with responsibility for the security of U.S. personnel and equipment employed on the project. However, since Go Noi Island lies within the tactical area of responsibility of ROK Marine Corps actual security was provided by ROK forces and Vietnamese Regional Forces. Both the ROK and Vietnamese forces were most cooperative and responsive to the security needs of the project with the result that there were no enemy initiated incidents.

13 All U.S. engineering assets were withdrawn from the project on 21 July 1970. This was necessitated by redeployment considerations and other priority projects. All of

the tasks originally conceived were not completed although those essential to continuation and the successful completion of the project were finished.

15 The following are considered to be highlights in connection with the project:

a. The cooperation, willingness, and sense of urgency displayed by all U.S. elements participating in the project.

b. The spirit of cooperation and coordination apparent among U.S., Korean, and GVN forces in security matters.

c. The interest and involvement of the GVN at the province level.

d. The pioneer spirit, the industry, and the increasing confidence displayed by the refugees being resettled and the RF/PF security units.

16 In addition, the circumstances surrounding the dunnage lumber delivered to the project are of interest. It was originally planned that house frames would be provided by the settlers out of locally obtainable bamboo. After the construction of the first 100 houses, however, the supply of bamboo was exhausted and further progress was threatened. The dunnage lumber provided was generally good but came in a variety of sizes. To remedy this, a mobile sawmill was provided and useable wood was cut at the village site. The help of the people in pulling nails from the wood in return for truck rides to gather fire wood resulted in faster construction of homes, higher earnings for the villagers, and greater participation in the resettlement project. Each family pays 2,500 \$VN for the wood to build their house with the money being turned over to the village council for use of village projects in the future.

17 The impetus given to the Go Noi Resettlement Project by GVN and Allied Forces has provided sufficient momentum for the success of the project. 1st Marine Division will continue to provide assistance for the Go Noi project on a "as required" basis. Progress has been good and while it may be expected to slow somewhat in the future a firm civilian foothold has been established.

d. 1st Marine Division reports the following additional items:

(1) Milk projects are continuing in Headquarters Battalion, 3/11, and 5th Marines CAAOR's, with 5th Marines having distributed a total of 1,045 gallons of milk during the month at Go Chua Hamlet, Loc Thanh Village, and A Dong Hamlet.

(2) A school was constructed at Soc Son Hamlet in the 5th Marines area of responsibility. The school was a joint Marine Corps-International Rescue Commission project, with IRC providing food for a Food-for-Work program. The grand opening of the school on 30 July 1970 was attended by representatives from Quang Nam Province and the 1st Marine Division G-5.

e. 1st Marine Aircraft Wing reports the following:

The MAG-11 chicken raising projects in Co Man Hamlet have continued with considerable progress. Of the 190 chicks supplied to two interested villagers on 23 May 1970, only six chickens have died... Because of the medical, hygienic, and feed care provided by the Vietnamese, no future large losses are

expected. Coops were built prior to the delivery of the chickens. A contract was drawn up with twenty-five percent of the net profit to go to the farmers. The Vietnamese supply the care and handling while the Civic Action team supplies the feed and medicine. One of the reasons for the project's success is the joint ownership created by the contract. Since the project's start, residents of other hamlets in MAG-11's CAAOR have asked for assistance in starting similar projects.

f. Force Logistic Command completed the repair and painting of the Maternity Hospital in Xuan Thieu. The building was completely painted inside and out, new screens were installed on the windows, and an additional room was built onto the rear of the hospital.


