

PART IINARRATIVE SUMMARY1. INTRODUCTION

a. GENERAL. Admiral John S. McCain Jr., Commander in Chief, Pacific, visited III MAF on 19 August 1970. Admiral McCain was greeted by Lieutenant General Keith B. McCUTCHEON and then briefed on the current tactical situation in Military Region 1. During August 1970, III Marine Amphibious Force was located in northwest Danang, Quang Nam Province, Republic of Vietnam. The average Marine/Navy personnel strength in Military Region 1 was 39,566, a decrease of 433 under the previous month.

b. ACTIVITIES. III Marine Amphibious Force continued to be guided by COMUSMACV Directive 10-11 dated 5 April 1970 and VICT-ICTZ Combined Campaign Plan 1970 of 13 December 1969 in pursuit of its objective for August 1970.

2. OVERALL EVALUATION

a. Incidents of enemy initiated activities continued to reflect a decrease during the month of August characterized by widely scattered harrasing fire. Enemy KIA decreased to 256 as compared to 456 the previous month. Enemy terrorism incidents for the reporting period remained at a relatively low level with no significant change from the previous month. There were only three reported incidents of VC propaganda actually being distributed, but several incidents involving the death or capture of VC who had propaganda material in their possession.

b. There were four major named operations continued or initiated during August 1970. Operation "PICKENS FOREST" terminated on 24 August with a total of 2 USMC KIA, 20 USMC WIA, 34 Enemy KIA and 5 individual weapons captured. Operation "LYON VALLEY" was conducted by 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines from 16 August through 24 August 1970 and resulted in 5 Enemy KIA and 8 individual weapons captured. Operation "RIPLEY CENTER" was conducted by 7th Marines (-) and "A" Company, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines from 13 August 1970 to 31 August 1970. This operation terminated with 27 USMC WIA, 25 Enemy KIA and 7 individual weapons captured. Operation "IMPERIAL LAKE" was commenced on 31 August by 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines with negative results for the month.

c. The number of mine and booby trap incidents decreased to 84 as compared to 101 from the previous month. Mines and booby traps accounted for 11 Marines killed, 173 wounded, 156 of which were evacuated. These figures represent 54% of the total casualties suffered by Marine units during the month of August as a result of mines and booby traps.

a. GENERAL. During the month of August 1970, there were three major named operations commenced in Quang Nam Province of Military Region I by Marine units. Two of the operations have been terminated together with the operation continued from July 1970. Results of the operations for the month are listed below:

b. EVENTS. During the month of August 1970, the following significant contacts were reported in chronological order:

At 011200H, a platoon patrol from "I" Company, 3rd Battalion, 7th Marines, 6 Kms northwest of FSB Ross, guided by a Hoi Chanh in search of an enemy hospital observed 2 enemy standing near a bunker. The enemy were challenged but failed to respond and attempted to flee. Small arms fire was initiated against the fleeing enemy resulting in 2 VC killed. A sweep of the area revealed an enemy hospital complex containing 11 AK-47's, 1 M-79 with 15 rounds, 1 SKS rifle, 1 carbine, 15 Chicom grenades, 1 B-40 rocket launcher with 6 rounds, 1 Singer sewing machine, 300 pounds of assorted documents, 200 pounds of clothing, 800 pounds of rice and a large amount of medical supplies captured. There were no friendly casualties.

At 012255H, a platoon from "B" Company, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines, 6 Kms southeast Marble Mountain, while set in a defensive position received 2 M-26 grenades from an unknown size enemy force. Fire was not returned due to lack of a discernable target. A sweep of the area under illumination was conducted with negative results. During the contact 1 USMC was killed and 2 USMC wounded requiring evacuation.

At 040315H, Recon Team HANSWORTH, while set in a night defensive position received grenades, TNT bamboo bombs and small arms fire from an unknown

size enemy force. Organic weapons fire was returned with unknown results and an AO called on station. During the contact 1 USMC was killed and 2 USMC wounded requiring evacuation.

At 041430H, a platoon from "G" Company, 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines, 8 Kms south of Marble Mountain, while on a sweep operation engaged an unknown size enemy force located in a bunker complex with organic weapons fire causing the enemy to flee. Supported by gunships, the fleeing enemy were pursued resulting in 12 VC killed and 12 VCS detained. A search of the bunkers produced 8 individual weapons, 12 M-26 grenades, 2 Chicom grenades, miscellaneous 782 gear, medical supplies, assorted documents and foodstuffs captured. There were no friendly casualties.

At 060025H, An Hoa Combat Base received 11 120mm mortar rounds resulting in 8 USMC wounded, three of which required evacuation. At least one of the incoming rounds contained CS gas. Artillery and 81mm mortar fire missions were directed against suspected enemy locations followed by a sweep of the area with negative results.

Between 070530H and 071230H, elements of "A" Company, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, 4 Kms southeast of Hill 425, while conducting pacificer operations discovered an enemy base camp large enough to hold 50 men. A search of the camp resulted in cooking utensils, 90 pounds of foodstuff, and assorted medical supplies captured. The base camp was destroyed without incident.

At 072020H, a squad patrol from CAP 2-3-2, 2 Kms northwest of Dien Ban, received M-79 and small arms fire from an unknown size enemy force. The patrol returned fire with small arms causing the enemy to break contact. During the engagement 1 USMC and 2 PF were wounded requiring evacuation. At 072115H, while evacuation of the wounded was being conducted, a CH-46D received ground fire, was hit, burst into flames and crashed resulting in 2 USMC killed and 4 USMC wounded requiring evacuation. One of the PF wounded was killed as a result of the crash.

At 080001H, elements of "B" Company, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, 6 Kms south of Marble Mountain, while set in an ambush position received 4 to 5 M-26 grenades from an unknown size enemy force located approximately 30 meters north of their position. The unit returned fire with small arms causing the enemy to break contact. A subsequent sweep of the area was made with negative results. During the contact 1 USMC was killed and 2 USMC wounded requiring evacuation.

At 081300H, An Hoa Combat Base received 9 122mm rockets. There were no casualties or material damage. Artillery fire missions were directed against a suspected enemy launch site and a platoon from "G" Company, 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, was inserted into the area to conduct a search with negative results.

At 081330H, Recon Team CLAY PIPE, 3 Kms southwest of Hill 425, while on patrol discovered an enemy base camp consisting of 4 huts with bunkers and occupied by 15 to 20 enemy. The enemy were engaged with grenades and small arms fire resulting in 9 NVA killed and 1 USMC wounded. An AO was called on station and a secondary explosion observed when on board ordnance was fired. The team moved to a LZ and was subsequently extracted.

At 092330H, Recon Team PAL JOEY, at LZ Sage, received 5 60mm mortar rounds, 5 RPG rounds and small arms fire followed by a ground attack from an estimated 25 enemy. The enemy were engaged with organic weapons fire resulting in 5 VC killed. Later 3 more VC were killed by artillery as they attempted to recover their dead. Other artillery fire missions were employed on suspected enemy mortar positions with unknown results. There were no friendly casualties.

At 121615H, a member of a joint platoon patrol from "G" Company, 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, 4 Kms northeast of An Hoa, detonated a 155mm round rigged with a pressure type firing device. Total casualties were 5 USMC killed, 15 USMC wounded requiring evacuation, and 2 USMC receiving minor wounds.

At 181250H, a UH-1E from HML-167, 7 Kms northeast of FSB Baldy, received ground fire, was hit, crashed and burned. The aircraft was completely destroyed and 3 USMC crew members killed.

At 190930H, a platoon from "F" Company, 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, 6 Kms east of LZ Dagger, while on patrol found an enemy base camp consisting of 5 huts with bunkers. A search of the camp produced 4,500 pounds of corn, 1,800 pounds of rice, 100 pounds of salt, assorted booby trap material, 3 88mm mortar rounds, 3 Chicom grenades, 1 122mm rocket round, 3 hell boxes and 3 NVA uniforms. The foodstuff was evacuated and the bunkers and ordnance destroyed.

At 200915H, a squad patrol from "H" Company, 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines, 4 Kms northeast of FSB Hatchett, received heavy machine gun and M-79 fire from a platoon or larger size enemy force set in an L-shaped ambush. The patrol returned organic weapons fire and called for artillery and air strikes. The remainder of the 3rd Platoon arrived to reinforce the engaged squad causing the enemy to break contact. During the contact 3 NVA were killed, 1 USMC killed, and 9 USMC wounded, six of whom required evacuation.

At 220930H, the point man of a "G" Company, 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines, tactical column, 5 Kms northeast of FSB Hatchett, observed a 81mm and a 60mm mortar round rigged as a booby trap. While searching for evidence of other booby traps, he detonated a M-26 booby trap. A corpsman who moved into the area detonated a second M-26 booby trap. Total casualties were 6 USMC and 1 USN wounded, all of whom required evacuation.

At 250530H, a fire team from "B" Company, 1st Battalion, 1st Marines, 4 Kms southwest of Hill 10, while set in a ambush position observed 35-40 enemy pass it's position at a distance of five meters. Approximately two squads were allowed to pass through the killing zone before the fire team opened fire with organic weapons and effected a hasty withdrawal. A artillery fire mission was called on the area. A subsequent sweep of the area revealed 3 VC killed. There were no friendly casualties.

At 250820H, a CH-46 from HMM-265, 17 Kms north of Thuong Duc, lost its rotor RPM's as it was letting down into a LZ, crashed and burned. The aircraft was destroyed and from the crew and 14 passengers aboard only 1 USMC and 1 CIDG received minor injuries.

At 251145H, a CH-46 from HMM-364, 10 Kms southwest of An Hoa Combat Base, crashed and burned resulting in 3 USMC injured, two of which required evacuation. The aircraft was in a landing approach which terminated in a hover slightly short of the LZ. A rapid increase in power was required which resulted in decaying rotor RPM.

At 271100, a Marine from "M" Company, 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines, 2 Kms northeast of Liberty Bridge, detonated a booby trapped 81mm mortar round. A corpsman moving into the area detonated a second booby trapped 81mm mortar round. The rounds were rigged with trip wires and concealed in a fence line. Total casualties were 4 USMC and 1 USN wounded requiring evacuation.

At 300100H, An Hoa Combat Base received 25 82mm mortar rounds. There were no friendly casualties or material damage. This attack was coordinated with a mortar attack on the CP of the 258th Vietnamese Marine Brigade and a mortar and sapper attack on a Buddhist Orphanage and Hospital Complex located nearby. The 258th Vietnamese Marine Brigade received 100 82mm rounds resulting in 51 wounded. The Buddhist Orphanage and Hospital Complex received 50 mixed 60mm and 82mm mortar rounds followed by a sapper attack resulting in 10 VN killed, 4 of whom were orphans, and 44 VN wounded, 37 of whom were orphans.

At 300915H, a squad patrol from "F" Company, 2nd Battalion, 7th Marines, 10 Kms west of FSB Baldy, while on patrol the Marines came to a stream and dispatched a fire team to recon the area before moving across. After the fire team had proceeded about 50 meters upstream they met 3 NVA and killed them. The remainder of the squad ambushed 9 NVA as they attempted to flee resulting in another 6 NVA killed and 3 NVA, 3 AK-47's, 1 M-16, 19 grenades and 10 packs captured. There were no friendly casualties.

4. Personnel

a. Special Services Activities

(1) Freedom Hill Recreation Complex

(a) THEATER: The 35mm Indoor Theater was operational 29 days during the month of August with an average attendance of 687 per day.

(b) BOWLING CENTER: The Bowling Center was operational 26 days during the month of August with an average of 410 games bowled per day.

(c) Stage Show: Miss America, USO Show (Project DALLAS PLAIN) performed at the Freedom Hill Recreation Center Amphitheater. Projected call-in figures of personnel expected to attend was over 5,000. The count at the two gates into Freedom Hill exceeded 4,100. Included were 15 patients and 5 Corpsmen from the 95th Evac Hospital and 34 patients and 5 Corpsmen from the 1st Medical Battalion.

(2) Stars & Stripes: During the month 261,550 free issues of Stars and Stripes newspapers were distributed to III MAF personnel.

(3) R&R Activities (Out-of-Country): The total number of R&R seats allotted to III MAF for the month was 2595. The total number of R&R (Confirmed and Standby) and leave personnel using the aircraft was NA resulting in a NA% utilization of seats.

(4) In-Country R&R: The total China Beach In-Country R&R Allocation for the month was 218.

(5) Special Services Hong Kong Flight: Two round-trip Special Services Hong Kong flights were made during the month utilizing 88 spaces.

5. Intelligence

a. General Enemy Situation. Enemy initiated activity rose briefly on 8 and 9 August but returned immediately to the comparatively low level experienced during July. An expected "high point" of activity in the last days of August failed to materialize. This "high point" was expected as an attempt by the enemy to disrupt the August 30th senatorial elections. Small unit attacks and Sapper activities continued as the enemy's modus operandi.

On 7 August the First Company, 6th Battalion, Vietnamese Marine Corps located a cache 2 kilometers northeast of FSB 1 (YC 944330). The cache contained 1 AK-47, 2 radio handsets, 45 rounds 75mm recoilless rifle ammunition, 286 82mm mortar rounds, 23 60mm mortar rounds, 115 rounds of mixed B-40 and B-41 rounds, 14,400 rounds of assorted small arms ammunition, 6 anti-tank mines and approximately 17 pounds of documents.

On 8 August a recon team from the First Marine Division discovered an enemy base camp 8 kilometers southwest of FSB BUSHWACK (AT 958437). The camp consisted of four houses with bunkers, one of which was an ammunition storage bunker. The team engaged 15-20 enemy with organic weapons, killing nine.

On 9 August reconnaissance team "Pal Joey" was attacked by an estimated 25 enemy, possibly from the T-89th Sapper Battalion, 6 kilometers southeast of Liberty Bridge (AT 988508). Six of the enemy were killed.

On 23 August while on a Pacification Operation 9 kilometers southwest of LZ YUMA (BT 090630), Alpha Company, First Battalion, Fifth Marines made contact with several small groups of enemy resulting in 4 enemy killed, 27 detainees, and 3 individual and 1 crew served weapon captured. On 29 August while on a Cordon and Search Operation 4½ kilometers southwest of Liberty Bridge (AT 893513) Fox Company, Second Battalion, Fifth Marines made contact with an unknown size enemy force, which resulted in 7 enemy killed and 4 detainees.

The Hue-Danang train was the victim to two mining incidents. The first occurred on 27 August 4½ kilometers southeast of FSB ANZIO (YD 950073) where the train hit an unknown type mine destroying five meters of track and causing damage to 50% of the engine. The second incident occurred on 29 August 3 kilometers west of Lang Co Bridge (AT 853952). Again the train hit an unknown type mine causing the derailment of two cars.

c. Enemy Order of Battle. Confirmed units operating in Quang Nam Province as of 31 August 1970 remained the same as in July. Enemy strengths continued at 3,790 administrative personnel, 3,911 guerillas, and an overall total enemy strength of 15,206 in the province.

d. Counterintelligence

(1) Counterintelligence Monthly Overview. In spite of predictions of increased terrorist and propaganda activity during the month of August, the VC/VCI counterintelligence related activity continued to decline in comparison to previous months. Information received on several occasions during August indicates the VC/VCI are employing teenage children for terrorist and low-level intelligence collection activity because of their freedom of movement without suspicion. While this tactic is not a new development, the emphasis placed on recruitment of children could possibly indicate a shortage of VC/VCI and an apparent lack of popular support from local inhabitants.

Perhaps the most significant terrorist incident during August was the NVA terrorist attack on a German Buddhist Orphanage near An Hoa, Duc Duc District (AT 898473), at 0115 hours, 30 August 1970. The attack consisted of a mortar barrage followed by a ground attack of approximately 30 NVA soldiers, using satchel charges, hand grenades and small arms fire. The results of the attack disclosed the death of 15 Vietnamese civilians (6 children) and wounding 45 (32 children) others; and damage to three orphanage buildings. This attack was possibly related to VC planned activity to disrupt GVN elections scheduled for 30 August 1970.

(2) Terrorism and Propaganda. There was no significant change in the number of terrorist incidents from the previous month. However, the number of incidents involving damage/destruction of houses/buildings decreased considerably. If the total number of damaged/destroyed,

two were GVN administrative offices, two were schools, and three were part of an orphanage compound. The increase in the number of KIA's and WIA's over last month can be attributed to the terrorist incident on 30 August 1970.

There were two incidents in which GVN Hamlet/Village officials were victims of VC terrorism.

VC Propaganda/Proselyting activity during the month introduced on two occasions English VC propaganda revealing professionalism in grammatical construction and use of American expressions. There was a total of three incidents of VC propaganda actually being distributed; however, there were several incidents involving the death or capture of VC who had propaganda material in their possession.

(3) Subversion. No incident of subversion is known to have occurred during the month.


(4) Sabotage. On 22 August 1970, at approximately 2230 hours, explosives were placed inside of a building, GVN administrative office vicinity (BT 030764) located in District 1, Danang City, and detonated, resulting in 20 carbines completely destroyed.

(5) Espionage. There was only one report of possible espionage activity. Two teenage Vietnamese females were apprehended while observing a CAP patrol base. One of the girls, 16 years old, whose name appeared on a "Wanted List" was unresponsive to questioning; both girls were subsequently turned over to GVN authorities. This incident, along with previous reports of the VC recruiting teenage children for low-level intelligence collection, is indicative of a continuing VC/VCI collection effort/capability within the III MAF AO.



6. LOGISTICS

a. General. During the month of August, the G-4 staff and those special staff sections under its cognizance were concerned primarily with redistribution of excesses, transfer of equipment to the Armed Forces of the Republic of Vietnam, transfer of real estate/facilities and common service support. Increment IV Keystone Robin (Alfa) Embarkation units V, VI and VII were completed, a number of ASP's and medical aid stations were inspected, a major land clearing operation was completed and planning for future actions continued.

b. G-4(1) Redistribution Program

(a) The program for redistribution of excesses continued during August. Near month's end, redistribution instructions for 72,875 excess items of equipment (cumulative total reported through Embarkation XI of Increment IV Keystone Robin (Alfa)) had been issued.

(b) Transfer of equipment to the Armed Forces of the Republic of Vietnam has proven very successful. Of the 1715 items of equipment offered by units of this command, 1658 items have been accepted. This equates to approximately a 97 percent acceptance rate.

(2) Ordnance

(a) ASP #1 and MAG-11 Bomb Dump at Da Nang were inspected during August and found to be satisfactory in all respects.

(b) New rates for ground ammunition stockage and expenditure in RVN were received from Headquarters, U.S. Marine Corps during August. These rates, effective 1 September 1970, differ only slightly from previous rates.

(c) The 80 percent available supply rate for 175mm HE ammunition, established during June, was cancelled during August because it was no longer required.

(4) Airlifts. Marine passenger airlifts decreased from 100,408 during July to 90,470 for August - a decrease of 9932. Total Marine cargo lifted decreased from 8475 short tons to 7899 short tons - a decrease of 576 short tons. Personnel flown out of RVN in connection with permanent change of station orders totaled 5355 - an increase of 577 from the previous month.

(5) Common Service Support. Some problem areas in connection with common service support continued during August, but to a lesser degree than the previous month. Close coordination with major subordinate commands and liaison with the U.S. Army Support Command, Da Nang, and the Northern District Engineer continues in order to resolve nettlesome areas of common service.

(6) Conferences

(a) The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4 attended a Real Estate conference in Long Binh on 6 August. The conference, sponsored and hosted by USARV, concerned transfer of real estate and facilities.

(b) The Deputy Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4 attended the quarterly Ship Scheduling Conference in Yokosuka, Japan from 16 to 21 August. The conference was sponsored and hosted by COMSEVENTHFLT.

(c) The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4 attend-

c. Embarkation Summary. During August a total of eight amphibious ships were used to transport troops and equipment to CONUS, Japan and Okinawa in connection with Increment IV Keystone Robin (Alfa) redeployments.

d. Engineer Summary

(1) Land clearing operations within the 2d ROKMC Brigade area of operation were completed during August, with a cumulative total of 3375 acres having been cleared.

(2) Upgrading road work continued during August with no serious interdictions.

(3) Work began on Go Noi Island during June and suspended during July, was resumed for several days during August. When the road refinement construction had been completed, work on the island was again temporarily suspended.

e. Supply Summary. During August a Force directive, establishing a system for evaluating and reporting garrison property as a basis for redistribution to other Marine Corps units, was published.

f. Dental Summary

(1) The total number of military patients treated within dental facilities of this command during August, was 9411 with 22,139 dental procedures completed.

c. Civic Action Projects. The following are highlights of significant civic action projects conducted during the month of August 1970:

(1) 1st Marine Division reports the following:

(a) On 30Aug70, NVA troops attacked the An Hoa Buddhist Orphanage in Duc Duc District. The 5th Marines provided prompt medical treatment to the injured victims of the attack. The combined material and technical assistance from G-5 and the 5th Marines has hastened the prompt rebuilding of the orphanage.

(b) Though the greater part of time, work, and assistance has already been devoted to the completion of the Go Noi Island project from the 1st Marine Division, considerable progress has been made since the last reporting period. 1st Marine Division Reports:

1. 188 acres of land has been cleared.
2. 1.8 miles of road between village #1 and village #2 has been upgraded.
3. A "Pioneer Road" has been built 600 meters from village #2 to a small lake, which will serve as watering point for irrigation.
4. Gravel has been provided to upgrade three hundred meters of road from the bridge to village #1.
5. As of 15Aug70, 1,388 people were residing full-time at village #1, while 150 inhabitants now occupy village 2.

(2) Force Logistic Command reports:

(a) The construction of wells, a community bath, and a continuing program of housing projects in the Hamlet of Phuoc Ha appear to be particularly effective because the people are offered the opportunity to aid one another and help the community as a whole. All projects are approved and coordinated through the appropriate hamlet officials. Maximum

participation is achieved by offering materials for personal use only to those individuals, who are willing to cooperate with the local program officials. This system helps strengthen the peoples' reliance upon their elected officials.

(b) The construction of a market place in the hamlet of Hoa My exemplifies the improvements made toward initiating self-help projects. Funds were obtained through the 1970 Village Self-Development Program to build the market place. Such projects involve the participants in the decision making process within their local government, as well as the improvement of their community.

(3) Combined Action Force reports:

(a) CAP Marines of Dien Ban District have devoted recent efforts toward school construction and repair. Such programs have generated greater cooperation and understanding among local civilians, CAP Marines, and Popular Forces.

(b) Combined Action Forces have also provided materials assistance to refugee camps. Providing permanent wood siding for their houses, instead of cardboard or inferior materials, is helping villagers/refugees gain confidence in PF's.


