





PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY1. INTRODUCTION

a. GENERAL. General Lewis W. WALT, Assistant Commandant of the United States Marine Corps, visited III Marine Amphibious Force from 1 November through 4 November 1970. General WALT was greeted by Lieutenant General Keith B. McCUTCHEON and briefed on current tactical situation in Military Region 1. During November 1970, III Marine Amphibious Force was located in northwest Danang, Quang Nam Province, Republic of Vietnam. The average Marine/Navy personnel strength in Military Region 1 was 25,625 a decrease of 1,255 under the previous month.

b. ACTIVITIES. III Marine Amphibious Force was guided by COMUSMACV Directive 10-11 dated 5 April 1970 and I ARVN/FWMAF MR 1 Combined Fall-Winter Campaign Plan of 13 December 1969 in pursuit of its objective for November 1970.

2. OVERALL EVALUATION

a. Incidents of enemy initiated activities throughout the Marine's Tactical Zone for the month of November decreased slightly from the preceding month but remained to be characterized by widely scattered harrassing fire. Despite the slight decrease in enemy activity, enemy KIA increased to 135 as compared to 107 the previous month. Enemy terrorism incidents remained at a comparative level with the preceding month, but the number of KIA's and WIA's showed a slight increase. For the month of November there were no propaganda incidents reported.

b. There were two major named operations continued during the month of November 1970. Operation "IMPERIAL LAKE" while under operational control of 5th Marines (-) (REIN) continued from the previous month with 41 enemy KIA and 35 individual weapons captured. Marine casualties increased for the month with 14 KIA and 44 wounded. Operation "HOANG DIEU", a saturation operation which involved all USMC and ARVN units continued with significant enemy casualties being inflicted. There were 74 enemy KIA and 17 individual weapons captured. Total Marine casualties were 3 KIA and 57 wounded.

c. The number of mine and booby trap incidents increased to 32 compared to 31 from the previous month. Mines and booby traps accounted for 4 Marines killed and 57 wounded, 48 of whom required evacuation. These figures represent 40% of the total casualties suffered by Marine units during the month of November.

PART IIISEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS DURING NOVEMBER 1970.1. SUMMARY OF OPERATIONS

a. GENERAL. During the month of November 1970, one Marine operation was continued from the preceding month in Quang Nam Province of Military Region 1 by Marine units. The combined saturation operation HOANG DIEU, conducted by Marine and ARVN units continued also with significant success throughout the month. Results of the operations for the month are listed below:

b. EVENTS. During the month of November 1970, the following significant contacts were reported in chronological order:

At 031152H, an FO at FSB ROUNDUP using an IOD observed 4 enemy, with packs and weapons, 2½ Kms northwest of FSB ROUNDUP. An artillery fire mission was called resulting in 4 VC killed.

At 031220H, Recon Team SADDLE BAG, 1½ Kms southeast of Hill 425, observed 2 enemy helping a third which appeared to be wounded. An AO was called on station which employed on board ordnance, resulting in 3 VC killed.

At 031415H, a platoon from Company "A", 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, 5 Kms east of FSB RAINBOW, while enroute to a suspected enemy base camp, was ambushed by approximately 8 enemy to their north and northwest. The platoon returned small arms and automatic weapons fire, then pulled back and requested air support. AO came on station and employed on board ordnance with unknown results. Total casualties were 3 USMC wounded, all of whom required evacuation.

At 040915H, a platoon from Company "M", 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines, 1 Km northwest of FSB RAINBOW, while on a sweep operation found 5 NVA bodies. The bodies appeared to have been approximately three days old and killed by air strikes.

At 041158H, a quick reaction force from Company "F", 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, responding to an enemy sighting by a CUPP team, 6 Kms southwest of Hoi An. During the insert, 10 enemy with packs and rifles were observed in the Ba Ren River. Supporting gunships employed on board ordnance resulting in 10 VC killed. While sweeping the area several contacts were made resulting in 10 more VC killed, 1 AK-47, 3 9mm pistols, 2 M-26 and 18 chicom grenades, 4 packs containing 18 blasting caps and assorted documents captured. Total casualties was 1 USMC KIA.

At 041400H, a platoon from Company "B", 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, while on patrol 4½ Kms east of FSB RAINBOW received small arms fire from an unknown size enemy force. They returned small arms fire and called AO on station which employed on board ordnance. A subsequent sweep of the area was made with negative results. Total casualties were 1 USMC KIA and 1 USMC wounded which required evacuation.

At 061000H, a CUPP team from Company "G", 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, while in a blocking position observed an unknown size enemy force. Engaged enemy with small arms fire and called AO on station which employed on board ordnance. A sweep of the area disclosed 2 NVA killed, 1 AK-47, chicom grenades, 2 cartridge belts and assorted documents captured. There were no friendly casualties.

At 082245H, "D" Battery, 2nd Battalion, 11th Marines, firing in support of a PF patrol 7 Kms northeast of ROSS Combat Base, accounted for 5 VC killed.

At 091315H, Company "A", 7th Engineer Battalion received 5 122mm rockets which impacted within their compound. Total casualties were 1 USMC WIA which required evacuation. There were no material damages. Counter battery fire missions were employed against suspected enemy launch sites with unknown results.

At 102050H, an ambush from CAP 2-7-2, 5½ Kms northwest of Dien Ben, initiated organic weapons fire on 3 enemy carrying weapons. The enemy returned small arms fire and 1 chicom grenade. A sweep of the area disclosed 3 VC killed, 2 AK-47, 1 B-40 launcher with 4 rounds, and 16 chicom grenades captured. Total casualties was 1 USMC wounded.

At 111535H, CAP 2-1-5, 2 Kms southeast of Hill 41, observed 5 VC carrying weapons. The unit initiated small arms fire and the enemy returned fire. A subsequent sweep of the area disclosed 2 VC killed, 2 AK-47 and 1 9mm pistol captured. There were no friendly casualties.

At 131030H, a CUPP team from Company "G", 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, 4 Kms south of Baldy Combat Base, supported by fixed wing aircraft engaged enemy in a series of small contacts. While sweeping the area, a dying VC detonated a grenade which resulted in 3 USMC wounded and requiring evacuation. Enemy losses were 4 VC killed and 1 AK-47 captured.

At 141700H, a member of a patrol from Company "C", 1st Battalion, 1st Marines, 5 Kms south of Hill 65, while carrying rice to a collection point detonated a booby trap rigged with a pressure type firing device. Total casualties were 7 USMC wounded, all of whom required evacuation.

At 141830H, Recon Team ICE BOUND, 4½ Kms southeast of FSB RAINBOW, observed 7 VC moving along a trail. The enemy were taken under small arms fire resulting in 3 VC killed, 1 detainee and 1 AK-47 captured. There were no friendly casualties.

At 181620H, a platoon from Company "E", 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines, 3½ Kms east of Hill 55, while conducting a cordon and search operation, engaged an unknown size enemy force with small arms fire. The results were 3 VC killed and 2 wounded, 1 AK-47, 2 81mm mortar rounds, 1 chicom grenade, 3 unknown type booby traps and assorted documents were captured. There were no friendly casualties.

At 181650H, Recon Team RUSH ACT, 3 Kms southwest of FSB RAINBOW, requested an emergency extraction. A CH-46D from HMM-263 had completed the spie rig pickup and commenced climbing while make a right turn. At this time a lead gunship advise a "left turn". The transmission was not acknowledged and the CH-46D disappeared into the clouds at approximately 400 feet above the pickup zone. The CH-46D crashed into the side of the mountain. Total results were 15 USMC killed and 1 CH-46D destroyed.

At 201500H, a patrol from Company "I", 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines, 1½ Kms southwest of Hill 270, observed 1 VC fleeing away from the patrol. He was taken under small arms fire, wounded and then apprehended. The detainee informed the patrol of a nearby cave where other VCI were hiding. The patrol checked the cave and observed 3 VC inside. The enemy were taken under small arms fire and a grenade thrown into the cave causing it to collapse. Total results were 3 VCI killed, 1 detained, assorted medical supplies and clothing captured. There were no friendly casualties.

At 201800H, a CUPP Team from "H&S" Company, 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines, 3½ Kms northwest of ROSS Combat Base, observed 9 enemy with packs and weapons. The enemy were taken under small arms fire resulting in 3 VC killed and 1 wounded, 1 AK-47, a pay roster, several documents and miscellaneous 782 gear were captured. There were no friendly casualties.

At 231120H, a CH-46D from HMM-263, 2 Kms northeast of FSB RAINBOW, while on an insert mission and making its final approach to LZ, impacted against the ground causing the aircraft to roll on its side. Total casualties were 5 USMC wounded. The aircraft sustained substantial damage.

At 241200H, a platoon from Company "C", and Company "D", 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, 1 Km east of FSB RAINBOW, while conducting a combined sweep operation approximately 200 meters apart engaged 12 to 15 enemy located between their positions. The enemy were engaged with small arms fire. The enemy returned small arms and RPG fire, then broke contact. A subsequent sweep of the area was made with negative results. Total casualties were 9 USMC wounded, 8 of whom required evacuation.

At 241730H, an FO at FSB ROUNDUP using an IOD called an artillery fire mission on 2 suspected enemy locations 2½ Kms southwest of FSB ROUNDUP. The results of the fire mission was 4 VC killed and 11 secondary explosions observed.

At 251210H, a squad patrol from Company "A", 1st Battalion, 1st Marines, 3 Kms northwest of Hill 10, while obtaining water from a stream detonated an unknown type booby trap. Total casualties were 5 USMC wounded all of whom required evacuation.

At 260519H, an FO at FSB ROUNDUP using an IOD observed 9 VC sitting around a camp fire 2 Kms northwest of FSB ROUNDUP. An artillery fire mission was called resulting in 3 VC killed and 1 secondary explosion observed.

At 260930H, a platoon from Company "H", 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, ¾ Kms southeast of FSB RAINBOW, found an enemy base camp consisting of four cave complexes. A search of the caves produced 12 AK-47, 1 M-60 machine gun, 1 M-79, 1 9mm pistol, 150 chicom grenades, 10 B-40 rounds, 9 RPG's and 10 82mm mortar rounds. Also found were 2 field phones, 1000 feet of wire and 2 PRC-10 with handsets.

At 281900H, a squad from Company "L", 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines, 6 Kms northwest of FSB COYOTE, while enroute to its ambush site received small arms fire and 5 chicom grenades. The unit returned small arms fire causing the enemy to break contact. During the contact 4 USMC were wounded, all of whom required evacuation. A sweep of the area was conducted with negative results.


At 281845H, a platoon from Company "F", 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, 5 Kms southeast of FSB RAINBOW, while in a night defensive position received a suspected RPG round. Fire was not returned due to the lack of a target. Total casualties were 8 USMC wounded, all of whom required evacuation.

At 282330H, at Company "K", 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines, 5 Kms southeast of FSB RAINBOW, the Command Post received 10 chicom grenades from a unknown size enemy force. A 60 and 81mm mortar fire mission was employed on a suspected enemy location west of their position with unknown results. Total casualties were 1 USMC killed and 7 wounded, 4 of whom required evacuation.

5. Intelligence

a. General Enemy Situation. Continued rains with ensuing flooding of the lowland areas seriously hampered the enemy's attempts to move into those areas. The weather and floods very effectively restricted the enemy's food acquisition activities.

Enemy initiated activity consisted primarily of attacks by fire on out-lying posts. U.S. Marine forces continued to make contact with small enemy units moving back to their base areas to escape the floods.

The number of Chieu Hois increased for the reporting period. Primary reasons given by these people for rallying was the shortage of food and excessive hardships. Hoi Chanhs and Prisoners of War indicate the morale in the majority of the enemy units is extremely low.

It appears that the enemy is breaking down some main force units into small elements to reinforce and assist the Local Force Units and the local political effort. With this breakdown there is little likelihood the enemy will attempt any large scale offensive in Quang Nam Province in the near future. Any "surge" will probably consist of small unit infantry and sapper attacks against outposts.

On 4 November, Foxtrot Company, 5th Marines, inserted as a quick reaction force six kilometers north of Combat Base Baldy (BT 127514), made contact with an unknown size enemy force that resulted in 20 enemy KIA.

On 8 November, elements of the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines uncovered 17,000 pounds of locally grown unpolished rice vicinity (BT 026432).

Also on 8 November Delta Battery, 11th Marines fired a 105 mission three kilometers northeast of FSB Ross (BT 098354) which resulted in 5 VC KIA.

On 9 November, Alpha Company, 7th Engineers, on Hill 55 (AT 967617) took five rounds of 122mm rockets.

On 10 November, Alpha Company, 5th Marines, while on a search mission, ten kilometers west of Combat Base Baldy (BT 035438) found 4,500 pounds of locally grown rice.

On 12 November, this same unit found 5,000 pounds of rice, 800 pounds of salt, one M-1 carbine, five NVA uniforms, three Chicom grenades, and assorted documents at (BT 029442).

On 13 November, a patrol consisting of CUPP Team 8, Marines from Golf Company, 5th Marines made contact with an unknown size enemy force, four and one-half kilometers south-southwest of Combat Base Baldy (BT 122410). Four of the enemy were killed and one individual weapon captured.

On the night of 14 November, 2-1 CUPP Team Caster, in their night defensive position vicinity (AT 882264) received twelve incoming rounds of 60mm mortars.

During the night of 15 November Marines of Golf Company, 1st Marines, and a Vietnamese Seal Team ambushed and killed six VC fifteen kilometers east of LZ Stallion (BT 077691).

While on a sweep operation on 24 November, elements of the 1st Battalion, 5th Marines were attacked by an unknown size enemy force. The enemy attacked with an unknown number of 60mm mortar rounds and small arms fire. Enemy casualties were unknown. The action took place thirteen kilometers west of Combat Base Baldy (AT 999430).

On the night of 25 November, while moving to an ambush site two and one-half kilometers southeast of LZ Stallion (AT 950689), CAP 2-1 and a PF unit, made contact with an unknown size enemy force. One VC was killed and ten taken prisoner.

c. Enemy Order of Battle. There were several changes in the enemy order of battle holdings during November. Headquarters, 141st NVA Regiment, their one remaining battalion, and Headquarters, 31st NVA Regiment were dropped. The 102nd Battalion of the 31st was redesignated the D-8 Sapper Battalion, and the 103rd Battalion (31st NVA) is now the D-9 Infantry Battalion. Both are currently carried as independent units. The 490th Sapper Battalion was downgraded to a company.

Administrative strength is carried at 3,975 and guerrilla strength at 4,024. Total enemy strength for Quang Nam is 12,209.

d. Counterintelligence

(1) Counterintelligence Monthly Overview. VC/VCI counter-intelligence related activity during the month of November 1970, showed another decrease in terrorist incidents. The type and number of incidents is indicative of the enemy's diminishing capability to intimidate local inhabitants and gain popular support in GVN controlled areas.

(2) Terrorism and Propaganda. Terrorist activity within the III MAF AO totaled ten isolated incidents during the month of November. The number of KIA's and WIA's resulting from terrorist activity showed a slight increase. There were no VC/VCI initiated incidents involving damage to or destruction of buildings or homes. The number of victims of VC/VCI terrorist activity is as follows:

There were two incidents involving the assassination of three GVN officials and four VN civilians.

There were no propaganda incidents reported during the month.

(3) Subversion. No incident of subversion is known to have occurred during the month.

(4) Sabotage. On 19 November 1970, a USMC truck, 2½ Ton, 6x6, was destroyed. Just prior to the explosion, the truck had been used for delivery of trash to the Hill 55 trash dump (AT 964608). Numerous Vietnamese children had swarmed about the vehicle and the drivers were engaged in conversation. Once the vehicle was emptied, it was returned to the Hill 55 compound and exploded shortly thereafter. Investigation disclosed that a charge of 5-10 pounds of C-4, detonated by an M-26 grenade with an approximate 30 minute delay had been placed under the drivers seat near the center of the vehicle.

(5) Espionage. There were no reported incidents of espionage during the month. However, it can be reasonably assumed that the VC/VCI maintain a continuing collection effort within the III MAF AO for the purpose of identifying prospective targets.

6. LOGISTICS

a. General. During the month of November, the G-4 staff and those special staff sections under its cognizance continued to carry out those functions leading to the redeployment of the Marine Corps from Vietnam. Although Marine Corps units were not participating in Increment V of the redeployment of forces from Vietnam - Keystone Robin (Bravo) - redistribution of excesses to Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces and the transfer of real estate continued. In addition, the G-4 staff sections were active in providing relief in the wake of Typhoons Kate and Patsy. The Disaster Relief Coordination Center coordinated medical, supply, and engineer assistance throughout the central section of Military Region 1 during these critical times. The 2d Brigade, Republic of Korea Marine Corps was provided considerable assistance in countering the effects of high winds and inundation in its area of operations. Meanwhile, planning was undertaken throughout the month in anticipation of redeployment of Marine forces during Increment VI, Keystone Robin (Charlie).

b. G-4(1) Redistribution Program

(a) The program for redistribution of excesses continued during November. A total of 21,299 items were reported as excess and offered up during the month. In total, redistribution instructions have been issued for 121,417 excess items since inception of the redistribution program.

(b) Project 805, transfer of equipment to the Armed Forces of Vietnam, has continued to be highly successful through November. Of the 505 items offered to the Vietnamese during the month, 503 were accepted. These items included the acceptance of 46 military war dogs and accounted for the only two nonacceptances. One dog was not accepted due to a missing tail caused by wounds on the battlefield; the second dog was not accepted due to excessive viciousness. To date over 2.3 million dollars worth of equipment has been transferred to the Armed Forces of Vietnam, and the acceptance rate stands at 92% with 8,918 items offered and 8,186 items accepted.

(2) Real Estate/Facilities

(a) Camp Monahan was transferred to the Armed Forces of Vietnam during November.

(b) Processing on the below listed locations was suspended and will be reinstated as determined by future re-deployments:

(c) No new real estate was processed for transfer during November.

(d) On 1 November 1970 III MAF established a Real Estate/Base Development Office which is responsible for Marine Corps Real Property in Military Region 1. This new office carries out the following tasks:

1 Maintains and updates all III MAF property records, inventories, and site drawings

2 Identifies and plans for timely disposal of excess Marine Corps real property

3 Submits excess property reports (MACDC-13) to MACV

4 Submits base/cantonment C/E equipment listing to MACV

5 Submits property transfer plans (MACDC-14) to MACV

6 Prepares the transfer and acceptance of Marine Corps real property (DD-1354)

7 Submits the property transfer after action report (MACDC-15) to MACV

8 Prepares the required legal documents when property is transferred to ARVN forces.

The Real Estate/Base Development Office is staffed with one major, one Navy lieutenant (jg) CEC Corps, two draftsmen, and one clerk/typist.

(3) Airlifts.

(a) Marine passenger airlifts lessened from 50,253 during October to 50,007 during November - a decrease of 256. Total Marine corps cargo lifted increased from 4,458 short tons to 4,863 short tons during November - an increase of 405 short tons. This includes over 600 short tons of fuel dispensed by Marine Corps KC-130 aircraft during in-flight refueling missions.

(b) Personnel flown out of the Republic of Vietnam in connection with permanent change of station orders totaled 1,818 - a decrease of 2,158 from the previous month.

(c) In addition to the above figures, a special airlift carried 35 short tons of critically required medical supplies from Hong Kong to Da Nang for the German hospital ship, Helgoland. Typhoon conditions had caused the diversion of the hospital ship's quarterly resupply.

(4) Motor Transport

Vehicle Fragmentation Armor Kits. Antifragmentation armor kits for 2 1/2 and 5 ton "M" series vehicles, developed to provide a degree of protection for vehicles operating in a mine blast environment, were allocated during September 1970 to major subordinate commands (See III MAF Command Chronology for September 1970). On 4 November 1970 an M-35 truck with a fragmentation kit installed detonated a 30 pound box mine. The vehicle was totally destroyed. Four Marines were in the truck; two received minor lacerations and bruises and two were evacuated with no permanent disability anticipated. On 16 November 1970 two M-54 trucks with fragmentation kits installed detonated two 30-40 pound rock mines. Both vehicles received extensive damage. Three Marines were in the vehicles; one was returned to duty and two were medical evacuated with no permanent disability anticipated. It is clear from the foregoing that the introduction of antifragmentation kits to the combat environment has already proven an unqualified success and undoubtedly resulted in the saving of more than one life with the prevention of serious injury to others.

(5) ROKMC Airboat Procurement. During October action was initiated to obtain 15 airboats from the 5th Special Forces Group (Airborne) as a non-reimbursable transfer of switch-back assets to the Marine Corps. The airboats were for use by the 2d Brigade, Republic of Korea Marine Corps at Hoi An, Vietnam. During November, training of Korean operators and of mechanics was conducted and concluded by members of Company D, 5th Special Forces Group (Airborne) at Cau Lanh and Can Tho in the Mekong delta area south of Saigon. Also during November, 15 airboats, 2,000 pounds of extra spare parts, and 15 extra 01 aircraft engines were delivered to the Korean Marines at Hoi An. The boats were in operation by the end of the month.

(6) Ordnance. Effective use of the newly formed Joint Ammunition Resource Board (JARB) was made during the month of November. Due to ammunition suspensions, a shortage in 66mm rocket (M72 LAW) ammunition occurred throughout III Marine Amphibious Force. Within 24 hours of requesting an emergency loan for this item from the chairman of the JARB, 2,000 rounds were transferred from U.S. Army to Marine Corps assets. It is anticipated that the JARB will continue to contribute to the coordination of inter-service transactions in the future.

c. Embarkation Summary. During November no ships were available for the opportune shipping of retrograde cargo from Vietnam. Planning for available shipping of retrograde cargo in the ensuing months as well as planning for embarkation during Keystone Robin (Charlie) took place throughout the month.

d. Engineer Summary

(1) Foul weather and typhoon conditions resulted in a large engineer effort throughout the III Marine Amphibious Force in November. A major effort was made in the area of road repair resulting from damage caused by flooding. 5,330 cubic yards of earth products and 2,584 cubic yards of crushed base rock were required to make the necessary repairs. In addition, considerable damage by high winds and flooding was done to buildings and bridges and major efforts were expended in repairing and rebuilding these structures.

(2) The construction of two new company bases and the rehabilitation of existing structures for the 2d Brigade, Republic of Korea Marine Corps were completed during November.

(3) During November, III Marine Amphibious Force assumed control of all Tactical Support Functional Component (TSFC) material from the 32d Naval Construction Regiment. This material will provide TSFC support for all Marine units remaining in Vietnam.

e. Supply Summary.

(1) As a result of the redeployment of Marine Aircraft Group - 13 and 5th Communications Battalion from Vietnam, transfer of garrison property to the U.S. Army at Chu Lai and Hoa Long Compound was transferred in November.

(2) During November assistance was given the 2d Brigade, Republic of Korea Marine Corps as a result of flood damage. 977 Ration Supplement Sundries Packs were issued to the Korean Marines in this regard. In addition, flood losses were submitted by the Korean Marines and amounted to an estimated replacement cost of \$860,000.

f. Dental Summary

(1) The total number of military patients treated within dental facilities of this command during November was 5,577 with 13,923 dental procedures completed.

(2) Dental Civic Action conducted by III Marine Amphibious Force dental units during November resulted in 1,319 dental procedures and treatment of 626 patients.

(1) In the early part of November, preventive medicine teams were established to seek out potential health hazards as a result of refugee evacuation to areas in the 1st Marine Division area of operations.

(2) During November, aid stations at the 2d Battalion, 1st Marines, 1st Battalion, 5th Marines, 2d Battalion, 11th Marines, and Headquarters Battalion, 1st Marine Division were inspected. Inspections during the month also included 1st Medical Battalion.

(3) The USS Sanctuary operated in Vietnam waters throughout the month of November.

(4) The total average patient load for the 1st Medical Battalion during November was 93, with a total of 482 patients admitted and 95 evacuated out of country. Blood expended totaled 318 units.



c. Civic Action Projects. The following are highlights of significant civic action projects conducted during the month of November 1970:

(1) 1st Marine Division reports:

(a) Division units continue to train Vietnamese personnel in first aid and in the conduct of MEDCAPS. This training will be of value in the self-help program when U.S. medical units have left the area.

(b) Civic Action Teams are encouraged to exert influence on Vietnamese requesting assistance to use the new standard "Request for Military Assistance Form" which must be submitted through GVN channels. While it is often easier to accomplish the work for the people, the efforts expended in getting requests into the GVN channels has produced beneficial results in Vietnamization by getting programs into the VSD program.

(2) 1st Marine Air Wing reports:

(a) The Hoa An Civic Action, working with the people of the Hoa An Hamlet constructed a culvert bridge to provide free access to the hamlet via a small but vital pathway which is subject to flooding. This was an effective example of increasing participation in the self-help program.

(b) Crescent Beach Orphanage is located in a remote but secure area, and is often overlooked by all other organizations. Utilizing helicopters, members of the 1st Marine Air Wing Civic Action Teams were able to get to the orphanage and assist in the installation of electrical wiring light sockets and wall outlets. In addition Wing personnel provided eighteen chickens and one rooster to the orphanages as the basis for a poultry program. While the impact of this assistance is slight, the effort should be effective locally.

l. On 28 November Sgt W. T. FRANKLIN joined III MAF, G-6 as Administrative Chief.

m. On 30 November Sgt D. A. McINTYRE, Admin Chief, G-6 was detached from the section and returned to CONUS.

n. To ensure reliable communications, a 50 pair cable was installed from the Hill 327 MASS-3 DASC radio site to the Division CP DASC operation site by the Communication Support Company, 7th Communication Battalion.

o. All plans and coordination have been completed to re-home FLC AUTODIN terminal on Korat on 1 December. This will provide a highly flexible AUTODIN system with additional back-up to serve all major Marine Corps commands in the Danang area.

p. Overall improvement of III MAF Communication Systems resulted from the establishment of a new multi-channel patch between Hill 244 and Camp Horn. This link also enabled the shut down of the remaining III MAF communication facilities located at Camp Hoa Long.

q. Dedicated Circuit 30300 was established between FLC Communication Center and 1st Marine Division Communication Center by re-routing over the M-9 cable. This new route also provides a back-up for the primary red rocket circuit 00405 in the event the AN/TRC-29 experiences an outage.

r. Procurement of 150 AN/PSM-13's from the U. S. Army will be accomplished by Third FSR. The AN/PSM-13 is a battery test set capable of testing twelve types of batteries. It will be utilized primarily for testing the BA-386 and 4386 which are used with the AN/PRC-25, AN/PRC-77 and KY-38. The addition of the non repairable PSM-13 will ensure economic employment of batteries by indicating remaining life. Since the test set can be used by either operators or technicians, a quick battery check can be made prior to unit jump-off on patrols or operations. The item will be allocated down to the Company level.

s. In consonance with MACV plans to phase down communications and a continuous program of circuit evaluation, action has been taken to deactivate the following circuits:


