PART IINARRATIVE SUMMARY1. INTRODUCTION

a. General. The III Marine Amphibious Force was visited by Lieutenant General W. K. JONES, Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force, Pacific, during 27-28 February 1971. Upon his arrival in the Republic of Vietnam, he was greeted by Lieutenant General Donn J. ROBERTSON, Commanding General, III Marine Amphibious Force. General JONES' visit was in connection with an update on redeployment and retrograde activities. In addition to attending briefs, General JONES spent time visiting with III Marine Amphibious Force troops in the field. During February 1971, the III Marine Amphibious Force was located at Camp Haskins, Northwest Da Nang, Quang Nam Province, Republic of Vietnam. The average Marine/Navy personnel strength in Military Region I was 24,787, a decrease of 703 personnel from the previous month.

b. Activities. III Marine Amphibious Force activities were guided by COMUSMACV Directive 10-11, dated 5 April 1970, and I ARVN/FWMAF MR 1 Combined Fall-Winter Campaign Plan, dated 8 September 1970, in pursuit of its objectives for February 1971.


2. OVERALL EVALUATION

a. Incidents of enemy initiated activity continued at an even pace with recent months. Harassing fires continued to dominate the enemy's ability to engage ARVN/FWMAF units. Through the use of rocket and mortar attacks, the enemy persisted in demonstrating his presence to the civilian population, although none of his efforts succeeded in inflicting significant casualties or damage. Total enemy strength in Quang Nam Province is presently held at about 9,500 compared to 10,466 at the end of the previous month.

b. In addition to normal, small unit operations, there were three major, named operations continued or initiated during the month of February 1971. Operation "IMPERIAL LAKE" continued under the operational control of 5th Marines (-) (REIN). During the month this operation resulted in 30 enemy killed and 11 weapons captured. Friendly casualties were 1 killed and 21 wounded. Operation "UPSHUR STREAM" continued with negative results. Operation "HOANG DIEU 103" commenced on 3 February 1971. This is another in a series of joint, US/ARVN saturation operations that are conducted throughout Quang Nam Province. Results of this operation during the month were 78 enemy killed and 34 weapons captured. Marine casualties were 2 killed and 81 wounded. Results of all Marine operations during the month were 150 enemy killed and 66 weapons captured. Psychological operations, Civic Action Programs and the training of Vietnamese personnel, continued to play a major role in III Marine Amphibious Force Activities.

c. There were 34 incidents of activations of surprise firing devices causing casualties to Marine personnel during the month of February. A total of 2 Marines were killed and 60 were wounded as a result of these incidents. Surprise firing device incidents accounted for approximately 22% of all battle deaths and 39% of all battle wounded.

a. GENERAL. During the month of February 1971, two operations were continued from the previous month and one operation was commenced. Operations "IMPERIAL LAKE" and "UPSHUR STREAM" were continued and operation "HOANG DIEU 103" was begun. Results are listed below;

b. EVENTS. During the month of February 1971 the following significant events were reported:

At 010315H, the Da Nang Air Base received nine 122mm rockets, 3 of which were duds. One VN woman was killed, 2 USN personnel were wounded, 2 USMC KC-130 aircraft received light damage, and power lines were downed in the MAG-11 area. One of the aircraft sustained shrapnel damage and both suffered heat damage from a fire that started in a nearby Tactical Air Fuel Dispensing System.

At 021245H, CAP 2-7-10, while on patrol 8 Kms west of Marble Mountain, engaged an unknown size enemy force, resulting in 5 VC killed and 2 VC, 2 M-26 grenades and 3 individual weapons captured. While searching the contact area, the unit found and blew a tunnel, resulting in 2 more VC killed and 1 individual weapon captured. Friendly casualties were 2 RF's wounded.

At 021333H, CUPP Team 10, Company "G", 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, while on patrol 5 Kms north of BALDY Combat Base, observed 5 enemy carrying weapons. The CUPP Team moved into a blocking position and the enemy engaged the team with grenades. The team returned small arms fire causing the enemy to flee to a bunker. M-26 grenades were thrown into the bunker and all 5 VC were killed. Two individual weapons were captured. There were no friendly casualties.

At 021630H, a Forward Observer on OP ROUNDUP, with the use of an IOD, observed 26 enemy carrying packs and rifles 2 1/2 Kms northwest of his position. An artillery fire mission was called, resulting in 5 VC killed and 6 secondary explosions.

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At 040530H, while in an ambush position 5 1/2 Kms west southwest of Hill 65, an element of Company "M", 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines and the 117th RF Company received between 14-20 B-40 rounds, grenades, and small arms fire from an unknown size enemy force. Seven Marines and two RF's were wounded and later evacuated. The units, supported by artillery and gunships, returned fire with small arms. Then, reinforced by a quick reaction force, the unit swept the area and found 1 NVA killed, detained one VC suspect and captured two AK-47's.

At 041527H, a Forward Observer, with the use of an IOD, observed 4 VC entering a hut located in a confirmed enemy base camp 2 Kms northwest of OP ROUNDUP. An artillery fire mission was called, resulting in 4 VC killed.

At 051205H, a CH-46D from HMM-364, while flying a MEDEVAC mission in support of the ROK Marines, was hit with small arms fire and crashed 1 Km northeast of Dien Ban. One ROK Marine was killed. Five crewmen and one corpsman received minor injuries. The aircraft burned and was assessed a combat loss.

At 051325H, a platoon size quick reaction force from Company "H", 2d Battalion, 5th Marines, while checking a suspected enemy location 6 Kms west of BALDY Combat Base, received small arms fire from an unknown size enemy force located in a hut. The unit returned fire with small arms, killing 4 VC. Gunships were called on station and observed 2 VC attempting to flee the area. The gunship employed on board ordnance, resulting in 2 more VC killed. During a sweep of the contact area, 4 VN's, 2 of whom were wounded, were detained. Six individual weapons, 1 B-40 launcher, 4 packs and assorted documents were also found.

At 071750H, RECON Team "DORNEYBROOK", while on patrol in the Que Son Mountains, observed a column of over 50 enemy located 7 Kms northwest of Fire Support Base RYDER. The enemy were carrying weapons and were moving northward. Artillery and 81mm mortar missions were employed, resulting in two secondary explosions. Enemy losses are not known.

At 081505H, gunships, accompanying a two squad reaction force from Company "F", 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, on an operation 3 1/2 Kms northeast of Hill 218, employed on board ordnance on 3 VC fleeing into a treeline in a suspected enemy location. Upon being inserted, the quick reaction force received small arms fire from an unknown size enemy force. The unit, supported by gunships, returned small arms fire. A subsequent search of the area disclosed 6 VC killed by air, and 3 VC killed by small arms fire. In addition, 4 VC were detained and 2 grenades, 1 pack and several documents were captured. During the contact one Marine received minor wounds.

At 110905H, a VC detainee disclosed to Company "F", 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, the location of 6,000 pounds of unpolished local rice in a cache 7 Kms north of Fire Support Base RYDER. The rice was stored in 256 sandbags and was in good condition. The rice was taken to BALDY Combat Base.

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At 121240H, the pointman on a patrol from Company "F", 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines, detonated a M-26 grenade rigged as a surprise firing device, resulting in 2 Marines wounded. Then, while moving to a MEDEVAC site, a member of the patrol detonated a 60mm mortar round rigged with a trip wire firing device, wounding 4 more Marines. A total of six Marines were wounded, all of whom required evacuation.

At 151707H, RECON Team "COSSACK", while on patrol 4 Kms southeast of An Hoa, engaged approximately 4 enemy, resulting in 3 enemy killed. Supported by gunships, the team exchanged small arms fire with another enemy force, resulting in 1 more enemy killed. The team then moved to an LZ and was extracted under moderate small arms fire.

At 170200H, CAP 2-4-3, while in an ambush position 4 Kms northeast of Hoi An, received incoming M-79 fire and grenades from an unknown size enemy force located on Cam Thanh Island. The unit returned fire with small arms. Two USMC, 1 USN and 4 PF's were wounded and evacuated. While the unit was moving to a new ambush position, it again received M-79, resulting in 4 additional Marines wounded. Gunships were then called on station and fired on board ordnance on the suspected enemy location. Enemy losses are not known.

At 170810H, a patrol from CAP 2-4-2 observed 3 VC near a rice paddy 3 Kms west of Hoi An. Gunships were called on station and employed on board ordnance. A subsequent sweep of the area disclosed 3 VC killed by air, 7 bunkers destroyed, and 1 sampan sunk. There were several secondary explosions.

At 210130H, the Da Nang Air Base received seven 122mm rockets, damaging two Air Force aircraft. At the same time ASP-1 received one 122mm rocket, resulting in negative damage.

At 231815H, a CH-53D operating from Marble Mountain Air Facility, while approaching an LZ at coordinates (XD 698216), was hit by mortar fire. The aircraft was on a combat resupply mission in support of operation Lam Son 719. The co-pilot was wounded in the leg. The entire crew was recovered.

At 241640H, a Marine Helicopter Coordinator Airborne, while on a visual reconnaissance mission 6 Kms north of BALDY Combat Base, observed 3 bunkers, a hut and numerous packs and weapons laying about in the open. Gunships applied on board ordnance on the enemy position. Then a quick reaction force from Company "E", 2nd Battalion, 5th Marines, was inserted and took small arms and M-26 grenade fire from an unknown size enemy force. The unit returned fire causing the enemy to flee. Gunships pursued the fleeing enemy. A subsequent sweep of the contact area disclosed 8 VC killed by air and 7 VC killed by small arms fire. In addition, 2 VC were detained and 2 individual weapons, 8 grenades and several documents were captured. Friendly casualties were 2 USMC wounded.

At 261830H, a Forward Observer with Company "I", 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines, observed 4 enemy carrying packs and weapons 2½ Kms north of Hill 190. An artillery fire mission was called, resulting in 4 enemy killed.

(a) Theater: The 35mm theater was operational 24 days during the month with an average daily attendance of 363. The theater was turned over to Army control on 28Feb71.

(b) Bowling Center: The Bowling Center was operational 24 days during the month with an average of 387 games played, daily. The Bowling Center was also turned over to Army control on 28Feb71.

(c) Library: The total attendance at the Freedom Hill Library for the month of February is not available, the Library was closed down and all books were sent to Camp Butler, Okinawa, Special Services on 24 Feb 1971.

(2) Stars and Stripes: During the month of February, 163,424 free issues of Stars and Stripes newspapers were distributed to III MAF personnel.

(3) R&R Activities (Out-of-Country): The total number of seats allotted to III MAF for the month of February was 1278. The number allotted to Okinawa was 140. The MACV percentage of utilization for February is not available at this time. For update information, the January 1971 aircraft utilization figure was 97.5%.

(4) In-Country R&R: The total China Beach In-Country R&R allocation for the month was 11 officer quotas and 225 enlisted quotas, all of which were used.

(5) Special Services Hong Kong flight: Two round-trip Special Services Hong Kong flights were made utilizing 88 seats.

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5. Intelligence

a. General Enemy Situation. At the beginning of this reporting period the enemy launched the first stage of his Winter/Spring (K-800) Campaign. During the first week there was one rocket attack on Da Nang airfield, four mortar attacks and four ground attacks on friendly positions. During the next two weeks enemy activity declined to four minor attacks by fire which resulted in no casualties or damage. Phase II of the K-800 campaign was initiated on 21 February by rocket attacks on Hill 55 and the Da Nang airfield. Through the last week of the reporting period small scale attacks were conducted against ARVN, PF and RF outposts.

Although the first two phases of the K-800 Campaign were not successful in terms of casualties and damage inflicted on allied positions, it was successful in that the enemy was able to demonstrate his continued presence to the civilian population despite allied deterrent operations.

The enemy can be expected to continue to conduct operations against RF and PF units in his continuing effort to discredit the GVN. Lines of communication can also be expected to remain prime targets with hopes of hindering the Lam Son 719 operation.

Agent reports continue to indicate either a third phase of the K-800 campaign, or a new campaign to be initiated about the 18th of March. Traditional targets such as Da Nang, Hoa Cam Training Center, refugee centers and various bridges in Quang Nam Province continue to be named as objectives.

b. Significant Contacts During the Period

(Note: Significant U.S. Marine contacts during the reporting period are listed under paragraph 1.b., part III of this chronology.)

(1) On 1 February, at 0200, the 122d RF group was attacked by an estimated VC company three kilometers east of Dien Ban District Headquarters (BT 097578). Ten of the enemy were killed and one captured. Also captured during the action were one M-79, two AK-47s, and ten hand grenades.

(2) At 1330 on 2 February, 1-21 RF group made contact with a VC squad nine kilometers southeast of Hoa Vang. Five VC were killed and two chieu hoi'd. Two AK-47s were also captured.

(3) On 3 February, at 0900, two PF platoons, the 158th and 233d, made contact with an unknown sized enemy force. Point of contact was eight kilometers northwest of Hoi An (BT 105638). Six of the enemy were killed and two AK-47s one M-16, and one pair of binoculars were captured.

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platoon of VC entered the hamlet and forced the local villagers to attend a propaganda meeting. Upon departure, the VC kidnapped the Deputy Hamlet Chief and one PSDF member. The number and type of incidents perpetrated during the reporting period are indications of the enemy's weakening capability to combat the GVN pacification program, and failure to gain popular support among the people.

(2) Terrorism and Propaganda

(a) Terrorist activity within the III MAF AO consisted of ten isolated incidents during the month. The number of killed and wounded resulting from terrorist activity increased over the previous month. On 23 February 1971, a Vietnamese civilian bus detonated an unknown type mine at 1330 approximately 5.2 km. northeast of An Hoa (AT 910505) resulting in the death of five and wounding of 17 Vietnamese civilians. The bus was completely destroyed. At 0130 on 24 February 1971, an unknown size enemy force attacked the Phu Loc refugee camp (AT 925525) approximately 8.6 km. northeast of An Hoa, resulting in the death of one and the wounding of 20 Vietnamese civilians, and the destruction of 45 homes. On 25 February 1971, an unknown size enemy force kidnapped nine civilians in Thuong Duc (D), who apparently participated in anticommunist political classes. On 9 February 1971, the National Police Activities Chief, I Corps, was killed when a time-delay explosive device was detonated in his vehicle. One deputy hamlet chief was kidnapped on 7 February 1971. Five GVN officials were wounded on 22 February 1971, when a mine/booby-trap was detonated in a village committee headquarters building. The number of victims and structures damaged/destroyed during the month is as follows:

(b) Enemy propaganda activity was limited to one forced propaganda meeting of the residents of Phu Son (H), Hoa Luong (V), Hieu Duc (D).

(3) Subversion. No incident of subversion is known to have occurred during the month.

(4) Sabotage. No incident of sabotage is known to have occurred during the month.

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(5) Espionage. There were no reported incidents of espionage during the month. However, it can be reasonably assumed that the VC/VCI maintain a continuing intelligence collection effort within the III MAF AO for the purpose of identifying prospective targets.

a. General. During the month of February 1971 active participation in Redeployment Increment VI, Keystone Robin (Charlie), began with the redeployment of Marine Air Control Squadron-4 from Vietnam. In addition, one LKA and one LPD assisted in the movement of retrograde cargo and aircraft to Okinawa. The joint U.S. Army/Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces offensive in northern MR 1 and Laos, launched in February, required substantial logistic assistance from Marine Corps sources. The logistical effort by III MAF in support of Operations Dewey Canyon II and Lam Son 719 included motor transport, helicopter, and equipment and ammunition support. This support continued throughout the month. Instances of plague and rabies were noted among the Vietnamese population during February which demanded immediate preventive medical efforts to preclude these maladies from becoming a threat within III MAF. In the case of rabies, directives were instituted to ensure the absence of rabid dogs in the camps and living areas of Marine units.

b. G-4(1) Redistribution Program

(a) A new computerized evaluation of the III MAF redistribution program has established that 274,388 items have been transferred through February.

(b) MACV Project 805, transfer of equipment to the Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces, moved into high gear once more with the transfer of equipment belonging to units redeploying during Keystone Robin (Charlie). All of the 213 items offered for transfer under Project 805 during February were accepted by the RVNAF. This is a noteworthy accomplishment and reflects the good condition of the equipment being offered the Vietnamese and the strong interest displayed by Marine unit commanders. The dollar value for the February transfers was \$253,000. Since 30 June 1970, 8,867 items have been accepted of 9,606 offered. The total dollar value of all items transferred is approaching three million dollars.

(b) During February, elements of the 1st Marine Division redeployed from Fire Support Base Ryder and OP Roundup leaving no Marine Corps units at those locations.

(c) No additional real estate/facilities were offered for transfer during February 1971.

(3) Airlifts

(a) Marine intra-Republic of Vietnam passenger airlifts decreased from 52,848 during January to 42,623 during February - a decrease of 10,225. Marine cargo lifted increased from 3983 short tons to 8062 short tons during February - an increase of 4079 short tons. This includes over 319 short tons of fuel dispensed by Marine Corps KC-130 aircraft during in-flight refueling missions. In addition to the above refueling missions, 3377 short tons of fuel were lifted in support of Operation Lam Son 719.

(b) Personnel flown out of the Republic of Vietnam in connection with permanent change of station orders totalled 3318 - an increase of 174 over the previous month.

(4) Ordinance

(a) Since the forming of the MACV Joint Ammunition Resources Board, III MAF has actively participated in the transfer of munitions assets as operational requirements in Vietnam have required. For the period 1 January - 28 February 1971 total money value of ground ammunition transferred to or from U.S. Army or Army of the Republic of Vietnam is as follows:

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(b) During February, an additional 3000 short tons of storage space was provided to the ARVN in Ammunition Supply Point #1. Total space currently utilized by the Vietnamese in this ASP is 6000 short tons. Eventually, the ARVN will receive ASP #1 from the Marine Corps. Because the majority of aviation ammunition still requires storage in this ASP, III MAF has informed MACV that transfer of the facility to the ARVN will not take place any earlier than 15 May 1971.

(c) During the month, emergency transfers of ground ordnance were made to USARV for use by ARVN forces in connection with Operation Lam Son 719. This ordnance included 81mm, 60mm, and 155mm rounds as well as 3.5" HEAT rocket rounds.

c. Embarkation Summary. During February, a total of two amphibious ships were loaded with Force Logistic Command retrograde cargo for Okinawa. One amphibious ship sailed for the United States with Keystone Robin (Charlie) Embarkation Unit I, composed of MACS-4.

d. Engineer Summary.

(1) The Force Engineers continued to furnish maintenance to 34.2 miles of road during the month of February. A major effort was placed on the upgrade of LTL-4 West. This project required 5565 cubic yards of fill, 3350 cubic yards of rock, and 35,000 gallons of road oil. Engineers repaired Chung Yong Road for the 2d Republic of Korea Marine Corps Brigade and prepared two interior roads for paving in the 1st Marine Division Command Post area.

(2) Force engineers are in the process of dismantling and palletizing 26 Butler buildings for use in Japan, Okinawa, and the Republic of the Philippines. This operation commenced on 3 February and 12 of the buildings were dismantled and palletized for shipment by the end of the month.

(3) During February, electrical distribution systems and plumbing upgrading were completed on the facilities at Hill 37 and Camp Reasoner.

(4) Vertical construction during the month consisted of SEA huts, bunkers, and building rehabilitation projects.

e. III MAF Logistical Support of Operations Dewey Canyon II and Lam Son 719. In February, two operations involving U.S. Army and Republic of Vietnam forces were

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initiated with the objective of interdicting North Vietnamese supply routes through Laos. Logistical support for the operations was heavily committed and III MAF was requested to augment U.S. Army and Republic of Vietnam assets. During the month, one truck company from the 1st Marine Division, reinforced with vehicles from the Force Logistic Command and 1st Marine Aircraft Wing, carried an estimated 100,000 short tons of ammunition and supplies over a distance of approximately 30,000 miles during the period 7 - 14 February. A total of 72 vehicles and 10 forklifts were utilized. In addition to motor vehicle support, CH-53 helicopters from HMH-463 carried personnel and cargo throughout the month, averaging 5 aircraft a day. AH-1G Cobra helicopters protected the CH-53's, flying an average of 3 aircraft daily. Toward the end of the month, III MAF provided the following in support of Operation Lam Son 719:
