NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- 1. General Overview of all Activities. During this reporting period, 14-31 July 1969, 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion went under the Administrative Control of the 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade (ref CG, 3d Mar Div msg 180352Z July 69). Operational Control of the Battalion was maintained by the 3d Marine Division. Administrative Control of 1st Armored Amphibian Tractor Company and CoC, 3d Tank Battalion was passed to 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion on 15 and 13 July 1969 respectively (ref CG, 9th MAB msg 230210Z July 1969 (S)). All control minus operational control of CoA, 3d Anti-Tank Battalion was passed to 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion effective 14 July 1969 (ref CG, 9th MAB msg 270130Z July 1969 (S)). The final increment of 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion arrived at Camp Schwab on 18 July 1969. 1st Armored Amphibian Tractor Company arrived at Camp Schwab on 21 July 1969. Liaison with 9th MAB Staff sections was initiated and the Battalion entered Phase I Training. In addition to the training requirements, the Battalion began the rehabilitation of vehicles and equipment in accordance with 3d FSRO РЦЦЦО.36.
- 2. <u>Command Relations</u>. Coordination and liaison with 9th MAB was initiated and continuous throughout the reporting period. Coordination and cooperation with adjacent units i.e., 9th Marine Regiment, MACS 8 and RLT 26 Rear was also continuous.
- 3. Mission Assigned. The Battalion had a dual mission during this reporting period. Upon the redeployment of the Battalion from the Republic of Vietnam, the Battalion entered an intensive rehabilitation program of vehicles and equipment in order to place one company in a C-2 status (ref CG, FMFPAC msg 212049Z June 69 and Admin, 9th MAB msg 270012Z June 69). In addition, the Battalion began Phase I Training for redeploying forces (ref BrigO 1500.15).
- 4. Intelligence. Liaison was conducted with 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade G-2 and was continuous throughout the reporting period.
- 5. <u>Logistics</u>. On 13 July 1969, the remainder of 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion boarded the USS Vernon County, LST 1161, and arrived at Kin Red Beach on 18 July 1969. Upon arrival, this unit assumed operational control of the 1st Armored Amphibian Company, CoC, 3d Tank Battalion and CoA, 3d Anti-Tank Battalion. LTI Teams have been requested for all wheeled and tracked vehicles, communication and ordnance equipment. All support to date, by 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade, PSB and FSR has been excellent and no problem areas can be forseen at this time.
- 6. Communication and Electronics. Preventive maintenance was performed on all communication equipment and LTI Teams have been requested.



- 7. Equipment. Rehabilitation continued on all combat essential equipment. LTI's have been requested for all combat essential equipment and upon completion of the LTI's, Tactical Equipment Repair Orders will be prepared and equipment will be turned in as rapidly as possible. At the present time, deficiencies of combat essential equipment exist and more is contemplated upon the turn-in of equipment. As soon as a firm determination can be established, a report will be made in the next Logistics Summary.
- 8. Personnel and Administration. The Battalion joined one officer and dropped three enlisted personnel. The overall average strength of the Battalion was twelve officers and two hundred and forty-eight enlisted.
- 9. <u>VIP Visits</u>. BrigGen R. B. CARNEY Jr., CG, 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade, reviewed a static display of 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion on 28 July 1969 and LtGen H. W. BUSE Jr., CG, FMFPAC, reviewed a static display of 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion on 31 July 1969.

- 1. General Overview of all Activities. During this reporting period, 1-31 August 1969, 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion was under the administrative control of the 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade (ref CG, 3d MarDiv msg 180352Z July 1969). Operational Control of the Battalion went to CTF 79 upon receipt of COMSEVENTHFLT msg 042230Z August 1969. During this reporting period, Phase I Training was successfully completed and Phase II Training initiated. In addition to training requirements, the Battalion continued the rehabilitation of vehicles and equipment in accordance with 3d FSRO P4440.36.
- 2. <u>Command Relations</u>. Coordination and liasion with 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade was continuous throughout this period. Coordination and cooperation with adjacent units, i.e., 9th Marine Regiment and MACS 8 was also continuous.
- 3. <u>Mission Assigned</u>. The Battalion had a dual mission during this reporting period. The Battalion is under an intensive rehabilitation program of vehicles and equipment in order to place one company in a C-2 Status (ref CG, FMFPAC msg 212049Z June 1969 and Admin, 9th MAB msg 270012Z June 1969). In addition, the Battalion completed Phase I Training for redeploying forces (ref Brig0 1500.15).
- 4. Intelligence. Liasion was conducted with 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade G-2 and was continuous throughout this reporting period.
- 5. Logistics. LTI's have been completed on 90% of all combat essential equipment. The 10% of LTI's still pending are seven motor transport vehicles, seven tracked vehicles, one hundred and fifteen infantry weapons and ten artillery weapons. LTI's are still required on non-combat essential equipment such as tents, optical equipment, general supply items and field messing equipment. LTI teams have been requested to complete LTI's on combat essential and non-combat essential equipment.
- 6. Communication and Electronics. LTI's have been completed on 96% of communication and electronic equipment. There is 4% of the communication and electronic equipment pending LTI's by 3d FSR. Preventive maintenance on equipment, not in daily use, is in progress. There is a small amount of communication and electronic equipment pending 3d FSR work.
- 7. Equipment. Rehabilitation on all combat essential equipment is progressing well. At the present time there has been 90% of combat essential equipment and 96% of communication and electronic equipment LTI'd and TERO's submitted where required.

- 8. Personnel and Administration. The Battalion joined 4 officers and 64 enlisted and dropped 2 officers and 48 enlisted. The overall average strength of the Battalion was 16 officers and 270 enlisted.
- 9. <u>VIP Visits</u>. Gen Leonard F. CHAPMAN, Commandant of the Marine Corps, visited 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion on 5 August 1969 for a tour of 1st Amtrac Bn area and an up to date briefing. 

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- 1. General Overview of all Activities. During this reporting period, 1-30 September 1969, 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion was under the administrative control of the 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade. Operational control was retained by CTF 79. During this period, Phase II Training was carried out. In addition, the Battalion continued the rehabilitation of vehicles and equipment in accordance with 3d FSRO Ph440.36.
- 2. <u>Command Relations</u>. Coordination and liasion with 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade was continuous throughout this period. Coordination and cooperation with adjacent units, i.e., 9th Marine Regiment and MAC's 8 was also continuous.
- 3. <u>Mission Assigned</u>. The primary mission of the 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion was the rehabilitation of vehicles and equipment. The rehabilitation program is designed to place one company in a C-2 Status (ref CG, FMFPac msg 212049Z June 1969 and Admin, 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade msg 270012Z June 1969). In addition, the Battalion continued Phase II Training for redeploying forces (ref Brig0 1500.15).
- 4. Training. Presently, each unit has a nucleus of trained personnel capable of performing their duties efficiently. However, if we were to deploy a platoon of LVT's, Tank's or Anti-Tank's, each man would have to be thoroughly trained in order to make each one of these units an effective combat readiness unit. Since we are presently in a cadre status, we have not been allotted a training allowance for 90mm, 105mm, 106mm or .50 caliber ammunition. The problem that lies here is that it is necessary to have this ammunition so that we can fully qualify our personnel in the effective use of the crew-served weapons. Another one of our major problems is the lack of suitable training areas. There is no indirect firing ranges. Driving areas are inaccessible due to lack of trafficable access routes. These conditions seriously hamper our training program.
- 5. <u>Intelligence</u>. Liasion was conducted with 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade G-2 and was continuous throughout this reporting period.
- 6. Logistics. Recoverable Items Reports were received on twenty-seven amphibian tractors and these were dropped from our records, leaving a total of sixty-six amphibian tractors. Four new tractors were received and acceptance LTI's were completed on them. Code letters were received on two M151 jeeps, allowing us to reorder new vehicles and two M35 trucks were received. A P.S.B. Team performed LTI's on all vehicles remaining of those brought from Vietnam to determine their eligibility for code H classification. With the deactivation of Sub-Unit Two, 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion Supply picked up all 5th Marine Division assets belonging to CoA, 5th Amtrac's, CoA, 5th Tanks' and CoA, 5th Anti-Tank's (ref Admin, 9th MAB msg 291011Z Aug 1969). Property accounts were reconciled and excesses were determined for





turn-in. Equipment to be stored continued to be sorted, inventoried and assigned to locator cards.

- 7. Communication and Electronics. The rehabilitation of the communication section progressed well during the month of September. Assets belonging to 5th Marine Division units were consolidated with our communication equipment. Some T/E deficiencies were filled and excesses were determined. An inventory of all T/E equipment was held and completed.
- 8. Equipment. Rehabilitation of combat essential equipment was hampered by the lack of personnel to perform the necessary work. The Battalion remained in a C-4 Status. The highest number of tractors to come off deadline was nineteen. Motor Transport assets available for use remained limited. One M151 jeep was operational, two M35 trucks and four M37 3/4 ton trucks were operational. Fifty-seven machinegums, M1919Al were turned in for repairs and the majority were classified as code H items due to worn trunnion blocks.

At this time, CoC, 3d Tank Bn is progressing at a satisfactory level. It is estimated that 60% of the rehabilitation program for CoC, 3d Tanks is completed. Equipment and supplies that are not authorized have been declared as T/E excess. Overall, the company is now operating with approximately 95% of equipment authorized.

All of the LVTHAl's are deadlined due to the lack of available MLOIC direct fire sights. Althrough 3d FSR has the responsibility to supply five sights and order seven, none have been received. The company is waiting for replacements and evacuation vehicles from FSR.

CoA, 3d Anti-Tank Bn has reached a level of eight ontos in the up status, six remaining down for guns only and one remaining down mechanically.

- 9. Personnel and Administration. During the month of September, the personnel situation was bolstered by the addition of CoA, 5th Amtracs, CoA, 5th Tanks and CoA, 5th Anti-Tanks. However, a shortage of the occupational fields: 1833, 1811, 2142, 2141 and 2149 existed and continues to exist. The Battalion joined 8 officers and 201 enlisted personnel, of the 8 officers and 201 enlisted personnel joined, 3 officers and 88 enlisted personnel came from the 5th Marine Division assets. The overall average strength of the Battalion was 19 officers and 382 enlisted personnel.
- 10. <u>VIP Visits</u>. Col H. S. WIISON, Prospective Chief of Staff, 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade, visited 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion for an up to date briefing and a tour of the area.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During this period the Battalion emerged from a cadre status and made considerable progress towards overall combat readiness. A second line company was activated, thereby providing a total of six LVT platoons. The Battalion's mission was defined as one of providing an amphibious, ship-to-shore assault capability to the 3rd Marine Division. Two reinforced LVT platoons went afloat with BLTs of the Special Landing Forces during this period.

After four years of protracted land combat operations the proficiency of our LVT crewmen was found to be significantly deficient. This factor was evident in the sinking of an LVTP5A1 near the reef at Oura-Wan Bay on 1 November 1969 in which crew inexperience was a major contributing cause. Since then a comprehensive training program has been initiated. During December the Battalion accomplished an extensive amount of practical application of the techniques of waterborne assault operations. As a result, operational readiness in the training category improved to C-3 by the end of the month.

Also during this period the massive task of segregating, inventorying, inspecting and rehabilitating the supplies and equipment brought out of Vietnam was eventually accomplished. The usual growing pains were experienced as the Battalion sought storage, maintenance, and billeting space for its expanding components, but by the end of December these problems were largely solved. Combat readiness in the categories of equipment on hand and equipment availability increased to C-2 and C-3 respectively.

The factor which had the most effect in limiting the attainment of higher levels of combat readiness was the shortage of personnel, particularly in the SNCO ranks and in the 1833 and 2142 fields. These shortages also had detrimental effects on training and maintenance programs.



- 2. <u>Command Relations</u>. Operational control of the Battalion passed from the 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade to the 3rd Marine Division on 7 November 1969. On 10 December the Commanding General and certain members of his Staff visited the Battalion for a briefing on problem areas and corrective programs.
- 3. <u>Mission Assigned</u>. To provide an amphibious, ship-to-shore assault capability to the 3rd Marine Division. Specifically, the Battalion can provide a lift capability of 2,040 boat spaces, enough to land the assault elements of two RLTs.
- 4. Equipment. During this period a total of 37 LVTs were evacuated to CONUS for depot maintenance. These were the last of the vehicles brought out of Vietnam in a Code "Y" or "Z" condition. They were replaced by vehicles from the 5thAmTracBn which was deactivated during this time.
- 5. <u>Personnel</u>. In addition to the critical problems in this area described above, the Battalion suffered a shocking loss when the Battalion Maintenance Officer, CWO-4 R.W. Dancey, died of leukemia.







NARRATIVE SUMMARI

1. Ceneral Overview of Activities

- a. During this period, the let Amphibian Tractor Sattulion supported the 3rd Marine Division in all phases of amphibian operations, including SLF committments.
- b. A concerted caphasis was placed on maintaining a standard of readiness in the Battalien, commensurate with that of the 3rd Marine Division during this period. Both water and land training areas were utilized extensively to further upgrade the overall proficiency of the personnel of this Organisation.
- 2. Personnel and Administration. During the month of December the Sattalion stood at approximately 55% of menning level.
- 3. Intelligence. During this period the Battalion's everall security posture was highly satisfactory with no discrepancies.
- b. Training. Emphasis on training for the period was mainly in the areas of maintaining and improving contact material re-diness and the individual technical knowledge of members of the Command. A syllabus for waterborne training was published in connection with a program of comprehensive LVT Technical Training for the 3d quarter of FT70.

6. Squipment

- a. Ordnance. The sombat vehicle readiness of the Mattalian improved this reporting period.
- b. <u>Motor Transport</u>. A high rate of personnel turnover combined with a large excess of equipment procluded the first echelon maintenance from being brought up to a more favorable standard. Measures for alleviating

this situation are being put into effect by disposing of the excess vehicles.

c. Excess Equipment. A large excess of equipment has burdened the Battalion throughout this reporting period. Due to a lack of personnel to properly maintain the equipment, a maintenance problem has developed affecting the overall readiness of the equipment. Efforts to effect proper redistribution are being made and should help to alleviate the maintenance problem.

7. Logistice

a. Bupply. Large quantities of excess supplies retrograded from RVN are being reduced.

b. Pacilities

- (1) LVT Parking Area. This area remains a problem with the only area available consisting of clay soil. The imadequate drainage in this area causes extremely difficult working conditions to exist during rainy periods. Coordination with the Camp Butler Engineers and the 3rd Marine Division Engineers will alleviate this situation semewhat in the near future.
- (2) Armorise. The three separate armories maintained by the Battalian are considered to provide adequate security for the Battalian weapons. Lack of qualified armory personnel (MOS 2111) tends to reduce the efficiency of this armory system.
- (3) Billeting and Office Space. The Battalien is not in a consolidated area at this time, which is detrimental to the overall functioning and control of personnel within the Sattalien.
- c. <u>Medical</u>. During this period, the Battalion Aid Station functioned under the supervision of a Chief Fetty Officer. No Medical Officer is assigned to the Battalion.
- 8. Communications-Electronics. Exphasis during this reporting period was mainly upon the determination of material shortages, disposing of material excesses, and maintaining all equipment present.
- 9. Activations/Deactivations/Redesignations. On 150ec69, Company C, 1st Amfrac Bn, was activated and initially manual by 5 officers and 34 enlisted men.



was detached from its parent Emitalion, 5th Amphibian Tractor Battalion (-), which was deactived on that date, and placed under the Administrative and Operational control of the 26th Marine Regiment, 5th Marine Division (-) (Rein), FMF Camp Pendleton, California. The campany was formed minus one (1) plateon with all other organic assets at 99% T/E including the augmentation of six (6) personnel to the T/O from Headquarters & Service Company, 5th Amphibian Tractor Battalion (-), 5th Marine Division (-)(fein), FMF, Camp Pendleton, California. With detachment and deactivation of the parent Battalion came inherent problems as listed below:

- a. Assumption of all personnel not senior to the present Company Commander which in turn placed the Company more than 400% T/C am officer strength and over 150% in calisted strength.
- b. The assumption of a Brigade area messhall and accompanying burden of administrative control.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

On 27 November in accordance with CMC msg 031530Z dated Oct69 and 5th MarDivO 5450.5 this unit was redesignated as Company A (-)(Rein), 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion, 5th Marine Expeditionary Brigade, FMF, Camp Pendleton, California 92055 vice Company A (-)(Rein), 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion, 5th Marine Division (-)(Rein), FMF, Camp Pendleton, California 92055, thus completing the redesignation initiated on 1 November 1969 as reported in the previous submission. This reporting period was characterized by continual decreases in officer and enlisted

personnel strength due to quotas assigned by higher headquarters. Personnel transferred were to duty stations throughout the Marine Corps. At the end of this period, the Company still remained with 263 enlisted personnel and 15 officers as opposed to the 199 enlisted and 6 officers recommended. Personnel inputs during this period from WestPac and from otherosources as Schools Battalion, MCB, Camp Pendleton, were 50 enlisted.

As stated in the previous submission the many excess personnel on hand created a burden in the adequatedtraining of those personnel, because only enough organic and personal items of equipment were retained to support a Company minus. No change in that problem occurred during this period except that the reduction of personnel as stated above reduced proportionality the inability to effectively accomplish the MOS and regulatory training. Significant also was the fact that on 31 December 1969 this Company did not have an approved Table of Organization, an approved Table of Equipment, nor a stated mission beyond that given to all amphibian tractor letter companies by T/O M4653.

Highlighting December was the support of Third Battalion, Third Marines on a PHIBLEX during 1-5 December. During the same dates, one platoon was committed to supporting Second Battalion, Third Marines in a RAIDEX Exercise. The remainder of December, 1969, was committed to regulatory and mandatory MOS, GMS, and individual training with less emphasis on field work within the unit specialty. The end of the Second Quarter FY-70 found the Company still in a C-1 Readiness posture with an overall deadline rate of only 5% of the major items of rated equipment, and with a marked improvement in the overall proficiency of the LVT's and crews.

- b. Administration. Those functions previously reported, i.e., order writing, legal administration, training and operation sections have continued in operation. Additionally during this period an S&C section was established. A Human Relations Council was established in accordance with Brigade Order 5850.1. With membership composed of representatives from each Brigade unit in the Camp Delmar (21) Area, this council is to provide a forum whereby enlisted personnel may pose problems and seek solutions to grievances which they consider important to their personal or group welfare, but not of sufficient importance to warrant a request mast. A main goal of this council is to identify the existence of real or potential problem areas in racial relations.
- c. Training. Training continued in individual, unit, and MOS training with emphasis on increasing overall proficiency and unit readiness. Training during this period was highlight ed by a displacement of the Company CP during 1 to 5 December 1969 to coordinate support of Second Battalion, Third Marines in a RAIDEX Exercise, and two platoons in support of Third Battalion, Third Marines in PHIBLEX 4-69. Main weakness of the Company was in the area of training while aboard ship and the routine of ship board life. Noticeable improvement was reflected in the area of Communications. In all, two LSD's and 1 LPD were used during this period in amphibious operations. The salient features of training by date were as follows:
- 1-5 Dec69 Second and Third Platoons and detachment of Headquarters Section in support of PHIBLEX 4-69 First platoon operated aboard USS Juneau in support of RAIDEX, Second Battalion, Third Marines
- 8-9 Dec69 Dangerous Drug Lecture, 21 Area Theatre, 250 men

11 Dec69 - Gas Chamber - 200 men

155199Dec69 - Rifle range detail fired ranges 115 and 116

16 Dec69 - RVN Lecture, 21 Area Theatre, 150 men

23 Dec69 - Battle sights fired, 26 men, range 212A

d. Equipment. As stated in the Narrative Summary, no approved Table of Equipment has been received based on the proposed and recommended submission previous to this reporting period. This unit held 66 of 66 major end items of equip-

ment. The combat deadline for these items ranged from a high of 12% during early December 1969, to a low of 5% as of 31 December 1969. No significant problems regarding equipment has been encountered to date.

- e. <u>Communications</u>. At the beginning of this period, only 18 of the 38 LVTP family of vehicles organic to this unit were modified with the AN/VRC-46 series radio. Implementation of the modification was begun by the 5th Force Service Regiment during the month of December. By 31 December 1969 only 6 LVT P5A-1's remain to be modified, and these are scheduled for completion during January 1970. All CVC helmets have been modified concurrently with the LVTP5's, as required to make them compatible with the new system.
- f. Activation/Deactivation/Redesignation. On 27 November 1969 this unit was redesignated from Company A (-)(Rein), 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion, 5th Marine Division (-)(Rein), FMF, to Company A (-)(Rein), 1st Amphibian Tractor Battalion, 5th Marine Expeditionary Brigade, FMF.
- g. Logistics. Logistical support from higher echelons remain excellent with rapid response to out needs. An inspection held by the Material Management Unit of the 5th Marine Expeditionary Brigade during 15-17 December 1969 revealed a lack of a published Allowance List for Mount-Out held. All other aspects relating to mount-out, i.e., stocks, locator deck, and 708 card annotation were rated excellent. Problems of allowances, again, are related to the lack of an approved T/E. The discrepancies noted were corrected by publication of an Allowance List subject to further review and change.
