NARRATIVE SUMMARY

Three new officers joined the Battalion in September. Captain D.E. DAMON has been assigned as Battalion Supply Officer, Captain W.W. BENSON as HLO to PANAMA and 1stLt J.W. SHAFFER as Asst S-2/NBC Officer. On 3 September 1stLt D.O. THOMPSON became Support Platoon Commander at "B" Battery and CWO-2 HOWARD became Missile System Maintenance Officer. On 27 September 1stLt R.G. RAMIREZ was transferred to WSM Platoon.

On 5 September a typhoon hit the DaNang area causing minor damage at "B" and "C" Batteries. "A" Battery received extensive damage and one U.S. Army soldier received minor hand injuries. Winds were estimated at 120 MPH.

Damage to "A" Battery and its equipment:

Pulse Acquisition Radar (PAR)/Antenna Pedestal cracked
Nine SEA Huts/roofs destroyed
Three SEA Huts lost/frames and roofs destroyed
Nine SEA Huts/destroyed
Two four-holers/destroyed
Three generator sheds/destroyed
Motor transport shed/destroyed
Dog kennels/destroyed
Communications hut for MRC-83's/destroyed
Four bunkers/destroyed or extensively damaged
Eight posts/minor damage

Due to equipment damage from water and wind the Battery was in a down status for approximately 96 hours. A detachment from NMCB-53 started rebuilding the Battery on 8 September

From 2-6 September the Battalion received a Group Administration and Material inspection. The inspection grade was Satisfactory with minor discrepancies.

1. Enemy Action

a. On the following dates and times Danang was attacked by rockets:

1 September	0200	21 September	0205
3 September	0520	28 September	0550
17 September	0510		

The battalion suffered no casualties or damage.

b. VC/NVA activity in the Hai Van Pass continued at a high level during September. On 3 September two VC suspects were seen on the beach at AT 948943, 81mm fire was called by Battery "A". On 8 September 1968 air strikes and artillery were called on a suspected VC/NVA position at AT904930, observer reported seeing 40 NVA. On 19 September, there was a small night ambush at AT928922, no casualties. On 25 September, there was a night attack on a culvert at AT932894. On 27 September, there was a small attack by B-40 RPG's at AT928922, no casualties.

c. Enemy activity increased near Hill 55, however it had no effect on AFU "E".

3. Civic Action

a. Part of the road to Nai Nam was rebuilt and the construction of a cement dike was started.

b. Construction of a frog pond was completed and work continues on three fish ponds.

c. Nai Nam received 2 rolls of screen, 40 sheets of tin, 2 loads of damaged lumber, 1 load of plywood, and 5 tons crushed rock.

d. Sacred Heart Dispensary received 200 pounds of medical supplies. Both Sacred Heart Orphanage and China Beach Orphanage received 3 boxes of toiletries and 3 boxes of shoes. Sacred Heart also received 3 M-36 truck loads of food.

4. Air Defense

a. The Battalion did not better the record number of practice air defense engagements of last month. A total of 1257 or 100% of all engagements were successful, however.

b. There were 23 HAWK runs, 21 or 91.3% were successfully engaged.

5. Ground Defense

a. Several bunkers were rebuilt within the H&S Battery compound; others were improved upon.

b. Work was completed on Posts # 3, 7 and 10 at "A" Battery.

c. At "B" Battery posts # 3 and 16 have been refurbished while posts # 17 and 19 are in the process of being refurbished. All secondary positions along the southern perimeter have been refurbished.

d. Battery "C" continues to improve on all posts.

e. AFU "E"'s ground defense posture is being altered. Posts # 34 and 35 are being combined into a single post with better fields of fire and more protection against small arms.

6. Training

a. H&S Battery conducted 17 hours of GMS and 39 hours of technical training.

b. Battery "A" conducted 4 hours of GMS and 32 hours of technical training.

c. Battery "B" conducted 10 hours of GMS and 15 hours of technical training.

d. Battery "C" conducted 12 hours of GMS and 30 hours of technical training.

e. The time available for GMS and technical training was restricted. Major efforts were required to correct typhoon losses thereby reducing time available for training.

b. On 18 September AFU "E" received one AN/MPQ-39 from WSM.

c. During September Supply was inspected by the Field Supply Analysis Office Team # 3. Several minor discrepancies were noted.

d. During the month of September \$42,532.18 was obligated from OpBud funds. The Hotel obligations were \$4,812.18 and the Quebec obligations were \$5.29.

e. Total obligations for the month are \$53,349.65.

f. The end of the month brought to a close the first quarter of fiscal year 1969. From a grant of \$196,515.00 for the first quarter in OpBud, Battalion Supply utilized \$159,013.38 with the remainder of \$37,516.62 being transferred to the next quarter for utilization.

g. Hotel had a quarterly grant of \$60,000.00 of which \$30,131.80 was obligated leaving a balance of \$29,868.20 which was transferred to the second quarter.

h. Quebec had a quarterly grant of \$4,000 of which \$1,918 was obligated leaving \$2,081.77 which was transferred to the second quarter.

i. During September, Supply processed 2,261 requisitions, not including ServMart items. Of this number 1,730 items were issued from stock which gave a gross effectiveness of 76.3%. This is a decrease of 1.1% from the previous month. Of the total requisitions submitted, 320 were for items not previously carried. This accounted for a net effectiveness of 88.19%. This is a decrease of 2.1% from the month of August.

j. Total mileage was 41,322; 2,498 passengers were carried.

8. Military Construction and Camp Improvements

a. H&S Battery rebuilt several bunkers and improved others in the compound. Work continues on the interior of the Enlisted Club and the Sgt's Club remodeled the bar.

b. "A" Battery continues to rebuild their area along with a detachment from NMCB-53 following the typhoon of 5 September. Posts # 10, 7, and 3 were completed.

c. "B" Battery began work on severe erosion problems along the upper firing level. Relocation of Battery Communications has been completed. Drainage ditches have been completed around the fuel bladders. Work to put concrete floors in the generator sheds is continuing.

d. "C" Battery continues work on its perimeter defense, defoliation and erosion control. A 600 cubic foot refrigeration unit was installed in the messhall. The Helopad was repaired and refinished. Construction on launcher pad # 6 and generator sheds completed, along with securing the camp's buildings

e. AFU "E" is nearing completion of post # 34. Construction has begun on a new missile storage pit/missile test area.

f. The Communications Section has replaced old sandbags with sand filled 55 gallon drums in its area within the H&S Battery compound.

9. Operations

a. Radio Relay made several administrative improvements on work order flow, material distribution and preventive maintenance.

b. A Radio Relay Generator Section was formed to more efficiently run and maintain the power unit assigned to that section.

c. Technical improvements included replacement of antennas damaged during the typhoons, and repair of five PU-278 generator sets. The section also received two rebuilt PU-346 generators.

d. As a result of the A&M Inspection the log books on MRC-83's and TRC-75's were corrected.

e. The Operation Central, AN/TSQ-57 was without an air conditioner the first part of the month, but it is not operating effectively.
