ANNEX A (Civic Action) to Periodic Personnel Report 3-66

Ref: (a) Div0 1080.3

- a. The 1st Military Police Battalion's civic action program has continued to progress in scope, towards a goal of lasting projects. In order to enhance civil military relationships an effort was made to touch hamlet areas not reached before by this unit. Commodity distribution was cut back during the month of August, limited to strict criterion of definite need within each community.
- b. The Combined Action Companies DaNang and East DaNang continued to hold MEDCAPS twice daily and commodity distribution when required. Combined Action Company DaNang East completed construction of three compound dispensaries and CAC DaNang completed construction of one dispensary. This totals to nine new dispensaries out of the 12 CAC DaNang compounds. Plans in September will result in all compounds having equal medical facilities. CAC compound F-2 began construction of a foot bridge at AT 989783, with MCB 10 and local civilians. Date of completion is estimated to be 7 September 1966. On 21 August 1966, five homes burned down in vicinity of BT 034746, origin unknown. CAC F-5 assisted the families by billeting them the night of the fire. Two carpenter kits were provided to the victims to rebuild their homes along with some lumber. A GP tent was erected for temporary housing and some clothing was provided. Materials and assistance were furnished to a local PF in DaNang East for repairing his home. DaNang East CAC G-3 painted the floor and walls of the maternity ward at Tan Thai village.
- c. Company "A" conducted a small commodity distribution and a MEDCAP one afternoon each week for three weeks in Hoa Son (BTO40757). On request of the village chief location of this MEDCAP will be changed to the vicinity of Hoa Cung village headquarters (BT 033751). Company "A" began English classes, an hour a day, three days a week, for 10 school teachers at Hoa Cung school. It is anticipated that English classes will begin for the children of this school following the elections. Company "C" conducted similar commodity distribution and MEDCAP one afternoon a week in Xuan Hoa district, DaNang Special Sector. The Xuan Hoa district officials invited members of their command to eat at their homes and the Battalion in kind arranged a special dinner for them at the Battalion messhall in the middle of August. Company "D" has held a MEDCAP and commodity distribution in Than CampBac (BT 018723). The Cao Dai asked for some assistance in supplying building materials for their school. Six truck loads of lumber were obtained and delivered to the school, already under construction. On 8 August, Company 'D" commenced English language classes for 8 school teachers of the Binh Khue Cam school (BT 014724). MEDCAP's were started on 12 August and are being held at this school twice a week. On 20 August 1966, a swing has been enthusiastically utilized by the school children. On 29 August English classes were started on a 2 hour a week basis for approximately 40 children at this school, jointly taught by a Vietnamese school

teacher and a Marine officer. Civic action in this area has resulted in a positive receptive attitude. In this area, we have begun to receive intelligence information as a by-product of the established rapport.

2. Special Incident Report

a. At approximately 171335H, a Marine Crusader Jet crashed at approx. coord 013728. At 171340H, this battalion dispatched 20 Marines from Company D, 20 from Battalion Headquarters and 12 from CAC F-6 to the crash site. These Marines assisted in cordoning off the crash site, assisting the injured, controling traffic, and controling the populace. Twentysix (26) bodies were recovered by 1st MPBn personnel. Personnel from Delta Company were used for security of the area during the night. 1st MP Bn personnel distributed clothing, cooking oil, blankets and other material aid to assist the victims of the crash, on the night of the accident and the days following.

S-2 CHRONOLOGY

1. Significant Events

a. The Hoa Tho village police chief was assassinated by a teenage boy with a 45 pistol on 26 August 1966 at Hoa Tho village office AT 999712. The assassin escaped.

2. New Developments

- a. Due to local security and civic action, a rapport has been established with local officials, resulting in intelligence information about VC operations within the 1st MPBn's, TAOR.
- b. Agent reports indicate VC infiltration into this unit's TAOR with the mission of interfering with the September 11 national elections. This information is discussed in detail in paragraph 4 of this Chronology.

3. Problem Areas. None

4. Intelligence Summary

- a. A few rounds of sniper fire were received almost every day in August in some part of this units TAOR. Company "B" received fire the 7th, 9th 15th and 16th; Company "C", the 6th 8th; Company "D", the 17th 20th, 21st, 22nd; CAC Da Nang East, the 25th, 26th, 27th and 30th; Camp Tien Sha, the 4th and 14th; and the Naval Covered Storage Area, the 5th 8th, 20th and 26th. During August, Da Nang East had a higher incidence of sniper fire incidents than Da Nang Main. Da Nang Main, however, had grenades thrown at three patrols and at one CAC compound.
- b. VNAF on 1, 6 9 and 25 August reported one to two platoons of VC operating in Hoa Tho village (AT 971728) with the mission of recomnaissance, assassination of key officials and mortar attack of the area. It was most likely elements of this unit which attacked 3rd Tanks on 16 August 1966.
- c. VNAF reported possible demonstrations to take place at Hoa Vang on 19 August. VNAF and MAF agents reported VC intentions to mortar the Da Nang Air Base on 19 August. Neither event took place.
- d. On 18 August NAD reported VC intentions to attack both Da Nang Air Base and the Da Nang East Air Base between 16 August and 12 September. On 25 August VNAF reported that a company from the 507th Battalion had the mission of attacking the Da Nang Air Base from the South East between that date and election time, 11 September. Also VNAF reported on that date the names of possible VC propaganda agents operating in Hoa Guong village south of the Da Nang Air Base. These personnel were put under survoillance, and names reported to CIT. Also on 25 August 1966 the Hoa Guong Police Chief reported infiltration of part of a VC company into Khue Bac BT 052735. S-2 comment; if VC did infiltrate this area they were few in number for no indication of their infiltration could be observed and search produced negative results. On 26 August 1966 Hoa Vang District S-2 reported three assassins operating in Hoa Tho near BT 003710. On 26 August 1966 the Hoa Tho Police Chief

was shot by a teenage boy (mentioned in para 1). On 29 August VNAF reported infiltration of VC into Hoa Cuong with terror plans for the 8th through 12th of September. On 30 August 1966 the assistant hamlet chief of Khue Trung II (BT 0172) notified the C.O. Company "D" that two assassins (names and possible locations given) were in Hoa Cuong village to sabotage the elections. S-2 comment: the area has been under surveillance but results are negative to date. On 31 August 1966 VNAF agents reported large scale infiltration of Da Nang and surrounding areas, particularly Hoa Tho, with trained saboteurs and assassins to prevent the elections.

5. Special Intelligence Reports

a. All special remorts were forwarded to MAF, and 3rd Division when appropriate.

b. On 29 August 1966 the Hoa Cuong Police Chief gave information on the location of the 92nd VC Regiment including location of the Regimental CP at Thach Bo village, AT 955687. All details of this report were sent to MAF and 3rd Division.

6. Prisioner Report

- a. There were 3 VCS apprehended and checked positively against the black list and taken to CIT. There were 2 VCS evacuated to ITT.
- b. There were 8 suspicious persons apprehended and turned over to Hoa Vang District Headquarters during August.
- 7. Enemy Casualties. At 152215H August 1966 Company "B" BT 054745 received one round sniper small arms fire. Company "B" dispatched one patrol to the vicinity of the snipers position BT 055746 and observed an armed man in flight. The patrol fired on and wounded the man, who never the less succeeded in escaping.
- 8. Captured Equipment and Supplies A Vietnamese frogman, Coastal Security Company, while on liberty in Da Nang West was walking through a dump at BT 001726 and found a ChiCom 26mm flare gun and 16 rounds of flare ammunition, 3 white star and 13 red star. The weapon was in excellent condition and couldn't have been separated from its owner longer than 24 hours. The Vietnamese turned this weapon into Tango Security, who in turn notified 1st MPBn. S-2. A surveillance watch was established in the area with negative results.











Ref: (a) LPM 1960, Chapter 5, para 20-24 (b) Force Order 03440.2

1. Purpose. To publish general guidance and instructions for the perfermance of duty of sentries manning Gates, 6, 12 and 16 of the Da Nang Airbase Perimeter.

- 2. Cancellation. Bastalion Order 163D.1.
- 3. Background. Gates 6, 12 and 16 are within the area of responsibility of the First Military Police Battalion. All sentries standing duty on these gates must have a working knowledge of all General and Special Orders concerning their post as brought out in this order. They must also maintain a high degree of military bearing and military courtesy while on duty.

4. Action.

- a. Unit Commanders will insure that sentries are properly instructed in their duties prion to assuming each gate watch. All sentries will be guided by the beneral Orders for sentries $(R_ef(a))$, and the rules of Engagement for the D_a Nang Airbase $(R_ef(b))$.
- (1) Uniform. The uniform for gate sentries will be clean utilities, shined boots, steel helmet w/camouflage cover and normal arms. Rifle will be carried at sling arms and cartridge belts squarely worn.

(2) Entry and Exit

- (a) The following personnel will be allowed to enter or leave the Airbase.
 - 1 U.S. Service Personnel
 - 2 Third Nationals and U.S. civilians with appropriate

passes.

3 Vietnamese Nationals and Service personnel when approved by Vietnamese Military Police on post.

(3) Vehicles

(a) All vehicles containing only U.S. service personnel will be allowed to enter and exit freely during hours when gates are open.

(b) Vietnamese Military vehicles and U.S. vehicles with Vietnamese passengers will be allowed to enter and exit on approval of the Vietnamese Military Police on duty.

(4) Searching

(a) Searching will normally be directed by this head-quarters. In the event of suspicious behavior, unusual cargo, or other provacative circumstances, sentries are authorized to conduct in immediate on-the-spot search.

(b) Normally all searches of V₁etnamese personnel and vehicle will be conducted by Vietnamese duty personnel. If a search of Vietnamese personnel or vehicles becomes necessary and there is not any Vietnamese on duty at the gate, the subject personnel/vehicles will be detained and this headquarters notified for further instructions.

(c) If a search of Vietnamese personnel/vehicles becomes necessary, one sentry will search while at least one other sentry covers the man who is conducting the search.

(5) Special Orders for the to to

- (a) Gate six is located at coordinates (ATØ1Ø733) and is a secondary entrance to the Da Nang Airbase for use by U.S. Military personnel and vehicles only.
- (b) The post will be occupied by one sentry between the hours of first light and 1800.
- (c) Gate 6 is supported by post#1, Company D, which will have four (4) LAAW's, one (1) Shotgun, two (2) CS Grenades and an M-60 Machinegun availabel for defensive purposes.

(d) All Vietnamese personnel will be directed to gates I or 12 for entrance.

(6) Special Orders for Unte 12.

^ ·.

(a) Gate 12 is located at coordinates (AT 995747) and is a primary entrance to the Da Nang Airbase.

(b) The gate will remain open 24 hours daily.
(c) The gate will be manned by two men from 0700 to 1700 and by four men, two men on post and two on standby, form 1700 to 0700.

(d) The uniform for this post will be as stated in para 5(a) of this order, except that those sentries on duty between 0700 and 1700 daily will wear M.P. Helmet Liner, MP brassard, and white belt with holster magazine pouch and slide. They will be armed with the .45 cal pistol and three (3) magazines of five (5) rounds each. One

magazine will be inserted in the pistol. No rounds will be chambered unless required in the performance of duty in accordance with reference (b).

(e) Vietnamese Military personnel are on duty at all times and will control the entry and exit of Vietnamese through the gate.

(f) Between 0700 and 2000, 3rd Marine Division MP's will be on duty at the gate to provide traffic control. Sentries will still control the entrance and exit of vehicular and pedestrian traffic.

(g) The sentry post at gate 12 will maintain two (2) shotguns, four (4) LASW's, four (4) flak vests and four protective masks for defensive purposes.

(h) The post will also maintain two signal direction wands and two flashlights.

(7) Special Orders for Gate 16.

- (a) Gate 16 is located at coordinates (AT 997765) and is a secondary entrance to the Da Nang Airbase for use by U.S. Military personnel only.
- (b) The gate will be open from first light until 1800 daily and will be manned by one sentry.
- (c) Gate 16 will have two (2) CS Grenades, two (2) LAAW's, one (1) Shotgun and an M-60 Machinegun available for defensive purposes.

 (d) All Vietnamese will be directed to gates 1 or 12.
- 5. It is the policy of this battalion that all sentries on post are carefully instructed as to their duties and responsibilities. In addition to being efficient and knowledgeable, they are expected to be wourteous and helpful to traffic on the gate and to their Vietnamese counterparts as well. All instructions will be to this end.

(c) U. S. Navy Regulations, Sec. 0761

1. <u>Purpose</u>. To prescribe regulations on anti-blackmarket, personal property, customs and currency controls in implementation of references (a), (b), and (c).

2. Background

a. 1st MPEn personnel may import their personal baggage, and personal! effects into Vietnam without paying Vietnamese customs and taxes.

b. In addition, personnel who are issued ration cards may buy items in the Post Exchange that were brought into Vietnam without payment of Vietnamese customs or taxes. III MAF personnel are prohibited from possession alcholic beverages as personal property, Foro 1710.1. These privileges are for the benefit of III MAF personnel only and will not be used to obtain property for Vietnamese Nationals or others who are not entitled to such privileges.

3. Customs

a. <u>Prohibited Items</u>. The private importation or exportation of any of the following articles into or out of Vietnam by any means is prohibited:

(1) Narcotics

- (2) Marihuana (cannabis) or other habit forming drugs, i.e. derivatives of the following primary substances; Barbituric acid, Bromal, Carbromal, Chloral, Cocaine, Codeine, Herion, Morphine, Opium, Paraldehyde, sulformethane.
 - (3) Explosives, ammunition, or fireworks.
 - (4) Privately owned firearms.

- (5) Vietnamese currency in excess of 500 piasters
- (6) Items in excess of demonstratable personal needs.
- (7) Gold or Silver Bullion.
- (8) Articles manufactured or produced in Communist China, North Vietnam, or North Korea.
 - (9) Obscene or Pornographic articles or literature.
- (10) Printed matter advocating treason or insurrection against the U. S. or Republic of Vietnam or any country with which the United States has entered into a mutual defense or assistance agreement.

b. Currency, etc., Conversion

- (1) Upon arrival in Vietnam all personnel will declare the amount of United States and foreign currencies and dollar instruments in their possession. All United States currency and instruments will be converted into Military Payment Certificates and or Vietnamese Piasters at the point of entry into Vietnam, where facilities are provided, and, in any event, not later than at the time of command processing on entry into Vietnam.
- (2) Untied States currency and negotiable instruments received through the mail by personnel of this command will either be converted immediately into M.P.C. or Vietnamese Piasters, mailed immediately to an address outside the Republic, or converted into money orders for immediate mailing outside the Republic.
 - c. Currency etc. Possession/Transaction. Personnel are prohibited from:
- (1) Having United States currency and dollar instruments except one cent coins, in their possession at any time after their arrival in Vietnam.
- (2) Dealing in M. P. C. in any manner with personnel not authorized to possess MPC. This prohibition includes but is not limited to:
 - (a) Accepting MPC from unauthorized personnel.
 - (b) Transferring MPC to unauthorized personnel.
 - (c) Exchanging MPC for unauthorized personnel.
- (d) Converting MPC, Piasters, U. S. or foreign currency or dollar instruments at other than authorized facilities.
- (3) Converting MPC into Piasters except at official United States conversion points.

(4) Taking or mailing MPC outside the Republic of Vietnam.

4. Ration Cards

a. General

- (1) Rationed items will be sold only to customers who possess a valid ration card.
- b. Restrictions. The following restrictions govern the use of ration cards.
 - (1) Cards are not transferable.
 - (2) Cards are valid for 13 months.
 - (3) Cards may not be bartered sold or placed in pawn to any person.
- (4) Cards must be turned in to the proper authority upon departure from Vietnam.
- 5. Enforcement. Military personnel violating this general order shall be subject to punishment in accordance with the procedures and provisions of the Uniform Code of Military Justice.

6. Action

- a. Commanding Officers and supervisory personnel shall ensure that:
- (1) Personnel are periodically instructed on the appropriate provisions of this order to include instruction during processing on entry into, and daprture from, Vietnam.
- (2) Appropriate implementing procedures are developed and enforced to include action to:
- (a) Insure that all personnol arriving or departing from the Republic of Vietnam, except medical evacues, execute a MACV form 40 (Encl (1)) and that all personnel arriving or deaprting on R&R aircraft and commercial aircraft other than Military Airlift Command (MAC) contract aircraft have completed the necessary GVN customs forms in addition to the MACV form 40. The executed MACV forms 40 will be collected by the responsible Commanding Officers, entered in the individuals Service Record Book to be maintained for one year for possible use in disciplinary actions. Book to be maintained for one year for possible use in disciplinary actions.
- (b) Insure that checks are made of the baggage of each group of personnel arriving and departing from the Republic of Vietnam. All reports of violations will include the MACV Form 40 as executed by the individual concerned before the violation was discovered.

Three Vietnamese males were apprehended as possible illegal residents and were taken to Hoa Vang District Headquarters for further disposition.

- B. Lack of an approved T/E for CAC units continues to cause great difficulty in what normally would be standard requisitioning procedures. Recommended T/E was submitted by this o ganization in June, 1966.
- C. PF personnel have received an initial allowance of food distributed through Vietnamese channels, provided by CRS.

 - b. New Developments: People-toPeople Medical Programs have continued to increase their medical aid to Vietnamese civilians. The twelve Corpsnon in the Combined Action Company treated an average of 3500 Vietnamese civilians per week. Weekly visits to these positions were made by the Battalion Surgeon, who reviewed problem cases and referred patients to USAAM or Armed Forces Medical facilities as indicated. Transportation of patients on a bi-weekly basis to referring facilities was instituted. It is felt the quality of medical care rendered has been improved. Lectures in field sanitation and hygeine were conducted by medical personnel for Vietnamese civilians.
