8-2 INTELLIGENCE

#### NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- 1. During April 98 detainess were apprehended. Of these, 45 were illegal residents, 38 were cutting wood in an unsuthorised area, 4 were draft dodgers, 5 had no ID cards, 6 had improper ID cards, and 2 are still being held for questioning.
- 2. Numerous intelligence reports from Vietnamese sources indicate possible enemy attempts to gain noteworthy propagands viotories during the period 1 May (VN Labor Day) 19 May (Ho Chi Minh's birthday). These attempts could include both major attacks against US-GVN installations and sabotage/terrorist attacks against U.S. billeting areas and GVN buildings. III MAF reports that a captured enemy document contained an MR-5 directive to enemy forces urging increased attacks on U.S. Airbases.
- 3. Danang Special Sector Intelligence Section reported that a meeting was held on 20 April at AT 831623 and was attended by military and political cadremen of both province and district level. Included in the discussion were proposed plans to attack the district Headquarters of Hieu Duc, Hoa Vang, and Pai Loc District.

### S-3 OPERATIONS/TRAINING

- 1. During the month of April, 1967 the Battalion conducted 102 day and 119 night fire team patrols, 485 day and 848 night squad patrols, 54 ambushes and set out 144 listening posts for a total of 1752 small unit actions during the month with no significant contact.
- 2. Normal Battalion training was conducted consisting of six hours per week of GMS Training and weekly weapons safety classes.
- 3. Air Base Defense Battalion Operation Order 103-67, "Defense of Hoa Vang District HQ's" was published (See section IV, Supporting documents).
- 4. An Air Base Description Folder was compiled for a civilian study group working for the Department of Defense on a study of Base Defense in Vietnam. (See section IV, Supporting documents).
- 5. A reevaluation of the defense of the I Corps Bridge complex was made and Battalion Frag Order 3-67 was published to coordinate the defense of the bridge complex. (See section IV, Supporting documents).
- 6. From 20-22 April indoctrination classes were held for 17 new CAC personnel to familiarize them with the mission and functions of the CAC program and the customs and traditions of the Vietnamese people when they will be working closely with. Ten hours of Vietnamese language classes were also included during these classes.

#### 8-4 LOGISTICS

- 1. During the month of April two additional Vietnamese laborers were hired, bringing our total to twelve.
- 2. Two generators (15KW) and 6,000 feet of wire were obtained and placed on the I Corps Bridge and additional lights were installed under the bridge.
- 3. Supply. Shortages of parts of the M-109 and M-422 continues to be a problem. However, all other individual equipment is in good supply. The first shipment of jungle boots arrived for distribution to the Battalion.
- 4. Motor Transport. Five new vehicles were involved to the command during the month, three M-38's and two M-35's.

### 8-5 CIVIL AFFAIRS

### I. Coneral.

- a. During the month of April the civic action program of the 1st MP Bn continued to function under the guidelines set in Force Order 5080.
- b. During April there were two accidental shooting incidents involving Vietnamese nationals within the TAOR of the 1st MP Bn.
- (1) On 18 April a Vietnamese male was shot and subsequently died in the vicinity of the Tri Minh The (I Corps) bridge.
- (2) On 19 April a Vietnamese woman was shot through the arm while sitting in her home in the vicinity of CAC F-2:
- (3) Both incidents are being investigated and solutium has been paid to each family.
- c. During April solatium was also paid to the family of a VN woman who was killed in March near CAC G-2 and to the family of a VN boy who was killed in March near CAC F-7.
- d. A photo trip has been planned through a neighboring village on the 6th of May. This will enable Marines to see the "other side" of Vietnam and take interesting pictures also.
- this battalion and neighboring Vietnamese. One form is for use in Quang Nam Province only and is to be filled out in duplicate, one copy to be sent through the normal Vietnamese channels and the second copy to be retained by the military coordinators for "follow-through". The second form is to

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be used by the bettalion personnel and Vietnamese in the Danang area. It is to be used in the same manner as the first form.

These forms are an excellent means of obtaining Vietnamese participation in projects. They must fill out the forms and indicate who will be the Vietnamese sponsor. The forms also require the endorsement by signature and seal of the hamlet and village ohiefs. By filling out the forms the Vietnamese "obligate" themselves and insure association and participation in the project.

i. On the 22nd of April the monthly Hoa Guong Village civic action council met for the third time. The council has been increasingly successful in creating a working rapport between the Vietnamese and military forces represented in the village. The meeting has shown the Vietnamese that the free world forces have the sincere interests of the people at heart and they are encouraged to bring up any problems that the military through its mesources, manpower, or influence might help solve.

During the April meeting approximately 50 - 75 farmers of the village showed up to express their serious concern over crop damage. This crop damage was attributed to spraying by sirplanes. Since these crops represent success or failure for the farmers, they were very seriously concerned.

The council promised to contact agriculture representatives from Quang Nam Province and from the 29th Civil Affairs Company to see what can be done.

During April coordination will be attempted with units represented in Hoa Tho and Hoa Phat to explore the possibility of beginning civic action councils in those areas. This is of direct importance to the lst MP Bn since the attitude of these people could have influence on the battalion's tactical security.

## 2. Education.

- a. The battalion's education program began tapering off as the schools
- (1) The battalion was represented at ten schools for closing ceremonies. At this time gifts were presented to the best students, usually school kits obtained by the battalion. These ceremonies were attended by village of-circumstances.
- (2) A survey was conducted to find what classes will be taught during the surman and when the discontinued ones will begin again. This should provide some continuity in our education program.

b. A variety of self-help projects to enlarge or improve schools have been started. These will be stressed during the summer months. Included are the building of latrines, painting of schools, building of school benches, and rebuilding of schools.

## 3. Public Health.

- a. Sick call was held daily at each CAC compound. Almost 13,000 patients were treated during the month. Approximately 6,000 bars of scap were distributed.
  - The battalion medevaced 22 Vietnamese Nationals during the month.
  - c. Latrines were constructed at schools and village headquarters.
- d. Plans have begun on a "pit-privy" latrine, permanent type, with a septic tank. If successful, these will be built throughout the TAOR.

#### 4. Public Works.

- a. The battalion aided the Vietnamese in the construction of culverts, schools, and public health facilities during the month.
  - b. A self-help project to paint the Ngaio District VIS was completed.
- c. Approximately 20 speed limit signs were constructed and posted throughout Hoa Guong and Hoa Tho Villages.
  - d. A road patrol was begun by the 1st MP Bn through Roa Guong Village.

- b. A detailed report was compiled on the III MAF Platoon leaders Personal Response Notebook. This was submitted to the Personal Response Officer at III MAF.


## PSYCHOLOGICAL OPERATIONS







#### 5 APRIL 1967

- a. Sentries manning perimeter defensive positions observed approx. 5 tracer rds being fired at 051945H at aircraft taking off to the south. Rds appeared to be coming from vicinity of BT 014709. Notified 1st Mar Div COC. Sent out patrol from CAC F-6 to sweep area north of Song Cau Do. Neg results.
- b. At 052245H, 1 rd SAF impacted near Gate #6 (BT 010734). Rd fired from somewhere to the south. Patrols in area alerted. No casualties.
- c. At 052030H at coord. BT 026729, CAO F-7 apprehended 2 male dtness with improper ID and sent them to Hoa Vang Dist. HQ's.
- d. From 052230H to 062400H a sweep was conducted by Mar's and FF's from CAC G and QO's and Natl Police in Tan Thai Village within the area bounded by coord. BT 062808, 063807, 060800, 062800. 2 female dtness sent to Danang Garrision.

### 6 APRIL 1967

- a. At 062157H an alert was held for the Bn & the FISG reaction plt.
- b. At 061530H one (1) VN was apprehended at BT 004729 without ID. Taken to Hoa Vang HQ's.

## 7 APRIL 1967

a. At 070013H Prov. Co.'s Comm. bunker (BT 003775) spotted a VN riding a bicycle along the north end of the runway. The VN stopped, left the bi-cycle, and ran away in a northerly direction. A patrol was sent out with neg. results.

#### 8 APRIL 1967

a. From 080900H - 081015H Mar's & PF's from CAO G made a sweep of the area bounded by coord. BT 042770-048778, & BT 048752-053753. Neg. results.

#### 1) APRIL 1967

a. At 110045H a patrol from CAC F received one (1) rd S/A fire at coord BP 045739. The patrol and a reaction squad swept the area and found an empty tunnel which was destroyed. No further contact.

b. At 112010H am observation post from A Company at coord. AT 045745 received two (2) rds of S/A fire from the direction of the I Corps bridge.





a. At 121240H one VN female was picked up for no ID at B Co. road block (BT 055748), and transported to Hoa Vang HQ's for further disposition.

#### 14 APRIL 1967

a. At 140010H, at AT 995734 the D Co. line received approx. 40 rds S/A fire. A patrol was sent out and searched the area with neg. results. No casualties.

b. At 141621H an USMO F-8 on the north end of airstrip accidentially discharged one (1) Arrow Rocket Pod containing nineteen (19) rockets. The impact area was to the south of the airstrip. 5 rds detonated causing damage to an earthmover; one unexploded projectile was recovered and removed by USMO EOD personnel. USAF and USMO EOD are trying to locate the other projectiles. No casualties.

o. One Vietnamese with severe head injuries was brought to CAC G-2 by two (2) other VN, who said the injured men had been besten with rifle butts by two (2) Mar's at 2145H at approximate coords. BT 051805. The injured man was medevaced to USOM Hospital. The man was brought to G-3 at 142200H.

### 15 APRIL 1967

a. At 150005H Mar's from C Co., Natl Police, QC's, and PF's of the Dong Giang Sector conducted a sweep through An Trung Hamlet, An Hai Village. Five (5) illegal residents and two (2) draft dodgers were apprehended and taken to Danang Garrison for interrogation. Seven (7) dtness. Coordinates of sweep; Bounded by BT 042762 - 048763, BT 048753- 052752.

b. At 157850H Mar's from 3/1 fired on a boat at coord. BT 047733 & reported wounding two Vietnamese in the oraft. The two wounded (one male and one female) were picked up by Mar's and PF's from CAC G at approx coord BT 050733. Both were seriously wounded and were evacuated to NSA hospital. Neither had ID cards. The boat was fired on because it was in the river after curfew. The two wounded VN were questioned by members of an ATT team and will be released after they recover from the wounds.

#### 17 APRIL 1967

Prom 170330 to 170640H the HAS Co. 1st reaction plt., elements of D Co., Natl Police, CAC F, and set dogs conducted a sweep of BT 015722, 020725 along the Song Cau Do and the fishing village at coord. BT 023725. The sweep was searching for contraband, suspicious VN, and caves along river bank. Neg. results.

#### 18 APRIL 1967

a. From 180900H-181100H, coords. BT 048797 - BT 040805 - BT 055813 - BT 058813, a sweep was conducted by one (1) sqd of Mar's and two (2) plt. PF's from Nai Hien Dong BT 048797-040805 to Nam Quang Village BT 055813-058813. One detained taken to Danang Garrison for no ID card.

b. At 180230H a CAC G-4 patrol apprehended one detainee who was seen wandering around and looking in Vietnamese houses. The man's ID card and voters registration card were taken and the patrol was taking him back to the CAP compound when he broke away and escaped. The documents were turned over to Vietnamese authorities for further action.

At about 181135H a VN male, DANG VAN CHUC, was proceeding north, toward the I Corps Bridge, at approx Coord. BT 040758 when he was shot in the knee of his right leg. He was taken to USAID hospital but was DOA. At the time CHUO was hit several Mar's and PF's were firing at objects floating down the river. A S.I.R. was made to III MAF COC by Armed Forces Police C.I.D. Section which is presently conducting an investigation of the incidents.

d. At 181500H Vietnamese children pointed out an old M-26 grenade at coordinates BT 008779. The grenade was rusty and had no fuse indicating that the grenade had been in that position for quite a while. The grenade was recovered.

## 19 APRIL 1967

AT 986766. A Vietnamese woman came to the UAC compound with a flesh wound on the arm. She was taken to the USOM Hospital. The origin of the rds







- b. Friendly Forces. Dong Giang Sector provides one squad of PFs.
- c. Assumptions.
  - (1) The enemy intends to continue the destruction of vital bridges in the areas
  - (2) The old I Corps Bridge is a vital target.
  - (3) The new I Corps Bridge upon completion will be a vital target and its destruction would provide a great propaganda victory for the VC.
- 2. MISSION. Defend the I Corps (Trinh Minh) Bridge against enemy attack with primary concern being a UDT type attack.

#### 3. EXECUTION.

- a. Concept of Operation. The Air Base Defense Bn. defends the I Corps Bridge using walking posts on the bridge, boat checks of the bridge pilings four (4) times nightly, a daily underwater check of the pilings, Seismic Intrusion Devices and frequent interdiction of the area around the pilings using fregmentation grenades.
- b. Company A. Furnishes boat with motor for the nightly checks of the bridge.
- c. Company B In addition to normal security.
  - (1) Pick up and assume responsibility for the Alpha company motor-boat by 191800H and beginning on the night of 19-20 April 1967 conduct at least 4 nightly checks of all of the bridge pilings, both on the old and the new I Corps Bridges using the leat.
