





NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- (S) Support for III MAF during this period continued with the collection, processing and reporting of Signal Intelligence by the 1st Radio Battalion. The six platoons remained in place in Quang Tri and Quang Nam Provinces for the immediate direct support of the Division and Regimental Commanders. The Operation Control Platoon operated at Camp Horn and was directly responsive to the requirements of III MAF. A Direct Support Team (DST) was active this month with the 7th Marines in Operation Cklahoma Hills, and the 5th Marines were supported during Muskogee Meadow. Support to Operation Montana Mauler continued until termination of the operation on 3 April.
- (S) Transmission Security Monitoring in support of III MAF continued throughout the period. The number of violations dropped from the last months figure of 194 to 163 for April. This is of note since a higher number of messages were monitored (149,130) with 294 man-hours devoted to this task. Lectures were provided to tactical units upon request, although they sometimes had to be cancelled by the tactical unit due to operational commitments.
- (S) Airborne, short range and VHF Direction Finding efforts were continued and at times the fixes were utilized for firing of artillery into the suspected area. Fixes were attained as follows:



(S) The Army and Air Force units continued to work in close harmony with the Radio Battalion. The 138th Aviation Company has provided direct support in a responsive and timely manner. Many "unident" fixes are not any assistance to the Radio Battalion Analysts, but often are fired on by the tactical commanders.

4. (U) Maintenance

- a. <u>Electronics</u>. A total of 22 work orders were submitted, 17 completed and 4 pieces awaiting repair parts in the shop.
- b. Engineer. 78 Tactical Equipment Repair Orders were submitted and 81 completed. 6 were evacuated to higher echelon. 45 of the 78 were for general repairs and the remainder for scheduled maintenance.

5. (U) Motor Transport. During April the Motor Transport Section travelled 22,796 miles with 68 tons of cargo and approximately 4,558 personnel. 61 TERO's were submitted and 64 completed with 2 evacuated to higher echelon for completion. 25 TERO's were for general repairs and the remainder were scheduled maintenance.
