



#### PART II

#### NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. (S) During the month of May, 1st Radio Battalion, through its operational platoons deployed throughout Central and Southern I Corps Tactical Zone, provided on-the-spot direct support to tactical elements of the 1st Marine Division and to Marine Aircraft Group 13 while the battalion as a whole provided beth direct and general support to the headquarters of III Marine Amphibious Force, the U.S. Army XXIV Corps, the 1st Marine Division, and the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing. The direct support role was highlighted by timely provision of vital tactical intelligence information which aided in the launching of successful assault missions, fire missions, embushes, counter-ambushes, search and destroy missions, and warnings of impending attacks upon U.S. Marine and other Free World Forces installations and deployed units. The results of this direct support by 1st Radio Battalion elements ensured the continued loss by the enemy of equipment and personnel, the denial of freedom to move to and from his forward base areas, and helped prevent the enemy from obtaining local provisions and supplies.

On 27 May, 1st Radio Battalion operations were expanded by the activation of the 5th Platoon at Chu Lai with subordinate sites at Hill 270 and Landing Zone Bayonet in direct support of Marine Aircraft Group 13.

- 2. (C) During the month of May, 1st Radio Battalion TRANSEC elements monitored 931 hours of friendly communications activity; a reduction of 290 hours from the April figure. The number of TRANSEC positions remained at six. Total transmissions monitored numbered 82,795; a reduction of 17,910 from the April figure. This latter reduction can be attributed primarily to the increased use of cipher equipment on selected voice nets of III MAF units. Total violations numbered 175, of which 84 were spot reported. The latter figures represent a considerable reduction in total violations, but a relatively high rate of violations requiring spot reports.
- 3. (S) Enemy activity as reflected through the number of ARDF/SRDF fixes showed a decrease in May. Total fixes numbered 1843 in May as compared with 2,112 hm April. ARDF fixes dropped from 1,362 in April to 1,158 in May while organic 1st Radio Battalion SRDF fixes also decreased from 750 in April to 685 in May. Total fixes identified in May numbered 499 (643 in April), of which 420 (509 in April) were ARDF and 79 (134 in April) were SRDF. There were 179 fixes used as the basis for fire missions.
