



PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- 1. (S) During the month of June, 1st Radio Battalion, through it operational platoons deployed throughout Central and Southern I Corps Tactical Zone, provided on-the-spot direct support to tactical commanders of the 1st Marine Division and to Marine Aircraft Group 13, while the Battalion as a whole provided both direct and general support to the headquarters of III Marine Amphibious Force, the U.S. Army XXIV Corps, the 1st Marine Division, and the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing. The direct support role was highlighted by the timely prevision of vital tactical intelligence information to tactical commanders in the field. This direct support aided in the launching of successful assault missions, fire missions, blocking missions, air attacks and air strikes, search and destroy missions, and warnings of impending enemy attacks upon U.S. Marine and other Free World Forces installations and deployed units. The results of this direct support by 1st Radio Battalion elements ensured the continued loss by the enemy of personnel and equipment, the denial of freedom to move to and from his ferward base areas, and helped prevent the enemy from obtaining local previsions, supplies, and recruits.
- 2. (C) During the month of June, 1st Radio Battalion TRANSEC elements monitored ed 817 hours of III Marine Amphibious Ferce communications activity; a reduction of 114 hours from the figure for May. The number of TRANSEC monitoring positions remained at 6 throughout May. Total transmissions monitored numbered 65,221; a reduction of 17,574 from the figure for May. This latter reducted can be attributed primarily to the increased awareness of TRANSEC principles by individual radio eperators and an overall reduction in the use of voice radio in non-cipher communications. Total TRANSEC violations numbered 230, and which 73 were spot reported to the command responsible for the violation. While the violation figure for June is at a much higher ratio than that for May, the ratio of Spot Reports is greatly reduced.....although 73 is still a high number for significant violations.
- 3. (S) Enemy activity as reflected through the number of ARDF/SRDF fixes again showed a decrease in June. Total fixes numbered 1,768 in June as compared with 1,843 in May. ARDF fixes dropped from 1,158 in May to 1,124 in June, while organic 1st Radio Battalion SRDF fixes dropped from 685 in May to 644 in June. Total fixes identified in June numbered 572 (499 in May), of which 525 (420 in May) were ARDF and 47 (79 in May) were SRDF. There were 268 fixes by ARDF and SRDF used as the basis for fire missions in June (179 in May); 7,461 artillery rounds were fired in reaction to these fixes.
