


PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- (S) During the month of November, 1st Radio Battalion, through its operational platoons deployed throughout Quang Nam province, provided on-the-spot direct support to tactical commanders of the 1st Marine Division, while the Battalion as a whole provided both direct and general support to the Headquarters of III Marine Amphibious Force, the U.S. Army XXIV Corps, the 1st Marine Division, and the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing . A Direct Support Unit subordinate to the Fourth Platoon was in direct support of 5th Marine's operations in the Que Son Mountains. The direct support role was highlighted by the timely provision of vital tactical intelligence information to tactical commanders in the field. This support aided in the launching of successful assault missions, fire missions, blocking missions, air attacks, search and destroy missions, and warning of impending attacks upon U. S. Marines and Free World Force's installations and deployed units. The results of this direct support by 1st Radio Battalion elements ensured the continued loss by the enemy of personnel and equipment, the denial of freedom of movement to and from his forward base areas, and helped prevent the enemy from obtaining local provisions, supplies, and recruits.
- 2. (U) The Marine Corps Birthday was celebrated at a ceremony on 10 November 1970 at 0900. It.Gen. McCUTCHEON, Commanding General III Marine Amphibious Force, attended as Guest of Honor. During the month of November 1970, the preponderance of off duty time was utilized in improving the new canton ment area; reinforcing and resandbagging bunkers, organizing and implementing the guard section and improving sanitary conditions throughout the Camp. The enlisted club was formally opened on 24 October 1970. The Operations Section and a portion of the Communications Section shifted operations from Camp Horn to Camp Books on 06 November 1970.

SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

- 1. During the period 1-5 November, the HQ element, 1st Radio Battalion, relocated from Camp Hoa Long to Camp Books. This relocation was accomplished in echelons with minimal disruption to operational commitments.
- 2. (S) On 6 November 1970, a Fourth Platoon Direct Support Unit was established on Hill 381, in the Que Son Mountains, to provide the 5th Marine Regimental Commander with real-time intelligence support for operations being conducted in that area.
- 3. (C) Decreased physical security and logistics support provided by host units on Hill 327 necessitated the closure of the Second Platoon Site on that hill and the temporary redistribution of resources to other sites. The redistribution of personnel and equipment to other Radio Battalion sites occured during the period of 11-15 November.
- 4. (C) For tactical and logistic reasons the 4th Platoon site at Hoi An was deactivated on 20 November.
- 5. (C) Physical location of 1st Radio Battalion Platoons and Detachments.
