(4) On 27 November, in recognition of over 90% participation in the Savings Bond Program. Truck Company received its Minuteman Flag from the Treasury of the United States VIA the Commandant of the Marine Corps.

b. Administration:

(1) On 25 November Headquarters & Service Company submitted a proposed revision to the table of organization structure into consonance with the current version. This proposal was a modification to the proposal submitted in September 1966.

c. Intelligence.

(1) The S-2 Section was reorganized on 19 November 1966 and removed from operational control of the Group S-3.

(2) Second Lieutenant A. J. MEDNIS was assigned as Group S-2.

(3) Liaison has been established with the following adjacent units, for assistance in collecting intelligence information:

(a) 4/503 Airborne - Southwest and West Sector

(b) 7th Engineer Battalion - Southeast Sector

(c) MCB-58 and MCB-9 - Northern Sector

(4) During November the S-2 coordinated supporting fire from the 11th Marines and mortar support from the MCB units.

d. Training.

(1) In addition to regularly scheduled general military subjects and technical training four (4) hours of live firing training was conducted for personnel of Force Logistic Support Unit Two. Truck Company went to the range twice for familiarization firing. One hundred and twenty (12) men fired the M-14, M-60 and .45 caliber pistol and on 27 November 1966 twenty (20) men fired the M-16 rifle with the cooperation and guidance of the Army.

e. Special Operations.

(1) Combined Action Company Platoons, Hotel-1 and Hotel-2 conducted patrols and set up ambushes in and around the Hamlets of Nam O and Koa Knanon respectively, adjacent to Red Beach Complex.

(2) On 16 November 1966 the Combined Action Platoon, Hotel-2 consisting of 8 Marines, 1 Navy Corpsman and 20 South Vietnamese Popular Forces was attacked by an estimated platoon size force of insurgent communists (Viet Cong) near the Hamlet of Nam O. 1 Marine and 3 Popular Forces were KIA and 5 Marines and 1 Popular Force were WIA. Viet Cong casualties are estimated at 2 dead and 4 wounded. Members of the CAC Platoon conducted themselves in an exemplary manner and successfully repelled the attack.

(3) During the week of 24 November the Air Delivery Platoon worked evaluation drops for HMM 265 CH46-A helicopters. The platoon is continuing its relocation of its supply and maintenance area and is in the process of centralizing its storage in the MWSG-17 Complex across from III MAF Transient Facility. The platoon is also in the process of vacating the ARVN parachute left after repacking cargo parachutes. The repacked parachutes are being transferred to the MWSG-17 Complex.

(4) During November 1966, support continued for Operation Prairie Supplies furnished during the month are as follows:

(5) Maintenance detachments of 3 and 6 men were maintained in support of tactical operations at An Hoa and Dong Ha respectively.

(6) 146 Contact Teams provided 2,798.5 man hours of service to support units.

(7) The M-54 platoon of Truck Company increased its cargo hauling capacity with three additional M-199 (Dolly Converter) trailers. The tanker section of the M-35 platoon delivered 362,000 gallons of water and 210,000 gallons of fuel. The Miller Bus section transported 52,846 passengers during the month and the semi-section hauled 9,748 tons of cargo.

(8) General KRULAK and party toured Maintenance and Supply area on 2 November 1966.

(9) General Van STOCKUM and party toured the Maintenance Company area on 20 November 1966.

(10) Miss Martha Raye entertained the Marines of Red Beach on 3 November 1966. She also visited Ammunition Supply Platoon #1 on 17 November 1966.

(11) Miss Frances Langford sang for the Marines of Red Beach on 19 November 1966. Lieutenant General Lewis WALT was in the audience.

(12) On 10 November 1966 the Marine Corps 191st birthday was celebrated at Red Beach. The U.S.O. put on two separate shows for the enlisted men and Staff NCO's. Cake cutting ceremonies at the enlisted club were presided over by Sergeant Major R. E. WINSLOW.

(1) During the engagement of the CAC Platoon, Hotel-1 with the Viet Cong on the morning of 16 November 1966, Communication Support was exceptionally good.

I. Logistics:

(1) During the reporting period the Supply Platoon, Force Logistic Support Unit #2 augmented the LSA at KHE SAHN operated by 3d Shore Party by providing personnel to operate the Class I, II, III, IV and V dumps. The Supply Platoon also supported Operation Pawnee IV in all Classes of supply.

L. Civil Affairs / Community relations

(1) FLSG-Alpha

(a) Discussion

1. Self-Help Program. A First Aid Station was built and installed in Dinh Cu. Materials were supplied by this section and all labor was performed by the Vietnamese. Staff Sergeant BYRD acted as direct supervisor for this project. The people in the village responded exceptionally well to this unique structure; and show great pride and satisfaction that they completed it themselves.

2. The schoolhouse in Phuoc Ngyia is well on its way to completion. Materials were supplied by this section and all labor is performed by Vietnamese. The school will be used by 200 children and the target date of its completion is 15-20 January 1967.

(b) Medical - C. A. P. The progress of this program is fair. The total number of patients treated was a great deal lower than the preceding months. One of the reasons is that the weather during November was mostly inclement; causing a reluctance on the children and parents to leave their homes.

(c) Unique Projects. The long awaited opening of the pediatric hospital finally arrived on the last day of November. The structure is basically completed, and numerous work requests to further beautify and complete the hospital are rapidly being completed. As was stated in the Civil Affairs report of October 1966, this hospital, under the Command of Colonel R. R. WEIR, is the only one of its type in Vietnam.

(d) A donation of \$734.00 was made to the EC and Sacred Heart nages y Maintenance Company.

(e) Highlight of the Month. On Thanksgiving, 250 children from FLSG-A's area were escorted on the Base to enjoy Thanksgiving Dinner. Each child was chaperoned by a Marine, who seemed to enjoy this affair as much as the children! At the completion of dinner, the Marines played games with the children and bought them individual small presents, ie, tooth-brushes, candy, etc. Although the pilot project, it was generally agreed that this goes a long way in developing friends with the Vietnamese. Future Christmas and New Years dinners are being planned.

## (2) FLSU# 2

(a) The Vietnamese Independence Day celebration which included a Marine sports participation at Hue was a success. No adverse incidents were reported.

(b) There is now a powdered milk and vitamin program initiated in Thuy Luong Village Schools. The children receive a cup of milk and a vitamin each day.

(c) The orphanage at the Catholic Church in Thuy Luong and the Pagoda at Thuy Luong both received materials for much needed repairs, and food and clothing for distribution to the poor of the village.

(d) The hamlet of Van Khanh, which is a refuge hamlet in the village of Thuy Luong also is receiving help from FLSU #2 and "B" Company 3rd Motors. So far, this help has consisted of food for the new refugees, clothing, blankets, and building materials for houses.

(e) The village of Chuei Loi is probably the most ambitious under taken of FLSU #2.

(f) We have this month provided the village with the materials to finish the village schools, rebuild a village office and dispensary, farm tools for the entire village as well as a blacksmith and carpentry shop.

(g) The FLSU #2 Civil affairs team employs four Hoy Chan PF's full time as security and working parties for the field workers. This has worked out beyond all expectations.

(h) The Hoy Chans have also been a steady stream of information on the positions and strength of Viet Cong units in the TAOR. We are able to keep better track of the movements and plans of the Viet Cong through the efforts of the new loyal National Government Hoy Chan. The Hoy Chans have even gone so far as to pass out propaganda to the Viet Cong by hand.

## M. Chaplains Support

Lt R. S. COLLINS, MCB-9 gives Lutheran coverage for FLSG-"A".

(2) The FLSG-"A" Chaplains conducted 55 Sunday Services with 1033 men attending, and 75 Weedkay Services with 784 men attending.

(3) There were 157 persons receiving professional counseling during this period.

(4) A chapel was constructed at ASP #1 during the month.

(5) Both Chaplains participated in the Civic Action Activities with reference to the institutional work within the area.

(6) The Senior Chaplain gave the Invocation for four Marine Corps Birthday Celebration within the Command.

(7) There were three Memorial Services held by the FLSG"A" Chaplains with an attendance of 176.

### 3. Documentation

a. This group has no journals of historical significance for inclusion in this report. However the following Group Order and significant event is reported:

(1) Group Order 5500.2B was published for our Provisional Rifle Company. (see enclosure2)

(2) On 15 November 1966 the Graves Registration Team #2 facility was opened at the 3d Medical Battalion Camp site. The facility is a concrete decked building 16'x48' and has a concrete 12'x28' pad supporting two reefers.

### 4. Monthly Recapitulation of Services/Support Provided

#### a. Miscellaneous Services

(1) During November 1966, the III MAF Laundry, which is operated under the cognizance of H & S Company processed 109,085 pounds of laundry. This includes laundry service to Marine Ground Forces and one (1) Marine Aircraft Group located in the Danang TAOR.

(2) During November 1966, the III MAF Transient Facility which is also under operational control of this Group, serviced 19,102 military personnel. The daily average was 637.

(3) During November 1966 this Group provided messing Facilities for the 1st Battalion, 44th Army Artillery and "G" Battery is equipped with 50 Caliber AAA weapons. As of 30 November these Army Units are in the process of moving into their tactical position in RVN.

(4) On 29 November elements of the 11th Engineer Battalion, Force Troops, FMF, a newly formed Marine Unit, just arriving in country, moved into the Red Beach Complex where it will remain temporarily until the units equipment is ashore, at which time the unit will move north to the vicinity of the DMZ and establish an operating base.

1. Purpose. To publish instructions relative to the organization, equipping and training of the Provisional Rifle Company.

2. Cancellation. Group Order 5500.2A

3. General.

a. The Provisional Rifle Company provides a reaction reserve force to combat hostile action within the assigned rear area TAOR as outlined in reference (a).

b. Mission, communication and command directives are contained in reference (a).

c. This Company is under the operational control of the Commanding Officer, Force Logistic Support Group Alpha and will be activated on order of the Commanding Officer, Force Logistic Support Group Alpha or his representative.

4. Action.

a. Commanding Officers of Headquarters and Service Company, Supply Company, Maintenance Company, Truck Company and SU#1, H SCo, IIMAF(FLC) shall:

(1) Organize one reinforced rifle platoon in accordance with the T/O listed in enclosure (1).

(2) Furnish to Commanding Officer, Headquarters and Service Company a roster of the platoon and changes thereto when necessary.

(3) Billet platoon members in a manner that will expedite muster and ease control. Insure that Platoon is prepared to react within 30 minutes.

(4) Furnish Commanding Officer, Headquarters and Service Company with phone number and tent location (number) of Platoon Commander and Platoon Sergeant.

(5) Insure platoon is armed and equipped as indicated on enclosures (1) and (2).

(6) Furnish, as scheduled below, one rifle squad reinforced with 1 MG team to Commanding Officer, Headquarters and Service Company. This reinforced squad will report to the Camp Guard House at 1800 daily. This squad minus the Machine Gun team will be billeted (H&SCo, H&SG-A) in building #30 and be on 5 minutes alert from 1830 until 0630. The Machine Gun team will be collectively billeted by their parent organization and will be on a 5 minute standby alert from 1830 until 0630. Monthly duty assignments are:

Supply Company - 1st through 7th of each month  
Truck Company - 8th through 15th of each month  
Force Logistic Command - 16th through 23rd of each month  
Headquarters and Service Company - 24th through 31st of each month

b. Commanding Officer, Headquarters and Service Company shall:

(1) Designate and assign the Provisional Rifle Company Commander and provide Company Headquarters Section Personnel as outlined in enclosure (1).

(2) Provide and maintain in Headquarters and Service Company area sufficient supplies of Class I and V for independent operations for 2 days.

(3) Initiate direct liaison with all units/personnel concerned.

(4) Be responsible for the training and readiness of the Provisional Rifle Company less Maintenance Company 's Platoon.

c. Commanding Officer, Maintenance Company shall:

(1) Organize and equip one (1) reinforced rifle platoon in accordance with the T/O and T/E listed in enclosures (1) and (2).

(2) Be responsible for the training and readiness of this Platoon.

(3) Provide and maintain in Maintenance Company area sufficient supplies of Class I and V for independent operations for 2 days.

(4) Initiate direct liaison with all units/personnel concerned.

(5) Be prepared to deploy Maintenance Company's one (1) reinforced Rifle Platoon to provide a reaction force to combat hostile action as directed by the Commanding Officer, Force Logistic Support Group Alpha.

d. The Group Communications Officer will provide items listed on enclosure (2) upon request of Commanding Officer, Provisional Rifle Company.

e. Commanding Officer, Truck Company will be prepared to provide vehicles with drivers upon request of the Commanding Officer, Provisional Rifle Company. In addition, provide to the alert Squad a  $2\frac{1}{2}$  ton truck from 1830-0630 daily.

5. Commanding General, Force Logistic Command, III Marine Amphibious Force concurs in the provisions of this order.
