

1. During the period 1-28 February 1969, Force Logistic Command continued to provide sustained logistic support to the III Marine Amphibious Force organizations and the Republic of Korea Marine Brigade.

b. Legal

(1) Legal Assistance. Legal assistance was rendered in 105 cases during February 1969; five being Navy personnel, three Army, and 97 Marines.

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(2) Legal Lectures and Inspections. One legal lecture on search and seizure and one lecture on investigations were given during February 1969. Two legal inspections (MaintBn and FISG-B) were held during February 1969.

(3) Disciplinary Court-Martial Cases. A total of 59 courts-martial were tried in February 1969; nine GCM's, 22 SPCM's and 28 SCM's.

c. Purchasing and Contracting. Purchases were made from and contracts awarded to commercial suppliers during February for items requested by I Corps Marine Units in the amount of \$303,385.58; these are broken down as follows:

(2) A new contract was awarded for laundry services for the period 1 March 1969 to 28 February 1970.

(3) A contract was awarded for 6000 pallets from a local contractor for the CCP. This contract will amount to over \$23,000.00.

(4) The electricity contract for Marine Units in the Danang area expired 28 February 1969. The requirement for subsequent service has been placed on the Navy Public Works Office which has the responsibility for providing utilities for all installations within I Corps area.

d. Logistic

(1) Operations

(a) Twelve supply updates were processed during the month with a total of 53,282 requisitions processed, 17,498 receipts processed and 45,953 shipping mats produced.

(b) The total number of transactions processed for the month was 379,046.

(c) The overall fill rate for the month was 48%, with the fill rate for RO Items being 50%.

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(d) During the month of February all stock located at the RSA at Phu Bai was closed out and the roll back of the assets to MC 100 has been progressing well.

(e) The transceiver at the new RSA located at Quang Tri became fully operational during the month.

(f) During February there were 646 unserviceable Secondary Depot Repairable items prepared for retrograde to 3d Force Service Regiment. During this same period 253 serviceable items were received from 3d Force Service Regiment. The Secondary Depot Repairable inventory was completed and results reported to 3d Force Service Regiment on 13 February 1969.

(g) Reconciliation AN/AP cards were distributed to all customers by 15 February 1969.

(h) Initial issue of M-16 rifles was completed to all units in RVN by the end of February 1969.

(2) Overall Supply Situation. No specific problems in the overall supply situation were encountered during the month of February.

(3) Status

(4) Class III(A) and III (W)

(a) Situation. During the month of February, the overall posture remained good. On 2 February a fuel dispensing site was installed at C-2; capacity is 10,000 gallons of MoGas and 10,000 gallons of Diesel. The new berms were completed at Hill 55 on 12Feb69, and the tank farm was moved to allow for expansion of the 7th Marines C. P. There was a capacity change at the Cua Viet fuel facility on 15 February, storage is now 150,000 gallons of JP-4, 330,000 gallons of Diesel, 60,000 gallons of AvGas, and 180,000 gallons of MoGas. An Hoa also has an increased Diesel fuel capacity from 20,000 gallons to 40,000 gallons.

(b) Significant Problem Areas. Due to an enemy rocket and mortar attack on 23 February the following items of equipment were lost:

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- (1) Truck Co., FLC 1 10,000 gallon tank
MoGas (loss of 4,000 gallons)
- (2) MAG-11 4 10,000 gallon tanks JP-4
(loss unknown)
- (3) MAG-16 at An Hoa 4 10,000 gallon tanks JP-4
(loss of 30,000 gallons)
- (4) LSU#1 at An Hoa 1 10,000 gallon tank DF-2
(loss of 2,000 gallons)

(5) Class V(A) and V(W)

(a) Situation. Except for minor problems, ammunition assets were equally distributed to meet commitments. During the month of February, MAERU reworked 16,630 rounds of 81mm ammunition. The Class V expenditure for the month was \$29,713,526.05. Tonnage handled by the Ammunition Company, Supply Battalion at ASP #1 and ASP #2 is as follows:

(2) Communication/Electronics. Retrograde of sixteen radio sets AN/TRC-97 has been completed under the IRAN Program. This completed the R&E FY-69 retrograde for this item of equipment.

(3) Engineers. Modification instructions for the installation of the air cooler/oil cooler modification for the Eimco Tractor, were prepared and forwarded to FMFPac. Instructions will be used for a formal MI to be published by CMC.

(4) Motor Transport

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(a) The 3rd and 4th echelon deadline of 5 ton multi-fuel vehicles has continued to increase due to insufficient availability of LDS 465 1/1A engines.

(b) During the period covered, 71 M54A2C vehicles were received and issued under FY-69 R&E Program.

(5) Ordnance

(a) 175mm SP Gun, M-107 maintenance school was conducted at FLC by 1st Logistic Support Command Technical Representatives. Approximately sixty crewmen and maintenance personnel were trained on 1st, 2nd, and 3rd echelon maintenance.

(b) 155mm Howitzer SP, M-109 Exchange Program has been completed with the issue of forty-two weapons to the using units.

(6) Services Situation

(a) Boot Repair. Fifty-eight pairs of boots were repaired in the past month.

(b) Graves Registration. A total of 595 human remains were processed during the month of February. Graves Registration Platoon has been authorized an allowance of four operating tables, but they have not been received as of this date.

(c) Laundry Processed. A total of 1,119,331 pounds of laundry was processed during the month of February.

(d) Bakery. Force Logistic Command bakeries produced a total of 765,742 pounds of bread during the month of February.

(e) Ice. Force Logistic Command organizations produced 730,000 pounds of ice and procured 3,221,264 pounds of ice during the month.

f. Civil Affairs

(1) 3Feb69 - The Civil Affairs and Psychological Operations Program were inspected at FLSG-Bravo during the Commanding General's Semi-Annual Inspection. An inspection grade of satisfactory was assigned.

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(2) 5Feb69 - Elements of the Force Logistic Command G-5 Section participated in a cordon search operation in Hoa Long Village south of Marble Mountain. A temporary tent camp was constructed which provided shelter for 2,000 villagers for three days while searches and interrogations were being conducted.

(3) 9Feb69 - A cordon search operation was conducted in the Namu Xuan Thieu area. Numerous VC suspects were apprehended and interrogated.

(4) 16-17Feb69 - Civil Affairs teams in Area #5 provided TET bags, gifts and TET envelopes for over 6,000 children in 30 hamlets. The civic action teams participated in many of the celebrations.

(5) 18Feb69 - The Commanding General's Semi-Annual Inspection of Maintenance Battalion was conducted. The Civil Affairs and Psychological Operations inspection was rated satisfactory.

(6) 23Feb69 - During the post-TET offensive the Hoa Khanh Village Self-Defense units were credited with 12 VC kills at a cost of four KIA's. These paramilitary forces proved to be good fighters and were a definite asset to hamlet security.

g. Industrial Relations

(1) 5Feb69 - The Semi-Annual Inspection of Force Logistic Support Group Bravo Industrial Relations Program was conducted with satisfactory results.

(2) 18Feb69 - The Semi-Annual Inspection of Maintenance Battalion Industrial Relations Program was conducted with satisfactory results.
