- (b) Air alert conditions yellow and red warnings to be sounded by minimum one minute pulsating sound of siren.
- (c) Phase III condition warning to be sounded by minimum five minute continuous siren.

4. ADMINISTRATION AND LOGISTICS.

- a. Resupply of communications equipment available from FLSU #2 Communications Platoon.
- b. Emergency repair facility available from FLSU #2 Electronics-Maintenance shop.






