NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During this reporting period Force Logistic Support Group, BRAVO lost personnel and equipment in support of Operation Oregon. This unit continues to provide required maintenance and services to the various units located within the Chu Lai Combat Base. In conjunction with Operation Oregon, the U.S. Army has relieved Force Logistic Support Group, BRAVO of the responsibility of providing baked goods for the supported units within the Chu Lai Combat Base, TAOR.
2. Force Logistic Support Group, BRAVO established an LSA at Tam Ky in direct support of Operation Union.
3. On 28 April 1967, Colonel S. D. LOW was relieved by Lieutenant Colonel E. C. CARPER Jr. as Commanding Officer of Force Logistic Support Group, BRAVO. Concurrently Lieutenant Colonel L. A. HALL succeeded Lieutenant Colonel E. C. CARPER as Executive Officer of this Command.
4. The building program continues to progress at a highly satisfactory pace. However, during the reporting period, the permanent ASP Project was abandoned lieu of a newly selected site.

2. FMF Organizations not committed to combat:

a. Personnel. During this reporting period, this Command has experienced the loss of Marine Corps Personnel for the seventh consecutive month, despite this fact, morale remains high.

b. Administration: No significant changes.

c. Intelligence: No significant changes.

d. Training

(1) In addition to the regularly scheduled technical and on-the-job training conducted by the respective sections within the various companies of this Command, the training listed below was held:

(a) Range Firing - M-14, Cal. .45, and M-60

e. Special Operations: During the reporting period the LSAs at Quang Ngai and Duc Pho were closed and Operations Boone and DeSoto terminated. However, an LSA was established in the Tam Ky area in direct support of Operation Union.

f. Command Relations: No significant changes, other than outlined in Part I of this report.

g. Equipment: No significant changes other than the reduced allowance of equipment imposed on this Command in support of Operation Oregon. Scheduled contact teams from Ordnance, GSM, and Engineer platoons have been cancelled due to deployment of units. Maintenance Company still provides on-call contact teams from all commodity areas on a 24 hour basis.

h. Logistics

(1) The shipment of retrograde cargo by air has proven quite satisfactory. However, in the past weeks, a much greater movement of priority material has slowed down the air shipment of Bravo's retrograde. The shipment of material North has been moving rapidly and with little difficulty. The only problem is lack of staging area at Air Freight and the Sand Ramp. This creates a requirement for rapid movement of material when ships and aircraft become available.

i. Community Relations

The month of April saw continued support for the people of the Chu Lai New Life Village by the FLSG-B Civic Action Team.

Presently in progress is a New Buddhist pagoda. This project is being supported entirely by the FLSG-B Civic Action Team. Cement, scrap lumber, sand batched rock and scrap tin has been transported to the site during the month.

A vegetable garden has been started behind the pig farm. This garden is small pending the success or failure of crop production. If the garden does prove successful, a larger garden will be started for each hamlet with the ultimate aim of starting a farmers' cooperative and also to augment the income of the village.

The Catholic High School now under construction is also being aided by the Civic Action Team. Bulldozers and dump trucks from FLSG-B have provided support for the ground excavation around this structure.

Statistically, the month's activities are computed as follows:

The following loads of material were transported to the village in support of civic action projects:

- 9 loads of stone
- 35 loads of scrap lumber
- 90 bags of cement
- 14 loads of sand
- 3 loads of scrap metal

The FLSG-B Medcap program treated 1219 Vietnamese and administered 1387 treatments for various ailments.

#### Industrial Relations:

To date there are 107 Vietnamese employed under the Organization and Maintenance fund. There are 53 housemaids, 6 barbers and 2 waitresses presently employed.

#### j. Communications

(1) Radio Section. During the month of April 1967, Radio Section continued to provide equipment and personnel to man two Sub-Sector II alert nets. The section is now guarding the Chu Lai Defense Net 24 hours a day. In addition, a 24 hour watch is maintained on the FLC Command Net. The section supported the LSA with radio equipment and radio personnel in support of Operations "Desoto" and "Boone" until 7 April 1967. On 24 April the section provided radio equipment and radio personnel to the LSA in support of Operation "Union". This operation is being held at Tam Ky. The section continued its normal housekeeping duties, and PM of gear.

(2) Message Center. During the month of April 1967 the Message Center transmitted 504 messages and received 3029 messages for a total of 3533 messages processed. This includes on-line encrypted, courier and U.S. Mail messages. In addition the Message Center transmitted 380 and received 6190 data cards via the IBM Data Comm Transceiver for a total of 6570 data cards processed. One man attended the Crypto refresher course at Yokosuka, Japan.

(3) Wire Section. On 24 April wire section provided personnel and equipment for the LSA established at Tam Ky. Wire Section continues to maintain the switchboards to provide Telephone Communications for FLSG-B, which handles about 1500 calls per day.

(4) Maintenance Section. During the month of April 108 work orders were processed. Normal second echelon maintenance was performed on organic communications equipment.


