NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During this reporting period Force Logistic Support Group, Bravo continued to provide the necessary maintenance and support of the units located within the Chu*Lai Combat Base. The U. S. Army retains the responsibility of producing and providing baked goods for units in the CHu*Lai TAOR.
2. Major General BOUKER, Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force Pacific (forward), visited this command for a command briefing on 6 December 1967.
3. During the month the Aid Station treated "436" persons. There were "1679" immunizations given. The Civil Affairs Section treated "70" Vietnamese.
4. The building program within Force Logistic Support Group, Bravo continues with the first increment of the current construction at the ASP ~~is~~ 63% complete.

Includes receipts from all sources and shipments to all destinations. One thousand four hundred sixty-eight (1468) peices, with a weight of 13,812 pounds, have moved through the parcel post system to RUC's within RVN.

The introduction of R6/RO Trailers into the Chu-Lai area has enabled this unit to expedite the local distribution of materials.

There has been a decrease in the Marine Corps Air Lift capability to Chu-Lai during the month. This has not created a back log of shipping as surface transportation has been available.

e. Command Relations. No Significant Changes other than the Outline in part I of this report.

f. Equipment. Maintenance Company was continuing to provide maintenance support for USMC units, other U. S. Army Forces and the Republic of Korea Forces in the Chu-Lai TAOR.

(1) On 20 December 1967, Maintenance Company stopped accepting customer 's work orders. Maximum effort was devoted to complete the outstanding work orders and other special projects currently in all commodity areas.

(2) A 1st FSR Maintenance Liaison team started accepting customers work orders on 22 December 1967.

i. Communications

(1) Headquarters Section: Ninety two (92) requisitions were processed for communications items. The majority of the requisitions were for communications publications.

In addition a total of 15,193 autodin cards were processed; 12,044 outgoing and 3,149 incoming. Down time on the FLC teletype circuit was 52 hours and 55 minutes.

(3) Maintenance Section: A total of 92 pieces of communications equipment were processed by the maintenance section during the month of December. The maintenance section began a 24 hour/day operation affording continuous surveillance of all communications equipment in constant use.

(4) The Radio Section: Continued to maintain a continuous guard on the Force Logistic Command Net and the nightly guard of the Chu-Lai Defense Net, in addition to providing radio operators for convoy control and the Commanding officer, 1st CAG, as needed. The weekly alert net drill was held with the incorporation of all Sub-Section III units into the drill.

(5) Wire Section: The wire section maintained a continuous watch on the Group Switchboard as well as providing trouble shooting service and installing new lines and telephones. A new telephone directory was published and distributed.
