PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During this reporting period Force Logistic Support Group, Bravo continued to provide the necessary maintenance and service for units located within the Chu Lai Combat Base and the coordination of ISA requirements in conjunction with operation CALHOUN. The U. S. Army remains to hold the responsibility of producing and providing baked goods for the support of units in the Chu Lai TAOR.
2. Brigadier General LAHUE and Major General NICKERSON visited this Command on 3 July 1967. The Korean First Logistic Support Group Commanding Officer, Colonel CHUNG and Lieutenant Colonel KWON, Commanding Officer, 11th Logistic Support Battalion, ROKA visited on 6 July 1967.
3. Brigadier General HERBOLD, Commanding General, Force Logistic Command and Lieutenant Colonel HOWLAND staff officer of FLC, visited this Command on 31 July 1967. General HERBOLD was briefed during this visit by Lieutenant Colonel HALL, Commanding Officer, FLSG-Bravo and by members of his staff concerning the shortage within this Command. The FLC ISO photographer photographed personnel working throughout the FLSG-Bravo area.
4. The Medical Aid Station treated 656 persons. There were 672 immunizations administered. The Civil Affairs section treated 772 Vietnamese personnel.
5. Combined Action Group Headquarters was established within the FLSG-B area on 26 July 1967. This Command provided office and storage space required by the CAG Headquarters.
6. The building program within the Force Logistic Support Group, Bravo area has been reestablished and is progressing rapidly. New installations completed and under construction are listed below:
 - a. Fire Station, completed.
 - b. FLSG-Bravo Enlisted Club, 50 percent completed.
 - c. FLSG-Bravo Chapel, 50 percent completed.

SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

1. FLC Organization committed to combat and the SLF: Not Applicable.

2. FMF Organization not committed to combat:

a. Personnel. During this reporting period, this Command has experienced the loss of Marine Corps personnel for the tenth consecutive month, despite this fact, morale remains high. The continued loss of personnel has caused curtailment of certain services, ie, canvas and shoe repair.

b. Administration. No significant changes.

c. Intelligence. No significant changes.

d. Training.

(1) In addition to the regularly scheduled technical and on-the-job training conducted by the respective sections within the various companies of this command, the training listed below was held:

e. Special Operations. During the reporting period operation Calhoun terminated on 1 July 1967. The ISA remained in the field in support of elements of the 5th Marines and other units remaining until permanent transfer of personnel which was initiated on 16 July 1967.

f. Command Relations. No significant changes, other than outlined in part I of this report.

g. Equipment. No significant changes other than the reduced allowance of equipment imposed on this Command in support of operation Calhoun and the subsequent loss to FLC of the equipment that was supporting this operation.

Maintenance Company continues to provide maintenance support in the 3rd and limited 4th echelon categories for USMC units, other U. S. Armed Services and the Republic of Korea in the Chu Lai TAOR. The following significant projects are presently in progress or have been completed.

(1) LSA support for Operation Calhoun terminated on 1 July 1967 and Maintenance Company personnel involved were transferred to Supply Battalion, 1st FSR.

(2) Motor Transport Maintenance Platoon is in the process of rehabilitating sixteen (16) M-54 Trucks and seven (7) M-35 Trucks.

(3) Ordnance Maintenance Platoon made arrangements for 3rd and limited 4th echelon maintenance support of the 5th 155 SP Gun Btry. (-) Rein.

h. Logistics.

(1) The shipment of material North continues to move with little difficulty.

The Bulk Fuel Platoon provided fuel support for MUST #1 at Chu Lai and 9th Engineer Battalion at Tam Ky.

The Bulk Fuel Systems have been reduced from three to two systems.

Technical and equipment assistance was given to the experimental MUST #1, to include storage of JP-4 at Chu Lai. Fuel was also provided for tank support by two (2) 800 gallon rigid tanks for diesel at Tam Ky. They were moved to Hill 63 and Supply Battalion, FLC took over support requirement as of 16 July 1967. Bravo continued supporting 9th Engineer Battalion at Tam Ky with Diesel and MoGas and MAG-36 at Tam Ky with JP-4 and AvGas.

The requirements for inspection and cleaning of retrograde material are becoming more stringent. Some problems have been encountered in washing retrograde being shipped out of country. These problems could be eliminated or lessened to a large degree if Shipping and Receiving could be provided with water storage facilities.

994 pieces, with a weight of 10,519 pounds has been moved through the parcel post system to RUC's within RVN. This has alleviated our transportation problem somewhat.

A total of sixteen Conex Containers are being utilized for essential storage in the FLSG-Bravo area. Upon completion of the two Enlisted Men's Clubs being built, this requirement will decrease by six.

i. Community Relations.

(1) Civic Action. During the month of July the FLSG-B Civic Action Team continued its full support towards the Buddhists Pagoda.

The following loads of material were transported to the village in support of civic action projects:

45 loads of wood

5 loads of tin

2 loads of rock

4 loads of sand

95 bags of cement

15 gallons of paint

The Civic Action Team also helped in the repainting and improvements of the school in the Chu Lai village. The Commanding Officer, Lieutenant Colonel HALL attended the opening of the new Catholic School. After the ceremony, he toured throughout the Chu Lai New Life Village. This consisted of visiting the Buddhists Pagoda, Catholic Church, and FLSG-B Aid Station.

(2) Industrial Relations: To date there are 114 Vietnamese employed under the Organizational and Maintenance fund. There are 39 housemaids, 7 barbers, 12 waitresses, 7 barboys employed by this command under the personal fund system.

j. Communications.

(a) Radio Section. During the month of July, Radio Section conducted radio operator training for 8 men within this Command who will be utilized to operate the radio assigned to Company Commanders during an alert, due to shortage of communication personnel. Radio Section continues to guard the FLC Control net and to perform daily, weekly, preventive maintenance on equipment.

(b) Message Center. During the month of July 1967, the FLSG-B message center handled 1,125 incoming teletype messages and 185 outgoing messages for a total of 1,310 processed. This includes on-line encrypted courier and U. S. Mail messages. In addition, the Message Center transmitted 3,587 data cards and received 3,587 data cards via the IBM data comm transceiver for a total of 7,174 data cards.

(c) Wire Section. New lines were installed to the Combined Action Group Headquarters Section at FLSG-Bravo Command Post. Also new lines were installed to Medical Supply warehouse, Maintenance Company Motor Transport. The continuous operation of the FLSG-Bravo switch was maintained 24 hours daily on an average of 1500 calls per day.

(d) Maintenance Section. The Tech shop processed 43 work orders on organic communication equipment. In addition, 2nd echelon preventive maintenance was performed on all equipment. Rebuilt antenna cable for 7th Comm. Fabricated power cables for PP-388 to be used in conjunction with VRC-12 equipment.
