NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During this reporting period Force Logistic Support Group, Bravo continued to provide the necessary maintenance and support of the units located within the Chu Lai Combat Base. The U. S. Army retains the responsibility of producing and providing baked goods for units in the Chu Lai TAOR.
2. Brigadier General OLSON, Commanding General, Force Logistic Command, visited this command for a command briefing on 3 November 1967.
3. Brigadier General OLSON, Commanding General, Force Logistic Command, visited this command in relation to the ROKMC Liaison Team on 5 November 1967.
4. Brigadier General OLSON, Commanding General, Force Logistic Command, and Colonel REID, Assistant Chief of Staff for Special Projects, Force Logistic Command, and Colonel BLUE, FMFPac visited this command for a command briefing on 17 November 1967.
5. Colonel MILLER, FMFPac, visited this command for a command briefing on 21 November 1967.
6. The Medical Aid Station treated 500 persons. There were 2452 immunizations administered. The Civil Affairs Section treated 80 Vietnamese.

Includes receipts from all sources and shipments to all destinations. Three-thousand Two-hundred-seventy (3270) pieces, with a weight of 31,867 pounds, have moved through the parcel post system to RUC's within RVN.

The receipt of Sea Land Vans made available to this command for the shipment of retrograde Class VA materials continues to be far less than our requirements. Only seven (7) of the fifty (50) Sea Land Vans requested for the month were received.

e. Command Relations. No significant changes other than the outline in Part I of this report.

f. Equipment. Maintenance Company is continuing to provide maintenance support for USMC units, other U. S. Armed Forces and the Republic of Korea Forces in the Chu Lai TAOR. The following significant projects are presently in progress or have been completed.

(1) School was given on the M-98 for approximately one-hundred (100) men of the 2d Brigade, Republic of Korea Marine Corps. This school was held on site and covered all 1st and 2d echelon preventive maintenance.

(2) A 3rd echelon Motor Transport School is presently being held for eight (8) men of the Republic of Korea Forces. This school is covering the following maintenance areas:

- (a) Engine Replacement
- (b) Transmission Replacement
- (c) Clutch and Pressure Plate, Adjustment and Replacement
- (d) Repair and Adjustment of Brakes
- (e) Wheels and Wheel Bearings
- (f) Trunion Axles
- (g) Electrical System Trouble Shooting
- (h) Body Repair

g. Logistics.

(1) The shipment of materials North continues to move with little difficulty.

h. Community Relations.

(1) The FLSG-B Civic Action Team has been working on three (3) construction projects. In Hoa Van Hamlet a Buddhist school and office are under construction. In Dinh-Phuoc Hamlet a hamlet office and kindergarten are under construction.

(2) A total of 125 bags of cement were purchased to aid in the construction of these projects. The money for the cement was raised through the sale of scrap wood donated by local military organizations.

i. Communications.

(1) Headquarters Section: The Headquarters section processed a total of 223 requisitions for communications items. One-hundred sixty-nine (169) of the requisitions were for missing SL-3's, SL-4's, and Technical Instructions.

(2) Maintenance Section: During the month the Maintenance section processed a total of 112 work orders. The majority of the equipment repaired was telephone equipment.

(3) Radio Section: The Radio section continued to maintain a continuous guard on the Force Logistic Command Net as well as providing a radio operator for the Commanding Officer, CAG whenever he leaves the Command Post. The Alert Net drill was continued throughout the month with four drills being held. In addition school was held on a weekly basis for all company Alert Net radio operators.

(4) Wire Section: The Wire Section maintained a continuous watch on the Group switchboard as well as providing troubleshooting service and installing new lines and telephones. The switchboard continues to handle approximately 1500 calls daily.

(5) Message Center Section. During the month the Message Center section processed a total of 1926 messages, broken down as follows:

A total of 23,668 cards were processed on the Autodin system; 8,944 received and 14,724 sent. There was a total of 122 hours and 5 minutes of down time due to generator failure, and equipment troubles.
