b. Legal

(1) Legal Assistance. Legal assistance was rendered in 112 cases during the month of November 1968.

(2) Legal Lectures. An all day legal symposium was held at this Command for unit legal officers and Clerks on 7 November with 10 in attendance from the various units. There were four lecturers who covered legal matters in general, submission of investigations, filling out of charge sheets and the duties of trial and defense counsel. During mid-November, the officers of

UNCLASSIFIED

Headquarters and Service Battalion were lectured on the duties of a president of a special court-martial.

(3) Disciplinary Court-Martial Cases. A total of 48 court-martial were tried within PAC during the month of November 1968.

c. Purchasing and Contracting. The Purchasing and Contracting Office, 1st Force Service Regiment/Force Logistic Command purchased various items in Vietnam on the open market for the support of military forces in Vietnam during the month. A total of \$231,586.48 was obligated during the month.

d. Logistic

(1) Support for Combat Operations. During the month of November the Force Logistic Command continued to provide combat service support for combat troops operating in the ICTZ. Continuing operations in the ICTZ throughout the month were operations NAPOLEON/SALINE, KENTUCKY, SCOTLAND II, NEVADA EAGLE, HENDERSON HILL, and VICTORY DRAGON VI. During November operations DARING ENDEAVOR and NICOLET BAY commenced and terminated. Other operations commencing in November were operations MEADE RIVER, DAWSON RIVER and VERNON LAKE II. Operations LANCASTER II, JEB STUART III, COMMANCHE FALLS, WHEELER/WALLOWA, BURLINGTON TRAIL and GARRARD BAY terminated.

(2) Services

a. Graves Registration processed 236 remains for the month of November. A total of 8,226 human remains have been processed for the year.

b. Laundry processed for the month of November amounted to 372,000 pounds.

c. A total of 53 pairs of boots were repaired during November.

(3) Central Control Point Operations. Twelve daily updates were processed on the IBM S/360 during the month. Input amounted to 48,285 requisitions and 25,788 receipts. A total of 66,924 shipping mats were produced. The total number of transactions processed for the month were 721,000. The fill rate this month was 49 percent, with the fill rate for RO items being 51 percent. The stock denial rate for the month was 10.6 percent.

(4) Rations

a. During the month of November, Force Logistic Command bakeries produced 558,255 pounds of bread, broken down as follows:

- (1) Danang 402,255 pounds
- (2) Dong Ha 156,000 pounds

b. During the month 7,328,343 pounds of ice were procured and 424,400 pounds were produced by Force Logistic Command. These totals are:

(3) Combat Operations Base, Vandegrift produced 74,400

pounds.

(5) Ammunition. Overall ammunition assets within III MAF remain at an acceptable level. Class V expenditure for the month totaled \$31.5 million.

(6) Fuel. The U. S. Army received control of the fuel sites at Force Logistic Support Group Alpha on 2 November 1968.

(7) Maintenance

a. Motor Transport. A current shortage of multifuel engines, 5 ton; and clutch disks has increased the deadline rate of motor transport combat essential equipment.

b. Engineer. Approval received from CMC and CG, FMFPac for implementing the M-64 Einco Tractor modification as recommended by this Headquarters in October 1968. Procurement of materials to perform the modification is proceeding now. It is hoped that modifications can be performed during spring of 1969.

c. M16A1 Retrofit Program

(1) Currently 66,699 chrome chambered M16A1 rifles are in service. Total remaining non-chrome chambered M-16 rifles in service is approximately 1,500. The estimated completion date of the FIC M16A1 Retrofit Program is 31 January 1969. At this time the program will be taken up by 3d FSR.

(2) A major problem encountered in the completion of the Retrofit Program was the shortage of pin, spring, and tubular. These parts are on requisition and supply action has been taken to expedite the shipment. For this reason no further delays in the Retrofit Program are anticipated.

e. Civil Affairs

(1) 2-4 Nov 68 - The Hoa Khanh Village Self-Defense Unit held a rally in commemoration of this newly organized unit. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-5 assisted in logistical support and provided a public address system.

(2) 5 Nov 68 - The Preziosi School located in Xuan Duong hamlet, Hoa Hiep Village was dedicated. The school was a self-help project with funding being provided by the residents of East Paterson, New Jersey in memory of Sergeant John PREZIOSI, USMC, who was killed in action during January 1968. In attendance at the dedication was the Commanding General, Force Logistic Command; the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-5, III Marine Amphibious Force; the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-5, Force Logistic Command; District Chief, Hoa Vang District; Senior District Advisor, Hoa Vang District; and the Village and Hamlet officials.

(3) 10 Nov 68 - The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-5 attended the Province Senior Advisor's Conference in Hoi An. Mutual problems and solutions were discussed relative to overall pacification effort in Quang Nam Province.

(4) 12 Nov 68 - The Commanding General's Semi Annual Inspection of 5th Communication Battalion's Civil Affairs and Psychological Operations Program was conducted by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-5, Force Logistic Command. The inspection was given a rating of satisfactory with minor discrepancies.

(5) 15 Nov 68 - The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-5 attended a meeting relative to the organization of Vietnamese Youth Groups in Hoa Vang District. The meeting was sponsored by CORDS. Various programs were proposed and implementation procedures discussed.

(6) 16 Nov 68 - Effective this date all Combined Action Platoons (CAPS) operating in Area #5, report all civic action endeavors to this Headquarters. Area #5 is now completely integrated and coordinated for all civic action activities.

(7) 19-26 Nov 68 - Increased enemy activity in Hoa Hiep and Hoa Vinh Villages necessitated an increase in Psychological Operations in those areas. Armed Propaganda Teams (APT's), aerial broadcasts, and leaflet drops were extensively conducted to assist the overall pacification effort.

DA NANG, Vietnam - The spirit of Thanksgiving filled the room when Hans broke away from his escort and ran to the bedside of his wounded buddy at 1st Medical Bn. Hospital near Da Nang.

Hans, a 75-pound scout dog, and Marine Sgt. Robert Sabo (563 Dearborn, Toledo, Ohio) were reunited Thanksgiving Day at the hospital where Sabo is recovering from wounds received in a fire fight a few days earlier. Sabo and Hans are with the (M.P. Third) Bn., a unit of Force Logistic Command, which furnishes scout dog teams to Marine infantry units to detect enemy activity and ambushes.

"A few days ago my company commander visited me and asked if I needed anything," said Sabo. "I told him all I wanted was to see Hans, and now here he is. I can't believe it."

The two-year old German Shepard and Sabo were attached to M Co., 3rd Bn., 7th Marine Regiment, on a search and clear mission near Hill 55 when Hans and another scout dog sensed enemy personnel in the area. The Marines opened fire and in the ensuing fire fight, Sabo was wounded and evacuated to a field hospital. Hans and Sabo were separated.

The Air Delivery Marines prepare the load of flares prior to take off. The 360 flares are loaded aboard 6,000 pound air delivery platforms, which can be ejected from the aircraft in a matter of seconds. The platforms and ejection method are a safety precaution in case the flares aboard are ignited by enemy fire.

Each evening, a member of the Air Delivery Platoon goes up with the "flarebird", explained Marine Staff Sergeant Leslie Bishop (261 Tacoma Ave., Everett, Wash.). "If the bird is hit and the flares ignited, the platform and their load of flares are ejected from the aircraft."

Ground units requesting night illumination contact the First Marine Aircraft Wing operational control office in Da Nang. The "flarebird" is alerted and given the coordinates of the requesting unit.

Arriving on station, the aircraft's navigator establishes radio communications with the ground unit, while squadron commander and the air delivery men prepare the flares for the drop.

The flares are placed in one of 12 chutes and the first safety defused. Each of the flares have two safety primers which must be engaged before the flare will ignite. As the flare is pushed down the chute and leaves the aircraft, the final safety is neutralized.

LA 441G, Vietnam--Marine "flarbirds" are lighting up the enemy, turning night into day, for allied troops in Vietnam's northernmost tactical zone.

Giant C-130 Hercules cargo aircraft cruise high above Allied positions each evening, on station ready to drop up to 360 illumination flares. Each of the magnesium filled, three-foot canisters burn with the intensity of three million candlepower.

The flare drops are a joint maneuver between the first Marine Aircraft Wing's Transport Squadron-152 (VMGA-152) and the Force Logistic Command's Air Delivery Platoon.

Two of the Hercules aircraft are on station as "flarbirds" each evening. The first "bird" lifts off around 7 p.m. followed by the second at 10 p.m. Each stays aloft between seven and eight hours.

Flarebird 3-3-3-3-3-3

Flares are normally dropped from 6,000 feet. Often enemy fire is directed at the "flarebird".

With the flares ready to drop, the navigator establishes where the ground unit wants the flares and how many are needed during a pass over the position.

The pilot begins his first run. Flying over the darkened position he calls out "mark" over the aircraft's inter-com system. The flares are then defused and pushed down the chutes into the darkness.

Twenty-five seconds after leaving the bird, the flare's parachute engages. Twenty-five seconds later the flare begins its three-minute burn.

Sixty-five thousand feet below, night turns into day as men of the 1st Air Delivery Squadron and the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing work together to assist Marine infantry units in their battle against the enemy.
