

PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

During February 1968, FLSG Bravo continued to provide logistic support for the 3dMarDiv (FWD), its supporting elements and the 1stMarRegt in direct support of Operations Kentucky V, Osceola, Neosho and Napoleon. The Group was additionally tasked with logistic support of one brigade (+) of the 1st Air Cavalry Division and one brigade (-) of the 101st Airborne Division, U. S. Army. In the latter part of the month, logistic support of two more brigades of the 1st Air Cavalry Division was assumed.

There were significant changes in all classes of supply. Personnel supported by Class I increased from 30,000 to 40,000. The bakery adopted a two-thirds capacity production of bread due to non-availability of yeast for a two week period until yeast again became available. Additional requirements for Class II & IV supplies were received from supported Army units to establish their camp sites and mess halls and presented no insurmountable problems. The Bulk Fuel Farm increased its storage capacity to 460,000 gallons of deisel, 330,000 gallons of mogas, 160,000 gallons of avgas and 540,000 gallons of JP-4 to meet the increasing fuel requirements of supported Army units. Increased requirements of Class V material necessitated a three shift operation at the ASP, to allow LCU ramp offload and Marine unit resupply concurrently during the day and preload of convoy trucks at night for dispatching the next day to outlying Army units.

A significant increase in enemy artillery and rocket attacks occurred on base and at the LCU ramp during the month, and enemy attempts to interdict traffic on the Cau Viet River hampered resupply efforts considerably.

Material issues and receipts for Project 972 decreased again during the month. Only 11 short tons were received and 265 short tons issued.

Civic action effort decreased also due to the local tactical situation.

SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

- 19Feb68 Unknown number of rounds enemy artillery incoming at Cau Viet. Five 10,000 gal. fuel tanks, one 800 gal rigid tanks, hoses, fittings and 12,000 gal mogas destroyed. Two minor WIA - nonevac.
- 22Feb68 Unknown number rounds enemy artillery incoming in vicinity of LCU ramp and airstrip. POL hose and fittings damaged, 50 gal mogas and 300 gal deisel fuel destroyed. One WIA (member FLSG-Alpha).
- 25Feb68 Approximately 50 rounds enemy artillery incoming. One fire truck, two laundry units, one GP tent (Code H) shrapnel damage. Two WIA; one minor, one medevac.
- 26Feb68 Enemy artillery, rockets and mortars incoming received throughout the day. (1) RTF forklift, (2) M52 tractors with trailer (U. S. Army), (6) M35A2 vehicles, (1) M52 tractor (Marine), (1) water truck (Code H), (1) M37 vehicle (Code H), (3) SEA Huts, (1) Butler Building damaged by shrapnel. 960 rounds C445 (105mm) ammunition, (2) S&P trailers (U. S. Army), (1) Med. GP tent destroyed. (2) Marine and (1) U. S. Army personnel received minor shrapnel wounds.
