NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During this reporting period, Supply Company (Rein), Force Logistic Support Group-Bravo continued to provide the necessary Logistics Support and limited maintenance support for units located within the Chu Lai Combat Base.

The U. S. Army remains to hold the responsibility of producing and providing baked goods for units in the Chu Lai EAOR.

2. Brigadier General OLSON, Commanding General, Force Logistic Command, visited this Command on construction matters at the Ammunition Supply Point on 9 February 1968.

3. During the month of February 1-29, 1968, the Aid Station treated two-hundred and thirty-eight (238) persons and administered two-hundred and forty-nine (249) immunization shots.

The Civil Affairs Section treated ninety-two (92) Vietnamese personnel.

4. The building program within Supply Company (Rein), Force Logistic Support Group-Bravo continues with the first increment of the current construction at the new Ammunition Supply Point (ASP) is seventy-two (72) percent complete.

During the period covered by this report, Class V (W) and Class V (A) ammunition dumps operated on a 24 hour a day basis with an additional requirement to ship 500 pallets of Class (V) ammunition to DaNang. The above is a break down by short tons of Class I, Class V (W) and Class V(A) handled by this Command during the period covered by this report.

This company still has thousands of 500lb bombs buried in the sand. These bombs have been blown from their pallets and are being excavated, palletized, and issued.

This company has received twenty-six (26) boxes of clothing during this reporting period. These shipments eliminated many of the clothing items in a critical supply status. Presently, there are six (6) shipments outstanding, and it is anticipated that upon receipt of these shipments, the majority of the critical clothing items will be alleviated and the retail clothing will be able to resume normal operations.

i. Community Relations

(1) In the aftermath of increased Viet Cong activity around Tet, the Civil Affairs Section aided the people of Chu Lai New Life Village to take a number of steps toward making their village more secure. Sandbags and engineer stakes were provided for use in construction of a trench and foxhole line around the village's western boundary. A bunker was constructed at the Chapelle Vietnamese hospital. Additionally, a concertina wire barrier was erected along the Thanh Tra — An Tan boundary.

(2) Some 35 truckloads of lumber and roofing tin were provided to the people of Chu Lai. Most went to the newly arrived refugees of Thanh Tam hamlet, who were also given soap and clothing. The rest of the lumber and tin was given to four schools which are being constructed or added to in the different hamlets.

(3) MedCAP assistance was rendered through the Vietnamese hospital on a daily basis. Over 500 patients were treated during the month. Work on improving the facilities and sanitation of the hospital is continuing.

(4) Supply Company (Rein), Force Logistic Support Group-Bravo, employs 123 Vietnamese under the Organizational Maintenance Fund. Another 26 Vietnamese are employed under non-appropriated funds.

j. Communications

(1) Headquarters Section. A limited number of requisitions were submitted by the section holding to the policy of requisitioning only those items necessary for the immediate accomplishment of the Platoons mission. Excess equipment was still being turned-in on a continuing basis.

(2) Maintenance Section. During the month of February, the repair shop handled 19 work orders. Thirteen of these were completed in the shop, five were evacuated to a higher echelon shop, and one remains on the workbench. During the month the repair shop has maintained a constant surveillance of the Supply Company switch board, teletype, and IBM circuits as well as performing second echelon maintenance on all communications equipment assigned to the section.

(3) Radio Section. Radio section maintained a continuous guard on the Force Logistics Command Radio Net and manned the Chu Lai Defense Net nightly from 1800-0730. Commencing on the 19th of the month the section has manned the Sub-Sector II Command Net. An antenna test, in conjunction with Force Logistic Command and FLSG-Alpha, has been in operation since the preventative maintenance program was commenced on a daily and weekly basis. The majority of all excess radio equipment has been turned-in to Organic Supply for reissue.

(4) Wire Section. The section maintained a continuous watch on the Company switchboard as well as providing trouble-shooting and installation service throughout the month. A new telephone directory was published and distributed using a new numbering system to simplify the switchboard operation for the subscribers.

(5) Message Center Section. Six-hundred and Sixty (660) messages were processed during February; 516 incoming classified and unclassified, and 142 outgoing classified and unclassified. Additionally, a total of 66,309 cards were processed on the Autodin system; 56,679 outgoing and 9,630 incoming. The Message Center had a total of 251 hours and 5 minutes of down time broken down as follows: 205 hours and 30 minutes on the Autodin circuit and 15 hours and 35 minutes on the teletype circuit. The majority of the down time was caused by equipment troubles and line troubles either on this end or at Force Logistic Command.
