NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During this reporting period, Supply Company (Rein), Force Logistic Support Group-Bravo, continued to provide the necessary logistics support and limited maintenance support for units located within the Chu Lai Combat Base.

The U.S. Army retains the responsibility of producing and providing baked goods for units in the Chu Lai TAOR.

2. During the month of June, 1968, the Aid Station treated two hundred and forty two (242) persons and administered two hundred and seventy nine (279) immunizations.

The Civil Affairs Section treated twenty four (24) Vietnamese personnel.

3. The building program within Supply Company continues with the first increment of the current construction at the new Ammunition Supply Point, which is eighty three percent complete.

During this reporting period 156 Sealand Vans were received and loaded with Retrograde Cargo for shipment to Conus. In addition 28 Conex boxes were also utilized.

i. Equipment. Service and Support Section continues to provide third echelon maintenance for organic engineer equipment. The Motor Transport Section continues to perform third echelon maintenance of organic motor transport. 9th Engineer Battalion Motor Transport third echelon requirements are being met by the Maintenance Battalion Liaison Team.

k. Community Relations.

1. As a part of the overall reduction of this Command's assigned support mission in the Chu Lai area, the responsibilities now being carried out by our civic action and MEDCAP personnel are now being assumed by other units in this area. In accordance with Commanding General, Force Logistic Command, letter 13/TS/td/8224 over 5080/6 dated 16 June 1968, the transition will be accomplished by 1 July 1968.

2. This Command currently employs, through the Industrial Relations Office, 117 Vietnamese civilians on Organizational Maintenance funds and 20 on non-appropriated funds.

1. Communications.

1. Maintenance Section: The maintenance section processed a total of seventeen work orders; fifteen were completed in the shop and two were forwarded to the next higher echelon shop. A constant surveillance was maintained over the teletype and autodin circuits throughout the month.

2. Wire Section: The Wire Section ceased operation of the Supply Company switchboard during the month when the completed dial system was installed. A total of one hundred telephones were withdrawn from service in addition to the switchboard. The security switchboard is continuing to be manned on a twenty four hour per day basis.

3. Radio Section: The section maintained its continuous guard on the Force Logistics Command Tactical net and the SubSector security and Chu Lai Defense radio nets.

4. Message Center Section: During the month the section handled a total of 741 messages; 74 classified and 667 unclassified. Additionally, a total of 9473 cards were handled on the autodin circuit; 7053 outgoing and 2420 incoming. There was a total of 224 hours and 10 minutes down time during the month caused by power failures and equipment troubles at both ends of the circuit. The IBM 407 run-off machine was installed giving the message center complete run-off capabilities of autodin messages.
