NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During this reporting period, Supply Company (Rein), Force Logistic Support Group-Bravo, continued to provide the necessary logistics support and limited maintenance support for units located within the Chu Lai Combat Base.

The U.S. Army retains the responsibility of producing and providing baked goods for units in the Chu Lai TAOR.

2. During the month of May 1-31, 1968, the Aid Station treated four hundred and thirty (430) persons and administered two hundred and thirty (230) immunizations.

The Civil Affairs Section treated fifty four (54) Vietnamese personnel.

3. Brigadier General OLSON, Commanding General, Force Logistic Command, inspected this Command on the 31st of May, 1968, from 1400 to 1600 hours.

4. The building program within Supply Company continues with the first increment of the current construction at the new Ammunition Supply Point, which is seventy percent complete.

In addition a new outdoor stage has been built for the Enlisted Men's Club. During this reporting period a gate has been installed at the Supply Company's PX and two hundred and thirty five Ammo Designation signs have been made for the Ammo Dump.

k. Community Relations.

1. During this reporting period this Command has assisted in the construction of five hamlet schools and offices. These buildings will consist of a first grade classroom, office and meeting room for each hamlet.

2. The following is a statistical abstract of construction status of the schools in the Chu Lai New Life Hamlet.

- A. Eight truckloads of lumber were delivered to the Dinh Phuoc school which is 85% completed.
- B. Five truckloads of lumber to the Thanh Tra school which is 50% completed.
- C. Two truckloads of wood to the Hoa Van school which is 15% completed.
- D. Four truckloads of lumber to the Catholic Highschool which is 30% completed.
- E. Dong Yen primary school; projected.

3. Hospital

- A. Medcap visits have been conducted every other day for the treatment of Vietnamese and the training of local nurses.
- B. Eight heads have been started which are 75% completed.
- C. General maintenance was conducted on hospital equipment.

4. Swill was provided for the Chu Lai Village pig farm from the Supply Company messhall.

5. This unit's support of the Ly Tin District Medical Center took the following form during the month of May:

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- A. Two hundred and fifty (250) patients were treated by U.S. Navy Corpsmen.
- B. Five civilian patient/casualties were evacuated to Quang Ngai and the U.S. Army Hospital.

6. Psychological Operations. Two movies were shown during the month of May.

7. This Command currently employs, through the Industrial Relations Office, 119 Vietnamese civilians on Organizational Maintenance funds and 21 on non-appropriated funds.

1. Communications.

1. Maintenance Section. Twenty four work orders were received during this reporting period. Nine were processed to a higher echelon of maintenance, four were completed and eleven are pending. A constant surveillance has been maintained over all Supply Company circuits. The section continues to perform second and third echelon preventative maintenance on all communications equipment.

2. Message Center Section. During the month of May the section processed a total of 885 messages; 751 incoming and 134 outgoing. On the data circuit a total of 21,760 cards were processed; 15,262 outgoing and 6,498 incoming. Down-time during the month amounted to a total of 117 hours and 30 minutes of which 21 hours and 30 minutes was due to local power failure and the remainder to equipment failures on both ends of the circuit.

3. Wire Section. The section continued to man the Company switchboard as well as the Sub-Sector switchboard. Trouble-shooting and installation was continued as needed.

4. Radio Section. The section maintained its continuous guard of the Force Logistic Command Net and the nightly guard of the SubSector Command Net and the Chu Lai Defense Nets.
