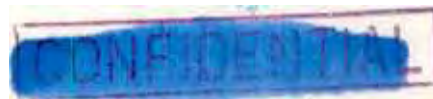

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PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. On 20 August 1970 Sea Land Corporation discontinued sending refrigerator vans to An Hoa, Baldy, and Hoi An. Perishable rations for these areas were then supplied by airlift and one M349A1 van without a refrigerator unit. To alleviate the strain on existing assets, FMFPac was requested to increase FLC's allowance of M349's from 3 to 4. (A deficiency of one already existed.) Subsequently, this was approved and 2 each M349A4's were shipped via the USS Transglobe from Okinawa on 5 September 1970.

2. During the month of August the Force Logistic Command shipped 1,223 bundles of M8A1 matting to Iwakuni.

3. Because of unusually high usage of JP-4 at the LSU's, G-3/S made liaison with the Wing and arranged to have Wing tankers fly fuel to supplement our own resupply actions.

4. Representatives of Foremost Dairy made trips to our LSU's to determine if it was feasible to make dairy deliveries directly to the mess halls. A final decision was made that deliveries would be made to Baldy but not to Hill-37 and Hoi An.

5. In order to control the retrograde process of excess SAC-3 items redistributed out of RVN, and to measure the percentage of turn-ins versus dues, a mechanized 1401 system has been initiated. The system calls for key punching cards with pertinent data relating to TAM number, nomenclature, quantity, owner AAC, invoice ACC and message/transaction authority. A listing is run by destination, i.e. CONUS, Okinawa, Hawaii, which represents all SAC-3 materiel due for turn-in through MC-114 Retrograde. They in turn annotate the listing when the items are received. This information is punched into the master card for listing update. As a result, Retrograde, G-3, and Embarkation can identify:

- a. Equipment to be turned in.
- b. Equipment turn-in.
- c. Equipment to be staged for future shipping.

Once an item is shipped, the master card will be pulled from the deck and a new position listing prepared.

Combat essential TERO's on backlog decreased from two hundred sixty-two to two hundred twenty-three. The overall backlog continues a slow but steady decline.

(b) On 17 August 1970 Gunnery Sergeant RUTTER was ordered on TAD to Okinawa for the purpose of procuring and couriering back to Vietnam high priority supplies.

(c) The Purchasing and Contracting Officer received a letter from Sea Land Service Inc. on 20 August 1970 that the letter agreement for Rental of Reefer Vans of 14 July 1970 would no longer be honored after 21 August 1970.

r. Training

(1) Significant Events

(a) During the month of August 1970, the Command Training Section was responsible for normal staff cognizance of the Command Training Program which included administrative coordination and allocation of quotas to five formal schools and three internally conducted courses of instruction for a

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combined total of 67 students. Technical assistance for NBC was furnished to two subordinate organizations. Four formal staff visits were conducted. A Commanding General's Inspection was also conducted. Drug Abuse lectures were presented to one subordinate unit and two lectures were presented to NCO Leadership School. A complete block of combat oriented instruction was presented to the Camp Provisional Rifle Company. The two formal courses of instruction conducted by the Command Noncommissioned Officer Leadership School included students and instructor staff participating in two combat operations.

(b) Technical assistance for NBC was furnished to 1st Military Police Battalion and Maintenance Battalion for a combined total of four hours.

(c) Supply Battalion received a Commanding General's Inspection in Training, (including race relations and leadership councils) and NBCD functional areas.

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STORY OF INTEREST

Third Military Police Battalion's Redeployment

After more than three years fighting, patrolling and protecting, the 3rd Military Police Battalion, Force Logistic Command, is gone. But by no means forgotten.

The main element of the battalion departed Vietnam by Navy ship late this month to deploy to Camp Pendleton, California.

The return of the battalion to the United States is part of the fourth increment of troop redeployment from the Republic of Vietnam and results in a reduction of approximately 480 spaces. Following its arrival at Camp Pendleton, the battalion will be inactivated.

Approximately 200 officers and enlisted Marines made up the element which departed by ship. Other personnel of the unit were redeployed by air earlier in the month, while some were re-assigned in-country to complete their overseas tours.

The battalion is commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Charles FIMIAN with Major William A. RENNER as the Executive Officer. Sergeant Major James M. REID is the Battalion Sergeant Major.

The activation of the battalion commenced in June of 1966 under the control of the Fifth Marine Division at Camp Pendleton, California. On April 30, 1967, the battalion embarked aboard ship at San Diego and deployed to the Republic of Vietnam. The 3rd Military Police Battalion disembarked at Danang on May 31, 1967.

Assigned to the administrative control of Force Logistic Command, the 3rd Military Police Battalion assumed control of the Third Marine Amphibious Force Correctional Center and Prisoner of War Detention Facility on June 1, 1967. "A" Company assumed control of the correctional center, while "B" Company assumed operational control of the POW Facility. "D" Company assumed duties as Armed Forces Police in Danang, Marine Security, and operated the I Corps and III MAF Criminal Investigation Department.

"C" Company was attached to the 1st Military Police Battalion during June of 1967 shortly after its arrival in Vietnam and performed bridge security in the Danang area until the unit's deactivation in the Phase III troop withdrawals.

The Scout and Sentry Dog Platoons of Headquarters and Service Company have compiled an impressive record over their three years of service in Vietnam. Their list of achievements include finding three POW camps, 33 hospitals, 1120 ambushes, 1424 bunker complexes and spider holes, 20 tons

of rice, medical gear, and assorted enemy equipment

The battalion has also recently had the distinction to serve as the combat testing ground for dog teams trained in the new and difficult art of detecting mines and booby-traps.

The teams consist of a dog handler and a highly trained German Shepherd Dog. The dogs undergo 18 weeks of training in the U.S. conducted by practicing psychologists and college psychology students. Using the same reasoning as Pavlov used in his conditioned response experiments, the dogs are rewarded with food and praise after finding a dummy mine or booby-trap.

Although it is not certain what a dog actually senses when he discovers a mine or booby-trap, the theory is that he detects one or more of three different things; the smell of the mine or booby-trap, the scent of the human who planted it, or the visual disturbance in the terrain.

Still in the evaluation stage, the teams have successfully uncovered over 81 lethal surprise firing devices and several hundred pieces of ordnance that could be transformed into booby-traps.

Dog handlers serving with the battalion have been awarded: two Navy Crosses, eight Silver Stars, 18 Bronze Stars, 17 Navy Unit Citations, 16 Navy Achievement Medals and 156 Purple Hearts for wounds received in action. These medals were awarded over a two year period beginning in July of 1968.

The battalion has also conducted an aggressive civic affairs program. Since the unit's arrival in Vietnam, Navy corpsmen and doctors attached to the 3rd Military Police Battalion have conducted 303 Medical Civic Action Patrols (MEDCAPS) within their area of responsibility. These MEDCAPS have treated 14,092 Vietnamese from nearby hamlets and villages.

Upgrading the economy and living conditions of these hamlets has been the goal of the 3rd MP's S-5 Civil Affairs Office. Over the past two years the office has introduced an improved variety of rice that increases production over Vietnamese rice using the same amount of land. Vegetable seeds donated by organizations in the U. S. have been distributed by the S-5 Office and have provided both variety and more nutrition to the Vietnamese' diet. Successful cross-breeding between smaller Vietnamese pigs and American pigs, another S-5 project, has boosted the hamlets' economy.

Colonel FIMIAN, an outspoken supporter of his men, said "In their own particular fields, that is the dog handlers, Armed Forces Police or correctional personnel, I feel that they are the best in the Marine Corps. With the redeployment of this unit, many of these Marines will be able to use in stateside assignments much of their valuable experience gained over here."

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"They have done a real fine job, that is not publicized because of its very nature, and have gotten better at it every year. The dog teams have saved many Marines in the field.", Colonel FIMIAN added.

The Colonel went on to say, "The men are happy to be going home for two reasons; not only are they going home, but they also know that they are leaving with a deep sense of accomplishment".

Control of the correctional center and the battalion's compound, Camp David A. LAND, named in honor of the first Marine killed in action while serving with the battalion, will be assumed by the 504th Military Police Battalion, the Army battalion responsible for military operations throughout I Corps.



1. Purpose. To establish policies and procedures governing the relocation of Company A (Rein), 7th Engineer Battalion (-).

2. Background. Reference (a) passed administrative control of Company A (rein), 7th Engineer Battalion (-) from the Commanding General, 1st Marine Division to the Commanding General, Force Logistic Command effective 19 July 1970. Reference (b) and (c) pertain to the relocation of the company to the Camp Books cantonment and the assumption of supply support responsibilities by the Force Logistic Command.

3. Policy

a. Command and Command Relationships

(1) The Commanding General, III Marine Amphibious Force exercises operational control and technical direction of Company A (Rein), 7th Engineer Battalion (-). Operational control and technical direction are defined by paragraph 5401 of reference (d).

(2) The Commanding General, Force Logistic Command exercises administrative control and coordination of Company A (Rein), 7th Engineer Battalion (-). Administrative control and coordination are defined by paragraph 5401 of reference (d).

(3) Company A (Rein), 7th Engineer Battalion (-) is an administrative component of Maintenance Battalion, 1st FSR/FLC. The Commanding Officer, Maintenance Battalion exercises all aspects of administrative control and coordination except as specified by this order.

b. Operational Control and Technical Direction. Operational control and technical direction will be exercised by the Commanding General, III MAF. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3, will maintain general staff cognizance of the engineer company's activities for the Commanding General, FLC. 4. Procedures


3 Engineer repair parts may be stocked in the company maintenance area provided they are carried on the Headquarters and Service Battalion property account. Accounting for repair parts will be by utilizing a "drop sheet", which will be turned in to Headquarters and Service Battalion Supply daily.
