NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During the month of March the Force Logistic Command (G-3/S) continued to coordinate a project directed by COMNAVFORV 180444Z DEC 69 (S) in which 3 LST's departed for Iwakuni, Japan with 2046 bundles of AM-2 Airfield Matting. This marks the second stage of this project, which started in February. Based upon shipping availability, this retrograde will continue in April and be completed in May.
2. During the month, shipments of construction material were made to Camp Butler, Okinawa.
3. Representatives from the Force Logistic Command (G-3/S) made a liaison visit to the Marine detachments of the Naval advisory Group, United States Embassy, COMNAVFORV, and Sub Unit #1 ANGLICO, all located in the Saigon area, to discuss supply support problems in their units. Proposed Interservice Support Agreements were also discussed with USARV.
4. The redistribution of T/E and Special Allowance assets under Keystone Bluejay continued during the month. The USS DENVER, LPD-9 carried two loads of material to Okinawa totaling 49,703 square feet, 47,895 cubic feet, and 10,580 measured tons.
5. FLSG-BRAVO received 25 line items (approximately 1,876 pieces) of equipment from Division units, accomplished necessary repairs, and turned in to TMO for shipment to VNMC, Saigon. This equipment is part of the initial provisioning of the 9th Battalion and is to be delivered by 1 June 1970.
6. Despite the withdrawal of Marine units from Vietnam, the number of Tactical Equipment Repair Orders (TERO's) received by Force Logistic Command shops at the end of this period was substantially higher than the average of the previous two quarters. Since the 1st Quarters of the Fiscal Year, however the backlog of equipment which is deadlined for 3rd and 4th echelon maintenance at Force Logistic Command has been cut nearly in half.
7. 12 March 1970 - Surveillance Team provided by Ammo Company, Supply Battalion, 1stFSR/FLC with one QE technician from MAERU-3 went to Hoi An to provide service to the 2nd Bde ROKMC.

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8. 16-19 March 1970 - G-3 Operations Officer, G-3 Assistant Ammo Officer and the Commanding Officer, Ammo Company, Supply Battalion, Force Logistic Command, attended MACV Ordnance Conference at Saigon. Primary subject of concern to this Command was assumption of USMC ASP's by U. S. Army.

Training

(1) During the month of March 1970, the Command Training Section was responsible for normal staff cognizance of the Command Training Program which included administrative coordination and allocation of quotas to 11 formal schools and three internally conducted courses of instruction for a total input of 90 students. 


~~CAMP~~ JAY K. BOOKS, Vietnam (Delayed)--The key word in today's Marine Corps is flexibility. Although the old adage that every Marine is basically trained as a rifleman still holds true, many modern Marines are highly specialized and skilled technicians

One of the most flexible and technical units in the "now" Marine Corps is the Force Logistic Command's (FLC) Engineer Maintenance Company, which provides third and fourth echelon maintenance for all Marine Corps and Republic of Korea engineer equipment in I corps, Vietnam's northernmost tactical zone.

Third and fourth echelon maintenance means replacing of defective parts and the rebuilding of broken down equipment so that the final step in equipment maintenance, salvaging, will not become necessary.

The 137-man company consists of five different repair shops. Since July 1969 it has completed over 2,500 job orders and sent out over 250 different "contact teams" into the field for on the spot repair jobs.

When gear is turned into the company for repairs, it is first given a visual spot-check inspection by the technical inspection shop to see if the item is still worth repairing, and to make sure that first and second echelon maintenance (operator's and unit's maintenance) has been completed on it.

If the item is in repairable condition, depending on the unit's operating commitment, a float item from the company lot can be exchanged for it. Thus, a broken-down machine can be turned in, and another machine in good running condition will be given to the unit rather than have the unit wait for repairs.

Needless to say this is a very time-saving operation, and the company float lot is well stocked with ready-to-go engineer equipment in case of an emergency.

Once gear is accepted, it is logged in, and sent to one of the company's four diversified repair shop. The heavy equipment shop repairs an average of 60 heavy duty equipment pieces a month, ranging from crawler tractors to heavy-duty forklifts. The shop completely revitalizes a machine, overhauling the engine and the body.

The generator shop has completed over 700 work orders in 1970 alone, besides sending out over 50 contact teams. The shop is capable of fixing all small engines such as outboard motors, chainsaws, and fuel pumps.

A new addition to the shop is the "Series 700" generator, recently adopted by the Marines for use in Vietnam. It has some distinct advantages over other models still in use. The newer generator is comparable to an IBM machine. Its instrument panel lights up when something goes wrong internally, pinpointing the trouble.

The generator shop already has issued over one-hundred "Series 700" generators to supply Vietnam-based Marines with electrical power.

The job of keeping Marine refrigerators and water pumps in running condition is handled by the company's refrigeration and water supply section. It is manned by 15 well trained Marine Corps water supply men and refrigerator repairmen.

The welding and machine shop completes the make-up of one of FLC's busiest units. The shop is well stocked with the latest available equipment, including lathes, shapers, milling machines, band saws, and drill presses. Its 11 men complete over 40 work orders monthly on all engineer equipment in I Corps.

Repairing and providing maintenance for engineer equipment is usually a timeless and thankless task. The main satisfaction received by the mechanically inclined Leathernecks from Engineer Maintenance Company is knowing that they have played a vital role in today's Marine Corps in Vietnam.

1. Purpose. To establish a Manpower Management Reporting Coordination System within this Command and to promulgate procedures for coordinating problems in connection with timely and accurate reporting of information into the MMS.

2. Cancellation. FLCO 1080.8A.

3. Information

a. Reference (a) delineates the responsibilities of commanding officers of reporting units and of intermediate commands in the timely and accurate submission of information and required documents into the MMS.

b. Reference (b) contains information and instructions relative to the utilization of the Unit Transaction Register (UTR) in the MMS.

c. Reference (c) contains additional information concerning the MMS within commands of the III Marine Amphibious Force and lists services available to commands to assist commanders in executing their responsibilities as contained in reference (a).

d. Since the inception of the MMS in WestPac commands on 1 March 1969, diary error rates for this Command have exceeded the standard of reporting performance as established by the Commandant of the Marine Corps. e. The number of third or higher notifications to reporting units of this Command by the Automated Services Center (ASC), through UTR's, of erroneous or incorrect information entered on unit diaries is considered to be excessive. It is apparent that, in many instances, timely action is not being taken to correct reported deficiencies.

f. Monthly Personnel Rosters (MPR's) are not, in many instances, being audited properly and returned to the ASC within five working days after receipt as required by reference (a).

4. Action

a. Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1. Appoint an officer from the office of the G-1 as the Command MMS Coordinator. This officer will be responsible for:

(1) Coordination of all matters pertaining to the MMS within the Command.

(2) Monitoring third and higher notices of discrepancies contained on UTR's in order to identify trends developing in inaccurate/erroneous/late reporting.

(3) Maintaining continuous liaison with the ASC and organizational MMS Coordinators in order to obtain current available information which would assist in improving reporting procedures within the Command.

(4) Monitoring reports of late and/or erroneous MPR submissions by reporting units of this Command.

(5) Collecting data in the following areas and drafting monthly bulletins to publish this data to organizations of this Command for use in monitoring the effectiveness of MMS reporting:

- (a) Unit diary error rates.
- (b) Late entry rates.
- (c) Late diary rates.
- (d) Late/erroneous submissions of MPR's.

(e) Trends in inaccurate/erroneous/late reporting of information as contained in third or higher notifications on UTR's.

(6) Coordination between the ASC and organizational MMS Coordinators for assistance required in the education programs established for proper reporting of information into the MMS.

b. Organizational Commanders

(1) Appoint an officer as MMS Coordinator and provide the name of the officer appointed to this Headquarters (G-1).


(2) Establish procedures to ensure that appropriate corrective action is taken expeditiously on all required corrections indicated on UTR's.

(3) Establish procedures to ensure that MPR's are properly audited, corrected and returned to the ASC within 5 working days of their receipt.

(4) Establish a continuing MMS education program for all personnel involved in reporting information into the MMS. Company commanders and executive officers of reporting units and personnel reviewing unit diaries in the organizational headquarters are considered to be involved with the reporting of information into the MMS. This program will include, but is not limited to, assistance from the ASC and instruction on the information contained in the monthly bulletins prepared in accordance with paragraph 4a(5), above.

(5) Establish procedures to ensure that reporting units deliver unit diaries daily to battalion/group headquarters for a complete review at that level prior to their delivery to the ASC. Unit diaries will not be unnecessarily delayed at battalion/group level. In all cases they must be delivered to the ASC the same day that they are received from the reporting units.

5. Recommendations. Recommendations concerning ways and means to improve MMS reporting within this Command are invited. Such recommendations shall be addressed to this Headquarters (G-1) via the administrative chain of command.

Subj: Command Close Order Drill Competition

1. Purpose. To promulgate instructions in regard to the establishment of a Command Close Order Drill Competition.

2. Background

Due to the exigencies of war, over the past five years, some Marine units have not had the opportunity to perfect this military accomplishment. Close order drill fosters unit spirit and a high order of discipline, the life-blood of a professional military force.

b. Noncommissioned officers gain self confidence and respect through the demonstrated ability of being highly proficient in conducting close order drill. This capability is a prime requirement for an NCO to successfully perform duties in the garrison environment which will be encountered upon redeployment from Vietnam.

c. This Command has initiated a program to march troops in formation whenever the opportunity is afforded, and conduct five minutes of close order drill prior to marching to noon chow. As an added incentive to increase the interest of the members of this Command in attaining the military virtue of precision marching, and to provide an additional opportunity for NCO's to attain proficiency in drilling troops, a Close Order Drill Competition is hereby established.



3. Information

- a. A command competition of battalion level close order drill teams will be conducted 19 April 1970.
- b. Each battalion is encouraged to have internal company level drill teams of a minimum of 30 troopers compete for the honor of representing the battalion in the Command level competition.
- c. Each drill team will be required to perform for a period of six minutes. The performance will be judged on the basis of appearance, precision and originality.
- d. The Sergeants Major of the Command will comprise the judges of the Command level competition.

4. Action

- a. Staff cognizance of the competition will be exercised by the AC/S, G-2.
- b. Each battalion Commander will institute a program in support of the Force Bulletin.
- c. The AC/S, G-1 will take cognizance of the procurement of suitable awards.
- d. The Force Logistic Command Sergeant Major will develop grading criteria for the determination of placement within the competition.

a. The Command Chaplain, will present the training and provide the necessary material.


b. The Commanding Officer, Headquarters and Service Battalion will provide two classrooms.

1. Purpose. Reference (a) directed AM-2 Matting held by FLC be invoiced and shipped to Okinawa and Japan.

2. Cancellation. FLCBul 4400 of 23 Feb 1970

3. Background. Approximately 270 bundles of matting have been borrowed from stock and placed in use throughout the camp in bunkers, for walkways, and for similar projects. The subject matting consists of 12 and 6 foot smooth aluminum sections. A bundle consists of 12 sections or 11 sections and 2 half sections.

4. Action

a. Addressees will assemble all serviceable AM-2 matting and have it washed, banded with 1/2" banding, mounted on skids and turned in to Supply Company, Supply Battalion. Arrange turn in with Supply Operations Officer, ext 2325. Matting that is not essential to fortification will be turned in by 7 March 1970. That which is installed and essential to security will be turned in by 1 April 1970.

b. This effort will be coordinated within each Battalion to ensure turn in of full bundles.

c. Sections which are damaged will be turned in directly to Supply Company, segregated but not bundled. Supply Company will inspect the damaged sections and turn unserviceable sections into Salvage. Sections which are usable will be bundled at Supply Company.



 - c. Submit all future requisitions for T/E deficiencies via this Headquarters (Attn: G-4) for approval.
