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PART II

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. On 18 September a new ISSA, 5D-M60129-0003-0, became effective. This agreement is for the provision of Class I supplies, fresh bread only, in support of U.S. Army elements located in the Danang area, I Military Region, RVN. This agreement further provides for Class I Ration support to approximately 725 personnel per day at Camp Viking.
2. A Civic Action Program to turn over salvageable 2½, 3/4 and ¼ ton vehicles, engines and a variety of spare parts to the Quang Nam Province Combined Coordinating Council for the vocational training of disabled veterans and families of deceased servicemen at Hoi An was approved and material physically turned over on 27 September.
3. Four-hundred pounds of candy and 100 dozen doughnuts were donated by FLC to the Vietnamese children's Mid-Autumn Festival held at Camp Books on 15 September.
4. NSA Danang Excesses. A magnetic tape, listing approximately 30,000 line items held by APDO of NSA excesses was received for requirements screening by this command on or about 15 August. The tape had to be recycled to conform to the configuration of ADP equipment of this command. Upon completion of this action, the tape was screened against MC100 requirements in a buy position and requisitions were produced for matching items. This resulted in 187 requisitions for \$98,000. It was recommended to Commanding General on 17 September to cease action on this project. Verbal approval was given on that date.
5. The number of new TERO's received during the month of September decreased slightly by 251 with a total input of 7,115 TERO's. The input of TERO's on combat essential equipment decreased by 187 with a total input of 705 TERO's. The overall backlog continues a slow but steady decline.
6. Highlights of the month of September:
 - a. 7 Sep. Major General WOLLWINE, USA, MACV, visited Chu Lai in connection with Army take-over.

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b. 7 Sep. Major General GRAHAM, USA, Munitions Command, Picatinny Arsenal, visited ASP's 2, 1 and the MAERU-3 facility in ASP-1.

c. 21-29 Sep. Mr. John GIBSON, GS-11, Naval Ammunition Production and Engineering Center, NAD Crane, visited in connection with MAERU-3 activity.

NAVY UNIT COMMENDATION FOR FLC

Force Logistic Command was presented the Navy Unit Commendation (NUC) at a formal ceremony September 22, 1970.

Marine Lieutenant General Keith B. MCCUTCHEON, Commanding General of III Marine Amphibious Force, attached the streamer to FLC's colors. The award covers the period from June 1, 1968 to June 30, 1969. Personnel attached to FLC during that period are authorized to wear the NUC ribbon.

In the citation, signed by Secretary of the Navy John H. CHAFFEE, FLC was praised for "demonstrating an exceptional degree of professionalism and resourcefulness in providing support for the III Marine Amphibious Force, U. S. Army Commands in the I Corps Tactical Zone and the 2nd Brigade, Republic of Korea Marine Corps."

"The Force Logistic Command, despite adverse weather, difficult lines of communication and enemy action, was eminently successful in providing the necessary supplies, ammunition and petroleum products in support of combat operations."


SEQUENCE OF EVENTS;

1. Two Platoons of 40 Marines each with Lieutenants as Platoon Commanders are formed on road with color guard in company formation as set forth in enclosure (2).
2. Commanding Officer of Troops issues the Command of Attention when Commanding General III MAF positions himself in accordance with enclosure (2).
3. The Commanding General of FLC commands the Commanding Officer of Troops, "Present the Colors to be Decorated."



1. Purpose. To provide procedures in the proper handling and reporting of traffic accidents involving Vietnamese Nationals.
2. Background. In recent weeks there have been an increasing number of incidents throughout Vietnam in which Vietnamese have gathered at the scene of traffic accidents involving U.S. vehicles. The Vietnamese have attempted to prevent the vehicle and/or its occupants from leaving the scene until large sums of money had been paid to the victim or his relatives. Several such incidents have occurred in the Danang area. The possibility exists that one may become volatile before higher Headquarters is aware it has occurred. As a result reference (a) has been promulgated.
3. Action. In order to insure proper handling of such incidents, all Force Logistic Command Commanders will institute the following procedures:
 - a. As soon as possible, after the accident occurs, the Combined Police Force/Military Police unit of U.S. Forces (957-6152) and the Force Logistic Command Logistic Operations Center (955-2279/2138) will be notified by the vehicle operator or one of its occupants. This notification should be by the most expeditious manner available such as radio, telephone or by requesting the driver of another U.S. Government vehicle to carry a message for you. During this notification provide information as to the location of the accident and the extent of injuries and/or damage to all vehicles involved.
 - b. The Military Police or Combined Police Force Headquarters will notify the III MAF Command Center who will in turn notify the parent unit of the Marine/vehicle involved.
 - c. Upon notification, the parent unit (Battalion/Group) will dispatch an officer of field grade to the scene of the accident in a radio equipped jeep. This radio will enter the III MAF Tactical Net (Primary Designator M-643; Secondary M-808). Radios are available for temporary loan from Communications Company, Headquarters and Service Battalion. Call signs and frequencies will be provided. The parent unit will then notify the Logistic Operations Center (955-2279/2138) providing

all information available and the name of the field grade officer dispatched to the scene.

d. The III MAF Command Center will keep the parent unit officer abreast of developments while he is enroute to the scene.

e. Upon arrival at the scene the parent unit officer will keep the III MAF Command Center abreast of the situation. When directed to do so by the III MAF Command Center, he will take charge at the scene.

f. The Logistic Operations Center upon notification will enter the III MAF Tactical Net and monitor all traffic regarding the accident.

g. All Commanders will insure that:

(1) All officers within their command are familiar with this order and reference (a).

(2) All drivers are familiar with the provisions of paragraph 3.a of this order and paragraph 209 of reference (b).

This RDT will be placed immediately after the Standard Subject Identification Code (SSIC) or after the classification if the SSIC is not used.

b. The RDT is defined as the latest estimated date/time which the message drafter or releaser considers that the message must be received by the action addressee in order to allow sufficient time for a complete response to the message.

c. In cases where immediate message delivery would have been desirable prior to drafting, use the time the message draft was completed as the RDT. Readdressals are exempt from this requirement.


