



NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. Narrative

3.

During the month of March 1969, the Battery occupied positions during the first of the month on Hill 55, RVN. On 2 March 1969, the Alfa detachment of two 155mm guns moved from Hill 65 back to the Battery position at Hill 55.

On 1 March 1969, Alfa detachment equipped with two new 175mm guns was deployed to a position in An Hoa, under the command of lstLt G. D. SIMPSON.

On 5 March 1969, the Battery became fully operational 175mm Gun Battery. Four guns remained on Hill 55, while the detachment proceeded to An Hoa. The last rounds fired by the M53 155mm Gun in this Battery occurred at 050430H.

On 8 March 1969, four 175mm Guns and the Battery Headquarters displaced to Hill 34, where the Battery is presently located. Since arriving in position the Battery has continued a program of improving the gun pits, ready ammunition pits and living areas. Also the "A" position at An Hoa improved their position by building defensive and ammunition bunkers and improving their gun positions.

- b. <u>Intelligence</u>. The Battery received its intelligence and target acquisition from the 11th Marine Regiment. The Battery since moving from Hill 55 has been receiving additional intelligence data from Headquarters, 1st Tank Battalien along with local security information.
- c. Organizations and Operations. The Battery continued to assume the mission of General Support of the 1st Marine Division. The Battery has fired in support of Oklahoma Hills, which is currently in progress. Between 5 30 March 1969 the Alfa detachment was placed under the operational control of the 2ndBn, 11th Marines with a General Support Reinforcing Mission.
- d. Training. During the month of March 1969, the Battery conducted four hours of formal schooling and also four hours of weapon safety on the M16 refle. In addition, the Battery had three hours of FAM fire with the M16 refle and the M60 machine gun. In addition seventeen new personnel were given Vietnam Orentation lectures by the Commanding Officer.
- e. <u>Logistics</u>, <u>Equipment and Supply</u>. During the month, the Battery experienced no major problems with the receipt of the new M107's on the supply systems. At the end of the reporting period all M107's were in an operational status and all logistics, equipment and supply in a satisfactory basis.





f. <u>Civic Action/Civic Affairs</u>. The Battery initiated no Civic Action or Civil Affairs programs during the month. No MedCaps were held.





MARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. Narrative and and a control of the control of th

During the month of April 1969, the Battery occupied two positions; 1-12 April four guns were on Hill 34 and two guns composed the Alpha detachment at An Hoa under the command of First Lieutenant G. D. SIMPSON.

On 12 April 1969, two guns were deployed to the new Alpha position on Hill 55 under the command of rirst Lieutenant S. D. HILL. The former Alpha detachment moved from An Hoa to Hill 34 and rejoined the Baltery.

On 13 April 1969, an additional gun was deployed to the Alpha detachment giving them three guns while three guns remained at the Battery position on 111 34. This was effective through 30 April 1969.

Since a riving at Hill 34 on 8 March 1969, the Battery has continued to improve gun pits, ammo bunkers, lighting systems for illumination of the perimeter wire, living quarters, shower and head facilities, and is currently rebuilding the berm.

On 27 April 1969, ASP #1 exploded causing light to heavy damage to the buildings in the Battery area. Since that date repairs on the buildings has continued. Equipment incurred minor damage, mostly to vehicle canvas.

The Alpha detachment has effected a rigorous improvement program for gan pits, bunkers, protective wire on their perimeter, living quarters, and head and shower racilities.

Three Battery officers rotate on a weekly basis as the Alpha detachment commander.







- b. Intelligence: The Battery received its intelligence and target acquisition from 11th Marines. The Battery received additional intelligence data from Headquarters, 1st Tank Battalion along with local security in ormation.
- c. Organization and Operations. The Battery continued to assume the mission of General Support of the lst Farine Division. The Battery continued to fire in support of Operation Oklahoma Hills, which was in progress from 1-30 April 1969. The Battery has also fired in support of the Korean Marine Briade. On 12 April 1969, the Alpha detachment at An Hoa rejoined the Battery. The detachment had been OPCON to the 2d Battalion, 11th Marines, assuming a General Support/deinforcing mission from 1-12 April 1969.
- eight hours of formal training, four hours of weapons safety, six hours FAM firing of .50 Cal Machine Guns, M60 Machine Guns, M16 Rifle, M79 Grenade Launcher and M26 Hand Grenades; also sixteen hours of section training was held. One Staff NCO and one Lance Corporal attended the Division NCO Leadership School, one Enlisted attended the I Corps Generator School and one Sergeant attended the Division Career Planning Course. One Enlisted attended the Basic Infantry Weapons Repair Course held in Okinawa. In addition, sixteen personnel were given a Vietnamese Orientation lecture by the Commanding Officer.





- e. Logistics, Equipment and Supply. The Logistics/Supply status of the Battery is good. No major problems have arisen in conjunction with the M107, 175mm Gun. Logistical/Supply support from this units supporting elements was satisfactory. It is anticipated that as the M107 increases in usage and age a larger, more complete stock of 2nd echelon repair parts will be made available from the supply units which service the M107.





1. Narrative

During the month of June 1969, the battery occupied two positions. Three guns were located on Hill 34 along with the battery CP. The other three guns composed the Alpha detachment on Hill 55.

A barrier wire construction program was continued at both positions to strengthen our defensive posture. Tangle foot, apron and concertina was placed around the berm. Also intra battery wire was started around the gun pits, FDC and the living quarters. Since 25 April 1969, some 75 rolls of single strand wire and 1440 rolls of concertina have been added.

Work continued on the new FDC bunker. All that remains is finishing the inner walls and constructing the firing charts.

Five additional sea huts were constructed at the Battery CP. Also an extension to the battery office was built. This extension provided a room for the S and C plus office space for various sections in the battery.

1. Narrative

During the month of September the Battery continued to occupy two positions. Three guns and the CP were located on Hill 34. The other three guns composed the Alpha Detachment at the Northern Artillery Cantonment.

The HE and powder bunkers at the CP position were completed. Repairs were started and completed on the HE and powder bunkers at the Alpha position.

On the night of 5 September a small force of about 12 NVA/VC attempted to probe the CP position. They were spotted by the outposts and fired upon when they approached the defensive wire. Movement in front of the wire continued throughout the night with an estimated 5 probable enemy casualties. In the morning at first light a squad sized patrol swept the area and captured one wounded VC Master Sergeant and a small cache of weapons which included 3 satchel charges, 1 RPG round, 8 home-made grenades in C-Ration cans, and one AK-h7 magazine with 52 rounds. Interrogation of the prisoner by lst ITT disclosed that their mission was to destroy the 175mm guns and as much of the CP as possible. They expected mortar support but did not have it at the time of the probes. No friendly casualties resulted from this action.

- C. Organization and Operations. The Battery continued to assume the mission of General Support of the 1st Marine Division. We new operations were fired upon in the month of September.
- D. Training. During the month of September the Battery personnel received 12 hours of formal training, 4 hours of weapon safety, and 4 hours of fan firing of the 50 Cal. machine gun, M60 machine gun, 116 rifle, M79 grenade launcher and M26 hand grenade. Four hours of section training was held by each section in the Battery. Training by the Division Mobile Training Unit was attended by 64 men; 22 new personnel were given the Vietnamese orientation lecture by the Commanding Officer.
- Logistics, Equipment and Supply. During the month of September this unit submitted two-hundred and seventy-six (276) requisitions to the supply source. Of these requisitions one-hundred and thirty-two (132) were completed. There were ten (10) requisitions for major end items with six (6) being completed. This unit received three (3) trucks, M151 which improved our motor transport and communications operations status. Also received one (1) radio AN/PRC-25. All





monsoon equipment with the exception of rain hats and boots are completed. One (1) high pressure cleaning unit was also received. Two (2) TA-312's telephones were received. FDC received their aiming circle which had been sent to D. X. The armorer received two (2) Star-light scopes and one (1) .50 ca. machine gun. One (1) -60 machine gun was lost to Code H status. Critical repair parts which caused GA card submission have either been received or removed from critical list. One (1) M107 gun has been permanently replaced by a float gun from 1st FSR. At the present time this unit is in C-1 status. A complete summary can be obtained from this Unit's Log-Sum report. Third echelon maintenance has slowed down considerably from last month. One (1) tanker, M-49 has been down for third echelon repair for an unusually long time. This unit's logistics still remain in an overall good condition with the exception of Supply personnel. 5 Sep 1969 to 6 Sep 1969 - Various incidents were reported by Posts #31 and #32 in which the enemy was observed attempting to withdraw dead or wounded and to reenter the wire. (Effective 052305H Sep 1969 to 060600H Sep 1969). Ref: Watch officer's log of 05 and 06 Sep 1969.

6 Sep 1969 - A squad sized patrol swept the area in front of the wire and captured a 23 year old man and a small cache of weapons. (Effective 060630H Sep 1969). Ref: SPOTREP dated 060815H Sep 1969.



HARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. Marrative.

During the month of December, the Battery continued to occupy two positions. Five guns and the CP were located on Hill 34. The other four guns composed the Alpha Detachment at the Northern Artillery Contonnent. From 4 to 31 December, three guns from 3rd 175mm Gun Battery were placed under the Operational Control of 1st 175mm Gun Battery. Upon joining the 1st 175mm Gun Battery one gun was emplaced with Alpha Detachment, while the other two guns remained at Hill 34.

At the CP position, a new watch tower was constructed to improve the security near the burn and new fighting holes were built into the burn itself. Work is still continuing on the defensive perimeter.

The gun pads at the Alpha position were being rebuilt, in the month of December and are nearing completion. A new FDC/XO pit was also started in December and will soon be completed and in full operation. The replacement of old wire and strengthening the defensive position is still continuing at Alpha.



2. Entries. At OlhO hours local time on 31 December, Gun #1 experienced an in here premature burst of a 175mm projectile. The fuse apparently activated approximately midway through the tube. The burst completely severed the tube throwing large fragments up to approximately 700 meters. There were no injuries to personnel. Damage to the weapon was confined to complete destruction of the tube and slight damage to the turret mount.
