**CONFIDENTIAL****I INTRODUCTION: UNCLASSIFIED**

The following is a narrative summary of significant events occurring within First Air and Naval Gunfire Liaison Company during the period of 1 July 1965 through 31 December 1965. During this period, the C.P. for 1st ANGLICO was located at MCAS Kaneohe Bay, Oahu, Hawaii, with Lt.Col. Oscar J. Morel, USMC Commanding. Lt.Col. Carroll B. Burch, USMC was the Executive Officer.

**II OPERATIONS:**

Fiscal Year 1966 found elements of 1st ANGLICO engaged in combat against an enemy of the United States for the first time since the Korean Conflict.

During April 1965, 1st ANGLICO was directed to send four (4) Shore Fire Control Parties plus an additional Spot Team to the Republic of Viet Nam to direct and control shore bombardment missions in support of the War effort. Lt.Col. George W. Albers, Executive Officer at that time, was designated as Officer in Charge of Sub Unit One, 1st ANGLICO. Lt.Col. Albers departed Oahu with eleven (11) Officers and one hundred and three (103) Enlisted during May 1965.

This initial input of 1st ANGLICO personnel into RVN was to be on a TAD basis, not to exceed six (6) months duration. This TAD status was eventually changed to PCS early in January 1966.

Sub Unit I, 1st ANGLICO, was established in RVN, with Headquarters in Saigon during May 1965. During the first six (6) months in RVN, frequent changes in personnel were necessary. By November 1965, a 100% change in personnel had been accomplished, with three (3) Officers having assumed Command. Lt.Col. G. W. Albers, the original OIC of the Sub Unit, was relieved by Lt. G. M. Wasco, USNR during July 1965. Major R. E. Romine relieved Lt. Wasco during September 1965.

The introduction of Naval Gunfire into RVN was soon discovered to be an effective supporting arm. The administrative and command post for 1st ANGLICO units in RVN was established in Saigon. The OIC, while still an integral part of 1st ANGLICO, was assigned to MAC V, with admin control of the Naval Advisory Group.

1st ANGLICO has the responsibility of supporting and providing shore bombardment along the entire coast of Viet Nam. This necessitated the establishment of 1st ANGLICO elements in each of the four (4) Corps Areas. To accomplish this, it was found that the most workable solution was to establish a Liaison Section (for Naval Gunfire) in the Operations center of each Corps Area. The Liaison Section is responsible for the processing of and gaining approval for, all Naval Gunfire missions fired within that Corps Area.

Due to the un-conventional type of war being fought in Viet Nam, it was soon found that the "Spotter" on the ground was not, in most cases, the best solution. Thus it was necessary to employ other means of acquiring targets and controlling the fire on them. For this purpose, the airplane proved to be the logical answer. Starting very early in ANGLICO's operation in Viet Nam, and continuing at the present time, practically all spotting is being done from the rear seat of Army or Air Force L-19 aircraft. The airplanes were normally provided by the senior advisor in each Corps Area.

The use of aircraft for spotting purposes proved to be beneficial in a number of ways. First its mobility allows one person, or team, to cover a vast area of responsibility. Secondary, communications between the spotter and firing ships are greatly enhanced by the use of direct UHF radios.

As previously stated, Naval Gunfire was soon found to be a very potent and welcome weapon. The following is a summary of Naval Gunfire Operations in RVN during the period covered by this report:

In most cases, it is impossible to effectively evaluate results of missions, but it is generally considered by the advisors and unit Commanders in all 4 Corps Areas that the effects of Naval Gunfire have been excellent. On several instances, Naval Gunfire has been directly responsible for the breaking up of VC attacks.

During December 1965, 1st ANGLICO was directed to dispatch two (2) TACP's to the 3rd Marine Division in RVN. Four (4) Officers and twenty-four (24) Enlisted Marines departed Hawaii on 5 January 1966. At present it is not fully known in what capacity these TACP's will be employed, however it appears that they will augment the TACP's organic to the 3rd Marine Division.

1st ANGLICO has not been without casualties in Viet Nam. As of 1 January 1966, the Purple Heart has been awarded to three (3) of its members, one to 1stLt Lowell Hayner who died in Tripler Hospital of wounds suffered while adjusting fire on 5 October 1965. Major R.E. Romine and 1stLt G.G. Garwick have also been wounded in action.

Neither has 1st ANGLICO been without its moments of recognition in Viet Nam. The following is a summary of awards and decorations of 1st ANGLICO personnel in RVN:

### III TRAINING:

The center of activities in 1st ANGLICO has been, of course, in Viet Nam during this period. However, an extensive training program has also been conducted in Hawaii. During this six (6) months, 1st ANGLICO has supported the 25th U.S. Army Division on two (2) exercises; "TROPIC NIGHT" and "TROPIC NIGHT II". Both of those operations were CFX's involving all commands of the Division. 1st ANGLICO supported each with two (2) platoons. Operation "TENDER TOUCH" was an amphibious exercise conducted by the U.S. Army 5th Division (Mechanized) at Camp Pendleton, California. One platoon from 1st ANGLICO supported this operation.

In addition to routine training, 1st ANGLICO has provided shore bombardment exercises for twelve (12) Navy ships and ORI Inspections for four (4) Carriers.

The first half of FY 1966 has been an eventful one for 1st ANGLICO. It found ANGLICO engaged in war against an enemy of the U.S. for the first time in many years. It produced its moments of glory and its moments of sorrow and frustration. But most of all it proved that the U.S. Marine and Sailor can adjust to any condition, that as a team they are a formidable fighting machine that "CAN DO".

**I Introduction**

Basic methods of operation and employment of naval gunfire in RVN remain the same as during the first two quarters of the fiscal year. An overwhelming majority of all naval gunfire missions are still controlled from the air. Experience has proven that this is still the most effective and economical method of employing naval gunfire. This is true, primarily, to the mobility of the aircraft and the use of UHF and FM communications between spotter and firing ship. Aircraft used for naval gunfire spotting are provided by the senior American Advisor located at each site where 1st ANGLICO has a detachment.

Due to the infrequent sustained ground operations requiring naval gunfire support, it will be noted that the strength of the various spot teams and NGLO teams is considerably reduced from the T/O strength authorized for such teams. This is so for several reasons. One - the senior American Advisor at each location desires to keep American personnel at a minimum in order to avoid an over abundance of Americans at any location. Secondly, since ground operations are at a minimum, the additional personnel are not needed to transport heavy equipment. This is not intended to infer that the T/O for NGLO teams & spot teams should be changed. Should 1st ANGLICO be employed in its "classic role" as a supporting arm during an amphibious operation, the additional personnel will be required.

Naval Gunfire has continued to prove to be a dependable and potent support weapon. During the past six months we have seen an increase in the number of ships assigned for gunfire missions, including cruisers with 8" guns and four rocket ships. The LSMR's have proven particularly effective in IV Corps where shallow coastal waters prevent ships of larger size from getting into effective range.

The efforts of 1st ANGLICO and naval gunfire for the past six months reflect the following statistics:

These figures should not be considered as conclusive or representative of the entire damage inflicted on the enemy. Observation is extremely difficult in most areas of the country and damage assessment is impossible in some cases.

First ANGLICO's casualties in RVN have dropped from 3 during the first half of the Fiscal Year to one during the second half. Captain WILLIAM C. STROUP received gunshot wounds in his left ankle while on an operational spot mission at Quang Ngai on 15 April 1966. Captain STROUP has recovered and been returned to duty.

### III Training

While the main efforts of 1st ANGLICO have been directed toward efforts in RVN, an extensive training program has been in progress in Hawaii. During this period, 1st ANGLICO has provided shore bombardment qualification for nineteen (19) destroyers on their way to West Pac. The Carrier Air Groups of two Aircraft Carriers have been administered ORI's by TACP's from 1st ANGLICO. No amphibious exercises have been conducted during this period due to the cancellation of two exercises by higher authority.

NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. During the past six months, 1st ANGLICO, FMF at MCAS Kaneohe Bay, has been reduced to the point where it consists of a reduced Headquarters Section, a reduced Division Air/NGF Platoon and a Brigade Air/NGF Platoon, less one Naval Gunfire Spotter. This reduction was brought about primarily by the deployment of one Radar Beacon Team to 9th MAB and four USMC and three USN officers and seventy enlisted personnel to Sub-Unit # One.

2. 1st ANGLICO, FMF has provided services to both DESFLOTFIVE and COMFAIR-HAWAII on the island of KAHOO LAWE in the conduct of NGF Shore Bombardment exercises and Operations Readiness Inspections respectively.

a. Eighty Naval Gunfire Support Exercises were conducted for eighteen NGF Support Ships.

b. Control of Close Air Support was conducted during the ORI of the following aircraft carriers:

- (1) USS CORAL SEA (CVA-43)
- (2) USS ORISKANY (CVA-34)
- (3) USS ENTERPRISE (CVA-(N)-65)

3. 1st ANGLICO, FMF has also taken part in the following fleet exercises on the island of San Clemente:

- a. EAGER ANGLER
- b. BASE LINE II

4. Sub Unit # One, 1st ANGLICO, FMF actively supported U. S. and Allied Forces in South Vietnam and has continuously provided support for eighteen months.

b. An overwhelming number of Naval Gunfire missions were controlled from light observation type aircraft provided by the Senior Advisor located nearby each site listed above, less the detachment at BINH SON, which is in support of ROKMC units.

(1) The size of the separate detachments have been reduced to less than T/O strength in view of the fact that the majority of the missions have been controlled from light observation type aircraft and T/O strength teams are not required thereby making it possible for a T/O strength team to provide assistance in more than one geographical area. Whenever there is a requirement to provide control and coordination from ground positions, the full T/O team is required.

c. Naval Gunfire has continued to be a most dependable and potent support weapon. Destroyers with their 5" guns, cruisers with 8" guns and LSMR's have been effectively employed. There are, obviously, many more lucrative targets which are out of range of the available gunfire support ships. The LSMR's have been particularly effective in IV Corps where shallow coastal waters prevent ships of larger size from getting within required ranges of targets.

SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

a. The following information is provided on the results of Naval Gunfire missions conducted during the past six months:

(1) Total Missions Fired	996

b. With the above figures, the following statistics are evident: In the last six months, there were 135% more targets fired than the previous six months and 24% more structures were destroyed, 222% more enemy were killed and 1,080% more enemy were wounded in the same time period. Factors contributing to this are:

- (1) Increased emphasis and training on Naval Gunfire for both Navy and Marine Corps units.
- (2) Increased experience level of both Navy and Marine Corps units has contributed to better quality missions.
- (3) Larger number of targets fired per mission has caused greater damage per mission.
- (4) Increased knowledge of employment of Naval Gunfire has resulted in better use of facilities available.
- (5) Increased experience in intelligence gathering has resulted in more accurate and complete reports.



1. First Air and Naval Gunfire Liaison Company, headquartered at MCAS Kaneohe, Oahu, Hawaii has continued to expand the support rendered to fleet units, thus reaping the training benefits gained and ensuring a high level of combat readiness. In addition to the increased commitments undertaken, men and equipment have also been supplied to Sub-Unit One, 1st ANGLICO, located in the Republic of Viet Nam. Resultant of the RVN support, which is unstable at present, the Hawaii assets consist of a reduced Headquarters section, reduced Division/Air/Naval Gunfire Platoon, and a reduced Brigade Air/Naval Gunfire Platoon with one Shore Fire Control Party on TAD to the Sub-Unit. A proposed Provisional Table of Organization has been submitted to CMC indicating personnel requirements of Hawaii assets and RVN assets.

2. Sub-Unit One, First Air and Naval Gunfire Liaison Company, headquartered in Saigon, Republic of Viet Nam continues to provide support to a variety of United States and Allied Forces in all four tactical corps areas of South Viet Nam. Due to this support and the dispersal required, the separate detachments have been reduced to the minimum acceptable operational strengths. In that the majority of support rendered, is in the control of Naval Gunfire, and since the senior advisors are generally able to acquire aircraft for the spotters, a T/O strength team can generally be broken down to support more than one tactical area. Due to the vast deployment of assets, however, Sub-Unit One has nearly reached a point of saturation in support available. It is not meant to imply a limit of support by the number of missions and/or targets fired, but infers the number of units supported is near maximum with present assets.

- a. Control and spotter personnel continued to support DESFLOT Five while conducting seventy-five Naval Gunfire Exercises and qualifying twenty-three U. S. Naval Ships.
- b. Control and spotter personnel supported COMFAIRHAWAII and COMFIRST-FLEET while observing and controlling Naval Air for three Operational Readiness Inspections in the Hawaii Area and two Operational Readiness Exercises off the West Coast.
- c. The 5th Marine Division was rendered support in their Tactical Air Control Party training, and assistance provided in the planning phase of Operation Alligator Hide. Additionally, a Forward Air Controller was assigned to the 1st Battalion, 27th Marines when their Battalion FAC was injured just prior to their amphibious landing during Alligator Hide.
- d. In February command control was assumed by 1st ANGLICO of Sub-Unit One with Operational Control remaining with COMUS MACV.
- e. One officer was TAD to MAC Korea for the pre-planning phase of Operation Counter Blow, which was subsequently cancelled, however a Naval Gunfire support suitability study was conducted and submitted to MAC Korea.
- f. A jump school was conducted under the auspices of U. S. Army, Hawaii with nineteen enlisted personnel qualifying to wear the Basic Parachute badge.
- g. Aggressor elements were assigned in support of the 1st Marine Brigade while 1st Battalion, 27th Marines was conducting an amphibious landing on the island of Molokai with outstanding results. ANGLICO's aggressors entered the scheme of maneuver via a tactical parachute jump.
- h. In addition to the above, an intensive training program is being continued with emphasis on the Viet Nam environment type operations, and concentration devoted to individuals operating as a team.

1. First Air and Naval Gunfire Liaison Company, headquartered at MCAS Kaneohe Bay, Oahu, Hawaii consists of a reduced Headquarters Section, a reduced Division Air/NGF Platoon, and a reduced Brigade Air/NGF Platoon.
2. During the period 1 July to 31 December 1968, 1st ANGLICO continued to support Fleet Units in addition to its assigned mission of supporting other U. NARRATIVE SUMMARY

1. First Air and Naval Gunfire Liaison Company, headquartered at MCAS Kanehoe Bay, Oahu, Hawaii consists of a reduced Headquarters Section, a reduced Division Air/NGF Platoon, and a reduced Brigade Air/NGF Platoon.
2. During the period 1 July to 31 December 1969 First ANGLICO conducted extensive training of Shore Fire Control Parties and Tactical Air Control Parties. Naval gunfire qualification and training support was provided to fleet units and tenant commands at MCAS Kanehoe Bay. Shore bombardment qualification exercises were conducted for seven (7) naval gunfire support ships at Kahoolawe Island by Naval Gunfire Liaison Officers of this Command. Evaluation services were also provided for PACMIDTRARON and COMTUEX 24-69. ANGLICO tactical air control parties assisted in the Operational Readiness Inspections of four (4) attack carrier units by controlling close air support qualifications. Naval gunfire support joint training exercises were conducted with five (5) units of Destroyer Flotilla Five. Fleet services were limited due to fleet-wide reductions in strength.

A shortage of serviceable ammunition resulted in cancellation of a joint Naval Gunfire Support Training exercise scheduled in December. Ammunition difficulties experienced with 5"/54 projectiles hindered several joint training exercises. Illumination projectiles were particularly subject to malfunction. No rocket assisted projectiles were available for training and familiarization in compliance with revised training allowances.

Radar beacon qualification services were made available to requesting fleet units. Difficulties were encountered in the use of the AN/UPN 32 Transponder which has replaced the AN/TPN 7 Radar Beacon as a navigational aid for naval gunfire support. The difficulties were due to the fact that fleet units were not aware of the existence of the Transponder. Technical liaison provided by ANGLICO personnel is alleviating this problem for units requesting services.

Thirteen parachute operations were conducted during the report period utilizing both fixed and rotary wing aircraft services. A joint air-borne operation with Air Force and Army units was conducted on Lanai. A shortage of qualified personnel limited the scope of parachute operations. Current manning level requires 13 Officers and 116 enlisted personnel jump qualified. The average jump qualified personnel for the reporting period has been 6 Officers and 15 enlisted.
