#### PART II

#### NARRATIVE SUMMARY

- 1. During the reporting period, the Company Headquarters remained at grid (AT 995723); providing logistical and administrative support for all platoons/sections.
- 2. From 1 November to 1 December 1968, the 1st Platoon (-) remained in the 2nd Korean Marine Brigade area with the assigned tactical mission of general support. One section (rein) was positioned in the Brigade's Artillery Battalion cantonment at grid (BT 110581). One section was positioned at Dien Ban, grid (BT 066585). In addition to providing indirect fire support for the Korean Marines, the 1st Platoon (-) was also called upon to fire in support of U. S. Marine forces engaged in Operation MEADE RIVER.
- 3. From 1 November to 1 December 1968, the 2nd Platoon remained in the Cua Viet River position, grid (YD 348698). On 13 November 1968, OPCON of the 2nd Platoon was passed from the 12th Marines to the 5th Battalion, 4th Artillery, 1st Brigade, 5th Infantry Division. The fire direction center continued to be provided by the 12th Marines, utilizing both U. S. Marine and Army personnel.
- 4. During the reporting period, the 3rd Platoon (rein) (reinforced with one LVTH6Al from the 1st Platoon), remained in the immediate DaNang area. One section was positioned at the Northern Artillery Cantonment, grid (AT 921799); one section at OP HAWK, grid (AT 974703); and one section (rein) at the Company CP, grid (AT 995723). The 3rd Platoon (rein) assigned tactical mission remained as general support. The section located on OP HAWK has a priority mission of direct fire into the "Rocket Belt". In conjunction with this priority mission, on 17 November 1968, this section fired a total of 84 rounds, direct fire, on an active rocket site. (See Part III, paragraph 3). From 28 November to 1 December 1968, one LVTH6Al, from the Company CP, displaced nightly to the 4th Battalion, 11th Marines cantonment to provide direct fire support for the perimeter security.

#### PART III

#### SEQUENTIAL LISTING OF SIGNIFICANT EVENTS

#### 1. PERSONNEL AND ADMINISTRATION

a. With two LVTH6Al platoons not being under direct Company control, the Company's personnel readiness category has been rated as C-4. The projected readiness category during December 1968, if all elements were under Company control, is C-2. This rating is based on the projected loss of 14 personnel through rotation and 20 personnel being on special leave during the month of December. The shortage of SNCOs and Sergeants, OF 1831, continued. Timely replacements for rotating personnel have not been forthcoming. Unless this situation is corrected during December, the operational readiness of the Company will be seriously hampered. The Company had a net loss of 11 personnel during the month of November 1968.

#### 2. TRAINING

a. From 5 to 8 November and 13 to 15 November 1968, three LWTH6Als from the 3rd Platoon, two LWTP5Als and one LWTR1Al from the maintenance section conducted water training exercises at the 3rd Amphibious Tractor Battalion CP, grid (BT 083703). Water training was conducted during the day and one night, with the LWTH6Als being positioned as perimeter defense weapons during the night.

#### 3. ORGANIZATION AND OPERATIONS

- a. <u>Direct Counterrocket Fire 17 November 1968</u>. On 17 November 1968, the LVTH6Al section located on OP HAWK fired a total of 84 rounds direct fire at an active enemy rocket site located at grid (AT 966694).
- (1) 170510H Nov 1968. OP HAWK observed the launching of what appeared to be 10-15 enemy rockets at a range of approximately 1,500 meters. The U. S. Army searchlight team immediately illuminated the launch site.

- (2) 170511H Nov 1968. After ensuring that the target met the established criteria for immediate direct counterrocket fire, OP HAWK commenced firing.
- (3) 170524H Nov 1968. A "Check Fire" was placed on the guns by the 4th Battalion, 11th Marines. The two LVTH6Als had fired a total of 63 rounds of HE and 21 rounds of WP. The rocket position had been silenced.
- (4) <u>Surveillance</u> Although it was found that all rounds were approximately 100-150 meters short of the actual rocket site, 20 140mm rockets, prepared for firing, were discovered unfired on their mud launch ramps.
