

- 7. (U) G-1 Briefing for Executive Officers, Adjutants and Sergeants Major. This briefing was held twice, once on 20 November and again on 22 November 1967. It's purpose was to give a clear understanding of the G-1 Section's function, what support is available to units of the division and to spell out unit commanders responsibilities. The briefing lasted four hours and was well received. Attached is a copy of the briefing folder given to each unit attending. This folder consists of an agenda and complete scripts of talks given by each briefing officer.
- 8. (U) 1st Marine Division ARVN Interpreter Program
- a. In April of 1966 the 1st Marine Division entered the MACV Interpreter Program and soon received its first graduates from the interpreter course at Saigon. There are two very solid reasons why this program was developed:
 - (1) We cannot afford to send large numbers of our men to long term

schools that would make them fluent Vietnamese linguists.

- (2) Experience has shown that better response is received from the Vietnamese people when working through their officials and their people.
 - b. What kind of men are these Interpreters?
- (1) For most part they are conscripts draftees who enter the Interpreter Training Program directly from induction offices. Most are college graduates or men who were close to graduation upon induction.
- (2) At the Interpreter school they are tested and ranked by language proficiency, the best in the class receiving a rank of reserve Sergeant Interpreter unless they held a higher rank in the regular army in which case they retain their former rank. At present all of the 1st Marine Division's ARVN Interpreters have attained the rank of Staff Sergeant.
- (3) The new mobilization policy enacted by President Thieu when he took office, has extended the usual four year service requirement for these Interpreters to the end of hostilities or until they reach age 33, which ever comes first.
- (4) This tells us quite a bit about these men. They are bright, intellectually inclined, products of the cities of the Republic, come from better than average families, a few are financially well off, most are not, many who were teachers or professional men before induction took as much as a 2/3 reduction in their income when they entered the service, and above all most of them are totally unfamiliar with the military profession and way of life as we know it.
- c. Division Order 5312.1A sets forth the ARVN Interpreter Program. This order is presently under revision, the new order will reflect lessons learned and will streamline reporting and personnel accounting procedures.
- (1) 1st Marine Division presently has 77 ARVN Interpreters, as reflected in the attached roster.
- (2) Basic personnel administration for these men is performed by Headquarters Company, Headquarters I Corps.
- (3) They are assigned to Commanding General, III Marine Amphibious Force who in turn allocates them to the 1st and 3rd Marine Divisions.
- (4) The ARVN Interpreter Program Projects Officer, 1st Marine Division (Major E. M. DUNN, Assistant G-1) assists Commanding General

lst Marine Division in carrying out his administrative responsibilities for these men. These are set forth in MACV Directive 551-5 of 30Sep67 and III Marine Amphibious Force Order 5312.8A. This includes such matters as inter-Division assignment/reassignment, awards recommendations, issuance of identity cards, and tags etc.

- (5) While these men are members of the lst Marine Division they are assigned to regimental headquarters, battalions, and separate companies/batteries/teams. Operational control of these men is exercised through the Division G-2 Officer. WO-1 R. R. FITZGERALD (1st Interpreter Team) has been assigned as the officer in charge of ARVN Interpreters for the purpose of assisting the Division ARVN Interpreter Program Projects Officer in carrying out his tasks.
- (6) The accompanying photographs show the billeting area and offices for the ARVN Interpreters, complete with recreation room and shower facilities. About twelve interpreters are housed here on a permanent basis, these are assigned to units in the Division Headquarters area and an additional five transients are usually present. These buildings also provide the offices and billeting spaces for members of the 1st Interpreter Team.
- (7) The Senior ARVN Liaison Officer with the 1st Marine Division is tasked with the responsibility of bridging the gap between ARVN authorities and the 1st Marine Division in common and connected matters concerning these men, e.g. decorations, awards and promotion recommendations, leave, personal and family problems, etc. These tasks are ably carried out by Captain LUAT, ARVN. Captain Nguyen Hua LUAT provides valuable aid in many cases.

d. Significant events during November

(1) Probably the most significant event during the month was the loss of Staff Sergeant Ly Van HON 66/135173, killed in action on 8 November 1967 near Ap Hai (1), Quang Nam Province. Staff Sergeant HON was a member of Company "M", 3rd Battalion, 5th Marines. As his company was moving into night defensive positions they were attacked by a strong NVA force. All the members of the squad near HON were wounded and he received wounds that killed him instantly. The loss of Staff Sergeant HON was preceded on 28 October 1967 by the death of Staff Sergeant Duong Minh Ngoc DIEP 64/106156 ARVN who was killed in action in Quang Tri Province while serving with Company "F", 2nd Battalion, 1st Marines. Staff Sergeant DIEP was one of the best ARVN interpreters in this Division.



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ENEMY, WEATHER AND TERRAIN

1. ENEMY


a.(C) Main Force. The following Main Force enemy units are presently located within the 1st Marine Division's AOR: The K-4B Battalion in the Phu Loc area in the vicinity of (ZC 1395), the 368B Artillery Regiment located in Happy Valley in the vicinity of (ZC 0462). A battalion of the 368B Artillery Regiment is possibly located in Elephant Välley in the vicinity of (ZC 1382). The Headquarters of the 21st NVA Regiment and possibly one battalion are located east of Antenna Valley in the vicinity of (AT 9437). The 70th Independent Battalion, which has been carried in the Barrier Island area south of Hoi An and is suspected to be operating in the AOR in southeast Duy Kuyen District.

The Main Forces were somewhat in-active the past month. However, significant contact was made by friendly units participating in Operation ESSEX (6 Nov - 17 Nov), possibly with elements of the 3rd NVA and/or the 21st NVA Regiments.

- b.(C) Local Force. Local Force units within the Division's AOR were quite active during the month of November. Elements of the 402nd Sapper Battalion, the R-20th Battalien and elements of some of the local force companies were probably responsible for two separate enemy attacks on 1 and 8 November against 3/7's military installations, refugee hamlets and peace villages located throughout Dai Loc District.
- c.(C) Irregulars. Irregular activity continued to inflict a significant portion of USMC casualties during Nevember. Also, several CAP units within the area came under fire from irregular forces. The irregulars also continue to employ command detonated mines throughout the TAOR.

2. WEATHER AND TERRAIN

- a.(U) General. The weekly maximum and minimum temperatures averaged 83 and 71 degrees respectively for the month of Motember. The average humidity was 87% and approximately 8 inches of rain fell on the Danang area. The skies were partly cloudy with intermittent rain showers throughout the month.
- b.(C) Effects of the Weather. Periodic rain showers and low ceiling caused interruptions in air support; including Infrared Coverage, Airborne Personnel Detector Coverage, reconnaissance insertion and extraction and Aerial Observation.
- c.(C) Effects of the Weather on Terrain. Scattered rain showers resulted in some localized flooding but trafficability was not seriously affected.



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INTELLIGENCE SECTION ACTIVITY

1. ADMINISTRATIVE UNIT

- a.(U) Services and Support. During the period the unit provided general administrative services for the G-2 Section.
- b.(C) Personnel. During the period the G-2 Section operated with an average of 99% of its assigned manning level of 29 officers and 53 enlisted. There is a lack of SNCO's in the OF O2.
- c.(U) <u>Logistics and Allowances</u>. During the period approximately 50 percent of materials and supplies necessary for the operations of the Section and its attached teams were received as ordered. There is a need for typing chairs and filing cabinets.

2. ACQUISITION UNIT

a.(C) Acquisition section collected intelligence information from all areas of interest within the Division AO. AO/VR flights were conducted into the C-3, C-4, C-6 and C-7 areas throughout the reporting period.

b. Airborne Personnel Detector (APD)

- (1)(C) The one helicopter mounted APD; when available, has continued to produce reliable and timely intelligence through the accurate location of enemy units in harbor sites, on trails and in suspected storage areas. The APD was requested and approved for 22 separate missions; however, only 5 of these missions were flown due to non-availability of gun fire support helicopters.
- (2)(C) Information received from a Chieu Hoi indicated the presence of a large enemy force, possibly a battalion of the 368B artillery Regiment, in Elephant Valley. Based on this information two separate APB missions were flown in the general area specified by the Chieu Hoi, a quick reaction ARC light was requested and flown. Pilot BDA during TOT indicated secondary explosions occured, several of which were 5-6 times larger than the normal ARC light explosion, the flash being further identified as blue-white in appearance. Subsequent targeting in this area produced 2 additional secondary explosions.
- (3)(C) Gun support helicopters are normally provided by FMAW assets, however, one APD mission was flown using escert helicopters from the U.S. Army 282nd Aviation Support Company. Excellent results were achieved throughout the mission.

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- c.(C) IR missions have achieved limited success during this reporting period due to the high moisture content and ground hase conditions that existed throughout the Division AO. During the mensoon season additional AO/VR areas were scheduled to extend coverage over areas normally supplemented by other detection means.
- d.(C) The 245th Aviation Company, USA, continues to provide SLAR coverage for target acquisition in flat areas, especially the rivers and waterways throughout Dai Loc, Dien Ban, Hieu Nhon and Duy Kuyen. During the last two weeks of the reporting period, the SLAR Data-Link Van was not operative. By using the 1st Marine Division AO TAC net, SLAR aircraft can enter the net and report all targets directly to the AO radio operator within the Division COC. These targets are then immediately pessed through the Division COC to the commanders concerned for appropriate action. During this reporting period, a total of 96 targets were identified by SLAR.
- e.(C) Photo Imagery Interpretation Unit: The PIIU continues to support the First Marine Division with vertical aerial photography, high and low altitude paneramic photography, photo mosiacs, and various overlays associated with photointelligence. The intensified Infra-red program continued during the month of November with a tetal of fifty-five hot reports being received during the month. During the period 13 photo missions were requested, 7 were received, none were cancelled and 6 are still pending.
- f.(C) Air Observation Unit: During the month of November, Air Observers flew 328 sorties for 687.1 hours of visual surveillance in the 1st Division TAOR. In conjunction with normal VR flights, the following missions were performed: Photo 2, 126 artillery, 200 air strikes TAC(C) and 3 Naval gunfire. The AO's also accounted for the following; 136 KIA (C), 115 KIA (P), 14 WIA (C), 57 bunkers destroyed, 68 sampans destroyed, 595 structures destroyed, 11 secondary explosions, 260 structures damaged and 455 meters of trench destroyed. The AO's provided support for Operations ESSEX and FOSTER.
- g.(C) Interrogation-Translation Team (3rd. 9th and 13th ITT). Interpretation Team (1st and 7th IT): During the reporting period a total of 245 detainess were interrogated. These were classified as 20 PW's, 68 civil defendents, one returnee and 156 innocent civilians. Number of documents translated totaled 68.
- h.(C) <u>Combat Operations Center</u>: COC-2 continues to serve as a focal point for the receipt of spot reports from ITT, CIT, tactical units, adjacent units and higher headquarters. Immediate intelligence requirements generated or suggested by reports, verbal and written, are disseminated to collectors.
- 3.(C) PRODUCTION UNIT: The Basic Intelligence Section continues to maintain background and technical studies, briefings, files on intelligence

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estimates, enemy units, spot reports, situation reports, climate, population, etc. This information is constantly being updated. Basic Intelligence also continues to receive, evaluate and process captured enemy ordnance and materiel. The following are among the accomplishments during November:

(1) Screened, processed and forwarded 43 captured weapons, plus assorted equipment.

(2) Assisted in the preparation, assembly and distribution of 14 Intelligance Studies on the THUA THIEN - QUANG TRI Province areas.

(3) Completed and prepared for distribution the ELEPHANT VALLEY area study.

 (4) Commenced work on a special intelligence study of the ARIZONA area.
 (5) Continued work on a "Preliminary Estimate of VC/NVA Personnel Losses and Replacements" in QUANG NAM Province area.

(6) Commenced work on Update #2 to the Rocket Study of 10Aug67.

(7) Issued permits for the retention of War Trophies.

(8) Disseminated tidal and related data.

- 4.(C) STAFF COUNTERINTELLIGENCE UNIT: During the period the unit provided routine administrative counterintelligence services to the Division Staff. The unit processed 5 denials of security clearance, forwarded 14 completed NAC investigations to Regiments, processed 3 requests for COFRAM access, prepared 16 Top Secret accesses, granted 9 Top Secret clearances, initiated 17 requests for security investigations and conducted inspections of 11 Division Units. In addition, the Staff Counterintelligence Unit conducted a total of 26 liaison visits.
- a.(C) The Staff Counterintelligence Unit conducted a survey of all staff sections, consisting of clearances and access of personnel. This survey has been completed and each staff section has received a roster showing results. Also, an investigation of an incident involving possible compromise of classified material at Camp Hansen, Okinawa was completed.
- b.(C) <u>Kit Carson Scouts (KCS)</u>. During the period the KCS re-employed 2 scouts and accepted 2 new trainess. The Staff Counterintelligence Unit is working on a "Boot Camp" for KCS and it is scheduled to commence training on 4 December 1967. The KCS program has continued to show its effectiveness and and general value to the Marine Corps on Operation FOSTER.





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ORGANIZATION AND OPERATIONS

- 1. (S) During the month of November three major search and destroy operations were conducted by Division units. The 7th Marines continued Operation Knox in the Dong Tap/Hai Van Pass area. The operation terminated 4 Nov after eleven days of search and destroy operations that resulted in negative to light contact. Due to intelligence reports of enemy activity, the 2nd Bn 5th Marines conducted a multi-company search and destroy operation in the southeastern portion of Antenna Valley. Operation Essex commenced on 6 November and continued through the 17th of November. Contact throughout this operation was moderate to heavy. On 13 November, the 7th Marines commenced Operation Foster, a search and destroy operation, located in the DailLoc vicinity. This operation was initiated due to recent VC activity in this area. The operation terminated 30 November. Contact was moderate to heavy throughout the period and several large storage sites of rice were found.
- 2. (C) Major operations and the controlling headquarters were as follows:

- 3. (C) Extensive patrolling, security operations and other small unit activities as well as the major search and destroy operations accounted for enemy casualties of 327 VC KIA (Conf), 807 VC KIA (Prob), 75 NVA KIA (Conf), 131 NVA KIA (Prob), 1 VC Returnee, 1 NVA Returnee, 13 VC PW, 1 NVA PW, 218 Detainees, 13 Individual Weapons Captured, and 6 Crew-Served weapons captured.
- 4. (C) Normal fixed wing and helicopter support was utilized by the Division with large troop lifts being conducted during Operations ESSEX and FOSTER. Six naval gunfire ships fired support of the Division during Movember. The supporting ships and missions were as follows: USS Hopewell (DD 681) supported the Division for four days firing 618 rounds of 5": USS James E Kyes (DD 78) supported the Division for two days firing 380 rounds of 5"; USS Carronade (IFS-1) supported the Division for two days firing 460 rounds of 5"; USS Providence (CCG-6) supported the Division for four days firing 753 rounds of 6" and 619 rounds of 5"; USS Dupont (DD 941) supported the Division for four days firing 1022 rounds of 5"; and USS O'Bannon (DD 450) supported the Division for four days firing 518 rounds of 5".

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PLANS

- 1. (3) Operation Plan 303-68 (Relief/Reinforcement of CIDG Camps) was published 7 hovember. This was an update of an existing plan reflecting changes in units tasked which were necessitated by changes of unit locations.
- 2. (5) Operation Order 306-68 (Counter-Rocket) was published 15 November. This was an update of Operation Order 90-67, which it cancelled. Rocket belt tasks formerly assigned the 1st Marines were assigned the 5th Marines as the result of the relocations of those units. The order also reflects refined OF-Counter Rocket Center organization, reporting and control as currently in use.
- 3. (S) Operation Order 308-68 (Waterway Control) was published 20 November. This order revises, updates and supersedes Operation Order 91-67. Frincipal changes were in locations of units and TAOR's and resultant changes in waterway responsibilities along with implementation of certain additional waterway controls as advocated by GVN authorities.
- 4. (S) A draft of Operation Order 309-68 (Realignment of Forces and Areas of Operations) was published 22 November 1967. A proposed task organization annex was enclosed to facilitate concurrent planning and to aid in the preparation of annexes for the order to expand the operational area of the 1st Marine Division into THUA THIEN Province.
- 5. (U) Division Order 3120.16A (SOP for COC and FSCC during Mortar, Artillery and/or Rocket Attacks) was published on 29 November. Changes in the notification and action check lists reflect the 5th Marines' move into the former 1st Marines area, the new wire call signs and incorporation of information formerly contained on a supplementary check list in COC.
- 6. (C) Flanning continued on rewriting Operation Plan 305-68. This plan will be changed to reflect the redistribution of forces within the TAOR and the redesignation of some references in the plan. This plan will be issued as Operation Plan 102-68 in December to conform with the FMF Pacific system of numbering operation plans and orders.
- 7. (S) Flanning continued on Operation Order 309-68, designated late in the month as Operation CHECKERS. This order governs the realignment of the 1st Marine Division northward and provides for the activation of TF XMAY for operations and its displacement into THUA THIEN Province. Operation Order 309-68 will be the basic document for the shift of forces and will be published in December.





TRAINING

- 1. During the month of November 38 officers and 158 enlisted men attend formal schools both in and out of country.
- 2. Two ten day classes were conducted on the AN/PPS-6 Radar Set. A total of 4 officers and 16 enlisted men attended from four Division units.
- 3. The 1st Engineer Dattalion conducted several three day Demolitions, Land Fine Warfare and VC Boobytrap courses. 152 Marines attended.
- 4. The 11th Marine Regiment conducted three one day courses for non-artillerymen in the adjustment of artillery fire. The courses were attended by 58 Marines.
- 5. A two day Personal Response course was conducted by Division G-5 Section and was attended by 29 officers and 27 staff noncommissioned officers.
- 6. A three day school was conducted by the Division Embarkation section and was attended by 22 enlisted Marines from various units throughout the Division.
- 7. One officer attend a one day training seminar at LONG BINH RVN.
- 8. One day classes were conducted on the U.S.rifle M16A1. The classes consisted of the following instructions: functioning, care and cleaning, stoppages and immediate action. Zeroing of the individual's weapon and fam firing using 125 rounds of ammunition per man. 1053 officers and Marines attended.

COMMENTAL



LOGISTICS, EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLY MARRATIVE SUMMARY

- 1. (U) The major logistical activity during this reporting period was directed towards the support of combat operations.
- 2. (U) During the reporting period the G-4 Operations Officer, assisted by other special staff officers, conducted Materiel Readiness Inspections of eight units. The Embarkation Officer conducted readiness inspections of thirteen units and all special staff officers conducted numerous informal staff visits and inspections.
- 3. (U) M-16 Rifles. A field engineer from Colt Firearms, Mr. ITC, visited this Division during the month. It has been established that a large percentage of M-16 rifle chambers are unserviceably pitted. A conference was held at III MAF on 30 November and a program for replacement of unserviceable rifles was outlined. It was anticipated that a complete exchange of unserviceable rifles would be effected during December.
- 4. (U) The M109 Self Propelled Howitzer continued to be deadlined at an unacceptable rate due primarily to shortage of third echelon parts.
- 5. (C) Ammunition controlled by Available Supply Rates (ASR). The following ammunition items are controlled by an available supply rate:

- 6. (U) During the month eight rough rider convoys were conducted between Danang and Phu Bai and two to Quang Tri. These convoys were conducted by this Division with vehicle augmentation from 1st Marine Air Ming and Force Logistic Command. No significant direct enemy action was encountered during the conduct of rough rider convoys.
- 7. (U) On 1 November the M-76 vehicle (Otter) assets of this Division were transferred from 1st Notor Transport Battalion to 11th Notor Transport Battalion.
- 8. (U) Force Logistic Cormand assumed the responsibility for resupply of An Hoa during the month thus relieving the Division of the requirement.
- 9. (U) There was no significant deterioration of roads during the month as a result of lighter than expected monsoon rains and efficient engineer effort.
- 10. (U) During the month the 1st and 11th Motor Transport Battalions' available vehicles were heavily committed. They travelled 214223 miles and

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
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transported 20394 tons of cargo and 68939 personnel.



- 11. (U) Total sealifts for the month of November of 1st Marine Division units were 497 personnel, 38 vehicles and 202.33 short tons of cargo.
- 12. (U) Total airlifts for the month of November of 1st Marine Division units were 103 personnel and 20.8 short tons of cargo.
- 13. (U) BLT 3/1 was partially loaded on the USS NAVARRO on 30 November 1967. Loading was to continue until 3 December 1967.
- 14. (U) A three-day Embarkation School for Division personnel was conducted from 6-8 November 1967.
- 15. (U) 1st Engineer Battalion and 1st Shore Party Battalion completed fifty-one Division work orders during the period.
- 16. (U) The upgrading of major LOC's continued. Priority of effort continued to be focused on Routes 1 and 5. Major LOC's were kept open during the month of November.
- 17. (U) The repair of the airfield at An Hoa was accomplished by CB/NSA elements during the period 21 November to 1 December 1967. Approximately 72000 square feet of matting was replaced.
- 18. (U) The month of November celebrated Thanksgiving and the Marine Corps 192nd Birthday. Holiday meals were served where possible.
- 19. (U) OF 33 personnel shortages continue to exist. 88% of the authorized manning level of OF 33 personnel a re currently on board.
- 20. (U) The Division Food Services Officer was assigned the control of garrison mess property during the period.
- 21. (U) The program to evaluate the protective qualities of MDX4-4056 protective foot ointment continued among 1500 men of the nine infantry battalions.
- 22. (U) The final report of evaluation of eleven vests, medical kit was submitted to Commanding General, III MAF on 7 November 1967. The general consensus of corpsmen testing the vest was that significant discrepancies existed in the test item. Primary of these were the position of the back pouches, lack of protection of medical supplies from water, poor fasteners, and incompatability of the vest with the protective body armor and back pack.

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CIVIL AFFAIRS/CIVIL ACTION

- 1.(U) On 3 November there were several cases of plague reported in Nui Kim Son Hamlet (BT073708). By 12 November there had been 29 cases of plague reported in the Hoa Vang District, with 7 deaths attributed to the plague. On 20 November the 3rd Amphibious Tractor Battalion Medical Officer treated the last case of the disease in Nui Kim Son Hamlet. During the two week long epidemic the 3rd Amphibious Tractor Battalion evacuated 30 patients to the Danang USOM Hospital and innoculated over 5.700 Nui Kim Son residents.
- 2.(U) On 13 November, the reconstruction and remodeling of the clinic at Hoa Phu Village (AT923723) was completed by the 1st Engineer Battalion. The clinic has a treatment room with 3 medicine cabinets and 2 treatment tables. There is also a ward room with a maternity bed, 5 regular size beds, and 2 infant beds. The clinic serves approximately 3,000 people in the Hoa Phu area.
- 3.(U) The 3rd Amphibian Tractor Battalion completed a shower unit for the MEDCAP station in Nui Kim Son (BT073708) on 21 November.
- 4.(U) On 22 November, the 1st Engineer Battalion completed the construction of 5 wells in Phouc Hung Village (AT924724).
- 5.(U) Operation FOSTER terminated 301200H November with 11,668 refugees processed at the two refugee centers at Dai Loc (AT915573) and An Hoa (AT872478). The operation had commenced 131000H November in the old Arizona area.
- 6.(U) Projects underway in the 1st Marine Division CAAOR include: 3 schools, 4 pig breeding farms, 1 experimental rice farm, 3 dispensaries, and a maternity hospital.

PSYCHOLOGICAL OPERATIONS

Narrative summary for the period 1 - 30 Nevember 1967.

- 1. (U) Leaflet drops and aerial breadcast were made in support of operation Foster and Essex.
- 2. (U) The Division ran an extensive Rocket Rewards campaign.
- 3. (U) Extensive PSYOP Campaigns were directed at the 21st NVA Regiment, R:20 Battalien, and V25 Battalien, in support of reports that lew merale existed in these units.

COMMUNICATIONS-ELECTRONICS MARRATIVE SUMMARY

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- 1. (U) On 11 Nevember 1967 HSgt MYERS, CEO Maintenance Chief, was assigned TAD to Force Legistics Command for a period of 30 to 60 days. MSgt MYERS presence required by Force Legistics Command in order to aid in identification of Communications-Electronics perts and equipment presently stored at FLC.
- 2. (C) On 16 November 1967 Cal. CORDES attended the Area Coordinator Communications Conference held at III MAF. BGem FRENCE, CINCPAC J6, addressed the conference relative to future outlook of long line and tastical communications. Further details on this conference are cited in the minutes of the Area Gerdinater Communications Conference. (III MAF 1tr 10D/ar 2000 of 1800v67)
- 3. (U) On 18 November 1967 Major SCHNEILER visited Supply Battalion of Force logisties Command. The purpose of the visit was to observe progress of program now underway to break down multi-page that have been in FLC lot for an undue period of time. The program was progressing well and no further assistance from the CEO was necessary at this time.
- 4. (C) On 22 November 1967 a series of demonstrations displaying tactical Secure Voice Radio Equipment (KY-38) were presented. The one hour demonstrations were given by a three man team from FATEsc and coordinated through the Division CEO. Representatives from each of the regiments, support battalions, Force Logistics Command and 5th Communication Battalion attended the demonstrations which were held in the Headquarters Battalion Education Office.
- 5. (C) On 22 Nevember 1967 Col CORDES and Major VERDON visited the 3rd Marine Division Command Post for the purpose of discussing the implications of the forthcoming relocation of certain lat Marine Division units upon existing and planned communication systems. The visit also served to permit Major VEREON to become familiar with the facilities, installation and everall communication system of the 3rd Marine Division. Understanding was reached in a number of areas relative to the use of certain equipment by the lat Marine Division incident to the aforementioned relocation.
- 6. (C) On 24 Movember 1967 Lt Col MITCHELL, Commanding Officer, Division Communications Company, Lt Col COVIEG, Commanding Officer, 7th Communication Battalion and Captain SHAVER of 7th Communication Battalion Radio Relay and Construction Company visited the CEC. The purpose of this meeting was to delineate responsibility concerning the outside cable plant with respect to construction, trouble shoeting, and assignment of cable pairs. In addition, past, present and new pole line construction projects were discussed. DECLINESHIELL

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- 7. (0) On 27 November 1967 Major VERDOM represented the 1st Marine Division at a III MAF conference to examine the present structure, organization and control of the 5th and 7th Generalization Bettalions. Remaining within the specific parameters governing the study, it was determined that both battalions are being effectively and economically employed. It was concluded that no significant benefits could ascene from any reorganisation or shift of control. The study, therefore, concluded that any further action was not required.
- 8. (U) During Hevember 1967 work continued on a new switchboard installation to support telephone communications in the Division Command Post area. Two TTO-7 Switchboards are presently being installed by Division Communications Company and should be in operation by mid-December. Since the system will permit an increase in the number of eperators handling calls a 30 percent increase in telephone service is anticipated.
- 9. (U) During Movember 1967 Materiel Maintenance Management Inspections were conducted at the following units.

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ENEMY ACTIVITY

1 November (C) At 0120H, Hill 37 in the vicinity of the old Dai Loc Bridge at (AT 9158) received an unknown number of mortar rounds, and automatic weapons fire. At 0205H a reaction force from 3/7 was dispatched to the eastern end of Dai Loc Bridge. The enemy broke contact and withdrew.

Forty minutes later at 0200H, a ground assualt by an estimated 100 enemy was launched on Hill 25 at (AT 8356) when a Marine platoon from M/3/7 received 20 rounds of 82mm mortar. After the mortar fire ceased, the enemy breeched the platoen's defensive wire in four places using bangalore torpedoes. Once inside the wire, the enemy made extensive use of satchel charges and grenades to destroy bunkers. Spookey came on station and artillery was fired in support of the Marine Platoon.

Concurrent with the activity on Hill 25, elements of 3/7 located on Hill 65 at (AT 8857) were also receiving mortar fire from an enemy position at (AT 8856). This maneuver by the enemy reduced the threat of reaction by the Marines on Hill 65 in support of the Marine platoon on Hill 25.

In addition to the attacks on Hill 25 and 65, CAP units C-3 and C-4, were both taken under fire at (AT 8657) by mortar and small arms fire.

Also, a similar terrorist attack occurred at the Tam Hea refugee hamlet located in the vicinity of (AT 8757). Approximately 65 civilian dwellings were destroyed, ten civilians were killed and 34 wounded. Total enemy losses were reported as: 14 VC KIA (C), 40 VC KIA (P), 7 AK-47's, 25 satchel charges, 20 chicom grenades, 4 B-40 rocket rounds, and 4 bangalore torpedoes.

The main attack on Hill 25 was conducted by a unit highly trained in the use of sapper tactics. It is estimated that the main unit involved was the 402nd Sapper Battalion with elements of the R-20th Battalion and the Q-14th Company taking part in the diversionary actions.

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- O6 November (C) Operation ESSEX. Operation ESSEX commenced on 6 November in 2/5's TAOR and terminated on 17 November. Enemy losses for the operation were: 7 VC KIA (C), 40 VC KIA (P), 65 NVA KIA (C), 125 NVA KIA (P), 2 NVA PW's, 16 detaines, 6 individual weapons and 1 crew served weapon.
- 13 November (C) Operation FOSTER, Operation FOSTER commenced on 13 November in 3/7's TAOR and terminated on 30 November. Enemy losses for the operation were: 115 VC KIA (C), 331 VC KIA (P), 10 NVA KIA (C), 3 NVA KIA (P), 72 detainees, 8 PW's, 10 individual weapons, and 2 erew served weapons. Several rice caches were uncovered on Operation FOSTER resulting in approximately 100 tons of rice captured.
- O8 November (C) At 0105H on 8 November, 3/7's CP, the Army advisory Compound at Dai Loc, and the Old Dai Loc Bridge, all in the vicinity of (AT 9157) received 82mm mortar fire, heavy small arms/automatic weapons fire, followed by ground assaults.

At 0110H CAP C-1 at (AT 9256) received 57mm RR fire followed by a ground assault. The friendly units in the Dai Loc area were supported by Spookey and an I/3/7 reaction force was sent to reinforce CAP C-1.

The Army Advisor in Dai Lee also reported that a number of small hamlets were attacked in a coordinated effort by the enemy. Refugee camps at (AT 9358), (AT 9159), (AT 9257) and a Peace Village at (AT 9158) were damaged or destroyed by satchel charges and enemy fire.

At 0600H a sweep was conducted by I/3/7 in pursuit of the dispersed enemy and artillery and airstrikes were conducted. Enemy losses were 15 VC KIA (C), 43 VC KIA (P), 18 VC KBA (P), 8 individual weapons captured, and two PW's.

The PW's stated they were from the R-20th Battalion and it is estimated that elements of the R-20th Battalion combined with the Q-14th company and local guerrillas were the enemy units involved.

At 0210H in 1/7's area, a VC sapper platoon swept through another peace hamlet located at (AT 9469) destroying a number of houses. Concurrently, CAP B-3 located in the same general area came under small arms and mortar fire effectively preventing them from supporting the peace hamlet.









- 16 November (C) At 0900H on the 16th, a G/2/7 patrol fired at 15 armed enemy at (AU 8205) resulting in 2 VC KIA (C) and 2 VC KIA (P). Upon searching the area a rice cache of seven tons was found. A map written in Chinese and Vietnamese was also found on one of the KIA's body. The map was of the Phu Loc area and several U.S. military positions were plotted on it.
- 22 November (C) On the evening of the 22nd, in the vicinity of (AT 9066), a D/1/7 patrol observed approximately 125 enemy moving northeast. Some of the enemy were carrying long objects described as possibly being rockets.

 Marines fired small arms and artillery probably killing 20 enemy. The enemy broke up into small elements fleeing west and northeast. A platoon size reaction force dispatched by "D" Company made contact with rear elements of the enemy force and killed one VC.

 Further pursuit was ineffective due to heavy brush. It appeared that this action by "D" Company elements may have broken up a planned attack on friendly installations.
- 26 November (C) On Operation FOSTER at 1130H on the 26th, at (AT 8752) F/2/7 received a heavy volume of automatic weapons/small arms fire and 8 to 10 rounds of 60mm fortar from an unknown size enemy force inswell fortified and camouflaged positions. L/3/7 maneuvered to make contact and they also came under heavy fire. AO Benchmark-15 was on station and directed airstrikes on the enemy position. Enemy losses were unknown and friendly losses were 12 USMC KIA and 66 WIA (MED EVAC). The next morning at 0655H in the vicinity of the previous day's contact, F/2/7 received heavy small arms fire and 15 rounds of 60mm mortar. 1/3/7 attempting to link up with "F" Company, received small arms fire, M-79 and 60mm mortar fire. A total of 14 Marines were wounded in these contacts. At 1040H I/3/7 and F/2/7linked up and conducted a search of the area finding 20 VC KIA (C), 2 Soviet Machine Guns and 2 individual weapons. Total marine losses for the two day action were 12 KIA and 80 WIA (MED EVAC).

1. Mission. There has been no change in the 1st Marine Division's mission.

2. Enemy Situation

a. Characteristics of the Area of Operation

(1) Military Geography

(a) Climate and Weather. The maximum and minimum temperatures averaged 84 and 71 degrees respectively with an average humidity of 81%. Approximately 3 inches of rain fell in the Danang area.

Partly cloudy skies with intermittent rain showers are predicted for the coming week. Maximum and minimum temperatures will average 83 and 69 degrees respectively. The humidity will average 81% and 4 to 5 inches of rain is expected to fall in the Danang area. Lunar illumination will range from 19% on the 6th to 78% on the 12th.

- (3) Availability of Reinforcements and Replacements
 Replacements may be obtained from infiltration groups or by in-country
 recruiting. Reinforcements may come from elements of the 2nd NVA
 Division which have the capability of moving north from Quang Tin.
 There continue to be sightings and contacts in the Antenna Valley
 indicating that elements of the 2nd NVA Division are probably located
 in this area.
- (4) Aggregate Strengths. The estimated strengths of the enemy forces within the 1st Marine Division's newly defined AOR are: Main Forces 2,150, Local Forces 1,780, and approximately 22,000 Irregulars.
- (5) Movements and Activities. There were 94 enemy initiated incidents last week, of which 57 were the result of small arms fire, 22 were attributed to mines and booby traps, 8 mortar incidents, and 7 incidents due to enemy grenades.
- (a) 5th Marines. In 3/1's area on the 1st, a L/3/1 patrol heard rifle fire in the vicinity of (BT 0863). An artillery mission cleared by 1/5 was conducted resulting in five secondary explosions.

In 1/5's area, Cap D-5 observed 15 enemy at (BT 1858) on the 29th and another 150 VC in the same area on the 30th. Artillery and small arms were fired by the Cap unit in both instances with unknown results.

At 1100H on the 2nd, Benchmark-2 observed five boats moving toward a restricted area at (BT 1452) and on the 3rd, another small group of boats was observed by Benchmark-4 in the vicinity of (BT 1653). An artillery mission was conducted resulting in 4 boats destroyed and 10 VC KIA (P).

At 1916H on the 4th, a B/1/5 patrol received 100-120 rounds of automatic weapons/small arms fire and 3 grenades from an estimated 12 enemy at (BT 1262)

On the 5th at 0040H, Hoi An received two mortar rounds in the vicinity of the air field at (BT 1458). No damage was reported.

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In 3/5's area, Cap D-3 observed 50 enemy on the 4th in the vicinity of (BT 0358). Requests for artillery were denied due to friendly villagers in the area.

(b) 2/5. In 2/5's area at 0840H or the 30th, recon patrol Elf Skin was forced to abort an attempted insertion at (AT 9434). The insertion aircraft received a heavy volume of small arms and automatic weapons fire and a part of the recon team which was on the ground was extracted under fire. No casualties were reported.

Cap N-3 at (AT 8850) on the 30th, received automatic weapons fire from an estimated 8-10 enemy at (AT 8035). The patrol returned fire and called for 106 support. Directs hits with the 106 killed 5 VC.

At 1300H on the 1st, recon patrol War Cloud observed 12 VC unloading boats in the vicinity of (ZC 2131). On the afternoon of the 2nd, War Cloud again observed groups of enemy totaling 37 unloading gear from boats and digging a trench line in the same general area. On the 3rd, War Cloud once again observed 8 VC digging trenches in the vicinity of (ZC 2130). Artillery missions were fired in each instance with unknown results.

(c) 7th Marines. In the 7th Marines area, elements of 3/7 made heavy contact with enemy units during the early morning hours on the 2nd.

At 0120H, Hill 37 in the vicinity of the old Dai Loc Bridge at (AT 9158) received an unknown number of mortar rounds, and automatic weapons fire. At 0205H, a reaction force from 3/7 was dispatched to the eastern end of Dai Loc Bridge. The enemy broke contact and withdrew.

Forty minutes later at 0200H, a ground assault by an estimated 100 enemy was launched on Hill 25 at (AT 8356) when a Marine platoon from M/3/7 received 20 rounds of 82mm mortar. After the mortar fire ceased, the enemy breeched the platoon's defensive wire in four places using bangalore torpedoes. Once inside the wire, the enemy made extensive use of satchel charges and grenades to destroy bunkers. Spookey came on station and artillery was fired in support of the Marine Platoon.

Concurrent with the activity on Hill 25, elements of 3/7 located on Hill 65 at (AT 8857) were also receiving mortar fire from an enemy position at (AT 8856). This manuever by the enemy reduced the threat of reaction by the Marines on Hill 65 in support of the Marine platoon on Hill 25.

In addition to the attacks on Hill 25 and 65, Cap Units C-3 and C-4 were both taken under fire at (AT 8657) by mortar and small arms fire.

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Also, a similar terrorist attack occurred at the Tam Hoa refugee hamlet located in the vicinity of (AT 8757). Approximately 65 civiliar dwellings were destroyed, ten civilians were killed and 34 wounded. Total enemy losses were reported as:

- 14 VC KIA (C)/ 40 VC KIA (P)
- 7 AK-47's
- 25 satchel charges
- 20 chicom grenades
- 4 B-40 rocket rounds
- 4 bangalore torpedoes

The main attack on Hill 25 was conducted by a unit highly trained in the use of sapper tactics. It is estimated that the main unit involved was the 402nd Sapper Battalion with elements of the R-20th Battalion and the Q-14th Company taking part in the diversionary actions.

Elsewhere in 3/7's area, on the 30th at 0810H and 1030H, Benchmark-AO's 1 and 4 conducted airstrikes on a suspected enemy anti-aircraft position at (AT 8449) resulting in eight structures destroyed, eight structures damaged and three secondary explosions, one of which emitted a fireball 50 to 100 feet high.

At 1510H on the 3rd, recon patrol Elf Skin called artillery on two small groups of enemy at (AT 8146) resulting in two secondary explosions and evidence of 3 VC KIA (P),

At 1330H on the 31st, at (AT 8157) a M/3/7 squad combat patrol made contact with an unknown number of enemy firing automatic weapons/machine guns from fortified positions. Airstrikes were run resulting in four bunkers destroyed and one secondary explosion. Additional units of Company "M" moved in to search the area and they also received machine gun fire. Fire was returned and the enemy broke contact. "M" Company conducted a thorough search of the area finding 2 VC KIA, several large caves, and about 800 pounds of rice.

Also on the 31st at 0130H, I/3/7's combat base at (AT 9253) received four rounds of 81 or 82mm mortar outside their perimeter. Once again on the evening of the 4th, I/3/7 received one mortar round near its perimeter. Fire was returned in both cases and no friendly casualties were incurred.

At 1740H on the 4th, recon patrol Elf Skin observed a total of 60 VC moving in a northeasterly direction at (AT 8048). A fire mission was conducted resulting in 5 VC KIA (P) and 4 secondary explosions.

On the 5th, recon patrol Elf Skin observed another 60 VC with large packs moving northeast in the vicinity of (AT 7948). A fire mission was conducted with good target coverage.

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In 1/7's area on the 1st, recon patrol Swift Scout engaged 3 VC with small arms fire killing two of them at (AT 8365). The recon patrol later ambushed 10 VC in the same area resulting in two VC KIA (C) and four VC KIA (P). One of the enemy was captured and later died of wounds.

In 2/7's area on the morning of the 2nd at 0750H, a recon diving team while conducting a bridge security check of Namo Bridge at (AT 9284) discovered an explosive device 18-20 feet below water rigged to be command detonated. At 1245H one recon diver and one Navy UDT diver went below to disarm the device, but found that the explosive charge had since been removed leaving behind only the wire which formed the electrical circuit for detonation.

On the night of the 3rd, H&S Company radio relay security on OP Falcon at (AT 9378) received 15-20 rounds of small arms fire from an unknown number of enemy. Fire was returned and the area was searched with negative results.

(d) Operation Knox. At 0800H on the 31st, 2/3's CP located at (ZD 1801) received 43 rounds of 82mm mortar fire. An airstrike was run at (ZC 1797) on the suspected enemy mortar position.

Also, later in the afternoon on the 31st, recon patrol Golden Lemon received heavy small arms fire and 11 rounds of 82mm mortar at (AT 1799). Artillery called on the suspected enemy position caused two secondary explosions.

Operation Knox terminated at 1000H on the 4th. Total enemy losses were reported as 2 VC KIA (C), 10 VC KIA (P), and 7 detainees.

- (e) Operation Samurai III. On the 30th of October, the 4th Ranger Company found a base area at (ZC 0468) large enough to accomodate at least a battalion sized unit. In this same area the company made several small unit contacts.
- (f) IR, APD, and SLAR Emissions. The use of Infrared equipment was hampered the past week due to poor weather. However, IR coverage flown on the 1st at (ZC 0346) revealed two emissions or light activity.

Moderate human scent emissions were detected by the APD on the 30th in the vicinity of (AT 8370). APD surveillance on the 1st revealed a total of 60 emissions in the Elephant Valley area. Particulary heavy concentrations were detected at the following locations: Along the high ground south of Route 545 at (AT 8885) and (AT 8782), along a trail complex at (AT 8384), along a ridge line at (AT 8088), along a stream bed at (ZC 1988), along the Song Cu De at (ZC 1685), and along a stream bed at (ZC 1583).

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On the evening of the 2nd, SLAR detected one boat at (AT 8855) and on the evening of the 4th, enemy river traffic was detected at (AT 9954) and (BT 1559).

- (g) Other. Of interest the past week was that a Chieu Hoi named TRAN NGOC ANH rallied on the morning of the 1st to 2/5. He indicated that he was a member of the 21st NVA Regiment, 2nd NVA Division and that he believes the 21st NVA Regiment is presently located at (BT 0930). ANH also stated that the morale of the regiment is low and that most of the men wish to desert and Chieu Hoi. He also stated that the 21st NVA Regiment has suffered heavy losses and that the regiment is down to about battalion size.
- (h) <u>Summary</u>. Contact was relatively light in the 5th Marines area the past week. Of significance was that Cap Units D-3 and D-5 observed larger than usual groups of enemy moving near their areas. Also, AO's had several sightings of boat activity in the vicinity of (BT 1452) and (BT 1653).

In 2/5's area recon patrol Elf Skin was forced to abort an attempted insertion at (AT 9434) due to heavy enemy fire and recon patrol War Cloud sighted a total of 60 enemy over a three day period unloading boats and digging trench lines in the vicinity of (ZC 2131).

In addition to the heavy contact made by elements of 3/7 in the 7th Marines area, recon patrol Elf Skin observed a total of 120 enemy with heavy packs on the 4th and 5th moving northeast in the vicinity of (AT 8048).

(6) Operational Capability to Launch Rockets. The enemy's operational capability to launch rockets remains unchanged.

3. Enemy Capabilities

- a. To conduct acts of terrorism and harassment with emphasis on countering the Revolutionary Development Program, and to continue interdiction of LOC's with the objective of increasing VC control over population and denying the GVN/US/FWMAF use of water and highways.
- b. To conduct attacks by fire against friendly military positions, airfields, and logistics installations.
- c. To conduct less than regimental size attacks and harassment against isolated friendly forces and installations.
- d. To continue increasing his strength in Quang Nam/Quang Tin Provinces by adding new units and replacements through infiltration and in-country recruitment.

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4. Analysis of Enemy Capabilities

- a. The enemy has the capability to conduct unconventional warfare throughout the TACK. Past activities indicate that the enemy places a high priority on lines of communication and the RD and CAP Programs. The increased requirements for the use of Route #1 will make it an even more likely target.
- b. The enemy can attack by fire utilizing rockets or mortars. Although various potential rocket sites have possibly been eliminated due to weather conditions, the 368B Artillery Regiment continues to have the capability to launch 122 or 140mm rockets against the Danang Airfield or other vital installations. It is believed that a large scale attack would come from several dispersed rocket sites. There continue to be indications that local forces have a rocket support capability. To date, all of the attacks involving rockets have occurred during the hours of darkness. The major threat of large scale attack by fire on the vital areas in and around Danang comes from the western sector of the rocket belt. The 140mm rocket attacks associated with local forces may occur from any location.
- c. Less than regimental size attacks may be conducted within the lst Marine Division ACR. The past attacks on District Headquarters and key bridges may be an indication of the type of target to be hit in the future, however, any isolated unit or installation may expect an attack. The reliance on sapper tactics and the fear of supporting arms causes the enemy to conduct attacks at night.
- d. The enemy has the capability to infiltrate additional personnel and units into Quang Nam from Central Laos, North Vietnam, or adjoining provinces.

5. Conclusions

- a. Mining incidents, acts of terrorism, and other forms of guerrilla warfare will continue throughout the TACR.
- b. It is probable that the enemy will continue to make attempts to attack vital installations by fire utilizing the 140mm and 122mm rockets.
- c. Several sightings by AO's/recon patrols in the southern portion of 3/7's TAOR indicate increased enemy activity within the area.
- d. Low-level intelligence reports indicate the threat of possible enemy attacks by fire and/or ground assaults against the Lien Chieu Esso Plant/Namo Bridge area.
- e. Sizeable enemy forces (possibly the 21st NVA Regiment and the 3rd NVA Regiment) located south of 2/5's TAOR indicate that moderate to heavy contact can be expected by friendly units in that area.

2. Enemy Situation

a. Characteristics of the Area of Operation

(1) Military Geophary

(a) Climate and Weather. The maximum and minimum temperatures averaged 84 and 70 degrees respectively with an average humidity of 80%. Approximately 1.18 inches of rain fell in the Danang area.

Increased cloudiness and rain showers are predicted for the coming week. Maximum and minimum temperatures will average 82 and 68 degrees respectively. The humidity will average 86% and three to five inches of rain is expected in the Danang area. Lunar illumination will range from 85% on the 13th to 97% on the 19th.

There continue to be sightings and contacts in the Antenna Valley indicating that elements of the 2nd NVA Division are located in this area,

- (4) Aggregate Strengths. The estimated strengths of the enemy forces within the 1st Marine Division's newly defined AOR are: Main Forces 2_0150_y Local Forces 1_9780_g and approximately 20_9000 Irregulars:
- (5) Movements and activities. There were 127 enemy initiated incidents the past week of which 80 were the result of small arms fire, 27 attributed to mines and booby traps, 10 mortar incidents, and 10 incidents due to enemy grenades.
- increased the past week in the 5th Marines TACR.

During the early morning hours of the 6th, coordinated mortar attacks by the enemy were launched against Hoi An (BT 1457), Duy Xuyen at (BT 0651) and Phu My village at (BT 0952) followed by limited ground assaults at each location. Spookey and ARVN/Marine artillery were utilized in support and minimal damage was reported by the friendly units.

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CAP D-1 was hit on four separate occasions the past week, onco on the 6th and 7th, and twice on the 9th at (BT 8363), (BT 0464) and (DT 0363). The CAP unit received a total of twenty-five 60mm mortar rounds and heavy small arms/automatic weapons fire. No friendly casualties were taken as a result of the contacts.

At 0815H on the 6th, Benchmark-12 observed what appeared to be an observation tower of bumboo construction at (BT 0055). Airstrikes and artillery were conducted on the target. At 1415H, a Dyarrow 1907 from c/1/5, inserted to search the area, found one bamboo platform 6 x 8 feet, weighted down with rocks. The structure was destroyed by engineers.

car D-3 located at (BT 0458) on the 7th received heavy small arms and automatic weapons fire from an estimated ten enemy. Small arms fire and artillary were returned resulting in 4 VC KIA (C), 3 VC KIA (P), and one secondary explosion. Later that evening CAP D-3 came under fire again from an estimated 50-75 VC. Marines and PF's returned fire and the enemy broke contact.

search of several houses in the vicinity of (BT 0662) finding a rice cache totalling 3,000 pounds. 2,500 pounds of the rice was confiscated and the remaining 500 pounds was left for the local villagers.

Also on the 8th in 3/1's area, an unknown number of VC approached a M/3/1 LP at (BT 0967) and threw one satchel charge into the position. A reaction force in route to the LP received small arms fire.

At 1330H on the 10th, a Marine from a A/1/5 squad combat patrol detonated an unknown type mine at (BT 1062) initiating a VC ambush. The patrol received 100±150 rounds of small arms and automatic weapons fire. Fire was returned and the enemy broke contact. Search of the area revealed three claymore mines, seven 105mm rounds and eight homemade AP mines rigged in series to be command detonated and spaced 10±15 meters apart.

On the afternoon of the lith, a total of 12 bosts were taked under artillery fire by AO^2s at (BT 1956), (BT 1451), and (BT 0965). Eight boats were destroyed.

Later in the evening, in the vicinity of (BT 0063) a vibiale from Ha Company/5th Marines was ambushed by an estimated 15 enemy. A plateon from I/3/5 swent the area with negative results.

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(b) 2/5. Units committed to Operation Essex in 2/5's area made significant contacts during the past week.

On the afternoon of the 6th, H/2/5 became heavily engaged with an estimated NVA company in a fortified village at (AT 9138). Hotel Company received heavy small arms/automatic weapons fire and mortar fire from their front and right flank. Artillery and airstrikes were run on the enemy and G/2/5 linked up with Hotel Company in an effort to overrun the enemy position. Although Marines made repeated thrusts toward the position they were unable to overrun it. The next morning, G/2/5 launched an attack on the objective and met with negative enemy resistance.

On the afternoon of the 7th, G and H/2/5 located at (AT 9038) reported that they received 36 rounds of unknown type artillery or mortar. It was later evaluated that the rounds were possibly 120mm mortar. The rounds were received in two round volleys at three to four minute intervals. Six of the rounds received were reported to have emitted a gas somewhat milder than our CS gas. Shell craters appeared to be more characteristic of mortar than of artillery.

M/3/5 reported that they also received similar type rounds during contact on the evening of the 8th when they engaged an estimated NVA company at (AT 9036).

Also on the 8th, Recon Patrol Lunga Point in support of Operation Essex observed eight VC planting mines at (AT 9139). Artillery was conducted resulting in eight VC KIC (P) and two secondary explosions.

On the afternoon of the 11th, elements of G/2/5 observed 20 VC in a fortified village at (AT 9138). Artillery and airstrikes were conducted with unknown results due to darkness. Benchmark-12 observed 10 to 15 VC at (AT 8735). Two airstrikes were conducted resulting in three VC KBA (P) and one secondary explosion.

(c) 7th Marines. The 7th Marines area, particularly in 3/7's TACR, was the scene of significant enemy activity the past week.

On the 6th at (AT 8049), kecon Patrol Elf Skin called artillery on two groups of enemy totaling 29 whom they described as carrying packs and mortar tubes and moving in a northeasterly direction.

On the 7th, a squad security patrol from M/3/7 observed 35 enemy at (AT 8054). Artillery was conducted resulting in two VC KIA (C) and two VC KIA (P).

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At 0105H on the 8th, 3/7's CP, the Army Advisory Compound at Dai Loc, and the Old Dai Loc Bridge, all in the vicinity of (AT 9157) received 82mm mortar fire, heavy small arms/automatic weapons fire, followed by ground assaults.

At Cl10H CAP C-1 at (AT 9256) received 57mm RR fire followed by a ground assault. The friendly units in the Dai Loc area were supported by Spookey and an I/3/7 reaction force was sent to reinforce CAP C-1.

The Army Advisor in Dai Loc also reported that a number of small hamlets were attacked in a coordinated effort by the enemy. Refugee camps at (AT 9358), (AT 9159), (AT 9257) and a Peace Village at (AT 9158) were damaged or destroyed by satchel charges and enemy fire.

At 0600H a sweep was conducted by I/3/7 in pursuit of the dispersed enemy and artillery and airstrikes were conducted. Enemy cosses were 15 VC KIA (C), 43 VC KIA (F), 18 VC KBA (P), 8 individual weapons captured, and two PW's.

The PW's stated they were from the R-20th Battalion and it is estimated that elements of the R-20th Battalion combined with the Q-14 Company and local guerrillas were the enemy units involved.

At 0210H in 1/7's area, a VC sapper platoon swept through another peace hamlet located at (AT 9469) destroying a number of houses. Concurrently, CAP B-3 located in the same general area came under small arms and mortar fire effectively preventing them from supporting the peace hamlet.

Elsewhere in 3/7's area, on the 9th, Benchmark-8 conducted an artillery mission of four VC in a fortified position at (AT 5054) resulting in two VC KIA (C), one VC KIA (P), and one secondary explosion.

At (AT 9558) on the 10th, an unknown number of VC ambushed a Vietnamese vehicle, murdered two of the passengers and kidnapped a third who was the son of the Dan Los National Police Chief.

In 2/7's area on the 6th, two Marine vehicles from G/2/7 were ambushed by an estimated 10 enemy at (AT 9292). The ambush was initiated with two command detonated mines followed by heavy small arms and automatic weapons fire.

(d) <u>Americal Division</u>. A document captured by A/2/12 on 6 November confirmed that there is at least one company of 120mm mortars organic to the support elements of the 2nd NVA Division.

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Americal previously reported that the interrogation of an NVA PW captured on 20 September indicated that a new NVA rocket unit has infiltrated into SVN and was probably located northwest of Hiep Duc. The PW identified his unit as the 1st Battalion, 68th Artillery Regiment and stated both the 1st and 3rd Battalions arrived in SVN in August. For were enroute to Quang Ngai Province.

A second NVA PW captured on 9 November by B/5/7 Car stated he was also a member of the 1st Battalion, 68th artillery legiment. He stated his battalion consisted of three companies each equipped with six 3.2 mm rocket launchers for a total of 18 launchers. The PW stated that on 4 November his battalion was disposed between two streams to the west and northwest of Hill 81 in the vicihity of (20 1327) and (20 1326), He states that his battalion has been there for the last menth

(a) Other. The interrogation of a 16 year old VC who Chieu Holld to CAP Q-5 on 12 November further confirms that there is possibly a sizeable enemy force (3 companies) located southwest of the Hall Van Pass near the Elephant Valley area. The source also stated hat there are extensive ammunition storage areas located in the vicinity of (ZC 1483). There have been reports that a battalaon of the 368B Artillery Regiment is located in the same general area.

There have been indications that elements of the 21st NVA Regiment have suffered heavy losses due to contacts with friendly units south of Antenna Valley and that their morale is very low.

There is further indication that elements of the 21st Reignent have moved north to the Gc Moi Island area from antenna Valley with intentions of gaining a rest and to be resupplied.

(f) IR, APD, and SLAR Emissions.

(1) On the 5th and 6th, an IR mission flown over the southern boundry of the AOR dectected 17 emissions at (AT 8852), at (AT 8751) and one emission at (AT 8840). Five additional emissions were detected at (AT 8477)

An IR mission flown over the area south of Antenna Valley on the 7th detected a heavy concentration of emissions in the vicinity of (AT 9530),

One IR mission flown on the 8th detected 6 emissions in the vicinity of (20.1123).

(2) On the 5th the Airborne Personnel Setalior (ALD) detected heavy human scent concentrations in happy Valley at (AL 1970). (ZC 1166) (ZC 0873) (ZC 0367) and (ZC 0064).

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On the 7th, heavy human scent emissions identified the presence of enemy forces in the southeastern floor in Antenna Valley.

A sweep of the Bach Ma, Phu Loc, and Elephant Valley areas on the 9th with the APD detected heavy emissions at (ZC 1092) and very heavy emissions at (ZC 0592).

No significant boat traffic or vehicular movement was detected by SIAR this past week:

(g) Summary. Enemy small arms and mining activity increased the past week in the 5th Marines area.

Of significance was that coordinated mortar attacks were launched on the 6th at Hoi An (BT 1457), Duy Xuyen (BT 0651), and Phu My Village (BT 9052).

Cap D=1 was hit by enemy units on four seperate occasions during the past week and CAP D=3 was hit twice by the enemy.

A total of twelve boats were observed and taken under artillery fire by a0's on the 11th at (BT 1956), (BT 1451), and (BT 0963).

In 2/5 s area, units on Operation Essex made significant contacts with enemy forces the past week.

On the 6th, G/2/5 and H/2/5 engaged an estimated NVA Company at (AT 9138). On the evening of the 8th, H/3/5 engaged another NVA Company at (AT 9036).

In 7th Marines TAOR, 3/7°s CP, the Army Advisory Compound at Dai Loc, and the Old Dai Loc Bridge, all in the vicinity of (AT 9157) came under mortar fire followed by ground assaults during the early morning hours on the 8th. In addition, a number of refugee camps and peace hamlets in 3/7°s and 1/7's areas came under attack by enemy forces.

(6) Operational Capability to Launch Rockets. The enemy's operational capability to launch rockets remains unchanged.

- b. To conduct attacks by fire against friendly military positions, airfields, and logistics installations.
- c. To conduct less than regimental size attacks and harassment against isolated friendly forces and installations.

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To continue increasing his strength in Quang Nam/Quang Tin Provinces by adding new units and replacements through infiltration and in-country recruitment

4 Analysis of Enemy Capabilities

- a. The enemy has the capability to conduct unconventional warfare throughout the TACR. Past activities indicate that the enemy places a high priority on lines of communication and the RD and CAP Programs. The increased requirements for the use of Route #1 will make it an even more likely target.
- b. There are indications that enemy units having a rocket capability have an increased number of rockets in their possession. This information is based on several low-level intelligence reports which describe these units with a larger than usual number of rockets.
- c. Less than regimental size attacks may be conducted within the 1st harine Division AOR. The past attacks on District Headquarters and key bridges may be an indication of the type of target to be hit in the future, nowever, any isolated unit or installation may expect an attack. The remarks on sapper tactics and the fear of supporting arms contrast the enemy to conduct attacks at night.
- d. The enemy has the capability to infiltrate additional personnel and units into Quang Nam Central Laos, North Vietnam, or adjoining provinces.

5. Conclusions

- a. Mining incidents, acts of terrorism, and other forms of guerrilla warfare will continue throughout the TACR
- It is probable that the enemy will continue to make attempts to attack vital installations by fire utilizing the 140mm and 122mm rockets.
- c. There continues to be a threat of up to battalion sized enemy attacks by fire and/or ground assaults against isolated allied positions in 3/7's and 2/5's TACR's
- d. There are indications of a sizeable enemy force located southwest of the Hai Van Pass near the Valley area which pose a threat of possible attacks by fire and/or ground assaults against the Lien Chieu Esso Plant Namo Bridge, and other logistical installations within the area.
- e It is possible that elements of the 21st NVA **Pegiment have moved north to the Go Noi Island area thereby posing a threat to allied units within the area.

- 1. Mission. There has been no change in the 1st Marine Division's mission.
- 2. Enemy Situation
 - a. Characteristics of the Area of Operation
 - (1) Military Geography
- (a) <u>Climate and Weather</u>. The maximum and minimum temperatures averaged 81 and 71 degrees respectively with an average humidity of 84%. Approximately 2.4 inches of rain fell in the Danang area.

The seven day forecast calls for generally fair to partly cloudy skies with light rain showers expected during the latter part of the week. Maximum and minimum temperatures will average 80 and 67 degrees respectively. The humidity will average 80% and two to four inches of rain is expected in the Danang area. Lunar illumination will range from 92% on the 20th to 39% on the 26th.

- (b) Astronomical Data. See Annex A.
- b. Enemy Military Situation
 - (1) Strength and Composition. See Annex A, PERINTREP No 29-67.
- (2) <u>Locations</u>. Enemy unit locations are based on the best intelligence information available.

(3) Availability of Reinforcements and Replacements. Replacements may be obtained from infiltration groups or by in-country recruiting. Reinforcements may come from elements of the 2nd NVA Division which have the capability of moving north from Quang Tin.

Indications continue to point to the possibility that the enemy has increased his strength along the periphery of the 1st Marine Division's TAOR. These indications include reports of the presence of the 368B Artillery Regiment to the west northwest of Heip Duc and the possible formation of a regimental organization in the Phu Loc area utilizing the 804th and K-4B Battalions, with the possible inclusion of the 802nd Battalion as well.

- (4) Aggregate Strengths. The estimated strengths of the enemy forces within the 1st Marine Division's newly defined AOR are Main Forces 2,550, Local Forces 1,780, and approximately 22,000 Irregulars. The change in Main Force strength reflects the movement of a battalion of the 3rd NVA out of 2/5's TAOR and the movement into 2/5's TAOR of elements of Headquarters, 21st NVA (estimated strength of 400) and one battalion of the 21st NVA. A study recently completed by the 1st Marine Division G-2 OOB analyst will be published in the near future. This study will revise the strength figures reflected above.
- (5) Movements and Activities. There were 93 enemy initiated incidents the past week of which 66 were the result of small arms fire, 20 due to mines and booby traps, 2 mortar incidents, and 5 incidents due to enemy grenades. The 93 enemy initiated incidents this week showed a decrease from last week's 127.
- (a) 5th Marines. There were several small arms and mining incidents in 5th Marines TAOR the past week.

On the afternoon of the 12th, an Army PC was destroyed and six soldiers were killed when a 500 pound bomb rigged as a mine was command detonated at (BT 1758).

At 1500H on the 14th, a I/3/5 combat patrol at (BT 0261) received heavy small arms fire from an estimated ten enemy. Fire was returned and the enemy broke contact.

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Also on the 14th, a PF platoon located in the vicinity of (BT 0351) made contact with an unknown number of enemy. There were 5 PF's KIA, and 9 WIA. Enemy losses were 7 VC KIA (C) and an unknown number of KIA (P).

On the 15th, a total of 13 assorted mines and explosive charges were found and destroyed in the 5th Marines area. Seven of the mines were in the general vicinity of (BT 0966).

At 1620H on the 16th, at (BT 0858), a truck belonging to a D/2/11 convoy was damaged by a command detonated mine estimated to contain 200 pounds of explosive. A B/1/5 patrol sent to the area received small arms/fite-fromean estimated 7 enemy. Fire was cretured kildings 2 VC and the sent to the area received small arms/fite-fromean estimated 7 enemy.

Also on the 16th, at (BT 0770) CAP G-6 received heavy small arms/auto-matic weapons fire. Fire was returned and the area was searched with negative results.

On the 18th at (BT 0359), an L/3/5 patrol received heavy small arms fire from an estimated enemy squad. Fire was returned and the enemy broke contact.

(b) 2/5. Recon teams had several sightings of enemy movement in 2/5's area the past week.

On the 12th, 13th, and 14th, recon patrol War Cloud sighted several groups of VC and NVA totalling 89 at (AT 9952), (AT 9852), and (AT 9848). The majority of these groups were moving in a northeasterly direction.

On the 18th, recon patrols Petrify and Thin Man called artillery on a total of 18 enemy (AT 8838) and (AT 9039) killing 3 VC.

Units committed to Operation Essex in 2/5's area made only light contact the past week.

On the 16th, M/3/5 found an estimated 3,500 pounds of rice at (AT 8936). The rice was evacuated to Duc Duc for distribution to refugees.

On the 17th, recon patrol Thin Man in support of Operation Essex observed a total of 80 VC throughout the day in the vicinity of (AT 8939). Artillery and airstrikes were conducted resulting in 2 VC KIA (C) and 4 VC KIA (P).

Operation Essex terminated at 0800H on the 17th. Enemy losses for the operation were: 7 VC KIA (C), 40 VC KIA (P), 65 NVA KIA (C), 125 NVA KIA (P), 2 NVA PW's, 16 detainees, 6 IWC and 1 CSWC.

(c) 7th Hartnes. There were several small arms incidents in the

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7th Marines TAOR the past week. However, most of the activity took place on Operation Foster in 3/7's area.

During the past week units on Operation Foster uncovered several rice caches totalling in excess of 95° tons in the vicinity of (AT 8248), (AT 8348), and (AT 8550).

On the 13th, AO Benchmark-9 in support of 3/7 observed two groups of 50 enemy each at (AT 8751) and (AT 8852). Airstrikes were conducted resulting in five structures destroyed and 20 KBA (P).

On the 15th, G/2/3 received heavy small arms fire and 12 rounds of 60mm mortar at (AT 8151). Countermortar fire was conducted with unknown results. There were no friendly casualties.

On the afternoon of the 16th, F and G/2/3 sighted several groups of enemy totalling approximately 80 in the vicinity of (AT 8348), (AT 8251), (AT 8149) and (AT 8249). Airstrikes and artillery were conducted in each instance resulting in 5 VC KIA (C) and 30 VC KIA (P).

On the evening of the 16th, elements of 2/3 received 60mm mortar fire, heavy small arms/.50 caliber fire at (AT 8150). Fire was returned with unknown results.

Recon teams in support of Operation Foster also had significant sightings the past week.

On the 16th, recon patrol Pony Boy observed several groups of enemy totalling 166 in the vicinity of (AT 8049) and (AT 8149). Artillery and airstrikes were conducted resulting in 10 VC KIA (C), and 13 VC KIA (P). Heavy canopy prevented good observation on several missions.

On the 18th, recon patrol Gold Lemon observed a total of 60 enemy at (AT 8047). Artillery and airstrikes were conducted resulting in 12 VC KIA (C), 7 VC KIA (P), and one secondary explosion.

From 1200H to 1800H on the 18th recon patrol Pony Boy observed several groups of enemy totalling approximately 250 moving northeast in the vicinity of (AT 8049) and (AT 8150). Airstrikes were conducted resulting in 30 VC KBA (P).

On the 19th, Pony Boy again observed approximately 44 enemy moving southwest in the vicinity of (AT 8251). Artillery was conducted with unknown results.

Also on the 19th, recon patrol Lucky Lark observed three groups of enemy

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totalling 55 in the vicinity of (AT 8247). Again, artillery was conducted with unknown results.

In 1/7's area, on the 12th, a CAP B-5 bridge security team at (AT 9469) received heavy small arms fire, grenades and six rounds of 60mm mortar from an estimated 20 enemy. Fire was returned and the enemy broke contact.

On the 18th, a D/1/7 patrol called artillery and airstrikes on an estimated enemy squad at (AT 8865) with unknown results. Later in the day, another patrol from D/1/7 sighted 20 additional armed enemy at (AT 9364).

In 2/7's area on the 14th, two ARVN and 3 VN officials were killed in an ambush at (ZD 1401) by an estimated three enemy.

On the 15th, Benchmark-16 in support of G/2/7 conducted artillery and airstrikes on 20 VC at (AU 8205) with unknown results.

At 0900H on the 16th, a G/2/7 patrol fired at 15 armed enemy at (AU 8205) resulting in 2 VC KIA (C) and 2 VC KIA (P). Upon searching the area a rice cache of seven tons was found. Also one of the enemy KIA's appearance indicated the possibility that he was a Chicom advisor. A boy who was captured at the scene initially stated that the KIA was a Chicom advisor, but further interrogation indicated he was actually a local cadre leader or an NVA. A map written in Chinese and Vietnamese was also found on the KIA's body. The map was of the Phu Loc area and several U.S. military positions were plotted on it.

On the 18th, a G/2/7 squad at (ZD 1601) received heavy small arms fire and B-40 rocket rounds from an estimated seven enemy. A G/2/7 reaction platoon made contact with the enemy, killed 3 VC and captured 1 B-40 rocket launcher and 2 AK-47!s.

Also on the 18th, recon patrol Rummage observed a total of 12 VC in the vicinity of (AU 8205). An artillery mission was conducted killing two VC and probably killing seven more.

(d) Other

(1) III MAF indicates increased NVA employment of special warfare type troops in up to battalion size units. These units are reportedly trained for an espionage and sabotage role with sabotage of air fields as one of their primary objectives. Although these units appear similar to VC/NVA Sapper units, their level of training and method of employment appear to be somewhat specialized.

(2) An NVA PW named THE CHUNG was captured by a reaction platoon from G/2/7 on the 18th in the Phu Loc area (ZD 163010). The source

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disclosed that he was from the 2nd Battalion, 4th Regiment and also gave the unit designation as K-2. The latter is an AKA for the K-4B Battalion reported to be operating in the Phu Loc area. The PW stated that the battalion has 4 companies with a total strength of 400. The area of operation of the 2nd Battalion according to CHUNG is bounded by coordinated (ZD 120010) to (ZD 166020) to (ZC 160945) to (ZC 120953). The source also stated that the base area of the battalion is located on Hill 236 in the vicinity of (ZC 135954).

(e) IR, APD, and SLAR Emissions

(1) IR emissions were relatively light the past week throughout the TAOR.

An IR massion flown on the 18th in the vicinity of (ZC 2049) detected a moderate concentration of emissions.

- (2) A high priority APD mission flown on the 19th in the vicinity of (ZC 1283) indicated the presence of a possible enemy company in the area.
- (3) SLAR detected 3 moving targets on a river in the vicinity of (AT 9253) on the 14th.

Two additional moving targets were detected in the vicinity of (BT 0655) and (AT 8054) on the 16th and 19th.

(f) <u>Summary</u>. Activity in the 5th Marines TAOR was limited to small arms and mining incidents. On the 15th a total of 13 assorted mines and explosive charges were found and destroyed. Seven of the mines were in the general vicinity of (BT 0966).

In 2/5's area, units on Operation Essex made only light contact with enemy forces the past week. This operation terminated on the 17th of November with enemy losses of 72 KIA (C) and 165 KIA (P).

There were several small arms incidents in the 7th Marines TAOR the past week. Significant activity took place on Operation Foster in 3/7's area where units made several small unit contacts throughout the week and uncovered several rice quehes totalling more than 1950 tons in the vicinity of (AT 8248, 8348, and 8550).

Recon patrols in support of Operation Foster had sightings of several hundred enemy moving in the areas of (AT 8047, 8049, 8150, and 8247).

On the 18th, a G/2/7 reaction platoon made contact with an estimated 7 enemy in the vicinity of (ZD 1601). An NVA PW by the name of THE CHUNG was

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captured and upon interrogation the PW stated he was from the 2nd Battalion, 4th Regiment or K-2 Battalion. The latter is an AKA for the K-4B Battalion suspected to be operating in the Phu Loc area.

(6) Operational Capability to Launch Rockets. The enemy's operational capability to launch rockets remains unchanged.

3. Enemy Capabilities

- a. To conduct acts of terrorism and harassment with emphasis on countering the Revolutionary Development Program, and to continue interdiction of LOC's with the objective of increasing VC conduct over population and denying the GVN/US/FWMAF use of water and highways

- c. To conduct less that regimental size attacks and harassment against isolated friendly forces and installations.

The reliance on sapper tactics and the fear of supporting arms causes the enemy to conduct attacks at night.
 - d. The enemy has the capability to infiltrate additional personnel and

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units into Quang Nam from Central Laos, North Vietnam, or adjoining provinces.

5. Conclusions

- a. Mining incidents, acts of terrorism, and other forms of guerrilla warfare will continue throughout the TAOR.
- b. It is probable that the enemy will continue to make attempts to attack vital installations by fire utilizing the 140mm and 122mm rockets. This threat will increase as lunar illumination decreases in the coming week.
- c. The suspected presence of Main Force units south and southwest of Hoi An indicates a threat to this area.
- d. There are indications of a sizeable enemy force located southwest of the Hai Van Pass near the Elephant Valley area which poses a threat of possible attacks by fire and/or ground assaults against the Lien Chieu Esso Plant, Namo Bridge, and other logistical installations within the area.
- e. There are indications that elements of the 21st NVA Regiment are located in 2/5's TAOR east of Antenna Valley thereby posing a threat to friendly units within the area.

- 1. Reference (a) indicated that the subject Annex would be issued separately. Enclosure (1) is the pertinent Annex. Strength figures reflected in this Annex are based on past data as adjusted by reference (b), a recently completed study of enemy unit strengths and combat effectiveness.
- 2. The aggregate strengths reported in subparagraph 2b (3) of reference (a) did not reflect the results of the strength study mentioned above except in the case of Irregulars. The following aggregate strengths as of 27 November do reflect consideration of reference (b):

Main Forces: 2,000 Local Forces: 1,735 Irregulars: 17,500

3. It will be noted that the strength of the R-20th Battalion as reported in enclosure (1) is higher than that shown in previous PERINTREP's. This increase in strength is based on the study referred to in paragraph 1 and 2. This study did not take into account possible enemy losses incurred in the two attacks on Dai Loc (D) in early November or those incurred during Operation Foster. These engagements are currently being studied to evaluate enemy losses and to relate these losses to the R-20th Battalion and/or other enemy units which may have been involved.

Enemy Forces

- (1) I ARVN Corps conducts operations against VC and NVA Forces throughout ICTZ. Major subordinate commands I Corps include 1st ARVN Div (11th Division Tactical Area (DTA), QUANG TRI and THUA THIEN Provinces), 2d ARVN Div (12th DTA QUANG TIN and QUANG NGAI Provinces), QUANG DA Special Zone (QUANG NAM Province), Luc Long Dac Biet (LLDB, VN Special Forces) and Civilian Irregular Defense Groups (CIDG).
- (2) CG III MAF/SA I Corps exercises OPCON of U. S. Army Special Forces (USASF) A Detachments at CIDG Camps in ICTZ through Deputy Senior Advisor, I Corps and C-1 Detachment 5th USASF CP (Airborne). USASF Detachment Commanders serve as advisors to corresponding echelons of LLDB.
- (3) 7th Air Force operates MSQ=77 "Sky Spot" radar controlled bombing systems at PLEIKU (AR 7850) and DONG HA (YD 2461) in support of all-weather air operations in ICTZ. I Corps DASC provides for delivery of air support to CIDG Camps and provides FAC (Airborne) to support camps under attack.

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- (4) FMAW provides air support to include TPQ-10 systems at DA NANG (AT 9574) and CHU LAI (ET 5211) in support of all-weather air operations in 1st Marine Division area of responsibility.
- (5) LLDB, in coordination with Det C-1 5th USASF Gp (Airborne) maintains nine CIDG Camps in I Corps Tactical Zone (ICTZ), one in 1st Marine Division area of responsibility.

c. Assumptions

- (1) Mission and priority of task of Division will not change. (Reference (d)).
- (2) Normal combat and combat service support elements will be available.

2. MISSION

When directed by III MAF, in coordination with I Corps forces and U.S. Advisory personnel, 1st Marine Division provides supporting arms firm in defense of THUONG DUC CIDG Camp (ZC 142533); conducts spoiling attacks in vicinity of camp if threatened with attack; conducts operations to reinforce or relieve camp when under attack; reestablishes camp if seized, and pursues and destroys enemy forces involved.

3. EXECUTION

- a. Concept of Operations. Experience indicates enemy attacks on CIDG camps are most likely during extended periods of reduced visibility when friendly capabilities to relieve or support camps are minimized; enemy will establish ambushes along major avenues of approach likely to be used by ground relief forces; and enemy will interdict likely helicopter zones within their capability. Survival of a camp under attack will be dependent largely upon the speed with which friendly air, artillery, and/or ground support can be rendered.
 - (1) Primary responsibility for support of THUONG DUC CIDG Camp is assigned to 7th Marines to ensure continuity of planning and minimum response time in execution. Secondary responsibility is assigned to 5th Marines to ensure file whility in readiness to execute plans and to provide additional forces if required in support of camp. Through frequent liaison with A Detachment at THUONG DUC CIDG Camp, assigned units will keep continually abreast of friendly and enemy situations.

- (2) Three successive phases of support are envisioned in execution of this plan. Sequence of phases depends on speed with which they can be brought to bear. Normal sequence is tactical air support, artillery support, and commitment of ground forces. Extent of USMC participation will be determined by III MAF.
 - (a) All weather tactical air support is provided by TPQ-10 and MSQ-77 radar systems located to enable radar controlled bombing in vicinity of CIDG Camp. Camp is equipped with UHF radios to control air strikes under emergency conditions, to allow conduct of UHF/automatic DF homing, and to provide emergency communications visany U. S. aircraft to higher Headquarters. If camp is unable to operate UHF, a TAC (A) must be provided.
 - (b) Artillery support may be provided by artillery within camp, ARVN or US artillery within supporting range, or USMC artillery deployed to within supporting range of camp. Through preplanning and liaison, preplanned concentrations are prepared. Coordinated plans are developed for US artillery in support of ARVN ground forces moving to assist THUONG DUC CIDG Camp when under attack. Primary and alternate landing sites and firing positions are preselected where possible to ensure rapid deployment. Initial USMC artillery deployment envisions one battery reinforced with security element will be deployed either prior to or in conjunction with ground forces. In phasing of support, USMC artillery and associated security element, deployed in support of a camp under attack will pass to OPCON of the USMC ground force on its commitment.
 - (a) Relief forces may be ARVN, ARVN supported by US artillery, coordinated ARVN/USMC, or unilateral USMC. Initial USMC ground force is envisioned as one infantry battalion reinforced. When USMC ground force is committed, OPCON of USASF A Detachment passes to the senior USMC infantry commander in area of operation.

b. 5th Marines (Rein) 7th Marines (Rein)

(1) When directed, conduct unilateral or coordinated operations to reinforce or relieve THUONG DUC CIDG Camp (Annex B) under attack, reestablish camp if seized, and pursue and destroy enemy forces involved.

- (2) Maintain liaison with USASF A Detachments, at THUONG DUC CIDG Camp to coordinate planning and maintain current intelligence of threat to camps.
- (3) Submit recommendations this Headquarters for operations vicinity THUONG DUC Camp to exploit intelligence developed concerning camps.
- (4) When directed, provide security elements when artillery units are deployed to support besieged camp.
- (5) Operations may be conducted inside CIDG camp TAOR's after lecal coordination with the "A" Detachment Commander at the CIDG Camp concerned.

c. 11th Marines (-) (Rein)

- (1) When directed, immediately deploy artillery units, reinforced with security element to provide fire unilaterally or in coordination with ARVN artillery in besieged CIDG Camp. Annex C (Artillery Support).
- (2) Be prepared to deliver fires as soon as possible in support of besieged camp from artillery located within supporting range of camps. Annex C (Artillery Support).
- (3) Assist in preparation and maintenance of plans as requested by 5th and 7th Marines.
- (4) When directed, provide forces in accordance with 5th and 7th Marines' plans.
- (5) Maintain liaison with USASF A Detachments at designated CIDG Camp' to ensure preplanned concentrations are valid and fire support coordination procedures are established.

- (2) On notification of attack, this Headquarters will execute procedures of Annex D (COC/FSCC Immediate Action).
- (3) Notify this Headquarters immediately when current or planned operations would prevent execution of this plan.
- (4) Submit requests for external support to this Headquarters.
- (5) Direct liaison is authorized between all 1st Marine Division units and FLC.
- (6) Artillery support: Annex C (Artillery Support).
- (7) Air support, reference (d). Preplanned air targets: Annex E (Preplanned Air Targets).
- (8) No change in rules of engagement: Reference (d).
- (9) Direct liaison authorized with Senior Advisor QUANG DA Special Zone and 2d ARVN Division, as appropriate, in discussing coordinated plans.

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

- 1. Purpose. To establish standing operating procedures for the internal functioning of the lat Marine Division Combat Operations Center (COC).
- 2. Cancellation. Division Order 3560.2.
- 3. General. The Division Combat Operations Center is organized to provide the Commanding General with a positive means of rapidly directing and controlling all subordinate units during all conditions of combat. It serves as a centralized source of intelligence and operational information for the purpose of assisting the Commanding General in evaluating situations and providing him the best available current information upon which to base decisions. A secondary mission of the COC is to provide information to higher Headquarters, subordinate and adjacent units. The COC will function as a combined G-2 and G-3 element directly concerned with combat operations. Appropriate representation from the Division General and Special Staffs may function in the COC as required by the situation.

4. Functions. The COC will:

- a. Provide a center where the Commanding General and principal staff officers can confer with subordinate units, adjacent units, and higher headquarters on operational matters.
- b. Provide the Commanding General a positive and rapid means of directing, controlling and maintaining tactical operations of his command.
- c. Record, plot, display, and disseminate all significant operations and intelligence information received from or passed to subordinate units, adjacent units, and higher headquarters.
 - d. Maintain the status of all alert forces.
 - e. Maintain the status of specially organized units.
- f. Maintain the current task organization of units involved in special operations.
- g. Provide facilities for daily and special briefings, and conduct such briefings, or portions thereof as directed.
- h. Prepare the Division Situation Report (SITREP), Historical Report (HISTREP) and Command Chronology based on information received from subordinate units and cognizant staff sections.

5. Organization

- a. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3 has staff cognizance of the Combat Operations Center. The COC team is headed by an Officer-in-Charge appointed by the G-3, and is an integral part of the Operations Unit of the G-3 Section.
 - b. Personnel requirements for normal operations:
- (1) OIC COC and/or Asst OIC, COC, NCOIC, COC, Reports/Brief NCO as required.
 - (2) G-3 Watch Officer
 - (3) G-3 Watch NCO
 - (4) G-3 Journal Clerk
 - (5) G-2 Watch Officer
 - (6) G-2 Watch NCO
 - (7) G-2 Journal Clerk
 - (8) Teletype Operator
 - (9) Switchboard Operator
- (10) Other communications personnel to operate tactical circuits located in COC.
 - (11) HISTREP Writer at period designated by OIC, COC.
- c. Emergency Conditions. In addition to the above personnel, the following will man the center during emergency conditions and at other periods as directed by the Commanding General.
 - (1) ACOSS G-2 or G-2A
 - (2) ACofS, G-3 or G-3A
 - (3) ACofS, G-4 or G-4A
 - (4) Fire Support Coordinator or his designated representative.

Commence of the contract of th

(5) Air Officer or his designated representative

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- (6) Other General and Special Staff Officers as designated by the Commanding General.
- d. A separate location in the immediate vicinity of COC functional space is provided for the Commanding General, Assistant Division Commander, the Chief of Staff, and such officers as the Commanding General may designate.
- 6. Watch Instructions. Detailed instructions concerning the duties of COC Watch Personnel are contained in enclosures (1) through (6).
- a. Time of Relieving. On-coming duty personnel shall report in sufficient time to be thoroughly briefed by the off-going watch prior to assuming the watch.
- b. Relieving for Meals. On-coming duty personnel shall relieve in time for off-going personnel to eat during normal meal hours if the relief is scheduled during these hours. For reliefs scheduled outside normal meal hours, the G-2 and G-3 Watch Officers will make appropriate arrangements for their respective duty personnel to attend meals.

c. Scheduling

- (1) The OIC, COC will assign personnel for the G-3 Watch requirements.
- (2) The ACofS, G-2 will assign personnel for the G-2 Watch requirements.
- (3) The Commanding Officer, Communications Company, Headquarters Battalion will assign personnel for the COC Communications Watch requirements.

7. Internal Procedures

a. Routing

(1) Incoming intelligence or operational messages, directives, and documents will be delivered to the G-2 or G-2 Watch Officer as appropriate. The watch officers will carefully read all incoming traffic to determine the action addressee. He will further route all traffic to the action officer by the most rapid means consistent with security requirements.

- (2) The G-2 or G-3 Watch Officer will insure that the information contained in all incoming traffic is entered in the G-2 or G-3 Journal as appropriate.
- (3) During those periods when a Command Duty Officer (CDO), representing the Commanding General, is on duty in COC all incoming traffic that affects the tactical or logistical situation will be routed to the Command Duty Officer (CDO) who will take the necessary action or forward such traffic to the cognizant action officer.
- (4) All outgoing intelligence and operational traffic will be delivered to the G-2 or G-3 Watch Officer, as appropriate. The watch officers will carefully read all outgoing traffic to insure completeness and authenticity of information before release.

b. Spot Reports

- (1) Enclosure (8) is the format for the G-3 Spot Report,
- (2) Enclosure (9) is the format for the G-2 Spot Report.
- (3) Spot Reports will be received by the G-2 or G-3 Watch NCO's and/or officers. The watch officers will examine the spot reports to ascertain that they are factual, informative and complete. In those cases where spot reports are incomplete the watch officers will take appropriate steps to obtain the additional information required.
- (4) All Spot Reports will be given a G-2 or G-3 Journal number and entered into the respective G-2 or G-3 Journal.
- (5) Enchosure (7) lists the reports that can normally be expected and provides a ready distribution list.

8. COC Communications

- a. The primary functions of the COC communications facilities are to send and receive by expeditious means tactical information required for the Commanding General to effectively command and control his combat units. These facilities are not intended to be used for normal administrative traffic, nor are they to be used as a substitute for traffic that should be sent over command circuits except in an emergency situation when command circuitry is inoperable.
 - b. Enclosure (1) lists the land line communication of COC.

- c. Enclosure (11) lists the external voice radio circuits located in Radio Central COC.
- d. Enclosure (12) contains instructions concerning the utilization of the teletype communications in COC.

9. Briefings

- a. A daily briefing will be held to recap operational events, significant intelligence, administrative, and logistical status of the preceding twenty-four hour period to ensure that all members of the staff are informed of the activities of the command. This briefing will be held at the time designated by the Chief of Staff in the Command Briefing Room.
- b. Use of the Command Briefing Room for Special Briefings will be scheduled with the Staff Secretary,
- 10. References. References (a) through (s) contain instructions and information relative to the operations of COC. All watch standers shall become familiar with the references which are pertinent to their area of responsibility. The OIC, COC will maintain this SOP with all references in the COC.

DUTIES OF THE G-3 WATCH OFFICER

- 1. Supervise the G-3 Watch NCO and Journal Clerk.
- 2. During the period 2400-0400, prepare the Division Situation Report (SITREP) for the previous 24 hour period (0001-2400).
- 3. Prepare the Six Hour Situation Report for special named operations, (0600-1200-1800-2400).
- 4. Prepare notes for the G-3 Briefing Officer.
- 5. Stay current on the plans, operations and tactical situation within the Division TAOR, operating area and those special operations in progress outside the TAOR or operating areas.
- 6. Act as representative of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3 in the COC.
- 7. Be thoroughly familiar with references (a) through (s).
- 8. Notify the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3, or in his absence his designated representative and/or the Command Duty Officer when:
 - at Any Marine activity is receiving mortar, artillery, or rocket fire.
- b. Any Marine activity is engaged in an action that would probably or already has resulted in total friendly or enemy casualties of ten action KIA or WIA.
- c. Any significant event occurs such as a Blue Springs, Bald Eagle, Sparrow Hawk, downed aircraft, etc.
- 9. Report significant activities as they occur to III MAF COC Duty Officer in accordance with existing instructions.
- 10. Be prepared at all times to brief the Commanding General, principal staff officers or unit commanders as appropriate.
- 11. Personally review all incoming G-3 Spot Reports, take appropriate action and release to III MAF as appropriate.
- 12. Periodically review the operations of communications circuit. When a communication failure occurs promptly notify the Comm Center Duty Officer, and take necessary steps to reroute traffic (Courier, command circuit, radio, telephone, etc).

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13. Keep the OIC, COC and/or Asst OIC, COC informed of all significant events and action taken.

DUTTES OF THE G-3 WATCH NCO

- 1. General Instructions. The Watch NCO is responsible to the G-3 Watch Officer and will assist the Watch Officer in the performance of the functions of the COC.
- 2. Special Instructions. The G-3 Watch NCO will be guided in the performance of his duty by the following special instructions:
 - a. Supervise the activities of the Journal Clerk to assure:
- (1) The timely accurate entry of all applicable information in the G-3 Journal.
- (2) The proper maintenance of the Journal file and all supporting documents.
- (3) The proper conduct and appearance of the Journal Clerk throughout his tour of duty.
- b. Insure that all messages with a SECRET classification are entered in the message log and insure that all other classified material is handled in accordance with regulations pertaining thereto.
 - c. Receive and process incoming Spot Reports and messages.
- d. Supervise the routing of all traffic as directed by the Watch Officer.
- e. Insure that all appropriate information is accurately plotted on the Situation Maps and the Contact/Incident Situation Board.
- f. Be prepared to assist the Watch Officer in the preparation for or conduct of briefings as required.
- g. Insure that the encoming Watch NCO is thoroughly briefed on all items not specifically covered by written Instructions.
- h. Insure that the COC is in an excellent state of police at all times to include the immediate area.

i. 0600-1400 Watch

(1) After the briefing, clean Situation Map and Contact/Incident Boards.

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- (2) Check inside and outside police of COC area.
- (3) Check Unit Weekly Position Overlays and make changes on Situation Maps as required.
- (4) Send previous day's patrol activities down to G-3 Drafting Section.
- (5) Insure that the FMFPac Historical Report Forms (marked for DPI) are delivered to the Division Guard Mail Section.
- (6) Post new password on Password Board. Check with G-2 and get Password Number.

j. 1400-2200 Watch

- (1) Prepare night patrol acetate.
- (2) Distribute all guard mail from evening courier flight. (Historical/Daily Situation Reports to appropriate box, unit patrol information to Watch NCO files, any other information to NCOIC's incoming box).
 - (3) Prepare operation summary sheet and slide.
- (4) Pick up previous day's patrol activities acetate and overlay from G-3 Drafting Section and file them.

k. 2200-0600 Watch

- (1) Prepare day patrol acetate.
- (2) Prepare daily events sheet.
- (3) Prepare list of contacts by battalion and a Cumulative Casualty List and pass this information to the 3d Marine Division COC#3. Make note of the person called and the time.
- (4) Complete operation summary and acetate if not completed by the 1400-2200 Watch.

ENCLOSURE (2)

DUTIES OF THE G-3 JOURNAL CLERK

1. General instructions. The G-3 duty clerk is responsible to the G-3 Watch Officer and G-3 Watch NCO and will assist them in the performance of the functions of the COC.

2. Special Instructions

- a. Pick up all messages from the 1st Marine Division Message Center, twice during each watch, and deliver them to the G-3 NCOIC.
 - b. Enter all secret messages in the log book.

- i. Insure that the oncoming Journal Clerk is thoroughly briefed on the current situation and all future requirements.
 - j. Mail the FMFPac Historical Report Forms (marked for DPI).

DUTIES OF G-2 WATCH OFFICER

- 1. Supervise the G-2 Watch NCO and Journal Clerk.
- 2. - c. Recon Team/Patrols are inserted or extracted 12 hours later than scheduled, and when an emergency extraction is required.
- 5. Notify Acquisition Officer, G-2 when:
- a Any Marine unit/activity is receiving mortar, artillery or rocket fire (after notifying the ACofS, G-2).
- b. 1st Marine Division Recon Team/Patrols make contact with enemy, receive casualties, request emergency extraction or request assistance.
- c. A request is received from any adjacent, higher or lower echelon concerning intelligence matters.
- 6. Review all incoming traffic and disseminate all information to the proper units (Marine and Allied) from spot reports or agent reports by the quickest means available.
- 7. Notify Current Intelligence Officer of all activities, USMC casualties, and/or enemy casualties as soon as possible.

ENCLOSURE (4)

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- 8. Assist the COC-3 Watch Officer in any matters requested or of mutual concerns
- 9. Inform the OIC, COC and/or Asst OIC, COC of all significant events and action taken.

DUTIES OF G-2 WATCH NCO

- 1. Assist and keep the G-2 Watch Officer informed of all matters during the performance of his duties.
- 2. Supervise the Journal Clerk in the proper maintaining of the G-2 Journal.

COC TELETYPE COMMUNICATIONS

1. Teletype communications in the Division COC are functional circuits to facilitate rapid handling of operational and intelligence traffic. There is a lesser degree of formality and recording on these circuits than is necessary on command circuits. COC traffic should not be encumbered with administrative delays inherent in filing, routing and distribution.

2. TELETYPE HANDLING PROCEDURES

- a. A COC originated message for transmission to another COC utilizing COC circuits will contain only COC headings.
- b. COC messages to be transmitted over command circuits either to ensure receipt by addressees not members of COC circuits, or because of COC communications failure will be delivered to the Division Communication Center with COC headings and appropriate relaying instructions. The Division Communications Center will accomplish the necessary procedures of call sign assignment and message formatting to ensure receipt by addressees.
 - c. Ditto rolls will not be used in COC teletypewriter printers.
- d. Messages containing garbles will be delivered immediately to the COC Watch Officer who will determine which portion of the message he wants serviced. Teletype operators will not hold messages until corrections are received.
- e. A copy of all incoming or outgoing messages of command/admin significance will be delivered to the Communications Center with recommended routing for reproduction, distribution and filing.
- f. Coincident with the action set forth in sub-paragraph e above, one copy of the message will be immediately routed to the Division Staff Section having cognizance over the subject matter contained in the message.
- g. The teletype operator will maintain a log of all incoming and outgoing traffic.
- h. The OIC, COC will maintain a file of all incoming and outgoing messages.

ENCLOSURE (12)

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- i. The original outgoing machine "Has been sent" copy will be returned to the originating Staff Section and logged out in the check out log. The original message provided by the originating staff section will be maintained in the COC file.
- j. All incoming messages will be signed for on the teletype operators log and will be delivered to the G-3 Watch Officer for distribution and filing.
- k. COC teletype circuits may be used for command traffic when Communication Center circuits are inoperable and in emergency conditions. However, to insure proper message handling all such messages should first be delivered to the Communications Center who will in turn take necessary action for transmission over COC circuits.

3. Releasing Authority

The Commanding General, Assistant Division Commander, Chief of Staff, Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3 and those officers authorized in writing by any of the foregoing are authorized to release messages via the COC teletype circuits. Form I Div 2100/5 5-65 shall be used to grant releasing authority.



- 2. Background. Rehabilitation of BLT 3/1 will vary from the normal pattern to the extent that the rehabilitation will be accomplished at Subic Bay instead of at Okinawa. - e. Sufficient amounts of Class V for security of movement to embarkation site will be taken from on position assets. Prior to actual embarkation, ammunition will be collected from individuals and stored in ships ammunition spaces.
 - f. Special allowances in accordance with enclosure (2).

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7. Rear Area Storage

- a. Warehouse space presently occupied by 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines will be vacated by 1 December 1967.
- b. An inspection will be conducted by a representative of the G-4 Section with a representative of the 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines at a mutually acceptable time.

8. Cantonment Area

- a. The 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines will ensure that vacated cantonment areas are thoroughly policed.
- b. Cantonment areas will not be stripped of tin, lumber, and electrical facilities. Butler buildings and other pre-engineered structures will not be dismantled.

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LOGISTICS PROCEDURES

SECRET

1. REHABILITATION. Rehabilitation of BLT 3/1 will vary from the normal pattern to the extent that the rehabilitation will be accomplished at Subic Bay instead of at Okinawa. The rehabilitation at Subic Bay will be accomplished within the general concepts, objectives and framework outlined in reference (c). Since the rehabilitation on Okinawa was primarily a 3rd Force Service Regiment function with 9th Marine Amphibious Brigade units providing only operating stocks and Table of Equipment items, the same type of operation will be employed at Subic Bay. 3rd FSR, augmented by equipment and personnel from 9th MAB, will retain responsibility for procurement and issue of operating stocks and T/E items to units of the BLT.

2. LOGISTICS PROCEDURES

- a. Thirty days prior to embarkation in RVN a limited technical inspection/ inventory of equipment and supplies will be conducted for all units included in the intra-theater rotation program, utilizing 3rd FSR personnel. The LTI/inventory will be provided to the Commanding Officer, 3rd FSR a minimum of 20 days prior to embarkation.
- b. All elements of the BLT will embark with their own equipment in an "as is" condition and that equipment will be retained by the unit throughout the rotation cycle except as exchanged/replaced by 9th MAB. Exchange of equipment between elements of the BLT and other units is not permitted. Upon completion of LTI's units will ensure that equipment that has been LTI'd is not exchanged or replaced prior to departure for Subic.
- c. Units of the rotational BLT will continue to submit equipment for repair in accordance with current procedures as modified below:
- (1) TEROS for equipment presently in for repair will be upgraded to priority 02, with a RDD not later than 29 November 1967.
- (2) TEROS will not be submitted after 26 November for equipment to be embarked with the BLT.
- (3) TEROS submitted for equipment being turned in for repair will indicate a RDD of not later than 29 November 1967, with a priority 02, and "for BLT 3/1" in the remarks portion of the TERO.
- d. Units will ensure that equipment is not left in repair shops when the BLT departs RVN. If repairs are unable to be completed prior to embarkation, items will be reassembled and evacuated with the BLT. Equipment will not be turned in after the BLT is activated in RVN except where assurance is provided that the item will be repaired and returned prior to embarkation.
- e. Items which have been coded "H" will be embarked and taken to Subic Bay for turn in to 3rd FSR detachment there.

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ENCLOSURE (1)

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- f. Classes I, III, IV and V from on position assets will not be embarked. Therefore, all Class I, III, IV and V will be invoiced to the relieving unit except for sufficient Class V for the security of movement to the embarkation site.
- 3. DEPLOYMENT ENROUTE. In the event of contingency deployment enroute, other than in ICTZ, RVN; LFORM supplies will be utilized. Additional supplies will be provided to the BLT by the CG, 9th MAB and the CO, 3rd FSR by the most expeditious means available.
- 4. M-16El RIFLE. Sufficient assets of M-16 rifles and .45 caliber pistols will be available at Subic Bay to allow a complete turnover of weapons. The infantry battalion will exchange M-16's and all units will exchange .45 caliber pistols. Maximum use of a turnover will substantially reduce extensive required small arms repair time. All attached units will receive M-16 rifles before leaving RVN. Parent units will insure that training is accomplished prior to embarkation in RVN.
- 5. <u>CANTONMENT</u>. The BLT will ensure that vacated cantonment areas are thoroughly policed and suitable for immediate occupancy, by mutual consent of the commanders concerned.

6. SEQUENCE OF EVENTS IN BLT EQUIPMENT REHABILITATION

- a. Thirty days prior to rotation out of country, contact teams from 3rd FSR, as augmented by Provisional Service Battalion personnel, will LTI the designated BLT's equipment to determine what can be repaired within the rehabilitation time frame, and what will require replacement.
- b. The contact teams, in addition to determining those items to be replaced, will also determine which equipment can be repaired during the rehabilitation time frame and what parts support is required. The parts will be procured and pre-positioned at Subic Bay.
- c. 3rd FSR will pre-position equipment to be replaced, from BLT Layette assets, at Subic Bay. Liaison between 3rd FSR and FLC will be effected to obtain required end items not available in the Layette. The items will be issued to the BLT, without exchange, to be transported to Subic Bay along with the item replaced. Upon arrival at Subic the inoperative end items will be turned in to 3rd FSR personnel.
- d. The designated rehabilitation period will be used primarily to effect the exchange of designated BLT end items from the pre-positioned Layette. The maintenance effort will be directed toward bringing inoperative equipment up to combat operational status through component replacement. If an item cannot be replaced and cannot be made combat operational within the rehabilitation period, it will, with the consent of the BLT commander, be retained in the maintenance facility during the training period. Upon completion of the training period all combat operational items available will be provided to the BLT. Any combat essential items remaining inoperative at the time of the BLT's departure will be repaired as soon as possible and shipped to the BLT on the first available transportation.

SUPPLY PROCEDURES

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SECRET

1. SUPPLY PROCEDURES FOR ROTATING RATTALION LANDING TEAM. Upon notification that a rotating battalion landing team (BLT) will be activated the following actions will be taken:

a. <u>Division Headquarters</u>

- (1) Form an "attached units supply section".
- (2) Convene a meeting of supply officers from the infantry battalion and parent units of all attachments to discuss procedures and insure a clear understanding of all requirements.
- (3) Monitor activation and subsequent supply operation of battalion landing team through embarkation.
 - b. Infantry Battalion
 - (1) Conduct organic supply operations for own unit.
- (2) Provide space and assistance as required for the "attached units supply section".
- (3) Provide supply support of common items to attached units as required. In country support will normally be provided by parent unit.
- (4) Assign block of serial numbers to the attached units supply sections for use in requisitioning peculiar "as required" items.
 - c. Parent account of attached units
- (1) Prepare an allowance list in the format shown in figure 2-1, MCO P4400.15C. On hand, short, over and remarks block will be current as of the date material is invoiced to the infantry battalion (attached units supply section).
- (2) Prepare invoice, DD 1149/DD 1348, for all equipment (expendable and non-expendable) going to the infantry battalion. Separate invoice will be prepared on expendable and non-expendable supplies.
- (3) Memorandum Receipt Cards for individual equipment and weapons will be furnished for all personnel.
- (4) Prepare NAVMC 708 cards for all items being invoiced to the infantry battalion. Complete all required entries.
- (5) Prepare NAVMC 713 cards and interfile with NAVMC 708 cards where applicable. Complete all required entries.
 - (6) Prepare NAVMC 10359 (Equipment Custody Record Cards) and complete to

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include current signatures of responsible officer who is a member of the attached unit.

- (8) Ensure that all supply publications, SL-3's and SL-4's are furnished the units' maintenance section on all equipment.

d. 9th MAB/TOSS Supply Assistance

- (1) Representatives of 9th MAB Supply and Task Organized Supply Section RLT-26 (Rear) (TOSS) will conduct liaison visit to the BIT in accordance with reference (c) to review shortages of operating stocks and T/E deficiencies. Deficiencies will be requisitioned from FLC for the 30 day period in country plus an additional 30 days; the items that cannot be obtained from FLC will be requisitioned from 3rd FSR. As directed by the 9th MAB Supply Liaison Team, these supplies will be shipped to Subic Bay.
- 2. REQUISITIONING. Upon receipt of warning order the following steps will be taken by all units to complete BIM equipment and supplies from RVN supply source (MC 100).

a. Infantry Battalion

- (1) Thirty day replacement, based on T/A combat active rate, of Table of Equipment for BLT.
 - (2) Complete Table of Equipment requirements.
- (3) Thirty day operating level of Class II Type II supplies including spare parts and clothing.

b. Attached Units

- (1) Complete Table of Equipment.
- (2) Thirty day operating level of Class II Type II supplies including clothing. (Thirty day block of repair parts will be furnished attached units at Subic Bay).

c. Artillery Attached Unit

(1) In addition to the requirements in paragraph 2.b, artillery attached unit will requisition thirty day operating level of spare parts.

ENCLOSURE (2)

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- d. Upon a date to be specified by 9th MAB, 10 days after issue of warning order, all unfilled requisitions for the requirements specified above will be requisitioned from 3rd FSR (MR 100). These requisitions will be hand carried to the 3rd FSR by the 9th MAB Supply Liaison Section. Specific instructions for the preparation of these requisitions will be issued when received from 9th MAB.
- 3. GARRISON PROPERTY/ENCAMPMENT GARRISON T/E ALLOWANCES/CLASS IV FIELD FORTI-FICATION. Unless otherwise directed all Class IV field fortification, garrison property, encampment/garrison allowances as listed in the Table of Equipment will remain in place (RVN) and will be turned over to the relieving unit. A report will be made to this Headquarters 15 days prior to embarkation (copy to CG, III MAF) using the following format, and separated into the categories listed above:

T/A NO. FSN ITEM QTY CONDITION CODE LOCATION

- a. Property will be invoiced to the relieving unit on DD 1149/DD 1348 with separate invoices for expendable and non-expendable equipment to relieving unit. Encampment/garrison allowance is as listed in Table of Equipment.
- b. All garrison property will be signed over to the relieving unit by the III MAF Garrison Property Officer. The unit being relieved and the relieving garrison property officer will report to the III MAF Garrison Property Officer two days prior to the departure of the BLT.
- c. Special allowance and monsoon items will be the subject of separate correspondence.
- 4. CLOTHING. Each member of the BLT will have in his possession the following articles of clothing:
 - a. Organizational Clothing
 - (1) Jungle Utilities 3 sets.
 - (2) Towels, green 2 each.
 - (3) Coat, mans, field 1 each
 - b. Special Clothing.
 - (1) Jungle boots 2 pair.
 - (2) Drawers, green 3 pair.
 - (3) Undershirt, green 3 each.
 - c. Monsoon Clothing and Equipment
 - (1) Rainsuit 1 each.

- (3) Liner, poncho 1 each.
- d. In Kind Clothing. As required by paragraph 203.1 of reference (d).
 - (1) The liberty uniform will be khaki cotton.

 - (3) Cash sales for clothing will be available at Subic Bay.
- 5. FISCAL ACCOUNTING. Funding for the BLT will be the responsibility of 9th MAB beginning with submission of the requisition specified in paragraph 2d.
- a. Requisitions will be prepared for submission direct to 3rd FSR (MR 100) and must include the following cost code in block 23:

b. Fiscal Reporting. In order that positive control over funds is maintained, a twice monthly report of obligations will be reported to CG, 9th MAB starting when the requisitions are submitted for the BLT as specified in paragraph 2d. The report to be as of the 15th and last day of each month, due on the 17th and 2nd of each month. The report consists of the total of obligations to date obligated against 9th MAB's funds.

 - (a) Rotary and fixed wing tactical units provide airborne surveillance of the rocket belt and the approach routes thereto.

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- (3) Commanding Officer, 1st Military Police Battalion, Air Base Defense Battalion for III Marine Amphibious Force, provides ground security for III Marine Amphibious Force zone of DA NANG complex. Reference (c).
- (4) Commanding General. Force Logistic Command, provides Explosive Ordnance Disposal teams, as required, for employment with Rocket Investigation Teams. Appendix 2 (Exploitation of Enemy Attack by Rockets) to Annex B (Intelligence).

2. MISSION

lst Marine Division participates in the defense of the DA NANG vital area, denies the enemy access to the rocket belt and to the positions from which rocket fire could be delivered into the DA NANG vital area, and maintains capability to seek out, fix and destroy enemy rocket forces.

3. EXECUTION

a. Concept of Operations

- (1) The 1st Marine Division (-) (Rein) defends the DA NANG vital area with two infantry regiments, reinforced, together with supporting arms including air and naval gunfire, with particular attention to denying, detecting, attacking and destroying hostile rocket forces.
- (2) Two reinforced infantry regiments are positioned astride the rocket belt with battalions oriented toward main enemy avenues of approach from the northwest, west and south. Vigorous surveillance is combinuously maintained within the rocket belt utilizing all types of patrol activity supplemented by observation posts and mechanical surveillance means as appropriate.
- (3) Supporting arms supplement and are coordinated with surveillance activities. Observation posts and searchlights are positioned to obtain maximum effectiveness and coverage within rocket belt and approaches thereto. Counter-rocket fire is capable of early and accurate massed response.
- (4) Artillery, air and organic infantry battalion supporting arms are principal reaction means. Each infantry unit in

the rocket belt vicinity maintains a reaction force continuously in order to immediately exploit attack by fire on enemy positions and block escape routes. Helicopters, LVT's, motor transport and armor are used as available to facilitate movement of reaction forces.

- (5) Naval gunfire, as available, is employed to supplement counter-rocket fires.
- (6) Annex A (Operation Overlay) and Annex B (Intelligence).

b. 5th Marines (Rein)

- (1) Maintain forces within assigned TAOR with particular attention to rocket belt, area south of rocket belt and coastal area. Annex A (Operation Overlay).
- (2) Concentrate surveillance effort on main enemy avenues of approach and subsidiary routes into the rocket belt in TAOR.
- (3) Conduct high density patrol and surveillance activity within the rocket belt. Provide for complete coverage of the rocket belt in TAOR with requisite security elements.
- (4) Maintain, in coordination with GVN authorities, positive control of waterways within TAOR. Reference (f).
- (5) Be prepared to provide a reaction force for immediate employment in TAOR to destroy hostile rocket forces and to block possible enemy escape routes using best available means of mobility.

c. 7th Marines (Rein)

- (1) Maintain forces within assigned TAOR with one battalion assigned responsibility for each main enemy avenue of approach. Annex A (Operation Overlay) and Annex B (Intelligence).
- (2) Concentrate surveillance effort on main enemy avenues of approach and subsidiary routes into the rocket belt in TAOR.
- (3) Conduct high density patrol and surveillance activity to provide for complete coverage of that portion of rocket belt in TAOR.
- (4) Maintain, in coordination with GVN authorities, positive control of waterways within TAOR. Reference (f).

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- (5) Be prepared to provide a reaction force for immediate employment in TAOR to destroy hostile rocket forces and to block possible enemy escape routes using best available means of mobility.
- d. 2d Battalion (Rein), 5th Marines. Continue operations in presently assigned TAOR.
- e. 11th Marines (-) (Rein)/Northern Sector Defense Command
 - (1) 11th Marines (-) (Rein)
 - (a) Annex C (Supporting Arms).
 - (b) Reference (e) (Division Counter-Rocket Program).
 - (c) Coordinate surveillance from OP's and the utilization of searchlights.

 - (a) Conduct Intelligence Operations in TAOR with emphasis on daylight surveillance and night patrolling of the eastern end of Elephant Valley, Happy Valley, Thuong Duc Valley, Charlie Ridge, main and subsidiary avenues of approach and waterways.
 - (3) 2nd Bn, 5th Marines (Rein)
 - (a) Conduct Intelligence Operations in TAOR with emphasis on daylight surveillance and night patrelling.
 - (4) 11th Marines (-) (Rein)/Northern Sector Defense Command
 - (a) Conduct Intelligence Operations within sector and conduct Air Observer/Visual Resembliance (20/VR) daily coverage of the rocket belt.

- (c) In addition, provide reconnaissance to cover likely avenues of approach and egress the enemy could use to launch or withdraw from an attack on the vital area.

b. Request to Higher and Adjacent Commands

- (a) Provide as obtained any information to satisfy the intelligence requirements.
- (b) In addition, provide information as obtained on the 122mm or comparable rockets in the following areas:
 - 1. Technical characteristics and standard method of employment.
 - 2. Number of trained personnel required for effective employment.
 - 3. What is the maximum ordinate?
 - 4. Any information which could assist the Division in preventing or neutralizing any rocket attack on the vital area.
- (c) Provide sidelocking airborne radar (SLAR) coverage as requested for major waterways.

 - b. Coordinating Instructions
 - (1) Rules of engagement. Annex J to reference (a) except as modified by reference (b) and listed in 3b(2) below.
 - (2) Hostile rocket sites may be attacked by artillery when:
 - (a) Clearance is received from commander of area from which the rocket attack is being launched, or when;
 - (b) The hostile site is located by direct and positive observation, or when;
 - (c) A reliable three-ray intersection is achieved from azimuths reported by established observation posts.
 - (3) Under conditions specified in 3b(2)(b) and (c) above, artillery response may be initiated by the artillery commander concerned prior to receipt of clearance.
 - (4) Artillery commanders who initiate fires in accordance with 3b(3) above will report the area of impact to the commander normally responsible for clearance of fires in that area as soon as possible.

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- (5) Targets will not be taken under attack by naval gunfire until positive approval is received from the appropriate Fire Support Coordination Center.
- (6) Targets will not be attacked by air without positive approval by appropriate Fire Support Coordination Center except that:
 - (a) Air may attack hostile rocket sites without prior clearance when positive identification of the hostile site is established or when the rocket site is in the act of launching (firing) the rockets.
- (7) Artillery will have the primary attack priority. Aircraft will be directed to hold, and no check fires will be imposed on artillery firing at rocket sites to allow for air strikes.
- (8) Air strikes may be made without imposing a check fire on artillery at the pilots discretion.
- (9) Artillery fire on active rocket sites will be stopped at the direction of the Division Commander or his immediate representative.

4. AIRCRAFT SAFETY

- a. Air strikes on active rocket sites may be made without imposing a check fire on the reacting artillery units when the criteria in 3b(6)(a) are met.
- b. Artillery fire on rocket sites will be stopped to permit air strikes only at the direction of the Division Commander or his immediate representative.
- c. When directed by the Division Commander or his immediate representative, normal aircraft safety procedures as listed in Annex E to reference (a) will be effected.

5. SAFETY OF GROUND FORCES

- a. Normal safety procedures will be used except as modified in 3b(2) above.
- b. Artillery counter-fires will be lifted when the cognizant ground commander of the area involved reports that he is ready to move a reaction force into the launch site area. This action will be reported to the Division Commander by the artillery commander.

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

- (e) Commander, Coastal Group 14 (Junk Fleet) operates check point located at mouth of SONG CUA DAI (tast of HOI AN) and controls all outgoing and incoming watercraft from that location. All craft are checked for proper registration and cargo.
- (3) GVN Forces establish check points on the SONG TUY LOAN in vicinity grids AT937713 and AT960700 to control movement of watercraft engaged in sand and gravel industry.

2. MISSION

lst Marine Division (-) (Rein) participates in the defense of the DA NANG vital area; achieves and maintains positive control over waterways entering and within the TAOR; denies the enemy the capability of utilizing waterways as routes of ingress and egress to the TAOR; and denies the enemy freedom of movement on waterways within the TAOR.

3. EXECUTION

a. Concept of Operations

- (1) lst 'Marine Division (-) (Rein) maintains positive control over waterways in the division TAOR through the establishment of coordinated patrols and continuing surveillance.
- (2) Infantry regiments, reinforced with division supporting units as required, exercise control of waterways within their assigned TAOR/AO. All available surveillance and control measures are employed to deny the enemy freedom of movement into and through the division TAOR. Emphasis is placed on patrol activity, OP's and the use of mechanical detecting devices.
- (3) Artillery, air and naval gunfire are employed in a supporting role, as required. Aerial observers assist with surveillance and control of fire support.
- (4) Coastal areas are included in this concept and require coordination with naval forces.

b. 5th Marines (-) (Rein)

- (1) Maintain surveillance means across the SONG VINH DIEN and the SONG CAU BIEN.
- (2) Maintain surveillance along the waterways adjacent to the coast, the SONG HA XAU, SONG CAN BIEN and the SONG DE VONG as required.
- (3) Conduct surveillance along coastal area. Coordinate with Market Time forces as required.
- (4) Coordinate with 1st MP Battalion (III MAF Air Base Defense Battalion) for effective coverage of the SONG CAU DO from grid AT999704 to BT060723. 1st MP Battalion has responsibility for the river, NAVSUPACT operates patrol craft thereon.
- (5) Coordinate with Commanding Officer, 2d Battalion, 5th Marines for effective coverage of the SONG THU BON/SONG KY LAM where adjacent to the TAOR. River is 5th Marines responsibility.
- (6) Coordinate with Commander, Coastal Group 14 (Junk Fleet) for effective coverage of waterways in vicinity of mouth of SONG CUA DAI.
- (7) Interdict waterways within Division Supplementary AO, within capabilities, to minimize enemy freedom of movement. Be prepared to coordinate with the Commanding General, Americal Division, for operations adjacent to AO. The boundary between the Division Supplementary AO and the Americal Division on SONG BA REN between grids BT076496 and BT138504 is on south bank.
- (8) Direct liaison is authorized with Commanding General, Americal Division for purposes of coordinating operations and surveillance.
- (9) Maintain surveillance on all subsidiary waterways within TAOR (SONG LA THO, SONG BAU XAU, SUOI CO CA, SONG DO, SONG TAM GIAP, SUOI MAN QUANG, SONG BENH LONG. SONG CAM HA, and SONG THANH QUIT) as required, to deny the enemy use of these waterways.

c. /th Marines (Rein)

(1) Establish surveillance means astride the SONG CU DE, the SONG AI NGHIA, the SONG VU GIA, the SONG YEN and the SONG TUY LOAN.

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The SONG TUY LOAN is a Southern Sector Defense Command responsibility where adjacent to that sector.

- (2) Coordinate with Commander, Northern Sector Defense Command in establishing surveillance in vicinity of the mouth of the SONG CU DE. The mouth of the SONG CU DE is a 7th Marines responsibility.
- (3) Coordinate with Commander, Southern Sector Defense Command for effective coverage of SONG CAU DO adjacent to TAOR. SONG CAU DO is Southern Sector Defense Command responsibility where adjacent to that sector.
- (4) Coordinate with Commanding Officer, 2d Battalion, 5th Marines for effective coverage of the SONG THU BON/SONG TINH YEN in TAOR. The SONG THU BON/SONG TINH YEN enters 7th Marines TAOR at grid AT846445.
- (5) Maintain surveillance, as required, to deny enemy use of the following:
 - (a) Waterway that flows into 5th Marines TAOR, from grids A1941593 to AT990624.
 - (b) Connecting waterway between the SONG VU GIA and SONG THU BON, grids AT901565 to AT918534.
 - (c) Lateral waterway in the rocket belt flowing from grids AT906750 to AT938710.
 - (d) Lateral waterway in the rocket belt flowing from grid AT885795 to the mouth of the SONG CU DE.

d. 2d Battalion (Rein), 5th Marines

- (1) Maintain surveillance astride SONG THU BON/SONG TINH YEN from point of entry into TAOR to grid AT846445.
- (2) Coordinate surveillance along SONG THU BON/SONG TINH YEN where river is adjacent to TAOR. Responsibility for river passes to 7th Marines at grid AT846445.
- (3) Coordinate surveillance activity along SONG THU BON with 5th Marines from grids AT978562 to AT997547. This segment of river is 5th Marines responsibility.
- (4) Maintain positive control on SONG BA REN during season when that river is navigable.
- (5) Maintain surveillance of lakes in TAOR as required to deny enemy movement thereon.

e. 11th Marines (-) (Rein)/Northern Sector Defense Command

- (1) 11th Marines (-) (Rein)
 - (a) General support.
 - (b) Interdict waterways as requested by unit commanders.
- (2) Northern Sector Defense Command
 - (a) Conduct surveillance along coastal area of sector.

 Harbor Entrance Control Post boats patrol DA NANG Bay.

 Coordinate with NAVSUPACT.
 - (b) Coordinate with 7th Marines in establishing surveillance in vicinity of mouth of SONG CU DE. Mouth of SONG CU DE is 7th Marines responsibility.
 - (c) Maintain surveillance of waterways adjacent to the coast and extending inland as required to deny their use to the enemy.
- f. 1st Tank Battalion/Southern Sector Defense Command
 - (1) Coordinate with the 5th Marines for effective coverage of the SONG CAU DO. SONG CAU DO is Southern Sector Defense Command responsibility where adjacent to sector.
 - (2) Coordinate with 7th Marines for effective coverage of the SONG TUY LOAN. River is Southern Sector Defense Command responsibility where adjacent to sector.
- g. <u>lst Engineer Battalion (-)</u>. Be prepared to provide engineering assistance as required.
- h. Coordinating Instructions
 - (1) Emphasize surveillance activities on all waterways in conjunction with reference (e). Particular attention to those portions of waterways that lead into the rocket belt and waterways that provide lateral movement within the rocket belt.
 - (2) Maintain positive control of all waterways. Deny the enemy the capability of transporting personnel, weapons or equipment along waterways.

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- (3) Use all available mechanical means to supplement patrols, check points, listening posts and observation posts.
- (4) Deny watercraft movement on all waterways between 1800 and 0600. TAOR/Sector commanders establish liaison with district chiefs concerning segments of waterways in which watercraft are not allowed, day or night. Unit commanders challenge all watercraft appearing in unauthorized zones at any time. Take under fire all challenged watercraft that do not respond. Annex B (Waterway Denial Plan) and reference (f).
- (5) Coordinate with GVN forces for establishment of check points on waterways. Check points which are established and maintained by GVN forces are preferable. USMC forces assist as requested.
- (6) Establish river patrols in small craft, as required, to assist with check point control and watercraft search.
- (7) Direct attention to areas adjacent to waterways to discover enemy cache sites, exit trails and boat assembly areas.
- (8) Consider the monsoon season when developing plans in order to provide for seasonal waterways and increased width and depth of existing waterways.
- (9) TAOR/Sector commanders coordinate with district chiefs to ensure complete dissemination of waterway denial plan and curfew instructions. Personal contact to ensure understanding of the order and the consequences of non-compliance is imperative.
- (10) Coastal watercraft whose identity is not apparent are identified through 1st Marine Division COC or direct with Market Time units. Annex A (CTG 115.1 Support).
- (11) SLAR aircraft have been requested to provide continuous coverage over all waterways throughout the Division TAOR.

 A Data Link van has been positioned at division headquarters for immediate read-out of any water borne craft in the TAOR. This information, once received, will be passed through COC to the TAOR commander concerned for appropriate action.
 - (a) Continuous flights have been requested; however, inclement weather and aircraft and Data Link availability will have a decided effect on the SLAR coverage provided.

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- (b) Specified times for SLAR coverage encompass the period 2100 to 0300 nightly.
- (12) Make maximum use of FIREFLY missions as required.
 - (a) The FIREFLY program is a U.S. Army program. It consists of a team of three helicopters; one light ship, one gun ship and one control ship. Flying waterways at night, the team is capable of illuminating targets and destroying them with immediate fire power. Army aviation units at DA NANG and CHU LAI have this capability.
 - (b) FIREFLY is ideally suited for surveillance on waterways difficult to cover with patrols, check points or OP's. Examples of waterways where extensive use of FIREFLY might be profitably employed are SONG THU BON, SONG VU GIA, SONG CU DE, and SONG KY LAM - SONG DIEN BINH - SONG CAU LAU - SONG HOI - SONG CUA DAI.
 - (c) Requests for FIREFLY are made to Headquarters, 1st Marine Division:
- (13) Recommended changes to Annex B (Waterway Denial Plan) are solicited from TAOR/mector commanders based on the situation in their individual areas.
- (14) This order supports the plan promulgated by the QUANG NAM Province Chief. Information is exchanged on a regular basis with the Headquarters, QUANG DA Special Zone. Unit commanders exercise sound judgement when conflicts arise with local VN citizens and/or officials regarding implementation or understanding of provisions of this order. Notify Headquarters, lst Marine Division immediately of such conflicts that cannot be resolved on the local level.
- (15) Submit overlay of waterway control activities by 1800 daily. Waterway control activities should be depicted in red and may a manufactor with the patrol reputation of the patrol reputation of the patrol reputation.
- (16) Make maximum use of psychological operations in support of waterway control efforts. Submit requests for special leaflets, broadcast tapes and Armed Propaganda Team support to this headquarters (Attn: G-5).
- (17) Annex E (Fire Support Coordination) to reference (d).

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- (18) Annex F (Artillery) to reference (d).
- (19) Annex G (Naval Gunfire) to reference (d).
- (20) Annex H (Air Support) to reference (d)
- (21) Annex J (Rules of Engagement) to reference (d).

1. GENERAL

a. Background

- (1) Task Group 115.1 is the U.S. Naval/Coast Guard coastal surveillance group (Market Time) operating in the coastal waters of I Corps. Units of the following types conduct continuous patrolling within two miles of the coastline:
 - (a) Coast Guard Cutters (WPB)
 - 1. Voice Radio Call. "ARTICLE" plus letter suffixes "FOXTROT" through "MIKE." May be called "ARTICLE UNIT."
 - 2. Armament. Five .50 caliber machine guns and one 81mm mortar, capable of firing destructive or illuminating fires.
 - 3. Radio Frequencies. Continuous guard on 3450 KCS or 4085 KCS SSB/USB (net control "ARTICLE" CTG 115.1), 37.5 MCS VHF/FM, and either 277.8 or 301.0 MCS UHF.
 - (b) "Swift" Patrol Boats (PCF)
 - 1. Voice Radio Call. "NEWSBOY INDIA" plus "UNIT HULL NUMBER." May be called "NEWSBOY INDIA UNIT."
 - 2. Armament. Three .50 caliber machine guns and one 81mm mortar capable of firing destructive or illuminating fires.
 - 3. Radio Frequencies. Guards 3450 KCS or 4085 KCS SSB/USB, periodically comes up on 37.5 MCS, and can guard any other VHF/FM circuit.

(2) While the primary mission of these units is to prevent infiltration of hostile material or personnel through the coastal waters of I Corps, they can provide exfiltration patrol services, illumination using 81mm mortar, or, when cleared through the task group commander, destructive fires utilizing both mortars and machine guns. These units are rarely more than 10 miles apart, so they are capable of rapid response at any point along the coast.

b. Coordination of Support

- (1) Support Requests. Normal requests for TG 115.1 support is made through III MAF and CTG 115.1. In an emergency, direct liaison may be established by units on the scene.
 - (a) Exfiltration patrol and illumination fire may be provided upon request without prior clearance through CTG 115.1 when urgency of mission prohibits use of normal III MAF/CTG 115.1 channels.
 - (b) Destructive fire missions may be conducted without CTG 115.1 clearance only if the mission is of an extremely urgent nature. "Urgent" is defined as a situation when friendly forces have positive contact with enemy, are under hostile fire, and fire support is required in order to minimize friendly losses.
 - (c) Other scheduled or unscheduled destructive fire missions may be fired if permission is granted by CTG 115.1, and if a designated NGLO/ANGLICO team or forward air controller is available.
- (2) Required information. When requesting TG 115.1 support, submit the following information:
 - (a) Identity of unit(s) to be supported.
 - (b) Voice calls and VHF frequencies on which unit(s) to be supported can be reached.
 - (c) Area where support is required.
 - (d) Type of support required.
 - (e) Time support is to commence and expected duration.

(3) Coordinating Instructions

- (a) Requests for support should reach CTG 115.1 with info copy to CTF 115 at least 24 hours prior to the event.
- (b) If advance request is not possible, and if an urgent requirement for support exists, Task Group 115.1 units may be contacted directly on circuits listed in paragraphs 1a(1)(a)3 and 1a(1)(b)3.
- (c) TG 115.1 units carry KAC 138 but do not hold division CEOI or other directives.

INTRODUCTION

Good Morning,

I -

As the first item on my agenda I would like to welcome you aboard and then tell you way I wanted to assemble you particular officers and Sergeants Major for this briefing.

The scope of activities under my staff cognizance, as Division G-1, covers a wide area and includes procedures and personnel services which are of vital importance to the proper administration and the morale of the personnel of this Division. As the result of staff visits by myself and my assistants I have found that many of the services we offer and much of the administrative procedure which we sponsor is not really well known to the very people we are trying to reach, those persons in the executive and management positions of the Divisional organizations.

Therefore, I have asked that you be assembled here to listen to, discuss, and question, my assistants and members of the special staff as they present a program contrived to give you a clear understanding of how we function, what is available to you, and what your responsibilities in these matters are. This program will require about 4 hours of your time, there will be periodic breaks and when you leave you will be provided with a copy of the complete presentation. That completes my introduction of the program and I would now like to address the subject of our current personnel situation.

The Commanding General recently received a message from CG, FMFPac on this subject and he has directed that I use the material contained in that message in my comments to you.

Much has been said in the past was about our personnel out cokes for the remainer of the year. During the past two months we have seen events take place which have made new inroads in our strength without suitable compensation, as predicted, the lean period is upon us. To the expected replacement shortfall for the fourth quarter we have added the heavier than normal casualties of September, the predictably greater administrative losses of December, including the holiday concentration of special leaves, and finally, conversion to the 395 day tour. The timing of this last feature could have been delayed into calendar year 68, but in so doing would have lost considerable effect. Since we cannot prevent a second Christmas away from home for most of those who departed CONUS last December, transition to the 395 day tour at this time is the most aggressive thing that we can do, in terms of getting the greatest number of our WestPac Marines home for the holidays. The changeover which cost us about 700 Marines in October and will cost us approximately 200 more for November and December, nevertheless seems to have the universal support of all concerned. It is CG, FMFPac's view that the immediate benefit to the individual Marines and the long term leveling of rotation - replacement flow to WestPac units make it worth the price, we in this Division support that view.

We are presently at about 85% of manning level and will increase to about 92% of manning level by the end of November, and by the end of December we should be back up to about 95% of our present manning level.

CMC, FMFPac and we in the Division know that we need more manning level.

every effort is being made and will continue to be made to provide them.

In regard to the decision to make the transition to 395 days, we have, in effect, agreed upon taking a calculated manpower risk in the belief that it is in our ultimate best interests. Unfortunately this temporary and voluntary drawdown cannot go completely unnoticed by an observant press or by those among our own Marines who have a propensity for discussing or writing about unit strengths, rotation policies and the hardships they generate. It is therefore of the utmost importance that we keep the transition period in low key perspective and that we thoroughly inform both officers and men of the honest facts so that they will understand the improvement that the new tour computation brings to them.

395 DAY TOUR

There have been many interpretations and remore connected with the recent establishment of the 395 day tour. Basically, the reason for the change from a 13 month tour to a 395 day tour was that it would insure equitable tours for all personnel. Under the 13 month policy, many senior staff MCO's and officer's were able to arrange their departure data from CONUS in order to take advantage of a short tour, whereas the majority of troops were forced to live with a longer tour. We estimated that under the old system, close to 20% of our parsonnel were remaining out of CONUS more than 15 full months and that close to 10% were spending more than 15 months in Vietnam.

The 395 day tour precludes this from happening, in that it provides for establishment of an RTD which will insure that a man departs Vietnam in sufficient time for him to return to the States no later than 395 days after his original date of departure, regardless of the number of calendar months involved. This policy, as implemented by the First Division, also provides for a first in - first out oriteria when assigning aircraft seats, thus ensuring equitable distribution of seats among personnel, regardless of rank.

A common rumor connected with the new tour is that it is an initial step towards decreasing our tours to 12 months, and that soon we will be working on a 390 day tour, then a 385 day tour, and so on, until we get down to a tour of 365 days. This possibility has been discussed with re-

presentatives from FMFPAC and they have emphasized that there is no plan to decrease the present 395 day tour and that this will remain in effect.

ASSIGNMENT OF OFFICER MOSIS

A continuing review must be made of an officer's qualifications for assignment of a primary or of additional MOS's. The MOS's an officer holds must show his current qualifications to perform both primary and staff type duties. The lack of a commander to insure that this is done will not only be detrimental to the officer himself when he is assigned but will also result in the Marine Corps and the command of which the officer is a part not being able to properly utilize the abilities he has, as a result of previous assignments.

The most prevalent problem concerning primary MOS's is the lack of many Division units to change an officer's primary MOS from basic to that of a qualified officer. Paragraph 3052 of the Marine Corps Parsonnel Manual requires that an officer be given a qualified MOS after completion of a formal school and upon demonstration of proficiency in his MOS. It further requires that if an officer does not demonstrate the required proficiency after six months, a report of the circumstances which has precluded his attaining this proficiency will be made to the Commandant of the Marine Corps, with appropriate recommendations. There are some units in this Division which have established a policy that an officer cannot qualify for an MOS until he has been in country nine months, even after he has been a graduate of a formal school. Meedless to say this is in direct conflict with CMC policy and does not reflect the intent or pur-

pose of the MOS aystem.

A second, and parhaps more common problem is that of assignment of additional MOS's. This MOS should show the staff capabilities of an offiger. It is normal to assume that an officer should be qualified to acquire an additional MOS after he has auccessfully performed in a hillet for a period of about four months. There is no specific amount of time connected with an additional MOS, but a commander can be the judge of whether or not an officer should be so designated. The importance of requesting assignment of an additional MOS, when rated, cannot be overemphasized. The failure to do so because of oversight, or because the officer concerned doesn't think he wants the MOS is inexcusable. Officers are put in various assignments in order to better qualify them for future assignments in the Corps. If we fail to identify the skills they acquire in these assignments we are working against one of the purposes of the MOS system. Once an officer is considered to be qualified for an additional MOS the officer, or his CO, is responsible for requesting that CMC assign him this MOS.

As I have already mentioned, the assignment of an additional MOS should indicate an officer's staff capability, as opposed to his operational or command ability which is indicated by his primary MOS. In this regard, it is not generally intended that an officer should have two MOS's. For example, an infantry officer should not have an additional MOS of 1802, or 0802. When he is serving in the FMF his command time should be spent in the infantry and not in tanks or artillery. When it comes time for his staff duty, it should not be spent in these MOS's either, but

rather in an area such as logistics, intelligence, or infantry operations. There are many exceptions to this policy, such as the need to cross-train personnel in MOS's in which the Marine Corps has a shortage (2502 or 3502, for example). Generally, however, CMC will not approve the assignment of two primary type MOS's to one officer and will, when discovered, delete primary type MOS's from officers who possess them as an additional MOS.

FITNESS REPORTS

There has been a marked increase in the number of errors on fitness reports. Normally, CMC will screen fitness reports, detect errors and then send the reports directly back to the reporting senior for correction.

Because of a large number of errors within this Division, CMC has recently been sending all enlisted reports to the CG for notation and for correction. We have, in turn, noted the units in arror and have forwarded reports to the appropriate headquarters for correction. I will not belabor the point by pointing out specific errors, but recommend that everyone connected with the review and submission of fitness reports refer to paragraph 15068 of the Personnel Manual, or more specifically MCBul 1610 of 7 April 1967, which promulgates a change to the Marine Corps Personnel Manual, concerning fitness reports.

There is one area connected with submission of fitness reports which has been the cause of much misunderstanding among reporting seniors. that is: When should I refer a report to an officer or NCO for comment?

According to the Personnel Manual, a report should be shown to an officer or NCO when it is adverse or marginal. Moverse reports are further described as those containing unsatisfactory marks, those describing the

officer as "prefer not to have" or those that contain unfavorable comments in section D. There is normally little trouble in the mind of a reporting senior concerning referral of an adverse report, most problems lie with the determination of what constitutes a marginal report. Once again, referring to paragraph 15068, a marginal report is defined as one which contains a below average mark in items 16 or 17 of section C, a mark in either of the two blocks to the left of average in the value to the service section, or which contains marginal remarks in section D. Most reports are returned for signature because of remarks made in section D. The best rule in this case is that if there is any doubt in your mind, whatsoever, as to whether your remarks will result in the report being considered marginal, then by all means refer the report to the individual concerned for comment.

Ever since the Marine Corps has gone to the mo-show system on fitness reports, one of the biggest problem areas has been that officers are not aware of the caliber of their performance of duty. The fact that we do not show most reports to the officer or MCO concerned is no excuse for the officer or MCO being uninformed of how he stacks up as a Marine. Once again, the Personnel Manual is very explicit as to the requirement for counseling an individual as to his performance of duty. Having served as an officer monitor at Headquarters Marine Corps, it was normal to expect a continuing parade of officers who were passed over each year, to make a trip to Headquarters to review their files in order to determine the reason why they were passed over. These officers would come to my office, I would review

their cases with them, and, in an overwhelming majority of cases, they were surprised and amazed at what some of the reports contained, particularly in that they were never informed of their performance of duty. In many cases I personally knew the reporting senior and I made it a point to check with them to see if they had counselled the officer concerned, and in most cases the claim of no-counselling was entirely justified. I'm sure you all realize that the fitness report is the most important bit of information contained in an officer's record when it comes to selection time. Our system, although subjected to many slame and criticisms, is still the best of any of the armed services and will, if properly used, assure the Marine Corps that the most qualified officers are selected for promotion. This can only be so, however, if reporting seniors use this report as it is intended to be used, both as a means of providing an evaluation of the officer concerned to CMC and as a basis for providing the officer personal counseling, with a constructive criticism or evaluation of his performance of duty.

My final comment concerning fitness reports partains to that of the officer's statement of his preference for duty. Contrary to most opinions, the preference of duty is a very important part of the basis upon which a monitor makes assignments of an officer. However, because most officers do not make wise or judicious preferences of duty, the monitor is not given the opportunity to make use of this consideration. For example, a first lieutenant requires that he be assigned as follows: First choice - MROTC, second choice - Assistant Naval Attache - London, third choice -

Joint Staff Duty - overseas. As far as the monitor is concerned, none of these choices are possible for a lieutenant, therefore this officer's assignment cannot be influenced by his preference for duty. Granted these will be appropriate choices when this officer is of the proper rank and has the necessary prerequisites for this duty, therefore he should wait until that time to request them. The preference of duty section should not be used as a "dream sheet", but should indicate a preference of duty which is appropriate to the officer's rank, MOS, and experience and is in keeping with the characteristics of a desired career pattern, described in paragraph 4052 of the Personnal Manual. Some hints on requesting types of duty are: Only request that type of duty you should go to next in your career pattern, with the exception that once you receive a set of PCSO, project yourself to the subsequent tonr. of duty when making out a fitness report; don't request shead three or four tours; don't request something that you don't really want, but that you think will look good on your report -you may get it (example-many always feel they should request FMF).

I realize that this information is more or less common knowledge to the officer who has been around the Corps for awhile. However, most junior officers haven't the slightest idea as to how to request types of duty. This should be the topic of officers' schools or of counseling sessions held with officers.

ENLISTED PROMOTIONS

The Marine Corps is presently undergoing a change in its promotion policies. A representative of G-1, Headquarters Marine Corps, visited this

Division in September and informed us of the following pending changes to existing policies:

- 1. Promotions to Lance Corporal will be unlimited, the same as PFC's at the present time.
- 2. Promotions to corporal will probably be based on cutting scores, rather than being based on authorized M/L strengths.

These changes are presently under study and we expect some policy guidance concerning them in the very near future.

The HQMC officer also informed us of two other areas which have resulted in many personnel being deprived of promotions. The first of these is our interpretation of the requirements for meritorious combat promotions. This Division had required that a man be assigned to a small combat unit and that he distinguish himself under fire before he was eligible for meritorious combat promotion. We were informed that the criteria for this promotion is that the Marine be in a hostile fire area, and that being in Vietnam met this requirement. We have since modified our Division Order to reflect this. A second problem existed as a result of WestPac units not making full use of the promotions to corporal and lance corporal which were available to them. Under our old system, each battalion within the Division computed their quotas based on their M/L and then promoted up to this ceiling. There was never any attempt made to consolidate the entire Division's status, determine its ceiling and then promote, Division-wide, up to this ceiling. During September we did this and determined that we had quotas for 1440 corporals and 1161 lance corporals which would not be used. Therefore, these were

distributed to units who had eligible personnel but did not have sufficient quotas. We requested similar information from all units for the month of October, fully intending to continue this process, however, we are presently awaiting guidance from CMC concerning the basis by which we should be computing our quotas. In this regard, MCBul 1418 of 12 March 1967, with changes 1 and 2, has a cutoff date of 31 October 1967. This Bulletin authorizes increased promotion quotas over those authorized by MCO 1418.9E. We have requested information from CMC as to their intentions to continuing compution of quotas based on the bulletin or returning to the old system. If you have affected promotions based on the bulletin, which permits up to 50% of excess of M/L strength in corporals and lance corporals, I request you to notify me of this before you leave today. All other units should promote based on the old authority, MCO 1418.9E pending receipt of word from CMC as to their intentions.

OFFICER PROMOTIONS

The recent increased officer promotions has lead to some misunderstanding concerning the temporary appointments of officers. In order to clarify the status of officers selected or not selected by recent boards, I think it best that we first consider the basis for promotion of officers under normal circumstances. In order to qualify for promotion under the provisions of our permanent promotion authority it is necessary that an officer meet statuatory time in grade requirements. Paragraph 6100 of the Marine Corps Personnel Manual states these requirements as follows:

Lieutenants - 2 years

Captains and Majors - 4 years

Lieutenant Colonels - 5 years

A recent change to our promotion law has decreased the time in grade for Lieuténant Colonels to four years.

When the Marine Corps evaluated its capabilities to meet its increased grade requirements, it became evident that there were not sufficient numbers of officers available in the various ranks with the necessary time in grade to make them eligible for promotion. In order to alleviate this problem, CMC requested that the President authorize the Marine Corps to promote officers under provisions of a temporary law. This law allows us additional promotions to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, Major, and Captain regardless of time in grade. It requires, however, that personnel selected under the temporary law be reselected by a selection board convened under the permanent promotion authority, after these personnel have sufficient time in grade. The selection boards which met this year were convened under both permanent and temporary authority. Promotion lists were published in two parts, indicating those officers who were selected under each of these authorities. As a result there has been considerable confusion among those officers not selected for promotion, and even among those selected for promotion, as to their status. In order to clarify this situation. we will consider four officers who were considered for selection:

Officer number one had sufficient time in grade and was in the zone for selection under the permanent law. He was selected for promotion under this law. However, in order to allow his earliest promotion and to fill

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existing requirements for Lieutenant Colonels, he was promoted on 1 October under the provisions of the temporary law. As soon as a vacancy exists
for this officer in the permanent rank structure, he will receive his promotion warrant with an appropriate date of rank. In some cases this date
of rank will be prior to 1 October 1967. This officer does not have to be
reselected.

Officer number two had sufficient time in grade and was also in the zone for selection under the permanent law. He was selected for promotion under the temporary law, but was not selected under the provisions of the permanent law. This officer, although promoted on 1 October, has been officially passed over once, and will be considered for selection under the permanent law by next year's board. If he is passed over then he will have been officially passed over twice and will be required to retire upon completion of 20 years service. If this officer is not selected by the permanent board next year he will still retain his temporary appointment to Lieutenant Colonel until he gets out of the Marine Corps or until six months after cessation of the present hostilities. He will only lose this appointment as a result of unsatisfactory service.

Officer number three was not in the permanent zone but was selected under the temporary law. He must be reconsidered after he has sufficient time in grade. If selected by the permanent board he will get a date of rank under this law when a vacancy exists. If not selected by the permanent board he will be considered as being passed over but will retain his temporary appointment.

Officer number four was not in the permanent zone, was in the temporary zone, and was not selected for promotion. He is not considered to have

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bean

been passed over. If he is selected by a subsequent permanent board he will be promoted when a vacancy exists. If he is not selected by this board he is officially passed over.

I'm sure there are other questions in your mind concerning these appointments. If you'll save them until the break I'll answer them if possible, or will get an answer for you.

UNIFORMS, DISCIPLINE, AND MILITARY COURTESY

A recent MACV message has expressed General WESTMORELAND's concern over the uniforms, discipline and military courtesies displayed by U. S. personnel in Vietnam. General LAHUE has, in turn, expressed his concern in this area. One has only to make a trip in the rear areas to learn that these concerns are well founded. III MAF is in the process of issuing a directive pertaining to this problem, which will include rigid controls of all personnel in the rear areas. Personnel who are out of uniform or who are out of order will be apprehended and given a written order returning them to their organization. This Division will be notified of all violations and commanders of units with a high rate of incidence will be required to explain what actions have been taken to preclude this. This problem, as is typical of so many of our problems, is a result of a lack of personnel getting the word from their immediate superiors. In many cases personnel stopped in these areas claim that their NCO's told them that they were not required to observe normal military courtesies, nor was it necessary that they be in a proper uniform. In any case, there are many officers and staff NCO's who frequent these facilities and who observe these many violations but do nothing about it. They are to blame

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as much, if not more, than the Private or PFC who is out of uniform or who neglects to display proper military courtesy:

Granted we are in a combat zone, but this is not an excuse for ignoring the basic tenets of military life for which the Marine Corps has become noted. At the present time this Division is unsatisfactory in this aspect. It is only through the efforts and diligence of every officer, SNCO, and NCO that this downhill trend will be reversed. There should be sufficient horsepower in this room to get the ball rolling within every unit of this Division. You will hear more about this program in a forthcoming Division directive.

REPORTS

Division Order 5300.2 contains instructions regarding the submission of weekly, monthly and quarterly personnel reports. Since the last Adjutant's conference there has been improvement in many areas. However, we still experience delay in the receipt of personnel reports. Time of receipt is most important since you have been given the maximum lead time available in order that we meet our deadline. In many instances it has been necessary for me or one of the clerks in our office to call units concerning late reports. In an effort to eliminate some of our difficulties I will briefly discuss the reports required by DivO 5300.2.

WESTPAC MONTHLY PERSONNEL STRENGTH REPORT

Section one was modified effective 31 October 1967, to include an additional item "sierra". This item includes the total OF-03 personnel on rolls, officer and enlisted.

Section two of this report includes the names of officers joined,

deaths, medevac, medevac not dropped, transferred to other WestPac commands and those rotated to CONUS. At Division level we consolidate all of this information and provide FMFPac a consolidated report. Difficulty is encountered primarily, due to officers joining Division on the last few days of a month. In order to reduce errors it is important that the joining activity closely monitor the date an officer reports to Division. The last names submitted as joins during the month, are not just those officers who have reached their organization, but must reflect joins to the Division during the month. (Example - 2 officers report to Division on 30 October but do not physically report to their assigned organizations until 2 November. These officers must be included in total for period ending 2359, 31 October.) We do not report enlisted personnel by name in this section. However, the figures provided are equally as important.

We do not report intra-Division joins and drops. But report joins and drops from or to commands outside lstMarDiv. However, should you join an officer from another Division unit it is a gain as far as your strength is concerned. Therefore, should this occur indicate the detaching unit opposite the individuals name. This will assist us in obtaining our total count and eliminate the possibility of counting an individual twice.

PERSONNEL STATUS REPORT (PERSTAT)

You were advised by CG, lstMarDiv msg 130452Z Nov67 of the change in the "as of time" and "reporting frequency" for PERSTAT. Read this message carefully as certain requirements have been changed. There has been a reduction in the number of card columns utilized. Subsequent to submission of the 16 November report frequency has been reduced to every

two weeks. Reports to be submitted as of 2359 on Wednesday and due to G-1 NLT 0800 on Friday. This change in PERSTAT reporting to every two weeks means that we will not have weekly chargeable strength figures for Division units. Therefore, on those weeks that a PERSTAT is not required each unit will provide a report of chargeable strength. Include officer and enlisted USMC and USN. Report is submitted as of 2359 each Wednesday when no PERSTAT is submitted, to arrive G-1 by 0800 on Friday.

I recently returned PERSTAT forms to most units for the following reasons:

- A. Reports were submitted on locally reproduced forms
- B. Forms were torn
- c. Forms stapled
- D. Marks were to light

In either of the above examples the end result was identical. The optical scanner at FLC cannot process these forms to reproduce the required EAM card. Ensure compliance with instructions contained in my memo to all Adjutants dated 6 November.

Narratives are used to express a commanders judgement of readiness.

Many narratives are entirely too long. Maximum narrative length for one

RUC is prescribed by new procedures. A shortage of personnel should be

reported as critical when a commander is unable to take corrective action

after assessing his total personnel resources and concludes that a lack

of a certain number of Marines with certain skills and or grades sign
ificantly reduces his units ability to accomplish its assigned mission.

III MAF NON-EFFECTIVE REPORT

This report has caused little difficulty. You compute your non-effectives in man-days and we convert to man-months for FMFPac.

MONTHLY IN-COUNTRY STRENGTH REPORT

The purpose of this report is to provide the total number of Marine and Navy personnel in-country. There has been questions in the past concerning just what should be included under the TDY in-country column. Include only personnel TAD to your unit from out of country commands. If you include personnel TAD to you from other Division units we count these personnel twice. In the 3 months that I have been here I find it very difficult to get an accurate count of on-rolls strength of this Division. I feel that the main difficulty is our various methods of classifying personnel as chargeable, non-chargeable, effective, non-effective, on rolls strength etc. For period ending 31 October, FMFPac representatives stated their records indicated we should have 364 more personnel than our on-rolls figures indicated. It would be nice to be a little more accurate on strengths. Ensure that you utilize the proper criteria when reporting personnel strengths.

QUARTERLY PACFLT STRENGTH STATUS

Your only requirement is to ensure that a telephone call is made to G-1 stating the number of dependents who presently reside in the pacific command. We require number and location only. The other portions of this report will be compiled by the G-1 section. Negative reports are required.

QUARTERLY REPORT OF MILITARY PERSONNEL IN SOUTHEAST ASIA

No major problems with this one other than ensuring timely submission.

OPSTAT PERSONNEL PROJECTION

The OPSTAT is a G-3 function. However, prior to release each message is routed to G-1 for concurrence. Personnel projections should be made in accordance with paragraphs 11 and 16 of section II of FMFPaqO PO3000.5B,

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supplementary instructions for reporting units that are minus detachments or reinforced with detachments are contained in paragraph 502, section V. The term "unknown" in reporting an attainment date of next expected rating level is not authorized. If you have questions on availability of incoming personnel contact the Division Officer or Enlisted assignment section.

MANNING LEVELS - T/O'S

There has been some question concerning the relationship of M/L and T/0's. T/O's for FMF organizations reflect authorized strength for combat operations. FMF T/O's therefore portray requirements. FMF manning levels portray current allowances and represent an organization's share of currently available manpower resources. It must be emphasized that manning levels represent only the average manning level which an organization can expect to experience during the period that particular M/L is in effect. As a sideline-adjustments to T/O's will not automatically result in an adjustment to the current M/L for a particular unit. However, it should be noted that every change in T/O will eventually have an effect on the distribution of skills within the manning level grade and MOS summaries. Marine Corps manpower resources are allocated consistent with the approved manpower ceilings contained in the five year force structure and financial program. Essentially, allocation. is the process of apportioning authorized numbers in proportion to approved Marine Corps programmed requirements. This plan apportions all available numbers to activities and major organizations and does not provide for an unallocated reserve. FMF requirements as previously indicated are portrayed in current T/O. Since FMF T/O's provide a balance of functional capabilities among the various units of the overall force, any significant change in a functional area of an FMF T/O may well upset the balance of capabilities

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throughout the force and require corresponding adjustment in other units.

FMF allowances represent the number of personnel which the Marine Corps
can allocate to the FMF and support under current strengths. FMF allowances
are promulgated by means of M/L instead of block numbers since M/L permit
a more equitable apportionment of available resources, and also an apportionment which differentiates between hard and soft skill areas. It
must be emphasized that total FMF allowances represent the maximum number
of personnel numbers available to the FMF for a given fiscal year. Requests
for adjustment in the M/L submitted to Headquarters, Marine Corps by FMF
commanders can not alter total FMF allowances, but can only affect a modification in the distribution of FMF allowances.

QUARTERLY M/L REVIEWS

FMFPac provides a quarterly manning level authorization for this Division. This M/L is broken down into total personnel, officer and enlisted by rank and MCS. The M/L authorization also reflects adjustments that have been necessary due to deprived MCS's, decreases in overall Marine Corps personnel assets in certain MCS's such as 0848 and 5591, conversion of OF-03 billets to MCS 8151 due to a shortage of deployable personnel in OF-03. Also affecting manning level authorizations is CMC policy that personnel will not be returned to RVN until after 24 months in CONUS, unless of course the individual waives this restriction and volunteers to return to RVN. To give you an idea how we arrive at M/L's for Division units, upon receipt of FMFPac quarterly M/L authorizations representatives of G-1 consult members of the Division staff, various unit representatives, review M/L changes submitted from the field, review current T/O's and then break down the

authorized personnel down to battalion and separate company level. You are then provided a DPI print out of the results. This printout contains all assets authorized this Division. There are no additional assets available. Just because you are authorized certain personnel by M/L does not assure receipt of these people. If they are not assigned to Division we can't possibly assign them to you. As a matter of interest, the letter of transmittal that provided our 3rd quarter FY-68 manning level allocated all authorized manpower resources in the FMF ground category. No reserve of manpower exists to support proposed increases in current FMF T/O or M/L; it is essential that all proposed increases be accompanied by compensatory reductions if immediate response to a request for increase is desired.

PROVISIONAL T/O

During the past 24 months it became evident that there are numerous areas which are not adequately provided for in current M-series T/O's for a prolonged land campaign in the Vietnam environment. In order that personnel staffing may more closely approach the specific needs of Marine ground elements operating in Vietnam, an extensive review of current T/O's was conducted by the First and Third Marine Divisions. As a result of this review, FMFPac submitted to CMC provisional T/O for a Marine division serving in Vietnam. This provisional T/O has not been approved, however, it is being staffed at HQMC and those of you that have as long to do out here as I may well see it in the field. In the meantime, we will continue to receive our personnel allowance via the quarterly manning level.

In summary evaluate your reports control procedures to ensure that we achieve a timely and accurate personnel reporting system.

SPECIAL PROJECTS OFFICER

Good afternoon gentlemen:

I am Major Dunn, Special Projects and Plans Officer, G-1 Section.

In the next few minutes I will briefly discuss three of my projects which concern everyone present. (Chart II-A)

PERSONNEL ACCOUNTING DISCREPANCIES

On 10 August 1967 CG, FMFPac set a goal of <u>less than</u> 1% error rate for information entered into the Marine Corps Personnel Accounting System. This objective was set as a result of CMC review of the high error rate in personnel accounting information being submitted from all Marine Corps commands. In order to assist commanders in WestPac DPI 3 was tasked with making monthly analysis by reporting unit, and forwarding the results to commanders concerned.

Within the 1st Marine Division command attention was immediately focused on this problem with the following results: (Chart II-B)

This is not very impressive, in fact we are losing ground; however let's look back at the statistics that started this program: (Chart II-C)

The month of lowest error rate, August, was a month in which maximum command attention was directed at this problem. It included conferences, visits to units by teams of experts, local education programs and so on. As soon as the pressure is off this area and old hands rotate, the error rate will go up again, as evidenced by September statistics.

In order to ensure that the Division arrives at and holds its objective of a 0.9% error rate, every reporting unit in the Division must reach

a 0.9% or less error rate. This is not an easy task. It is however a reasonable goal and one that we must achieve because of its importance in all other phases of Marine Corps Operations. Inaccurate personnel information results in incorrect and delayed pay, misassignment, delayed promotions, delayed orders, and increased paper work. These delays, mistakes and the increased workload and time lost in straightening them out do not increase individual or unit morale and are among the complaints registered by experienced and highly qualified Marines who leave the Corps each month. The end result is that the inexperienced and less qualified move up and the rest of us must work harder.

In order to assist commanders in reducing errors the G-1 technical administration inspection has gone to a quarterly cycle. DPP-16 is providing personnel to make monthly visits to designated units which are experiencing difficulties in reporting complete and accurate information. This will continue to be supplemented with staff visits by G-1 officers.

If the adjutant or executive officer of each organization represented here will check with me at the conclusion of this briefing I will provide them with a month by month breakdown of their unit's personnel accounting discrepancies as reported by DPI 3.

ACCIDENTAL DISCHARGES (Chart II-D)

These figures speak for themselves. Some of those wounded were permanent losses to the service, others were losses to their unit anywhere from days to months.

The weapons of war are the tools of the military trade and like industrial machinery, procedures have been set down for their proper

care, maintenance, employment and user safety.

Research has shown that most industrial accidents are due to: (Chart II-E)

Lack of total familiarity with machinery and its operation

Careless actions born of overconfidence

Shortcutting of established procedures for safe operation

The preponderance of accidents take place when a man is physically
exhausted or run down, mentally bored or distracted.

This is an over simplification, of course, but research of cases reported during this year showed that one or more of these factors were present in each case of an accidental discharge. Some other interesting facts are:

The preponderance of accidental discharges take place somewhere between the first and fourth month of the man's tour. The other large grouping falls in the last four months of a tour. We can't think for each man but these facts definitely triangulate the periods in a man's tour when weapons safety should be re-emphasized.

TWO NOTES IN CLOSING THIS SUBJECT

Please do not send initial accidental discharge reports via regimental or task force headquarters. We have recently received reports that were delayed as much as ten days, due to stops at intermediate commanders, above the battalion level. We must make further reports to higher headquarters which must be timely as well as accurate.

If you have an accidental firing of a weapon to:

- a. Inflict a wound on another marine or self or:
- b. To impress the local populace;
- c. For some other reason,

do not report this as an accidental discharge.

1ST MARINE DIVISION ARVN INTERPRETER PROGRAM

In April of 1966 the First Marine Division entered the ARVN Interpreter program and soon received its first graduates from the English language training course at Saigon. There are two very solid reasons for the development of this program:

- a. We can not afford to send large numbers of our men to long term schools that would make them fluent Vietnamese linguists.
- b. Experience has shown that better response is received from the Vietnamese people when working through their officials and their people.

What kind of men are these Interpreters?

For the most part they are conscripts - draftees who enter the Interpreter Training Program directly from induction offices. Most are college graduates or men who were close to graduation upon induction.

At the Interpreter school they are tested and ranked by language proficiency, the best in the class receiving a rank of reserve Sergeant Interpreter, unless they held a higher rank in the regular army in which case they retain their former rank. At present all of the 1st Marine Division's ARVN Interpreters have attained the rank of Staff Sergeant.

The new mobilization policy enacted by President Thieu when he took office, has extended the usual four year service requirement for these Interpreters to the end of hostilities or until they reach age 23, which ever comes first.

This tells us quite a bit about these men. They are bright, intellectually inclined, products of the cities of the Republic, come from better than average families, a few are financially well off, most are not, many who were teachers or professional men before

induction took as much as a 2/3 reduction in their income when they entered the service, and above all most of them are totally unfamiliar with the military profession and way of life as we know it.

As many of these men are not here of their own free will and have been in the service but a short time, they are easily susceptible to the frustrations and chafings that come of not understanding the system or trying to resist it. Additionally they are prone to be easily discouraged by barracks talk and influenced by moderately informed spokesmen. An example of this you will find in your briefing book.

The crux of this matter is that we must understand these men; their problems and concerns before we can expect to work efficiently with them. They must feel a part of your unit and take pride in working with Marines. The same forms of recognition, encouragement and fatherly instruction that give the average Marine the <u>push he needs</u>, will also work with the ARVN Interpreters. They do respond to the good example and pursuasive leadership.

If we simply use these men and concern ourselves with their morale and welfare only when forced to do so, the UA rate and absenteeism will increase as well as losses due to disciplinary action. This Division can ill afford this as we presently have on board less than 60% of authorized and required ARVN Interpreters.

Division Order 5312.2A dealing with the ARVN Interpreter Program in this Division is being revised. The new order, when approved, will further clarify the unit commanders' position, authorities and responsibilities relative to assigned ARVN Interpreters and will contain simplified forms and formats for reporting required information.

In addition check lists will be provided that should cover most contingencies, for example, steps to be taken when an ARVN Interpreter is:

UA

Over Leave

WIA

KIA.

and so on.

In conjunction with G-2 we are working on projects related to general welfare of our ARVN Interpreters and we are making applied progress with ARVN Authorities in simplifying and speeding up such matters as processing and delivering of remains of interpreters KIA to next of kin and processing recommendations for Vietnamese decorations and awards.

Basically, 1st Marine Division policy is that while these men are with us, they are our men and we take good care of our men.

LACK OF TOTAL FAMILIARITY WITH MACHINERY AND ITS OPERATION

INTERPRETERS ASSIGNED TO THIS DIVISION

Many cases of UA on the part of the interpreters have been reported to the lst Interpreter Team lately, following are some of the reasons:

OVERWORK

Example: One Interpreter, assigned to a company, went on operation with the company's 1st platoon, when this platoon had finished its operation and came back for a break, the interpreter seldom got the same favor, but had to go with the 2nd platoon, and then the 3rd platoon. There are also unit commanders who don't let their interpreters go on leave and keep them working and so on.

LACK OF MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING

Most unit commanders think that interpreters are assigned to work for them and not work side by side with them. So they only talk to interpreters whenever they need them. They neglect interpreters living condition. They don't even ask whether their interpreters have a place to sleep or not.

An interpreter would never go UA when a good relationship has been established between his unit commander and himself.

DIFFICULTIES TO GET TRANSPORTATION

After obtaining leave orders and travel orders from III MAF and Division G-1 respectively, interpreters have to go through VNAF in the 15th aerial port to get a flight. It usually takes them 2 to 3 days to

stand-by in the air terminal before they can catch a plane. Sometimes they have to be very tactful and must bear the humiliation if they want to be manifested.

In many cases, interpreters had to tip the person working at the 15th Aerial Port or had to go by commercial flight at their own expenses. Many of the Interpreters have been complaining that they work as Marines but have to go through VNAF for transportation even though they have travel orders signed by Marine Div. Officers.

NO AWARDS AS ENCOURAGEMENT

Interpreters get punishment easily when committing a mistake, but they rarely get awards for a good job they have done. During operations, wounded interpreters received nothing while wounded Marines were awarded purple hearts. SOLUTIONS WHICH MIGHT HELP REDUCE UA CASES

- a. Unit commanders should treat interpreters as co-workers who need rest as Marines.
- b. Consider interpreters as members of his command and be treated accordingly.
- c. Interpreters should be authorized to ge a ride through the US Air Forces without going through VNAF where, especially interpreters are treated without any cordiality.
- d. Give awards to encourage their work. (Besides sending letter of recommendation to I Corps, Marine Corps issues its own US Medals to interpreters.

However, there are also some interpreters who are really incapable and uncooperative. These should be returned to I Corps with a letter stating their lack of qualifications with a recommendation that these men should not be employed as interpreters on the future.

The case of Interpreter SSgt Nguyen Van Thin is a typical example:

SSgt THIN was an interpreter for 4th Marines, 3rd Division. He was killed in action on May 9, 1967 at Con Thien near the DMZ while attempting to save the life of his friend, a Marine Sergeant of 1/4. SSgt THIN was trying to drag the wounded Sergeand down to the foxhole under heavy enemy gunfire. Bullets came and ended both the Marine Sergeant's life and the interpreters life. The Marines of 1/4 sent his body to the Special Forces unit nearby. This unit refused to receive the dead body and sent it back. At last, 1/4 took the dead interpreter to the ramp of Dong Ha and left it there for 3 days. Then the body was recognized by other interpreters who took it back to D Med where it was refused once again because as they were told the Vietnamese dead have to be taken care of by Vietnamese units.

Facing that circumstance, interpreter SSgt CUU made every possible attempt to obtain from the Battalion Commander a Death Declaration Certificate and a plastic bag to hold the dead body which had stayed in the D Med for 3 days now.

7 days later, the body of interpreter THIN was flown to Danang along with 50 dead American bodies. In Danang airport, one ambulance came to transport all the American dead bodies, except SSgt THIN's. Finally, SSgt CUU had to shoulder carry his dead buddy from Danang airport to I Corps Headquarters.

The most remarkable thing which has to be mentioned was that the bag containing the corpse developed a leak through which a terrible odor and foul fluids emanated and soiled SSgt CUU's clothes.

SSgt THIN is now buried at NAM-O.

All the interpreters are very upset and demoralized by the above incident. They feel that the Marines are ungrateful to them and their efforts and are afraid that a similar situation may happen to them should their luck run out some day. It is strongly hoped that such a sorry and sad thing will not occur again in the future.

PERSONNEL OFFICER

ROTATION OF PERSONNEL

Ref: DivO 1300.9 (Under revision)

The proper processing of personnel rotating from the RVN can only be accomplished through timely, accurate administrative procedures.

If you follow the sequence as set forth in DivO 1300.9 and submit correct reports on time to this Headquarters then the rotation of your people will function properly and the concept of first in country, first to rotate will be accomplished.

REPORTS REQUIRED

- A. Monthly Report of Officers Rotating
- B. Monthly Report of Sergeants Sergeants Major
- C. Monthly Report of Corporals and Below
- D. Monthly Report of Transportation Requirements

 Insure you report any additions or deletions to these reports.

ROTATION TOUR DATES

Ref: Div0 1070.1B

The importance of correct establishment, changing and reporting of RTD's cannot be stressed too strongly. The recent policy change of 12 months 20 days in RVN and the 395 day tour must be adhered to. There are many varied factors that will effect the RTD's; we must keep up to date on the procedures to be followed. Remember that all reporting of RTD's will be in the sequence of day, month and year.

VOLUNTARY EXTENSION OF O/S TUR

Ref: Div0 1300.8B

As discussed previously the main thing to watch out for is that all

prerequisites contained in the order are complied with. The time factor on submission of request is very important. Sergeants and above requests must be forwarded to FMFPac if they are less than 4 months from their RTD. Corporals and below may be approved by this Headquarters up to one month prior to their RTD.

SPECIAL 30 DAY LEAVE

The same applies with this program as it results from extending of a Marines O/S tour. We must have the request for special leave a minimum of 20 days in advance of desired date of departure.

To summarize what I have covered here would be as follows: Know the contents of the required references and follow the procedures that are contained therein. If after you have read and reread the Directive and there are questions in your mindias to what we want, then give us a call here and we will do our best to help you out.

CASUALTY REPORT INC

NOTIFICATION TO NEXT OF KIN

Over two years ago the Marine Corps launched a program of notifying next of kin of wounds received by their family members engaged in combat in Vietman. The program is similar to that, employed by the Marine Corps for notification of death. Since its inception, the impact of our program has been so great on the American public that the other services have developed like programs. Since there is continous public interest in the activities in Vietnam, which is largely due to intensive press coverage, our casualty reporting procedures are designed to lessen, in every way possible, the worry of families of Marines in combat areas, by keeping the families as fully informed as possible, and also, in some degree, to lessen the shock experienced by the next of kin on learning of injuries, illness, or death of loved ones. I am sure many of you have had the delicate task of notifying the next of kin. You know the importance of accurate and complete information in casualty reports.

Gentlemen, our casualty reports must be absolutely correct so that the officer making notification can do his job effectively, with dignity and assurance.

ACCURACY OF REPORTS

Our reports are checked against all existing records, in the parent unit,

DPI locators and medical facilities. The checks and rechecks made, result in

many telephone calls and repeated calls when there appears to be a discrepancy.

In cases of death, the service records must be delivered to the Division CRCC where the prepared death message is reviewed with the service record to assure accuracy. The many checks and re-checks are exasperating to units busily engaged in many other tasks connected with field operations, however,

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we are determined in our task of accurate reporting. Recently, our incessant drive for accuracy resulted in locating several men, reported "Killed in Action", in hospitals, receiving treatment!

TIMELY SUBMISSION OF REPORTS

It is difficult to request "speed" in reporting casualties, and also demand "accuracy", but both are required for effective casualty reporting.

I would like to read to you a paragraph from a recent letter which I received from Headquarters, Marine Corps regarding this subject. Quote "The time established for submission of death reports generally can be stated as "ASAP". It is again realized that, on occasion, difficulties exist in recovery and positive identification of remains, thus necessitating a delay in reporting. Timeliness of such reports cannot be over-emphasized from the standpoint of maintaining a sound and trusting relationship between family and the Corps. Of course, accuracy in this area must always be the primary considerations as the impact of such information on the next of kin is immeasurable and leaves no room for error. Let accuracy and timeliness be your watchwords." Unquote.

Our casualty SOP sets times for submission of casualty reports as:

Death reports - within 12 hours

WIA reports - by 1200 the following day

WIANE reports - within 72 hours

ASSISTANCE GIVEN UNITS BY CRCC

The Division CRCC is equipped to assist units in the collection of information from medical facilities in Danang area. Besides normal telephone lines, we have a radio link with the major medical facilities. A complete casualty report requires reporting body part afflicted, condition, prognosis, period of hospitalization and location of the patient. This information is collected and relayed to the parent unit preparing the casualty report.

Reporting the casualty is the responsibility of the parent unit, however, many times the Marine is hospitalized and we are informed by the medical facility prior to the time the man's parent unit receives notification from the field. In this respect, our casualty reporting becomes a "two way street". The Division CRCC commences preparation of a report on information received from the medical facilities, the parent unit commences preparation on information received from the field. The marriage of both reports results in a completed casualty report.

We, maintain casualty records in the form of a card file of all wounds and hostile injuries reported and a separate card file of all persons, both hostile and non-hostile, medically evacuated from Vietnam. All reports of admittance to hospitals received are recorded. We also monitor and record all evac information from messages received. Our files are a valuable tool and can be used in the location of personnel medically evacuated from Vietnam. We are in business to assist you in your responsibility for reporting casualties. Our task is assuring accurate and timely reports to higher echelons.

IDENTIFICATION OF REMAINS

It is important that all of you are familiar with the process of identification of remains of deceased personnel. All deceased personnel must be positively identified by two persons acquainted with the deceased.

Persons making identification are required to complete a standard "Statement of Recognition" form. Normally it is accomplished at the graves registration section. In periods of intense activity it is advantageous to complete the statement of recognition in the field where friends of the deceased are readily available. No death message is released until the statement of recognition has been completed. It is important that all efforts be made to

complete the identification process as soon as possible. Delay in identification has resulted in late reporting and worse in the deterioration of remains to the point the body is no longer viewable.

PERSONNEL MISSING. MISSING IN ACTION, AND UNAUTHORIZED ABSENCE

The Division CRCC reports "hostile casualties" and the "non hostile" casualties where the physical condition is fair or worse.

"Missing" is a "non hostile" casualty including all personnel involuntarily absent from their duties who are not believed dead.

"Missing in Action" describes all battle casualties whose whereabouts or actual fate cannot be determined and who are not known to be in an unauthorized absence status. Personnel will not be considered "MIA" merely because their bodies have not been recovered. If circumstances definitely preclude the possibility of survival, such personnel are described as "KIA-BNR".

Personnel missing, presumed UA are processed in accordance with provisions of the Marine Corps Personnel Manual for UA.

The individuals parent unit must make the determination in the case of a missing person.

Investigation is required in cases of missing and missing in action.

FORWARDING OF SRB®S OF MEDEVAC AND KIA PERSONNEL

Division CRCC informs units by message of medical evacuation from Vietnam of their personnel. In the same message, authority to transfer the individual is granted and request is made for the delivery of the SRB with original copy of Battalion Special Orders, to be delivered to CRCC within five days after receipt of the message. Service records are forwarded through FLC by courier to Camp Butler. It is important that units drop medically evacuated personnel as notification is received. Otherwise, you are carrying non-effective personnel on your rolls.

Service records of deceased personnel are required to be delivered to Division CRCC with the commanding officer's letter of condolence to next of kin within four days after death. This time is due to requirement of prompt delivery of service records to Headquarters, Marine Corps. The processing of benefits for next of kin are held in abeyance pending receipt and review of service records.

CLOSING STATEMENT

Casualty reporting demands a continuing, vigorous program to insure accurate reports and rapid processing. It is a critical factor which vitally affects the morale and welfare not only of the combatant Marine, but the family and loved ones he has left behind. The Division CRCC is organized to assist you.

DIVISION ADJUTANT

Good morning gentlemen. It is a pleasure to be able to address you personally instead of by messages as I am compelled to do so often.

My comments are generally directed to all adjutants in attendance this morning and primarily concern our joint problem areas.

Before I continue, let me assure you that I am not attempting to direct insults at any organization but only attempting to get the 1st Marine Division as administratively efficient as possible. In order to achieve this goal, it is imperative that each of you be as accurate and timely as possible in your daily functions, with the assistance of the management tools designed for efficiency.

I didn't have much to say at our last Adjutant's conference held on August 29th. However, since then I have been compiling notes replaced to discrepancies. My findings are alarming:

FAILURE TO KEEP COMMANDING OFFICERS INFORMED

I highly suspect that some adjutants are not keeping their commanding officers administratively informed. In this respect, I refer to the numerous adtakes sent by this headquarters to get simple information.

Don't conceal anything from your executive officer or commanding officer because sooner or later the matter will come to light. It's your responsibility to keep your commander out of trouble, administratively.

CONGRINTS/WELREPS/SPLINT

These are not new subjects to the majority of you and I will readily admit that this problem creates our biggest headache. I am sure many of you are exhausted with this problem, but due to its lasting importance, we are stuck with it. These things are taking up our valuable time and

the more effort we apply to the subject, in order to alleviate or reduce it, the more time we will have to devote to other important projects.

In this respect, no problem is too small or too petty to deny an individual his right to seek assistance within the chain of command in an attempt to alleviate his problem, whatever it may be. I surmise that many of our youngsters fail to seek assistance on the premise that no-body is willing to help or wants to be bothered; thus the individual feels his only recourse is to write to his parents who will in turn write to the Congressman, or he may write direct. Essentially, these youngsters must be encouraged, to relate any problem or problems, to their next superior NCO or Officer prior to voicing a complaint to his parents or congressman.

In this matter, I have a few suggestions to pass on which may help to eliminate or at least reduce this problem appreciably:

Personally encourage every individual at every level of command to write home regularly. (I often wonder what happened to our old system of ensuring that a letter was written at least once per week?) It is surprising how many Marines fail to write home, thereby automatically generating an excessive number of WEIREPS, usually filtered into Congress and then to HQMC. I'm sure you can appreciate that wives and parents experience great anxiety day by day, concerning the welfare of the individual. They feel that no news is bad news. Correspondence can also be appreciably reduced, if, when an individual is hospitalized or injured as a result of combat or noncombat circumstances, he relates true facts to his next of kin. We have received numerous WEIREPS

concerning minor non-hostile injuries which were fabricated in letters to the NOK indicating such injuries were a result of enemy action. You can imagine the chain reaction created when the NOK has learned that their loved one has been injured and they were not officially notified!

Another aspect of this problem is that many personnel who are misinformed, write their Congressman or Senators relative to assistance
for a humanitarian transfer or discharge. They honestly believe that
these representatives have the power to do anything. Advise your troops
that such requests must originate from them and are initially handled at
the unit level.

We can also reduce the volume by strict compliance with DivO 1700.5 and the format contained therein relative to informing the NOK of corporals and below who joined your organisation. Added emphasis must be placed on this requirement, particularly to convey to the NOK that the commanding officer has the individual. Although this is a big chore, if we eliminate one CONGRINT/WEIREP, we have succeeded.

To conclude this subject, please rest assured that the Commanding General has taken a special interest in all CONGRINT/WEIREP and SPLINT cases. He personally signs each reply and is advised of the status of each case on a weekly basis. For this reason alone, take a close look at the guidance promulgated by CG's message OhO555Z Oct67 because commencing last week, all such cases are closly monitored to determine the results gained, if any, from this directive.

CORRESPONDENCE

Each organization will periodically receive detailed endorsements from this headquarters outlining specific information required to answer

inquiries. In many, many instances, organizational replies do not meet the specific requirements therefore the correspondence must be returned for additional information. This imposes an additional administrative burden and anguish upon the organization and moreso upon me and my staff. In this respect, upon receipt of correspondence which requires a reply, please compare your answer with each of the outlined requirements to ensure that the information provided is in sufficient detail so that each point involved has been fully answered.

While on this subject, I would like to pass on some information which highly disturbs me. To my embarrassment, I have been advised that some of my subordinate officers and NCO's have been sending written communications, directive in nature, to various organizational commanders. I never have and never will condone such action. Therefore, matters of this nature that do not bear my signature are to be returned to me personally for appropriate action.

CASUALTY REPORTING

In this area, there has been a noted improvement, specifically in areas of timely submission of SRB®s and condolence letters to include timely appearance of personnel to identify the remains of deceased personnel. However, be extremely cautious in preventing erroneous case walty information, for we recently received two official death reports which were erroneous. In both instances, the commanding officers cone cerned were apprised of these near misses and I will leave it to your assumption as to what happened to the adjutants involved. To assist you in casualty matters, a new and comprehensive Division Casualty SOP

(Div0 P3040-10) will soon be published. When you receive it, digest it and Chapter Twelve of the Marine Corps Personnel Manual and your problems will be virtually solved.

CONDOLENCE LETTERS

This is a touchy subject, primarily since such a vast amount of effort is placed into preparation and proofreading. Considering the volume submitted and received, this chore encompasses many man hours. For this reason alone check out the fact thoroughly to ensure accuracy in every detail. To give you a sample of the problems we encounter in this area, I will cite the most significant errors:

In many instances, the phraseology is atrocious which tends to indicate that no real meaning or thought was considered in preparation or composition. Remember, you are preparing a letter of condolence to a parent(s), wife, or other NOK supposedly expressing a true meaning of remorse. If you keep this thought in mind, your letters are bound to improve. Some of the poor examples we cite are:

The beginning of a letter which states: "It is with great sadness that I inform you of the untimely death of your son or husband." This is ridiculous since HQMC has detailed a casualty assistance call officer to personally inform the next of kin many days prior to receipt of the condolence letter.

Also, the cause of injuries leading to death often nauseate me when I read things such as "Your son was ambushed while on patrol. He received severe fragment wounds to the head, exiting through his face leaving massive tissue damage." or "Both legs were blown off by an enemy mine." In this respect, spare the gory details by letting the

NOK remember the Marine as they last saw him rather than visualize a massacred body inside a casket.

Many letters use the term "Your son was critically wounded and died instantly". Don't you feel it more proper to say, "He was mortally wounded and died instantly"? Another prime example is "He died instantly and suffered up pain." Rational dictates that if he died instantly he could not have suffered pain.

Many others contain misspelled words which is indicative of carelessness, or a letter to a sister may refer to "your son", or a letter to a father may state "your husband".

Also, text of some letter is often inconsistent with factual information transmitted on the death message. Since you receive a copy of all death messages, ensure that all facts contained in the message are in consonance with your letter. Keep in mind that the NOK would be very upset if information relayed in a condolence letter was contrary to that which they previously received in person.

In many instances, the individual had been in the organization a very short time: Specifically, less than 8 days in one case. However, the condolence letter stated, "He will be keenly missed"! I am sure you will agree that such a letter definitely lacked meaning and sincerity.

There are many other areas that I have not covered which are marginal. However, I feel that if you apply a little sincerity and ensure the contents are meaningful the bulk of our frustrations will be solved.

In an attempt to help you, I have attached a few sample condolence letters to this brief. If you use them as a guide and the illustration contained in Chapter 12, MCPM, you can't go wrong.

In concluding this subject, insure that all letters bear a type-written date vice a rubber stamp. Unless it's directed within the Marine Corps Family, a date stamp tends to cheapen a letter.

Let's face it! This presents another big headache and brings forth more correspondence that we care to handle. Perhaps this is not within your realm of responsibility, but if not, pass the following information on to those responsible. It bothers me to suspicion that we have ghouls amongst our fellow Marines, but past factors and a recent comprehensive staif study on this subject tends to leave me with no other conclusion. In essence, I suspect some of our people are robbing the dead. The units involved and this Division can be spared much embarrassment if those responsible take immediate action to collect, inventory and properly dispose of personal effects upon notification that an individual has been KIA or medically evacuated. In relation thereto, and in direct connection with condolence letters, let me pass on a word of caution. Make sure when you tell the next of kin that, "John's personal effects have been prepared for shipment and will be delivered to you shortly", it is in fact, a true statement. Recently, three condolence letters which contained this positive statement later proved to be false. Unfortunately, when this command was queried relative to the personal effects that were to have been delivered to the NOK "shortly", everyone concerned was embarrassed because an extensive search revealed that said personal effects could not be located or accounted for.

PURPLE HEART POLICY

PERSONAL EFFECTS

Because many people considered the purpose of the award had been degraded, it became necessary to revise the qualifications for award of the Purple Heart. Under the new policy, certain criteria must be met and must require

treatment by a medical officer. The guidelines have been established in Force Order 1650.?. If your files do not contain a copy of this directive, let me know and I will ensure that you get one.

TWICE/THRICE WOUNDED

This is a rather touchy subject with me, but, in view of the content of MCO 1300.21A, we must, at the present time, go along with the program. However, when time permits, I shall recommend to the Commanding General that a letter be sent to FMFPac to contest the current thrice wounded poincy, which I feel leaves many gaps leading to suspected collusion. Conversely, I have never questioned the twice wounded policy, but many cases in which individuals qualify under the thrice wounded category disturb me to no end. My suspicions are aroused by the fact that after two legitimate hostile injuries become a matter of record, a third injury frequently crops up, having occurred six or more months earlier, which invariably involves a minor wound. In these instances, I scrutinize each such case with a suspicious mind. However, until the issue is resolved, I will continue to accept and honor these questionable thrice wounded reports provided the battalion commander signs the report.

MAIL AND VISITORS FOR HOSPITALIZED PERSONNEL

This is last but not least in the categories related to casualties.

Periodic visits to and receipt of mail is vital to the morale and welfare of our incapacitated Marines. Take care of their needs.

UNAUTHORIZED ABSENCE is a continuing problem which will probably never be solved. Notwithstanding this belief, be sure that your organization informs the NOK when an individual has been UA for a period of ten days. We have been embarrassed on occasion, since this requirement was not met, so keep

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close tabs on this below to avoid getting yourselm trouble. In this regard, the Marine Corps Personnel Manual is your guide.

In this matter of unauthorized absence, there is considerable confusion in making a distinction between a person UA or missing. If a person is suspected as missing under conditions other than UA, I recommend that any contemplated report be held in absyance until such time as an appropriate investigation has been conducted. In this regard, a Division Unit, recently confronted with two unauthorized absences, took the initiative to request assistance from G-2 concerning those absences which were erroneously qualified as missing cases. Not doubting the organizations sincerity in this matter, G-2 directed one of their CIT teams to conduct an investigation. Subsequently, a counter-intelligence report was prepared and submitted to CG, PMFPac, who came back to us for an explanation. We had a hell of a time trying to prepare a reply to correspond with the fact that we goofed.

MISCELLANEOUS

Messages. You undoubtedly wonder why we deal in messages traffic vice telephone calls. Past experience dictates the necessity of this action or documented evidence as a matter of protection. I frowned upon this policy shortly after my arrival but soon changed my mind after I was repeatedly subjected to embarrassment by virtue of false information received over the telephone.

In reference to messages, please use a subject line, in order that we can readily identify the case at hand. This is often omitted.

Emergency/humanitarian leave/PCSO. In this area, and as confirmed by a Division Chaplain, I have gained the reputation of being a "Hard Nose". In this respect I am human and do possess sympathetic tendencies. However, various factors are involved in rendering a decision, which is finalised by the G-1. In these cases, I ask myself the following questions:

Does the request appear valid, particularly when emergency or humanitarian leave will gain a PCSO for the individual concerned who will have less than 120 days remaining on his tour?

Does the request meet the criteria as outlined in the Marine Corps Personnel Manual?

Has the situation been adequately covered by the Red Cross? (In most cases no.) However, in the area of family illness, we will never question a case when the condition and prognosis of a patient is indicated as critical/poor, or worse. These cases result in an automatic approval of emergency leave. On the other hand, many cases we receive suggest that the wife or family members are using a weak excuse in an attempt to get an individual home. Many of these involve anxiety reaction on the part of the family member, allegedly created by the serviceman's presence in RVN. Gentlemen, I and probably most of you in this room are confronted with this same situation. The final decision in the latter type case is disapproval:

Many other cases pertain to marital problems, based solely on a threat of divorce in a letter from the wife. In order for us to make a decision in these cases, the request must be supported by documentary evidence from a lawyer attesting to these facts. Also, it is apparent that many individuals who are really effected with a threat of divorce, are not aware of the provisions of the Soldiers, and Sailors Relief Act which states that a wife may not divorce her husband while he is overseas, unless he consents in writing to such action.

Record of emergency data/SRB/SGLI (Serviceman's Group Life Insurance)
In many instances, particularly involving those WIA or KIA, we find
the record of emergency data is not current. Aside from the fact that

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this poses many problems, to include payment of death benefits, there is no need to elaborate on the importance attached thereto. Take time to ensure that this vital document is current. Also, as a matter of concern, a recent death revealed that a unit had not received a service record book for an individual. Here again, no need for elaboration.

Finally, in the area of problems, an excessive number of SHB is:
lack an SGLI designator sheet, although the individual is paying the
\$2.00 per month, HQMC has a difficult time in making a determination
as to who shall receive the dividend, particularly in cases where
parents are separated or divorced. Keep on top of this problem.

Gentlemen, I've attempted to let you know of our larger problem areas and I know that your's are numerous also. However rest assured that I am always available to assist you, so don't hesitate to contact me when you are confronted with a problem you can't solve.

PROVOST MARSHAI

The mission of the Provost Marshal is to advise the Commanding General and Staff on Provost Marshal and Military Police activities; to employ Military Police in the direction of traffic in the rear area, traffic in the forward areas being the responsibility of the regiments; to provide Prisoner of War collection points in the forward areas at the request of unit commanders, through G-1; to prepare and supervise Military Police training on a daily basis; and finally to plan, direct, and supervise the following Military Police operations:

TRAFFIC CONTROL IN THE REAR AREA

This is accomplished through use of vehicle patrols, traffic patrols, traffic control points, and check points.

CIRCULATION AND CONTROL OF INDIVIDUALS AND STRAGGLERS

This is accomplished through the use of vehicle patrols, walking patrols within the principal villages, check points and periodic checks of personnel seeking to use recreational facilities. Through a cross-reference system, a man detained in the field can be checked through the desk sergeant to determine if he is wanted by a unit for UA, if that information has been provided by the unit. Dissemination of information of this nature is made by the Division Provost Marshal to all law enforcement organizations throughout I Corps by Military Police Alert.

APPREHENSION OF MILITARY PERSONNEL

Those apprehended during the hours of curfew are detained and released to an Officer or SNCO from their organization regardless of the reason for

apprehension. Offenders apprehended during daylight hours may be released to their own recognition depending on the seriousness of the offense and multiplicity of offenses. For example; off-limits, uniform and weapons violates are released on their own recognition. Black-marketers, money manipulators, possessors of marijuana, and those persons UA are released to their organizations. In the cases in which officers or SNCO's are unavailable, written authorization by the 1st Sergeant for an NCO to sign for an apprehended person is accepted.

PROTECTIOD OF PROPERTY AND INDIVIDUALS

Vehicles and weapons are of primary interest. Vehicles found unattended in locations other than military compounds, or areas where security of vehicles is not provided, are impounded for release to the unit. Weapons left unattended in vehicles are also impounded for release to the unit. Weapons can be reclaimed, in accordance with CG mag 152345Z Sep67, from the Division Ordanance Officer. Property of all descriptions is picked up periodically at recreational facilities and checked through the stolen and lost file. Weapons are turned into the supply system. Other items are retained for 60 days and released to chaplains, medical units, or supply as deemed appropriate. Owners are notified in the case of items which bear identification. Where the Vietnamese civilians are concerned, items used solely for war and items which can be clearly identified as U.S. organizational property, i.e. water cans with tactical markings, are confiscated through coordination with the National Police and returned through the supply system.

In all Military Police action the protection of individuals is primarily

preventive in nature in that individuals are ushered through off-limits areas; conversations with prositutes, street vendors, and street urchins are broken up. Troops found riding in vehicles with ARVN, or found in exchange areas with Vietnamese are sent on their way to prevent the purchase of rationed items by unauthorized personnel. Individuals intoxicated, lost, or unable to care for themselves are detained for safekeeping and disposition to organizations and medical channels.

INVESTIGATIONS OF CRIMES

The Division Criminal Investigation Department investigates reported offenses and incidents which are purely criminal in nature such as homicide, rape, robbery, theft, blackmarket, and narcotics.

DETENTION OF U.S. PRISONERS

Owing to the close proximity of the III MAF Brig, detention facilities are not provided by the Provost Marshal's Office. In another circumstances this service would be provided. Our only detention facility is the Desk Sergeant's office wherein personnel detained can be held for short periods only, e.g., over-night.

PRISONER OF WAR HANDLING

Prisoner of War handling is currently limited to the operation of battalion and regimental collection points. This restricted activity is owed to the size of the Division rear area and the responsibilities attending therein. As most of you know, we maintain Prisoner of War compounds in all these regiments. Wherever possible, our own Military Police run the compounds. Otherwise, they supervise and instruct in the running of the compound by troops belonging to the individual units.

REAR AREA SECURITY

Military Police Company participates in rear area security by providing day and night patrols on rear area road nets, by manning the entrances to the Division CP security. Damage control is provided by our cordoning off affected areas as soon as we learn of the damage and then protecting government and personal property and the prevention of looting.

ACCIDENT INVESTIGATIONS

All accidents involving either U.S. and non-U.S. personnel are investigated. Accidents involving U.S. personnel are investigated. Accidents involving personnel with property damage in excess of \$50.00 are investigated. There is a lapsed time of one to four days before accident reports are mailed from the Provost Marshal's office depending upon the nature of the accident. Four days usually lapse in the case of death, or serious injuries involving Vietnamese. Unit investigation officers can be provided with documents reguarding Vietnamese killed or injured by waiting for the accident report or by coming to the Provost Marshal's office. We have and will continue to provide them with as much material as possible in order that they can meet their appointment deadline dates.

MILITARY POLICE LIAISON

It is the Provost Marshal's responsibility to coordinate law enforcement activities with other military and civilian police activities. Surrounding and within the TAOR are: 1st MP Bn on the air base; 3rd MP Bn operating AFP Danang; Air Police; Air Wing Security; National Police (QS); and Vietnamese military Police (QC). The vital area commander is at Hoa Cam Training Center.

In sum, law enforcement and traffic control in the Division rear area extends to the Regimental rear area boundary. Criminal investigations and Prisoner of War handling extends throughout the Division TAOR. Requests for Criminal Investigation Department assistance should go directly to the Provost Marshal's Office. However, requests for Prisoner of War handling should go to G-1.

PROBLEM AREAS FOR PROVOST MARSHALL

Often to much time elapses between the occurrence and requests for investigative assistance, and units often fail to safeguard items of possible evidence. This disadvantages and handicaps the investigator greatly. We need prompt notice.

There is a failure to report UA's and stragglers and to do so promptly. We really have no way of telling if a man is in fact UA; your help here is essential and if possible within the first 24 hours. We have handled Marines and released them only to later learn that they were UA.

Finally, there is the problem of control and discipline. Troops of ten are without complete uniform, and in unauthorized clothing (Vietnamese campaign hats being the most obvious). Often they carry no weapons or ammunition. Without your local enforcement our job is impossible, because we can write men up, detain them and correct them, but in the final analysis these problems can only be successfully solved by yourselves, the unit leaders, by your requirement of those same standards that Marines are noted for. They are your men.

- l. <u>Purpose</u>. To provide guidance and direction for the Provost Marshal and the Military Police Company, Headquarters Battalion, 1st Marine Division (Rein), FMF activities in the Division Tactical Area of Responsibility.
- 2. Provost Marshal. The Provost Marshal is a member of the Division special staff and comes under the staff cognizance of G-1. He is also the Commanding Officer, Military Police Company and therefore exercises operational control of the Military Police Company. The Military Police Company is under the administrative control of the Commanding Officer, Headquarters Battalion for supply, administration and logistics. References (a) and (b) set forth the general duties and responsibilities of the Provost Marshal. Specific duties and functions are:
- a. Advise Commanding General and staff on Provost Marshal and Military Police activities.
- b. Recommend employment and utilization of the Military Police Company.
 - c. Prepare and supervise Military Police Training.
 - d. Plan, direct and supervise following Military Police operations:
 - (1) Traffic control.

- (2) Circulation control of individuals.
- (3) Apprehension of military personnel.
- (4) Protection of property and individuals.
- (5) Prevention and investigation of crime.
- (6) Temporary detention of military prisoners.
- (7) Prisoner of War operations.
- (8) Military Police participation in rear area security and damage control activities.
- e. Coordinate activities with other military and civilian law enforcement agencies.
- 5. Wilitary Police Company. References (c) through (h) provide detailed guidance for Military Police activities. The Military Police Company will provide the following support to the 1st Marine Division as required/directed:
 - a. Traffic control
 - b. Prevention and investigation of crime.
- c. Operation of Prisoner of War collecting points to include evacuation of Prisoners of War from forward collecting points to a central Prisoner of War collecting point.
 - d. Operation of straggler collecting points,
- e. Operation of temporary confinement facility for military prisoners.
- $f_{\scriptscriptstyle \odot}$. Assistance in Division rear area security and area damage control missions.
- g_{\circ} Limited local and internal ground security for Division command post.
 - h. Escort and security for special persons.
 - i. Enforcement of military laws, orders and regulations.
- 4. Requests for Military Police Support

- a. Regiments are responsible for traffic control forward of their rear boundaries. Requests for Military Police assistance will be submitted to Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4 if a special problems arises in traffic control.
- b. Requests for Military Police to establish Prisoners of War collecting points will be submitted to Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1.
- c. Requests for assistance in criminal investigations will be submitted to Division Provost Marshall.
- d. Requests for all other types of Military Police support will be submitted to the Division Provost Marshal.
- e. When a unit requests Military Police support, the requesting unit will be responsible to provide necessary logistic support such as rations, billiting, water and consumable supplies.
- f. Requests for Military Police support should provide the following data:
 - (1) Requesting unit.
 - (2) Time and place to report.
 - (3) Duration of employment.
 - (4) Size of Military Police detachment desired.
- (5) Type of commitment (Prisoner of War collecting point, traffic control).
 - (6) Person to contact for further information.

CAREER ADVISORY

IA

Good afternoon gentlemen my name is Gunnery Sergeant FAIOLI and I am with the Division Career Advisory Section. My topic for today deals with Career Advisory Problem Areas.

The first problem area is the assignment of Career Advisors. As a first step in this Divisions revitalization of the Career Advisory effort the attention of all commanders is invited to review DivO Pl133.1D which is the SOP for Career Advisory. It states that assignment of Career Advisory NCO's on regimental and battalion level be assigned to either MSgt or GySgt and that this be his primary duties. However additional duties such as educational NCO may be assigned to company and battery Career Advisors. Personnel assigned to these duties should be thoroughly screened by commanders for motivation, appearance, and ability and should reflect the commanders concept of the ideal Marine and be mature with a thorough knowledge of the Marine Corps and its functions. In order to permit continuity of effort, personnel assigned as Career Advisors should remain in the billet for a period of at least six months, and be assigned insofar as personnel commitments permit. There should not be any gaps in the change-over of Career Advisory NCO's and a maximum possible snapping in period be required prior to take over.

The second problem area in the Career Advisory Program is the proper processing of scheduled interviews. Career Advisory NCO's are finding themselves trailing far behind in their interviews and this is largely due to lack of cooperation from personnel on section/company/battery levels.

Again I stress the attention of all commanders to review DivO P1133.1D, and comply with it intoffer as combat situations permit. The main objective of

the formal interview method is to provide the individual Marine with complete and factual information relative to the advantages and opportunities of a Marine Corps Career, and to advise and assist the individual with his career planning. As a reminder the initial formal interview will be conducted twelve months prior to a Marines expiration of enlistment. It is at this time that regular enlisted personnel become eligible for early reenlistment IAW current directives. Follow-up interviews will be conducted at 9 months prior to EAS by company/battery Advisory MCO's, 6 months prior to EAS by company/battery Commander's and 3 months prior to EAS by battalion Career Advisors. Every recommended and qualified Marine must be considered a potential reenlistment until the actual time of his separation.

Our third problem area is the drafting of the Administrative Action

Form. Either incorrect or out tated references are being used and in some
instances have no references at all. When options are submitted for a
duty station for which there are specified requirements, MCO 1300.20B is
not referenced and commanding officer's specific recommendations are not
being made. Integration request of reserves are being submitted as reenlistment options. Augmentation of reserve personnel is determined by
numerous factors and each case must be resolved on an individual basis in
accordance with current regulations and directives. Requests are also
being submitted on individuals as a first term reenlistment when in fact
it is his second or subsequent reenlistment. If administrative personnel
would apprise themselves of the current directives to the Career Advisor
Program and become knowledgeable of their contents there would be a
decrease in errors and an increase in effort toward this vital program.

Gentlemen if you will refer in your brief books to the section on Career Advisory you will notice that we have compiled for your convenience important information insofar as it pertains to Career Advisory matters... The first part deals with the elements of Career Advisory and the first element being command emphasis which is the key to reenlistments... The second part deals with Career Advisory Program pertaining to units from commanders on down to squad level ... The third part refers to all Marine Corps Directives to include sections of the Marine Corps Manual and MARCORPERSMAN pertinent to the Carer Advisory Program ... The fourth part deals with reenlistment incentives for west coast and east coast commands and are to be utilized for 1st term reenlistments or extensions of 3 years or more... The fifth part with the variable reenlistment bonus you have the proposed pay scale, the variable multiples figured out for 6 years and 4 years. Reenlistments or extensions and the qualifying MOS's. Also for your convenience we have formatted the essential information required for the elements of a lump sum VRB request, and for an option request. On the last page we have broken down for your convenience a format of the Administrative Action Form, the correct preparation of reenlistment or extension requests which will prevent unnecessary delays in submission or in some cases resubmission. To further assist the assigned Career Advisors we are in the process of reproducing most of our MCO's and Directives pertinent to Career Advisory.

Gentlemen we have discussed some problem areas in Career Advisory as it pertains to reenlistment or extensions. We have talked about three problem areas - First the assignment of Career Advisors; second, interviews; and third, administrative action forms. Gentlemen, the success

or failure of the Career Advisory Program insofar as reenlistments and extensions are concerned rests with the commanding officer and all officers and NCO's within the command.

Elements of Career Advisory Program

1. Command emphasis:

- a. This is the key to reenlistments. The success of the career advisory program is directly related to the amount of command attention and interest it receives.
- b. Emphasis must be strong enough to reach to all echelons of command.
 - c. Include the following:
 - (1) Commanding General's/Officer's Conference
 - (2) Letters from Commanding Ger al's/Officer's
 - (3) Adjutant Conference
 - (4) Career Advisory Conference

2. All hands effort:

- a. Commanders of themselves reenlist few Marines. The commanders provide the impetus and support but the reenlistments are gained by leaders at the lower echelons of responsibility.
- b. To be successful the career advisory program must have the active support and participation of all leaders and supervisors.
 - c. A low level, day to day effort will provide the best results.
- d. If small unit leaders are to produce maximum results, they must have a good knowledge of incentives and options. This requires a briefing or short training session.
- e. The briefing will also bring the Marine Corps as a career back into the proper perspective. We know it's a good career, but a reminder of the advantages doesn't hurt.

3. Good career advisors:

- a. A full time career advisory NCO is required at the battalion and squadron level and full time career advisory officer at the major command level.
- b. These Marines must be highly qualified. No matter what the career advisor says to the prospective reenlistee, he is really saying "Stick around and be like me." Marine Corps Order 1133.2F states that the career advisor should be the commander's concept of the ideal career Marine.

- c. Continuity is necessary for the career advisor to be effective. We should strive for six months in the job.
- d. Major commands should have a small, mobile team of highly qualified career advisors who can make a continuous swing through the units of the command to provide assistance, stimulate interest and evaluate programs.

Early interviews:

- a. The reenlistment process actually commences as soon as the Marine chlists. Within each unit; the reenlistment process should start as soon as the man joins the unit. A reminder of the career advisory program and the benefits of a Marine Corps career should be included as part of the initial indoctrination. This is a soft sell.
- b. The first formal interview should be given 12 months prior to the Marine's EAS. The lowlevel, day to day approach won't succeed unless interviews commence early, are continuous and are baloanced between formal and informal.
- c. Prepare interviews require a detailed knowledge of incentives; however we do not want to forget that the initial inclination for reenlistment is generally built on the intengible incentives: pride, the chance to be a leader, esprit, prestige.
- d. The benefits that hold the greatest appeal differ with each man. An important part of the interview cycle is to lisen and find out what the man's goals and aims are what appeals to him.

CAREER ADVISORY PROGRAM

UNIT PROGRAMS

Career advisory programs will vary from unit to unit. Each commander must adapt his career advisory program to fit the local situation. For this reason no precise rules can be established for a successful retention effort; however, the following guidelines are published for use by commanders in developing and maintaining career advisory programs:

- 1. Ensure personal command attention and supervision at all levels.
- 2. Search out and correct any areas of leadership, administration and welfare that may have an adverse effect on reenlistment.
- 3. Ensure that a positive approach is taken toward all requests for reenlistment incentives and options. Forward any reasonable request expeditiously.
- 4. Conduct a through training program for career advisory personnel to ensure precise and complete knowledge of career advisory and related matters. Pay particular attention to knowledge of incentives, both tangible and intangible.
- 5. Conduct periodic training programs for all officers and non-commissioned officers. These, especially on the company level, are the ones in most frequent contact with the potential reenlistee and are the ones that will bring success or failure to the retention program.
- 6. Achieve a balanced approach between the more formalized interviews conducted by the career advisory personnel and the informal talks by small unit leaders.
- 7. Commence reenlistment interviews when a Marine reports in and schedule them periodically during his time with your organization.
- 8. Assign career advisory noncommissioned officers on a full time basis at the battalion/squadron level.
- 9. Assign a command level career advisory officer on a full time basis with sufficient assistance to conduct training, coordinate the program, and reinforce the reenlistment efforts of the lower echelon career advisors.
- 10. Evaluate personnel assigned to career advisory billets to determine that they have the necessary qualifications. Personnel assigned as career advisors should meet your concept of the ideal career Marine.
- 11. Ensure that personnel assigned to career advisory billets on an additional duty basis have sufficient time available to do full justice to the assignment.

THE INDUSTRIAL RELATIONS PROGRAM

Good Morning, Gentlemen. I'm Captain KINDER and the purpose of my briefing is to acquaint you with the Imhustrial Relations program for the 1st Marine Division for which I am the Industrial Relations Officer.

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The mission of the industrial relations program is an important one and it directly coincides with our mission here in Vietnam. Through the use of local national civilian employees, this Division has a means of augmenting its manpower resources by permitting the fullest utilization of Marines in combat essential tasks. Therefore the employment of these local national civilians should be simed toward the releasing, replacing or supplementation of Marines. Although this is the primary mission of the program, there are certain other beneficial side effects being derived from it that will in the long run benefit the Republic of Vietnam and make a substantial contribution to our overall efforts here.

Some of these side effects include the training of unskilled workers both on the job and in special classroom situations. By its very nature in that this program requires something in return equivalent to what is given, we are building a sense of pride and self respect for many of the Vietnamese, which is evident in their work and overall production. Considering that we have over 1200 employees in this Division and when we multiply this figure by the number of relatives and friends they may have or possibly support, it then becomes obvious as to the relative importance of this program.

We employ four categories of employees, which are: appropriated fund, non-appropriated fund, vendors or concessionaires, and housemaids or personal service type employees. The only type for which there is a ceiling are those employed under the appropriated fund.

Some of the jobs being performed by these people are depicted on the board ower there (point). They show both unskilled and skilled or "white collar" type workers. They include kitchen helpers, laborers, carpenters, electricians, clerks, interpreter/translators and administrative assistants to mention just a few.

Some of the basic references that established and presently direct this program are shown here. (Chart V-A)

This next slide will show the organization of the industrial relations program. (Chart V-B)

Through the agreement between III Marine Amphibious Force and the Commander, U. S. Naval Support Activity, Danang, we follow the administrative policies and procedures that emanate from the Industrial Relations Department in Danang. Our Division ceiling is authorized and controled by III MAF as is fiscal control. Currently, our ceiling for appropriated fund employees is 661.

My office is under staff cognisance of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1. My responsibilities include the following:

- a. That LNC's are not hired in excess of authorized ceilings.
- b. That all disciplinary action taken against LNC's is reviewed and approved should that be the case.
- c. Negotiate the settlement of all grievances submitted by LNC's in accordance with established procedures.
- d. Reviewing, approving if appropriate, and forwarding all administrative matters to the Industrial Relations Department in Damang.
- e. Acting as the labor management advisor for all units of the Division.

- f. Scheduling training for LNC's and Marine supervisory personnel.
- g. As directed, prepare changes or modifications to existing personnel authorizations and coordinate requests from subordinate commands for changes in their ceilings.

All unit commanders who employ LNC labor are required to appoint a unit Industrial Relations Officer who is responsible to:

- a. Insure all LNC's have a current and proper security clearance.
- b. Maintain close liaison with my office on all LMC matters.
- c. Supervise, control and administer all Vietnamese employees employed by his unit.
- d. Submit administrative matters to my office for review and approval.

 After the hiring process, employees are then assigned to supervisors

 who deal or should deal directly with the employees.

Other responsibilities relative to this program include the Division Provost Marshal who has the responsibility to establish a pass and badge system as well as entry requirements for Vietnamese working aboard our bases. The Division Exchange Officer maintains cognizance over all vendors, concessionaires, merchants and barbers. The Division Surgeon has the responsibility to establish and enforce sanitation, medical and examination standards for LNC employees.

The security clearance required of all Vietnamese employed by the Division is called the MSS Clearance and it is obtained through the Military Security Service in Danang. This service is performed by Vietnamese security agents who run a background investigation on applicants. For the most part, this agency is funded for by the U.S. Government. Since there is often a considerable lapse of time between the initial

request and the final clearance (the time varies from two weeks to over three months), the use of a waiver has been authorized in the past under the provisions of MACV Directive 690-2. I have been discouraging the use of this waiver throughout the Division, however, in certain emergency type situations that prevail in the outlying areas, these waivers have been approved when properly signed by either the unit commander or his appointed industrial Relations Officer.

Other regulations relative to these employees which appears in Division Order 12000.1 require that all employees are subject to search at any time while aboard a base. Any property other than their normal personal property being carried on or off a base will be accompanied by a properly signed pass and any employee suspected of a security violation will be apprehended and turned over to the unit IRO for disposition.

Generally, speaking, we have not experienced any major problem areas in this program and we've received good cooperation from the unit IRO's throughout the Division. I would ask that your unit IRO's review and sign all requests for personnel action (standard form #52) before they are submitted to my office. I realize that the unit IRO's are pretty much tied down with their primary duties and consequently delegate much of their authority to their NCO assistants. However, since these forms are used to effect promotions, disciplinary actions, and dismissals to mention a few, I feel it is necessary that your unit IRO signify his approval since he has been designated the responsible officer.

Another area that occasionally concerns us has to do with employee relations. From time to time an employee will come directly to our office with what amounts to a relatively minor problem or complaint. These may include personality clashes, unfair supervisors, transportation difficulties


and so on. In most of these cases, we've found that the employee failed to discuss the matter with his unit supervisor or IRO and had he done so, it would have been readily solved or settled within the unit. Since these people do provide something in return for the money, time and effort we expend in their behalf and since upon employment they become a part of your unit, I only request that they be made to feel a welcome and essential part of your organization, at least until they should prove otherwise. In the meantime, my office will continue to assist you in any way we can.

At this time I'd be happy to answer any questions you may have concerning the Industrial Relations program.

DIVISION CHAPLAIN

VI

This presentation will consist of a brief overall picture of the chaplain situation in the 1st Marine Division, a brief description of the many ways in which a chaplain may be utilized in the units to which he may be attached, and finally some closing notes of importance.

The 1st Marine Division currently has an allowance of 29 Chaplains to serve the needs of 24 major units. Twenty are Protestants, eight Catholic and one Eastern Orthodox. 28 of these men directly support the Division: the Eastern Orthodox is expected to cover the entire III MAF area and Okinawa.

Generally, the chaplain symbolizes - or should symbolize - the spirit of religion, always and everywhere. This spirit of religion is the strongest support for the convictions that differentiate our American forces from the Communists. The Communists are officially atheistic and regard man as an animal to be herded and killed at will. Americans are, officially at least, theistic and regard man as having a soul as the origin of his intellect and will; and believe he is endowed with natural rights to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. We are here in South Vietnam to protect those basic rights of man for the Vietnamese and ourselves. So you can readily understand the importance of the chaplain in the military.

Let's take a quick look at the duties for which the chaplain is trained and the various ways in which your chaplain can be utilized, over and above these basic duties.

CONDUCTING DIVINE SERVICES

First, the conducting of divine worship is the primary part of the

religious ministry of the chaplain. Not only is he directed to conduct his religious ministry in the manner prescribed by the church in which he is ordained, but also he is responsible for setting up appropriate coverage for those of their faiths; he must do all he can to see that their religious needs are also met as adequately as possible. It is important to realize that, in our combat setting, this portion of his mission can be accomplished on any day in the week, not only Sunday, when the Chaplain is able to visit the men in various units of his command.

PASTORAL VISITATION

The second duty of the chaplain is that of pastoral visitation or "making the rounds". The chaplain should be expected to visit and know his men. This has the double result of keeping alive and awake their religious sensitivities, or home and church inspired consciences; then, if difficulties arise, the chaplain is known to those who are in need.

COUNSELING

Third, the counseling abilities of the chaplain can be of value and should be efficiently used. "Tell it to the chaplain" has often been said in jest, but there is a serious overtone. There are several ways in which the haplain's training and talent may be used in counseling.

- a. Men with conflicts or problems of adjustment may be sent, often quite advantageously, to a chaplain.
- b. When personnel problems arise in families in CONUS, the chaplain can draw on experience, wisdom and sympathy to help such Marines.
- c. At least one battalion employs the counselling ability of the chaplain by routing "office hours" cases to him. Facetiously I might say that the very threat of this is a deterrent to misbehavior in itself.

d. While the chaplain must never become merely the "agent" of the Commanding Officer, he can often be of help where there are impending problems in morale.

PERSONAL RESPONSE PROGRAM

A fourth use of the chaplain can be found in the Personal Response

Program. Division Order 5710.3 sets up guidelines for the establishment of

Personal Response Councils. It is appropriate to have the chaplain be a

member of this council although he should not be the cognizant staff

officer. All chaplains are prepared to assist this program by giving two

lectures:

Religiously Based Customs of Vietnam
Religions of Vietnam

The chaplain can also assist in training other officers and NCO's to give these lectures and to participate in discussion groups on these subjects.

CIVIL AFFAIRS PROGRAM

Fifth, the chaplain can be of value in the Civil Affairs Program. Once again, the chaplain should not be appointed the Civil Affairs Officer but can and should be used in an advisory and aiding capacity. The chaplain will often have special knowledge concerning schools, orphanages and religious institutions in general; these institutions are frequent recipients of our charity in the Civil Affairs Program.

DISCUSSION GROUPS

Lastly, the chaplain may desire to establish study groups; he should be encouraged to do so. Depending upon the educational background and talent of the individual chaplain, various kinds of discussion groups may be started. Some of them are: marriage classes, Bible Study, depth discussion

groups and studies on various religious subjects.

CLOSING NOTES

Command Support of Chaplain. The first of these closing notes is concerned with command support of the chaplain's program. This takes the form of firm backing by attendance at divine worship by the Command and Staff (even occasionally), including the chaplain in regular staff meetings, and in providing transportation for the ministry of the chaplain. Occasional private meetings with the chaplain to discuss morale, particular problems and policies can often be most helpful.

Negatively, the chaplain should not be burdened with collateral duties, for the wise commander will recognize that the chaplai often will be covering an area for divine services wider than the unit's TAOR. He will be caring for CAP units which are OPCON and ADCON to III MAF since III MAF is not assigned sufficient chaplains to offer coverage. In another instance, the Catholic Battalian Chaplain is usually responsible for the care of the Catholic personnel in the entire regiment.

Relation of Unit Chaplain To Division Chaplain. Each chaplain is assigned by the Division Chaplain and is expected to keep in constant touch with the Division Chaplain. Unless involved in operations or prevented by some unusual circumatance, every unit chaplain is expected to attend a weekly meeting/training session conducted by the Division Chaplain on Wednesdays at 1000. Most chaplains combine this meeting with visits to their men located in the Medical Battalion Hospital, the NSA Hospital and the brig. The Division Chaplain also sights all fitness reports before submission and stands ready to advise a unit commander in their preparation when desired.

Employment of Chaplain in a Combat Situation. This has been a very "touchy" subject since the death in action of Chaplain Vincent Capodanno. The guidelines as determined in Division Order P1750.3B, Section 701 still hold. Negatively, the chaplain is not to move out with company-sized units in an effort to contact the enemy. As a positive understanding, the chaplain is to be located generally with the battalion aid station when this is an evacuation point for casualties or with the battalion command post.

In conclusion, the Division Chaplain hopes that the Command will provide an environment is which the chaplain can perform with maximum effectiveness as a man of God and contribute to the morale and effectiveness of each unit to which he is assigned.

INFORMATIONAL SERVICES OFFICER

"Oh would some gift the giftie gie us ...

To see ourselves as others see us" _____Robert Burns

This fierce combat correspondent represents ISO as we see ourselves.

More important, though, and an excellent way to introduce you to the functions of our office is to see ISO as others see it.

Higher headquarters view us from the point of view of material we prepare for their release to the news media--about 2000 written news releases; 300 news photographs; some motion picture footage; and 300-400 tape recorded interviews per year. This material is released to the news media by III MAF and HQMC in support of the Marine Corps Public Information Program.

Recruiters and smaller newspapers regard ISO as the source of hometowntype news. I'll talk more on this later. For now just note that we put out about 40,000 stories a year and with your cooperation could double or triple that total even though our present achievement in FHTN tops the Marine Corps.

The Commanding General wiews ISO as the coordinator of press activities within the TAOR, and, of course, as the staff section responsible for recommending and implementing public information policies.

The manner in which the various functions involved in informational services— the things that ISO does, and the things that your organizations are expected to do in support of the Marine Corps information program will be defined for you quite clearly in the Division Informational Services SOP which is on mats now, and should be in your hands in the near future. You

will find that, among other things, it consolidates in a single reference most of the miscellaneous instructions on public information which you have been receiving fragmentarily.

There is, in your briefing folder, a chart listing the fleet home town news participation of the various Division units. Participation varies from battalions which have submitted over 3500 releases on their personnel to some which have not achieved even a hundred. It is such a simple program that lack of results can only be attributed to lack of effort. Each of you has been given a fleet home town news form. Look it over. You could fill it out in about 2 minutes. In two minutes, I could have filled out forms on as many of you as are here. That's all it takes when your unit has awards, promotions, and so forth to get the fleet home news requirement taken care of -- 2 minutes. How do you suppose these high scoring battalions do so well? It's simple. When personnel report in, a FHTN form is part of the check in. The battalion has mimiographed a standard release which is attached to the forms and sent to my office. The release is brief and simple. Blank has reported for duty with the such and such battalion, such and such regiment, First Marine Division, near Danang, Vietnam. The battalion is involved in military operations against Viet Cong and North Vietnamese forces and has conducted 21 such operations so far in 1967. The battalion is also active in Civic Action support for the Vietnamese civilian population, including medical care, road building and assistance to local schools ... something like that.

Seeing that the FHTN program works is one of the duties of your Battalion TICO (Technical Information Contact Officer). He's your ISO and

every battalion is required to have one. He also will make arrangements for reporters who visit your unit, and notify me if there is some newsworthy event which will occur in your unit. Needless to say, your TICO should not be frequently switched, and should be an officer in a position to know generally what is going on in your unit—an S-1, Adjutant, S-3 or the Sergeant Major. Included in your briefing folder is a handout "Tips for TICO's" which discusses his duties.

When really significant activities occur, such as major operations, reporters will be visiting your units. ISO will attempt to insure that you are warned in advance, and if III MAF hasn't assigned them an escort to see that they don't get lost on the way, he will. When they're in your area, see that they're briefed so they'll have enough background information to accurately interpret the events they observe and will report on. Provide them billeting and messing if required, and help them as much as you can with transportation. To most of you it may seem strange that the press is so well-treated in Vietnam, and it seem strange to me, too; but the MACV and III MAF directives on this matter are plain. When you receive the Division Informational Services SOP you will find in it the specific instructions concerning relations with civilian correspondents, rules for briefing and assistance to them and so forth. It will also contain some instructions concerning indoctrination information which should be given to incoming and departing personnel concerning their relations with correspondents.

In addition to civilian correspondents, there will be Marine combat correspondents and photographers visiting your unit. They will be from my office, from III MAF, from Leatherneck and, occasionally, from HQMC. They're

on our side. See that they, too, are adequately briefed and assisted in covering your activities and that some sergeant doesn't grab them up and send them on a sand-bag filling detail as the news story of the year is going on elsewhere in your TAOR.

In closing, let me hearken back to some of the material I presented at the start. As others see us, the lst Marine Division leads III MAF in Fleet Home Town News releases and in written releases. We have a good reputation with the press for prompt and cordial assistance to them. The success we've had and will have all hinges on your efforts. ISO is just the middle man. We collect up the FHTN's and check them and send them in. We round up the reporters and send them to you. If they are satisfied with their treatment, it's because of your efforts. We send our combat correspondents to your units, and they turn in a lot of stories. They do so because you let them move about freely to get the news. There are individual deficiencies in some units, to be sure, but I have no doubt that they're only temporary, and perhaps this meeting will set everything straight. But generally speaking, I'm well satisfied with your efforts, although like Walter Reuther or the United Auto Workers, whenever I'm asked what it is that I want, always promptly answer, "More."

Subj: Tips for Technical Information Contact Officers (TICO's)

Encl: (1) Quarterly Inspection Check List

- 1. Your assignment as a TICO for your unit has undoubtedly simply added to an ever-growing list of your additional duties. If you will occasionally review this memo and the Division SOP for Informational Services, you will find that you can accomplish your TICO responsibilities with relatively little difficult.
- 2. Keep Informed. You must know what's going on in your unit in order to adequately perform your job; your job as TICO is, in short, to insure that your unit and the men in it receive public credit when credit is due. Promotions, heroic actions, unit achievements, personal sacrifices, and the like should not go unrecognized outside your immediate command. They represent news, and there is an outlet for every item of news. If it is a major event, it may be appropriate for release to, or perhaps coverage by the civilian correspondents here in Vietnam. It may be appropriate for the Sea Tiger or for Stars & Stripes. Perhaps it should go in Leatherneck or the Gazette. Perhaps it is of interest primarily to newspapers and radio stations in or near a Marine's home town. If it is news, however, there is an outlet for it, if it is provided to the news media promptly. If it is delayed, it is no longer news, but history. Inform the ISO as soon as a newsworthy event has occured, or better still, inform the ISO ahead of time when the event is a scheduled rather than spontaneous occurence.
- 3. The fact that a Marine is serving with the 1st Marine Division is news in his home town. You should familiarize yourself, as TICO, with the Fleet Home Town News Program. When a Marine checks in with a company in your unit, his filling out of a Fleet Home Town News release form (NAVSO 5724/1) should be a routine part of his "check-in" procedure. A little before Christmas, another form should be filled out and forwarded so that people in his home town will be reminded that he's serving here in case they wish to send him a card or a gift. In addition, should he be promoted, descrated or commended, a home town news release is appropriate. As a rule of thumb, you will be doing you job in the home town news department very well if you report on about 20 percent of the members of your command each month.
- 4. You will find that the officers of your command are perhaps less interested in the home town news program than the troops. Most, however, are interested in at least an occasional release to their college alumni magazine or to fraternity publications. Encourage them, particularly when they're promoted or decorated. Be sure to have the name of the college and the name of the alumni or fraternity bulletin on the form. The year the subject graduated is also useful.

- 5. In infantry battalions and regiments, an ISO writer is normally assigned from the Division Informational Services Office to assist TICO's in covering activities such units and of the supporting arms which are under thier operational control or attached to them. During combat actions, he may be busy working as a combat correspondent, but at other times his main function is to simplify your liaison with the Division Informational Services Office. Use him! Remember, though, that in reinforced battalions, the battalion TICO should look out for the units attached and insure that anything newsworthy involving them is brought to ISO's attention.
- 6. Other units will rarely have an NCO from the Informational Services Section assigned to assist them. Their communications with, and proximity to the Division Headquarters, however, makes liaison with the Informational Services Section relatively easy. To arrange coverage or to tip off the ISO on a forthcoming newsworthy event, just stop by or phone (1st Division 41/141).
- 7. When correspondents require technical information, or wish to visit your command, the ISO is likely to call you either to get the answer or to make the local arrangements. Be sure you understand your CO's requirements in either instance. He may want to look over the response you're planning to make, and he is certain to be interested in reporters wisiting your command.
- 8. Your efforts as TICO will be subject to quarterly review during the ISO staff visit to your command. A copy of the inspection check-list is attached as a useful guide. From it, you can readily ascertain many of the things which will make your efforts as a TICO productive.
- 9. One more thing. Insure that you have readily available a biography of your Commanding Officer and a few 4x5 photographs. If your unit does anything spectacular they will be needed right away. The best picture is a head-and-shoulders photo of the CO uncovered, in utilities, standing against a plain background. In addition, if your CO is a colonel, check with him to insure that he is aware of the requirements of MCO P5720.44, paragraph 2010. It requires him to file with CMC (Code AG) a current biography and official photograph. CMC sometimes sends letters to officers who are delinquent in this regard, and you as TICO, should insure that you boss doesn't get one. If you find your CO or any other colonel on your unit's rolls who has not provided an official biography to CMC (Code AG), inform ISO, and a writer will be sent down to obtain the necessary information and write one. It will be returned for approval to the subject and then forwarded to CMC (Code AG).

SPECIAL SERVICES

RAR

Marine gets a chance to remove himself from the tension and anxiety of war.

In order to fulfill this objective a system has been evolved and promulgated in the monthly RAR bulletin. At the very basis of this system is the requirement that units submit their nominees for RAR to the Division Special Services Officer, six days before each flight departs; sconer if possible.

The format for the rosters required is shown as an enclosure to the monthly RAR bulletin. No other agency should be a recipient of RAR rosters; this precludes the habit of sending information copies or original copies of rosters directly to III MAF RAR Center. Advance submission of individual copies of orders is also prescribed. Advance copies of orders serve no purpose to Division Special Services or III MAF RAR Center.

Another consideration of importance and admittedly pragmatic is the "no show" problem. A "no show" is any person who fails to report at the prescribed check-in time. "No shows" cause problems, particularily if it involves a wife left stranded in Hawaii. The presumption is, that a man properly booked will be at the R&R Center by the prescribed check-in time. When he fails to appear the following questions arise:

- (1) Where is he?
- (2) Who will fill the seat left vacant?
- (3) Has a wife been denied the pleasure of her husband's company?

 Legitimate reasons for "no shows" do exist. Last minute cancellations

 can be called into the DivSSO or III MAF R&R Center. When cancellations

are not called in, a "no show letter" is sent for two reasons: (1) to inform the unit commander that one of his men did not appear at the right place at the right time and (2) to discover any flaws in the R&R system that might deprive a man of his entitlement to R&R. If administrative errors deprive a man of his entitlement, then the administrator responsible should be held to count for the misdeed.

In addition to our normal allocation of quotas we can acquire many more. Keep a pool of standbys ready for R&R on 12 hours notice. This can be very beneficial; you can use it as a reward system, or morale booster. If you can give us names we can get you quotas, in most instances.

MAGAZINES, NEWSPAPERS, AND PAPER BACKED BOOKS

Magazines are purchased annually with appropriated funds. The possibilities of this program as a morale builder are great. We need your requests by the 15th of December so that we can assemble the information and generate a contract. When you order magazines consider that they are to support your entire unit. Be liberal in your requests. A basis for ordering is one copy for fifteen men. If you haven't already submitted your request, use the form provided in the briefing packet; if you wish to change your order send us a new request and mark it as a resubmission.

The Stars and Stripes and the Sea Tiger are distributed by U. S. Mail, on the basis of one copy for each five men. If you are not getting your copies, check your mail clerk. If no flaws are found there call Division Special Services Office. Paper backed books are received at the rate of 5600 per month. We try to distribute them based on unit strength. We won't, however, break open a box to fill orders. This is to preclude Division Special Services from keeping the good ones and short change the units.

16MM MOTION PICTURES

The 16mm motion picture program presently provided by the Army & Air Force Motion Picture Service has been the subject of much controversy. The most frequently cited complaints are that the artistic quality and quantity of the movies are inadequate. Quantity and artistic quality are beyond our power to correct. The physical condition of the movies, however, is a matter susceptible to correction, by having a trained projectionist, and a good projector.

stance it will outline several procedures for the conduct of the system.

One definite point of emphasis is that each film may be shown only one time per film account. This means that you can't show a movie in the officer's club, the SNCO club, and the enlisted club, on the same night, if you have only one account. Swapping movies to avoid TV fillers is also prohibited. If you want additional accounts call DivSSO.

The Army Logistic Command is supposed to provide one projector for each film account number. Fattalion sixed units are supposed to have projectors on their T.E.. Apparently these sources are inadequate to meed the demand. Accordingly, we must solve a problem; shall special services tuy projectors? We have in the past purchased Bell & Howell automatic threading machines. They are not adequate and have destroyed more film than they have shown. Accordingly, I propose to submit the matter to the Recreation Council on 16 December. The important questions to answer if the council decides to buy motion picture projectors are: how many shall we buy, and for whom shall we buy them?

SPECIAL SERVICES OPERATIONS

Complex as it may be, technical precision in managing a special services operation is man'atory. The key to a successful special services operation sunit participation. In order to he'p the user understand what is presently available in the recreation fund we have prepared the catalogue that you will find in the briefing packet. The preface to that catalogue is worthy of note, for it poses questions that must be answered before we managers can begin to respond to your needs in an intelligent manner.

Property accountability is simple. Conduct an inventory on relief of special services officers. Submit certificates of disposition monthly. Investigate missing property according to the JAG manual only when the commander suspects culpability. If you keep a rein on your special services property, accounting will be easy. If your property becomes damaged or in need of maintenance turn it in and we shall get it repaired. We are capable of immediate replacement on some items. Others may take a maximum of two weeks.

Property distribution is a problem that can only be solved by studying demands. As of the present we do not have an allowance list for
special services equipment. I believe that we can develor something
similar to an allowance list. It is necessary if we are to continue to
give you support you need. The determination of what you need can only be
developed by you. The time to do this is prior to the recreation council
and recreation committee meetings. If you can feed me information before
these meetings I can prepare meaningful proposals for consideration by
each body.

Property requisitions are to be sent to Division Special Services in writing. We shall assemble your order and then call you to come and get it, if you prefer to come direct, you will waste time in waiting. If you are far away and unable to come to us, tell us what you want and we will figure a way to help you.

THE CUSTODIAN

The Custodian of the recreation fund is pecuniarily liable for all the money and property on the records. He is not an obstacle, even though he is compelled to supervise the proper negotiation of all the paper work. Please don't let the need for property accountability impede the mission of giving the Marines we lead the best possible support. The Custodian will try to make it as simple as possible for you.

SUMMARY.

We are the managers of your corporation. You are the board of directors. We are obligated to serve you. Your demands, however, must be as factual, meaningful, and complete as possible. With this help we can do any job you want us to do, as long as it supports the mission of special services: Recreation, Welfare, and Morale, for all Marines in this Division.

THE DIVISION EDUCATION SYSTEM

IX -

Good Afternoon Gentlemen:

I am Captain Bailey, your Division Education Officer. During the next ten minutes I will suggest ways for both of us to enhance your Marin s' epportunity to improve their education. To accomplish this aim, the Division Education Office, located across the division access road from Division Legal, performs three basic functions: Counseling, Registration, and Testing.

Our office prevides two tests which serve to gauge a Marine's educational attainments as well as to provide, if he makes a high enough score, a means for obtaining a high school diplema equivalent or college credit. These tests are the High School Level General Educational Development Test and the College Level GE-CIEP (General Examination - College Level Examination Program). To take either of these examinations a Marine is required to complete DD Form 179 and have the educational pre-requisites, which for the GED Test is completion of the eighth grade and for the GE-CIEP is graduation from high school or attainment of a high school equivalent certificate. Marines who fail either of these tests generally may not schoolule a re-test for that examination for at least one year. This rule may be waived if the Marine concerned satisfactorily completes a USAFI course or a course of instruction approved by USAFI. Thus for the Marine with sufficient intelligence and knowledge, those examinations effor the chance to accelerate the attainment of academic credit without having to take certain courses, and as well, they effor other Marines the gateway to collegiate study and better job eppertunities.

Through the Education Office, USAFI effers pre-high school courses, high school level courses and college level courses. Enrellment in these courses, assuming the Marine has the educational pre-requisites, is achieved by executing DD Ferm 305 and paying an initial \$5.00 enrellment fee through a postal memory order or certified check made payable to the Treasurer of the United States. Until a Marine satisfactorily completes his initial course, he may take only one course concurrently.

There after, so long as he successfully completes each succeeding course, he pays no enrollment fee and may take courses concurrently.

A special eppertunity, of which many Marines seem unaware, is the wide selection of courses effered by a number of state and private universities and colleges. Though these courses are sanctioned and largely financed by USAFI, Marines taking these courses deal directly with the university of their choice and are fully enrelled as a corresponding student just as any civilian student. A primary source of information for commanders on these courses is the handbook entitled, Correspondence Courses Offered by USAFI Through Civilian Universities and Colleges, NAVMC 108h. A similar authority for USAFI - Direct high school and college courses is the USAFI Catalogue, thirteenth edition (Rev-65). Both these publications are included along with several of the most important educational references in an enclosure to the handout given you.

A brief enumeration of the tests administered by the Division Education Office in addition to the high school GED and GE-CLEP includes: USAFI achievement (Grades 4-9), and of course examinations, USAFI subject standardized tests and the Army Language Aptitude Test. We do not administer the College Board er Graduate Record Examinations since they are administered by the Naval Support Activity, Danang. For your convenience, application blanks can be obtained at the aducation office for the next CEEB Test to be given on 13 January 1968 and the next Graduate Record Examination to be held on 20 January 1968. The deadline for submitting applications for the CEEB is 10 December, and the test fee is \$14.00 for the complete battery of tests. 5 December is the application deadline for the Graduate Record Exam whose cost is \$12.00 for the entire battery.

It is important to note that though we are willing and capable of providing your Marines with technical advice and assistance on their educational meeds, you have a command responsibility to see that your Marines are informed of the many

educational eppertunities previded by the Marine Cerps. You have the vital and inspiring task of counseling, metivating, assisting, ceaching and encouraging your Marines in their quest for a better education. Your responsibilities are clearly cited in DivO 1560.1A and your briefing handout, but your success in carrying them out depends solely on the conviction and enthusiasm you bring to that great task.

In a word, the Divisien Education Program signifies epportunity for your Marines. If they are to take full advantage of this epportunity, your commands and this effice must forge and effectively practice the spirit of teamwork. Take an active interest in the educational welfare of your Marines, become familiar with DivO P1560.1A, send your education efficers and NCO's to us for frequent consultation, but above all, seek to show your Marines that you really care by frequent personal contact and all the encouragement and assistance that you can give.

SUMMARY OF DIVISION EDUCATION SYSTEM AND ENUMERATION OF UNIT EDUCATIONAL RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. The purpose of the education program within this division is to raise the educational level of personnel within the 1st Marine Division, to increase their value to the Marine Corps, to their country, and to themselves. To accomplish this aim the Division Education Office performs the following three basic functions; Educational Counseling, Educational Testing, and Administration and Course Registration.
 - a. Types of Tests Administered include:

(1) Army Language Aptitude Test

- (2) USAFI End of Course Examinations
- (3) USAFI Subject Standardized Tests

(4) High School GED

(5) USAFI Achievement Tests (Pre-high school)

- (6) G E College Level Examination Program (GE-CLEP)
- b. Registration in following types of courses is administered by the Division Education Office:
 - (1) Pre-High School

(2) High School

(3) Cellege Level (USAFI Direct/Cellege Cerrespendence)

(4) Technical Courses

- (5) Courses from service extension schools
- (6) Speken Fereign Languages
- c. Through its educational counseling, the Division Education Office strives to help Marines evaluate their educational backgrounds with the objective of forming realistic educational goals. Each Marine will receive guidance on what courses to take based on his own decision, needs and academic background.
- 2. The subordinate units of the division have responsibilities which are just as vital to the quality of the Division Education system as are those of the Division Education Office. Without their co-operation the division education system can not assure itself of being truely responsive to the needs of the individual Marine. The primary unit educational responsibilities are as follows:
- a. Submit menthly educational report (Div0 1560.1) to the Division Education Office not later than the fifth day of each month.
- b. Schedule high school and college development testing by contacting the Division Education Officer (Auditor 137) (Personnel should bring mess gear).
- c. Interview all applicants prior to their enrelling in a course to determine proper qualification and metivation (Use MCO P1560.16% as an interview guide).
- d. Prepare and keep on file an Educational Development Record for each individual in the organization who enrolls in an off duty course (Lecally reproduce the format listed as figure 2 of DivO P1560.1A and utilize for this purpose).

DIVISION CLUB SYSTEM

X-

On return to your units each club will furnish free beer to the men at the expense of the Executive Officer and Sergeant Major. I believe that would be a big morale factor within your units. One of the highest priorities of all Commanding Officers, Executive Officers and Sergeants Major is the morale of your men. The Club System helps each unit to attain this goal.

I've been talking to a great number of company commanders and they tell me that it's a great morale factor to come off an operation and find a cold beer waiting for them at their base camp. You could almost say that the three B's are all important to our men. Beans, Billets, and Beer in that order. In the next few minutes I plan on giving you a better insight to the operation of the club system. I will cover the organization of the Division Club System, organization of branch clubs, finances and statements, and future projects. (Chart X-A)

First we have the organization of the Division Club system. In the number one spot we have the Division Club Officer who has the job of insuring policy is carried out by treasurers and branch activities. He is also the purchasing officer for the club system.

Under the Club Officer we have four treasurers who are appointed by the Commanding General. They are responsible for financial records, cash handling, wages, hiring of entertainment, and merchandising. This summer we received approval from Headquarters Marine Corps to set up a Central Service Agency. At this time the Commanding General appointed a treasurer to take over the responsibility of the Central Service Agency. This treasurer handles

all the warehousing of consumable items, and property bought by the purchasing officer. He is also responsible for paying all the bills accrued by the purchasing officer.

After this we have the three separate clubs; Commissioned Officers Mess (Open), Staff NCO, and Enlisted Club. These three clubs are operated independently of each other. (Chart X-B)

The commanding officer is responsible for the operation of clubs under his command. The commanding officer of each unit has to request the opening of the different clubs in his area. After being approved, he then appoints an advisory group, or if he desires, the members of the activity will elect representatives of the various organizational activities to constitute the advisory group. They in turn advise the commanding officer but shall not, as a group, engage in any management or operational duties. The advisory group shall consider expenditures not of a routine nature or that will incur long term indebtedness and then make recommendations for the commanding officer's consideration. The group will maintain a constitution and by-laws for approval by the commanding officer. The proceedings of each meeting of the advisory group shall be recorded and the action taken by the commanding officer thereon will be forwarded to the activity and filed. Copies of the proceedings with endorsements will be forwarded to the treasurer, and area auditor.

The club officer is responsible to the commanding officer to the operation of the clubs. He more or less is the go between from the manager to the commanding officer. The manager is appointed by the commanding officer in writing and a copy of the appointment is sent to the treasurer. The responsibilities and duties of the manager are as follows: exercise overall supervision of the activity; act as custodian of all records and government property

(to include their safekeeping and assure that they are not removed from the activity without proper authority). He is responsible for the receipt, and safekeeping of funds made by the activity and the turning in of the Daily Activity Records along with the funds taken in by said activity to the treasurer at the central office at least once a week. Any time that a manager is relieved there has to be an inventory of consumable stock and activity owned property. This inventory is taken by a board appointed by the commanding officer of the activity.

The treasurer is responsible for coordinating all branch activities.

He is the custodian of all records and Government property; responsible for the issuance of all orders for supplies and equipment; responsible for the receipt, safekeeping, deposit, disbursement, and accountability of the funds; responsible for the proper maintenance of the accounts and records in conformance with accounting handbook for non-appropriated funds; responsible for the submission of all statements and reports required by regulations; and responsible for the preparation of the activity's budget. The treasurers and managers must work hand in hand to accomplish all of their responsibilities.



III MAF has gone to Armac with the problem, and they in turn have gone to Headquarters Marine Corps. All we can do is wait for a reply. I'm



ORGANIZATION CLUB SYSTEM



CLUB SYSTEM

The 1st Marine Division Club System is comprised of three separate Clubs: COM(0), SNCO Club, and Enlisted Club. These three clubs are operated independently of each other, and are headed by treasurers appointed by the Commanding General Responsibility for financial records, cash handling, and merchandising rasts with these treasurers.

The manager of each branch activity is a member of the command operating that activity and is responsible to his commanding officer for properly administering the activity. The managers work directly with the treasurers and at least once per week come to the central office to turn in cash and draw merchandise

Furnishings refrigeration equipment, and snacks are purchased by the Division Clubs Officer from vendors' representatives in Vietnam, Okinawa, Hong Meng and the intellippines. Each branch activity is billed for the merchandise and equipment it uses. This plus wages, mess fund assessments, the cost of maintaining the central office, and the charges for repairing items of equipment are borne by each branch activity. What remains is held on the books until such time as that activity may want to use it for professional entertainment, a free night, or happy hour.

Some information ruge may aid in administering your branch activity more efficiently:

EXCHANGE

BACKGROUND

All exchanges in the Republic of Vietnam are operated under the Army Air Force Exchange Service. All merchandise, supplies, and equipment is purchased by the Central Office located in Saigon and is issued to using activities in the I Corps Area from a Central Warehouse located in Danang.

A percentage of the profits generated by the Army & Air Force

Exchange Service is returned to the Division to help support the Special

Services program. The current donation to the Special Services program

is \$3.00 per man per month.

EXCHANGE OPERATION

The Division Exchange System consists of the Main Office, Main Store and Warehouse complex located in the Headquarters Battalion area with branch stores serving the following units: (Chart XI-A)

5th Marines CP

3rd Bn 7th Marines

1st Bn 5th Marines

3rd Bn 1st Marines

2nd Bn 5th Marines

1st Tank Bn

3rd Bn 5th Marines

1st Motors

7th Marines CP

7th Engineers

2nd Bn 7th Marines

3rd 8" Howitzers (SP)

In addition Mobile Exchange Service is provided to smaller outlying units from the main store, also from the stores located at 2nd Bn 5th Marines, 2nd Bn, 7th Marines and 3rd Bn, 7th Marines. Mobile Air Service is also

available upon request and contingent upon availability of aircraft.

The Army Air Force Exchange Service is the sole controlling agency for concessionaire service (Reference I Corps Coordinator Notice 4066 of 5 June 1967). A wide range of concessionaire service is available through the exchange system, such as barber shops, modern dry cleaning and laundry, tailor shops, watch repair, and photographic processing. For additional concessionaire service or expansion of existing services contact the Exchange Officer at Division 44.

The stock assortment available at outlying stores is limited only by the space available. They will normally have a complete line of health, comfort and convenience items and a limited supply of highly sophisticated electronic items. The normal merchandise inventory for a battalion size store is \$30,000.00 to \$35,000.00 with a regimental sized store carrying approximately \$65,000.00 in inventory.

SUPPORT REQUIRED FROM UNITS BEING SERVED

Division Order 4066.2 of 19 September 1967 sets forth unit Commanders responsibility for support of exchange operations and encompassing the following:

- a. Provide a suitable building to accomodate a branch exchange.
- b. Furnish transportation to the store managers for the purpose of restocking the store and turn in of cash.
 - c. Provide an armed escort whenever cash receipts are transported.
- d. Provide a unit assistant on a full time basis to assist the store manager in the operation of the exchange.
- e. Appoint in writing, a liaison officer to assist the exchange officerminiproviding close supervision of the exchange operation in your area.

It is imperative that the above outlined support be furnished, as the exchange does not have the capability of providing transportation, buildings, and personnel for operating branch stores at the level required by the tactical situation here in Vietnam.

PERSONNEL

All personnel assigned to the exchange, with the exception of Unit assistants, are attached to Service Company, Headquarters Battalion and are further assigned to branch stores by the Exchange Officer. They are responsible to the Exchange Officer for the operation of the branch store in accordance with the requirements and desires of the unit being served.

RATIONED ITEMS

To assist in the control of black market activities, various items sold through the exchange have been designated ration type items. Upon arrival in country each military person should be issued a ration card which states the items that are rationed and the quantity which he is allowed to purchase. Instructions for the issue, control and use of ration cards is contained in I Corps Coordinator Notice 5512.1A and further amplified in Division Order 5512.2.

PROBLEM AREAS.

Limited storage space in each branch exchange severely restricts
the amount of back-up stocks that can be stored, resulting in the
requirement for frequent resupply, this in turn ties up tactical vehicles.
In many cases the non-availability of vehicles for resupply results in
an out of stock condition. Generally speaking there is no shortage of

merchandise only a shortage of storage space and transportation.

Road conditions, especially during the monsoon season cause a breakdown in our resupply. When no vehicle or traffic is moving, it places a severe strain on available aircraft and with the low priority of exchange merchandise it is almost impossible to move merchandise by air.

A severe shortage of qualified exchange personnel makes it mandatory that close supervision be exercised at the unit level as well as from the exchange staff.
