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# 7. (U) 1st Marine Division ARVN Interpreter Program

# a. Significant events.

(1) The following 1st Marine Division ARVN interpreters received Commanding General's Certificates of Commendation during the month of April:

SSgt Mai Ngoc CHUC SSgt Trong Cong DAM SSgt Tang Van CHIEU SSgt Tranh Dinh HOANG SSgt Hoang Ngoc SONG SSgt Ngo Tuan HGHIA

- (2) SSgt Nguyen Van LUAN was recommended for a Bronze Star Medal and a Navy Commendation Medal for heroic actions during two different operations. SSgt LUAN has served with the Division since its initial landing in the Republic of Vietnam and until very recently he had served with the same battalion for most of this time. While serving with the Division he has been wounded in five separate occasions.
- b. Strengths. During the month of April 1968 the number of ARVN interpreters assigned to this Division numbered 113. A six line embossed plate impression roster of these men is contained in TAB B to this section. Godes and format used in these personnel plates is included in 1st Marine Division Order P5312.2B, a copy of which was included in the Command Chronology for the month of March 1968



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### INTELLIGENCE UNIT

# 1. ADMINISTRATIVE UNIT

- a. (U) Services and Support. During the period the unit provided general administrative services for the G-2 Section.
- b. (C) <u>Personnel</u>. During the period the G-2 Section operated with an average of 88% of its assigned manning level of 29 officers and 53 enlisted.
- c. (U) Logistics and Allowances. During the period approximately 40 percent of materials and supplies necessary for the operation of the Section and its attached teams were received as ordered. There is a need for typing chairs and filing cabinets.

# 2. ACQUISITION UNIT

- a. Acquisition section collected information from all areas of interest within the Division AO. AO/VR flights were conducted into the C-3, C-4, C-6, C-7, and C-8 areas and the Reconnaissance Zone throughout the reporting period, noting continued enemy activity.
- b. (1) The Airborne Personnel Detector (APD) mounted in a HU-LE made four (4) missions of the eleven (11) requested. Non-availability of the UH-LE aircraft, malfunction of the equipment, and poor weather caused six (6) missions to be cancelled. One (1) mission was flown using the MPD equipment in lieu of the APD, which was temporarily in a down status.
- (2) The Manpack Personnel Detector (MPD) used in place of the APD equipment was used in support of Operation Ballard Valley within the Mortar Valley/Happy Valley region. The MPD equipment functioned well during the mission.
- (3) The APD missions flown during the reporting period have provided deeper coverage of the western regions in the Division AOR. The APD equipment has been put to the best advantage in determining routes of infiltration and harbor sites.
- (4) The employment of an aerial observer aircraft to accompany the three (3) UH-IE helicopter has allowed the APD mission to continue when ground fire has been taken by any one of the APD aircraft or when a lucrative target is located. The AO simply remains on station to adjust artillery and/or airstrikes called in immediately on the target. This technique allows the APD aircraft to locate the target and continue their mission, while the AO brings fire to bear on the enemy.
- c. Increased ground haze and moisture content in the air during the reporting period has hindered the infra-red missions in achieving better and more reliable results within the Division AOR.

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- d. (1) The 245th Aviation Recommaissance Company, U. S. Army, continues to provide SLAR coverage for target acquisition in flat areas, especially the rivershed area and waterways of Dai Loc, Dien Ban, Hieu Nhon, and Duy Xuyen. Immediate access to SLAR target acquisition continues through the earlier installation of a functioning Data Link Van, manned by 245th personnel. The Data Link Van is expected to continue providing much increased results of target exploitation.
- (2) The 245th Aviation Reconnaissance Company, U. S. Army, continued to provide deep  $\Delta O/VR$  on alternate days in the C-3, C-4, C-6, C-7, and C-8 areas and at the same time has been used for supplementary IR and photo missions with a great degree of success.
- e. Photo Imagery Interpretation Unit: The PIIU continues to support the 1st Marine Division with vertical aerial photography, high and low panaramic photography, photo messacs and various overlays associated with photo intelligence. The intensified infra-red program was greatly reduced this month due to bad weather resulting in only a total of twelve (12) missions being flown in the Division AOR. SLAR missions continued to be flown with 52 missions flown in the Division AOR. During the reporting period, of the 21 missions requested, 8 were received, 8 were cancelled and five are still pending.
- f. Air Observation Unit: During the month of April, the Air Observation Unit flew 236 sorties for 583.4 hours of visual surveillance in the 1st Marine Division TAOR. In conjunction with normal visual reconnaissance missions, the following missions were performed: 8 photo, 28 artillery, and 258 airstrikes. The AO's also accounted for the following: 91 KIA, 117 bunkers damaged/destroyed, 523 structures destroyed, 283 structures damaged, 10 boats destroyed, 4 A/W positions destroyed, 45 tunnels/caves sealed, 650 meters of trenchline destroyed/damaged, and 16 secondary explosions. During the month of April, the AO Unit provided support for Operation Jasper Square and Operation Ballard Valley.
- g. Interrogation-Translation Team (3rd, 9th, and 13th ITT) and Interpretation Team (1st and 7th IT): During the reporting period a total of 15 detainess were interrogated. These were **chassified** as one (1) PW, four (4) civil defendants, seven (7) returness, and three (3) innocent civilians. Number of documents translated totaled 51 batches.
- h. Combat Operations Center: COC-2 continued to serve as a focal point for the receips of spot reports from ITT, CIT, tactical units, adjacent units and higher headquarters. Immediate intelligence requirements generated or suggested by reports, verbal and written, are disseminated to collectors.
- (1) During the reporting period, one (1) enlisted was rotated, while one (1) officer and two (2) enlisted were joined to the Acquisition COC section.

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3.(C) <u>PRODUCTION UNIT</u>: The Basic Intelligence Section continues to maintain background and technical studies, briefings, files on intelligence estimates, enemy units, spot reports, situation reports, climate, population, etc. This information is being constantly updated. Basic Intelligence also continues to receive, evaluate, and process captured enemy ordnance and material.

The Estimative Intelligence Section also disseminated a daily intelligence summary on enemy activity within the 1st Marine Division TAOR.

The following are among the accomplishments of the Basic/Estimates Section during the month of April:

- (1) Completed special projects for CG's use.
- (2) Screened, processed and forwarded captured weapons, plus asserted equipment.
  - (3) Issued permits for the retention of war trophies.
- (4) Initiated intelligence studies of Elephant Valley, Happy Valley, Thuong Due and Goi Noi Island areas.
- (5) Disseminated to lower echelons, 00B overlays pertaining to enemy sightings.
  - (6) Continued updating of intelligence files.
- 4.(C) STAFF COUNTERINTELLIGENCE UNIT: During the period the Staff Counterintelligence Unit (SCI) provided routine administrative counterintelligence service to the Division Staff, the SCI also reviewed and processed the following reports and liaison visits.
  - (1) Submitted monthly rewards fund report to III MAF.
- (2) Processed two (2) Denials and three (3) Terminations of Clear-andes.
  - (3) Granted two (2) Top Secret Clearances.
  - (4) Processed seven (7) Top Secret and two (2) COFRAM Accesses.
- (5) Forwarded to Division Units seven (7) BI's, three (3) NAC's and forty (40) Ent-HAC's.
  - (6) Initiated ten (10) requests for investigations.
  - (7) Processed two (2) case's of possible compromise.

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- (8) Processed three (3) MIA's.
- (9) Conducted four (4) DAME assists.

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# ENEMY WEATHER AND TERRAIN

# 1. ENEMY

a.(C) Main Force. The following Main Force enemy units are located within the 1st Marine Division's AOR: The 31st Regiment was located in the vicinity of (ZC 1758) on 24 April. The headquarters of the 368B Artillery Regiment was reported at (AT 8163) on 28 April. The 1st Battalion of the 68B Artillery Regiment was believed to be in the region of (ZC 1938) on 21 April.

The units within or near Task Force X-Ray AOR are: On 25 April the 6th, 24th, 29th and 90th Regiments were located west of Hue City in Base Area 114 (YD 4620). The 803rd Regiment was reported north of Hue City at (YD 6029) on 25 April. The K-4, K-4B, K-4C Battalions of the 4th Regiment are at (YD 9715), (YD 1501), and (YC 9590) respectively. 4th Regimental Headquarters is carried at (YC 1092).

The C-19th and C-24th Sapper Companies are located east of Phu Loc along Route #1.

b.(C) <u>Local Force</u>. The headquarters of the 402nd Sapper Battalion was located in southcentral Happy Valley (ZC 1762) on 28 April.

The R-20th and V-25th are at present held in the Go Noi Island area of Dien Ban District.

The Q-82nd Battalion of Quang Da is reported to be in the area of (BT 0958).

The 2nd Sapper Battalion is reported to be located in bases west of Hai Van Pass in northern Hoa Vang District.

The 810th Local Force Battalion is believed in the vicinity of (YD 8420).

c.(C) <u>Irregular</u>. Irregular activity in the 1st Marine Division's TAOR continues to inflict more casualties than actual contact with the enemy.

# 2. WEATHER AND TERRAIN.

- a.(U) General. The weekly maximum and minimum temperatures averaged 86 and 80 degrees for the month of April. The average humidity was 84%. The skies were generally cloudy to overcast at night. Rainfall totalled .44 inches in the Danang area during the month of April.
- b. Effects of Weather. The weather for the month of April had effect on air operations in the 1st Marine Division's area.


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c. Effects of weather on terrain. The weather had little or no effect on terrain. Rainfall was .44 and had no appreciable effect on troop movement or trafficability.

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# ORGANIZATION AND OPERATIONS

- 1. (S) During April 1968, Operation Houston continued while three major operations were initiated by the First Marine Division.
  - a. On 10 April, the 7th Harines commenced operation Jasper Square, a one Battalion operation in the Western Go Noi Island area. This operation was initiated based on intelligence reports and recent recommaissance sightings indicating the presence of large enemy forces located in the operating area. Contact was light to moderate throughout the duration of the operation resulting in 54 VC KIA, 2 VC PW, 1 MVA PW, 6 DET and 10 IWC. The operation terminated at 141200H April 68.
  - b. The 5th Marines conducted a two Battalion Sweep on the Phu Tu Feninsula commencing at 081900H April to counter a recent enemy buildup and to deny his rice gathering efforts in that area. Contact during the operation was moderate and resulted in 15 VC KIA, 40 NVA KIA, 15 DET, 1 NTHEE, 14 TMC and 3 CSWC. The operation terminated on 261200H April.
  - c. Operation Ballard Valley, a one Battalion sweep into the Charley Ridge area was conducted by the 7th Larines with the operation initiating on 29 April and continuing into May. Contact during the initial days of the operation was negative.
- 2. (C) The major operations and their controlling headquarters were as follows:

- 3. (U) The four major operations plus extensive patrols, ambushes and other small unit activities accounted for a total of 957 VC KIA, 139 INVA KIA, 13 VC PV, 2 NVA PW, 7 RTNEES, 411 DET, 88 INC and 3 CSNC.
- 4. (C) Normal fixed wing and helicopter support was utilized throughout the month by the Division. Large troop lifts were conducted during operations Ballard Valley, Baxter Garden and Jasper Square. Four Naval gunfire ships fired in support of the Division during the month of April: the USS H.B. Wilson (DDG-8) fired 167 rounds of 5"/54, while the USS Mullany (DD-528) and the USS Cone (DD-866) fired 415 and 423 rounds of 5"/38 respectively. The HMAS Hobert (D-39) fired 158 rounds of 5"/54 in support of Division units.

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#### PLANS

- 1. (S) The Combined Campaign Plan Quarterly Summary and Review was completed and forwarded to III MAF on 9 April 1968. This review is a summary of the accomplishment of those tasks assigned the division by III MAF Combined Campaign Plan 1-68 and outlined plans for further or improved means for implementation of assigned tasks.
- 2. (S) Change number 3 to Operation Order 301-68 was published on 10 April 1968. A rewritten basic order, Annex A (Task Organization), Annex B (Intelligence), Annex C (Concept of Operations), Annex D (Operations Overlay), Annex F (Artillery) and Annex N (Distribution) are included as are page changes to Annex E (Fire Support Coordination), Annex I (Alert/Defense Postures) and Annex L (Communications-Electronics). Changes reflect the new forces assigned and the new dispositions of forces in the division occasioned by the arrival of the 27th Marines and the formation and deployment of Task Force X-RAY. Changes are also incorporated to implement the new instructions contained in CG III MAF LOI 7-68.
- 3. (U) On 13 April 1968 Division Order 3120.20A (Continuity of Command) was published. It provides for succession to command in the event the Commanding General becomes incapacitated and for establishment of an alternate Division Command Post. As the division presently has two Assistant Division Commanders, the senior ADC present and on duty at the Division Command Post is designated first in succession to command.
- 4. (S) On 25 April 1968 change number 4 to Operation Order 301-68 was published. This change tasks units to be prepared to provide supporting fires and reaction forces for the defense of CAP's within their assigned areas and promulgates a new Annex J (Rules of Engagement). The rewritten annex contains updated references and deletes content no longer applicable to the 1st Marine Division. A paragraph on personal property of Vietnamese is added which requires that periodic instruction for all personnel as to the meaning of looting and the penalties provided in the UCMJ for looting, burglary, larceny and housebreaking be provided.
- 5. (S) Operation Order 308A-68 (Waterway Control) was published on 26 April 1968. Revisions reflect unit displacements resulting from the execution of Operation CHECKERS and the arrival of the 27th Marines. Included are the modified areas of responsibility and the realignment of tasks of affected units. Provisions of the new waterway control plan published by CG, I ARVN Corps and promulgated by CG III MAF are also incorporated.
- 6. (S) Operation Plan 108-68 (Defense of the Western Approaches) was published on 26 April 1968. This is a plan to react to a threat by enemy ground forces from the west by conducting offensive operations in RUONG RUONG Elephant Valley and/or Happy Valley/THUONG DUC areas to locate and destroy enemy forces located therein.

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7. (S) Planning commenced on revision of Operation Order 304-67 (Revised) to broaden the scope of that order and incorporate quick reaction alert forces ranging in size from a platoon to a two-battalion regiment. Liaison continues with 1st Marine Aircraft Wing with regard to helicopter support and reaction times. It is tentatively planned to publish Operation Order 304-68 in early June 1968.

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### TRAINING

- 1. During the month of April 1968 28 officers and 261 enlisted men attended formal schools both in and out of country.
- 2. The 1st Engineer Battalion conducted several three-day and one-day courses on demolitions, land mine warfare and booby traps. 239 Marines attended the three-day course and 267 Marines attended the one-day course.
- 3. The 11th Marine Regiment conducted one-day courses for non-artillerymen in the adjustment of artillery fire, 224 Marines attended.
- 4. One officer and two staff NCO's attended a one-day presentation on Mechanical Embarkation Data System (MEDS).
- 5. Scout Sniper School held refresher training, 55 Marines attended.
- 6. A three-day Embarkation class was conducted by Division Embarkation Section and was attended by 1 officer and 41 enlisted Marines from various units throughout the division.
- 7. Division Leadership School graduated 44 officers, 17 staff NCO's and 85 NCO's during April.
- 8. Four officers and two enlisted Marines were sent TAD to the 1st Air Cav Div for cross training in tactics and operations.
- 9. Lay Leadership classes were conducted during the month of April, 92 Marines attended instructions.

# LOGISTICS. EQUIPMENT, AND SUPPLY NARRATIVE REPORT

- (U) 1. The major logistical activity during the reporting period was directed towards the support of combat operations.
- (U) 2. During the reporting period, the G-4 Operations Officer, assisted by other special staff officers, conducted Materiel Management Inspections.
- (U) 3. The conversion program for chrome chambered rifles has continued during the month. The following is a recap of present status:

- (U) 4. Two M51 VTR's and 1 M53 Gun SP have been exchanged under the R&E Program for this month.
- (U) 5. The M109 improvement kit installation is proceeding satisfactorily. Four additional guns have been completed bringing total completed to 12.
- (U) 6. The 105 Howitzer rebuild commenced in April. To date, 5 weapons were exchanged with Task Force X-Ray and 4 in the Danang area.
- (U) 7. A total of 11 Rough Rider convoys were conducted between Danang and Phu Bai by 11th Motor Transport Battalion.
- (U) 8. To expedite the completion of road building work on Highway One between Danang and Phu Loc, a concerted effort to improve traffic control was made during April. Beginning 22 April, convoys were restricted to traveling north on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday; South on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays.
- (U) 9. The 35th Engineer Battalion (USA) continued the upgrading of Route #1 from Nam O to Phu Loc. Two lane traffic is now open for 39.5 of the 51.9 kilometers. Two kilometers have been covered with a 5" base course of  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " (-) rock. Major problem area was the loss of 2100 man hours due to convoy traffic.

- (U) 10. Surface lifts totaled 17 for April. These lifts consisted of 90 vehicles, 378 personnel and 1797.4 short tons.
- (U) 11. Three airlifts for the month moved 3 vehicles, 45 personnel, and 66.9 short tons.
- (U) 12. USS Floyd County (LST 762) disembarked 3 vehicles and 165 pallets of BLT 1/27 follow-up shipping.
- (U) 13. Division Embarkation School was conducted from 1-4 April with 42 students attending.
- (U) 14. Progress of the MEDS system is as follows:

- (U) 15. First Engineer Battalion continued to provide close combat support to the Division. The 7th and 9th Engineer Battalions continued to provide support of a more deliberate nature for III MAF including 1st Marine Division units in the Danang and Chu Lai areas respectively.
- (U) 16. During April, 1st Engineer and 1st Shore Party Battalions received 59 work orders, completed 49, and still have 59 pending.
- (U) 17. The only major cantonment project for April was an enlisted man's club for the 11th Marine Regiment Headquarters.
- (U) 18. A total of 30 aerial road reconnaissance flights were made during April.
- (U) 19. Non-engineer units reported 15 mine and booby trap incidents during this period resulting in 8 detonations causing 3 KIA's and 7 WIA's. Four vehicles were damaged from severely to slightly. Incidents were caused by various types of mines.
- (U) 20. There are now 19 dental facilities providing support to the Division. Of this total, 13 are wooden frame buildings, 2 surgical vans, 2 Ml05 mobile trailers, 1 in a double quonset, and 1 MUST unit. Civic action covered 9 villages and hamlets with dental care given to 901 persons.
- (U) 21. The WestPac Food Services Team concluded their visit on 30 April 1968.

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- (U) 22. Division received 104 insulated food containers from Force Logistics Command. Of these, 53 have been issued to units and remaining containers will be issued as required.
- (U) 23. Adequate rations are now available at FLSG-Alpha and FLC has most subsistence items in stock.

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# ENEMY ACTIVITY

- 1 April 0130H D/1/7 observed fifty to seventy-five enemy in the vicinity of (AT 903667). A fire mission was called and the enemy scattered in all directions. A search of the area revealed one VC KIA and the capture of one AK-47.
- 2 April 1835H Recon team Rock Mat observed forty to fifty enemy moving southwest on a trail in the vicinity of (AT 852502 to 848493). The enemy wore green utilities and carried packs and rifles. A fire mission was called which could not be observed due to a treeline.

2213H - M/3/27 plateon defense position observed an estimated thirty to forty enemy in the immediate vicinity of (BT 048656) with suspected feckets and launchers. The VC were moving northwest. A fire mission was called and secondary explosions were heard. A sweep of the area resulted in one detainee.

2220H - E/2/7 platoon ambush observed twenty-five to thirty lights believed to be flashlights in the vicinity of (AT 85840). An artillery mission resulted in the discontinuance of the lights. Approximately thirty minutes later, five lights were observed moving northwest. An artillery mission was called and the lights were extinguished.

O 100H - 1st FSR/FLC permanent defense position at (AT 936800 and 945815) reported nine to fifteen mortar rounds landing four hundred to five hundred meters northwest of their position. Cap 2-7-4 reported flashes at (AT 923820) and fired three rounds 60mm mortars at those coordinates. Sniper fire was reported coming from (AT 936817). A 15th TC helo fired at coordinates (AT 936817).

0115H - 2/A/3rd Amtrac Bn at (BT 103583) received fifteen rounds of mortar and rockets plus small arms fire. Security was set up.

0115H - Hqs Co/7th Marines defensive position at (AT 968613) received one mortar round and two hundred rounds small arms fire from the vicinity of (AT 972611). Small arms fire was returned and 60mm mortar illumination was used.

0123H - Hq Co/7th Marines defensive position at (AT 968620) received approximately four 122mm rockets from an unknown position.

0120H - Cap 2-2-4 CP at (AT 063575) received ten satchel charges, all landing inside wire, and three hundred rounds of small arms and 50 caliber fire. Cap returned fire, fired 81mm mortars and called an artillery mission.

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0120H - F/2/7 squad combat at (BT 046632-029620-012642) received heavy automatic weapons and 60mm mortar fire. An artillery mission was called and Spooky fired 20mm rounds while providing illumination. The enemy broke contact at 0400H.

0120H - LVT H-6C platoon security at (BT 108582) received fifty to one hundred rounds of mortar followed by a ground attack. An artillery mission was called with negative results.

0120H - Cap 2-2-3 platoon ambush at (AT 928600) while returning to CP observed enemy activity by an unknown number of enemy. The enemy fireD four hundred-fifty rounds small arms and at the same time twelve huts were observed burning in An Hy (H) at (AT 925600). A fire mission was called on enemy escape routes. A search of the hamlet revealed one friendly villager killed and seven wounded. Eight huts were completely destroyed. Villagers reported that two enemy had been killed and that seven were wounded. The enemy fled with their wounded toward Happy Valley.

0130H - Hq Co/7th Marines defensive position at (AT 967618) and (AT 970619) received ten 82mm mortars from an unknown position at a direction of 2450 mils. The rounds impacted in the vicinity of the 3/11 artillery position with an unknown number of rounds landing short of the perimeter.

1555H - L/3/27 platoon combat sweep was led to a ville by a POW at (BT 084672). The POW showed them a cache containing one hundred and forty pounds of G-4, six B-40 rocket rounds and 250 rounds of small arms ammo. Another cache contained one hundred anti-personnel mines, three AT mines, two hand generators for claymores and one large 'rock' mine.

1900H - K/3/7 Co defense position observed twenty-one enemy with packs and rifles, dressed in mixed uniforms moving west in the vicinity of (AT 933496). A fire mission was called resulting in three VC KIA.

2035H - F/2/27 observed fifty enemy moving in the vicinity of (BT 053629). The company called a total of six fire missions resulting in forty-one secondary explosions. Search of the area revealed numerous 60mm and 81mm mortar cannisters, one unidentified fin assembly, and numerous blood trails leading to the river. Aiming stakes were also found.

2132H - K/3/7 observed thirty enemy with heavy packs and rifles moving east in groups of seven to ten men in the vicinity of (AT 927495). A fire mission was called resulting in three VC KIA.

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4 April 1300H - C/1/7 squad combat found two thousand pounds of rice in a hut in the vicinity of (AT 923680). The rice was stored in sixteen large vats. The district chief requested that the rice be brought to his headquarters.

1735H - K/3/7 platoon combat observed twenty VC wearing green utilities with packs and rifles in the vicinity of (AT 922492). An artillery mission was called resulting in eight VC KIA.

1740H - K/3/7 platoon combat observed eight enemy dressed in green utilities and carrying packs and rifles moving west in the vicinity of (AT 926307). An artillery mission was called resulting in four VC KIA.

1840H - K/3/7 platoon combat observed fifteen to twenty-five enemy moving east in green utilities with packs and weapons in the vicinity of (AT 925494). A fire mission was called resulting in five VC KIA.

5 April 1415H - G/2/7 squad combat patrol at (AT 981614) found three bins of rice in the vicinity of (AT 981614). The rice totaling approximately six hundred pounds was buried in the ground around some huts. The rice was destroyed.

1715H - Recon team Rock Mat observed four VC walking east in trail at (AT 827505). The VC wore pajamas and carried packs and rifles. A fire mission was called but could not be fired due to range.


1905H - Recon team Rock Mat observed eight VC in a harbor site at (AT 825505). The VC wore mixed uniforms of khaki and black pajamas and carried packs and rifles. An artillery mission was called resulting in two VC KIA.

2208H - Recon team Rock Mat observed forty VC moving west along Vujia River at (AT 825549) and (AT 820550). The VC wore green utilities with helmets, packs and rifles. An artillery mission and Spooky were called resulting in one VC KIA.

1940H - K/3/7 defensive position observed thirty enemy moving west in the vicinity of (AT 941505). The team called a fire mission resulting in one secondary explosion. Could not observe due to darkness.

2320H - K/3/7 combat base at (AT 925530) received four rounds believed to be 81mm mortar. Rounds landed west of the CF about two hundred meters.

6 April 1230H - Recon team Rock Mat observed twenty NVA moving north across a river in the vicinity of (AT 858549). The enemy wore khakis and green utilities and carried medium sized packs.





helmets and rifles. The team called a fire mission resulting in three NVA KIA.

1345H - D/1/7 squad combat patrol searched a ville in the vicinity of (AT 912674) finding one thousand pounds of rice packed in 105 shell boxes and sand bags hidden in bomb shelters, haystacks and huts.

1900H - K/3/7 platoon combat observed forty VC moving north in the vicinity of (AT 927527). The VC were dressed in green utilities, helmets and flak gear and carried rifles, packs and two mortar tubes. An artillery mission was called resulting in eight VC KIA.

7 April 0950H - Recon team May Fly observed two hundred VC moving east and west at (AT 825465 to 844484). The VC wore black pajamas and khakis and green utilities plus helmets and flak jackets. They carried packs and rifles. The team called gunships and a fire mission resulting in fifty-one VC KIA.

1430H - Recon team May Fly observed five VC moving into a hut at (AT 831459). The VC wore black pajamas and green utilities with packs and rifles. Pixed wing was called resulting in five VC KIA.

1530H - Recon team May Fly observed ten to fifteen VC moving west along a trail wearing green utilities in the vicinity of (AT 806466). They had packs, rifles and one machine-gun. The team called fixed wing resulting in four VC KIA and one secondary explosion.

1615H - Recon team May Fly observed twenty-five VC moving west along a trail at (AT 830460). The VC wore green utilities with rifles and packs. The team called fixed wing resulting in twelve VC KIA.

1730H - Recon team May Fly observed five VC moving west along a trail at (AT 834466), wearing black pajamas, green utilities with packs and rifles. The team called fixed wing resulting in two VC KIA.

1755H - Recon team May Fly observed fifteen VC in the vicinity of (AT 845485). The enemy wore black pajamas, green utilities, khakis, helmets and packs with rifles. The team called fixed wing and a fire mission resulting in twelve VC KIA.

1130H - Recon team May Fly observed forty-four enemy moving northwest in the vicinity of (AT 835474). The VC wore black pajamas, khakis and green utilities. All had large black packs with most having weapons visible and four possible 81mm mortars plus one 60mm. The team called fire missions resulting in 31 VC KIA.

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1600H - Recon team May Fly observed thirty VC moving north at (AT 826476). The VC wore black pajamas carrying packs and rifles. The team called a fire mission with excellent coverage of target.

The VC wore black pajamas, khakis and green utilities with packs and rifles plus six mortar tubes. The team called a fire mission and an air observer resulting in ten meters of trenchline and one bunker destroyed and one VC KIA.

10 April 1020H - H&S/3/7 defensive position observed twenty VC in the vicinity of (AT 914502). An artillery mission was called and a search of the area proved negative.

1027H - Recon team Moon Dash observed thirty VC moving east in the vicinity of (AT 967501). The VC were wearing black pajamas with coolie hats and rifles. An artillery mission was called, the view of which was obstructed by a treeline.

1800H - Recon team Moon Dash observed thirty-five VC moving west in the vicinity of (AT 966533). The VC wore black pajamas with packs and rifles being transported. An artillery mission was called, the results of which were unobserved.

0900H - D/1/7 platoon combat patrol captured ten thousand pounds of rice in the vicinity of coordinates (AT 944684-930696-944688). Rice was stored in jars and sacks, then hidden in huts.

1115H - I/3/7 platoon combat patrol observed fifty VC moving southwest at coordinates (AT 926485). The VC wore various uniforms and had packs and rifles. An artillery mission was cancelled due to the presence of gunships in the area.

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1330H - AO-2 in support of 3/7 observed forty NVA in the open at coordinates (AT 970529). One airstrike was conducted rendering five structures unusable.

1530H - AO-4 in support of 3/7 sighted twenty-five NVA in a treeline at (AT 970529). An airstrike was carried out demolishing three bunkers and damaging two others.

1600H - K/3/7 company offensive sweep received three to four hundred rounds of small arms fire which was followed by fifteen 60mm mortar rounds in the vicinity of (AT 957516).

1600H - K/3/7 captured two thousand pounds of rice. The rice had been concealed in jars in the vicinity of (AT 961593).

11 April 0030H - I/3/7 platoon ambush observed an enemy force of forty people moving west at (AT 924502). A fire mission was called, but the results could not be observed due to the darkness.

0910H - HAS/3/7 platoon OP sighted ten to fifteen enemy moving west on a ridgeline in the vicinity of (AT 883627) to (AT 877625). The enemy had weapons in their possession. An artillery mission was conducted but results could not be attained due to inability to observe target.

1030H - Recon team Night Scholar discovered a storage area in the vicinity of (AT 845853). Stored in the cache were two barrels of rice containing approximately six hundred pounds of rice, three unused barrels and one empty crate.

1235H - Recon team Night Scholar occupied a storage area containing two barrels of rice of approximately four hundred pounds. The rice was destroyed.

1330H - Cap 2-1-4 1/7 squad discovered one thousand, one hundred pounds of rice at coordinates (AT 937683).

1415H - H&S/3/7 made a sighting of twelve to seventeen enemy moving east atop of a ridge. An artillery mission was conducted on the VC at coordinates (AT 883627). One direct hit was observed as the enemy disappeared.

12 April 0800H - Recon team Moon Dash sighted five VC heading west at (AT 966536). An artillery mission was called but the results could not be observed due to the vegetation.

0800H - Recon team Moon Dash observed twenty VC traveling east carrying packs and rifles in the vicinity of (AT 946479). A fire mission was conducted but the results could not be observed due to the vegetation.

1715H - A0-4 in support of G/2/7 observed ten VC run into a bombed out village in the vicinity of (BT 014603). The air observer ran one airstrike resulting in seven VC KIA.

1850H - Recon team Night Scholar observed seventeen VC moving south to northeast across a river in the vicinity of (AT 825551). They were black pajamas and carried packs and rifles. A fire mission resulted in four VC KIA.

22 April 0815H - Recon team Auditor sighted ten VC moving west on a trail in the vicinity of (AT 873627). The VC wore green utilities and carried rifles and packs. An artillery mission was conducted with unobserved results.





- 1. <u>Purpose</u>. To provide information regarding rock mines, and to direct the indoctrination and training of personnel in necessary precautions.
- 2. <u>Background</u>. Recently, numerous rock mines have been discovered emplanted in the roads of the lst MarDiv area of operations. These mines have caused several vehicles, of various types, to be disabled. Due to the type of construction of the rock mine, it can only be detected visually. It is a definite threat to vehicular traffic and movement of personnel and equipment.
- 3. General. Rock mines are made by the local guerilla and are a crude but very effective explosive device. The explosive itself is obtained from dud bombs and artillery rounds, which the VC cut open using hacksaws. The explosive is taken to a location where it can be melted and mixed with sand or dirt and then molded into whatever particular shape and size the VC desires. The finished mine varies in weight from 10 to 25 lbs, and is capable of blowing the tracks from a tracked vehicle. No rock mines have been found to date which were rigged as antipersonnel mines. However, there is nothing to preclude them being effectively employed in this manner.


The rock mine is a much greater threat during the rainy season or whenever roads are middy because in mid it is much easier to place and more difficult to detect. Like any other AT mine, rock mines are usually buried and not left exposed on the surface of the road. The color and configuration of the rock mine makes it very difficult to distinguish from the surrounding soil and natural rocks when left exposed. Photographs of typical rock mines and their firing devices, together with method of employment, are enclosed. The photographs also show a rock mine made by pouring the molten explosive into a cinder block mold.

The VC placed several of these at a bridge building site where cinder blocks of the same size were being used. Personnel should be aware of the existance of this type of mine and exercise the same precaution as with other box mines and hidden explosive devices.

4. Action. Commanding officers are directed to give wide dissemination to the information contained herein with particular emphasis to those personnel involved in the conduct of road sweeps.














ROCK MINE IN ROAD BED




MIKOYAN-GUREVICH FAGOT






The Fagot (MIG-15) is a single-seat, single-jet fighter. It was encountered in Korea by U.N. jet pilots and their ensuing engagements constituted history's first record of jet-againt-jet aerial warfare. Design of this first-line fighter is attributed to the Miko-yan-Gurevich team. The MIG-15 has a single centrifugal-flow tur-bojet engine installed in the afterhalf of its fuselage. Wings and horizontal and vertical tail surfaces—all have pronounced sweep-back and blunt tips. The angle of the wings' sweepback is around 35°, approximately the same as that of the F-86. Resembling the F-86 in layout, the MIG-15's wings, however, are midmounted while the F-86 has low-mounted wings. Another difference is the MIG-15's highmounted hoizontal stabilizer on its broad fin and rudder. The Midget is a 2-seat trainer version of the MIG-15 with a longer cockpit canopy. The Fagot is in service with Sino-Soviet-Satellite air forces as well as Syrian Egyptian Air Force. Armament consists of one 37-mm and two 23-mm guns.







The Fresco (MIG-17) is an improved successor to the Fagot (MIG-15) and has been seen in fly-bys over Moscow during Soviet air shows. There are four versions of this aircraft. Points of difference include a fuselage tail when an afterburner is used, and a radar equipped nose-section. Patterned after the Fagot, this new aircraft appears to have greater sweepback to its wings and to be more slender and tapered than its predecessor. The cockpit is mounted well forward, and blunt-tipped sweptback wings are midmounted. The prominent fin and rudder resemble the sweptback tail of the Fagot, but the smooth line from the rudder's trailing edge to the jet exhaust is noticeably different from the Fagot's prominent stepback rudder. A keel-like bulge is evident on the underside of the afterend of the fuselage. One version of the Fresco, the Fresco D, is a radar-equipped, all-weather fighter with a slight nose modification. The Fresco is in service with Sino-Soviet-Satellite air forces, as well as Syrian/Egyptian, Afghan, and Indonesian air forces. Armament consists of one 37mm and two 23mm guns.




The Faceplate (MIG-21) is a single-jet swept-wing, supersonic fighter that was first displayed publicly in 1956. The sharply swept wings are low-midmounted and have squared-off tips. The swept-back horizontal stabilizer also has square tips. The fuselage, which appears long in relation to the wing length, is blunt in both front and rear. A fairing extends from the canopy to the fin. There is a noticeable bulge under the rear of the fuselage, and two fin fairings are located under the tailpipe. A tricycle landing gear is fitted. Armament is believed to consist of three 37-mm cannon and a number of 50-mm air-to-air rockets in underwing pods.



The Coot (II-18) is a four-engine, turboprop civil transport used by the USSR on international services as well as internal routes. In flight, the aircraft generally resembles the DC-6 but closer view shows its engines to be mounted well forward and atop the wings in a manner similar to the engine installations on the Lockheed Electra. Underwing nacelles for the main landing gear are incorporated with the inboard engines. The wings are low-mounted midway on the fuselage and neither they nor the tail surfaces are swept. The straight vertical stabilizer fairs into the fuselage, and the horizontal stabilizer is fuselage-mounted. The Coot can carry up to 100 passengers, with about 75 in the normal first-class configuration.

The Crate (II-14), a low-wing twin-engined transport, is the backbone of Soviet air transportation. It differs from the Coach (II-12) mainly in that it has a squared rudder and blunter wing tips. It retains the Coach's tapered wings, dorsal fin, and retractable, tricycle-type landing gear with dual main wheels that retract into the engine nacelles. The Crate is produced in East Germany and Czechoslovakia as well as in the Soviet Union. Il-14's have been given to the heads of state of many African and Asian nations for their personal use. Egypt and Indonesia have received large numbers of these aircraft. Later versions have been built with slightly longer fuselages.

The Cub (An-12) four-turboprop heavy cargo/transport is a military variant of the Soviet Cat (An-10A) civil airliner. It has wings, engines, and forward fuselage similar to those of the Cat, but incorporates a new rear fuselage and redesigned tail surfaces. Features differentiating the fuselage are a pronounced upsweep in the aft undersection and a rear gun turret. The angular, tapered vertical stabilizer, with sharply squared-off tip, has a deeper dorsal fairing into the fuselage. The horizontal stabilizer, mounted high on the fuselage tail section, lacks the auxiliary vertical control surfaces which appear on the commercial Cat.






The Fang (LA-11) is a low-wing, single-seat fighter. It is the last Soviet piston-engined fighter and is probably still in service in small numbers with Sino-Soviet satellite nations. This all-metal aircraft is very similar in appearance to the earlier Fritz (LA-9); both are postwar variants of the LA-5—LA-7 series. The wings of the Fang are tapered on the leading and trailing edges with squared-off wing tips and slight positive dihedral. Horizontal tail surfaces are mounted below the fuselage top line and have the same general outline as the wings. A battered sample of the Fang was obtained and placed on view when a defecting Soviet pilot crash-landed in Sweden in 1949.




The Beagle (II-28) is a light, twin-jet bomber designed by Ilyushin. Its fuselage is rounded, but it has an overall appearance of angularity. The wings have square tips and join the fuselage sharply without fairing. Straight lines are noticeable throughout the bomber; even the long, tapered engine nacelles have flat sides and a square look. Pronounced sweepback is a feature of the empennage. The high midwing, like the stabilizer, appears to have moderate dihedral. This all-metal jet bomber is the Soviet's counterpart of the English Canberra (U.S. B-57). The "Mascot" (UII-28) is a training version with a solid nose and an extra cockpit. The Beagle is in service with the satellite air forces and the Syrian Egyptian, Afghan, and Indonesian air forces as well as with the Soviet Air Forces.



The Coke (An-24), a twin-turboprop civil airliner, was developed rapidly and went into flight testing in 1960. Although apparently somewhat smaller, it has been variously described as resembling Cat and Camp, which too are products of Antonov's design shops; it has also been compared with the Fokker/Fairchild Friendship and the Handley-Page Herald. Its fuselage is low-slung, with a sharp upsweep in the aft undersection. The turboprop engines are wing-mounted with lower nacelles providing accommodation for the retracted main landing gear. Wings are set on the fuselage, above the cabin, and have a noticeable outboard taper. The tall vertical stabilizer joins into the fuselage with an angular dorsal fairing; the upswept horizontal stabilizer is set high and far back on the fuselage. Configuration of both the fuselage and the vertical fin are reminiscent of Antonov's earlier designs.






The Colt (AN-2) is a single-engined biplane that at present is in service in large numbers with the Soviet Air Force as well as with satellite nations. Recognition features include unequal-span wings braced together by two single struts placed about two-thirds outboard of the fuselage; a horizontal stabilizer mounted midway up the rudder, with brace supports attached to the fuselage; and a large, curved fin and rudder. A fixed, tailwheel-type landing gear is fitted. The Colt can operate out of small airfields and performs utilitarian duties, such as passenger and cargo transport, photographic work, and rescue and ambulance operations.



Except for its four jet engines mounted in lateral pairs in the wing roots, and its slightly increased overall length, this aircraft generally resembles its forerunner. Engines are staggered with the wing sweep and protrude fore and aft of the edges. The low-mounted wings are sweptback and moderately tapered with a slight crescent shape. Stabilizers are unequally sweptback and, like the wings, have squared-off tips. The horizontal stabilizer is mounted on the fuselage. The Cooker can carry up to 100 passengers.

The Cookpot (Tu-124) is a low-wing, twin-engine, medium-range civil transport, first of the Soviet transports to be powered by turbofan-type jet engines. The aircraft made its first appearance at Russian airports late in 1959 and went into serial production in 1960. Derived from the Camel, Cookpot resembles the parent aircraft in external configuration but is somewhat smaller. Its landing gear is about one foot shorter than that of Camel, its fuselage also is shorter, and it has sharper engine air ducts and wing leading edges. The only other apparent external difference on the later aircraft is an increase in engine air duct inlet area for the fan engines. Seating up to 68 passengers, Cookpot was designed to be used as an eventual replacement for older piston powered aircraft on USSR domestic airline routes.

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# 1. Operations

a. ITEM: Disposable water containers

COMMENT: Disposable water containers being utilized in RVN have proved to be valuable items whose serviceability may be improved with a little initiative. Lightweight and easy to store, they serve a valuable purpose for the unit that operates in mountainous terrain or remote areas where water may become scarce. The containers have limitations however. Their color is not in keeping with good camouflage principles and they lack the desired durability.

<u>IESSON IEARNED</u>: That a sand bag placed over the container will protect it from sharp objects, provide the necessary camouflage and, if wet, will keep the water cool.

# b. ITEM: Night operations against the NVA

<u>COMMENT</u>: Recent night movements into territory heavily contested during daylight hours have been particularly successful. Apparently the enemy doubted the Marines' desire to utilize the cover of darkness for movement or for attack and therefore maintained little or no security in the area.

<u>IESSON IEARNED</u>: That units should reemphasize training for night operations and take advantage of their capability to execute these operations at every opportunity.

c. ITEM: Combat in built up areas (Operation HUE CITY)

<u>COMMENT</u>: In house to house fighting, the enemy usually covers all building entrances and exits with automatic weapons and small arms fire.

<u>IESSON LEARNED</u>: That by using the 106mm recoilless rifle and 3.5 rocket launcher to breach walls and sides of buildings, normal entrances and exits covered by enemy fire may be avoided.

d. ITEM: Enemy tactics

COMMENT: The NVA/VC normally react with flanking movements once initial contact has been made. If they fail to attempt such a movement, it is highly probable that they are anticipating a Marine flanking maneuver and have the avenues of approach covered.

IESSON IEARNED: If the enemy fails to execute a flanking maneuver immediately following initial contact, it is an indication that he probably has his forces distributed to counter an attempt to flank his position.

e. ITEM: Movement in built up smean

<u>COMMENT</u>: Fire and maneuver during street and house to house fighting must be precisely executed due to the confined battle area. Some items of primary importance are listed below:

<u>IESSON IEARNED</u>: That crossing streets in team rushes, rather than individual rushes proved most effective. Efficient house to house movement on the fire team level is essential. Entrance to rooms and buildings must be preceded by a thrown grenade, necessitating an ample supply of grenades. The reserve platoon or company headquarters can best be utilized to secure a med-evac site to preclude assault units from being diverted for this task. In a building of two or more stories, the ground level affords the best overhead protection from mortar fire; however, units who take cover in the ground floor during a mortar attack should return to the upper floors as soon as possible as the best observation and fields of fire are achieved from those levels.

f. ITEM: Crossing bridges where enemy strength is unknown.

COMMENT: When crossing on foot, both sides of the bridge and the surrounding area must be covered by supporting arms. Spider holes and bunkers at ground level should be expected at the ends of the bridge. Quick aggressive movement by fire teams is the best method of crossing.

<u>LESSON LEARNED</u>: That on call fire must be available when crossing bridges.

g. ITEM: Dispersion

COMMENT: Whenever a casualty is taken on a patrol there is a tendency for other personnel in the patrol to assist the wounded thus bunching up and presenting a lucrative target.

<u>LESSON LEARNED</u>: When a casualty occurs on patrol, only the corpsman and possibly another man should initially move to aid the wounded. Additional assistance can then be called if required.

h. ITEM: VC Sympathizers

COMMENT: It has been noted that during the rice harvest period, VC sympathizers will place their bins approximately 100 meters apart in a straight line thereby making this a good determination of range for enemy mortars and snipers.

IESSONS IEARNED: Patrols observing the existence of such arrangements of rice bins, should beware and take an alternate route and question the farmers in the vicinity. Patrols should also observe any other signs that are unusual in the surrounding area.

i. ITEM: Fire danger in the summer months

<u>COMMENT:</u> As the summer heat dries out local vegetation it becomes extremely combustible.

LESSON LEARNED: Care should be taken when using incendiary munitions, to avoid starting grass and brush fires and endangering units.

J. ITEM: Water for long range patrols

OMMENT: During the summer, areas in which reconnaissance patrols operate may become barren of water.

<u>IESSON IEARNED</u>: That patrol leaders should make a detailed study before insertion to determine water sites. Reports from aerial observers, overflights as well as a map study should provide information as to possible sources of water and should be considered in operational planning. Location of water sites should also be included as an element in the post patrol debrief and the information recorded for future operations in the same area.

k. ITEM: Care of WP grenades

COMMENT: The summer sun in Vietnam generates extreme temperatures. If a WP grenade is left exposed to the direct rays of the sun the WP inside can melt and then solidify in a nonsymetrical position when it cools in the evening. This will cause an erratic bursting pattern.

<u>IESSON IEARNED</u>: Store WP grenades in the shade and out of strong direct sunlight.

1. ITEM: Clearance of landing zones

COMMENT: During a recent operation conducted in dense forested terrain, combat engineers were heavily committed in clearing helicopter landing zones. To accomplish this clearing, engineers employed chain saws, axes, and demolitions. Various procedures were used with the most successful techniques listed below:

# LESSON LEARNED:

- (1) Chain saws, while too heavy to manpack for extended distances over rough terrain, proved effective for clearing smaller trees. The larger hard wood trees required axes and demolitions.
- (2) Standard demolition formulas did not provide sufficient explosives to fell the hard wood trees which were found to require approximately twice the calculated amount.

- (3) Additional means should be made available to the engineers, other than heavy five gallon expeditionary cans, to transport gasoline and oil for the chain saws.
  - (4) Extra chains should accompany the chain saws.
  - m. ITEM: Enemy ambush techniques

<u>COMMENT</u>: Recently two LVT's were ambushed by Viet Cong disguised as Vietnamese soldiers. The LVT's approached two personnel dressed in RVN Army uniforms. When within approximately 50 meters, it was noticed that the Vietnamese were not carrying American weapons. This discovery prematurely triggered the ambush and the enemy was driven off.

<u>IESSON IEARNED</u>: That personnel should be particularly alert for Vietnamese in uniforms of ARVN who are carrying unfamiliar weapons.

n. ITEM: Crossing rice paddy dikes

COMMENT: During the spring and summer months, rice paddies become more trafficable for tanks. Exiting the paddies may be a problem when the height of the paddy dike is near the maximum vertical climb capability of the tank. As the vehicle starts up the dike, all the weight is transferred to the rear of the tank causing it to bog down in the spongy floor of the paddy.

<u>ILSSON IEARNED</u>: Decreasing the angle of approach to the dikes by placing felled trees or other material next to the dike slope adds to the successful negotiation of this obstacle.

o. ITEM: Destruction of enemy hard targets and fortified positions.

<u>COMMENT</u>: Frequently the initial engagement of a fortified position or hard target with HEP-T ammunition by tanks does not produce the desired penetration or destruction.

<u>IESSON IEARNED</u>: Best results are obtained by breaching the target with HEAT ammunition followed by HEP-T. The HEP-T will enlarge the embrasure created by HEAT and permit successful penetration of the target.

p. ITEM: Positioning of Med-Evac Helicopters in an unsecured zone

COMMENT: The tactical situation on the ground is influential in the positioning of the med-evac helicopters in an unsecured landing zone. It is extremely important that the helicopter pilot know the location and direction from which a supported unit is receiving hostile fire before he commences his approach to the zone. This will enable the pilot to approach and land by the most secure route and position the helicopter so as to limit

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exposure to hostile fire. This will ensure a higher degree of survivability for the aircraft and its payload.

Situation will enhance mission accomplishment once on the ground. Positioning the tail of the med-evac helicopter toward the last known direction of fire offers less target exposure than with the side or front of the helicopter facing the direction of fire.

q. ITEM: Evacuation of wounded from more than one zone

COMMENT: Radio frequencies are often saturated when there are a number of WIA's in two or more landing zones and ground units are requesting the med-evac helicopters at the same time.

the zone with the least number of casualties prior to proceeding to the next zone. This way the zones may be identified only once, enemy situation briefed only once, thus reducing radio traffic.

r. ITEM: Use of smoke grenades during emergency night extractions

seen in the landing zone by helicopter pilots because the reflection from parachute flares off of streams and rice paddies in close proximity to the pick up zone tend to flash much the same as the strobe light. Colored smoke grenades have been tried and found to be visible from the air while parachute illumination flares are being used.

LESSON LEARNED: That the use of smoke at night is very effective for marking landing zones when illumination flares are being used.

### 2. Logistics

a. ITEM: External transportation of cargo utilizing the nylon four point universal sling

COMMENT: During the period the external transport method of lifting cargo has been utilized, it has proven to be a most effective means of carrying diverse loads for distances up to 25 miles. However, operations in the last two months have revealed that the slings require continuous checks for serviceability. During December, seven external loads separated from CH-53A aircraft while in flight. The major contributing factor was failure of the nylon straps of the sling. The attachment points of the sling are metal to which the nylon straps are attached. This nylon and metal contact wears quickly and decreases the effective longevity of the sling.

IESSON LEARNED: That all nylon slings must be thoroughly inspected

prior to their use. Each unit should institute a program of continued inspections of this sling to minimize the loss of cargo.

b. ITEM: Improper loading results in aircraft structural damage to the CH-53A helicopter.

COMMENT: The CH-53A is capable of transporting many diverse loads of cargo internally. Due to the basic design limits of the ramp and conveyor assembly, caution must be observed in order that these components are not overstressed. The loading ramp is designed for a 3,000 pound load. The designed stress limitation on the conveyor assemblies utilizing the standard 40" X 48" pallet is 2,200 pounds per pallet. To insure continued effective use of the cargo loading ramp and conveyor assemblies on the CH-53A, careful planning must be utilized in order that the essential components are not overstressed and rendered unusable. The use of multiple forklifts and pallets should not be overlooked during the planning phase. If oversized cargo cannot be lifted by a 3,000 pound forklift, multiple lifts and pallets must be utilized to protect the aircraft from structural damage. When loading cargo of appreciable length and weight, the supported unit must be aware of the design limitations of the aircraft so that these components are not inadvertently overstressed.

LESSON LEARNED: That a continuous training program must be carried out to ensure that all helicopter support teams and other personnel involved in loading helicopters are aware of these basic aircraft structural limitations.

c. ITEM: Damage to artillery weapons caused by improper rigging for external carry by helicopters.

COMMENT: Four 105mm howitzers have recently been damaged because they were not properly rigged for external helicopter carry. In all cases a normal hook-up was effected, but during lift off, the howitzers shifted position and the muzzles struck the ground. The responsibility lies with the supported unit to have cargo properly staged and rigged for transport.

LESSON LEARNED: It is imperative that the supported unit have qualified personnel to ready cargo for lift by helicopter.

# a. Concept of Operations

- (1) On D-day, 1st Marine Division conducts multi-battalion helicopterborne assault(s) or ground attack(s) against enemy forces located in the RUONG RUONG-Elephant Valley and/or Happy Valley-THUONG DUC regions to prevent enemy attacks against the DA NANG/PHU BAI vital areas. In accordance with reference (b) the destruction of these enemy forces will be a matter of highest priority.

# 1. Summary of the audit action

### a. Lnemy | rc s

- (1) Aerial surveillance coverage of the Annamite mountains of Central ICT/ was reduced severely by the poor visibility during the winter months. The enemy used this reduced surveillance to start construction of a LOG from lower A SHAU Valley through Base Area 607 into QUANG NAM Province in the vicinity of (YC 635692). This LOC could enhance his infiltration of personnel and heavy equipment from the Laotian Border into the coastal plains of QUANG NAM Province.
- (2) Depending on the trafficability of the LOC network, the enemy has the capability of reinforcing heavily in a relatively short period of time.
- (3) The enemy's withdrawal from Northern ICTZ to avoid contact in the KHE SANH area has increased the probability of a major force realignment which could significantly increase the threat at any point of the enemy's choosing along the coastal plain, including the DA NANG vital area. The fact that the 325C NVA Division is unlocated and reports of large numbers of NVA replacements, estimated at 23,000 infiltrated into South Vietnam since 1 January poses a major threat.

## (4) "Yellow Brick Road" (see overlay)

- (a) On 28 March, a photo mission revealed a newly constructed corduroy road which is an extension of the A SHAU Valley road, running through Laos and Base Area 607 into QUANG NAM Province at (YC 635692).
- (b) On 31 March, 500 people were visually sighted working on the road between (YC 641688) to (YC 694666). At (YC 720630),

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bunkers and trenches as well as extensive tree clearing operations in preparation for road construction was evident.

- (c) VR flight on 2 April reported that work on the road had progressed along the route (YC 723628) to (YC 757640) along southern and western banks of river to (YC 808623), and that an estimated 1,000 people were working on the road between (YC 65069C) to (YC 808623). Further sightings on 2 April revealed 3 AA positions at (YC 678665) and (YC 667663).
- (d) VR flight on 4 April received coordinated .50 caliber and possible 37mm AA fire and intensive AW fire from positions vicinity (YC 683663) and (YC 640692).
- (e) On 6 April, a VR flight noted evidence of numerous motor vehicles vicinity (YC 670667), a destroyed truck was observed at (YC 669666) with unidentified cargo being unloaded.
- (f) At the present time, the YELLOW BRICK ROAD extends 18 kilometers into QUANG NAM. It is capable of supporting wheeled and track vehicles to (YC 692665) and heavy personnel movement to (YC 810630). The number of AA/AW positions are increasing daily demonstrating the importance the enemy places on this road.
- (g) The completion of this LOC would allow the introduction of Surface to Surface missiles (SSM) such as the Samlet (range 83 KM) and the Free Rocket Over Ground (FROG) i.e., the FROG-4 and FROG-5 (range 66 KM) or the FROG-3 and FROG-6 (range 33 KM). As yet no information has been received indicating that the NVA has these weapons, but the possibility must be recognized that Russia could provide them. The enemy can introduce longe range heavy artillery already in his inventory as well as heavier rockets such as the 200mm (range 18,500 meters) or the 250mm (range 30,000 meters).

- (1) Enemy ground attack against DA NANG is possible via two avenues of approach:
  - (a) RUONG RUONG and Elephant Valley.
  - (b) THUUNG DUC and Happy Valley.

# 3. Miscellaneous Information

## a. Military Installations

- (1) There was a CIDG camp at A SHAU (YC 495835) comprised of 12 U.S. Army Special Forces, 12 SVN Special Forces, and about 400 men. The camp was supported by a 1,700 foot airstrip covered with perforated steel matting. The camp was overrun by a regimental sized unit in March 1966, and has not been reestablished.
- (2) In the RUONG RUONG area there was a CIDG camp, NAM DONG, (YC 868842), until November 1964, when it was overrun by a regimental sized unit. The strength of the camp was 12 U.S. Army Special Forces, 12 SUN Special Forces, and about 400 men. There was a 1,700 foot airstrip which supported the CIDG unit. In October 1967, an Army helicopter sat down on the strip to effect repairs. The crew reported that the camp was deserted and no signs of enemy activity in the area were observed.

# b. Road Network

- (1) Route 14 from (ZC 213549) west and south to (ZC 026155) is a fair-weather, poorly improved dirt road, averaging 1 to 2 meters wide generally deteriorated and overgrown. Along this route there are 25 bridges ranging from wooden foot bridges to steel truss bridges. Most of the bridges are 3 to 4 meters wide, capable of supporting approximately 13 tons.
- (2) On route 4 from (ZC 148538) west to (ZC 025576) there are 10 bridges ranging from 3 to 4 meters wide and will support approximately 13 tons. The road is a fair-weather, poorly improved dirt road from 2 to 4 meters wide and deteriorates to a trail west of (ZC 025576).
- (3) Route 545 from (ZC 196843) west to (YC 913892) is a loose surface fair-weather road averaging 3 to 4 meters in width. There are approximately 6 bridges averaging 3 to 4 meters in width.

### c. Topography

(1) Moving west through Elephant Valley, Happy Valley, and THUONG DUC the elevation increases sharply and the topography becomes extremely rough. Rugged, steeply sloped mountains

predominate in 85% of the area. The exceptions are the river valleys. In the highlands area the elevations range from 500 meters up to as high as 1,700 meters. The slopes throughout this area average 30 to 40%. The major ridge lines have a general east—west orientation.

## d. <u>Vegetation</u>

(1) In this mountainous region the vegetation is generally dense undergrowth forests. Again, the exceptions are the river valleys, which are characterized by either brushwood or single canopy forest. The dense undergrowth multilayer canopied forests are characterized by a large variety of fast growing, closely spaced trees overlooking a very dense undergrowth. This type of forest contains a multilayered, 2 to 4, canopy that is essentially continuous with its upper layers reaching 25 to 45 meters. The trees are generally 2 to 4 meters apart with very dense undergrowth which limits visibility to about 5 meters. The brushwood areas contain grass, brush, and scrub trees. The grass and brush has an average height of from 1 to 3 meters. The scrub trees are about 3 meters in height and have very little foliage.

#### e. Rivers

(1) The rivers and streams throughout this area are easily fordable during the dry season and offer low gradient routes for foot movement. During the wet season many of these streams become impassable due to the heavy rain fall.

#### f. Cross-Country Movement

 Cross-country movement throughout this area is virtually nonexistant without the use of trails and/or stream beds. The steep slopes and thick underbrush precludes vehicular traffic.

- (c) Game Warden Forces consisting of 10 PBR's (River Patrol Boats) operate in the Perfume River (SONG HUONG) Lagune de l'est and DAM CAU HAI to control water traffic in those areas.
- (d) NAVSUPACT operates Harbor Entrance Control Post boats and patrols DA NANG Bay and DA NANG River (SONG HAN).

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- (e) Commander, First Coastal Zone operates check point located at the mouth of SONG HAN and controls all incoming and outgoing watercraft. All craft are checked for proper registration and cargo. District chiefs register watercraft within their districts.
- (f) Commander, Coastal Group 12 (Junk Fleet) operates from TAN MY, patrols lagoons and waterways in area and operates partial RAG (River Assault Group).
- (g) Commander, Coastal Group 13 (Junk Fleet) patrols DAM CAU HAI and the adjacent seas.
- (h) Commander, Coastal Group 14 (Junk Fleet) operates in coastal areas south of DA NANG, checking watercraft for proper registration and cargo.
- (3) GVN forces establish check points on the SONG TUY IOAN in vicinity grids AT 943710 and AT 960700 to control movement of watercraft engaged in sand and gravel industry.

### 2. MISSION

1st Marine Division (Rein) participates in the defense of the DA NANG and PHU BAI vital areas; achieves and maintains positive control over waterways entering and within the AOR in coordination with Market Time and Game Warden forces; denies the enemy the capability of utilizing waterways as routes of ingress and egress to the division AOR and denies enemy freedom of movement on waterways within the AOR.

### 3. EXECUTION

### a. Concept of Operations

- (1) 1st Marine Division (Rein) in coordination with Game Warden and Market Time forces maintains positive control over waterways in the division AOR through the establishment of check points, coordinated patrols and continuing surveillance.
- (2) Task Force XRAY in THUA THIEN Province and infantry regiments within the DA NANG TAOR, reinforced with division supporting units as required, exercise control of waterways within assigned TAOR/AO. All available surveillance and control measures are employed to deny enemy freedom of movement into and through the division AOR. Emphasis is placed on patrol activity, OP's and the use of mechanical detecting devices.
- (3) Artillery, air and naval gunfire are employed in a supporting

role, as required. Aerial observers assist with surveillance and control of fire support.

(4) Coastal areas and inland waterways bordering on coastal areas are included in this concept and require coordination with naval forces.

#### b. Task Force XRAY

- (1) Maintain surveillance means across the SONG TRUOI, SONG BU LU, SONG CONG QUAN/HA TA/DAI GIANG/LOI NONG, SONG THIEU HOA and SONG HUONG in zone.
- (2) Conduct surveillance along coastal area. Coordinate with Market Time forces as required.
- (3) Coordinate surveillance of DAM SAM, DAM THUY TU, DAM CAU HAI and SONG HUONG with Game Warden forces.
- (4) Deny enemy use of DAM LAP AN and any other waterways adjacent to the coast.
- (5) Coordinate with CG, Provisional Corps Vietnam in establishing surveillance across the SONG TA TRACH where that river forms the boundary between 1st Marine Division and Provisional Corps Vietnam.
- (6) Maintain surveillance on all subsidiary waterways within AO (SONG RUI, DAP DINH, SONG NONG, SONG PHO LOI, HOI BUNG BINH, etc) as required to deny enemy use of these waterways.
- (7) Direct liaison is authorized with Commanding Generals Provisional Corps Vietnam and 1st ARVN Division for purposes of coordinating operations and surveillance.

### c. 7th Marines (Rein)

- (1) Establish surveillance means astride the SONG CU DE, SONG TUY LOAN, SONG VU GIA and the SONG THU BON/TINH YEN/KY LAM. The SONG TUY LOAN is a Southern Sector Defense Command responsibility where adjacent to that sector.
- (2) Coordinate with Commander, Northern Sector Defense Command in establishing surveillance in vicinity of the mouth of the SONG CU DE. The mouth of the SONG CU DE is a 7th Marines responsibility.
- (3) Coordinate with Commanding Officer, 27th Marines to ensure

effective coverage of the SONG YEN. The SONG YEN is a 7th Marines responsibility.

- (4) Maintain surveillance, as required, to deny enemy use of the following:
  - (a) SONG AI NGHIA, SONG BA REN and SONG THUY LOAN.
  - (b) Waterway that flows between SONG AI NGHIA and SONG LA THO from grids AT 941593 to AT 974612.
  - (c) Connecting waterway between the SONG VU GIA and SONG THU BON, grids AT 901565 to AT 918534.
  - (d) Lateral waterway in the rocket belt flowing from grids AT 906750 to AT 938710.
  - (e) Lateral waterway in the rocket belt flowing from grid AT 885795 to the mouth of the SONG CU DE.
- (5) Maintain surveillance on lakes in TAOR as required to deny enemy movement thereon.

### d. 27th Marines (-)

- (1) Maintain surveillance means across the SONG VINH DIEN and the SONG CAN BIEN.
- (2) Coordinate with Southern Sector Defense Command and 1st MP Battalion for effective coverage of the SONG TUY LOAN and SONG CAU DO. Rivers are responsibility of SSDC and 1st MP Battalion.
- (3) Conduct surveillance along coastal area. Coordinate with Market Time forces as required.
- (4) Coordinate with 2nd Brigade ROKMC for effective coverage of the SONG THANH QUIT/SONG LA THO. Rivers are 2nd Brigade ROKMC responsibility.
- (5) Maintain surveillance on the waterway from grids AT 974612 to BT 004654. Coordinate with 7th Marines where that waterway forms common boundary. River is 27th Marines responsibility.
- (6) Coordinate with 7th Marines to ensure effective coverage of the SONG YEN adjacent to TAOR. The SONG YEN is a 7th Marines responsibility.

- (7) Maintain surveillance on the SONG BAU XAU, SUOI MAN QUAN and all subsidiary waterways within the TAOR as required to deny the enemy use of these waterways.
- (8) Direct liaison is authorized with Commanding General, 2nd Brigade ROKMC for purposes of coordinating operations and waterway surveillance.

## e. 11th Marines (Rein)/Northern Sector Defense Command

- (1) 11th Marines (Rein)
  - (a) General support.
  - (b) Provide fires to interdict waterways as requested by unit commanders.
  - (c) Be prepared to provide illumination as requested.

### (2) Northern Sector Defense Command

- (a) Conduct surveillance along coastal area of sector. Harbor Entrance Control Post boats patrol DA NANG Bay (VINH DA NANG). Coordinate with NAVSUPACT.
- (b) Coordinate with 7th Marines in establishing surveillance in vicinity of mouth of SONG CU DE. Mouth of SONG CU DE is 7th Marines responsibility.
- (c) Maintain surveillance of waterways adjacent to the coast and extending inland as required to deny their use to the enemy.

### f. 1st Tank Battalion/Southern Sector Defense Command

- (1) Coordinate with 7th Marines and 27th Marines for effective coverage of SONG CAU DO and SONG TUY LOAN where river forms common boundary. SONG CAU DO and SONG TUY LOAN are Southern Sector Defense Command responsibility where adjacent to sector.
- (2) Provide searchlight illumination as requested within capabilities.
- g. 1st Engineer Battalion. Be prepared to provide engineering assistance as required.
- h. Coordinating Instructions

- (1) Emphasize surveillance activities on all waterways in conjunction with reference (e).
- (2) Maintain positive control of all waterways. Deny the enemy the capability of transporting personnel, we apons or equipment along waterways.
- (3) Use all available mechanical target acquisition/intrusion detection means to supplement patrols, check points, listening posts and observation posts.
- (4) In accordance with reference (f), curfew hours on rivers and on the sea in I Corps Tactical Zone are from 1900 to 0500 the next morning, except for DA NANG harbor where the curfew lifts at 0400.
- (5) Deny watercraft movement on all waterways during curfew. TAOR/Sector commanders coordinate with district chiefs concerning waterways and segments of waterways in which watercraft are not allowed, day or night. Annex B (Waterway Denial Plan).
- (6) Coordinate with GVN forces for establishment of check points on waterways. Police cooperation can normally be solicited through the CORDS Police Sector Advisor.
- (7) Boats on restricted waterways or on waterways during curfew may be taken under fire and destroyed. There must be reason to believe the boat to be non-friendly and a vigorous PSYOP campaign, to include leaflets, ground and aerial broadcasts and RVN radio must have been carried out to inform the Vietnamese people that boats found in restricted waters would be destroyed. A boat may be assumed to be non-friendly if if fails to respond to challenge, takes evasive action or is committing an overt act against friendly forces, persons, facilities or installations.
- (8) Establish river patrols in small craft (i.e. multipurpose barges) as required, to assist with check point control and watercraft search.
- (9) Consider the monsoon season when developing plans in order to provide for seasonal waterways and increased width and depth of existing waterways.
- (10) TAOR/AO/Sector commanders coordinate with district chiefs to insure complete dissemination of waterway denial plan and curfew instructions. Personal contact to ensure understand-

ing of the order and the consequences of non-compliance is imperative.

- (11) In emergency cases (illnesses, injury, etc) when civilian movement on waterways during curfew hours is required, boats will be identified with a lamtern at the front of the boat and a lamtern at the rear of the boat. If the boat has a sail, an additional lamp will be placed on top of the mast.
- (12) Coastal watercraft whose identity is not apparent are identified through 1st Marine Division COC or direct with Market Time TOC or units. Annex A (CTG 115.1 Support).
- (13) SLAR aircraft have been requested to provide continuous coverage over all waterways throughout the division AOR. A Data Link van has been positioned at division headquarters for immediate readout of any waterborne craft in the TAOR. This information, once received, will be passed through COC to the TAOR commander concerned for appropriate action.
  - (a) Continuous flights have been requested; however, inclement weather and aircraft and Data Link availability will have a decided effect on the SLAR coverage provided.
  - (b) Specified times for SLAR coverage encompass the period 2100 to 0300 nightly.
- (14) Make maximum use of FIREFLY mission as required.
  - (a) The FIREFLY program is a U.S. Army program. It consists of a team of three helicopters; one light ship, one gun ship and one control ship. Flying waterways at night, the team is capable of illuminating targets and destroying them with immediate fire power.
  - (b) FIREFLY is ideally suited for surveillance on waterways difficult to cover with patrols, check points or OP's. Examples of waterways where extensive use of FIREFLY might be profitably employed are SONG TINH YEN/SONG THU BON, SONG CU DE, SONG VU GIA and DAM LAP AN.
  - (c) Requests for FIREFLY are made to Headquarters, 1st Marine Division.
- (15) Recommended changes to Annex B (Waterway Denial Plan) are solicited from TAOR/sector commanders based on the situation in their individual areas.

- (16) This order supports the plan promulgated by Commanding General, I Corps. Information is exchanged on a regular basis with Headquarters, QUANG NAM Sector. Unit commanders exercise sound judgement when conflicts arise with local VN citizens and/or officials regarding implementation or understanding of provisions of this order. Notify Headquarters, 1st Marine Division immediately of such conflicts that cannot be resolved on the local level.
- (17) Submit overlay of waterway control activities in accordance with Annex C (Reports) to reference (g).
- (18) Make maximum use of psychological operations in support of waterway control efforts. Submit requests for special leaflets, broadcast tapes and Armed Propaganda Team support to this headquarters (attn: G-5).
- (19) Annex E (Fire Support Coordination) to reference (d).
- (20) Annex F (Artillery) to reference (d).
- (21) Annex G (Naval Gunfire) to reference (d).
- (22) Annex H (Air Support) to reference (d).
- (23) Annex J (Rules of Engagement) to reference (d).
- (24) This plan supersedes and cancels Operation Order 308-68.

#### 1. GENERAL

#### a. Background

- (1) Task Group 115.1 is the U.S. Naval/Coast Guard coastal surveillance group (Market Time) operating in the coastal waters of I Corps. Units of the following types conduct continuous patrolling within two miles of the coastline:
  - (a) Coast Guard Cutters (WPB)
    - 1. Voice Radio Call. "ENFIELD COBRA UNIT" is the area call sign used in waters adjacent to division AOR.
    - 2. Armament. Five .50 caliber machine guns and one 81mm mortar, capable of firing destructive or illumination fires.
    - Radio Frequencies. Continuous guard on 4085KHZ or 2138KHZ SSB/USB (net control "ARTICLE" - CTG 115.1), 37.5 MCS VHF/FM, and either 277.8 or 301.0 MCS UHF. Can come up on any other VHF/FM circuit.
  - (b) "SWIFT" Patrol Boats (PCF)
    - 1. Voice Radio Call. "NEWS BOY INDIA" plus unit hull number if known. May be called "NEWS BOY INDIA UNIT." (Area call sign for initial contact same as for Coast Guard Cutters (WPB) above).
    - 2. Armsment. Three .50 caliber machine guns and one 81mm mortar capable of firing destructive or illumination fires.
    - Radio Frequencies. Continuous guard on 4085KHZ or 2138KHZ SSB/USB, 37.5 MCS VHF/FM circuit.

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(2) While the primary mission of these units is to prevent infiltration of hostile material or personnel through the coastal waters of I Corps, they can provide exfiltration patrol services, illumination using 81mm mortar, or, when cleared through the task group commander, destructive fires utilizing both mortars and machine guns. These units are rarely more than ten miles apart, so they are capable of rapid response at any point along the coast.

### b. Coordination of Support

- (1) Support Requests. Normal requests for TG 115.1 support is made through III MAF and CTG 115.1. In an emergency, direct liaison may be established by units on the scene.
  - (a) Exfiltration patrol and illumination fire may be provided upon request without prior clearance through CTG 115.1 when urgency of mission prohibits use of normal III MAF/CTG 115.1 channels.
  - (b) Destructive fire missions may be conducted with out CTG 115.1 clearance only if the mission is of an extremely urgent nature. "Urgent" is defined as a situation when friendly forces have positive contact with the enemy, are under hostile fire, and fire support is required in order to minimize friendly losses.
  - (c) Other scheduled or unscheduled destructive fire missions may be fired if permission is granted by CTG 115.1, and if a designated NGLO/ANGLICO team or forward air controller is available.
- (2) Required Information. When requesting TG 115.1 support, submit the following information:
  - (a) Identity of unit(s) to be supported.
  - (b) Voice calls and VHF frequencies on which unit(s) to be supported can be reached.
  - (c) Area where support is required.
  - (d) Type of support required.
  - (e) Time support is to commence and expected duration.
- (3) Coordinating Instructions

- (a) Requests for support should reach CTG 115.1 with an information copy to CTF 115 at least 24 hours prior to the event.
- (b) If advance request is not possible, and if an urgent requirement for support exists, TG 115.1 units may be contacted directly on circuits listed in paragraphs 1a(1)(a)2 and 1a(1)(b)2.
- (c) TG 115.1 units carry KAC 138 but do not hold division CEOI or other directives.

1. GROUND DEFENSE OPERATIONS

#### a. Concept

- (1) The concept for the defense of the division AOR is based on the establishment of sectors and sub-sectors.
- (2) Sector commanders are responsible for the coordination of the defense of their assigned sectors. Commanding efficers of tenant units are responsible for local security of their installations.
- (3) Division rear area sector commanders have the same authority within their assigned sectors as TAOR commanders enjoy regarding coordination of defensive/security measures and control of supporting arms.

#### b. Execution

(1) Task Force XRAY

- (a) Assume operational control of all tenant units within assigned sector for ground defense planning and execution of ground defense operations.
- (b) Assigned sector is contiguous with assigned AOR.

  - (a) Assume operational control of all tenant units within the Northern Sector of the division rear area for ground

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defense planning and execution of ground defense operations.

- (b) Frovide artillery fire support for defense of the division rear area sectors as required.
- (3) 1st Tank Battalion/Southern Sector Defense Command
  - (a) Assume operational control of all tenant units within the Southern Sector of the division rear area for ground defense planning and execution of ground defense operations.
  - (b) Request fire support from the Commanding Officer, 11th Marines as required.
- (4) Coordinating Instructions
  - (a) Organize assigned sector into sub-sectors as required.
  - (b) Designate a sub-sector commander for each sub-sector.
  - (c) Issue orders as necessary to accomplish the assigned defense mission.

#### 2. MACV SECURITY CONDITIONS

- a. General. The threat to the security of US personnel and material in Vietnam is continuous and may occur in the form of a ground attack, mortar/rocket fire, terrorist activity or sabetage. Basically, all military organizations must provide for their own internal security.
- b. The following security conditions have been established by COMUSMACV and promulgated by reference (a):
  - (1) Security Condition WHITE: Will exist whenever information indicates the need for unusual precautions to be exercised on the part of all MACV personnel throughout Vietnam, unless specifically localized by the direction of COMUSMACV. Such conditions will be announced for a specified period of time and may be expected during holidays or events having special significance in the Republic of Vietnam. Sensitive periods or dates which require special precautions are announced periodically by the Embassy or MACV Memorandum.

(3) The term ALERT will not be used in connection with readiness tests and exercises.

### 4. PASSIVE AIR DEFENSE CONDITIONS

- a. Passive Air Defense Conditions are established to counter the threat of enemy attack from the air. Reference to the various air defense conditions is not classified information, and alerts will be passed in the clear. Actions required under each condition is classified information and will be treated as such.
- b. Passive Air Defense Conditions will be passed by the fastest available communications means. The alert/warnings to be passed are as follows:
  - (1) Air Defense Alert. There is suspicious enemy activity which may result in enemy air attack.
  - (2) Air Defense Warning White. Attack by hestile aircraft/missiles is not considered probable or imminent in the immediate future.
  - (3) Air Defense Warning Yellew. Attack by hestile aircraft/missiles is prebable.
  - (4) Air Defense Warming Red. Attack by hestile aircraft/missiles is imminent or taking place.
- c. Units will take the fellowing measures when Air Defense Alert conditions are set:
  - (1) Condition White. If air attack has not taken place, resume normal operations. If air attack has taken place maintain maximum ground readiness and be propared to render assistance as directed.
  - (2) Condition Yellow. Increase ground defense posture to counter possible ground attack in conjunction with air attack. Continue essential operations. All other personnel take cover.
  - (3) Condition Red. Assume maximum defense readiness posture and be prepared to counter possible ground attack in conjunction with air attack. Continue essential operations from sheltered position. All personnel take cover.
- d. Units will establish an audible signal to alert forces to Air Defense Alert Condition Red.

#### 3. EXECUTION

### a. Concept of Operations

- (1) Combat base communications—electronics systems are semipermanent installations employing wire, DCA circuitry,
  and multichannel equipments for primary transmission paths
  backed up by tactical radio and radio relay equipments.
  Engineering of this system must provide an inherent flexibility which facilitates rapid expansion, integration,
  and support of tactical communications. The combat base
  communications—electronics system provides and supports:
  - (a) Communication Center.
  - (b) Division telephone and switching central.
  - (c) COC, FSCC, and DASC circuits.
  - (d) Liaison and coordination circuits with adjacent III MAF, FWMAF and RVNAF forces within the I Corps tactical zone.
  - (e) CRITICAM circuits (SSO).
- (2) Communications—electronics support for amphibious and/or ground operations extending away from a combat base is provided by tactical equipment resources. Communication planning for operations must consider integration and maximum employment of existing combat base communication systems and facilities.

### b. <u>Headquarters Battalion</u>

- (1) Install, operate and maintain a communications-electronics system to support the following division combat base facilities:
  - (a) Division message center.
  - (b) Teletypewriter terminal complex, to include requirements of the Combat Operations Center.
  - (c) Telephone central.
  - (d) COC and FSCC wire, radio and radio relay communications.

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- (e) Division interoffice voice communication systems.
- (2) Plan, install and be prepared to activate multichannel radio relay as backup to DCA communication systems and the cable system serving this headquarters.
- (3) Activate Division Tactical, Supporting Arms and Logistical nets as directed.
- (4) Establish system and technical control facilities and procedures for coordination with senior and subordinate commands to maintain circuit quality and to expedite restoration of internal communication systems.
- (5) Establish and maintain personnel and equipment to support other than base type operations by the 1st Marine Division (Rein), FMF.
- (6) Provide communication guard for all 1st Marine Division units and reinforcing units under the ADCON/OPCON of the CG, 1st Marine Division.
- (7) Provide communication guard either by relay or overthe-counter service to units external to the 1st Marine Division (Rein), FMF, as directed.
- (8) Be prepared to activate external radio circuits to III MAF.
- (9) Install and maintain circuit connections between 1st Marine Division (Rein) communications facilities and III MAF 31 Test.
- (10) Provide 1st Marine Division Communication Center with electronic equipment repair support.

### 1. GENERAL

- a. Rules of engagement herein are prescribed to minimize noncombatant personnel and property losses which may occur in the execution of military operations against the enemies of RVN. The source of these rules of engagement is contained in references (a) through (i).
- b. The use of unnecessary force leading to noncombatant battle casualties in areas temporarily controlled by the enemy embitters the population, drives them into the arms of the enemy, and makes the long range goal of pacification more difficult and costly. Circumstances in RVN call for exercise of restraints not normally required on the battlefield. All unit commanders apply only that force necessary to accomplish their mission, giving due regard to safety of their command and importance of preventing injury to noncombatant populace.
- c. Incidents of noncombatant casualties and destruction of property by RVNAF and US combat forces are exploited by the enemy to the fullest extent to enhance their objectives, to foster resentment against GVN and US and to permanently alienate the people from GVN.
- d. The 1st Marine Division has established the reputation of being able to move at will throughout its assigned area of responsibility and to defeat any enemy force encountered. Concurrently, 1st Marine

Division units constantly demonstrate their concern for the safety of noncombatants, compassion for the injured and a willingness to aid and assist the sick, hungry and dispossessed.

#### 2. APPLICATION

All commanders are directed to plan and conduct operations in accordance with the following guidelines:

- a. Consider both military and psychological objectives of each operation.
- b. Hold troop indoctrination briefings before each operation to emphasize both short and long range importance of minimizing noncombatant battle casualties.
- c. Concurrent air/ground planning to ensure proper selection of helicopter landing zones and proper employment and integration of artillery, naval gunfire and air strikes to avoid unnecessary damage to lives and property of noncombatants.
- d. Brief forward air controllers on areas where air strikes should not be called because of the presence of friendly or potentially friendly populace. Such information is sought from local officials at province and district level.
- e. Configure free strike zones to avoid populated areas except those established in known enemy base areas.
- f. Plan operations in coordination with province/sector and district/ subsector chiefs with due regard to security of plans. A liaison officer from Marine forces conducting operations in a particular province/sector is positioned at district/subsector headquarters for coordination. District/subsector advisors perform this function in the absence of a liaison officer.
- g. With due regard to the security and success of the mission, people are warned of impending air strikes or operations by leaflets and broadcasts whenever possible. This warning emphasizes that the enemy, by his presence, makes the action necessary and that the enemy is directly responsible for damages resulting from combat in populated areas.
- h. Hamlets and villages are attacked without prior warning if the attack is in conjunction with a ground operation involving movement of ground forces through an area, and if, in the judgement of the ground commander, his mission would be jeopardized by such a warning.

- i. Hamlets or villages not associated with ground operations are not attacked without prior warning (by leaflets and/or speaker system or other appropriate means) even though light fire is received from them.
- j. Participation of Vietnamese forces in operations is encouraged so that the war does not appear to be a U.S. action against Vietnamese people. Regional and Popular Force participation is sought at Marine battalion or company level so they may assist in search of private dwellings, obtain information and contribute to the desired effect of cooperative war effort.
- k. Assignment to Marine forces of qualified RVNAF liaison officers from appropriate RVNAF commands is essential and is arranged between Marine commanders and appropriate advisors for each significant operation. These liaison officers, through their knowledge of the area of operations and the population, assist in identification of personnel and help ensure close coordination with all Vietnamese forces.
- 1. In carrying out search and destroy operations, take all practicable measures to minimize destruction of indigenous private property and to ensure its proper control, disposition, and safeguarding. Plans include procedures for protection of private property and reporting, security and disposition of excess supplies.
- m. A civic action plan supports each operation even if the area has been controlled by the enemy. As each situation dictates, operation plans provide for utilization of all available assets to include a program for dispensing of medical supplies, transportation and distribution of emergency rations, medical evacuation of injured or sick regardless of suspected or known political affiliation, and light engineering work within the capabilities of tactical units.
- n. Whenever possible, utilize appropriate leaflets, airborne loudspeakers, ground loudspeakers and/or face-to-face teams to separate noncombatants from the enemy.
- o. The following practices are self-defeating and are not tolerated:
  - (1) Employment of unobserved and unregistered harassing and interdiction fires upon a populated area, when attack from that area is not indicated by available information.
  - (2) Use of heavy supporting arms upon populated areas when resistance received is not such as to impede maneuver of our forces to the objective or accomplishment of the mission.

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- (3) Use of noncombatant civilians as the point for combat patrols or for a unit in the approach march.
- p. Established rules of good military conduct and discipline are enforced.

### 3. CONDUCT OF OPERATIONS

### a. General

- (1) Local instructions specify where challenges are required. In those instances where a challenge is required, the sequence of engagement is:
  - (a) Normal challenge.
  - (b) If person challenged makes an overt attempt to avoid apprehension, opens fire or commits any other hostile act and thereby endangers life of challenger, challenger may fire.
  - (c) Unit commanders prescribe illumination prior to firing if local circumstances allow.
  - (d) Requirement for challenge is waived by local commander if required by tactical situation and no friendly forces are known to be operating in the area.
- (2) Magazines are not inserted in weapons in a camp area during daylight hours unless under attack.
- (3) Warning shots are not employed on contact with the enemy with the exception of daytime control of waterborne traffic. Craft failing to respond to challenge are warned by fire.
- (4) Rounds are not chambered in individual weapons unless contact with enemy is imminent. Senior Marine present determines if, in his judgement, measures must be taken to preserve lives of 1st Marine Division personnel. Initiation of any offensive or defensive formation implies imminent contact with the enemy.
- (5) Within the AOR and RZ and during operations in areas external thereto, establishment of a curfew is the responsibility of GVN officials. Assistance is enforcing the curfew normally devolves upon 1st Marine Division organizations and units. In such instances, indigenous personnel are informed of time limits involved and requirements for strict adherence. It is further explained that the purpose of the curfew is to ensure

that innocent civilians are not mistaken for the enemy and shot.

### b. VN Property

- (1) Civilian dwellings are not burned, nor are private property and livestock destroyed except as an unavoidable consequence of combat actions. Therefore, the firing of tracers into dwellings is avoided unless absolutely necessary to accomplish the commander's mission.
- (2) Destruction of Vietnamese dwellings and livestock as a measure of denying their use to enemy is left to RVNAF units. Requests from Vietnamese authorities for employment of 1st Marine Division to perform such destruction will be referred to this Headquarters.
- (3) Personal property of the Vietnamese will not be disturbed in any way except as essential for the tactical mission. All personnel will be provided periodic instruction as to the meaning of looting and the penalties provided in the Uniform Code of Military Justice for looting, burglary, larceny and house-breaking in violation of articles 103, 129, 121 and 130, respectively.

### c. Artillery/Naval Gunfire

- (1) Use of artillery and naval gunfire against known or suspected enemy targets in hamlets and villages occupied by noncombatants is governed by the following criteria:
  - (a) All attacks are controlled by airborne or ground observers and are executed only after U.S./GVN/RVNAF approval, as appropriate.
  - (b) Except as specified below, hamlets or villages not associated with ground operations are not attacked without prior warning (by leaflets and/or speaker systems or other appropriate means) even though fire is received from them.
  - (c) Villages and hamlets are attacked without prior warning if the attack is in conjunction with a ground operation involving maneuver of ground forces through the area, and if in the judgement of the ground commander, accomplishment of his mission is jeopardized by such warning.
  - (d) The use of incendiary type ammunition is avoided unless absolutely necessary in the accomplishment of the commander's mission.

- (2) In areas exclusive of villages and hamlets, artillery fire and naval gunfire is directed against enemy forces in contact in accordance with normal procedures. However, unobserved fire is directed only at targets or target areas declared hostile by GVN, VN liaison personnel, or air and/or ground observers. Further, unobserved naval gunfire is employed only under exceptional circumstances and in cases where:
  - (a) Requested naval gunfire support missions fall within specified strike zones approved by GVN/RVNAF as appropriate.
  - (b) Requested naval gunfire support missions cannot be observed due to terrain, weather or other factors.
  - (c) No U.S. ALO's, FAC's or airborne artillery spotters trained in naval gunfire spotting are available. (Conduct of naval gunfire support missions under this provision are taken as an acknowledged deviation from standard procedures).
- (3) All supporting arms missions, with exception of barrages and preplanned unobserved fires, are controlled by an airborne or ground FAC, forward observer, recon team insert, NGF Spot Team or RVNAF observer. All observed and unobserved fires, except barrages, are executed only after U.S./GVN/RVNAF approval, as appropriate.

### d. Air

- (1) All targets selected for an air strike are approved by the Province Chief or through higher ARVN authority.
- (2) All pilots endeavor to minimize noncombatant casualties and civilian property damage. Strikes are not executed where identification of friendly forces is in doubt.
- (3) All pilots have knowledge of the disposition of friendly forces and/or civilians prior to conducting strikes. This information comes from the ground or air briefing.
- (4) For purposes of this order, references to Forward Air Controller (FAC) also encompass and apply to Marine Tactical Air Coordinator Airborne (TACA) and Aerial Observers (AO) when appropriate.
- (5) USAF, USMC, and USN strike aircraft are normally controlled by the following, in order of preference as listed:
  - \* (a) US Air Force ALO/FAC or Marine TACA/FAC.

- \* (b) VNAF FAC/FAO.
- \* (c) USAF MSQ-77 (SKY SPOT) or USMC TPQ-10.
- \* Under VFR conditions, when USAF, USMC, or VNAF is not available, a qualified Army Target Identifying Pilot (TIP) may designate the target, and the flight leader of the strike aircraft control the strike.
- (6) In an emergency, when no qualified means of control is available, the following personnel may designate a target for strike aircraft:
  - (a) Commander of a ground unit or US advisor to a unit engaged with the enemy.
  - (b) U.S. pilot of an airplane or helicopter supporting a ground unit, who has radio contact with ground unit involved and/or can identify friendly positions in relation to enemy positions.
  - (c) U.S. pilot of an airplane or helicopter required to operate within vicinity of hostile village or hamlet for the purpose of conducting a medical evacuation or supply mission, and where enemy fire presents an immediate threat to lives of helicopter or transport crews.
- (7) Close air support missions that involve strikes on hamlets or villages are always controlled by an FAC. If attack on a village or hamlet is deemed necessary and is executed in conjunction with a ground operation involving movement of ground forces through an area, attack may be made without warning; however, appropriate US/GVN/RVNAF approval is required, except in emergencies. If an attack on a village or hamlet is not in conjunction with any immediate ground operation, inhabitants are warned by leaflets and/or loudspeaker system prior to attack and must be given sufficient time to evacuate area.
- e. Specific Instructions for Close Air Support to Include Interdiction (Day or Night):
  - (1) ALO/FAC
    - (a) Has a thorough knowledge of ground scheme of maneuver.
    - (b) Makes every effort to secure VNAF observer to assist in directing an air strike. If VNAF observer is not

# available, an ALO/FAC is authorized to direct air strikes.

- (c) Maintains a reliable communications with ground unit and with strike aircraft.
- (d) Makes a positive identification and marks target.
- (e) Ensures that strike pilots are aware of friendly locations in relation to the target, characteristics of target area, and local weather conditions.
- (f) Uses a 1:50,000 scale map of target area, and photographs when available.

### (2) Strike Pilots

- (a) Are under the control of, and have direct radio contact for a strike with a FAC or designated control agency (airborne or ground).
- (b) Have visual contact with the target or target marker except as noted in paragraph (f) below.
- (c) Always ascertain position of friendly troops (or civilians, when applicable).
- (d) Ascertain local conditions regarding weather, target area, and surrounding terrain characteristics.
- (e) Defend themselves against ground fire if the:
  - 1. Source of fire can be visually identified.
  - 2. Strike can be positively oriented against source.
  - Fire is of such intensity that counter action is necessary.
- (f) Strike at night only with flares, unless unler control of TPQ-10 or MSQ-7.
- f. Border Restrictions for Aircraft Conducting Assigned Missions in RVN.
  - (1) Aircraft do not cross demilitarized zone or Cambodian border unless specific authorization is obtained by this headquarters.
  - (2) All FAC's operating in vicinity of border have a 1:50,000

map of target area. Maps, mosaics, and photos are made available to pilots.

(3) Joint operations-intelligence facilities are established and complete prestrike briefings and poststrike debriefings are conducted for strikes within 5000 meters of border when practical.

#### g. Jettison

- (1) Munitions are jettisoned only in designated specified strike zones.
- (2) During night or IFR conditions, aircraft are under positive radar control while jettisoning. Check page 4-3 III MAF P03121.5.
- (3) During the day, VFR drops are monitored by radar whenever possible.

### h. US Armed Helicopters

- (1) U.S. Army and U.S. Marine armed helicopters are marked "U.S. Army" or "U.S. Marines", as appropriate, and may be manned with all U.S. crews at unit commanders' discretion.
- (2) If target involves noncombatants, such as in hamlet or village, an RVNAF observer is aboard the helicopter whenever possible and U.S./GVN/RVNAF approval to fire must be obtained unless the situation clearly presents an immediate threat to the lives of the crew.
- i. Air Reconnaissance Aerial Surveillance Missions
  - (1) Requests for reconnaissance coverage in areas which present a danger of overflight or border violation are forwarded through normal reconnaissance request channels.
  - (2) U.S. Army OV-1 aircraft may be armed with target marking ordnance while on surveillance missions.

### 4. POST OPERATIONS

- a. Where feasible, follow each operation with PsyWar/CA team to explain to the population what happened and how to avoid future noncombatant casualties.
- b. Following each operation wherein noncombatant casualties and/or

property damage have occurred, coordinate with the Province/ District Chief concerned for prompt identification of those affected. Consideration should also be given at this time to appropriate civic action reasures.

### 5. MISCELLANEOUS

- a. USMC units do not have the authority to exercise police powers over the Vietnamese people; hence the majority of controls have to be established by National Police, Army of Vietnam Military Police, or other ARVN military units and Regional and Popular Force units as appropriate. In the event of civil disturbance, the nearest Vietnamese National Police establishment is notified. 1st Marine Division units will take no action other than to defend themselves and U.S. property.
- b. Use of Riot Control Agents. Reference (h).

at the identification and nomination of those outstanding Marines who meet the criteria set forth in reference (a).

- b. Before nominating a man under this program the commanding officer should ask himself the questions framed in enclosure (1) and his answers to these questions should be reflected in the nomination letter.

#### SECTION I

101. GENERAL. Special Services for the 1st Marine Division will be conducted in accordance with MCO P1710.17, MARCORSPISERVEAN, these regulations, and other instructions as may be put forth by this Headquarters.

102. MISSION. The mission of the Special Services Program is to assist the Command in maintaining a high state of morale for the individual Marine through athletic, educational, and recreational activities.

## 103. FUNCTIONAL AREAS

- 1. The functional areas presently managed by Division Special Services reflect requirements which have been generated by the Division's deployment for combat. Accordingly, the Special Services Program will encompass the following functions:
  - a. Property
    - (1) Purchasing
    - (2) Storing
    - (3) Issuing
    - (4) Accounting
  - b. MARS (Military Affiliate Radio System)
  - c. R&R (Rest and Recuperation)
  - d. Entertainment (USO Shows and Paid Professional Entertainment)
  - e. Magazines, Newspapers and Periodicals
- f. 16mm Motion Picture Entertainment (Army & Air Force Motion Picture Service)
  - g. Division Education Program
  - h. Division Athletic Program (Suspended while in Vietnam)
- 2. NON-RESPONSIBILITY. Welfare/recreation funds or property will not be used to support clubs or messes except for holiday and special parties held in the enlisted clubs or enlisted messes.

- 3. SCOPE OF THES DERECTIVE. This directive has as its scope the duties and responsibilities of Special Services personnel and the techniques of property management. The functional areas cited in paragraphs 103.1b through 103.1h above are explained in separate directives.
- 104. THE SPECIAL SERVICES PROGRAM. The Special Services Program will be a composite of the functional areas cited above. The Division Special Services Officer will ensure that all of the assets, services, and facilities under his cognizance are managed so that each Marine is afforded his fair entitlement. Particular attention will be given to the need to match the services provided to the varying mobility requirements of a combat engaged, widely dispersed Marine Division. The ability to maintain centralized recreational facilities diminishes in proportion to the mobility requirements of combat, combat support, and combat service support organizations. Accordingly, the special services program will be carried out so as to meet the demands placed upon it by the user. Service will be the primary objective of the Special Services Program.

## 105. ORGANIZATION OF DIVISION SPECIAL SERVICES

1. STAFF COGNIZANCE. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1 has staff cognizance over the Special Services Officer and the Special Services Program. The Assistant Chief of Staff, Comptroller has staff cognizance over the appropriated and nonappropriated funds used to support the Special Services Program.

## 2. THE SPECIAL SERVICES OFFICER

- a. Performs his duties as prescribed in MCO P1710.17\_, MARCOR-SPISHAVMAN.
- b. Is responsible for planning, coordinating, and supervising the Special Services Program.
  - c. Supervises the duties of the following personnel:
    - (1) The Custodian of the Recreation Fund
    - (2) The Division Education Officer/Voting Officer
    - (3) The Division Athletic Officer (when appointed)
- d. Furnishes technical assistance to the Recreation Council and the Division Recreation Committee.
- e. Supervises all recreation, entertainment, and educational activities within the 1st Marine Division, other than those provided by the Clubs and Mess systems.

- f. Provides athletic and recreation equipment for all 1st Marine Division organizations and units under the Administrative Control (ADCON) of the 1st Marine Division.
- g. Publicizes all aspects of the Special Services Program so as to generate maximum interest and participation within the command.
- 3. THE CUSTODIAN OF THE RECREATION FUND. The Custodian performs his duties under the direct supervision of the Division Special Services Officer in accordance with the provisions of MCO P1710.17, and NAVSO P-2409, Accounting Handbook For Nonappropriated Funds, and other applicable directives. He specifically acts as a representative of the Commanding General in the maintenance of proper accountability of funds, property, and records. He insures that only authorized expenditures are made from the Recreation Fund and that requests for expenditures which are not considered authorized within the limitations of MCO P1710.17 are resolved or submitted to the Commanding General for final decision.
- 4. THE EDUCATION OFFICER. The Division Education Officer performs his duties as outlined in MCO P1560.16, Marine Corps Education and Library Manual, and other pertinent directives. It is his responsibility to plan, supervise, and promote an educational program in such a manner that all members of the Command have an opportunity to improve their level of education.
- 5. THE VOTING OFFICER. The Division Education Officer is assigned additional duties as Division Voting Officer. The Voting Officer performs his duties as prescribed in MCO 1742.2 (Absentee Voting) and other directives. He will be responsible for the planning, supervision, and promotion of an effective Absentee Voting Program and submission of statistical reports as required.
- 6. THE ATHLETIC OFFICER. The Division Athletic Officer performs his duties as prescribed in MCO P1710.17. He will ensure that the overall program provides an opportunity for active participation by all personnel, regardless of skill or experience. The purpose of this program is to promote physical fitness and "esprit de Corps", and to develop leadership, aggressiveness and confidence in the individual. (Temporarily suspended while in the Republic of Vietnam).

## 7. THE DIVISION REGREATION COUNCIL

a. COMPOSITION. MCO P1710.17 directs and defines the establishment, purposes, and responsibilities of the Recreation Council.

The Division Recreation Council will be composed of the following members:

- (1) Schior Member (Colonel)
- (2) Assistant Chief of Staff, Comptroller
- (3) Division Chaplain
- (4) Division Special Services Officer
- (5) Custodian, Recreation Fund
- (6) Regimental Executive Officers
- (7) Commanders or Executive Officers of all battalions
- (8) Commanders or Executive Officers of any unit for whom the Commanding General has approved an allocation of credit (Drawing Account).
- (9) All Special Services Officers (Ex Officio non-voting members)
  - (10) Area Auditor (Ex Officio non-voting member)
- b. DUTIES OF THE SENTER MEMBER. The Senior Member will ensure that the functions of the Council are performed in accordance with the provisions of NCO PIRIO.17. He will ensure that the record of proceedings for each meeting is forwarded to the Commanding General. The Custodian of the Recreation Fund will be the recorder of the minutes of the Recreation Council.
- c. QUORUM. A quorum will exist and meetings may be conducted when the Sender Member, Special Services Officer or Sustadian, and at least two-laires of the remaining voting members are present. Members present, not present, and the organizations they represent, will be recorded in the record of the proceedings.
- d. MEETINGS. Quarterly, (during the first week of each calendar quarter) or more often if directed by the Commanding General or at the call of the senior member.

#### 8. ENLISTED RECREATION COMMITTEE

a. COMPOSITION. MCO P1710.17 directs, defines, and establishes the purpose and responsibilities of the Enlisted Recreation Committee. The Division Enlisted Recreation Committee will be composed of the following members:

1-1:

- (1) Senior Member (Division Sergeant Major)
- (2) One enlisted man from each battalion and regimental Headquarters Company/Battery
- (3) One enlisted man from each organization authorized an allocation of credit (Drawing Account)
  - (4) Division Special Services Chief
  - (5) NCOIC Area Auditor's Office (Ex Officio non-voting member)
- b. DUTIES OF THE SENIOR MEMBER. The Senior Member will ensure that the functions of the committee are performed in accordance with MCO P1710.17.
- c. QUORUM. A quorum will exist and a meeting may be conducted when the Senior Member and at least two-thirds of the organizational representatives are present.
- d. NOMINATIONS. Commanding officers will ensure that the names of personnel designated to be members of the Division Enlisted Recreation Committee are submitted to the Division Sergeant Major.
- e. MEITINGS. Quarterly, (last week of each calendar quarter) or more often if directed by the Commanding General, or at the call of the senior member. The senior member will designate a recorder. The minutes of the meeting will be delivered to the Custodian of the Recreation Fund prior to the meeting of the Recreation Council.
- 106. ORGANIZATION OF SPECIAL SERVICES WITHIN SUBORDINATE ORGANIZATIONS
- 1. ORGANIZATIONAL COMMANDERS. Organizational commanders will ensure that the following Special Services assignments are effected in writing; that a copy of each appointing order is delivered to the Division Special Services Officer; and that personnel so assigned carry out the duties in cumbent with their assignments:
  - a. Organizational Recreation Council
  - b. Organizational Enlisted Recreation Committee
  - c. Organizational Special Services Officer
- 2. MEETINGS. Organizational Recreation Councils and Committees will meet prior to their Division level counterpart. By so doing, a fresh, responsive insight to the needs of the division will be generated for discussion at the quarterly meeting of the Division Enlisted Recreation Committee and Recreation Council.

## 3. ORGANIZATIONAL SPECIAL SERVICES OFFICER

- a. Each organizational special services officer will report to the Division Special Services Officer for briefing upon assignment.
- b. Newly assigned organizational special services officers will conduct an inventory of special services property upon assignment. Inventories will be conducted as prescribed in Section IV (Pre-Council Inventory) of this Order.

#### SECTION II

- 201. FUNDING. The 1st Marine Division Special Services Program is supported by appropriated and nonappropriated funds.
- 1. APPROPRIATED FUNDS. These funds are derived from Marine Corps appropriations.
- a. Appropriation Stores Account (ASA) Items. Headquarters, Marine Corps purchases major items of athletic and recreational equipment of a high cost nature such as pool tables, gym sets, boats, and television sets in accordance with allowances prescribed by MCO P1710.17, MARCORSPISHRVMAN. The equipment is requisitioned annually by the Division Special Services Officer and distributed to units on a custody basis. Repair and replacement of such items will be accomplished under the cognizance of the Custodian of the Recreation Fund.
- b. Operation and Maintenance, Marine Corps (0&M,MC). These funds are allocated quarterly to the Division Special Services Officer by the Assistant Chief of Staff, Comptroller in the form of Operating Budget Requisitional Authority. These funds are used to requisition SFA athletic and recreational supplies and equipment only. All SFA equipment and supplies will be requisitioned, received and distributed by the Division Special Services Officer.
- 2. NONAPPROPRIATED FUNDS. These are funds derived from the profits of military exchanges and such other sources as outlined in MCO P1710.17.

## 202. FISCAL CONTROL

- 1. NONAPPROPRIATED FUNDS. The Custodian of the Recreation Fund is responsible to account for all nonappropriated funds.
- 2. APPROPRIATED FUNDS. The Division Special Services Officer is responsible for the appropriated funds allocated for recreation and welfare. The Custodian of the Recreation Fund will manage such funds in accordance with Division Order P7000.3 SOP for Financial Management.
- 3. ALLOCATIONS OF CREDIT. Allocations of Credit are nonappropriated funds that have been set aside to enhance each commander's ability to provide for the particular Special Services needs of his organization. Such needs as parties and picnics, intramural athletic awards, and paid professional entertainment are the proper objectives of this fund. The following information is provided to facilitate understanding and prevent misuse of allocated credits.

- a. Allocated Credits are posted to the individual unit's account by the Custodian on the first day of each month. This account is called a "Drawing Account".
- b. Each battalion sized organization and each regimental headquarters company/battery will have a Drawing Account. Other units may be assigned a Drawing Account upon approval of the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1.
- c. Allocations of Credit will be posted to each drawing account at the rate prescribed by the Recreation Council and approved by the Commanding General (currently \$.50 per man per month). Unit strengths as of the last day of each month will be used for this computation.
- d. Allocations of Credit will be disbursed by the Custodian of the Recreation Fund, only, and only after receipt of a written request from the organizational commander.
- e. Organizational commanders are cautioned to make no commitments, either orally or in writing, of their Allocations of Credit prior to official approval of the expenditure by the Custodian of the Recreation Fund.
- f. Allocations of Credit are carried forward each month. Unused or unobligated credits are recouped at the end of each quarter, and are posted to the unobligated not worth of the Recreation Fund. New allocations of credit will be posted immediately after recoupent to prevent total depletion of any commander's drawing account.
- g. Commanders of combat support and combat service support organizations are advised to allocate a share of the organization's drawing account to subcrdinate units that are subject to detachment for "direct support" missions. Upon written notification of such action, the Custodian will be able to respond directly to the detached unit's request without seeking prior approval of the organizational commander. This will facilitate the servicing of "task" organized elements of the Division and will enable the Special Services Officer to respond immediately to the requests of units so detached.
- h. Commanders of organizations being detached from the 1st Marine Division's administrative control, and who have been authorized drawing accounts, will personally visit the Gustodian to receive instructions on procedures to be followed and to obtain the remaining balance of their account.

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- i. Units reporting to the administrative control of the 1st Marine Division will surrender their Allocations of Gredit to the Custodian of the Recreation Fund upon arrival, and commence the utilization of said funds under the jurisdiction of the Custodian.
- j. Units that report to the administrative control of the 1st Marine Division without an Allocation of Gredit will be granted such credit in the amount prescribed by the Recreation Council and approved by the Commanding General for the first month of tenure. At the end of their first month of tenure, they will be served as outlined above.
- k. Units reporting to the 1st Marine Division for operational control, only, may be granted funds for beverages and picnic supplies. Funds will be budgeted for this purpose.
- 1. Unit commanders who wish to order custom made individual athletic awards bearing the unit insignia are advised to seek local procurement facilities such as Army/Air Force Exchange sponsored concessionaires. Having obtained a price, it is then recommended that a visit be made to Division Special Services for study of other procurement sources. By so doing, the best price and most expeditious procurement arrangements can be accomplished.

#### 4. ACCOUNTING FOR RECREATION FUNDS

### a. DIVISION LEVEL

- (1) Appropriated Funds. The Custodian of the Recreation Fund will maintain the Memorandum Records as directed in DivO P7000.3 § 50P for Financial Management.
- (2) Nonappropriated Funds. The Custodian will maintain nonappropriated funds in accordance with the procedures outlined in NAVSO P-2409, Handbook for Accounting of Nonappropriated Funds.

#### b. ORGANIZATIONAL LEVEL

- (1) A report of the balance of each organization's Drawing Account will be furnished by the Custodian on the 15th day of each month.
- (2) The dollar value of fulfilled demands will be recorded by the Custodian and reported to organizational commanders as each demand is fulfilled.

- (3) The dollar value of each fulfilled demand will be subtracted from the organization's beginning balance, consecutively, as depletions occur.
- (4) On the 20th of each month the transactions for the previous month will be closed; the ensuing balance will be added to the new allocations; the cycle will start over.
- (5) An informal notebook type ledger will be used for this purpose. The actual documents of record are maintained by the Custodian. Organizational commanders must, however, be aware of their credit balance in order to plan and manage the effective employment of these funds.
- 203. BUDGET. The Division Special Services Officer is responsible for preparation of the annual budget for the Recreation Fund. He will be guided by the following precepts:
- 1. The Marine Corps policy is to utilize appropriated funds where available. The use of these funds require long range planning and must be included in the annual budget for operation and maintenance funds. Guidance in preparation of the annual operation and maintenance budget will be provided by the Assistant Chief of Staff, Comptroller.
- 2. The Special Services Officer will submit the annual budget to the Recreation Council in June of each year.
- 3. The annual budget will be supported by a narrative statement of the goals to be achieved and each goal will be supported by a dollar estimate. Dollar estimates will be based on past procurement data for goals that are to be continued or renewed. Dollar estimates for new goals will be based on price data acquired through competitive bid.
- 4. The annual budget will be programmed by fiscal year.
- 5. The average quarterly rotation of personnel, for the previous budget year will be the factor upon which the purchase of "general issue" items will be based:
- 6. A minimum of two bids will be required to support each purchase.

- 7. The Custodian of the Recreation Fund is authorized to transfer monies from any account to any other account as required to support the procurement of material, or the delivery of services set forth by the Recreation Council and approved by the Commanding General. Such transfers will be reported to the Recreation Council at each quarterly meeting. This prerogative is intended to give the Custodian the ability to adjust to changes in cost, and delivery lead time. In no instance, however, will the total dollar amount of any quarterly budget be exceeded.
- 8. No expenditures shall be made against the annual budget, or quarterly budget, for any planned program until the minutes of the Recreation Council have been signed by the Commanding General and delivered to the hand of the Custodian. Telephonic confirmation, or verbal report that the minutes have been signed is not adequate justification to commence expenditures.

#### SECTION III

## 301. RECREATION FUND PROPERTY

1. PROCUREMENT. All Recreation Fund property will be procured by the Custodian. While in the Republic of Vietnam, purchases from foreign sources will be in compliance with current Balance of Payments directives.

## 2. RESPONSIBILITY FOR CONTROL

- a. CUSTODIAN OF THE RECREATION FUND. The Custodian will distribute, maintain, and account for all Recreation Fund Property will not be issued by Division Special Services to any person not properly appointed as prescribed in Section I of this directive.
- b. ORGANIZATIONAL COMMANDERS. Organizational commanders are responsible and accountable for all Recreation Fund Property within their organizations.
- c. ORGANIZATIONAL SPECIAL SERVICES OFFICERS. Organizational special services officers will accept, distribute, maintain, and account for all special services property within their organizations.
- 3. THE CONCEPT OF ACCOUNTABILITY AND RESPONSIBILITY. Accountability is inherent to command. Accountability devolves upon the commanding officer who is required to maintain an account of property within the command. He retains accountability regardless of whether the property is in his possession for storage, use, or in the possession of others to whom it has been entrusted for use and safekeeping. The commanding officer may delegate that portion of his duties pertaining to property control, to designated subordinate officers. Accountability is further defined as an obligation registered with an individual who is required to assume jurisdiction over and upon proper occasion to account for public property committed to his charge by reason of his position, designation or assignment. Accountability is established upon an individual's acceptance of a position, designation, or assignment involving jurisdiction over public property.

#### 4. TYPES OF SPHCIAL SHRVICES PROPERTY

- a. EXPINDABLE SUPPLIES AND EQUIPMENT. Those items having a unit cost of \$25.00 or less whose chemical or physical alteration upon use or installation precludes reclaiming and reissue procedures. Example of such items are athletic supporters, mouth pieces for boxing, and office supplies.
- b. REPAR PARTS. Items required, regardless of cost, for the maintenance or repair of equipment; e.g., individual parts, subassemblies, and assemblies.

c. ITHMS FOR GENERAL ISSUE. Any expendable item, designated by the Commanding General, as "one time" issue, not to be returned. These items are:

Athletic Supporter Cards, Playing Badminton Set Christmas Decorations Ball, Basketball Darts/Dartboards Ball, Baseball Games, Assorted Ball, Football Gloves, Handball Ball, Golf Pen, Ball Point Ball, Handball Shoes, Basketball Ball, Softball Sweat Pants Ball, Volleyball
Ball, Table Tennis
Ball, Tennis Sweat Shirts Socks Trunks "Tiger Shorts" Battery (Flashlight) Trunks, Swim Cap, Baseball Writing Kits

- d. NONEXPENDABLE PROPERTY (TYPE "N"). Supplies and equipment procured with nonappropriated funds having a value of more than \$25.00.
- e. NONEXPENDABLE PROPERTY (TYPE "A"). Supplies and equipment procured with appropriated funds and having a value of more than \$25.00.

#### f. PLANT PROPERTY

- (1) Buildings, structures, and improvements (Class 2 Plant Property)
- (2) Equipment acquired with appropriated funds (Class 3 and 4 Plant Property)
- g. SPECIAL ITEMS. Firearms, trophies, and paintings acquired for morale purposes.

#### 302. MANAGEMENT OF PROPERTY RECORDS

1. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE CUSTODIAN OF THE RECREATION FUND. The Custodian of the Recreation Fund will maintain the records, instruments, ledgers and accounts prescribed in NAVSO P-2409, Accounting Handbook for Nonappropriated Funds.

## 2. RESPONSIBILITIES FOR ORGANIZATIONAL SPLCIAL SERVICES OFFICERS

- a. Organizational special services officers will maintain the following property records:
- (1) Consolidated Memorandum Receipt (CMR), (Letter format from the Custodian of the Accreation Fund). This document will be negotiated upon appointment and relief of each organizational special services officer. It will be prepared by the Custodian and will list all property currently on charge to the organization. The CMR will be the starting record for each organizational special services officer's tenure. From this document he will evolve his property management system. Each CMR issued by the Custodian supersedes all previous Consolidated Memorandum Receipts.
- (2) Certificate of Disposition (COD) (NAVCOMPT Form 741). This document is the instrument for decreasing the organization's property balance. COD's will be prepared monthly and submitted to the Custodian of the Recreation Fund by the 5th of each month. The monthly COD will reflect the disposition of property for the preceding month. COD's will be filed chronologically.
- (3) 1st Marine Division Special Services Issue Voucher. This document is the instrument for increasing the organization's obligation to the Custodian of the Recreation Fund. It will be prepared by the Custodian for each issue made to each organization.
- (4) Individual Custody Receipt (NAVCOMPT Form 744). This is the instrument that establishes an individual's obligation to the organizational special services officer. It shall be prepared by the organizational special services officer for every item of special services property issued, regardless of cost or type. Individual Custody Receipts will be segregated into the following categories and filed alphabetically by name within each category.
- (a) Items issued for "General Issue". Custody Receipts employed for this purpose will be conspicously marked "FOR GENERAL ISSUE NOT TO BE RETURNED".
- (b) For items that must be returned. These Individual Custody Receipts will be audited monthly to ensure that they are valid.
- b. The property management forms cited above will be furnished by the Custodian. Mormally these records are supplied by the supply system. While in Vietnam, however, it is considered worthwhile to manage the procurement of these documents from a central source.

#### 303. AUTHORITY TO DISPOSE OF PROPERTY

- 1. Organizational commanders are vested with the authority to dispose of property on charge to their organization. The following controls apply:
- a. In any instance of loss or damage that merits the commander's judgement or suspicion that culpability, or willful negligence might apply, an informal investigation must be conducted in the manner prescribed by JAG INST\_P5800.7, JAG Manual:
- b. In all instances requiring the disposal of property, regardless of type or cost, a Certificate of Disposition must be prepared and signed by the commanding officer. The following supporting documents must be attached to the Certificate of Disposition:
- (1) Individual Custody Receipts to support the disposition of "General Issue" items,
- (2) Individual Custody Receipts to support the disposition of expendable items.
- (3) Individual Custody Receipts to support the disposition of lost, damaged, or worn out equipment for which culpability or negligence does not exist. In the case of loss or damage, a written explanation of the circumstances causing loss or damage must be posted to the back of the Individual Custody Receipt by the person who was charged with the property at the time of its loss or damage.
- c. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-l is assigned the responsibility to approve Certificates of Disposition negotiated by the Custodian of the Recreation Fund. Property listed as unserviceable and beyond economical repair by the Custodian will be subjected to a technical inspection by a qualified, disinterested party. The Division Special Services Officer will request this service from combat service support organizations adjacent to the Division Special Services Facility.
- 304. SALVAGE OF DISPOSED PROPERTY. After property has been properly recorded on a COD and the respective COD negotiated as outlined above, the following procedures will apply.
- 1. All such property will be surrendered to the Custodian of the Recreation Fund upon submission of the Certificate of Disposition.

- 2. The Custodian will dispose of all property funded by nonappropriated funds in the best interest of the Recreation Fund. This prerogative permits cannibalization of spare parts for any item requiring repair. The residue of cannibalized property will be turned over to the appropriate property disposal activity when it is of no further value to the Recreation Fund. Salvage operations of this nature will be supervised by the Custodian of the Recreation Fund. Under no circumstances will such property be given to any person for barter or gratuity.
- 3. The Custodian will surrender all salvaged property that has been funded by appropriated funds to the Salvage Section of the Supply Activity of the 1st Force Service Regiment.

## 305. DISTRIBUTION OF PROPERTY

1. GENERAL. Recreation Fund property is procured to afford each member of the Division an opportunity to enjoy his moments of leisure. The Special Services program predicates its purchases upon the premise that distribution will be made to the lowest echelon of command. Organizational commanders are obligated to ensure that Special Services property is fairly and equitably distributed and that items which provide communal enjoyment, are in fact communally employed. The practice of individual sequestering of Special Services property intended for communal use must not be tolerated.

## 2. CATEGORIES FOR DISTRIBUTION

a. ITEMS FOR GENERAL ISSUE. Each member of the Division is entitled to one of each below listed item during his tour in Vietnam.

Athletic Supporter Shoes, Basketball Socks, Athletic (2 pair) Sweat Shirt Trunks "Tiger Shorts"

b. ITEMS FOR GENERAL ISSUE (AS REQUIRED). The below listed items are issued as required.

Balls, Assorted
Battery (Flashlight)

Cards, Playing
Darts/Dartboards

Games, Assorted Gloves, Handball Pen, Ball Point Writing Kit Sweat Pants

c. CONTROLLED ITEMS. These below listed items are apportioned by a MINIMUM TABLE OF ALLOWANCES maintained by the Custodian and published as a part of the Division Special Services Catalog.

Organizations will be given their entitlement as established by this T/A. Requests to modify the T/A will be considered by the Recreation Council as required.

d. <u>ITEMS ISSUED UPON DEMAND</u>. These items are all other items in the inventory. <u>Demands for items</u> that are not in the inventory will be recorded by the Custodian and presented to the Recreation Council for consideration.

## 306. REQUEST FOR PROPERTY

- 1. Requests for property will be submitted in writing using the format shown in Appendix A.
- 2. Division Special Services will prepare, distribute and maintain a catalog of property on hand.
- 3. Individual issues of Special Services property will not be made by Division Special Services. All property must be drawn by properly designated signatories as prescribed in Section III of this directive.

#### SECTION IV

## 401. ANNUAL INVENTORY

- 1. GENERAL. The annual inventory will be held on or about 30 June. It will be conducted in two phases as follows:
  - a. The Pre-Council Inventory
  - b. The Council Inventory

# 402. THE PRE-COUNCIL INVENTORY

1. GENERAL. The Pre-Council Inventory will be conducted under the supervision of the Custodian of the Recreation Fund on or about 1 June of each year or whenever the Custodian is relieved. The purpose of this inventory is to prepare for the Council Inventory.

# 2. PROCEDURES FOR THE PRE-COUNCIL INVENTORY

- a. The Custodian of the Recreation Fund will prepare two CMR's (Consolidated Memorandum Receipts) for each organization that maintains a special services property account. One CMR will show the total quantity of each item on charge to the organization and will be delivered to the organizational commander in a sealed envelope. The second CMR shall show the types of items on charge with no accountable balance indicated.
- b. Organizational commanders will designate a committee and direct that an inventory be taken.
- c. The inventory committee will report to the organizational commander when the inventory has been completed. The report will be listed on the CMR that showed items only. The quantities will be filled in by the inventory committee.
- d. The organizational commander will compare the totals derived by the inventory committee against the accountable balance indicated on the CMR previously delivered to the commander in a sealed envelope.
- e. Shortages will be adjusted as prescribed in Section III of this directive.
- f. Excesses will be reported by letter. They will be picked up on the property records of the Recreation Fund and then added to the account of the organization concerned.
- 3. INVENTORY FORMS. All inventory forms will be provided by the Custodian of the Recreation Fund.

## 403. THE COUNCIL INVENTORY

1. GENERAL. The Council Inventory is the method whereby the Recreation Council determines the propriety and accuracy of the Recreation Fund management. It is critically important that this inventory be conducted with accuracy and thoroughness, for it constitutes an annual accounting of funds and property as required by regulations. A Council Inventory will be held on or about 30 June each year or whenever the Custodian is relieved.

## 2. PROCEDURES FOR CONDUCTING THE COUNCIL INVENTORY

## a. DIVISION INVENTORY COMMITTEE

- (1) This committee will be appointed by the Senior Member of the Recreation Council. It will consist of a chairman and six members, designated from the membership of the Recreation Council.
- (2) The Division Inventory Committee will be responsible for assigning inventory teams to inventory each property account; for extending the report of each inventory team to reflect the total quantities and the dollar value of the property reported; and for submitting the completed inventory report to the Senior Member.

#### b. ORGANIZATIONAL INVENTORY TEAMS

- (1) Each organizational commander will appoint an inventory team consisting of the following personnel:
  - (a) One commissioned officer
  - (b) One staff noncommissioned officer
  - (c) One noncommissioned officer
- (2) Each organizational inventory team will be designated to inventory a property account by the chairman of the Division Inventory Committee. Under no circumstances will an organization inventory team inventory the property on charge to its parent organization.
- (3) Under no circumstance will any Special Service Officer be appointed to any inventory team.
- c. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE SENIOR MEMBER, INVENTORY COMMITTEE. The Senior Member will conduct a pre-inventory briefing on procedures for taking the inventory. Each member of the Division Inventory Committee and the senior member of each organizational inventory team will attend.

d. RESPONSIBILITIES OF THE AREA AUDITOR. The Area Auditor and his team will observe the taking of the inventory and answer any questions that may arise.

#### SECTION V

## 501. MOUNT OUT REQUIREMENTS

## 1. DIVISION SPECIAL SERVICES

- a. The Division Special Services Officer will appoint in writing an Embarkation Officer and Noncommissioned Officer.
- b. The Division Special Services Embarkation Officer will maintain current embarkation data and report embarkation readiness in accordance with current regulations. He will also maintain mount out boxes and other required containers in adequate Quantity.

## 2. ORGANIZATIONAL SPECIAL SERVICES

- a. SPECIAL LANDING FORCE. Allocations of Credit will be furnished to the commanding officer in accordance with the procedures outlined in Section II of this directive.
- b. PROPERTY. All property will be inventoried and returned to the Custodian of the Recreation Fund. Disposition procedures as outlined in Section III of this directive will be performed.
- c. REPLENISHMENT. Prior to departure, the unit special services officer will report to the Division Special Services Officer for a mount out supply of recreation/athletic equipment. Mount out supplies will exclude any item that costs more than \$25.00.

- 1. Purpose. To provide guidance and direction for the Provost Marshal and Military Police activities within 1st Marine Division (Rein), FMF.
- 2. <u>Gancellation</u>. Division Order 3120.17.
- 3. General. The nature of the conflict in the Republic of Vietnam requires rules and regulations beyond the scope of those established in references (a) through (h). Reference (i) contains instructions for the processing, exploiting, evacuating and accounting for detainees. Reference (j) establishes format and combines reports of statistical data, required by higher headquarters, that are related to crime trends, traffic violations, motor vehicle accidents and other military police activities. Reference (k) applies to the use of force during apprehension of friendly forces. Reference (1) applies to both military and civilian personnel. Reference (m) defines and delimits the investigative jurisdiction and responsibilities of the Office of Naval Intelligence and field components thereof. It also delineates the types of investigations which commanding officers are required to refer to Naval Intelligence and those which should be resolved through utilization of command resources. Enclosure (1) and (2) pertain to the investigation. apprehension, and detention of civilians.

- 4. Provost Marshal. The Provost Marshal is a member of the Division Special Staff and comes under the staff cognizance of AC/S, G-1. He is also the Commanding Officer, Military Police Company, Headquarters Battalion, 1st Marine Division (Rein), FMF. The Military Police Company is under the administrative control of the Commanding Officer, Headquarters Battalion for supply, administration and logistics. References (a) and (b) set forth the general duties and responsibilities of the Provost Marshal. Specific duties and functions are:
- a. Advise Commanding General and staff on Provost Marshal and Military Police activities. Submit reports in accordance with references (j) and (m).
- b. Recommend employment and utilization of the Military Police Company.
  - c. Plan, direct and supervise Military Police training.
- d. Flan, direct and supervise the following Military Police operations:
  - (1) Traffic control.
  - (2) Circulation control of individuals.
  - (3) Apprehension of military personnel.
  - (4) Protection of property and individuals.
  - (5) Prevention and investigation of crime.
  - (6) Temporary detention of military prisoners.
  - (7) Prisoner of War operations.
- (8) Military Police participation in rear area security and damage control activities.
- e. Coordinate activities with other military and civilian law enforcement agencies. (See enclosures (1) and (2)).
- 5. <u>Military Police Operations</u>. References (c) through (h) provide detailed guidance for Military Police activities. Military Police will provide the following support to the 1st Marine Division as required/directed:
  - a. Traffic control.

- b. Prevention and Investigation of Crime. In accordance with reference (m), copies of all criminal/security type investigations will be forwarded by the Provost Marshal to the Naval Investigative Service, Resident Agency. This refers only to those matters in which some substantial investigation has been performed by military police personnel on well-founded allegations and does not include reports involving purely military offenses, or noutine reports relative to drunkenness, disorderliness, etc.
- c. Processing, exploiting, evacuating and accounting for detainees. These activities will be conducted in accordance with reference (i).
  - d. Operation of straggler collecting points.
  - e. Operation of detention facility for military prisoners.
- f. Assistance in Division rear area security and area damage control missions.
- g. Limited local and internal ground security for the Division Command Post.
  - h. Escort and security for special persons.
  - i. Enforcement of military laws, orders, and regulations.

### 6. Requests for Military Police Support

- a. Regiments are responsible for traffic control within their assigned TAOR's. Requests for Military Police assistance will be submitted to Assistant Chief of Staff, G=4 if a special problem arises in traffic control.
- b. Requests for Military Police to establish Prisoner of War collecting points will be submitted to Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1.
- c. Requests for assistance in criminal investigations will be submitted to the Division Provost Marshal.
- d. Requests for all other types of Military Police support will be submitted to the Division Provost Marshal.
- e. When a unit requests Military Police support, the requesting unit will be responsible to provide necessary logistic support such as rations, billeting, water, and consumable supplies.
- f. Requests for Military Police support should provide the following data:

- (1) Requesting unit.
- (2) Time and place to report.
- (3) Duration of employment.
- (4) Size of Military Police detachment desired.
- (5) Type of commitment (Prisoner of War collecting point, traffic control, etc.).
  - (6) Person to contact for further information.

## 7. Investigation, Apprehension and Detention of Civilians

#### a. Definitions

- (1) United States Civilian, Category I United States civilians who are serving with or accompanying U. S. Forces in Vietnam within the meaning of Article 2(10) UCMJ. This category includes:
- (a) U. S. civilian personnel of the Departments of Defense, Army, Air Force or Navy, and merchant seamen manning ships operated directly by one of these departments.
- (b) U. S. civilians employed by private business firms, either foreign or U. S., which are under contract to one of the military departments to support military operations in Vietnam. This would include merchant seamen not included in paragraph 7a(1)(a) above, who are employed on chartered ships carrying military cargo.
- (c) U. S. civilian personnel of other U. S. Government agencies and private contractor employees of these agencies if their position or a particular job assignment places them in a position where they are accompanying U. S. forces in Vietnam or in adjacent waters.
- (2) Category II Other employees of U. S. Government agencies not covered by Category I, e.g., USAID, JUSPAO, or State Department Foreign Service employees.
  - (3) Category III News media personnel.
- (4) Category IV U. S. citizens having no connection with U. S. forces as defined in Category I. This would include persons engaged in private enterprise, tourists, and civilian dependents.
- b. The apprehension, investigation and detention of civilians will be as prescribed in enclosures (1) and (2).

- c. In no case will apprehension, detention or search and seizure authority be exercised by personnel of this Command over Vietnamese Nationals, FWMAF, Third-Country Nationals or other than Category I U. S. citizens, except as delineated herein.
- d. Personnel of this Division, so authorized, may apprehend or detain any person on a 1st Marine Division installation, on 1st Marine Division (Rein), FMF controlled property, or in combat areas or facilities under 1st Marine Division control for offenses committed thereon or for the protection of human life or property.
- e. In the event that an individual other than a member of a U. S. Armed Service or Category I U. S. citizen, as defined in paragraph 7a(1) above, is apprehended under the authority of subparagraph 7d above, immediate steps will be taken to inform Vietnamese authorities and to turn over the individual apprehended as soon as possible. If Vietnamese authorities do not or cannot respond within a reasonable time, the prisoner will be escorted to the exit from the installation, property, or other area under U. S. control and released.
- f. 1st Marine Division (Rein), FMF personnel are not authorized to enter Vietnamese property for the purposes of Criminal Investigation or Crime Prevention except at the express invitation of the owner or tenant of the property involved or at the invitation and in company with Vietnamese police authorities. In this latter instance, it should be emphasized that the basic and primary authority to enter such property rests with the Vietnamese authority who must make the initial entry. In any event (by invitation of the tenant, owner or Vietnamese police), entrance to such property will be made only for the limited purpose of protecting the life and property of U. S. Armed Forces personnel and Cateogry I U. S. citizens and/or for the purpose of apprehending such personnel only.
- g. Scarches of Vietnamese personnel incident to their lawful apprehension by 1st Marine Division personnel as prescribed above will be conducted: (1) by Vietnamese police in the case of males and (2) by a Vietnamese female in the case of females. Such searches are limited to a search conducted for the sole surpose of discovering weapons or implements with which the prisoner might have himself or others. In the event that Vietnamese personnel are not available and in that event only, a search may be made for the surpose of discovering weapons by 1st harine Division personnel. In the case of a female priconer, where a Vietnamese female is not available to conduct a search, the a mediate search authorized hereby will be limited to a sight search and so it clearly appears that a conductable to a sight search and so it clearly appears that a conductable to a sight search and so it clearly appears that a conductable to a sight search and a prisoner. In the event of such a search, only weapons and contraband may be seized.

#### 8. Detention

- a. Detention facilities and procedures will be as prescribed in par 103.5 of reference (1)..
- b. Vietnamese personnel will not be detained in 1st Marine Division (Rein), FMF facilities.
- 9. <u>Gate Searches</u>. Searches of persons entering or departing installations of the 1st Marine Division (Rein), FMF may be conducted for the purpose of preventing the unauthorized introduction or removal of U. S. Government property and contraband. Searches conducted for the foregoing purpose shall be in accordance with the following rules:
- a. All persons, military or civilian may be searched prior to entering or departing any area controlled by the 1st Marine Division or an element thereof. Such searches are considered necessary for the health, welfare and security of personnel and property.
- b. Physical Searches: all persons, military and civilian, seeking entry to or exit from an area controlled by the 1st Marine Division (Rein), FMF may be physically searched where such procedure is determined by the Installation Commander or Coordinator, to be necessary at that time to prevent the introduction or removal of unauthorized property from the custody and control of the 1st Marine Division. The physical search of such personnel will be conducted by military inspectors in the case of members of the armed services and category I U. S. civilians and in the case of all other persons by Vietnamese inspectors assigned and/or available for such purpose and under the general supervision of the military personnel appointed for that purpose by the Installation Commander or Coordinator. Male inspectors will search male employees. Only female inspectors will search females. Personnel will not be required to disrobe for such searches. Insofar as is practicable, the search will be conducted in a manner least likely to embarrass and degrade the individual being searched. Inspectors will request that personnel to be searched show/display or exhibit the contents of all packages, handbags, boxes, bags or other containers. The searching personnel will not handle the property in any way except to seize that property which is clearly contraband, or property of the U. S. Government or other unauthorized property.
- c. Except as provided above, all searches will be sight searches and will be conducted as follows: Sight searches may be conducted by military or Vietnamese personnel assigned for such purpose. Sight searches will be conducted on order of and at the discretion of the Installation Commander or Coordinator. As in the case of

physical searches, to be effective, they should be conducted at unannounced and varying times of the day and month. When personnel are aboard transportation of any kind and an inspection of their person or property cannot be conducted with any degree of competence while in or on the transportation, personnel will be required to debark from the vehicle in order to permit the search. In that event, inspectors will, in addition to searching personnel, thoroughly inspect the vehicle itself. Inspectors will request that personnel to be searched show/display or exhibit the contents of all packages, handbags, bexes, bags or other containers. The searching personnel will not handle the property in any way except to seize that property which is clearly contraband, property of the U. S. Government, or other unauthorized property. Personnel being inspected may be requested to empty and/or display any property carried in pockets or otherwise on their person.

- d. Inspectors, whether conducting a physical or sight search, may seize items which are clearly contraband, which are property of the United States, or other unauthorized property which the individual does not have authority to possess. In each case when property is seized, a receipt therefor will be prepared in triplicate. The original will be given to the person whose property is seized. The duplicate receipt will be forwarded to the Division Legal Officer and the triplicate will be retained in the Provost Marshal's file. In addition thereto, a report of such seizure will be made, in the case of a serviceman or Category I U. S. Citizen, to the individual's commanding officer or military superior. In the case of all other personnel such report will be made to the Camp Industrial Relations Officer.
- e. In the event that personnel refuse to consent voluntarily to a search as described above, permission to depart the base will be denied to military personnel and Category I U. S. civilians and an immediate report thereof will be made to the individual's commanding officer or military supervisor. Civilian employees will be advised that, if they persist in their refusal to be searched, such refusal may be grounds for terminating their employment and the privilege of entering on U. S. controlled property thereafter. If such personnel continue to refuse, a report thereof will be made to the cognizant Industrial Relations Office with a view to terminating their employment and thereafter denying them permission to enter all U. S. controlled property. In the case of all other personnel refusing to submit to such a search, immediate steps will be taken to deny them further access to any property under control of the 1st Marine Division (Rein), FMF and to report such refusal to higher authority with the request that denial of the privilege of entering all U. S. property in RVN be taken.

#### CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION CRIME PREVENTION AND CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION

- PURPOSE. To establish policies governing the prevention and investigation of criminal acts and offenses involving US Armed Forces personnel and US Category I civilians serving with or accompanying the US Armed Forces in Vietnam.
- 2. APPLICABILITY. This directive applies to all US Armed Forces personnel, component and subordinate commands, and Category I US civilians as defined in MACV Directive 190-1. The term US forces as used in this directive includes US Armed Forces personnel and Category I US civilians.

#### 3. GENERAL.

- The prevention or deterrence of criminal acts and offenses committed by or against US forces or against US property is a major objective of this command.
- The establishment of investigative programs to detect serious criminal offenses and other unlawful activities including but not limited to black-marketing, currency exchange manipulations, narcotics, marihuana, dangerous drugs, illegal use of or disposition of US government property, traffic in stolen goods, fraud and corruption is essential.
- Criminal acts committed by or against US forces personnel. or against US property outside of a US Military installation or facility will be investigated by the criminal investigation agency of the component service exercising geographical jurisdiction over the area concerned or by the investigative agency of the service exercising jurisdiction over the individual, or property involved.
- (1) Primary jurisdiction for the investigation of criminal acts committed by or against US forces personnel, or against US property outside of a US Military installation or facility will be exercised by the criminal investigation agency having jurisdiction over the individual or property involved.

#### MACV Dir 195-1

- (2) Secondary jurisdiction rests with the agency exercising geographical jurisdiction and will be assumed only in the absence of the agency exercising primary jurisdiction or because of the exigency of a particular incident or situation. In all such cases, the agency exercising primary jurisdiction will be informed of the matter as soon as practicable and provided with all pertinent information.
- (3) In all cases where doubt exists as to the appropriate agency to conduct an investigation a determination will be made at the lowest' appropriate level of command.
- (4) Criminal investigations involving more than one component service may be conducted jointly or transferred by mutual agreement to the component service having primary interest.
- 4. <u>RESPONSIBILITIES</u>. Component Commanders and Commanding General, III Marine Amphibious Force or commanders specifically charged by service directives to operate, maintain and administer military investigative service will:
- a. Establish criminal investigation and crime prevention programs within their respective commands and areas of jurisdiction.
- b. Establish criminal investigation offices, where facilities permit, to provide criminal investigative support to their subordinate commands.
- 5. INCIDENTS INVOLVING OTHER THAN US MILITARY PERSONNEL OR CATEGORY I CIVILIANS. When it is determined during the course of a criminal investigation that FWMAF, Vietnamese Nationals, Third-Country Nationals, or other than Category I US citizens are involved, the appropriate representatives of the country or US agency concerned will be notified as soon as practicable.

## 6. SEARCH AND SEIZURE.

- a. Procedures governing the authority and the conduct of searches and seizures will be in accordance with applicable directives and with the laws of the RVN.
- b. In no case will apprehension, detention or search and seizure authority be exercised by US forces criminal investigative personnel over Vietnamese Nationals, FWMAF, Third-Country Nationals or other than Category I US citizens, except as delineated in MACV Directive 190-1.

### 7. SUSPENSION OF FAVORABLE PERSONNEL ACTIONS,

- a. Prompt notification to commanders that an individual under their control is the subject of an investigation or a material witness is of particular significance in Vietnam due to the frequent and rapid turnover of personnel.
- b. Criminal investigative personnel will inform commanders of the requirement to take appropriate action in accordance with applicable directives to insure suspension of favorable personnel action relative to individuals under investigation or to take other appropriate action in the case of material witnesses.
- c. Criminal investigation records will reflect the date and the name of the commander or other individual in the unit who was notified that an investigation involving a member of his command had been initiated.

#### 8. REPORTS OF INVESTIGATION.

- a. Reports of investigation will be prepared and distributed in accordance with applicable component service directives.
- b. Information copies in triplicate of each interim pending progress and/or completed report of investigation that lists a US civilian in the subject/title block will be furnished this Headquarters, ATTN: MACJ15.
- c. Reports of investigation pertaining to military personnel assigned to MACV will be distributed as follows:
  - (1) US Air Force Personnel Commander, Det 11, 1131st Special Activities Squadron, APO 96307
  - (2) US Navy Personnel Commander, Naval Support Activities, Saigon, APO 96309
  - (3) US Marine Corps Personnel Commanding General,
    Marine Corps Unit, MACV,

  - (4) US Army Personnel Commanding General, US Army Element, MACV, APO 96222

- d. Reports required by this directive are exempt from reports control under paragraph 39t, AR 335-15.
- 9. <u>LIAISON AND COORDINATION</u>. Close liaison, cooperation and exchange of information of mutual interest with FWMAF, US and GVN investigative and intelligence agencies is authorized and encouraged. Caution will be exercised to insure that information released is not in violation of component service security regulations.

MILITARY POLICE US FORCES POLICE OPERATION

- To prescribe policies for the utilization and operation PURPOSE. of US forces police in Vietnam and for US forces police authority over US civilians in Vietnam.
- This directive applies to all US Armed Forces APPLICABILITY. personnel and units.

## RESPONSIBILITIES.

- Component and uniservice commanders are responsible for enforcing the policies and procedures set forth in this directive. The issuance of supplementary instructions, not inconsistent with this directive, is authorized.
- Supervisors of US forces police are responsible for maintaining b. rosters of supervisors in US civilian firms within their area of responsibility who are to be contacted when employees of the firm are apprehended or detained by US forces police.

#### 4. DEFINITIONS.

- US forces police. As used in this directive, the term US forces police includes US Army Military Police, US Navy Shore Patrol, US Marine Corps Military Police, US Air Force Police, and the criminal investigation agencies of each service, i.e., Army Criminal Investigation Division (CID), Naval Investigating Service (NIS), Marine Criminal Investigation Division, and Air Force Office of Special Investigation (OSI).
- United States civilians. As used in this directive, the term United States civilians includes all US citizens and nationals other than members of the Armed Forces within the Republic of Vietnam.
- (1) Category I: United States civilians who are serving with or accompanying US forces in Vietnam within the meaning of Article 2(10) UCMJ. This category generally includes:

- (a) US civilian personnel of the Departments of Defense, Army, Air Force or Navy, and merchant seamen manning ships operated directly by one of these departments.
- (b) US civilians employed by private business firms, either foreign or US, which are under contract to one of the military departments to support military operations in Vietnam. This would include merchant seamen not included in paragraph 4b(1)(a), above, who are employed on chartered ships carrying military cargo.
- (c) US civilian personnel of other US Government agencies and private contractor employees of these agencies if their position or a particular job assignment places them in a position where they are accompanying US forces in Vietnam or in adjacent waters.
- (2) Category II: Other employees of US Government agencies not covered by Category I, e.g., USAID, JUSPAO, or State Department Foreign Service employees.
  - (3) Category III: News media personnel.
- (4) Category IV: US citizens having no connection with US forces as defined in Category I. This would include persons engaged in private enterprise, tourists, and civilian dependents.
- c. US Armed Forces personnel. As used in this directive, the term US Armed Forces personnel includes members of the US Armed Forces and persons serving with or accompanying the Armed Forces as set forth in Article 2(10) UCMJ.

## 5. US FORCES POLICE AUTHORITY.

- a. It is official US Government policy that US forces police will normally exercise police authority over military personnel and Category I civilians only. This is based upon agreement with the GVN. However, US forces police may be required to exercise some degree of control over other US civilians in situations where immediate action is required and where Vietnamese police are not readily available.
- (1) US forces police will give information, advice and assistance to all US civilian personnel in Vietnam.

MACV Dir 190-1 23 June 1967

- (2) US forces police will exercise apprehension and detention authority over Category I civilians where identified. Such authority normally will not be exercised over Category II civilians except in emergencies as set forth in paragraph 5a(4), below.
- (3) Normally, once identification has been established by Vietnamese authorities, US forces police will not exercise any authority over Category III and IV civilians. These civilians are subject to Vietnamese jurisdiction and situations involving them will be handled by Vietnamese authorities.
- (4) In situations where Vietnamese authorities are not available and it is necessary for the protection of human life or US property or security, or when the person is engaged in the commission of a serious crime (felony), US forces police may temporarily apprehend and detain other US civilians.
- (5) Vietnamese police will be notified as soon as possible whenever US civilians are apprehended or detained by US forces police.
- (6) The foregoing does not affect in any manner the rights of US citizens under the constitution and laws of the United States, nor do they affect the jurisdiction of Vietnamese courts and law enforcement officials over US citizens in Vietnam.
  - b. The United States Embassy has agreed to:
- (1) Ensure that all US civilians in Vietnam are aware of the circumstances under which US forces police may exercise police authority over them and the need for presenting identification cards upon request.
- (2) Arrange for each US Government affiliated civilian in Vietnam to be issued an identification card and ensure that he is requested to properly identify himself upon request of the US forces police.
  - c. US forces police will:
- (1) Apprehend or detain persons on a US Government installation or on US controlled property or in combat areas and facilities under US control for offenses committed thereon or for the protection of human life or property. Notification procedures outlined in paragraph 5c(3), below, will apply.

EACY Dir 190-1 23 June 1967

- (2) Apprehend and/or detain US civilians in other situations only under the conditions outlined in paragraph 5a, above.
- (3) Notify the appropriate component or uniservice commander and the appropriate Vietnamese authorities as soon as possible when a CS civilian is apprehended or detained and forward a report immediately by electrical means to this Headquarters, ATTN: MACJ15. (Reports exempt under aragraph 39c. AR 335-15.)
- (4) se minimum force necessary to apprehend or detain. The amount of for use in apprehending or detaining a resisting offender all be only that force which is necessary to overcome the resistance.
- (5) Exercise utmost care in handling uncooperative individuals. Persons who are reasonably believed to be US Armed Forces personnel and refuse to divulge their identity may be considered to be in Category I and police authority will be exercised accordingly until their status is determined by a responsible officer.
- (6) Release US civilians who are detained for other than serious offenses on their own cognizance when practical.
- (a) Categories I and II civilians will be released to their immediate supervisor or his authorized representative. In the case of merchant seamen, this would be the ship's master or agent-in-country.
- (b) Categories III and IV civilians will be released to the appropriate Vietnamese authorities.
- (7) Prepare traffic citations or incident reports in the performance of official duty, for violations of UCMJ or local laws by US Armed Forces personnel. Such citations and incident reports will be forwarded to the commander or supervisor of the individual concerned for action.
- (8) Policies and procedures concerning news media personnel are contained in Annex A to this directive.
- 6. JOINT POLICE PATROLS. By agreement between the Government of the Republic of Vietnam (RVN) and the Government of the United States, policing will be conducted by joint police patrols wherever possible. These patrols will be composed of National Police (Canh Sat), RVNAF Military Police (Quan Canh), US forces police and FWMAF military policemen. The following policies apply to joint patrols:

MACV Dir 190-1 23 June 1967

- a. The national police officer will be in charge of the joint police patrol.
- b. The national police officer will establish identification of persons in civilian clothing prior to any action by US forces police.
- c. The national police officer at the scene of an incident/accident involving a US civilian will make the initial determination as to the disposition of an apprehended or detained US civilian.
- d. FWMAF representatives will assume custody over their service personnel.

#### 7. ENFORCEMENT.

- a. Traffic Control.
- (1) US forces have no legal authority or jurisdiction over Vietnamese traffic outside US controlled installations.
- (2) Traffic control and enforcement on US installations is the responsibility of the installation commander.
- (3) Traffic control and enforcement outside US forces controlled areas is the responsibility of the local Vietnamese civil and/or military authorities. US forces police will also enforce traffic regulations over all US Armed Forces personnel and all drivers of US Government vehicles.
- (4) US forces police will investigate traffic accidents involving US Armed Forces personnel or US property. Investigations which involve FWMAF or Vietnamese personnel or property will be coordinated with the FWMAF and/or Vietnamese authorities.
  - (5) Police Escorts and Traffic Control for Key Personnel.
- (a) Vietnamese security and law enforcement authorities will lead police escorts of key personnel and control Vietnamese traffic as required.
- (b) Component and uniservice commanders will make arrangements with local Vietnamese law enforcement agencies for adequate, integrated security and traffic control measures for escorting key personnel.

- (c) US forces police will provide only trail security vehicles or other mutually agreeable augmentation.
  - (6) Convoy and Oversized Vehicle Escorts.
- (a) Wherever feasible US forces police will coordinate traffic escorts for convoys and oversized vehicles with local Vietnamese police authorities.
- (b) Where Vietnamese authorities are unavailable or unable to further equired convoy/oversized vehicle escorts, US forces police are authorized to provide such escorts within limitations outlined in paragraph 7a(1), above.

#### b. Vice Control.

- (1) The suppression of prostitution is an established policy of the US Armed Forces.
- (2) Actions to suppress prostitution will be coordinated with appropriate local Vietnamese authorities.

#### c. Search and Seizure.

- (1) Installation commanders have the authority to order a search, upon probably cause, of all property under their jurisdiction.
- (2) Installation commanders may delegate the general authority to order search and seizure. Such delegation should be to persons of the command exercising jurisdiction over the place where the property is situated and not to persons otherwise exercising police power.

## 8. CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION.

- a. Criminal incidents affecting or involving US military personnel or property will be investigated by accredited investigators of the Army, Air Force, Navy, or Marine Corps in accordance with pertinent service directives. Investigations involving FWMAF or Vietnamese personnel, US civilians serving with or accompanying US Armed Forces or property will be coordinated with appropriate FWMAF or Vietnamese authorities.
- b. CID, OSI, NIS and Marine Corps investigators will be utilized only in conformance with pertinent directives of their component service.

#### 9. REPORTS.

- a. Component and uniservice commanders will establish procedures to review all criminal investigation and other police reports pertaining to their personnel. The criminal investigation and police reports will be prepared in accordance with appropriate service directives.
- b. Criminal investigation reports in triplicate pertaining to all categories of US civilians will be forwarded to this Headquarters, ATTN: MACJ15.
  - c. US forces police reports.
- (1) The Military Police Report (DA Form 19-32) or comparable Navy, Marine or Air Force service report will be prepared on all complaints received and incidents reported by US forces police. Reports will be prepared in every case where an apprehension is made or a person is restored to US forces control from another apprehending agency. (Reports exempt under paragraph 171, AR 335-15.)
- (2) US forces police reports will be prepared in accordance with respective service directives and regulations.
- (3) One copy of each US forces police report pertaining to US civilians will be forwarded to this Headquarters, ATTN: MACJ15.
- (4) One copy of each US forces police report will be forwarded to the appropriate service component commander, ATTN: Provost Marshal or Director, Security Police (Air Force), as appropriate.
- d. Provost Marshal Activities Report (RCS: PMG-2(R-6), authority AR 190-46).
- (1) DA Form 19-20, RCS: AF-Y7, or comparable service form will be used to record data concerning offenses committed by persons subject to the UCMJ. (Reports exempt under paragraph 390, AR 335-15.)
- (2) Each component service will prepare a Provost Marshal Activities Report, or a comparable service form or report, quarterly as of the last day of March, June, September and December. An information copy of this report will be submitted to this Headquarters, ATTN: MACJ15, not later than the 15th working day following the last day of the reporting period.

# US FORCES POLICE AUTHORITY AND NEWS MEDIA PERSONNEL

- 1. The following guidance establishes MACV policy relating to the activities of news media personnel engaged in news gathering activities outside US military installations.
- a. Under normal circumstances, US forces police will not exercise police jurisdiction over properly accredited (MACV or GVN Press Card) civilian news media personnel working at their profession.
- b. Properly accredited news media personnel who present either an RVN or a MACV Press Card will be permitted to enter an area, building or locality which has been cordoned off unless:
- (1) Their presence would interfere with the treatment, rescue or evacuation of casualties.
- (2) Their presence would materially reduce the effectiveness of efforts to minimize the effects of the disaster.
- (3) Their presence or activities in an area will constitute a danger to themselves; in which case they will be permitted entry after being informed of the danger and cautioned that they proceed at their own risk, or,
- (4) There is exposed classified material or information which cannot be covered, concealed or removed. However, if upon advice and guidance of information officials in such cases, determination is made by the responsible senior US military member present that damage inimical to the best security interests of the US Government is unlikely to result, then entry will be permitted after the news media personnel are informed of the presence of the classified material or information and requested to cooperate in its protection.
- 2. Physical force will not be used if news media representatives refuse to cooperate in the protection of classified material. However, in such an event, the assistance of appropriate military and civil law enforcement officials will be requested in preventing compromise of such material and in recovering all photographs, negatives, sketches, notes and other material which are presumed to contain classified information. Refusal of

news media personnel or their superiors to cooperate in preventing compromise of classified material will be reported promptly by priority means to Headquarters, MACV, ATTN: MACJ15 (Provost Marshal Division) with information copy to MACOI (Office of Information).

Reports Required: I. Daily Refugee Control Report paragraph 4.a
II. Unit After Operation Report (Refugee Portion)
paragraph 4.b

1. Purpose. To promulgate instructions to unit commanders relative to control of refugees created during named operations.

#### 2. Background

- a. The safety, care and handling of refugees is viewed as one of the most serious problems faced by Division units. Careful advance planning can do much to relieve the overall plight of a relocated population. Experience has proven that refugees quickly recognize that the sympathetic attitudes, action and activities of 1st Marine Division units are in sharp contrast to the enemy's terroristic activities. Proper handling and care represent tangible opportunities to gain favor toward the GVN and FWMAF in spite of military actions and thus serve in the pacification process.
- b. This SOP amplifies the guidance set forth in references (a), and (b).
- c. Generalist Teams (platoons) of the 29th Civil Affairs Company are now available to Division units for refugee planning, assistance and support. This Headquarters (Attn: G-5), is the initial point of contact in requesting planning and support.

#### 3. Action

- a. Planning. Operational planning must include the potential of generating refugees who must be removed from the tactical area. Planning for refugee control must include:
- (1) Determination of the number of refugees expected to be generated within the area of operation. This determination should be based on intelligence estimates/reports and in conjunction with assistance from 29th Civil Affairs Generalist Teams.
- (2) Determination of the number of refugee teams required to handle the anticipated refugees.
  - (3) Selection of refugee collection points based on:
- (a) Access to a road network to permit movement of GVN refugee teams to the collection points.
- (b) Access by refugees from different portions of the area of operation.
  - (c) Security of the collection points from enemy forces.
  - (d) Distance to the points of resettlement.
- (4) Notification of the populace in order to assist refugees in locating collection points:
- b. Responsibility. Overall responsibility for the movement, care, feeding, and shelter of refugees is a function of the GVN. However, subordinate commanders of this Division must be prepared to assist in accomplishing this responsibility in order to assure that the tactical units efforts are not diverted from their primary mission.
- (1) Refugee collection points will be manned by GVN Refugee Team(s) whose duties will include:
- (a) Screening of refugees to prevent the escape of VC infiltrators.
- (b) Collection of intelligence of immediate tactical importance from refugees concerning VC forces.
- (c) Determination of ultimate destination of refugees collected.

- (d) Security at the collection points and during evacuation to the rear areas.
- (e) Transportation of refugees when overland transportation is possible and tactically desirable.
- (f) Resettlement of refugees and provision for emergency shelter and food at a point designated by the District Chief concerned.
- (g) Employment of GVN psychological operations teams at the collection points.
- (2) Subordinate 1st Marine Division tactical commanders are responsible for the following:
- (a) Establishing early communications and liaison between committed units, MACV advisor staff and the District Chief(s).
- (b) Providing a means of communications to refugee teams at the collection points to permit rapid requests for tactical assistance/evacuation of refugees to secure areas and to secure intelligence of immediate value.
- (c) Transportation support, helicopter or vehicular, within tactical commanders operating capability, when such support is necessary.
- (d) Transportation and/or procurement of emergency shelter (tents) or food when it is not available from GVN sources.
- (e) Submission to this Headquarters (Attn: 6-5), at least 72 hours in advance, of requests for special psychological operations support, i.e. leaflets, broadcast tapes, armed propaganda teams, etc., designed to notify and direct refugees to designated collection points.
- (f) Submission of requirements for additional civil affairs refugee teams to Headquarters (Attn: C-5) as soon as requirements are known.
- (g) Notification and coordination with CORDS representatives in the area of operation to ensure that emergency provisions such as food and shelter are delivered to the refugee resettlement areas.
- (h) Providing an Interrogation/Translation Team at the collection points to assist in screening the refugees and to secure intelligence of immediate value.

#### 4. Reports

- a. Daily Report of Refugee Control. Enclosure (1) shows the format to be used in submitting this report. Daily reports should cover the period from 1800 one day until 1800 the next and should be submitted by 2000. Negative reports are desired. Reports will be submitted by message.
- b. After-Operation Report (Refugee Portion). Enclosure (2) shows the format for the refugee portion of the unit after-operation report. This report will be submitted within 72 hours of the termination of an operation.



#### SECTION I

## SCOPE, STATUS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

101. SCOPE. This order sets forth information, procedures and regulations concerning the administration, management and employment of Army of the Republic of Vietnam Interpreters assigned to this Division.

## 102. ARVN INTERPRETER STATUS

\*

- 1. The ARVN interpreters assigned to the 1st Marine Division are military men and will be given the courtesies, respect and privileges commensurate with those afforded Marines of like rank.
- 2. ARVN interpreters of the 1st Marine Division have been assigned to the Division by CG, III MAF. While serving with the Division they are carried on the rolls of Headquarters Company, Headquarters I Corps, where basic ARVN general and personnel administration concerning them is accomplished.
- 3. These men are assigned to the 1st Marine Division in order to provide a direct, face-to-face communication channel between units of the Division and the Vietnamese people. ANVN interpreters will not be employed in an offensive combat role as scouts, point men, house searchers, etc. If imaginatively employed, these men can play an invaluable role by serving as a link between the unit commander, local officials and the Vietnamese people. ARVN interpreters have made significant contributions to the success of MEDCAP, DENTCAP, Civic Action, and other assistance and pacification projects and programs as well as providing valuable, on-the-spot interpretations and translations on the field of battle.

### 103. COMMAND RESPONSIBILITIES

- 1. Command responsibilities relating to assigned ARVN interpreters are set forth in MACV Dir 551-5 of 30Sep67 (NOTAL); CG, WEI MAF For 0 5312.8A and CG III MAF ltr 1/A/ref over 5312 of 30Sep67 (NOTAL). Staff assistance to the Commanding General in carrying out his responsibilities in this program will be as follows:
- a. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, isiresponsible for ensuring that ARVN interpreters are employed to best advantage in accordance with current operational commitments of the Division.
- b. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1, will ensure that required administrative actions are taken concerning assigned ARVN interpreters, e. g. issuance of ID Cards and Tags, submission of required reports, processing of recommendation for assignment, reassignment, decoration and awards, promotion, pay, basic personnel accounting
- 2. Commanders of organizations and units to which ARVN interpreters are assigned will look to their welfare and ensure compliance with the procedures and regulations set forth in this order. The commander of

each organization having ARVN interpreters assigned will designate an officer as the ARVN Interpreter Program Project Officer. This officer will be responsible for assisting the commander in carrying out his responsibilities and will act as the point of contact within his organization for matters concerning ARVN interpreters. A copy of the letter of appointment will be forwarded to this Headquarters (Attn: G-1).

3. Organizational commanders will ensure that subordinate unit commanders and leaders fully understand that they are as responsible for the health, safety, and general welfare of assigned or attached ARVN interpreters as they are for their Marines and Navy personnel.

#### SECTION II

#### PERSONNEL MANAGEMENT AND ADMINISTRATION

#### 201, IDENTIFICATION AND PERSONAL DATA

#### 1. IDENTIFICATION CARD

- a. All ARVN interpreters assigned to the 1st Marine Division are required to possess a 1st Marine Division ARVN interpreter Identification Card. This card will be in the format of Figure 1. It will be issued through the 1st Marine Division ARVN Interpreter Program Project Officer (G-1) at the time an ARVN interpreter reports to the Division for duty.
- b. These Identification Cards will be valid for one year from date of issue. When an ARVN interpreter is transferred from the 1st Marine Division his ID Card will be retrieved and returned to the issuing office.
- c. ARVN interpreters assigned to the 1st Marine Division on a temporary duty basis will be issued an ID Card that will be valid for the length of temporary duty with the Division.
- d. ARVN interpreter ID Cards constitute a pass allowing the bearer to enter U. S. Military installations. These cards are serialized and their issue controlled. Loss of an ID Card must be reported promptly to this Headquarters (Attn: G-1).

#### 2. IDENTIFICATION TAGS

- a. Two identification tags will be prepared and issued to each ARVN interpreter upon his reporting to the 1st Marine Division.
- b. Identification tags will be prepared in the format shown in Figure 2. These tags will be worn by the owner at all times. They will be suspended about the neck by a long and short chain that will be issued with the ID  $tags_{\circ}$ 
  - c. ID tags that are lost or become unserviceable will be replaced.

#### 3. EMBOSSED PLATE - ARVN INTERPRETER PERSONNEL

- a. Frequently referenced personal data concerning individual ARVN interpreters will be maintained through the use of a Personnel Embossed Plate. See Figure 3 for format and coding instructions.
- b. An embossed plate will be prepared for each interpreter upon his reporting to the 1st Marine Division. An impression of this plate will be made on all copies of assignment or transfer orders provided to the organization, unit or team to which the man is assigned.
  - c. A master file of embossed plates for all ARVN interpreters

assigned to the Division will be maintained at this Headquarters.

#### 202. ASSIGNMENT AND REASSIGNMENT

#### 1. REQUEST FOR ARVN INTERPRETER SUPPORT

- a. Requests for ARVN interpreters to be assigned to an organization will be made to the Commanding General (Attn: G-2), using the format contained in Figure 4.
- b. Requests will contain the number of interpreters required, approximate duration of assignment and justification for the assignment.
- 2. <u>ASSIGNMENT</u>. Upon the approval of an assignment by the Assistant Chief of Staff, G-2, assignment orders will be issued and transportation arranged for the interpreter(s) to the organization he will support.

#### 3. REASSIGNMENT

#### a. NORMAL ROTATION POLICY

- (1) Normally, ARVN interpreters who have served continuously with a combat organization for a period of 12-18 months will be reassigned to duty with a combat support or combat service support organization. ARVN interpreters serving with a combat support or combat service support organization will normally be rotated to duty with a combat organization after a period of 12-18 months.
- (2) Operational commitments of the Division are the prime consideration in making assignments and reassignment and will occasionally make it impossible to adhere strictly to the above rotation policy.

#### b. COMMAND REQUESTS FOR REASSIGNMENT

- (1) Command requests for the reassignment of an ARVN interpreter will be submitted to the Assistant Chief of Staff,  $G \sim 2$ , using the format contained in Figure 5.
- (2) Reasons for the requested reassignment will be stated, citing specific facts, circumstances or incidents that have prompted the request.
- c. When an ARVN interpreter is temporarily attached to an organization other than the one to which assigned by this Headquarters, and the attachment is for more than 24 hours, a report in the format of Figure 6, will be made to this Headquarters (Attn: G-1).

#### d. PERSONAL REQUESTS FOR REASSIGNMENT

(1) REQUEST FOR REASSIGNMENT WITHIN THE 1ST MARINE DIVISION.
Personal requests by ARVN interpreters for intra-division reassignment will be submitted using the format contained in Figure 7.

# (2) REQUEST FOR REASSIGNMENT TO A COMMAND OUTSIDE OF THE 1ST MARINE DIVISION

- (a) Personal requests by ARVN interpreters for reassignment to another command, not a part of the 1st Marine Division, will be hand written in both English and Vietnamese.
- (b) This request will be addressed to CG, III MAF via this Headquarters, if the command to which assignment is desired is part of III MAF. When the command to which assignment is desired is not part of III MAF, the request will be addressed to CG, I Corps via this Headquarters (Attn: G-1) and CG, III MAF (Attn: Force Adjutant).
- (c) All such requests will be forwarded through appropriate U. S. Commanders and ARVN Liaison Officer(s) before reaching this Headquarters.

#### 203. LEAVE AND LIBERTY

1. This war will not be over for the ARVN interpreter at the end of a 395-day tour. When we have gone home, he will stay on. Many of the ARVN interpreters of this Division have been with the Marines since the initial landings in March of 1965. These men need rest and recreation just as do the Marines with whom they serve. Therefore, a liberal but judicious leave and liberty policy should be followed by organizational commanders subject to the requirements of operational commitments and existent regulations. Organizational ARVN interpreter leave and liberty policies must be coordinated with the organization's ARVN Liaison Officer.

#### 2. LIBERTY

- a. NIGHT LEAVE. This is essentially what is referred to as "over-night liberty" by Marines. It may be granted to ARVN interpreters who are free from duties during the night. This liberty is to secure at a prescribed time the following morning.
- b. <u>PASSES/SPECIAL LEAVE</u>. U. S. organizational commanders may authorize two and three-day passes for assigned interpreters. These passes are bi-lingual passes and are issued by the appropriate ARVN Liaison Officer. They are used for short term emergencies, for settling personal affairs, special holidays (such as TET), and as recognition of exemplary performance of duty. Normally, such passes should be limited to one each calendar year.
- 3. LEAVE. There are seven different types of leave within the ARVN leave system. Those that are discussed below are the types which will apply to all ARVN interpreters assigned to the 1st Marine Division.
  - a. SPECIAL LEAVE OF 48 HOURS TO 7 DAYS

- (1) This type of leave is normally granted to personnel when:
  - (a) The interpreter gets married.
  - (b) His wife gives birth to a child.
- (c) A close relative is very ill or has died and the interpreter desires to attend the funeral. For this purpose close relatives are defined as:
  - 1. Paternal and maternal grandparents.
  - 2. Parents.
  - 13. Wife's parents.
  - 42 Foster parents or tutor.
- Brothers and sisters or foster brothers and sisters of either the man or his wife.
  - 6, Children, foster children, daughters and sons in-law.
  - : 71 Paternal and maternal grandchildren.
- (d) The interpreter desires to attend a relative's marriage. For this purpose relatives are defined as:
- 1: Brothers and sisters or foster brothers and sisters of either the man or his wife.
  - 2; Children or foster children.
    - 2. Paternal or maternal nephews and nieces.
- (e) There has been a sudden disaster in the family (fire or other calamity).
- (f) When the man has been approved to take National Cultural examinations.
- (2) The maximum time fixed for special leave is seven (7) days, not including travel time. An exception to this is in the case of a man taking the National Cultural Examination. In this case leave time will be set according to the length of the examination for each certificate plus travel time.
- (3) Interpreters taking this type of leave will be required to procure documentation either before or after taking leave. Failure to procure adequate documentation will result in disciplinary action by

ARVN authorities.

(4) The total number of days of this type of special leave that may be granted each calendar year is 15 days.

#### b. ANNUAL LEAVE

- (1) During the present national emergency annual leave has been reduced to 15 days. This leave is based upon a Table of Distribution of Annual Leave prepared by Headquarters Company, Headquarters I Corps. Further details are contained in Annex C, MACV Dir 551-5 of 30Sep67 (NOTAL).
- (2) Presently, annual leave is normally granted in 7-or 8-day, send-annual increments.

#### c. LONG LEAVES

- (1) For interpreters this includes long sick leave, long leave for convalescence, for educational reasons, etc.
- (2) Long sick leave may be requested only upon the written recommendation of a medical officer (either  $U_{\circ}$  S. or ARVN).
- ; (3) Long leave is obtained in accordance with separate ARVN regulations and is not deductable from annually accrued leave.
- d. LEAVE REQUESTS. All leave must be coordinated with the Senior MAVN Liaison Officer, 1st Marine Division. Requests will be bi-lingual and must be submitted in the format of Figure 8.

#### 204: PAY

#### 1. MONTHLY PAY DAY

- a. The ARVN interpreters assigned to this Division will normally be paid once monthly between the 26th and 30th day of the month.
  - b. A monthly pay schedule will be published by this Headquarters.
- 2. ARVN INTERPRITER PAY OFFICER. A Marine officer will be appointed in writing as the ARVN interpreter pay officer. This officer's duties will include the timely delivery of the monthly Interpreter Pay List to the Headquarters, I Corps Unit Paymaster, receipting for the payroll, paying of all 1st Marine Division ARVN interpreters and the return of completed pay documents, and any remaining funds to the Headquarters, I Corps Unit Paymaster.
- 3. In the event that an organization's ARVN interpreters are not available for a scheduled pay call, alternate pay days or other pay arrangements can be made by contacting the Division ARVN Interpreter Program

Project Officer (Tel. Ext. 401).

205. MAIL. The mailing address for ARVN interpreters of this Division is:

Rank, Name, Serial Number c/o III MAF Liaison Officer AG Advisor, Hq, I Corps

#### 206. SECURITY CLEARANCES

- 1. All personnel requesting admission into the RVNAF interpreter program are given a local agency security check before acceptance. However, the completion of this check does not entitle them to access to classified information.
- 2. Requests for a security clearance; KIN (Confidential), MAT (Secret), TOI MAT (Top Secret), must be made through U. S. channels to the AG Advisor, Hq. I Corps (Attn: MSS). A security investigation of this type normally takes from four to six months to complete.
- 3. RVNAF regulations do not permit the issuing of interim security clearances. Therefore, access may not be granted until security clearance has been confirmed.
- 4. Classified documents requiring translation to, from Vietnamese will, in the absence of an interpreter possessing requisite security clearance, be referred to a qualified ARVN Liaison Officer. This does not apply to captured enemy documents whose information we are interested in obtaining not protecting.

#### 207. INTERPRETER EVALUATION REPORTS

- 1. Interpreter Evaluation Reports are personnel management tools that are used in much the same manner as Marine Corps Officer and NCO Fitness Reports. Accuracy and honesty in reporting is essential as these reports form the basis for promotion and future assignment.
- 2. Regulations require that the III MAF Senior ARVN Liaison Officer prepare Monthly Evaluation Reports on all ARVN interpreters attached to III MAF units. These reports are based upon reports of performance made by U. S. and ARVN officers and supervisory personnel.

#### 3. SUBMISSION

#### a. QUARTERLY REPORTS

(1) In order to ensure that an accurate and current report of an interpreter's performance, as seen by his U. S. Marine supervisors, is available, commanders of 1st Marine Division organizations having ARVN interpreters attached will submit Interpreter Evaluation Reports on the following quarterly schedule:

(2) These reports will be submitted in the format of Figure 9. Completed reports will be forwarded to this Headquarters (Attn: G-1).

#### 4. COMPLETION

- a. The manner of completing items 1 thru 4 of Figure 9 are self-explanatory.
- b. Instructions for completing items 5 and 6 are contained at the bottom of Figure 9.
- c. Item 7 will be completed in accordance with the guidance contained in subperagraphs 15008.75, by c and k MARCORPERSMAN.
- 208. PROMOTIONS. There are two categories of promotions for which an ARVN Interpreter may become eligible.
  - a. Annual Promotion
  - b. Special Promotion

# 1. ANNUAL PROMOTION

a. Annual enlisted promotion boards usually meet during the last quarter of a calendar year for the selection of qualified men to the next higher rank. Selectees are promoted on a quarterly basis during the succeeding calendar year. For example, promotion dates for NCO's and other enlisted during 1968 are:

1st Quarter - 1 Jan 1968 2nd Quarter - 1 Apr 1968 3rd Quarter - 1 Jul 1968 4th Quarter - 1 Oct 1968

- b. Promotion eligibility and consideration is based on a point computation sheet which takes into consideration such things as present billet, time in service, time in grade, military and civilian education, decorations and awards received, commanding officer's recommendation, etc. Annual promotion selections are, therefore, based on past performance and the contents of a man's service record.
- c. Promotion slates and computation sheets for ARVN interpreters are prepared by ARVN Liaison Officers and authorities at Hq, I Corps.

#### 2. SPECIAL PROMOTION

- a. BATTLEFEED. Generally this type of promotion is recommended for a man who has distinguished himself in battle. Figure 10 contains specific criteria for this type promotion recommendation.
- b. OTHER THAN BATTLEFIELD. This type promotion is recommended for a man who has distinguished himself other than on the field of battle. Normally he should have been in his present permanent grade one year and spent a minimum of six months in his present position. The man should be occupying a billet and performing duties that entrust him with responsibilities normally entrusted to men of a rank higher than that which he presently holds. However, recommendations for promotion may be for only one rank higher that the man's present rank.

#### 209. DECORATIONS AND AWARDS

- To ARVN interpreters may be recommended for both RVN and U. S. Military Descriptions and Awards. For criteria and recommendation procedures for U. S. awards see DivO 1650.4C and MACV Dir 672-1 of 14 January 1968 (NOTAL). See Figure 11. For criteria and recommendation procedures for RVN awards consult the organizational ARVN Liaison Officer or this Headquarters (Attns G-1).
- 2. It should be noted that RVNAF personnel may be recommended for U. S. swards only for sots of gallantry and heroism. However, ARVN interpreters may be recommended for the Commanding General's Certificate of Commandation. In recognition of meritorious service.
- 5. Commanders should be mindful that tours for ARVN interpreters do not said with 395-days service. He receives no out-of-country R&R and he is already "home". Prompt recognition of the valuable services and heroic actions of ARVN interpreters is one way to build and maintain high morale and motivation among these men who are providing invaluable assistance to this Division.
- 4. All swards recommendations for ARVN interpreters will be forwarded to this Headquarters (Attn: G-1).

#### 210. CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE

- 4. Commanding officers of organizations and units to which ARVN interpreters are assigned do not have disciplinary powers over them. All distiplinary action(s) must be taken by ARVN authorities.
- 2. Commanding officers will report and request appropriate disciplinary action in cases of misconduct, breaches of good conduct and discipline, improper performance of duty or other unfavorable matters in which an ARVN interpreter is involved. These reports will be in the format of Figure 12. They will be forwarded to this Headquarters (Attn: G-1) and will bear the endorsement of appropriate ARVN Ligison Officer(s).

- 3. Only facts or circumstances known to be true will be cited in this report; additionally it will contain:
- a. A resume of the interpreter's performance of duty during current assignment with the reporting unit.
- b. Recommendations for the particular form that disciplinary action should take. Recommendations for leniency and matters in mitigation are also appropriate.
- c. A statement as to whether or not the interpreter should be retained in the interpreter program is mandatory.

#### 231. ABSENCE VITHOUT LEAVE AND ABSENCE OVER LEAVE

- 1. Unauthorized absences will be reported to this Headquarters (Attn: G-1) in the format of Figure 13.
- 2. Efforts should be made to locate a man who is AWOL/AOL; however, the report of his absence will be initiated as follows:
  - a. AVOL Within 24 hours.
  - b. AOL Within 5 days.
- 3. Personal interest and concern for the individual ARVN interpreter and his problems will preclude most cases of unauthorized absence.
- 4. The five-day period involved in Absent Over Leave reporting has been established to take into consideration the ever present problem of obtaining transportation from place to place in the Republic of Vietnam.
- 5. ARVN interpreters going on leave should be informed that if an unavoidable delay in their return arises (e.g., non-availability of transportation, etc.) they should report to the nearest Marine Corps and/or ARVN authority for assistance and obtain written confirmation of delay, to include a statement as to time involved and justification for the delay. Interpreters delayed in Saigon should contact:

#### 212. CASUALTY PROCESSING AND REPORTING

#### 1. EVACUATION AND TREATMENT

a. Treatment and processing of ARVN interpreters who become casualties will be the same as for U. S. personnel.

- b. In cases requiring extensive hospitalization, and when medically advisable, ARVN interpreters will be evacuated/transferred to an appropriate Vietnamese military medical facility.
- c. The unit commander responsible for initial medical evacuation will notify this Headquarters (Attn: G-1) as soon as possible after the incident/evacuation. See paragraph 212.2 below.

#### 2. REPORTING

- a. A casualty report in the format of Figure 14 will be submitted by message to this Headquarters (Attn: G-1) within 24 hours after occurrence.
- b. As with U. S. personnel, accurate and timely reporting is essential to assure the prompt notification of injury or death to ARVN authorities, allowing them to expeditiously carry out their casualty management and notification responsibilities.

#### 3. LEPTERS OF CONDOLENCE AND SOLATIUM PAYMENTS

- a. As a matter of policy, in cases of death of an ARVN interpreter, a bi-lingual condolence letter to next of kin is prepared for the Commanding General's signature. Letters of condolence to next of kin from unit commanders are encouraged; however, they will be forwarded to this Headquarters (Attn: G-1) for release.
- b. In cases where solatium payment or personal claim is indicated, e.g., accidental death, or serious injury not involving enemy action, the matter will be referred to this Headquarters (Attn: G-1) for action.

#### SECTION III EQUIPMENT, WEAPONS AND CLOTHING

#### 301. EQUIPMENT

- 1. Upon joining the 1st Marine Division, an ARVN interpreter will be issued a complete set of field (782 gear) and other required equipment. Items that are not available through Headquarters Battalion supply will be provided by the organization to which the interpreter is assigned.
- 2. Receipting and accounting for equipment issued will be the same as for  $U_{\rm o}\ S_{\rm o}$  personnel.

### 302. WEAPONS

- 1. ARVN interpreters will be issued a U. S. Pistol, Caliber .45 1911A1, upon joining the Division and will be given familiarization training with it to include familiarization (FAM) firing and instructions in safety precautions in handling this weapon. If this can not be accomplished before a man is assigned to an organization, it will be done at the organization to which he is assigned. A remark as to whether or not a man has FAM fired the U. S. Pistol Caliber .45 will be made on the copy of his orders that are forwarded to the joining organization.
- 2. When an interpreter reports to an organization he will be familiarized with the operations and techniques of fire for small arms and weapons within his organization which he might be called upon to use in a critical encounter with the enemy.
- 3. ARVN interpreters will be included in the organizational and unit Weapon Safety Programs as outlined in Div0 5101.2\_.

#### 303. CLOTHING

- 1. ARVN interpreters will be given a basic issue of clothing upon reporting to the 1st Marine Division. Besides providing for his personal comfort and needs, the use of Marine Corps type clothing, along with equipment, will make the ARVN interpreter less of an individual target while carrying out his duties.
- 2. Receipting and accounting for clothing issued will be the same as for  $U_\bullet$  S. personnel.

#### SECTION IV

#### HEALTH, WELFARE AND PROFESSIONAL ADVANCEMENT

#### 401. INITIAL ORIENTATION PROGRAM

- 1. Upon reporting to the Division, as ARVN interpreter will be processed and given an initial orientation talk.
- 2. Upon reporting to the organization to which assigned, an ARVN interpreter will be given an initial orientation similar to the one given to newly joined Marines of his rank. Every effort should be made to integrate this man into the organization and make him feel a part of the team.
- 3. Time and operational commitments permitting, use ARVN interpreters in the organization/unit's initial orientation program. These men have first-hand information concerning Vietnamese customs, traditions and history. In addition they can introduce new men to the sound of the Vietnamese language and possibly teach a few words or phrases.
- 4. Among other things, this orientation program will further assist the new Marine in understanding why we are here and introduce him to a comrade in arms.

#### 402. RECREATION ATHLETICS AND EDUCATION

- 1. As with Marines, every effort should be made to encourage the ARVN interpreter to participate in unit recreation, athletics and education programs.
- 2. A little imaginative thought will produce a number of things that this man can do for the units education program. Many ARVN interpreters are former school teachers. They could conduct Vietnamese language classes for the men of a unit. Many are knowledgeable in other fields that are of use or interest to the average Marine.
- 3. Such participation in the life of the unit will build confidence and pride in the ARVN interpreter, the men with whom he serves, and the unit as a whole,

#### 403. BASIC HEALTH AND COMFORT ITEMS

- 1. Normally, interpreters who are located in non-combat, non-isolated areas are expected to produce their own health and comfort items from the local economy. They receive a supplementary subsistence allowance for this purpose.
- 2. Agreements with the Government of the Republic of Vietnam and resultant USMCV regulations prohibit ARVN personnel from having MPC in their possession. In addition, post exchange privileges are not authorized to ARVN personnel.

3. Interpreters assigned to units which are located in combat and isolated areas, or where purchase cannot be made on the local economy, shall be provided gratuitous issues of basic essential health and comfort items.

#### 404. TRAINING COURSES AND COMMISSIONING PROGRAMS

- 1. ARVN interpreters with four or more years service may request assignment to any training course they desire, except the NCO Interpreter course, provided they meet other eligibility requirements.
- 2. ARVN interpreters with four or more years service may also request assignment to any of the following training courses leading to  $\infty$  mmission in the RVNAF:
  - a. Reserve Officer Training Course
  - b. Air Force Officer Training Course
  - c. Special Officer (Cadet) Training Course

Acceptance is, of course, based on meeting other prerequisites.




Figure 2. Format for ARVN Interpreter Identification Tags

# CRITERIA FOR SPECIAL BATTLEFIELD PROMOTION (From JGS J1 #0373/TTM/1/PQ/QC, dated 17 Feb 1967)

- (1) Have continuously served in their present duty at least 3 months.
- (2) Have at least 6 months time in grade.
- (3) During the period of six months must receive, at least, a citation at any level.
- (4) Is capable to take command of a unit higher than their present one. (Commanders responsible for rating these individuals in the matter of ability will make recommendations).
- (5) Must distinguish themselves by one of several of the following combat achievements:
  - a. The individuals themselves or their unit's assistance has inflicted heavy damages to the enemy.
  - b. The individuals themselves or with their comrades assistance has reversed a critical situation and saved friendly force units and inflicted heavy damages to the enemy.
  - c. Seriously wounded, but still continues to fight, and by their brave actions, have contributed to the ultimate victory of the unit.
- NOTE: Particularly, regarding personnel who have distinguished themselves by a brilliant combat achievement and even the citation at Armed Forces level does not correspond to this exceptional service, responsible authorities can exempt one of two prerequisites, paragraph (2) and (3), mentioned above, which deal with the seniority in rank and citation required for special battlefield promotion.

# DECORATIONS AND AWARDS GENERAL POLICY IN VIETNAM (Extracts from MACV Dir 672-1 of 14 Jan 1968)

#### Par 4. Policy

- "b. Republic of Vietnam Armed Forces and Free World Military Assistance Forces.
- (1) United States Decorations which may be awarded to foreign military personnel are contained in pertinent service publications. Prior to awarding any U.S. decoration to foreign military personnel, recommendations must be routed to COMUSMACV to obtain U.S. Mission concurrence.
- (2) United States Mission policy is to recommend foreign military personnel for U.S. decorations only for acts of heroism or for gallantry in action against the enemy. Each recommendation for award of the Distinguished Service Cross (Air Force Cross, Navy Cross) or the Silver Star must be accompanied by an eyewitness statement of a member of the U.S. Armed Forces. Acts for which recommendations for award of the Distinguished Flying Cross and lesser valorous awards are submitted need not have been witnessed by a member of the U.S. Armed Forces. However, such recommendations must be submitted by a member of the U.S. Armed Forces who has personal knowledge that the facts contained therein are essentially correct. All recommendations will be accompanied by a biographical sketch of the intended recipient."

#### Par 5. Procedures

"i. Recommendations for sward of United States awards to foreign military personnel will be prepared in the appropriate service department format having final approval authority and will include a proposed citation. All such recommendations will be accompanied by a biographical sketch of the recommended individual and routed to COMUSMACV for Mission concurrence. Care will be taken to insure that all personal data pertaining is accurate. In addition, if the award pertains to a Vietnamese, careful attention must be given to insuring that the name is properly listed on all documents. Errors in this respect could cause embarrassment to the United States Government if the name is listed on the citation in the wrong order. The following system of listing names will be used:

#### EXAMPLE

Captain Nguyen Van Sam
"Nguyen" is the family name.
"Van" is the middle name.
"Sam" is the first or given name.

- 1. Purpose. To publish the Vietnam Ground Ammunition Expenditure Rates.
- 2. Cancellation. Div0 8010.1B.
- 3. <u>Background</u>. The Commandant of the Marine Corps has revised previously furnished expenditure day rates predicated on actual usage history during the period July 1967 through January 1968. These rates were promulgated by reference (a) and will be used as planning factors to support combat operations in the Republic of Vietnam.
- 4. Action. Revised expenditure rates are contained in enclosure (1). These rates reflect the recent average daily usage for the items listed therein. These expenditure rates are to be used for planning purposes to determine support requirements. Ammunition may be expended in that quantity required to accomplish the mission. However, assets of certain items are periodically reduced to a level that will not support demands. When this situation exists, higher headquarters establishes an Available Supply Rate (ASR) which limits actual expenditures to the ASR imposed. ASRs are cancelled when the distribution system is again capable of supporting the demand. This Headquarters will promulgate ASRs by classified message when established by higher headquarters. Commanders will limit expenditures within the ASRs established.

Div0 8010.10 6 Apr 1968

- a. Higher headquarters has established the on-position stock level of Class V Materiel for RVN based units as a Basic Allowance (BA) and five Days of Ammunition (DOA). Reference (b) will be used to determine the BA, and five DOA will be computed using the daily expenditure rates contained in enclosure (1) of this order. On-position ammunition is defined as all ammunition within the unit irrespective of whether it is located in unit storage area or in the hands of personnel. A request to increase the on-position stock level beyond a BA and five DOA will be submitted to this Headquarters when the unit's mission and/or locations necessitate maintaining a higher stock level. Request for increased stock levels will contain justification to support the request. Exceptions to the foregoing are temporary buildays in preparation for specific operations.
- b. Class V Nateriel will be requisitioned on DD Forms 1150, 1348, or any locally reproduced form. Requisitions will be submitted in triplicate to Ammunition Supply Point #1 via the Division Ordnance Office. Exceptions to the foregoing are units located in the Fhu Bai TAOR and units supported by a Logistic Support Area (LSA), in which case requisitions will be submitted direct to FLSC-A or LSA as appropriate. Further, units of this command which are under the OPCON of a command outside the Danang/Phu Bai TAOR's will comply with the directives promulgated by the command exercising OPCON.
- (1) The preferred item, as listed in enclosure (1), should be requisitioned except in those cases where a particular substitute item is required. A substitute item will be issued when the preferred item is not available.
- Ammunition which is unserviceable or excess to the requirements of a unit will be returned to the supporting ASP or LSA. Ammunition turned in as excess or unserviceable will be segregated and packed in wooden boxes, preferably those boxes designed for the particular item(s) being turned in. Ammunition must be packed in a manner to insure that it is not damaged during retrograde movement.
- d. Requests for ammunition other than items listed in enclosure (1), will be submitted to this Headquarters with complete justification for the request.
- e. Enclosure (2) provides average packaging data for planning purposes.



During March this Division submitted 3050 Fleet Home Town News Releases. The Fleet Home Town News, Center advises that approximately 90 per cent of the releases are used by the civilian media. The Fleet Home Town News Program is so organized that a minimum of effort is required at the unit level. The unit Technical Information Contact Officer has only to have the members of the unit fill out Fleet Home Town News Release forms (NAVSO 5724/1) on appropriate occasions, such as joining, promotion, participation in an operation and receipt of awards. The completed forms are forwarded to the Division ISO with a cover letter or memo giving enough details on the reason for submission to enable the ISO to complete an appropriate news story. The remainder of the work is done by the Division ISO and the Fleet Home Town News Center.
- 3. Information. This Command's participation for the month of March is set forth in enclosure (1). Many units still fall below the desired minimum participation of 10 per cent of their on board strength each month.
- 4. Action. Commanders will ensure that all members of their unit are given the opportunity and encouraged to participate in the program on each appropriate occasion.

Subj: Interrogation of Criminal Suspects

1. Purpose. To prescribe policy and procedure for interrogation and warning of suspected criminal offenders.

#### 2. Background

a. The United States Court of Military Appeals in the case of United States v. Tempia, decided 25 April 1967, held that the Supreme Court decision in Miranda v. Arizona, 384 U.S. 436 (1966) has applied to military law since 13 June 1966, the date of the Miranda decision. The Tempia case held that the Constitutional protections against self-incrimination are available to persons subject to the Uniform Code of Military Justice. The Tempia decision has been further clarified by later decisions from the U.S. Court of Military Appeals. Hence, the rules set forth in Miranda must be applied to military interrogations of criminal suspects. Accordingly, at any interrogation at which an Article 31(b) warning is required, the accused or suspect should be advised as indicated in the enclosure.

- b. After such explanation the accused or suspect should be asked if he desires counsel.
- (1) If he answers in the affirmative, the interrogation must cease until counsel has been provided. When counsel is requested, the interrogator will contact the unit legal officer who will in turn contact the Division Legal Officer.
- (2) If he answers in the negative, but at any time during the proceedings indicates in any manner that he does not wish to be interrogated further, the interrogation must cease.
- c. Any statement obtained from an accused in violation of the foregoing rules will not be admissable in evidence against him in a courtmartial. The same is true of any other evidence derived through an

improperly obtained statement. It is to be noted that the Government has the burden in a court-martial of proving beyond a reasonable doubt that the accused had been fully advised of the rights set forth above and thereafter made a knowing, conscious, and intelligent waiver of any of those rights.

#### 3. Action

- a. Commanders shall give wide dissemination to the contents of this Bulletin, and will ensure that the rules of criminal interrogation are thoroughly understood and applied by all concerned.
- b. Enclosure (1) is a suggested format for use in a criminal investigation.
