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INTELLIGENCE SECTION

1. ACQUISITION UNIT

a. General. During this reporting period, the emphasis in Division operations continued to be on frustrating enemy rice gathering activities, locating his base camps and supply caches, and disrupting his preparations for the up coming Winter-Spring Campaign. In keeping with this emphasis, the Division's intelligence gathering agencies were targeted principally against enemy base camps, arms and rice caches, and transportation routes. Increased integration of Ground Surveillance sensors and Ground Reconnaissance elements was effected in monitoring enemy movement. Also during this period, the III MAF Surveillance Reconnaissance Center (SRC) became operational and began testing long range patrolling concepts for Force Reconnaissance Teams by employing these teams within the Division TAOR. Assistance was provided to the SRC in order to achieve a coordinated reconnaissance effort while the Force Teams were working in the Division area.

b. Ground Reconnaissance

- (1) The Acquisition Unit coordinated the Division's Ground Reconnaissance efforts, with three areas receiving primary interest: the southern Que Son Mountains, the Ong Thu Slopes and Charlie Ridge. Eleven base camps were located as follows: five on the Ong Thu Slopes, three on Charlie Ridge, and one each in Sherwood Forest, Elephant Valley, and Hai Van Mountains. A total of 73 reconnaissance team inserts were completed, including reliefs of teams assigned to the five OPs operated by the 1st Reconnaissance Battalion. Team activities resulted in 226 enemy KIAs, three enemy PWs and six secondary explosions.
- (2) 1st Force Reconnaissance Company chopped OPCON/ADCON to III MAF at 240001H November 1969. However before leaving Division control, the company successfully inserted teams by rubber boats on the peninsula east of Hai Van Pass and by parachute south of Nui Tron (vic AU8305).

c. Photo Imagery Interpretation Sub-Unit

(1) General. Poor weather precluded all but one photo mission from being flown in response to 1st Marine Division requirements. PIIU assembled four mosaics for Ground Surveillance to be used in planning the implacement of ground sensors, and one mosaic each for 1st, 5th and 11th Marine Regiments. During this period the

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PITU conducted a one week training course on handling and requesting aerial photography for enlisted intelligence personnel from the 1st Marines, 7th Marines and 26th Marines. A visibility study was initiated that will encompass all major observation posts in the Division TAOR. In other activity, the Photo Imagery Interpreters completed a terrain analysis of a suspected PW camp located in BA 112, and worked with Interrogator Translator personnel in map and photo tracking of a Hoi Chanh's description of a large rocket cache in the Charlie Ridge area. Increased use of the imagery interpreters during interrogations is planned for the future.

- (2) Infra-Red Ground Readout Station. During this reporting period an Infra-Red Ground Station (TAQ-IA) was requested from III MAF. 21,5th SAC installed the station on 19 November 1969 and it became operational on 20 November 1969. Two of the Division Photo Imagery Interpreters were sent to the China Beach Generator school for a one week course in order to learn to operate the Station's power source. These men will operate the station along with one technician from 21,5th SAC. However, equipment problems have prevented the realization of the station's full effectiveness for real-time target acquisition.
- (3) Detector Concealed Personnel (DCP). Thirty DCP missions were requested during the period, of which eight were flown and provided 46 DCP readings. The readings were located in the mountains to the south and west of the Arizona area and Antenna Valley.
- (4) Infra-Red (IR). 180 IR objectives were requested, of which 21 were flown resulting in a total of 15 emissions. Three emissions were located along a high speed trail south of BA 112. Weather aborted 150 objectives.
- (5) Side Looking Airborne Radar (SLAR). Twenty-one SLAR missions were flown in the Division TAOR and 58 moving target indicators (MTI) were recorded. The MTI was scattered throughout the TAOR with no major concentrations.
- (6) Photo. Four new high performance aircraft photo missions were requested during the period. One mission was received and 14 other missions are still pending. Of the 34 photo reprints requested, 33 were received and one is still pending. Additionally, 19 handheld photo missions were requested; 11 were received and eight are pending.

d. Aerial Observation Sub-Unit

(1) During the month of November, the AO Unit flew 310 sorties totaling 674 flight hours of visual surveillance and supporting arms control in the 1st Marine Division TAOR.

(1) During the reporting period, 407 detainess were interrogated. The detainess were classified as follows: 49 PW's, 47 civil defendants, 25 returnees, and 286 innocent civilians. There were 89 batches of documents containing 8,185 items that were screened at the Document Translation Center. A total of 78 interrogation reports were submitted by the ITT's



- (2) Significant information gained from captured documents included cryptographic material, VC/NVA situation reports, infiltration data, instructions on the use of mines and booby traps, hand drawn sketches of attacks, mission orders, communication schedules, and a letter mentioning future VC activities.
- (3) Significant information gained from detainees included comprehensive enemy attack plans to be carried out over the next three month period, infiltration routes, base areas for major VC/ NVA units, enemy rice collection efforts (including commonly used trails, areas of availability and non-availability and effects of FWMAF operations on the food collection effort), percentages of casualties due to food deficient diseases and other ailments, casualties, replacements and personalities, and of particular significance, the presence of one relatively new enemy unit within the 1st Marine Division area of operations. Also as a result of these interrogations, information was obtained uncovering the location of three enemy food/ ammo caches within the TAOR of the 5th Marines. In addition, information was obtained that led to the exact location and subsequent destruction of a NVA/VC hospital and large rice and weapons caches within the TAOR of the 7th Marines. Also uncovered were five enemy caches within the TAOR of the 26th Marines.

(4) Significant Occurrences:

- (a) 3d Interrogation-Translation Team: During the period 1-7 November 1969 the team participated in Operation PIPESTONE CANYON. Sixteen batches of captured documents were processed by the team's document scanning center. Training was conducted for team members on enemy order of battle, interrogation report writing and the care, cleaning and safe handling of individual weapons.
- (b) 9th Interrogation-Translation Team: The team participated in 7th Marines operations in the Hon Tau Mountains area, where team members helped to locate a large enemy hospital which was subsequently destroyed. Thirty-eight refugees were screened and 37 batches of captured documents were processed by the team's document scanning center. Training was provided to the battalions of the 7th Marines on proper handling and evacuation of documents and classes were held for team members on interrogation techniques, report writing, enemy order of battle and local area study.
- (c) 13th Interrogation-Translation Team: Fifteen refugees were screened and 10 batches of documents were processed by the team's document scanning center. Training was conducted for team members on enemy order of battle, interrogation approaches directed at Vietnamese culture and customs, and weapons safety.

- (d) 15th Interrogation-Translation Team: Three sub-teams were deployed with the battalions of the 26th Marines and also provided interrogation support for the Northern Sector Defense Command and NSA Hospital in Danang. Training was conducted for team members on interrogation in the field, language training, enemy order of battle and Viet Cong Infrastructure.
- (e) 1st Interpreter Team (Division Interrogation Center): The Center interrogated 47 prisoners of war and returnees. The Interpreter Team also provided 24 hours of orientation classes for newly arrived ITT/IT personnel.
- (f) 7th Interpreter Team (Document Translation Center): The team screened 89 batches of captured enemy documents totaling 8,185 items. There were five full translations and 534 summary translations produced. In addition, 17 full translations of ARVN interrogation reports, three full translations of ARVN document exploitation reports, three full translations of lesson plans, one full translation of a test, and one full translation of a roster of ARVN students attending Division schools. Three full translations of enemy letters were provided to the Division, G-2, G-3, capturing units and elements of III MAF.

f. Ground Surveillance Sub-Unit

- (1) On 3 November 1969 two Ground Surveillance Marines were helo-lifted to OP Crows Nest with a NOD for the purpose of aiding OP personnel in detecting possible attacks by fire in the Marble Mountain area.
- (2) From the 4th to the 13th of November the Ground Surveillance Sub-Unit conducted a vigorous program of sensor orientation and familiarization within the 1st Marine Division. Particularly significant classes are as follows:
- (a) On 4 November 1969, a two hour general orientation covering sensors was given to the Commanding Officer, 26th Marines, his staff, and Battalion Commanders.
- (b) On 6 and 12 November 1969, two hour classes were given to Reconnaissance Battalion personnel. One class dealt with a general sensor orientation while the second emphasized the proper emplacement of MINISIDs and MAGIDs.
- (3) A Reconnaissance Team was inserted on 15 November 1969 with the specific task of implanting a string of sensors along a high speed infiltration route located approximately two kilometers



southeast of Tach Bich. Over 7900 probable personnel movements were detected on this trail.

- (4) On 18 November 1969 two Ground Surveillance personnel were inserted on OP Carousel for the purpose of installing unattended seismic devices outside the perimeter of the OP and training personnel in their operation. The sensors were operational before dark and at approximately 2330 that evening the position was alerted by the recently installed sensors. Fifteen minutes later the OP was probed and the enemy was successfully repelled. Reconnaissance teams on the OP planted an additional string of sensors on a well used trail passing in front of the OP on 23 November. By the end of the period 41 groups of enemy moving on the trail had been detected and taken under fire.
- (5) During the month of November, sensors in the 1st Marine Division's TAOR, detected 161 targets. A total of 121 fire missions were called with over 560 rounds of mixed artillery and mortar being fired and resulting in 12 enemy KIAs, one sampan sunk, and numerous blood trails and drag marks located. However, most of the targets were detected in heavily infested enemy areas where results of the missions could not be observed or assessed.

2. STAFF COUNTERINTELLIGENCE UNIT

- a. As of 30 November 1969, 121 Kit Carson Scouts were employed by the 1st Marine Division. These scouts participated in 1,041 patrols which resulted in nine enemy KIA's, four enemy captured and 10 VC suspects detained. One individual weapon was captured and 50 mines/booby-traps were destroyed or neutralized. Scout personnel additionally participated in 14 Division Psychological Operations.
- b. Normal passive and active Counterintelligence support to assist in protecting the Division against the enemy's intelligence collection efforts continued during this period. Additionally, CI personnel of the 1st and 3d Counterintelligence Teams participated in 20 combat operations. During the period, 934 persons were screened against existing blacklists. All were determined to be innocent civilians. During CI operations conducted in support of Division organizations, two NVA/VC were KIA; two VC were captured; six secret enemy tunnels, two B-40 rockets, two B-41 rockets, one 20 pound box mine, one CHICOM grenade, 1,000 small arms rounds were destroyed; and 500 pounds of rice, eight individual weapons, two 81mm mortar rounds, one 155mm dud round, three B-40 rockets with booster train, miscellaneous clothing and equipment were captured.

c. During November 1969, Division organizations reported expenditures for information or ordnance in the amount of 362,895 \$VN under the Volunteer Informant Program. There were 190 separate disbursements for the return of ordnance which might have been used as booby traps and one disbursement for information.

- a. Intelligence Material and Publications Prepared and Distributed to Subordinate, Adjacent and or Higher Commands.
 - (1) Daily Intelligence Summaries (INTSUM)
- (2) Monthly Periodic Intelligence Report (PERINTREP)(15 October-15 November 1969).

b. Briefings.

- (1) Briefings on the Enemy Order of Battle and geographical orientation of Quang Nam Province and the 1st Marine Division TAOR were presented to the following:
 - (a) All newly arrived officers joining the Division.
- (b) Six classes (two officer, two SNCO, two NCO Leadership classes) conducted at Division Schools.
- (2) Briefings on the current enemy threat were presented to MajGen BOWMAN, 1st Division Regimential and seperate Battalion Commanders, and various newly arrived senior officers being assigned to III MAF and 1st MAW.
- c. Target Intelligence. Target intelligence during the month of November generated 187 TPQ-10 requests, 50 of which were struck; seven TOT requests, all of which were completed; and 79 artillery targets were struck. No ARCLIGHT missions were requested, however three secondary targets nominated during October were struck.

d. Enemy


(1) In contrast to the flurry of enemy activity, characterized by isolated rocket and mortar attacks, which closed out October 1969, attacks by fire were limited on 1 November with only two incidents reported. The 7th Marines were targeted by the enemy in both incidents. C/1/7 operated in the Central Que Sons (AT 9643) received three rounds of 60mm mortar fire and at approximately the same time (1945H), H&S/3/7



defensive position 4 km to the east (BT 0042) counted 16 unknown type mortar rounds impacting in and around their position. The level of enemy activity continued to decline on 2 November with L/3/5 reporting the only attack by fire of the day. A squad from "L" Company operating along Liberty Road (AT 9049) was the recipient of small arms, mortar and RPG fire from an unknown size enemy force at 1500H. Renewing their pressure against the 7th Marines, the enemy launched numerous mortar attacks, against Marine positions in the Central Que Son. Early on the morning (0200H), of 3 November, D/1/7 company defensive position (AT 9541) received 12-15x82mm mortar rounds followed by 8-10 additional rounds of 82mm mortar fire at 0910H.

- (2) The enemy, relocating his mortar tubes 1 km to the northeast, hit B/1/7 (AT 9642) with 8-10 rounds of 82mm mortar fire. The preponderance of enemy activity continued to be directed against units operating in the Que Sons as C/1/7 (AT 9643) was the target of 6x60mm mortar rounds on the 4th (1130H).
- (3) The following evening the action shifted to the central portion of the Division's TAOR. AT 0050H MAG-16 and the 212th (Army) Aviation located at the Marble Mountain Air Facility, received 19 rounds of 82mm mortar fire. Almost simultaneously, Hoi An City received 12x82mm mortar rounds, there were no casualties and only minor damage. There were four other mortar attacks reported by ARVN and PF units in and around Dien Ban (D) Headquarters. E/2/5 defensive position's (AT 7855) routine was momentarily disturbed at 0200H by 10 rounds of 60mm mortar fire. A 20 foot span of Golden Gate Bridge (AT 9660), guarded by L/3/1, was dropped by enemy explosives at 1950H on the 6th. The following day a D/1/5 defensive position in the Northern Arizona (AT 8650) received two possible lob bombs launched from an unknown location AT 2230H.
- (4) Two important rocket caches were uncovered during the first half of November. The first cache was found by K/3/26 on the 7th; lOxlhOmm rockets were located 1 km southwest of Hill 190 (AT 8681) at 0810H. The following day three additional 1hOmm rockets were discovered by K/3/26 after an intensive search was conducted of the same general area. A second cache was discovered in the Central Que Son Mountains (AT 9640) by D/1/7 resulting in the recovery of 7xl22mm rockets at 1200H on the 8th and four additional 122mm rockets were found in the same vicinity the following day.
- (5) Significant enemy activity was resumed again on the 9th. The enemy directed another lob bomb against the 5th Marines, this time a 250 pound bomb launched toward a C/1/5 defensive position 2 km south of Hill 65 (AT 8755).

- (6) Apparently in belated commemoration of the Marine Corps' Birthday, the enemy fired 5xl40mm rockets towards the Northern Sector Defense Command Area (AT 9675) early on the morning of 11 November. The rocket attack was followed by a flurry of enemy activity on the 12th. At 1845H, a C/1/7 defensive position in the Southern Que Son Mountains (AT 9639) reported four rounds of 60mm mortars had impacted in their position. Singularly significant was 2d Battalion, 26th Marines' introduction to the enemy's interdiction tactics on the 13th. The Danang-Hue train carrying a F/2/26 platoon was blown off the tracks by sappers at 1030H, 2 km south of Fire Support Base Les Banos (AT 8397), employing a command detonated mine. The final incident of the day was reported by K/3/1 at 2150H when a platoon defensive position located 4 km southwest of Hill 55 (AT 9357) received 15 RPG rounds and small arms fire from an estimated 60 enemy.
- (7) The first half of November closed out with A/1/7 in the Southern Que Son Mountains (AT 9637) being selected as the target for three rounds of 60mm mortar fire at 1825H on the 15th.
- (8) 1st Battalion, 7th Marines, assigned the mission of locating and destroying enemy base camp areas in the Que Sons, uncovered numerous base camps, and supply and weapons caches. The operation commenced on 2 November, was continuing as of the end of this reporting period.
- (9) Again, there was a heavy concentration of enemy sighted in the Arizona Area. Of the enemy observed, most were moving in a westerly direction in groups of 30 or more.
- (10) USMC units monitoring enemy movement in the Que Son Mountains and Antenna Valley also reported significant sightings but were unable to discern any trend in direction, size, or mission. Other sightings were scattered throughout the Division TAOR.
- (11) On 2 November ever 100 detainess were apprehended by elements of 1/5 and 2/5 operating in the Northern Arizona. Representatives of most of the enemy units operating in the Arizona were among those detained. A fairly substantial number of FW's were captured by ARVN and RF Forces during Operation PHI PHUNG 33/69, which was centered in an area just west of Barrier Island (vic BT 1450). A total of 197 detainess were reported as of the end of November.
- (12) Terrorist attacks against the civilian populace, which had leveled off during late October, remained at a fairly low level throughout early November. These infrequent activities, attacks by fire against resettlement hamlets and attempted assassinations and

kidnappings of GVN and local officials, were widely separated both in time and location and had no discernible pattern.

- (13) Throughout the month work continued on the Danang Anti-Infiltration System (DAIS), consisting primarily of preparing the ground for new cable and continuing maintenance on the existing system. Numerous activations were recorded during the early half of November, the vast majority occurring just south of Hill 190.
- (14) Late on the evening of the 16th (2030H), the enemy directed his efforts 4 km northwest of Hill 55 (AT 9665), against an A/1/1 position, where three rounds of 60mm mortar fire impacted. At this same time, Reconnaissance Team Carousel on Hill 146 (AT 8245) reported an attempt by an unknown size enemy force to penetrate the OP's defenses. The first indication of enemy presence came via seismic sensor, emplaced outside the protective wire, and the ensuing sporadic contact, consisting primarily of small arms fire and grenades, continued throughout the night.
- (15) The enemy remained noticably inactive during the period 17-23 November, with no significant attacks by fire recorded until early on the 24th. AT 240230H, a H/2/26 defensive position in the vicinity of the Esso Fuel Farm (AT 9386) received 1x60mm mortar round. On the evening of the 25th, a negligible increase in the intensity of the enemy's mortar attacks was noted when two rounds of 82mm mortar fire were targeted against H&S/1/7's night defensive position in the Central Que Sons (AT 9639).
- (16) The last significant enemy activity recorded for the month of November occurred on the 27th, with two attacks by fire. A squad patrol from NSDC occupying an ambush site located vic (AT 9473) received seven rounds of 60mm mortar fire near their position at 1940H. Shortly afterwards (2000H), the 3/1 CP on Hill 37 (AT 9158) had five rounds of 82mm mortar rounds impact within the cantonement. Counter mortar fire was directed against two possible enemy positions south-southwest (AT 9055) and southeast (AT 9257) of the hill.
- (17) The latter half of November was characterized by a substantial decline in the number of enemy sighted. However, the pattern established during the first part of the month continued with several significent sightings reported in the Arizona, as well as in the Que Son Mountains. In contrast to the early part of the month, the majority of enemy movement was detected by newly-emplaced seismic and magnetic RF sensors. An extraordinarily high number of activations, presumably the result of enemy supply columns, were recorded.

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
- (18) RF sensors positioned in the Thach Bich Area (AT 7927), monitored by Reconnaissance Team Defend "A" at the Nong Son CIDG camp (AT 8138), reported a large number of nightly activations from the SID's and MAGID's. The pattern of activation indicated that approximately 90% of the movement was to the North. When Reconnaissance Team Cherry Jam attempted an insertion west of this sensor field on the 27th, it was forced to abort as a result of hostile small arms fire. Consequently, no visual observation of the sensor field was possible.
- (19) Sensors reporting numerous enemy movement were those located at the extreme southern edge of the Arizona Area (AT 8246) and monitored by Reconnaissance Team Carousel. These sensors indicated 95% of the movement orginated in the West and was directed East.
- (20) Sensor activity, indicative of enemy movement, was also detected by the Danang Anti-Infiltration System (DAIS). Readings were reported by Hill 10 (AT 9069), although not in the magnitude experienced during the early part of the month.
- (21) Reconnaissance teams were active during the month throughout the TAOR conducting patrols and maintaining continuing surveillance from fixed OP's. Enemy reaction to the Division's reconnaissance effort resulted in the emergency extraction of several reconnaissance teams. On 28 November Team Millbrook was extracted from the Ong Thu Slope (ZC 1948) after being surrounded by an unknown size enemy force. Team Cherry Jam (once again) attempted insertion into a haven 3 km southeast of Thach Bich (AT 8128) on the 30th. As the insert helicopter approached the intended landing zone the intensity of small arms fire from an unknown number of enemy necessitated the abortion of the mission.
- (22) The level of mine and booby trap incidents rose during the first half and then dropped slightly during the second half of November. The majority of these incidents were recorded in the 1st Marines TAOR.
- (23) The number of terrorist attacks directed against the civilian populace during the second half of Nevember reflected a slight decrease.

e. Weather and Terrain

(1) The maximum and minimum temperature range recorded for the month of November 1969 was 93 to 65 degrees. Overcast weather 

with little precipitation, a typical of the Nevember monsoon season, prevailed throughout most of the menth. Tetal rainfall was almost six inches below the established monthly mean for November with 8.76 inches recorded.

(2) Weather during the month had no appreciable effect on ground operations, however air operations were adversely affected. Reduced visibility, due to prevailing ground fog and low ceilings, limited aerial observation and helicopter operations.





ORGANIZATION AND OPERATIONS

- 1. (S) During November 1969, in addition to the normal offensive activities conducted by the Division, the 5th Marines and the 7th Marines each developed a successful unnamed operation within their TAOR's. Operation PIPESTONE CANYON continued until 1800H on 7 November 1969.
- a. The Fifth Marines unnamed operation in the Arizona Territory, which commenced 30 October and continued through November, accounted for over 500 VC/NVA KIA. Numerous enemy weapons and significant amounts of equipment and foodstuffs were captured. The operation was conducted in three phases. Phase I involved elements of the First and Third Battalions providing blocking positions while the Second Battalion (-) was helolifted into Northern Arizona to conduct clearing operations. After ten days of successful small unit engagements, the Second Battalion was helolifted out of the Arizona and returned to THUNG DUC Valley and Hill 65. The Third Battalion returned to Liberty Bridge, Liberty Road area. Phase II commenced when the First Battalion began conducting intensive clearing operations in the Southern Arizona as a deception. On 17 November Phase III began as the Second Battalion (-) was reinserted via helicopter into the First Battalion area under the guise of a resupply mission. The battalion moved under the cover of darkness to an attack position. The other two battalions resumed their blocking positions. As a result the enemy was forced onto Football Island. Successful preplanned artillery TOT was fired on the island. An intensive search and clear operation was conducted by the Second Battalion on the island. Successful ambushes were achieved by the blocking elements as the enemy attempted to escape. By the end of November contact had become scarce and the Fifth Marines resumed activities throughout their TAOR.
- In early November the First Battalion, Seventh Marines moved into the QUE SON Mountains to provide a blocking force for an ARVN operation being conducted to the south. At the conclusion of the ARVN operation the battalion remained to search for enemy installations reported by intelligence information to be located in the area. The operational area in the QUE SON Mountains is characterized by large rock outcroppings and boulders. This terrain provided literally hundreds of natural caves and hiding places for the enemy. The natural vegetation is of such density and the slopes so precipitous that both visibility and maneuverability was seriously inhibited. Engagements with the enemy were initiated at a time and place where the enemy clearly had the advantage, and combat was generally between small units at close range. However the First Battalion of the Seventh Marines (Rein) conducted methodical searching operations. They exploited all contacts with constant pursuit. The flexibility afforded by the helicopter kept the enemy off balance and on the move. Enemy supply lines and routes of communications into the QUE SON Mountains through Antenna Valley were successfully interdicted through the employment of the Integrated Observation Device at FSB Ryder. Over 100 enemy soldiers were killed by accurate artillery fire. In the QUE SONS themself, the long





sought after CP of the 36th NVA Regiment was located. The First Battalion destroyed extensive bunker complexes and buildings, and captured over 100 individual weapons. Extensive ordnance caches, which included thousands of rounds of small arms ammunition, grenades, and mortar rounds were also discovered. A complete hospital complex was discovered and destroyed. Tons of stored rice was captured. The success that the First Battalion achieved was the culmination of many months of operations throughout the Division TAOR which had forced the 36th Regiment to withdraw to the QUE SONS where their position was exploited by the Seventh Marines efforts.

- c. Phase V of Operation PIPESTONE CANYON saw an increase of night patrolling and ambushing in the north northwestern portion of the Dodge City area. Only four enemy contacts were made during this reporting period. The following are the final cumulative totals of enemy structures destroyed, food captured, and booby traps encountered: 1 Command Post, 113 bunker complexes, 113 tunnels, 2,680 bunkers, 361 fighting holes, 3,496 meters of trench lines, 124,694 lbs of rice, 2,274 lbs of corn, 60 lbs of salt, 495 booby traps found, 161 booby traps detonated, 656 booby traps total.





PLANS

- 1. (C) Planning continued for the implementation of the Infantry Company Intensive Pacification Program (ICIPP). The 1st Marine Regiment was selected to begin with a pilot program. Although eight villages were selected, only four were occupied during the reporting period. The remaining four will be occupied during December. Planning has been directed towards starting an ICIPP in each of the remaining regiments in the near future.
- 2. (C) 1st Marine Division Operation Order 301A-YR (Basic Operation Order) was returned from staffing and publication will be made in December 1969.
- 3. (C) The 1st Marine Division's Force Structure Priority List was completed and submitted to III MAF for consideration in the development of the MACV Force Structure Priority List.
- 4. (C) 1st Marine Division Order 03330.2B (Rules of Engagement in RVN for the use of Artillery, Tanks, Mortars, Naval Gunfire, Riverine Forces and Air and Armed Helicopter Support) was written and staffed for comments/recommendations prior to publication. This Order establishes the specific Rules and Engagement for the conduct of Air and Surface battles within RVN and supports current directives as published by higher head-quarters.
- 5. (C) 1st Marine Division Order 03330.3 (Control, Disposition and Safe-guarding of Vietnamese Property, Captured Material and Food Supplies) was written and staffed for comments/recommendations prior to publication. This Order publishes policies and procedures for the safeguarding, control and disposition of Vietnamese property, captured materials and foodstuff.



TRAINING

- 1. During the month of November 1969, 38 officers and 111 enlisted Marines attended formal schools in and out of country.
- 2. 1st Engineers Battalion conducted three-day and one-day courses on demolitions, landmine warfare and booby traps. 269 Marine attended the three-day course and 88 Marines attended the one-day course.
- 3. 11th Marines conducted one-day courses for non-artillerymen in the adjustment of artillery fires. 169 Marines attended.
- 4. Scout Sniper School held refresher training for 18 Marines.
- 5. Division Schools Advanced Orientation Course graduated ht officers and h6 staff mencommissioned officers.
- 6. Division Schools NCO Leadership Course graduated 90 noncommissioned officers.
- 7. Division Schools Mobile Training Team conducted instruction throughout the Division for 3538 enlisted Marines and officers.
- 8. Division Embarkation Section's Embarkation Contact Team conducted instruction throughout the Division for 10 officers and 30 enlisted.

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OPERATIONAL TECHNICAL INSPECTIONS

- 1. The below listed units were inspected during the month of November and found to be satisfactory.
- 2. There were no discrepancies requiring action by this or higher headquarters.

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LOGISTICS, EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLY SUMMARY

Operation PIPESTONE CANYON continued into its seventh month in the Goi Noi island area. Until its termination on 7 November 1969, the operation continued to be supplied from the LSA at Camp Muir (Will 55), accounting for the majority of the 97 lifts of 189,905 pounds of cargo and 286 passengers directed to units in the field by LSA personnel.

The LSA at An Hoa resupplied the units of the 5th Marine Regiment operating in and around the ARIZOWA area. A total of 205 lifts of 561, 516 pounds of cargo and 11,874 passengers were directed to units in the field by LSA personnel. In addition, 36 refuelers and 166 cargo vehicles resupplied the LSA at An Hoa.

The LSA at LZ BALDY enjoyed its first full month of complete operational status. A total of 315 lifts of 1,358,425 pounds of cargo and 2,247 passengers were directed to field units of the 7th Harine Regiment by ISA personnel.


On 12-14 November 1969, personnel from the G-4 and special staff sections presented an S-4 Orientation course to 25 officers and staff of 1st Marine Division units. The course consisted of 2 days of classroom presentation by all staff sections and was highlighted by a one day tour of the Supply and Maintenance Battalions of the Force Logistic Command.

Division Embarkation assisted in the coordinating and supervising of 383 personnel transferring from the 3rd Marine Division to this command. Embarkation also assisted in preparing 30 retrograde tracked vehicles for embarkation, as well as assisting, where possible, the 3rd Marine Division Embarkation Staff in the redeployment of that unit. Also coordinated was the movement of Duel Blade Materiel from Dong Ha to Danang and its transport from Danang to the 7th Engineer Battalion. During Povember, the section conducted 7 formal CFEX inspections, 1 reinspection, 3 courtesy inspections, 2 Instruction Team visits, and further provided embarkation consultation to the 7th Marine Regiment.

During the period 1-30 November 1969 the Lateriel Management Section conducted 5 formal CHT inspections, 8 reinspections, and 5 staff visits. Further, FARES/MONSTAT instruction was presented by the section to S-4 personnel of the 26th, 7th and 11th Larine Regiments as well as to the S-4 of 3rd Battalion, 5th Marine Regiment, ITT/IT, and SI teams.

In November, the 1st Engineer Battalion continued to provide close combat support to the 1st Marine Division while the 7th and 9th Engineer Battalions provided close combat support to 1st Marine Division units in the Danang, An Hoa and Chu Lai areas. The 1st Engineer Battalion mine sweep teams covered 2,527,060 meters of road, while the 7th Engineer Battalion mine sweep teams covered 2,051,820 meters of road. A total of 94 mine/booby trap incidents were reported, including 63 detonations

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resulting in 13 KIA's, 102 WIA's and damage to 7 vehicles. The most common device was the M-26 Fragmentation Grenade (24 incidents).

The 1st Engineer Battalion was issued 63 Division work orders during November. 68 Division work orders were reported completed/cancelled, leaving 69 Division work orders outstanding. The 1st Shore Party Battalion was issued 12 Division work orders during November. 4 Division work orders were reported completed/cancelled, leaving 16 Division work orders outstanding. The Engineer section conducted 4 formal CMMI inspections, 2 reinspections, and made 4 staff visits.

Motor Transport assets within the Division were used for tactical and administrative troop movements and general cargo handling. During November, the 1st Motor Transport Battalion traveled a total of 99,644 miles and transported 61,257 personnel and 5,493 tons of cargo. The 11th Motor Transport Battalion traveled a total of 106,092 miles and transported 24,121 personnel and 16,379 tons of cargo. In addition, Division Motor Transport Battalions conducted 261 convoys, and Division Motor Transport Maintenance Section conducted 5 formal CMMI inspections, 2 reinspections and 2 staff visits.

During the month of November, the Division Supply Materiel Management Team conducted 4 formal CMMI inspections and 8 courtesy inspections.

One LVTP5 and one M48A3 received mine damage and are combat losses. In November, the Division Ordnance Office conducted 7 formal CMMI inspections. 8 courtesy inspections, and 2 staff visits.

The construction of the new mess at Headquarters, 26th Marine Regiment was completed, and the first meal was served on 25 November 1969. The Bakery at Force Logistic Command baked and decorated 103 cakes for use in the Division messes on the Marine Corps Birthday. The Food Service staff conducted 5 formal CMMI inspections and 17 staff visits.

The 1st Dental Company continued to support the 1st Marine Division in the Danang and An Hoa areas with 71 personnel and 16 dental facilities. A newly constructed, centrally air-conditioned dental clinic was opened at 1st Medical Battalion, to include 6 dental units, a prosthetic laboratory, surgical office and sterilizing room. The dental facility supporting the 26th Marine Regiment was reopened. Treatment rendered in November in support of the Civic Action Program included 611 procedures on 225 Vietnamese patients.

ENCLOSURE (1)

CIVIL AFFAIRS/CIVIC ACTION

Narrative summary for the period 1-30 November 1969

- 1. (U) The people of the flooded hamlet of XUAN TRA (BT068682) requested the help of the 1st MarDiv on a priority basis. The 1st MarDiv drainage plans were approved by the Hoa Vang District Chief and 1st Engineers started worked on 7 November. By 21 November the drainage problem was solved. The MSR was cut, a by-pass constructed. The Vietnamese will dig the necessary drainage ditches inside their hamlet. By 25 November the people of Xuan Tra moved back to their formerly flooded homes. Their morale is extremely high. Throughout the crisis 2/1 assisted the hamlet with MEDCAPS, clothing and food.
- 2. (U) In the vicinity of Hill 55 Diem Ban District Local Forces continued to resettle people from contested areas. Approximately 300 people were moved from the Chau Son area (AT948605) to Duc Ky (2) (AT968608). Virtually no preparations were made by District and the people were living in deplorable conditions. 1st Marines attempted temporary relief conducting MedCaps and allowing the people access to the river for drinking water and washing. On 18 Nov, Dien Ban District moved the people back to their burned out homes. Their homes were burned literally in front of their eyes when they were moved initially. This was to prevent their return. District attempted to mollify the people by saying the VC had made the move necessary and that the GVN would help them restore their burned out homes. It is doubtful that they accepted these explanations.
- 3. (U) The Self-Help tea plantation of Phuoc Thuan Hamlet (AT936732) in the HqBn CAAOR has shown steady progress. 5000 tea plants are growing and 5,000 more plants will be planted during December. HqBn in conjunction with the 1st Engineer En cleared and terraced the land for the plantation.
- 4. (U) The 5th Marines took effective measures to process the increasing numbers of war victims (formerly called Refugees) that are voluntarily coming in from the Arizona Area. A shelter was constructed as a reception center. As the people are received, they are given clothing, food and shelter for the night. The next morning they are transported to Duc Duc District for settling in the Xuyen Thu Village area west of An Hoa. Although the reception processing is not a complete solution to the continuing war victim problem, it does alleviate some of their hardship while they are in the 5th Marines care. 253 such people were processed this month in the 5th Marines! area.

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5. (U) On 25 Nov, the Agriculture School at Hoi An was opened with a dedication ceremony. The 1st Marine Division provided the majority of the funds for its construction. Division support included:

357,426 \$VN For Construction Material 86,437 \$VN For Labor 443,863 \$VN Piasters

- 6. (U) 1st Marine Division G-5 is assisting Rev. Gordon SMITH, a missionary of 40 years in Vietnam, in caring for 150 orphans received from the Chu Lai area. They were soon settled (AT949890) in a sea side valley south of Hai Van pass. The Division provided 2 GP tents plus C-rations and rice. The first group of 60 orphans arrived 11 November 1969.
- 7. (U) 1/11 conducted a "Soap-in" as part of its health/sanitation/medical civic action program at Le Son Hamlet (AT985665). The Battalion Surgeon noted a large number of medical problems among the children were the result of not using soap and water. To solve this problem the corpsmen held a class on the use of soap.

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PSYCHOLOGICAL OPERATIONS

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Narrative Summary for the period 1-30 November 1969.

- 1. (U) There was a slight decrease in the Volunteer Informant Program in the 1st Marine Division during the month of November. A total of 316 incidents occured with 50 items of ordnance and information collected as compared to 45 incidents and 297 items of ordnance and information collected during October. A total of 82,075 \$VN was expended in November as compared to 104,050 \$VN in October. Success of the program is continuing.
- 2. (U) A total of 10 Hoi Chanh rallied to Division units during this reporting period. Six(6) to the 5th Marines; three(3) to the 7th Marines; and one(1) to the 26th Marines. Ralliers for the I Corps area for November 1969 totalled 813. 355 ralliers came from the 1st Marine Division TAOR (approximately 43%).
- 3. (U) Earlywords during this reporting period were utilized as follows:

5th Marines - 1,3,18,28,29, and 30 November 7th Marines - 12 November 26th Marines - 7, 15,24,27, and 28 November

- 4. (U) Armed Propaganda Teams were utilized during this reporting period by 26th Marines for the period of 3-8 November in Quang Nam (3).; the 1st Tank Battalion for the period of 12-16 November in Hoa Tho; and the 1st Marines for the period of 25-27 November in Chau Son (2).
- 5. (U) Cultural Drama Teams were utilized by 26th Marines on 3 and 4 November in Hoa Din and Hoa Loc Village; the 7th Engineers on 16 November in Hoa Ninh; and the 1st Tank Battalion on 17 November in Hoa Tho Village.
- 6. (U) Two PSYOP Exploitation Teams were utilized during this reporting period to investigate enemy terrorist incidents within the 1st Marine Division TAOR.
- 7. (U) HB (Loudspeaker) Teams were utilized as follows during this reporting period:

1st Marines - 5,7,21,23, and 25 November

7th Marines - 20 November

26th Marines - 11 November

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7th Engineers - 5 and 26 November 1st Tank Bn. - 6 and 27 November 2nd CAG -- 8 November 11th MT Bn. - 13 November

8. (U) HE (Audio/Visual) Teams were utilized as follows during this reporting period:

- 9. (U) PSYOP media, consisting of loudspeaker broadcasting and aerial broadcasting were utilized on 18 and 19 November in support of the 1st Marines operation to resettle the people of Due Ky Refugee Camp from the boundaries of the 1st Marines AOR to an area S.E. of Hill #55.
- 10. (U) On 24 November 1969, Company 'L', 3rd Battalion, 26th Marines requested an Earlyword broadcast west of Hill 190. A Kit Carson Scout passed a Rally Instruction message. The message stated that anyone that wanted to rally should walk in at sling arms and swing a white parachute over their heads. The parachute could be obtained by simply picking up one of the parachutes from a spent flare (many of which litter the area).

On 270900H November 1969, Bui Van Danh rallied to Company 'L', 3rd Battalion, 26th Marines at AT899819. He had his weapon at sling arms and was waving a white parachute over his head. Bui Van Danh stated he and his unit had heard the broadcast on 24 November.

- 11. (U) During this reporting period 12,744,000 leaflets were dropped on 315 targets within the 1st Marine Division TAOR.
- 12. (U) During this reporting period 138 aerial broadcasts were flown over 138 targets for a period of 20 hours and 10 minutes of broadcast time.

a. 21 November 1969: LtCol O'MARA accompanied by Maj FORDHAM Comm Officer Seventh Marines attended a Communications Planning Conference at III MAF G-6 and later at Headquarters XXIV Corps with the Signal Officer and Assistants.

7. New Communication Facilities:

- a. 8 November 1969: Completed installation of cable-one 25 pair cable from Radio Relay site, hill 327, to Eleventh Marines CP and one 25 pair cable from Radio Relay site, hill 327, to Danang DASC.

Its secondary use and possibly more important will be to provide a radio relay link from the alternate Division CP to the Regts. This provides, for the first time, a radio relay installation dispersed from the main radio relay site serving the Division Headquarters.





3. General

- a. Basic instructions and eligibility criteria are contained in reference (a). These instructions must be followed in detail, with particular emphasis placed on the composition of the basic request and the required documentation.
- b. In processing a request, the following questions should be ascertained and thoroughly evaluated prior to forwarding the request to this Headquarters.
- (1) Is hardship of temporary nature? Will humanitarian transfer alleviate the condition so the man can return to a full duty status?
- (2) Has a thorough investigation into other family members availability and capability to assist been conducted?
- (3) Would the registration of a BAQ allotment alleviate the situation?
- (h) Would additional financial help from the serviceman suffice in lieu of a Hardship Discharge?

(5) Will job offered actually exceed service pay considering side benefits of service?

4. Applications

- a. Lequests will be addressed to the Commanding General, 1st Marine Division (Rein), FAF, (Attn: DivAdj) via the normal chain of command in format as outlined in enclosure (1).
- b. The original and one copy, including enclosures thereto, will be submitted to this Headquarters. The service record book will be forwarded with, but not as an enclosure to, the recommendation.
- c. Although a statement from a prospective employer indicating facts relative to future employment is not required by reference (a), such a statement is desirable in cases involving financial problems in order that the Division Discharge Review Board may more accurately evaluate the assistance which the Marine can render if discharged/released from active duty.
- d. Endorsements will include a specific recommendation for approval or disapproval of the request. When disapproval is recommended, specific reason(s) therefor will be indicated. To further assist the reviewing authority in making his determination, such endorsements will also include any information known to the Commander which is not contained in the basic request or prior endorsement(s).
- 5. Availability of Applicant. Organizations forwarding requests will insure that the individual will be available to appear before the Dependency and Hardship Discharge Review Board. Such requests will be acted upon by the Dependency and Hardship Discharge Boardswithin five days after receipt at this Headquarters. The individual concerned will not be ordered to temporary additional duty or Red without prior approval from this Headquarters. Emergency Leave may be granted in accordance with current policy; however, this Headquarters will be advised that a hardship discharge case is pending.

6. Action

- a. Commanding Officers processing all subject requests will:
- (1) Read and strictly comply with the provisions of reference (a) and this Order prior to forwarding the individual's request for discharge or release from active duty.
- (2) Ensure that all required documentation is appended and notarized as required.

- (3) Carefully evaluate each case for possible solutions to the individual's hardship which, if pursued, would obviate the necessity of hardship discharge or release to inactive duty.
- (4) Avoid stereotype recommendations. Each request of this nature will be carefully considered on its individual merits.
- b. By the very nature of the circumstances involved, requests for dependency or hardship discharge require expeditious handling to assure minimum delay in relieving personal problems. To this end, applicants will be given every assistance in the preparation of their request, and applications will be given the special handling that circumstances warrant.
- 7. Discharge Review Board. The Dependency and Hardship Discharge Review Board will be convened at this Headquarters.

- 1. Purpose. To publish amplifying instructions relative to the criteria to be utilized in determining eligibility for subject award and processing instructions.
- 2. Cancellation. CG, 1stMarDiv msg 260629Z May69.

3. Ceneral

- Reference (a) delegated the authority to award the Combat Action Ribbon (CAR) to all Commanding Generals and authorized all Commanding Officers holding service records to verify retroactive eligibility for the award by review of individual service records and established the criteria to be utilized in determining eligibility for the award. Reference (b) clarifies the eligibility criteria published by reference (a) and directed Commanding Officers to reevaluate all CAR's previously approved and awarded to ensure that each individual is qualified in accordance with the criteria.
- b. Reference (c) published the Commanding General, Fleet Marine Force policy concerning review and eligibility for the CAR as follows:
- (1) All Commanding Officers will review the service records of members of their unit and reevaluate the criteria used to establish eligibility for each CAR previously approved. Upon completion of the review, a list of personnel who remained eligible should be published. Personnel who have been awarded the CAR under previous policy, which is no longer applicable, will be informed of their ineligibility status by separate letter and will be permitted to submit further information, if they so desire, which may be used to substantiate their eligibility for the award.
- (2) Applications for the CAR for personnel above infantry battalion level, in combat service support and aviation units, should be forwarded lin-at to the Commandant of the Marine Corps (Goda DL).

- (3) The principle eligibility criterion for the Combat Action Ribbon (CAR) is that the recipient must be a member of a tactical close combat ground unit of battalion or smaller size, and must actively participate in a ground or surface fire fight with the enemy or in action during which he is endangered by enemy small arms fire. Being within the bursting/fragmentation radius of an enemy explosive or of friendly ordnance detonated by an enemy explosive while engaged in active defense against a direct ground attack also constitutes eligibility.
- (h) For purposes of determining eligibility for awards that may be approved by Commanding Generals, tactical close combat ground units of battalion size are identified as:
- (a) All infantry battalions or elements thereof and attached manuevering support elements.
 - (b) Combined Action Platoons and companies.
 - (c) Reconnaissance units operating in forward areas.
- (d) Artillery units displaced to forward fire support/combat bases in support of infantry operations; but not artillery units located or operating with units not normally eligible for the award (such as artillery units located within the Danang area).
- (e) Advisory personnel accompanying allied forces in surface combat operations. Normally, all support units and units located in fixed installations or at combat bases occupied by staffs above the infantry battalion level will not be eligible for the CAR without approval of the Commandant of the Marine Corps.
- (5) To further assist in determining eligibility for the CAR, the following guidelines are provided: Personnel of a fixed installation are eligible when participating in a firefight or directly endangered by enemy fire or explosives while engaged in active defense against or subject to direct ground attack. If a fixed installation such as Danang is penetrated by an enemy demo team, only those participating in a resultant firefight are eligible. Such an attack does not qualify all the personnel of the installation for the award, nor are other personnel who happen to be located within the base at the time eligible. Sporadic indirect attacks by rocket, artillery and mortar fire directed against installations not simultaneously under enemy ground attack do not constitute eligibility for the entire installation. In such cases, determination of eligibility for personnel located in fixed installations should be predicated on the degree of danger involved. In determining specific eligibility of personnel for the CAR, the following applies:
- (a) Enemy Fire. Personnel are eligible for the CAR if they are directly exposed to enemy small arms fire, i.e., small arms rounds

must impact in or dangerously near their position during a ground/surface attack.

(b) Enemy Explosives

l Personnel are eligible for the CAR if they are located within the bursting/fragmentation radius of detonated enemy ordnance or friendly ordnance detonated by an enemy explosive during a ground/surface sttack.

2 Personnel involved in reactions such as moving aircraft or explosives during the ground attack may be eligible.

(c) Reconnaissance Personnel

l Members of a Marine reconnaissance patrol are eligible when landed by helicopter at a vantage point considerably removed from friendly lines if they observe enemy forces even though they do not engage them due to the nature of their mission.

2 An intelligence patrol or information team is eligible when performing a special mission operating clandestinely in an enemy environment.

(d) Hospital Corpsmen. A hospital corpsmen serving with a Marine unit is eligible when the Marines he is accompanying are eligible.

(e) Flight Crews

l Flight crews who eject or are forced to land in North Vietnam are eligible.

2 Flight crews who eject or are forced to land in South Vietnam, if they resultantly encounter hostile forces, are eligible.

3 Flight crews on ships participating in combat action which meet the eligibility criteria for shipboard personnel are eligible.

La Flight crews of helicopters are eligible if unable to complete their mission due to mechanical failure resulting from enemy fire or direct enemy action and, as a result of the incompleted mission, subsequently participate in bonafide ground combat action with the enemy.

- (f) Ship Board Personnel. All Marine personnel aboard ships or craft of the U.S. Navy will qualify for the CAR in accordance with current OPNAV directives.
- (6) Administration. Authority for Commanding Officers holding service records to certify eligibility for the CAR through a review of

the service records or through statements made by the individual concerned does not include authority to approve the retroactive award of a CAR for that individual. Approval of the award must be accomplished a Commanding General, and no entry should be made in the service records until such approval is received. Awards for personnel above the infantry battalion level to include combat service support and aviation units must be approved by the Commandant of the Marine Corps.

(7) Determination. Determination of eligibility for the CAR rests with the judgement of the Commanding Officer; therefore, to maintain the prestige associated with the CAR, Commanding Officers are enjoined to consider the award of the Combat Action Ribbon in strict sense of active participation in close combat action.

4. Action

- a. All Commanding Officers will comply with the instructions outlined in subparemaph 3b(1) above and submit a rester with a cut off date of 30 November 1969 of those personnel determined to be eligible for the award to this Headquarters for approval. Administrative action form may be used as the covering letter.
- b. For approval of the CAR for those personnel in accordance with subparagraph 3b(4) above, after 30 November 1969, utilize administrative action form containing appropriate substantiating data with roster of personnel attached thereto and submit to this Headquarters for approval.

- 1. Purpose. To publish procedures and guidance for the distribution and control of General Wall Scholarships.
- 2. Cancellation. Div0 5080.(D.
- 3. Background
- a. Very few of the students who enter primary school in I Corps remain to graduate from high school. Although attrition is high at all levels, most students drop out between primary school and secondary school; that is, after approximately five years of education. Surveys have shown that the greatest, single reason for these dropouts is the lack of sufficient funds within the student's lamity.
- b. The Ceneral WMT Scholarship is designed to aid those students, who show promise as future leaders through their academic achievement. Primary consideration should be given those students who:
- (1) Are orphans of ARVW or other Vietnamese military personnel or dependents of disabled Vietnamese military personnel.
- (2) Are dislighted from their homes, such as residents of refutee chaps where family incomes are very low.

Divo 5080.(E

- (3) Are attending secondary school or who could attend secondary school if they had sufficient funds.
 - (4) Have demonstrated a desire to become a teacher.
- c. The scholarships are given in the form of a monthly payment to help defray the cost of sending the child to school. Normally, VN\$ 500 is sufficient to send a primary student to school for one month. Additional funds may be provided secondary students depending on individual circumstances.

4. Action

- a. Unit commanders within the 1st Marine Division Civic Action Area of Responsibility will continuously canvass their assigned areas for deserving Vietnamese students. Often local government officials or school officials can be helpful in locating suitable students.
- b. Forms for the administration and presentation of scholarships are contained in enclosures (1), (2), and (3). These forms, which require the signature of the unit commander, may be reproduced locally or obtained from this Headquarters, (Attn: G-5). The purposes of these forms are:
- (1) Scholarship Application Form. (Enclosure (1)). This form provides basic information regarding potential WALT Scholars including a brief family situation for comparative purposes.
- (2) Scholarship Agreement. (Enclosure (2)). This form establishes that the student is enrolled in school and that his headteacher and parents/guardian understand the conditions of the scholarship.
- (3) General WALT Scholarship Certificate. (Enclosure (3)). This form is presented to each WALT scholar when his/her scholarship is initiated. A ppy of this certificate will be forwarded to this Headquarters, (Atm: G-5). When scholarships are renewed it is not necessary to forward additional certificates. Once a certificate is on file at this Headquarters it is sufficient to submit the student's name with each scholarship renewal.
- c. Scholarship funds are allocated quarterly; therefore, units wishing to initiate scholarships in the middle of a school quarter will find scholarship funds scarce. Funds for the September-November 1969 school quarte, for example, were allocated in August. Except in rare instances, no new scholarships can be funded by this Headquarters until the beginning of each new school quarter.

- d. Scholarship funds are picked up each month from the fund Custodian, located in the Division G-5 Office.
- e. The approval or disapproval of the scholarship lies with the unit commander.
- f. Because of the limited amount of funds available for General WALT Scholarships and the need for continuity in providing scholarships, unit commanders are encouraged to initiate unit funds with donations coming from the unit itself.
- g. A monthly General WALT Scholarship report will be forwarded to arrive at this Headquasters (Attn: G-5) by the 25th of the month and will include the following information:
- (1) A roster of signatures of scholarship recipients or their parents/guardians and the amount each received.
 - (2) The total amount of funds distributed for the month.
 - (3) Number of students in:
 - (a) Primary school
 - (b) Secondary school
 - (c) Other schools
- (4) Number of students who are dependents or orphans of ARVN or other Vietnamese military personnel, whether they are in primary or secondary school, and the amount each received.
- h. Scholarships supported by unit funds will be reported separately in the same report.

During October 1968, as a result of racial indidents, the T Corps Coordinator decided to form an ICTZ system of Watch and Action Committees with the mission of identifying race relations problems, studying these problems, and formulating ways and means to reduce racial tensions and incidents. Subsequently, the ICTZ Watch Committee was appropriately renamed as the ICTZ Leadership Council.

4. Action

- a. Leadership Councils will be formed immediately, as follows:
 - (1) Division Leadership Councils
 Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1 (Chairman)
 Executive Officers of Regiments and Separate Battalions
 Division Sergeant Major
 - (2) Regimental Leadership Council:
 Membership to be determined by the Commanding Officer
- (3) Battalion and Separate Battalion Leadership Councils: Establish Leadership Council, composed of varying grades and races.

- b. All Councils are to advise commanders on race relations, transmit reports of information and recommendations concerning race relations, and to serve as focal points for the collection of information bearing on racial understanding and activities.
- c. Information concerning the place, time, and date of meetings for the Division Leadership Council will be promulgated by separate correspondence.
- 5. Reports Required. Regimental and Separate Battalion Commanders will submit a written report to reach the Commanding General (Attention G-1) by the second day of each month. In addition, reports of unusual or significant incidents should be reported immediately. All reports will be personally signed by the Commanding Officer. The report will include the following:
- a. A review of all incidents during the previous month which may be attributed to or could have produced racial tensions.
- b. A description of positive tasks accomplished by the organization during the previous month to ease racial tensions and/or to encourage racial understanding and harmony.
 - c. A forecast of the state of race relations for the coming month.

- 1. Purpose. To establish a system for the early warning of commanders when stocks of Class V material are, or are projected to be, insufficient to fulfill normal requirements.
- 2. General. The Division Commander has access to information concerning dump levels and expected receipts which permits an evaluation of the capability to meet normal requirements of all users. Rapid dissemination of this information will permit users to institute appropriate measures to conserve items in short supply.

3. Definitions

- a. ORDCRIT The designation ORDCRIT shall be reserved for items for which the projected availability between the out-of-country source and the dump issuing to the user is such that it can be anticipated that normal demands cannot be met. (Inability to properly position assets in-country will not be a determining factor in designating an item ORDCRIT.)
 - b. Green Stocks are adequate to support normal comsumption.
- c. Amber Stocks are available but are not sufficient to support normal usage.
- d. Red Stocks are depleted in ASP's. All assets are in LSA dumps or on position.

4. Action

a. The Assistant Chief of Staff, G-4 will coordinate action required to monitor levels in ASP's and due-in; determine items within the ORDCRIT definitions stated in paragraph 3 above; and promulgate appropriate noti-

fication in the format contained in enclosure (1). All items not "RED" or "AMBER" will be assumed to be "GREEN".

b. Upon receipt of an ORDCRIT "AMBER or RED", subordinate commanders will take such action as is appropriate, within their authority, to conserve assets of ORDCRIT items (e.g., reduce consumption, substitute other items, etc.).

SECTION I

101. MISSION

- 1. The primary mission of the medical service is the conservation of combat power of the 1st Marine Division (Rein), FMF. This is accomplished through technical supervision of measures designed to safeguard the health of the command, early effective care of the sick and injured, and prompt and orderly evacuation of casualties from forward areas.
- 2. Medical units will provide care for the injured and sick, utilizing the highest professional standards possible under existing conditions. Personnel at all levels must consistently be alert to possible means of improving these standards of medical care.
- 3. Medical personnel will be guided in the execution of the above by the Standing Operating Procedure for Medical Services which is published herein and those published by higher authority.
- 4. Medical personnel at all levels will advise unit commanding officers on all medical matters relating to the command. Medical personnel will ask and receive assistance when necessary from the Senior Medical Officer of the next senior command.
- * 5. Preventive Medicine measures are as outlined in DivO P6200.4 (SCP for Preventive Medicine Services) and that Order should be utilized as an adjunct to this Order.

4. <u>SUBSTITUTE EXAMINATIONS</u>. Commanding officers will forward to the Senior Member of the Examining Board, not later than seven days following the date of the regularly scheduled examination, a list of all personnel who, through no fault of their own, were prevented from taking the examination, stating briefly the circumstances which prevented the individual from participating.

5. FIELD ADVANCEMENT PROGRAM

- a. Currently, a program is in effect whereby commanding officers are authorized to waive the written examination for certain personnel in pay grades E-4 through E-6 serving in a combat area, provided all other eligibility requirements are met as outlined in NAVPERS 15989 (Manual of Advancement in Rate or Rating). This Headquarters will periodically publish instructions implementing this program.
- b. Commanding officers with Summary Court-Martial jurisdiction are authorized to promote Naval personnel from pay grade E-2 to E-3 as soon as the individual completes thirty days in the Republic of Vietnam. All other requirements for advancement to pay grade E-3 are waived. A feeder diary will be submitted to this Headquarters on all personnel receiving Field Advancements to pay grade E-3 citing BUPERS MSG 201345Z JAN 67 as authority for advancement. In addition to service record entry on page 4, the following page 13 service record entry will be made:

"Field advancement to Hospitalman effective this date in accordance with BUPERS MSG 201345Z JAN 67."

6. MERITORIOUS ADVANCEMENT

- a. CG III MAF ForO 1430.1 authorizes the Commanding General to effect immediate meritorious advancement to PO3 and PO2 when Navy personnel have demonstrated exceptionally outstanding professional performance under fire. Commanding officers should submit recommendations for meritorious advancement of Navy enlisted personnel by letter to Commanding General (Attn: Division Surgeon) (Original and 4 copies). Letter recommendations are to include the following:
 - (1) Practical Factors completed for rate being recommended.
 - (2) Military Requirements, PO 3&2, completed (date)
 - (3) Hospital Corpsman 3&2 completed (date). (For advancement to HM2 only.)

4-3 Ch 2 (4) Advanced to present rate on ____(date)__.

Meritorious advancements are subject to quota limitations established for the Field Advancement Program.

- b. CG III MAF Foro 1430.1 authorizes the Commanding General, 1st Marine Division to waive time in rate requirements for meritorious advancement of multiple amputees. It is command policy that, if otherwise qualified, Navy personnel in pay grades E-1 through E-4 whose wounds result in multiple amputations will be advanced to the next higher pay grade by meritorious combat promotion.
 - (1) Immediately upon notification that a member of the command has been wounded and the wounds resulted in multiple amputations, notify this Headquarters (Attn: Division Surgeon) by telephone (ext. 6216 or 6316), giving full name, present rate, service number, date wounded, type of amputation, and place of hospitalization. A statement as to whether or not the individual is recommended for meritorious combat promotion will be included. These oral recommendations must be followed up in writing, stating the information listed above.
 - (2) Prompt notification is required as multiple amputees are normally evacuated out-of-country as soon after hospitalization as practicable, and the Commanding General desires to make such presentations prior to their departure from RVN.

406. TRAINING

- 1. Formal In-Service training will be conducted for a period of 2 hours per week as operational conditions permit.
- 2. Marine Self and Buddy Aid training will be conducted as required in FMFPACO's in the 1500 series.
- 3. A training log will be maintained for all in-service, Marine Self and Buddy Aid, and on-the-job classes held.
- 4. Lesson plans will be current for each subject.

407. TRANSFER OF PERSONNEL

- 1. All permanent change of station orders will be issued by this Head-quarters.
- 2. Rotation Data Card Worksheets will be forwarded to this Headquarters

Subj: EARLYWORD In Military Operations (PSYOP)

Ref: (a) DivO P3410.1A

1. Purpose. To promote a better understanding and more effective utilization of EARLYWORD for Psychological Operations in the 1st Marine Division TAOR.

2. Background

- a. Loudspeakers and radios are used as PSYOP weapons to extend the range of contact with the enemy and to exploit cold war activities, counter-guerrilla operations, tactical maneuvers, exploitation of enemy weaknesses, and consolidation phases of wartime operations.
- b. In the Republic of Vietnam, I Corps Marines are supported by Flight "A", 9th Special Operations Squadron (9th SOS), USAF. This Air Force unit provides direct support for delivery of 1st Marine Division aerial loudspeaker broadcasts.
- c. The 9th SOS is equipped with two kinds of PSYOP support aircraft.
- (1) The Air Force 02-B fixed-wing aircraft, is primarily used to deliver aerial broadcasts in South Vietnam. This aircraft has a special loudspeaker built into the fuselage of the aircraft.
- (2) The C-47 is the aircraft used primarily for leaflet drops. However, it is also equipped with a loudspeaker system and with its better navigation equipment, night aerial loudspeaker broadcasts and EARLYWORD are possible.

3. Information

a. A small adaptor unit (EARLYWORD) connects the airborne loudspeaker on the PSYOP aircraft to the aircraft's intercom. EARLYWORD allows any signal which can be heard on the aircraft's loudspeaker system to be re-broadcast to the ground via the aircraft's loudspeaker system. Direct broadcast from FM or other radio media is made possible by EARLYWORD; i.e., a tactical unit

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receiving a Hoi Chanh in the field is capable of immediate employment of surrender or rally appeals from the Hoi Chanh to his former comrades. The aircraft can fly over known enemy troop concentrations, bunkers, hamlets, or fields and transmit a message from a ground station as far away as 40 miles. If the target audience is located so far from the ground broadcasting station that radio reception is difficult, the PSYOP aircraft can orbit over the broadcasting station, tape record the message, and proceed to the target area for re-broadcasting.

b. Units in the field frequently report that EARLYWORD broadcasts are of low quality. The loudspeaker system emits a signal on a 15 degree cone. Unless the unit is within the 15 degree cone (target area) on the ground the broadcast cannot be easily heard or understood. Therefore, units requesting EARLY-WORD aircraft should be aware of this dispersion limitation.

c. Uses for EARLYWORD

- (1) Utilization of interpreters positioned at a central location to support several widely dispersed ground elements (possibly using two or three 02-B's in different locations).
- (2) Personalized messages to indigenous minority groups (literacy of target audience not a significant factor).
- (3) Encircling movements (cordon and search) when instructions to civilians, surrender messages or ultimatums are used.
- (4) Harassment to create dissension and undermine the enemy.
- (5) Search and rescue missions for Marines lacking a radio receiver, separated from their unit, or disoriented in heavy vegetation.
- d. Ideal targets for 02-B speaker operations are point targets or lines between two points. A point target is one set of UTM coordinates with a specified radius (ideally 2 kilometers). The ideal line target is approximately 5 kilometers in length and 4 kilometers wide. These types of targets significantly reduce transmission and plotting time and reduce clutter on the pilots charts, thereby increasing the effectiveness of each broadcast.

4. Action

a. PSYOP capable aircraft are in the air during most of the

daylight hours. They can be diverted from normal missions by emergency or priority requests. To request EARLYWORD aircraft, units should:

- (1) Contact Division PSYOP (G-5), who will "frag" a PSYOP aircraft, if the mission is valid.
- (2) Requests can be made direct to the G-5 office or through the Division COC switchboard.
- (3) Requests also may be handled by the unit Air Officer who can radio Danang Direct Air Support Center (DASC). DASC will then contact Division PSYOP.
 - (4) EARLYWORD requests will include:
 - (a) Identification of requesting Command.
 - (b) Date and time required.
 - (c) Location for aircraft to report (coordinates).
 - (d) Unit call sign and frequency.
- (e) A brief description of the situation requiring EARLYWORD support.
- (5) The EARLYWORD aircraft will contact the requesting unit Air Officer upon arrival in the area. The EARLYWORD pilot will then designate the frequency that the EARLYWORD broadcast will be transmitted on. From that point the requesting unit PSYOP Officer should control the EARLYWORD mission.
- b. Preplanned missions produce better results than quick reaction or immediate type missions. Quick reaction and immediate missions, however, can be timely to provide greater flexibility and more rapid response. Use it wisely and often and effective PSYOPS will result.

- 1. Purpose. This directive outlines the conduct of the Personal Response Program of the 1st Marine Division, defines the functions of the G-5 Personal Response Section/Contact Team, and details the services provided by the Personal Response Section for subordinate units.
- 2. Cancellations. Div0 5710.2, Div0 5710.3, Div0 5710.5, Div0 5710.6 and Div0 5710.8.
- 3. <u>History</u>. The Personal Response Program began in 1965 to educate Marines to the cultural and religious mores of the Vietnamese people. Gradually, the program evolved to a multi-faceted effort aimed at improving the attitude of the individual Marine toward the Vietnamese people.
- 4. Personal Response. Personal Response, as it currently pertains to the <u>lst Marine Division</u>, refers to the individual and collective feeling that <u>Marines</u> have toward the Vietnamese. It is the mission of the G-5 Personal Response Section to improve Vietnamese-American relations through the improvement of the attitude of Marines toward the Vietnamese. It is the mission of the Personal Response Contact Team, consisting of one officer and one staff NCO, to assist unit commanders in the conduct of their individual Personal Response Programs. Commanders may draw on the Team for instruction, technical assistance and training materials by contacting the Personal Response Section, G-5.
- a. Program. Current emphasis in the 1st Marine Division Personal Response Program is twofold.

Div0 5710.8A 12 Nov 1969

- (1) Attitude Improvement. Attitude improvement lectures will be offered by both unit S=5 s and the Division Personal Response Constact Team. Unit S=5 officers will provide attitude improvement lectures to joining Marines while the Division Personal Response Contact Team will give lectures to subordinate units as requested to supplement local instruction.
- (2) <u>Cultural Education</u>. A positive effort is being made to educate Marines to Vietnamese history, religions, culture and language through the following:
- (a) A lecture outlining Vietnamese history and religious development is offered by the Division Personal Response Contact Team to subordinate units on a request basis.
- (b) The G-5 Personal Response Section offers a cultural tour in the Danang area including visits to leading religious and historical landmarks in the area. Units may arrange for tours by calling the Personal Response Section at least two weeks in advance of the date requested.
- (c) G-5 offers a bi-monthly Vietnamese Language/Culture Course at the Division CP. Each battalion size unit is afforded a quota of one for this three week course. Limited additional quotas may be requested. A memorandum will announce class scheduling approximately two weeks prior to the commencement of each class.
- b. Subordinate Units. Unit commanders will initiate Personal Response Programs to include, in addition to orientation of new joinees, the following:
- (1) Dissemination of Personal Response Handbooks (NAVMC 2616) and such other literature that is provided by this Headquarters.
- (2) Such additional instructions in attitude improvement, Vietnamese Mistory/culture/religious, or problem areas with respect to local Vietnamese-American relations that the unit commander may direct.
- (3) Regiments and separate battalions will establish Personal Response Councils for the purposes stated in paragraph 5 below. The council will meet at least once quarterly and will forward a copy of the minutes of the meeting to this Headquarters (Attn: G-5). Meetings will be held during the 2d quarter of FY70 (Oct-Dec 1969) and a report submitted to this Headquarters by 31 December 1969.
- 5. Personal Response Council. A Personal Response Council is established within the 1st Marine Division with the following mission:

- a. To improve Vietnamese-American relations within the Division TAOR.
- b. To isolate problem areas and to focus command attention on their solution.
- c. To assess the quality and effectiveness of troop indoctrination programs and courses of instruction and to recommend improvements where necessary.
 - d. The Council will have the following permanent members:

Assistant Chief of Staff, G-5 (Chairman)
G-1 Section Representative
G-3 Section Representative
Division Chaplain
Informational Services Officer
Regimental and Separate Battalion Executive Officers
Division Personal Response Officer
Division Sergeant Major

- e. The Council will meet at the call of the Chairman.
- 6. Reports. A Quarterly Personal Response Report will be submitted by regiments and separate battalions to reach this Headquarters (Attn: Personal Response Officer, G-5) by the last day of the quarter. The first report is due 31 December 1969. The report will follow the format provided in enclosure (1).

Subj: Vietnamese Language/Culture Course

1. Purpose. The Division G-5 section will conduct a Vietnamese Language/Culture Course to be held at Division Headquarters beginning 8 December 1969. The course will last for a period of three weeks ending 27 December 1969.

2. Information

- a. The importance of having interested and qualified personnel to work in the area of Vietnamese/American relations cannot be overemphasized. The need for well trained individuals who have a working knowledge of both the culture and language of the Vietnamese people is critical. Experience has shown that those units having such qualified personnel on their staffs have enjoyed more success in all programs in support of pacification than have those lacking such personnel.
- b. Since the course will require a three week investment of an individual satime? care should be taken to ensure that full use is made of the school training received. Ideally, personnel who are presently working in unit S-5's should attend this school. Each battalion size unit and larger may nominate one individual. Requests for additional quotas may be submitted to G-5 (Attn: Personal Response). Both officer and enlisted personnel are eligible. Nominated personnel must possess the following qualifications:
 - (1) Have a minimum of five months remaining in-country.
- (2) Be assigned to, or scheduled for assignment to a billet where language and culture instruction will be useful.
- (3) Students should not have received any previous formal Vietnamese language training.
- 3. Instructions. Personnel will attend classes on a full time basis, six days a week for five hours a day plus compulsory study periods throughout the course. Instructors will be provided through the ARVN Liaison Office. All students will reside in the immediate vicinity of Division Headquarters. Units will supply transportation to and from Division Headquarters for personnel attending the course.

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4. Action

- a. Nominations will be submitted to reach this Headquarters, G-5 (Attn: Personal Response) not later than 1500 on 1 December 1969.
- b. Personnel will report to Division G-5, Personal Response office no later than 1500 on 7 December 1969. The following is a list of minimum equipment to be in the hands of personnel upon reporting for instructions
- (1) Adequate clothing and personal effects for a three week period, including blankets.
 - (2) Normal arms, helmet and flak jacket.

- 3. Background. Experience has proven that the wearing of helmets and body armor significantly reduces casualties from enemy weapons, particularly fragmentation munitions. Current incidents indicate that Marines are being killed or seriously wounded because standard protective equipment is not worn. While the problems of weight, restriction of movement, difficult terrain, and discomfort during hot weather are recognized, these problems can be overcome by leadership, indoctrination, and acclimatization.

4. Action

- a. The wearing of helmsts and upper torso body armor is mandatory for all personnel when enemy contact, including mines, booby traps or ambush is likely.
- b. All personnel traveling by road within the lat Marine Division TAOR, exclusive of the Northern Sector Defense Command and the Southern Sector Defense Command, will wear the helmet and upper torso body armor. When flying over the above defined area, all Division personnel will have in their possession helmet and upper torso body armor.
- c. In cases which do not clearly fall within the above criteria, helmets and body armor will be worn as directed by commanders at no lower than infantry battalion and separate battalion/company level. In no case will the wearing of helmet and body armor be a matter of individual choice.

1. Purpose. To establish procedures for the 1st Marine Division (Rein), FMF, change of command ceremony.

2. General Information

- 3. Formation and Participants. The formation will consist of the Commander of Troops and his staff, the commanding officers and representative personnel from each regiment, battalion, and separate company, and massed organizational colors of all regiments, battalions, and separate companies. National flags in the ceremony will be those of the United States and the Republic of Vietnam. The formation and procedures for the ceremony will be as set forth in reference (a) and enclosures of this Bulletin.

- b. Representative staffs from division, regiments, battalions, and separate companies will be formed in accordance with enclosures (1), (2), and (3). As many different organizations and enlisted ranks as practicable will be represented in each regimental, battalion, or company unit.

- (2) Provide communication equipment and personnel in support of Helicopter Control Plan (enclosure (4)).

g. Provost Marshal

- (1) Provide for traffic control.
- (2) Establish reserved parking spaces in Hq Bn messhall parking lot.
 - (3) Provide security for LZ's 400 and 401.

h. Information Services Officer



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DETAILED SEQUENCE OF EVENTS

- 1. Fair Weather. Change of Command Ceremony will be held on the parking area in front of G-1/4 office area.
- 0935-All participants in position as shown in enclosure (1) and (2) at Parade Rest.
- 1000-(1) Adjutant front and center and orders Band to "Sound Attention".
 - (2) Band sounds "Attention". Each unit commander commands "Attention".
 - (3) Adjutant commands "Sound Adjutant's Call".
 - (4) Adjutant commands "Parade Rest" "Sound Off".
 - (5) Band plays, Adjutant returns to position in steff.
 - (6) Commander of Troops then directs the Adjutant, "Receive, The Report, Sir". The Adjutant, passing the Commander of Troops right, marches to his post between the troops and the Commander from where he commands "Report".
 - (7) On "Report", the regimental, separate battalion and separate company commanders in succession from left to right, front to rear, salute and report "_____Regt/Bn/Co, all present or accounted for". The Adjutant returns each salute after the report is completed.
 - (8) The Adjutant then faces the Commander of Troops and reports "Sir, All Present Or Accounted For".
 - (9) Commander of Troops directs Adjutant "Publish The Orders, Sir".
 - (10) Adjutant commands "Attention to Orders". Designated Officer then reads pertinent extracts from outgoing and incoming Commanding General's orders.
 - (11) Adjutant assumes position in staff.

- (12) Commander of Troops boxes staff, commands "Present the Colors". Color Guard moves forward.
- (13) Major General SIMPSON and Major General WHEELER take position in front of VIP stand.
- (14) Commander of Troops faces about, orders "Present Arms", faces about and executes hand salute.
- (15) Band plays VN National Anthem and National Anthem.

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(16) Commander of Troops commands "Order Arms" Color Guard moves to original position.

- (17) Commander of Troops faces about commands "Present Arms", faces about and executes hand salute.
- (18) Band renders honor to Major General SIMPSON. See NOTE
- (19) Commander of Troops terminates hand salute, faces about, commands "Order Arms", directs the Sgt Major to "Deliver the color to the Commanding General" and faces about.
- (20) Sgt Major takes most direct route to a position four paces in front of the Division color guard, salutes and takes the organization color from the color bearer. Sgt Major then marches to a position two paces in front of Major General SIMPSON.
- (21) Commander of Troops faces about, orders "Present Arms", faces about and executes hand salute.
- (22) Sgt Major transfers the colors to Major General SIMPSON who passes the colors to Major General WHEELER. Major General SIMPSON's flag will be hauled down at the point when he passes the color to Major General WHEELER. Sgt Major salutes as the color is passing from one to the other. Major General WHEELER transfers the colors to the Sgt Major.
- (23) Commander of Troops terminates hand salute, faces about and orders "Order Arms".
- (24) Sgt Major returns the Division color to the color bearer, salutes and resumes his post.
- (25) Commander of Troops orders "Present Arms", faces about and executes hand salute.
- (26) Band renders honors to Major General WHEELER, Major General WHEELER's flag is broken on the first note of the music.
- (27) Commander of Troops terminates hand salute, faces about, commands "Order Arms" followed by "Parade Rest", faces about and assumes position of parade rest.
- (28) Microphone is placed in the front of the General Officers.
- (29) Reading of messages.

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- (30) Remarks by Major General SIMPSON and Major General WHEELER.
- (31) Commander of Troops calls the command to attention.
- (32) Band plays "Auld Lang Syne" and "The Marine's Hymn".
- (33) Major General SIMPSON and Major General WHEELER depart.
- NOTE: During rendering of musical honors all personnel stand at attention. Personnel in uniform salute during playing of musical honors.
- 2. <u>Foul Weather</u>. In the event of inclement weather, the Change of Command Ceremony will be held in the Headquarters Battalion officers mess at the same time and date.
- a. Formation and Participants. The formation will consist of the Commander of Troops, representive staffs, Adjutant, Sgt Major, band, organizational colors of regiments, battalions and separate battalions. The only National flags in the ceremony will be those of the Division and Republic of Vietnam. The formation for the ceremony will be as set forth in enclosure (1).
 - b. The uniform will be the same as for fair weather plan.
- c. Ceremony responsibilities remain in the basic Bulletin except as noted herein after.

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CONTROL OF HELICOPTERS

- 1. In order to provide timely and expeditious transportation for VIPs attending the 1st Marine Division Change of Command Ceremony, the following system will be implemented:
- a. Land-line and radio communications will be established between the Division LZ 401 pad, Division VIP 400 pad, and the Ceremony Coordinator.
 - b. Radio communications will be established between LZs 400 and 401.
